

Bush proposes sharp cuts in U.S., Soviet nuclear arsenals



U.S. President George Bush proposed sweeping cuts in U.S. and Soviet nuclear arsenals.

WASHINGTON — President Bush wants the Soviets to join in scaling back the world's most powerful nuclear missiles as he commits the United States to eliminating most short-range missiles.

In an announcement detailing some of the biggest changes in nuclear history, Bush pledged Friday to "take steps to make the world a less dangerous place than ever before in the nuclear age.

Bush said in a nationwide television address that he will eliminate ground-launched short range nuclear weapons — most of them stored in Europe — as well as those carried on ships and submarines, including the Pentagon's 350-400 Tomahawk cruise missiles. But the United States will keep those carried aboard aircraft.

He further offered to open negotiations with the Soviet Union to eliminate all long-range ballistic missiles with multiple warheads, an area where the Soviet Union has a large advantage.

Bush, however, would keep U.S. ship-borne multiple warheads, where the United States has the edge.

It was not clear how many warheads would be eliminated under Bush's unilateral cuts, but a senior official who briefed reporters said it would be

The president called on the Soviets to respond to his plan with "equal-He telephoned Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and Russian Presi-

dent Boris Yeltsin on Friday morning to inform them of his decision and also consulted Friday with European leaders.

"I have asked the Soviets to go down this road with us — to destroy their entire inventory of ground-launched theater nuclear weapons," Bush

Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin, briefed in New York by Secretary of State James A. Baker III, said his country is "prepared to give a positive response to an initiative of the United States and to meet U.S. steps halfway.'

'Peace dividend' likely if Soviets reciprocate

NEW YORK — If the Soviet Union reciprocates, and the early response is favorable, President Bush's proposal to ban some of the most dangerous ocean-spanning nuclear weapons could produce a peace dividend from

the Cold War far surpassing budget savings. The long-range nuclear missiles with multiple warheads that the two superpowers have poised at each other from ground silos are considered by many experts as the most likely to touch off a nuclear holocaust.

Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger lamented years ago the decision of the two superpowers to develop multi-warhead missiles as a terrible mistake. It is these weapons that Bush on Friday night suggested the United States and the Soviet Union scrap

only two months after he and Gorbachev signed a Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty that would have retained a mighty arsenal — and only a day after he asked Congress to provide funds for the MX Peacekeeper.

"The time is right to use START as a springboard to achieve additional stabilizing changes," Bush said in proposing the two sides vault past the cutbacks of about one-third in their globe-girdling nuclear/weapons/to "seek early agreement to eliminate from their inventories all ICBMs with multiple warheads.'

He said "such an action would take away the single most unstable part of our nuclear arsenals.

Bush ranged far beyond multiple-warhead missile cutbacks in unveiling one of the most sweeping arms control plans since the dawn of the atomic age 46 years

Other presidents have spoken hopefully of reversing the nuclear arms race, and Ronald Reagan, in a summit meeting with Mikhail S. Gorbachev in Reykjavik, Iceland, in 1987 proposed eliminating all nuclear weapons.

The proposal was quickly altered to encompass only ballistic missiles - and not long after that was abandoned as unrealistic.

The end of the Cold War, Gorbachev's own arms reductions and persistent calls from Americans for a "peace dividend" all contributed to Bush's sweeping declaration. So did a series of initiatives from Democrats in Congress, including one by Sen. Albert Gore of Tennessee nine years ago to ban multiple-warhead

The unification of Germany effectively removed fears in the West that Communist troops from the East would rush across the East-West divide. It also, as Bush acknowledged after/slow deliberation, riddled/the rationale for NATO's maintaining battlefield nuclear weapons. As a result, Bush announced the United States would eliminate its land-based tactical nuclear weapons and

ines and ships.

'We can now take steps to make the world a less dangerou's place than ever before in the nuclear age. Bush said in a nationwide "Idress from the Oval

The elimination of battlefield nuclear weapons can be accomplished with a stroke of the presidential pen. Many of the other provisions of Bush's plan require cooperation from the Soviet Union. And working together they would have to try to restrain the world's growing nuclear club.

Gorbachev, who pioneered in trimming troops and weapons, is likely to embrace at least the outline of Bush's proposal once he absorbs the details.

