## 'Let the people know what time it is' Magic moves from sports champion to AIDS champion

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A beaming, joking Magic Johnson shifted from his role as a sports champion to his new role as champion of AIDS awareness with no sign of self pity or anger. "You don't have to feel sorry for me because if I die tomorrow I've had the greatest life," he told talk show host Arsenio Hall on Friday in his first public appearance since announcing that he has the HIV virus.

The studio audience at "The Arsenio Hall Show" gave the Los Angeles Lakers superstar a two-

minute standing ovation.

Fans, fellow athletes and others rallied to support Johnson after he announced Thursday that he had tested positive for the virus and would retire from basketball. "I think this is an alarm clock for a lot of people," said Chicago Bulls star Michael Jordan. "God did this for a reason and I think we should adhere to that and learn from it."

Johnson offered some AIDS advice Friday, urging Hall's audience "to practice safe sex, start using condoms and be aware."

"I came on to let the people know what time it is. Please put your thinking caps on and put your cap on down there," he said, gesturing below his belt.

People already are paying attention. After his announcement, callers flooded AIDS hot lines around the country, including one at the federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Between 5 p.m. and midnight Thursday, the CDC hot line — which normally gets about 3,000 telephone calls a day — received 40,000 calls, said CDC spokesman

Kent Taylor. The crush continued Friday, he said.

President Bush, in Rome, defended his administration's response to the disease, saying it had "increased funding dramatically" for AIDS research.

"I can't say I've done enough," Bush said. "Of course I haven't."

The Lakers, in their first game since Johnson announced his retirement, lost 113-85 to the Phoenix Suns.

Both teams gathered at the center of the court before the game and Laker A.C. Green led players,

coaches and fans in a brief prayer. Laker Byron Scott cried.

"You look for him to kind of yell at you, 'Let's go B, let's get it going,'" Scott said. "He's not there. It's just weird right now."

During the interview with Hall, Johnson told viewers not to be frightened by his illness.

"We don't have to run from it. We don't have to be ashamed of it ... You don't have to run from me like, 'Uh-oh, here comes Magic,'" he said.

## United Way looks toward a full-time executive director

The United Way of Calloway County, 51 percent along the way toward reaching its \$175,000 1991 goal, is looking toward a possible future leadership restructuring to include a full-time executive director and year-long campaign.

The United Way board, which met Friday, discussed the idea of hiring a full-time executive director, but President Chuck Williams admitted the measure is at least a year away.

"Right now we can't justify the expenses of a director," Williams said. "We want to keep our operating costs, which are the lowest of any United Way in the state, as low as possible."

But the goal of \$175,000 for 1991 will come close to allowing the group to fill the position at approximately \$12,000 a year and still maintain a 10 percent admini-

strative cost level, Williams said.

"We need about \$200,000 to keep (the cost of a director) in line with our current administrative cost percentage," Williams said.

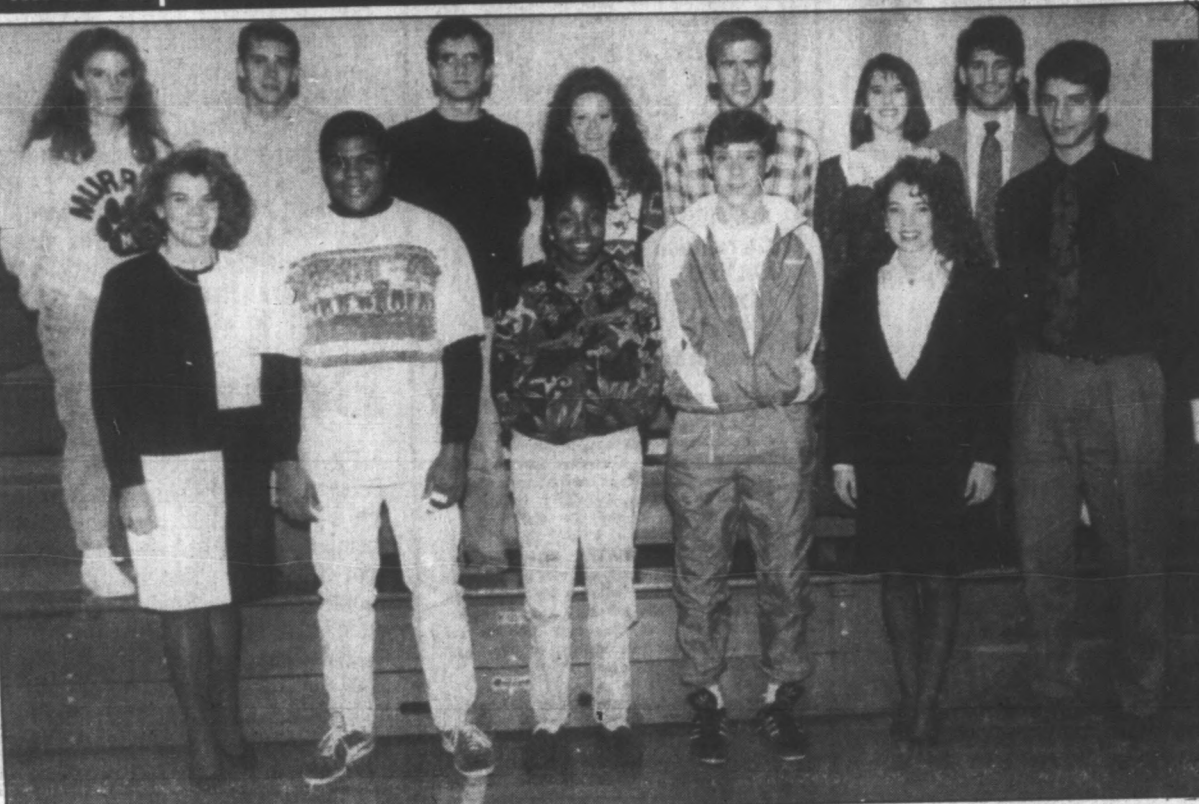
A full-time director would allow the group advantages never before experienced such as a year-long campaign, additional fund-raising events and most importantly a continuity within the group's leadership.

"A board director can't stay on the board forever," Williams said. "When that person leaves, he or she takes with them the experience and the knowledge they've gained of the group's members and the whole process in general."

An executive director will help solve a lot of burnout that board members suffer when overburdened with work for many years, one board member said.

The possibility of hiring a director may be feasible by 1993, Williams said.

## Special session to follow Jones' inauguration

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Gov.-elect Breton Jones, a recent convert to the idea of partial public financing of elections, has picked up a powerful legislative ally, but House Speaker Don Blandford remains skeptical.

Jones met for more than an hour on Friday with Blandford and Senate President Pro Tem John "Eck" Rose.

Rose said he agrees with Jones that some public financing is the only way to get a real handle on the costs of campaigns. But Blandford has always had reservations about the idea and he said Friday

they have not been resolved.

But the speaker said Jones has convinced him of one thing.

"I've agreed to keep an open mind," Blandford said.