Russian Federation President Boris Yeltsin promptly offered immediate support. "Boris Yeltsin gave high marks to the initiative and spoke in favor of identical huge cuts on the Soviet Union's side." the Russian Federation's official news agency reported in a dispatch

In New York, Secretary of State James A. Baker III discussed the proposal Thursday and Friday with Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin, who told reporters

"We have established that both sides are positive and radically inclined on the matter. We are prepared to give a positive response to any initiative of the United States and to meet U.S. steps halfway.

Candidates offer different views on education reform

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) -Gubernatorial candidates Larry Hopkins and Brereton Jones both say they support the 1990 education bill, but their stands part company after that.

Hopkins told the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence on Friday that education reform with probably have to proceed more slowly because of financial concerns.



World leaders endorse Bush's arms initiative

Boris Yeltsin joined other world leaders in praise for President Bush's proposal to sharply reduce superpower nuclear arsenals, and Australia's leader today described the cuts as "the single most decisive step for world peace since the nuclear age began.

The Russian republic president, according to an official report, gave his hearty endorsement to the initiative, one of the broadest changes in U.S. nuclear strategy since the start of the nuclear arms race in the early 1950s.

'Boris Yeltsin gave high marks to the initiative and spoke in favor of identical huge cuts on the Soviet Union's side," the official Russian Information Agency reported Friday in a brief dispatch.

And though there was no immediate public response from Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin said Moscow is receiving the initiative in a "positive"

"We are prepared to give a positive response to an initiative of the United States and to meet U.S. steps halfway," he said in New York.

Bush, in a speech from the Oval Office Friday, announced the United States will eliminate its land-based tactical nuclear weapons and remove all short-range atomic arms from U.S. submarines

He also called on Moscow to open negotiations to eliminate all long-range ballistic missiles with multiple warheads.

Bush cabled details of the plan to Gorbachev, Yeltsin and others on Thursday, and followed that up with calls Friday to Gorbachev, Yeltsin and Western leaders,

according to White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

British Prime Minister John Major, in a statement released soon after the speech, hailed the proposals and urged the Soviets to respond "with equal imagination." 'These are far-reaching propos-

als." he said. "I trust that President Gorbachev and President Yeltsin will respond with equal imagination. If they do, it will be a turning point in our history, bringing enormous benefits to mankind.

Australia's prime minister, Bob Hawke, described the cuts as "the single most decisive step for world peace since the nuclear age began nearly 50 years ago.

"In an act of great imagination, vision and courage, George Bush has moved the world a step back from the brink of nuclear annihilation," Hawke said in a statement.

In Japan, the only nation to have been bombed by atomic weapons and a strong advocate of nuclear disarmament, Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu called the initiative 'epoch-making.'

'The government of Japan strongly welcomes this epochmaking and courageous initiative by President Bush and strongly supports this initiative as a major step forward," he said.

The Italian government welcomed Bush's proposals with "the strongest satisfaction," saying in a statement they would "contribute to consolidating the new climate of international collaboration.

Premier Giulio Andreotti, in a letter to Bush, said he also hoped the Soviet Union would adopt similar measures.

Andreotti was also informed by Bush on Friday morning of the U.S. measures, which include reductions in short-range nuclear missiles, a statement from the premier's office said.

SOVIET UNION

TBILISI — Opponents of Georgia's president gave up their weapons, and negotiators for both sides prepared today to meet to try to end the worst upheaval in the Soviet republics since the failed coup in Moscow. The atmosphere was notably calmer in the streets of Tbilisi, the Georgian capital, and at a broadcasting center on the outskirts where hundreds of rebel national guardsmen and opposition activists were maintaining a vigil. There were however, government trucks forming roadblocks.

•The interim committee running the national economy decided to cut defense allocations by 5.6 billion rubles (\$10 billion), about 6 percent of the officially stated defense budget of 96.5 billion rubles (\$173.7 billion). •In Tadzhikistan, Muslim leaders canceled Friday prayers for the first time in memory so thousands of faithful could continue their protests over the naming of a Communist Party hard-liner to replace the republic's acting president. Tadzhik President Rakhman Nabiyev insisted he would not resort to violence and said he was ready to negotiate with opposition leaders, who claim his rise to power amounted to a coup.

Deputy KGB Chairman Nikolai Stolyarov said in Moscow that the security

police would be dissolved in newly independent Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia by early next year.