Jones also announced he would summon the General Assembly to a special session to draw new political boundaries right after the gubernatorial inauguration on Dec.

10.

No firm date has been set, but Blandford said he expects the session to last the minimum necessary six days and be over in time for Christmas.

Every 10 years, the boundaries of political subdivisions must be altered to conform to population shifts identified by the census. That

means the makeup of the 100 state House and 38 state Senate districts will be redrawn.

But complicating the task will be the fact that Kentucky lost one of its congressional seats because population increases did not keep up other states.

## Task force tracks church fires through computers

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A computer system is being used to investigate a possible link between a fire that gutted an office and classrooms at a church and more than two dozen blazes at other houses of worship in 16 months. The cause of the Friday morning fire at First Baptist Church in Jacksonville Beach was under investi-

gation. Property damage was estimated at \$200,000.

A task force that includes agents from the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, the State Fire Marshal's Office and Jacksonville police and fire departments has been assembled to investigate the 28 church fires reported since July 1990.

Investigators are getting help from a computer modeled after one developed for investigating the Gainesville student murders. It will store and compare information.

Flames were shooting out the windows when firefighters arrived at the church and the blaze was quickly extinguished, said Fire Chief Gary Brown.

Police said they questioned two men found in the area, but considered them witnesses, not suspects.

The blaze followed two church fires in the community of St. Augustine Thursday. One destroyed a classroom at a First Church of Christ, Scientist, and the other caused minor damage at a Baptist church. Both were determined to be arson.

Twelve church fires have been reported since Oct. 18, most of them in Gainesville, Winter Haven and St. Augustine. Others were reported in Ocala and Lake City.

Investigators have not found any definite links between the fires, most of which occurred in the early morning.

## Militia, civilians in enclave rebel against Yeltsin's laws

GROZNY, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Militiamen and civilians in this separatist Muslim enclave blockaded streets and reportedly seized control of airports today to prevent Soviet soldiers from enforcing emergency rule by Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

The defense chief of Chechen-Ingush said his militiamen captured 1,000 Soviet troops, but Soviet Interior Ministry spokesman Maj. Vladimir Shtepa said he "had received no such information."

About 30,000 people threw up blockades in the streets of the capital in defiance of Yeltsin's emergency decree, which took effect today, banning rallies and ordering a curfew in the southern enclave bordering Georgia.

The monthlong decree, issued Friday, was Yeltsin's harshest step to quell ethnic unrest since becoming Russian leader last year. He was apparently taking such action because the splintering of his

republic could undermine radical market reform he has been seeking to rescue the collapsing economy. But he risked criticism that the crackdown was anti-democratic.

Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev has largely refrained from such severe steps to end ethnic unrest.

Yeltsin's decree was to be enforced by Russian-controlled Soviet Interior Ministry troops based in the territory 930 miles south of Moscow, the Russian television newscast "Vesti" reported.

Defying the order, about 30,000 demonstrators blockaded Grozny's central Freedom Square with buses. Although most of the demonstrators were unarmed, protesters on the outskirts of the city carried hunting rifles and other weapons.

Ten transport planes containing 1,000 Soviet special troops flew

# Court panel criticizes state's public defender system

FRANKFORT, Ky. — State law sets out seven possible schemes for state and local governments to provide and pay for attorneys to represent indigent defendants.

Three members of the Court of Appeals said that is a recipe for trouble.

The court used the trials of two men facing the death penalty to point out the pitfalls of a system

that tries to balance the will of three branches of government, the goodwill of individual attorneys and the constitutional guarantee of a right to representation.

Though the cases were decided, the three judges on the panel were all moved to write their own opinions released Friday.

Judge Anthony Wilhoit summed up the frustration. "This budding problem presented by the cases before us needs prompt attention by those branches lest a full-blown

crisis develops in criminal prosecution," Wilhoit said.

In one case, attorneys Theodore H. Lavit and James H. Abell defended Michael Dean, who was charged in Washington County with robbery and murder. Dean was acquitted in his 1988 trial.

With time and expenses, the attorneys submitted a bill for \$8,854. The trial court eventually directed the two be paid \$2,500, the amount set out in statute for felony cases.

But Abell and Lavit argued that the capital case qualified as a "special circumstance" exception for a higher fee.

The appeals court agreed and ordered them to be paid their original bill.

The other case involved the succession of attorneys who represented Clawvern Jacobs, who was charged with the 1986 kidnapping and murder of an Alice Lloyd College student in a sensational case. Jacobs was found guilty and is on

Death Row.

In that case, the trial court found the \$1,250 cap to be unconstitutional and ordered the Department of Public Advocacy to pay some of Jacobs' attorneys as much as \$10,234 in one case.

After dealing with the technical aspects of each case, the judges criticized the legislative and executive branches.

"We do not know how the legislature expects the state to fulfill its obligation to indigent defendants

with competent, effective representation, especially in capital cases, with the meager limits of compensation it is authorized to pay," Judge Michael McDonald said.

"It is, of course, the responsibility of the executive branch to see that counsel are adequately paid," Judge John Miller said. "Whether the executive branch fulfills this responsibility through the department or extraneous means is of no concern of the judiciary; the fact is, it must be fulfilled."

One proposal making the rounds already has been effectively endorsed by the Democratic leadership of the state Senate.

As revealed in mid-September by Sen. Joe Meyer, D-Covington, co-chairman of the Subcommittee on Redistricting, the new map would carve up the current 5th Dis-

trict in southern Kentucky and divide the counties among four districts.

Blandford said he has no objection to the proposal, but has also not endorsed it. "We're looking at it as a starting point," Blandford said.

Jones said he has no preferences on congressional boundaries and believes it is primarily a legislative matter.

Blandford said it would be "cleaner" to redistrict during a special session rather than during the regular General Assembly session that begins Jan. 7. A special session would cost an estimated \$40,000 per day.

Jones said he will meet with all of the Democratic leaders of the House and Senate in the coming weeks.

Blandford, who has feuded with Gov. Wallace Wilkinson for virtually all of the last four years, said the cordial relations with a governor will be a refreshing change.

## McConnell to stations: make refunds or else

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell intends to collect any refunds he is due from overcharges for advertisements broadcast during his 1990 reelection campaign, he told some 300 stations in a letter.

"While we have not made any prejudgments regarding culpable parties or the nature or extent of legal violations, the Senator does intend to investigate fully the sales practices of each station and exercise his legal rights under Federal law," said the letter from Washington attorney Niels Holch, who headed McConnell's Senate staff until last April.

The letter sent last month gave the stations 60 days to examine their records and send back any overcharges for campaign ads they find.

J.T. Whitlock, executive director of the Kentucky Broadcasters Association, said Holch's letter has caused concern in the industry, especially among small radio stations that don't have a lawyer.

"It just scared the hell out of them," he said of the small broadcasters. "I got 35 calls the day the letter hit the mailboxes."

Whitlock said he has advised stations to check their advertising records and make refunds if they are due. He said he knows of only one station that found an overcharge, and that was due to a mistake. He declined to name the station.

Before the letter went out, McConnell's campaign got about \$54,000 in refunds, mainly from TV stations, that had voluntarily reviewed their books, Holch said Thursday.

Holch said he and Cathy Farrell, who bought commercial time for last year's campaign, have devised a system for estimating stations' overcharges and that they believe more is owed.

McConnell, R-Ky., says stations have nothing to worry about from him as long as they didn't overcharge. But he suggested the fact the campaign has gotten some refunds indicates the suspicions aren't unfounded.

## Board member questions firing

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A Personnel Board member has written a memorandum to other board members saying he knew of no reason why Arthur "Dutch" Hatterick should have been fired as executive director last month.

Don Dampier, of Georgetown, said he didn't know before last month's meeting about the effort to dismiss Hatterick and abstained from voting. He asked in the memo that his vote be changed to "no."

Dampier, one of two state employees on the board, said the sudden dismissal has raised questions among state workers about the panel's credibility.

Hatterick's firing was "created a disruptive and skeptical attitude among our state employees with questions as to whether the Board is really the fair and equitable avenue for appeals that it purports to be," Dampier wrote in the memo.

Dampier said it seemed to be a contradiction for a board that is

supposed to see that state merit system employees are insulated from politics to summarily dismiss one of its own employees.

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Dampier said it appeared there had been some discussion of the matter before the Oct. 11 meeting.

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## Foley murder case given to grand jury

LONDON, Ky. (AP) — The case of a Laurel County man accused of killing four people and stuffing their bodies into an old septic tank was turned over to a grand jury.

Laurel District Judge Henry Stoltz found probable cause Friday to believe Robert Foley had committed the crimes. The next grand jury is scheduled to meet Dec. 16

and to return indictments Dec. 20.

Foley, 35, of White Oak, was ordered held without bond.

Kentucky State Police charged Foley Oct. 26 with murder in the deaths of three Ohio residents and a Laurel County man who had been missing since October 1989.

The four were identified as Kimberly Bowersock, 22; Lillian Conti-

no, 28; and Jerry McMillen, 36, all of Van Wert, Ohio. The other victim was Bowersock's boyfriend, Calvin Reynolds, 23, of Laurel County, but formerly of Van Wert.

Detective Johnny Phelps of the state police post at London testified Friday that two eyewitnesses have given police a graphic account of the slayings.

The four were identified as Kimberly Bowersock, 22; Lillian Conti-

into Grozny's Khanakala airport this morning. Yusup Soslanbekov, the defense minister of Chechen-Ingush, told The Associated Press. He said they were immediately surrounded by the Chechen National Guard and forced into military barracks near the airport.

The militia, or national guard, has taken control of all airfields, all highways leading to the enclave are blocked, and rail communications have been cut, the Tass news agency reported. It said concrete blocks

had been placed on the tracks.

The territory's president, Gen. Dzhokar Dudayev, on Friday created a Chechen defense ministry and named Soslanbekov as its head. Dudayev also put all military groups in the region under its jurisdiction, according to Prof-Inform, the Russian trade union news agency.

Dudayev had called on men aged 15 to 55 to arm themselves and claimed 5,000 soldiers and 62,000 volunteers, and the support of nearby Georgia, Armenia and Azerbaijan.

Dudayev also asked that all Russian representatives on Chechen-Ingush territory resign by midnight today, Tass said.

Dudayev today ordered Yeltsin's emergency decree canceled and

declared his own state of martial law, said Prof-Inform. He also said he intended to go ahead with his presidential inauguration scheduled today.

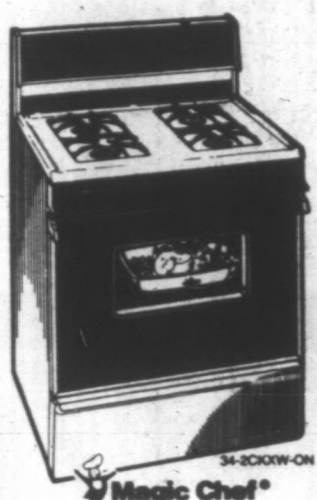
Prof-Inform reported that KGB troops stormed the Grozny's telephone exchange. The report could not be immediately confirmed.

Chechen-Ingush, a small Muslim enclave of 1.3 million people within the Russian federation, declared itself an independent republic last Saturday.

One of 20 autonomous republics created for ethnic minorities, it has demanded more self-rule partly in fear of domination by Russia.

The Soviet Union is home to more than 100 ethnic groups, many of whom were displaced by dictator Josef Stalin.

## BUSH SUPPORTS EC SANCTIONS

**THE HAGUE, Netherlands** — President Bush is offering unqualified support for European sanctions against war-torn Yugoslavia and suggesting that the United States might follow suit to help force an end to the violence. Bush, cautioning against isolationism by the West, also is urging the disintegrating Soviet Union to move along a path of democratic reform as it struggles for a new footing. After arriving here from a NATO summit in Rome, Bush today met with leaders of the European Community to give a boost to global trade talks. The talks have been deadlocked by the EC's huge subsidy program that has brought prosperity to Europe's farmers. Bush's delegation included Secretary of State James A. Baker III, Trade Representative Carla Hill and Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan.

## SERBIA DEFIES SANCTIONS

**ZAGREB, Yugoslavia** — With more air raids, a naval blockade and a threat to fire long-range missiles against secessionist Croatia, Serbian-led federal forces are defying new sanctions imposed by the European Community. But as the damage and casualties mount, analysts say the sanctions approved Friday in a 12-nation EC meeting in Rome will take months to build any meaningful pressure on Serbia. Federal forces launched more attacks across Croatia today. Zagreb Radio said Dubrovnik and the area around the besieged port city came under attack from gunboats this morning. The Dubrovnik area, the Gruz residential area, the area above Mokosica and the entire Lapad area came under heavy cannon fire, it said. "Dubrovnik is reverberating with explosions," it said.

## BOAT PEOPLE DEPORTED

**HONG KONG** — Vietnamese refugees, some carried or dragged half-naked and screaming, were packed on a plane and deported to their Communist homeland today. The operation aims to persuade thousands of boat people to leave squalid camps and return home voluntarily. Today's 59 Vietnamese, nearly half of them children, were the first forcibly sent home in nearly two years. As many as 10 security officers at a time hauled struggling men and women up a ramp and into the rear of a Hercules C-130 transport plane. Several Vietnamese men were shirtless and shoeless. One woman ripped off her shirt in protest and had to be covered by a green blanket. At least seven women-police officers were injured in the first flight of "Operation Orderly Return." There were no immediate reports of injuries among the refugees.