TOKYO - Typhoon Mireille, pelting Japan with heavy rains and strong winds, has killed at least 39 people and injured 660 and caused blackouts at more than 3 million homes, police and other government agencies said today. Mireille, the 19th typhoon spawned in the Pacific this year, hit Japan's southern shores Friday afternoon with winds gusting up to 133 mph. Heavy rains triggered landslides and flooding on the southern island of Kyushu, where 10 deaths were reported Friday. According to the National Police Agency, 39 people had been killed, most by falling debris, landslides and floods, nationwide as of this afternoon. Six other people were reported missing and 660 injured. Police said the typhoon capsized 32 ships and flooded 10,614 homes. More than 3.6 million homes, including 2 million on Kyushu alone, had also been affected by temporary power outages — the nation's worst typhoon-related blackout on record

ROMANIA
BUCHAREST — Police used trucks and tear gas today to clear the central square of hundreds of protesters unsatisfied with government promises to meet their demands for better living and work conditions. "We need sincere people to lead us," Doina Cornea, a leading anti-Communist dissident, told Romanian TV on Friday. "The leaders we have now lied to us." Marian Munteanu, a leader of student protesters brutally beaten by miners last year when they were called to Bucharest to crush anti-government protests, later appeared alongside miners at downtown University Square. "The miners are our brothers," he told the crowd of about 5,000. "I don't agree with violence, but I must admit that in crisis situations like this, we need unity. "Unity! Unity!" the crowd cried.

But he complained the proposal would save only \$500 million from the \$291 billion defense budget.

Administration officials did not offer cost estimates but said some of the scaling down steps would likely end up costing money.

Bush warned against any expectations for "a budget windfall for domestic programs.

Much of Bush's plan is geared toward reducing the hair-trigger status of U.S. and Soviet nuclear arsenals, which has caused great concern about an unintended nuclear exchange.

Eliminating tactical weapons from Europe, Bush said, is appropriate because, "a Soviet invasion into Western Europe, launched with little or no warning, is no longer a realistic threat. The Warsaw Pact has crumbled. In the Soviet Union, the advocates of democracy triumphed over a coup that would have restored the old system of repression.'

With some Soviet leaders questioning their need for a large nuclear capability, Bush said, there is "an unparalleled opportunity to change the nuclear posture of both the United States and the Soviet Union. In addition to the elimination of tactical nuclear missiles, Bush

announced the following unilateral steps: - Removing U.S. B-52 and B-1 strategic bombers from day-to-day alert status and returning their weapons to storage. Bush asked the Soviets to withdraw their mobile intercontinental missiles to their garrisons. - Withdrawal from alert of all intercontinental ballistic missiles sche-

duled for deactivation under the yet-unratified Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty. He asked the Soviets to do the same.

- Abandonment of the controversial rail-based system for the 10-warhead MX missile, which the Senate voted down Thursday. The MX missiles based in silos will remain.

- Creation of a new U.S. Strategic Command to streamline the previously separate Navy and Air Force commands of strategic weapons. The new command will be based at Offut Air Force Base in Omaha, with commanders rotated between the Navy and Air Force.

The consolidation coupled with elimination of short range missiles from naval ships is sure to be considered a worrisome diminution of power in naval circles.

Immediate implementation of the START treaty, which was signed in July in Moscow but which the administration still has not sent to the Senate for ratification. Although it has a seven-year implementation allowance, the United States will begin eliminating the long-range weapons it covers at an accelerated pace. Despite the cuts, Bush said, "Let no one doubt we will still retain the

necessary strength to protect our security and that of our allies and to respond as necessary. He said he remains committed to full funding of the B-2 bomber prog-

ram and Strategic Defense Initiative known as Star Wars.

Lottery president projects optimism

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — It may be a while before the Kentucky Lottery can get to returning 35 percent of total sales to the state, but

President James Hosker said that is not the point. Hosker said Thursday he hopes to give the state \$90 million this fiscal year, which is what the budget calls for from the lottery. But the percentage of total sales may not even reach 25 percent.

He emphasized it is possible that by returning a smaller percentage, the total number of dollars could be larger. For example, Hosker said that returning more money in the form of

prizes will increase total sales and therefore the take to the state. Currently, the state is getting about 24 percent of each dollar spent on lottery tickets. The remainder goes to prizes, administration and

Lawmakers, who had been worried by earlier predictions that the lottery could return only \$60 million or so to the state, appeared satisfied with Hosker's prediction and explanation. "The bottom-line dollar is the more important figure," said Sen.

Mike Moloney, D-Lexington. Hosker also told the interim Appropriations and Revenue Committee

that he was not advocating any plan to use lottery proceeds to build a new football stadium for the University of Louisville.

The Kentucky Division of Forestry announced today that Calloway County will be patroled daily by airplane beginning October 1st and continuing through December 15th for grass and forest fire protection. Local Forest Ranger Ron Talent explained, "The Kentucky fire laws will go into effect October 1st and continue in effect through December 15th. KRS 149.400 states that there will be no burning except between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 12:00 midnight." He further stated that all fire spotted by airplane will be reported to the local Ranger and will be checked out by him or cited into court. Mr. Talent stated that citizens using the excuse of not knowing the law will

not be excused. Mr. Talent is asking your fullest cooperation again this fall to help him keep fires in Calloway County to the absolute minimum. If you must burn, wait until after 4:30 p.m., never burn if the wind is high, and always stay with the fire until the last spark is out. If you let a fire get out of control, even if you are burning during the legal hours between 4:30 p.m. through 12:00 midnight, you will be cited into

Airport improvement efforts are taking off in the Commonwealth

I have long viewed the development of safe and efficient airports as one of our most promising tools for economic growth in large and small communities across Kentucky and the nation.

This is particularly true in a time of economic recession, which makes this the right time, in my opinion, for a report on the very encouraging progress we have been making with regard to our Kentucky

As chairman of our Aviation Subcommittee, I have been working for some years now to encourage the use of our federal Aviation Trust Fund for much needed airport improvements in every part of our nation. This fund has a surplus of more than \$7 billion. It is supported by those who use our aviation system -- and it should be used for their

We are achieving increased use of our Trust Fund for a variety of far-sighted purposes, including the alleviation of airport noise problems. These problems must be solved in connection with airport projects to meet the tremendous growth of air-passenger traffic in recent

I have also been very pleased with our success in building federal support for vital improvements and essential-air-service programs for many of our smaller airports, such as those in Owensboro and Paducah.

These and other efforts have produced some impressive results in recent years. But I don't think we have ever seen more encouraging results than we are seeing in Kentucky today. Some of our most recent

* A federal commitment of \$149 million for Standiford Field xpansion, which could create as many as 16,000 jobs in the Louisville area over the next few years. We have also obtained \$585,000 for a security system and Senate approval of \$3 million for a new control tower at Standiford Field.

* Funding of \$4 million for noise abatement, \$805,251 for a taxiway and \$500,000 for a master-plan update at the Cincinnati-Northern Kentucky International Airport. We are also looking at the possible release of \$100 million to resolve noise problems in connection with the expansion of this airport, which will contribute some \$3.3 billion to the regional economy in 1992.

* Ninety percent federal funding of a \$6 million reliever airport

* A \$1.3 million security-system grant for Lexington's Blue Grass

* Funding of \$500,000 for runway overlay and \$648,000 for an instrument-landing-system (ILS) site at the Bowling Green Airport, which has already received ILS equipment funding.

* Other projects, including funding for a new runway at Hatcher Field in Pikeville, a new airport for Russell County, priority consideration of runway extension for McCreary County and airport improvements at Georgetown, Murray, Mount Sterling, Mayfield and Sturgis.

I look forward to working with state and local leaders across Kentucky as we continue to strengthen our economy through an improved aviation system in the months and years ahead.

Sept. 23; Starkville (Miss.) Daily News: What has happened to the Democrats?

The pugnacious party of Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Truman has wallowed lately in defeatist moaning over the difficulty of capturing the presidency in 1992. After three straight losses in national elections, most Democrats see small chance of beating a popular Republican incumbent with his string of victories in war and foreign affairs. The biggest Democratic names have dropped one by one from the list of likely candidates. Until just over a week ago, former Sen. Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts

was the only announced contender.

The announcements by Virginia Gov. Douglas Wilder and Iowa Sen. Tom Harkin tripled the Democratic field. Arkansas Gov., Bill Clinton and Nebraska Sen. Bob Kerrey are expected to add their names soon.

None of these candidates look(s) likely to sweep the primaries and make next summer's convention just a formality. A wide open convention with a huge television audience would, in contract to a yawn-producing coronation, launch a nominee with no problem of face or name

Issues? While Democrats share the need to bash George Bush for his preoccupation with foreign policy and the thinness of his domestic policy, they cover a range of other emphases.