## FURNACE CAUSES FAMILY FATALITIES

**CHICAGO** — A couple and their eight children who had closed their house up tight, apparently to keep warm on a frigid fall night, died when deadly carbon monoxide gas escaped from a malfunctioning furnace. The bodies of the 10, who were dressed for bed, were found Friday after friends became alarmed when they hadn't seen them for two days and broke into their brick bungalow. "We opened the windows and they were all dead," said one of the friends, Efrain Lopez. "I knocked, and there was no answer. We went in and saw (one victim) by the refrigerator. He looked like he was just going to get up. He looked alive, but he was dead," said Peter Diaz, another friend.

## ISRAELI SHELLING CONTINUES

**NABATIYEH, Lebanon** — Israeli gunners and affiliated militiamen shelled guerrilla-controlled areas in south Lebanon today. Police said no casualties were reported. The U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon, which monitors the volatile region, said 40 howitzer shells had been fired into hills and valleys around the southern market town of Nabatiyeh since midnight Friday. A UNIFIL source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the barrage targeted areas suspected by the Israelis as possible guerrilla routes.

## PHILIPPINES BRACE FOR ANOTHER STORM

**MANILA, Philippines** — Frogmen searched today for bodies entombed in the seabed under landslides triggered by a storm that killed as many as 5,000 people in the central Philippines. An approaching typhoon threatened more hardship. Navy divers found 16 bodies buried in the shallow portions of the bay off Ormoc, a port and agricultural center on Leyte island 350 miles southeast of Manila which suffered the most casualties in Tuesday's floods after Tropical Storm Thelma hit Leyte and Negros islands. The Manila weather bureau reported that a typhoon was heading for northern and central areas of Luzon island and would begin to affect weather there by Monday. Forecasters said the new storm, Typhoon Seth, was centered today 600 miles east of extreme northern Luzon and was headed southwest with maximum sustained winds of 115 mph. Storm warnings were raised over northeastern Luzon and meteorologists warned coastal areas to prepare for strong winds and rough seas. The Office of Civil Defense reported at least 3,444 people died, including more than 3,000 in Ormoc. In addition, 2,080 people were listed as missing and officials fear most of them perished.

## NO NUKES IN SOUTH KOREA

**SEOUL, South Korea** — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney will discuss the withdrawal of nuclear weapons from South Korea in a security conference this month, the country's largest daily reported today. The report followed President Roh Tae-woo's declaration Friday that South Korea will not produce, possess or deploy nuclear weapons on its soil, an initiative aimed at halting North Korea's fast-moving nuclear weapons program. It was the first time Roh has vowed to eliminate nuclear weapons in South Korea, and indicated U.S. nuclear warheads were being withdrawn. Roh asked North Korea, suspected of nearing development of nuclear weapons, to take similar actions, but there has been no reaction from the world's most isolated communist state.

## FRAGILE CEASE-FIRE IN CAMBODIA

**PHNOM PENH, Cambodia** — A United Nations team arrived today to patrol Cambodia's fragile cease-fire, but the Communist government reported fighting with guerrillas. Lt. Gen. Ataul Karim of Bangladesh said his U.N. Advance Mission in Cambodia will try to keep the peace and work with Cambodia's Supreme National Council, a reconciliation body comprising all four warring factions. The mission is to prepare for a U.N. military contingent of thousands of soldiers from 23 countries. It will give way to the U.N. Transitional Authority in Cambodia, a military and civilian authority to conduct the largest peacekeeping operation in U.N. history. After nearly 13 years of war, the Cambodian government and three guerrilla groups signed a peace accord last month. The United Nations is to ensure a cease-fire, disarm the combatants, help administer the country and organize elections in 1993.

## FACTIONAL FIGHTING IN SO. AFRICA

**JOHANNESBURG, South Africa** — Black factional fighting erupted again at a gold mine, leaving 21 miners dead and 44 injured, police said today. Police said they did not know what started the fighting late Friday at the President Steyn gold mine near Welkom in the Orange Free State. Fighting at the mine on Monday left 15 miners dead. Fighting between rival black groups in recent years has taken thousands of lives. The violence threatens efforts to end white-minority rule.

## OAS SEEKS ARISTIDE'S RETURN

**PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti** — Negotiators from the Organization of American States are pushing ahead their effort to restore exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide to power, despite a government order for his arrest. A team from the Organization of American States was expected to arrive in Haiti today to try again to arrange an agreement allowing Aristide's return.

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## Magic moves from sports champion...

He was frank about his sexuality, and about past naivete.

"First of all, I'm far from being a homosexual," he said. He added that he had believed myths about the disease. "It can only happen to gay people. That's so wrong," he said.

When he told his wife of two months, Cookie Kelly, that he was infected, Johnson said he offered to split with her. She said no.

"She almost smacked me upside my head," he said. "She's a strong woman and I was smart to marry her."

Kelly, who has tested negative for the virus, is about seven weeks pregnant, a Laker spokesman said. Johnson said he was touched by all the support he has received.

The companies with which he has endorsement contracts have said they wouldn't cut ties with him because of his infection. "I'm still with them and that's beautiful," he said.

He also has gotten an outpouring of support from fellow basketball players, he said.

Boston Celtics star Larry Bird, who entered the NBA the same

year Johnson did, and who has carried on one of basketball's most spirited rivalries with him since their college days, said Johnson's infection "doesn't seem fair."

"I hope he can keep his smile ... I've told him that if he needs anything from me I'd be glad to do anything I could for him," Bird said.

While the sports world continued to express its shock and sadness over Magic Johnson's retirement from pro basketball because he had contracted the AIDS virus, many also were moved to join him in the cause.

"My wife, Bridgette, and I are joining Magic and his battle against the HIV virus and educating the American people and the youth about practicing safe sex," Rex Chapman of the Charlotte Hornets said. "Bridgette and I are donating \$50,000 to any HIV virus research fund set up or designated by Magic."

At the same time, other athletes called for uniform AIDS testing, fearing that the exchange of blood on the field of battle had driven the danger level of some sports too high.

"We're tested for drugs. I don't see why we shouldn't be tested for AIDS," Phoenix Cardinals nose tackle Jim Wahler said. "There's so much bloodshed on the football field. It's for your own safety. I don't think it's an invasion of anybody's privacy."

If nothing else is achieved, Johnson's fellow athletes hope this at least will raise public awareness of the disease.

"It's really a tragedy. I mean, the guy has not only been such a great player, but he's been such a great ambassador for the game and everything else," Kevin McHale of the Boston Celtics said. "My heart

goes out to him. I think all you can do now is just pray that he handles everything in the best way that he can."

In a statement he released in Charlotte, Chapman said: "Magic is a lot of things to a lot of people and above all to me, he is a great friend. I hate that it takes something like this to make people more aware of this terrible virus that tragically affects thousands of Americans."

"I know the NBA will be there for Magic and other affected by the virus. I also hope that other professional sports and businesses all over will lend a helping hand."