Wilder is a champion of fiscal restraint. Harkin seeks to evoke the give-'em-hell style of Harry Truman, with a populist peal for liberal solutions. Democrats face the hard fact the Republican party, nationally, commands the loyalty of most white middle-class voters. Yet the same voters choose Democratic congressional majorities.

However, translating local political success into a credible bid for the White House is the elusive trick. The relative unknowns seeking the office need to demonstrate their worthiness in honorable combat for their party's nod.

A well-publicized fight producing a nominee of newfound stature, speaking to a broad cross-section of American, could result in a real challenge to a complacent Bush.

The phantasy of the opera

The country music television networks have me hooked. I flip back and forth between two cable channels to get them.

Country is the only music I can understand the words to anymore. No one writes ballads nowadays, and the words to rock music are harder to decipher than classical opera, which at least has the excuse of being in Italian or some other non-English language.

I was reared on country music; nobody in Tennessee in those times escaped the influence of Saturday night and "clear-channel" radio station WSM. Hank Williams, Jimmy Dickens, Roy Acuff, Patsy Cline and the others were all members of

Other than being so readily at hand, what made country music a family matter were the words to the songs. "Blue Roses," "Your Cheatin' Heart," "The Great Speckled Bird," "D-I-V-O-R-C-E" and such were about the longings and heartaches of living.

In fact, I'm "Almost Persuaded" that country songs are soap opera for plain folks, set to music.

That makes me wonder: Why are all the television afternoon soaps about well-off people - tycoons, doctors, lawyers, Mafia figures? Why are there no soap operas for ordinary folks?

Is it because working people are out working in the afternoons and can't watch "Days of Our Lives" or "The Young and the Restless"?

Probably not. Most viewers have VCRs with timers now and can record the soaps if they are not at home. In fact, we understand that they do precisely that when it comes to afternoon soaps.

One theory is that working people are drawn to the soap operas because the characters are caricatures of a lifestyle that can be consumed vicariously in the absence of affluence. Through soaps, we enjoy the fancy restaurants and cocktail parties without having to put them on our credit cards; we are involved in the illicit relationships and trysts without having to pay any emotional or legal price for

Country music provides us with many of the same entanglements and surprises that afternoon soap operas do. The difference between the two genres is in the characters, who are more likely in country music to be beauticians, truck drivers, cowhands, farmers and

Why have the two media never merged? Why is there no country music soap opera on afternoon television? Surely there is as much viewer market for plain-folk actors named Tammy and Roy and Porter as for high-rollers like Michael or Sabrina or Roman.

Actually, there is a form of country soap evolving, and seeping through the back door. Used to be that television merely showed the singers doing their thing on stage, in front of an audience, at the Opry or elsewhere. Copying MTV, many of the songs are now presented in story-line vignettes, with pictures that follow the song's lyrics.

For example, Randy Travis has a good video about visiting his grandmother's old farm and having hashbacks of happier days of youth and memories of the old man. There are steamier tapes, of course, depending upon the message in the words

As these short pieces show, country music has in it the makings of television drama every bit as tearful — and as convoluted, plastic and phantastic - as the uptown

afternoon soap operas. The primary argument against such a merger of entertainment


forms is that it could disintegrate into a musical version of "The Beverly Hillbillies" or "The Dukes of Hazard," canning only the corn of country life and not the cream. The fantasy for viewers of regular soap operas is in getting on television what they otherwise personally cannot afford either financially or morally. Viewers won't watch soap drama that is too much about people like themselves as they are: they want to see themselves as they ought to be but are not.

But if that is the case, that opens an interesting avenue of thought. Maybe the hidden audience for a country soap opera is not the housewives and working women who watch the fast-lane soaps, but the fast-lane wives and single women who are tired of the view at the top and who want to get "down and out" without actually sacrificing anything.

Country soap opera is just a thought, born out of a feeling that afternoon television probably needs something other than what it now has. Country music in soap opera packaging offers as much stilted staging as Worldwide Wrestling, as much innuendo and scandal as Geraldo, and as much intrigue and drama as "Santa Barbera."

Pick up on this idea, Nashville.

Rope it and ride it. And then, after that, let me also advise you to look into getting Pat Sajak to replace Ralph Emery as your all-night talk host.

FRANKFORT — Last week we looked at why Joe Wright, majority leader of the Kentucky Senate and one of the most respected and talented members of the General Assembly, decided to call it a day and retire next year.

The workload, at home and in Frankfort, even for part-time lawmakers, is taking more and more time away from families, businesses or professions. Add the special responsibilities of the majority leadership of the Senate, and after 16 years, Wright decided to go home to his family and farm.

Understandable, perhaps, but a major loss to the legislature; indeed, to the entire state.

There was a time in the not-too distant past that a lawmaker of Joe Wright's proven abilities and leadership qualities could have looked forward to a climb up the political ladder. A seat in either house of Congress. Or, an eight-year stay in Frankfort, four years in the Lieutenant Governor's Mansion followed by four years in the Governor's Mansion.

The game — and the rules it is played by — have changed mightily in recent years, however.

Now, open seats in either the U.S. House or Senate are rare to come by. Even as the number of Kentucky seats in the House slips by one, those who remain have virtual lifetime locks on those seats. It has been a good 15 years since an incumbent Kentucky congressman was defeated for re-election.

No one is likely to oust either U.S. Sens. Wendell Ford or Mitch McConnell for some years to come. Besides, even the best and the brightest of citizen-politicians think



COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — A Texas A&M kicker who collapsed and died before practice had been evaluated for a heart problem in high school, but the condition would not have caused his sudden death, the team's physician said.

Dr. Jesse Parr said the results of an autopsy did not reveal what caused James Glenn, 19, a walk-on freshman kicker from League City, to collapse at Kyle Field before practice Wednesday. He died a short time later at a

hospital.
"This incident that occurred with this athlete could have occurred walking across campus, in the dorm, at the movie or just as well on the football field." Parr said.

However, a cardiologist, Dr. B.T. Turakhia, said he had been treating Glenn for arrhythmia, the same condition that killed Loyola Marymount basketball star Hank Gathers. Arrhythmia, said Turakhia, "can cause death very rarely, but it can cause



Red, White and Blue USA leads Ryder Cup play

KIAWAH ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — For the first time in four years, the United States came out of opening-day Ryder Cup play in something other than a catch-up position.

The Americans' lead was by the smallest of margins, a single point over the European stars who have dominated this biennial competition But it was a lead, $4 \frac{1}{12}$ points to $3 \frac{1}{12}$, and that's a far, far better position

than the 6-2 and 5-3 deficits they faced in 1987 and 1989, respectively. The margin could have been — and perhaps should have been — even larger. But a great rally by Spanish stars Seve Ballesteros and Jose Maria Olazabal prevented an American sweep of the morning foursomes matches, in which each member of a two-man team plays alternate shots on the

In the afternoon, in fourball play in which scoring is based on the better ball of each two-man team, Sam Torrance of Scotland and David Feherty of Northern Ireland came back from 3-down after 10 holes and halved a match that appeared to be the property of Lanny Wadkins and Mark

Ray Floyd, at 49 the oldest man ever to play in these matches and the only former captain to return as a player, teamed with Fred Couples as the most prolific American team.

They scored two victories, 2 and 1 over Bernhard Langer of Germany and Mark James of England in foursomes, and 5 and 3 over England's Nick Faldo and Masters champion Ian Woosnam of Wales in the fourball. The fourball drubbing of Faldo and Woosnam was their second in the 10½ hours of competition on Friday over the sand dunes and marshes of the new Ocean course.

The duo, one of European captain Bernard Gallacher's principal weapons, also lost 1-up to Payne Stewart and Mark Calcavecchia in the mom-

Use of bluestone may cause fish kill

Using bluestone (copper sulfate) to control algae in ponds may cause a fish kill, if the concentration is too great, according to an Extension aquaculture specialist.

"Bluestone is effective in controlling algae, but can kill fish if the alkalinity of the water is under 50 parts per million and label recommendations are followed," said Bill Wurts, aquaculture specialist with Kentucky State

Wurts explained that standard agricultural recommendations for controlling algae using bluestone requently do not take into account the alkalinity of the water or whether fish are present.

He said that if the alkalinity is below 20 parts per million, bluestone should not be used at all. If it is above 20 parts per million bluestone can be used, provided that its concentration is not great.

Wurts said the following table can be used to determine how much bluestone can be used with-

Alkalinity of LESS THAN 20 NO BLUESTONE EFFECTIVENESS IS GREATLY REDUCED ABOVE 200

Wurts said that certain fish, including carp, grass carp, goldfish and trout may be more sensitive to bluestone and that it probably

Spring turkey hunting dates set for 1992

Spring turkey hunting for 1992 in Kentucky will run April 15-28, according to regulations recently approved by the state's Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission.