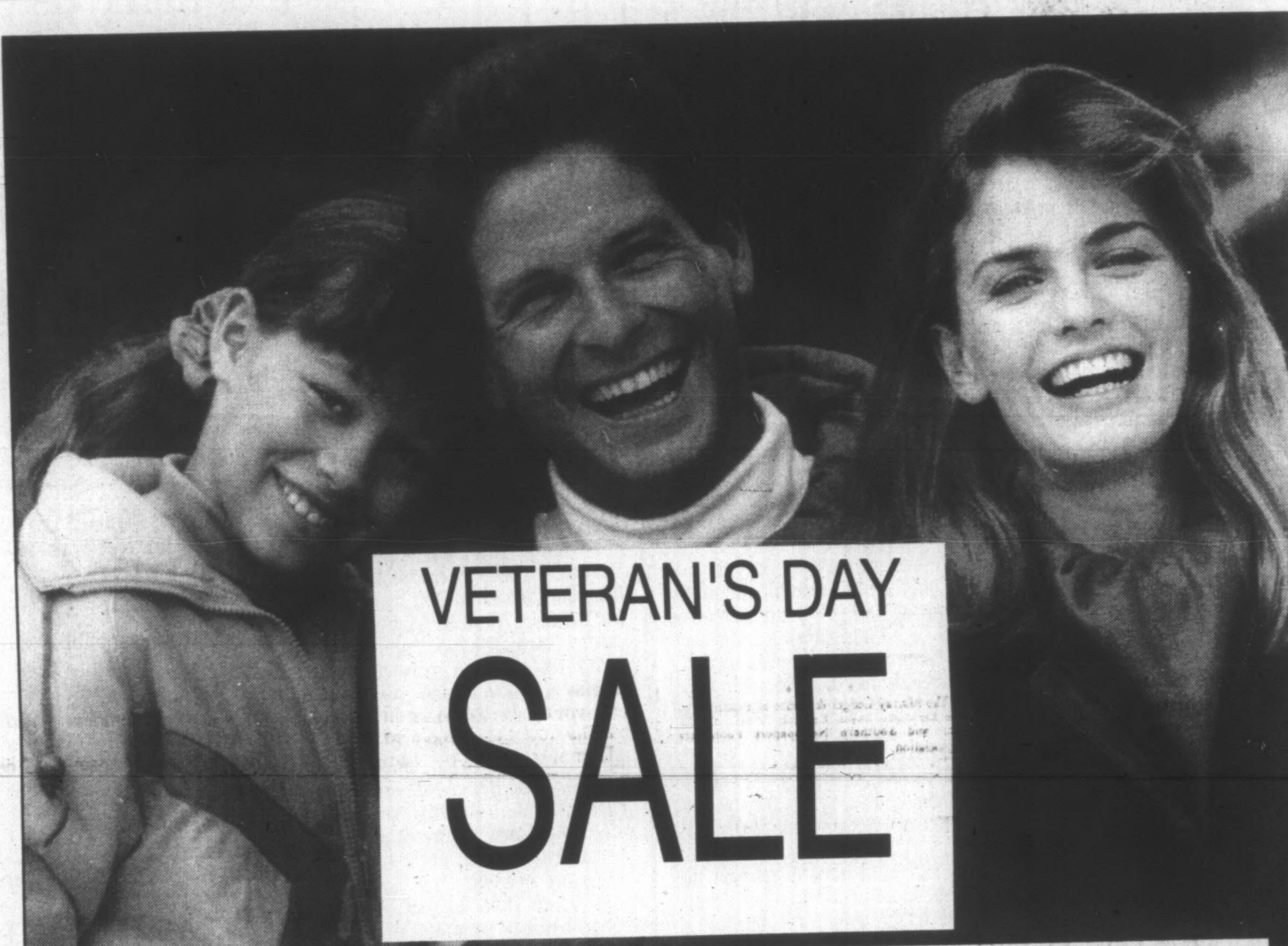

## Bush may find himself in Jimmy Carter's shoes

WASHINGTON — The two events were nicely juxtaposed. While Russians, on the 74th anniversary of Lenin's revolution, celebrated democracy, NATO leaders meeting in Rome pondered a new role for the alliance now that the Soviet bear has been tamed.

For George Bush, the NATO event should have been a festive one. But most of the smiles belong to the Democrats back home who sense perhaps for the first time that Bush might not be as invincible as he once seemed.

That notion grew partly out of the defeat Tuesday in Pennsylvania of Bush loyalist Dick Thornburgh at the hands of a liberal Democrat in the nation's only Senate race, an outcome that has some Democrats smelling blood and some analysts recalling Jimmy Carter.

Jimmy Carter? Much like Bush's own experience, things went well for Carter in foreign policy during his first 2½ years in office. Carter was the architect of the Camp David peace treaty, established normal relations with China and worked out an arms-limitation agreement with the Soviet Union.

But during his last year and a half in the White House, the roof fell in on Carter. There was the Iran hostage crisis, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and, most importantly, an economy that reeled under the weight of skyrocketing inflation and interest rates. In the 1980 election, Carter carried just six states.

Bush, like Carter, was able to establish himself early on as a wily foreign policy practitioner. The U.S.-led defeat of the Iraqi army earlier this year occurred at almost the exact same stage of Bush's presidency as the signing of the Camp David accord did in the Carter presidency.

Things began to unravel for Carter in the fall of his third year in the White House. Bush's popularity has been slipping of late, but it remains to be seen whether he can do better than Carter did in maintaining voter support.

Bush confronts a situation in which Americans no longer feel threatened by Soviet missiles but do feel vulnerable to problems on the home front. At least that was the message delivered by the defeat of Thornburgh by Sen. Harris Wofford, who based his campaign on such issues as the need for job security and national health insurance.

Polls indicate that most Americans feel Bush has been spending too much time abroad, and he responded to that sentiment as the results in the Pennsylvania race became known. He decided to postpone a long-planned trip to South Korea, Japan, Australia and Singapore.

Perhaps Bush has been too successful at foreign policy. Economic decline at home has come at a time when the United States for the first time in two generations has the luxury of not having an obvious military threat to deal with.

A Democratic presidential hopeful, Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa, says the time has come to stop worrying about the defense of Europe and devote more resources to schools, highways and health care.

"We're not going to get there if we have a president who thinks the real threats to our national security are halfway around the world when they are really halfway down the streets," Harkin says.

The case for a continued activist role for the United States was put forth in a speech last month by Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger.

"It is my belief that our national well-being, including the health of our economy, is dependent upon a stable international order — an order which will not exist if we do not shape and lead it," Eagleburger said.

A policy of disengagement, he said, cannot possibly shield the country from a host of international problems or their consequences, "from debt to overpopulation, pollution to drug trafficking, terrorism to weapons proliferation."

### Kentucky editorial roundup

Here we go again.

Just when it looks as though Kentucky is making some progress in getting its business at hand done in a way that doesn't shut out the public, along comes something that guarantees to shoot it back down to the level of secrecy.

This time, the problem involves the proposed manner in which the state Department for Environmental Protection ... would allow the viewing of documents by Kentuckians.

The guidelines ... would allow file clerks who are not sure whether a request for documents should be approved to put the request into what amounts to a limbo folder, thereby making sure there was no information released that shouldn't have been.

Unfortunately, the reverse would be the outcome: Requests that perhaps should be OK'd under provisions of the state's open records laws would be doomed to death in a manila envelope on the desk of a clerk. ...

The decisions would be subject to attorney intervention, but many people would not challenge this effective denial. ...

In addition, the cabinet would close records with handwritten notes, documents or lists considered not yet finalized, and Hazard Ranking System scores — which help the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency determine priority in contaminated site locations.

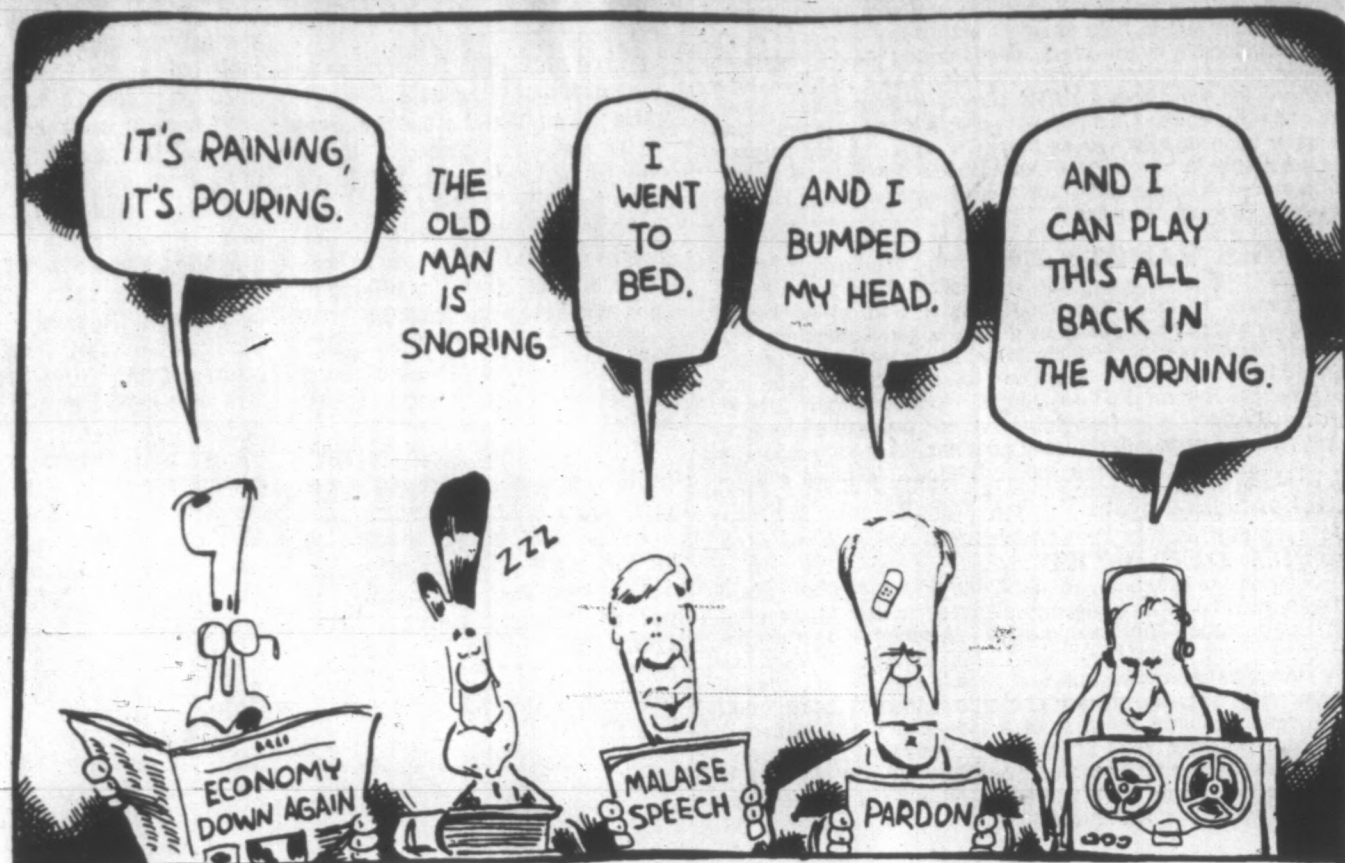
We can understand the need to keep some things out of the public's view until details are final, and the open records laws understand and make provisions for that. But we can't understand how any cabinet of the state in this day and age could logically think a system such as the one proposed by the Environmental Protection Cabinet is fair to Kentucky's taxpayers.

We urge a reconsideration of the cabinet's plan — this time taking into account the need for openness.

## Let justice roll like mighty waters

When I was growing up in west Tennessee, one of the grand old men who ruled over our court square in those Parisian paradise times before malls and suburbs was a loveable pharmacist, Charles Trevathan. Mr. Charlie's family had been important in that little town almost from its beginnings, and he carried on the tradition by being mayor and on all the important boards and committees.

I bump into Mr. Charlie's daughter, Cara, occasionally. She lives in Columbia, S.C., and both her deceased first husband and her second husband were alumni of Wofford College, my current employer.

She sent me a copy of a bill she has framed in her home. Back during the Civil War, once Fort Donelson had fallen in 1862, the Yankees intermittently occupied our hometown thereafter. Mr. Charlie's father and uncle owned a drug store in town, founded sometime before 1856, and the Yankee troops betimes supplemented their supplies with goods from the store. A careful record of purchases was kept, and over a two-year period various colonels ran up a bill of \$867.95.

In 1862, the bill included: "60 Meals for Co. Lowe's command at 25 cts, \$15.00; feeding Co. horses at different times for Same at 25 cts, \$15.00; 1½ BBLs Cider by Co. Lowes Men at 5.00, \$750.00"

The bill for 1863 showed "120 lbs Salt Pork at 7c., \$8.40; 1 Saddle Taken by Same, \$15.00; 1 Coffee Pot & Wash Pan by Same, \$.75; Dinner for 12 Men & Horses, \$6.00; 1 Mule by Col. Lowes command, \$150.00; 1 Mule Returned, \$150.00; Expenses on his return, \$5.00; 1 horse, \$75.00; 1 Mule, \$150.00; 1 Horse returned, \$75.00; Expenses in getting horse home, \$10.00" The Trevathans must have operated an Avis Rent-A-Mule franchise.

In 1864 the 2nd New Jersey Regiment consumed "15 Ton hay,

at 25/a ton, \$375.00; 1 Log Chain, \$6.00; 100 lbs. Salt Pork, at 8 cts, \$8.00; 100 lbs Sausage Meat, at 15 cts, \$15.00; 1 Skillet, \$1.50; 1 Bee gum, \$3.00."

The best we can tell the bill was never fully paid, although it was reduced by some small amount. Cara figures that as of 1989, with interest at 6 percent accrued annually, the U.S. Government owed her something in the neighborhood of \$895,450.85. That was two years ago, so I'll round it off to \$900,000.