New for '92, there will be only one zone statewide instead of two zones with different season dates. Also new for next spring, a regulation has been established to make it illegal to use gobbler or hen calls in any legal turkey hunting area during the preseason period of March 1-April 14.

Nine new counties, including Calloway, and parts of counties have been added for turkey hunting in the spring.

In the western part of the state, these also include Caldwell, Hickman and Lyon counties and two sections of Crittenden County the portion of the county south of Ky. 120 and east of U.S. 641, and another sector which lies south of

should not be used for algae control in waters stocked with any of these fish.

He said that the pond is heavily overgrown with algae, a complete treatment is not advised, since killing all the algae at once will cause it to decompse rapidly, using much of the pond's oxygen in the process. And that also may lead to fish

"Treat only a third of the pond at a time, if it is heavily infested with algae. The remainder can be treated at two week intervals," he said.

For more information on controlling algae in farm ponds, contact your county Extension agent for agriculture.

'Sneaker boots' lead to a quiet revolution

HENDERSON, Ky — There's a quiet revolution going on in outdoor footwear and the woods haven't been so full of sneakers since the native tribes were making a move on Daniel Boone.

In the time of the legendary Long Hunters and their foes, both wore smoke tanned deerskin moccasins well-suited for moving quietly through the woods. They were thin and allowed the wearer's foot to feel the ground for an instant before he put his weight down and avoid the perhaps fatal noise of breaking a dry stick underfoot.

And moccasins were so light that a woodsman could walk as lightly as if he were barefoot. But they didn't provide much protection from cold or dampness and they wore out rapidly and the soles were slippery on some

Succeeding generations of outdoorsmen gave up lightness and silence for comfort and protection by adopting high-topped, heavy-soled leather boots. They kept out snow, rain and cold, but by the end of a long day, the wearer often felt as if he were wearing a concrete block on each foot.

The Vietnam War produced a breakthrough with the military jungle boot. It was made of leather and nylon fabric, but of necessity retained a heavy rubber, lugged sole usually reinforced with steel mesh.

Returning veterans wore their 'Nam boots afield and found them satisfactory in warm weather; soon, low-cost civilian versions were available. A few manufacturers, notably Browning, were producing high quality leather boots that were remarkably light, quiet and offered foot and leg protection, but they were expensive.

While military jungle boots were finding a place in the American field, designer athletic shoes were becoming the choice for much casual wear. Some of the casual footwear fulfilled the outdoorsman's requirements, but stood out in the woods like a flashing blue light and didn't offer much lower leg protection.

A marriage took place and a new generation of outdoor boots was born. Now, outfitters' catalogues and sporting goods stores are full of high tech 'sneakers' in quiet colors and camouflage patterns designed for the woods and the mountains. Made for everything from casual trail strolling to grueling mountaineer-

ing, the boots employ combinations of leather and fabric along with other manmade materials. Rubber and composition soles may be designed for use on a smooth trail or rugged rockface. Despite their light weight — Rocky Eliminators are advertised at only

21/2 pounds per pair — most are made with ultra-thin insulation and fabric that is water repellent but breathable.

The new foot gear reveals its parentage: out of athletic shoes by military boots. The hikers tend toward their mother's side, and Nike makes some, while the hunting boots look more like their father and carry names like Predator and Elk Royale.

Probably the perfect outdoor footwear for all conditions will never be developed, but today's high-tech sneaker boots have quietly gone a long way toward achieving the comfort, protection and quietness for which D. Boone would have paid many deer skins.

DEAR DR. GOTT. I require sur gery due to a cancerous polyp, and I question whether a colostomy will automatically cause me to become impotent. Would a colostomy bag in-

terfere with sexual activity DEAR READER. Malignancies of the bowel can, if discovered early, be removed with very little disruption of intestinal function. This is particularly true of polyps, growths that extend out from the intestinal wall like a mushroom growing on a log. Therefore, you may not have to worry about a colostomy

On the other hand, once malignant cells have invaded the bowel wall or worse, the tissue and lymph glands near the intestine - more extensive surgery is required. Along with the cancer, some normal bowel tissue has to be removed to ensure that hidden cancer cells do not remain. In this circumstance, provision must be made for alternative methods of evacuation, while the injured area of bowel

The/most satisfactory method is to reroute · the intestinal contents through an abdominal opening, into a collecting apparatus. Such a colostomy may be temporary or permanent In the former, patients undergo re-operation, after the original surgery has healed, to return the intestine to normal. In the latter, patients have to use an external collecting appliance indefinitely

Except in highly unusual cases, co lostomy surgery does not interfere with the circulation and nerve supply to the penis. Thus, impotence should not appear as a consequence of surgery alone. Obviously, all bets are off in the presence of extensive surgery (for widespread disease), bowel cancer that is near to (or has spread to the prostate gland, or the need for radiation therapy.