The unfortunate thing for Cara is that so far the government hasn't offered to settle its debts. The government is very quick to unleash its agents when someone understates an income tax form by a hundred dollars, but it has no bevy of agents out trying to see that people get what is owed them.

Cara must ponder occasionally how one goes politely but effectively about getting her money from the government. We are trying to help her.

We wonder if Cara's \$900,000 is included in the national debt figures that we hear so much about. If so, it is but a minuscule amount in that total and would never be missed if paid in full. More importantly, if the government has actually calculated this 127-year bill into the multi-trillion-dollar national debt, the very act of counting it as a debt is a clear admission of its legitimacy.

If that doesn't work, she could incorporate herself as a defense contractor (which is what the Trevathans were, in effect) and submit the bill to the Pentagon. Defense

contractors seem to have no trouble at all in getting their billings paid. She might have to inflate it considerably to get their attention because \$900,000 may not fit their computers, which can't handle bills under a million dollars.

She could also withhold payment of her annual income tax, subtracting whatever is due each year from the amount the government owes her. This is the most conservative approach for her to take, saving the government a lot of investigatory time and paperwork, plus doing them the patriotic service of not hitting them up for the whole bundle in one year. However, since Miss Cara is approaching retirement age, it would take an impossible number of years for her to owe the government enough to withhold until the bill was paid in full.

One promising idea that would satisfy both her and the government is for her to determine if the dollars owed were U.S. dollars or Confederate dollars. If they were Confederate dollars, Miss Cara probably is lucky the government hasn't offered to settle earlier. If they will pay off now, but in Confederate money they probably have in some warehouse or museum basement, it will cost them nothing at all to settle the account. But because authentic Confederate money is now selling for four or five times its stated value, she could sell \$900,000 Confederate bills for something like \$5,000,000 in current U.S. dollars.

The only other option that occurs to me is to suggest that she enlist her two South Carolina U.S. Senators, Hollings and Thurmond, and

the two Tennessee U.S. Senators, Gore and Sasser, all four of whom speak her native southern tongue and who are pledged to honor southern women and to help them in wartime distress. They could easily introduce some special legislation for redress, perhaps of the sort Native American tribes have been successful in securing for confiscation of their properties.

There is a precedent for this latter course of action. When I was working for the University of Alabama some years back, local campus legend had it that Senator John Sparkman had gotten several millions of dollars worth of property in northern Alabama for the university campus and for the Marshall Space Center by persuading Congress to pass a bill for "war reparations." Congress thought it was for expenses incurred by Alabama in World War II, but Sparkman allegedly told his friends that it was for the damages Yankee soldiers caused in the War Between the States, including unnecessarily burning the university in 1865, only four days before Appomattox.

I want to see justice done Miss Cara. She comes from decent, hardworking civic-serving stock. She also comes from Paris, Tennessee, a truly fine little town in which not a single citizen has ever gotten all he or she truly deserved, and most have gotten less. No foreign nations have ever offered to buy it; no one from Publishers Clearing House has ever visited there. It would do the morale of that ol' home town more good that a recount of its last U.S. census to see one of its own finally "hit it big." Miss Cara deserves it, and so do we.

And if she does get it, I hope the very first thing she does is to find her daddy's beautiful old mahogany and marble soda fountain and install it, fully operative, in the county historical society headquarters.

Let justice — and the good times — roll.

## The night 'das Volk' could not be stopped

(Editor's note: the following was submitted by Dorie Kramer, a native of Germany now living in Murray. Today is the second anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall.)

How easy it would be now for me to cross between the former West and East Germany compared to the horrifying experience of crossing the same in 1967. Fortified with passports and visas, my sister and I experienced the demeaning questioning and prodding of the overzealous young border guards who had been pressed into duty by the Soviet oppressors.

I thought my heart would burst with joy as I saw people of East and West with arms entwined, dancing on top of the Wall, and with tear-drenched faces, singing "such a day as beautiful as this was, such a day will never come again." That terrible Wall that had separated families for 28 long years, during which time members of families died, some maybe from grief, not having been able to share

the joy and sadness experienced in the life of a family. The Wall had mocked every sense of goodness in humanity.

The example the Germans living in East Germany set by demonstrating against the Russian tyrant was proof that freedom could be won without bloodshed.

With the cry "Wir sind das Volk!" (We are the people!) the multitude of courageous Germans marched in unison — and could not be stopped. The Wall made out of concrete, steel and barbed wire opened up and showed that liberty will not be fenced in.

It is one of history's ironies that the Americans first occupied much of this territory. The Russians had a reason for insisting that the American soldiers should wait in Saxony and hand over that region to them — for the uranium ore deposits in the Erzgebirge (mountains) was the "plum" Russia coveted! The Soviet-German Wismut AG first raised the curtain on one of the best kept secrets in the former GDR in February 1990.

"There can be no doubt that the first Soviet nuclear device, exploded on Aug. 29, 1949, contained uranium mined in Soviet-occupied Saxony. Confirmation of this assumption is available from the United States, where the Soviet Union was not generally expected to develop an atomic bomb until 1956 or 1960.... The Wismut AG began mining uranium ore as a strictly Soviet enterprise in the Erzgebirge region of occupied Saxony."

On my first visit back to Germany's Saxony Erzgebirge in 1967 I asked that we stop so I could smell the pine forest. My cousin advised me, "You can stop, but you will not smell any pine forest." The trees are gone and the mountains are all rubble. The Russians cut down the trees, hauled the logs to Russia and started mining for the uranium that the Russian geologists knew was in the mountains. That little field at the edge of the forest where my grandfather and I dug and roasted potatoes in the ground had been crushed by wheels of the

heavy trucks and machinery used to mine the uranium. Green pools of stagnant water stood in the ruts.

This location was "the largest uranium ore-mining region in Europe, and employed well over 100,000 people in the early 1950s." Its chief problem was radiation-induced lung cancer among miners — both men and women.

After 40 years figures were released about this enterprise. It is now known that thousands of ex-miners have been affected and new cases are being reported. Several friends were destroyed working in that mine. They had various jobs before the war but were forced to work in the mine because there was no other employment after World War II.

We visited our hometown which had been completely destroyed by allied bombing. And that night with my grandfather's feather bed pulled over my face to muffle my sobs, I agreed with Thomas Wolfe, that indeed, You Can't Go Home Again!