Whether a colostomy bag will interfere with normal sexual activity depends on where it is located and the attitude of its wearer A man who is ashamed or embarrassed about his colostomy may well have trouble. On the contrary, a colostomy patient who is familiar with proper care of the appliance and accepts the necessity for it will probably experience no difficulty during sexual activity

MADISONVILLE, Ky. (AP) -Democratic gubernatorial candidate Brereton Jones suggests the Tennessee Valley Authority be allowed to increase electric rates to cover the cost of new emissions controls.

The TVA has threatened to switch to low-sulfur coal from western states unless Kentucky helps with the cost of installing scrubbers, devices that reduce sulfur emissions that cause acid rain. Using scrubbers would allow TVA to continue using high-sulfur western Kentucky coal and still meet new federal clean-air requirements.

Jones made that suggestion Thursday as an alternative to the state offering TVA a subsidy. However, he said that until he learns more about the issue, it would be irresponsible for him to rule out a state subsidy for TVA.

He and his Republican opponent, U.S. Rep. Larry Hopkins of Kentucky's 6th District, appeared at a forum as part of James Madison Days, an annual civic observance in Madisonville in western Kentucky.

"I think we need to give serious consideration to allowing a fueladjustment charge for the utilities that put those scrubbers on," Jones said. "It would seem to me that we've got to focus on a way to do that in a manner that would allow our citizens to be able to bear the

Goodbye, Fourth

4th Army now a part of military history

FORT SHERIDAN, III. (AP) - The 4th Army, which trained more than half the combat soldiers sent overseas during World War II, has staged its final review and passed into U.S. military history.

The unit was disbanded amid tearful ceremonies Friday that marked a first step toward closing Fort Sheridan. The base is among several the Defense Department is shutting down as it scales back the armed

"It's like you've lost something," said Mary Jane Lucas, who was part of the 4th's historic first corps of women deployed to the field in 1942. "You want to cry. They were saving me a place in the cemetery here, and now they might move the graves, too.'

The fate of the fort's land after it closes in 1992 is undecided. Military officials have said that it is possible the cemetery could be moved Activated in 1932, the 4th prepared huge numbers of soldiers for combat between World War II and the Persian Gulf War. It established the Western Defense Command to protect the West Coast during World War II and sent several units to Florida during the Cuban missile crisis.

On Friday, soldiers turned out for a final review by Lt. Gen. James R. Hall, the 4th Army's commander. Hall retired Friday after receiving the Distinguished Service Medal, the Army's highest peacetime award. The band played, and about 500 people, including civilians and personnel from other units at Fort Sheridan, applauded, saluted — and

"It was very emotional," said Carol Jacobsen, wife of Col. Jim Jacobsen. "It was very sad." Some of the soldiers were teary-eyed, too.

"A soldier's not supposed to cry, but I had tears in my eyes," said Maj. Sungho Shin of Honolulu. The 4th was deactivated at Fort Sam Houston in 1971, mostly to

save money. It was reactivated at Fort Sheridan in 1984.

With just 216 civilian and 119 active Army personnel, the 4th supervised the training and readiness of about 137,000 Army reserve and National Guard troops from Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin.

It was among the best training units in the armed forces, said Gen. Edwin H. Burba Jr., commander in chief of Forces Command at Fort McPherson, Ga. He reviewed the troops Friday along with Hall. "In the Persian Gulf crisis, the 4th Army provided forces without a hitch, without a ripple and always on time," Burba said.

Most of the unit's soldiers were reassigned to the 1st Army at Fort Meade, Md., or the new U.S. Army Reserve Command in Atlanta. Sgt. Maj. Frank Toles is among those headed to Maryland.

"You think of the history that this unit had," Toles said, "but with the drawdown of the Army, some of us had to go. I'm sorry it had to