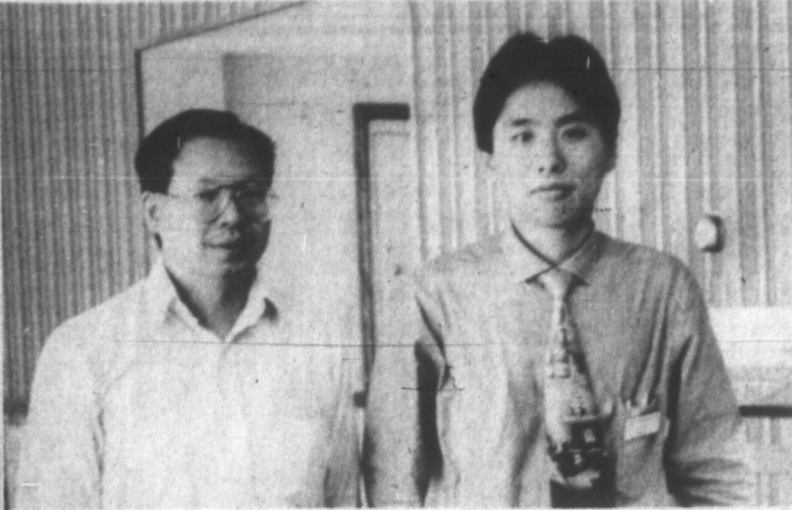

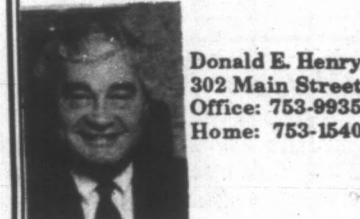

The highest compliment one can pay a card player is to say that he seems to see through the backs of the opponents' cards. Surprisingly, the number of deals where a declarer can live up to this billing is truly astonishing.

Consider this case where South reached four hearts on the bidding shown. West cashed two high spades before shifting to the jack of diamonds. South won with the king, not-

ing that there were two more losers — a diamond and a club. Although the club loser might be avoided with a successful finesse, declarer decided that in view of the bidding, the likelihood of East having the king was virtually nil.

So, rather than stake his hopes on a club finesse, South adopted a far more promising line of play. After leading a trump to the king and ruffing a spade, he cashed three more rounds of trumps to produce this position:

♦ J7

**West**  
♦ J  
♥ 103  
♣ K 10

♦ 10  
♥ 95  
♣ A Q

Now South played his last trump and West, who could not afford to part with a spade or a club, released a diamond. Declarer thereupon led a diamond to the ace and returned the nine of spades, discarding his diamond loser. West won with the jack but then had to return a club, putting a neat end to a well-played hand.

## LIBRARY NEWS

Peter McWilliams, author of *The Personal Computer Book*, is an oddity in the world of computer books. He writes clearly. And what he says makes good sense.

*The Personal Computer Book* tells you everything you wanted to know about PC's. It covers how to buy one, which one to buy (these are two DIFFERENT questions), data bases, desktop publishing, computers in the office, in the school, in the home, computers for people with physical disabilities, and so on.

The illustrations are a little too cute for our taste and the last chapter seems unnecessarily silly. But they do lighten the mood of the book for computer non-users. This book is one of the best we've seen in recent years on what you can do with a computer and why you would want to do it that way. We highly recommend it.

Oliver North's book, *Under Fire*, has just arrived. It details North's career from his boyhood in Texas and New York, through the Naval Academy, Vietnam, and his service in Washington. The Iran-Contra affair and the subsequent hearings are described from North's point of view. It's Ollie turn to talk, read his book and make up your own mind on who knew what.

Ralph Emory's autobiography, *Memories*, is here also. Country music fans will be delighted. Ralph talks about all the people he's known, his marriage to Skeeter Davis, his radio shows, and lots more. The book is filled with clear scenes of the people he has worked around: Dolly Parton, Jimmy Dean, Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard, Hank Williams (Sr. and Jr.), Ray Stevens, Willie Nelson, and a lot more.

The one story that sticks best is where Minnie Pearl sits and holds the hand of the ailing (dying) Hank Williams and tries to get him to sing "I Saw the Light" with her and Hank says "That's just it Minnie, there ain't no light, it's all dark." Here is a book about a man who

has paid his dues. If you don't read it you'll have missed one of the best biographies to come down the pike in a long while.

Another book that we recommend is George F. Will's *Men at Work: The Craft of Baseball*. *Men at Work* focuses on the why of baseball instead of worshipping the heroes and that come and go annually. The book talks about the game as a season-long thing that is the summation of thousands of individual acts done well or poorly.

Will is a fine writer who obviously loves baseball. If you are at all interested in baseball, you will enjoy this one. Our copy is even in large print, so you can read it in bed with your glasses off.

Michael Lewis, author of *Liar's Poker* is back with a new book, *The Money Culture*. Read it and meet Donald Trump, Leona Helmsley, Ivan Boesky, Michael Milken, and a whole host of other rich, near-rich, wanna-be-rich people. It's enough to give capitalism a bad name. It's also great fun.

Speaking of fun, we've just gotten P.J. O'Rourke's *Republican Party Reptile* and Hunter S. Thompson's *Hell's Angels, Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas, and Songs of the Doomed*. Both of the men write clear, vigorous, unequivocal prose. They are both leftovers from the drug culture of the 60's and their books are not for the faint of heart, but at their best they are immensely, savagely funny.

We particularly recommend the chapter "Bad Craziness in Palm Beach" from Thompson's *Songs of the Doomed*. It's an article he wrote for *Rolling Stone Magazine* on the Pulitzer divorce in 1983. It is a harrowing, howlingly funny piece of writing, well worth the read.

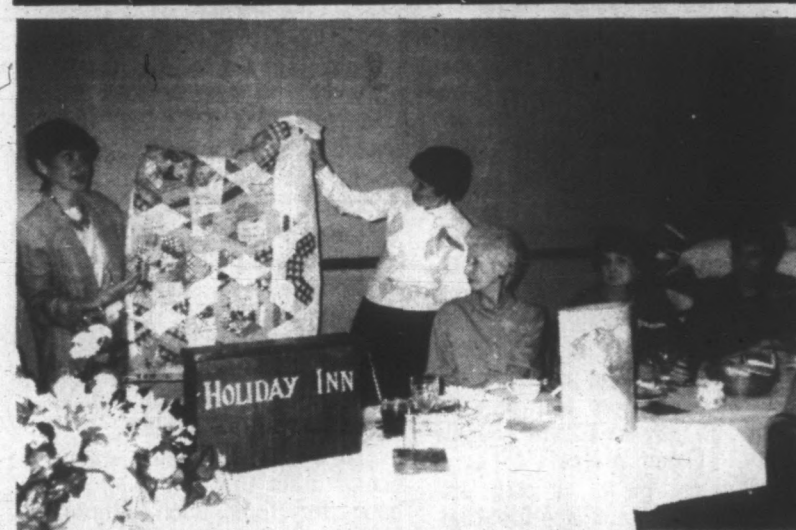

After taking two steps back, the Murray High Tigers took a leap forward Friday night.

Murray jumped past Crittenden County 27-0 in the first round of the Class A state playoffs at a cold Holland Stadium, using a 21-point burst midway through the second quarter to take control and advance to next week's regional semifinals, as the Tigers will travel to Russellville.

"Our kids really came out ready to play," Tiger coach Rick Fisher said. "We've had two bad weeks, and I don't know if we were over-looking Calloway or what, but this is what you work for all year long. You've got to hand it to the kids."

The Tigers who had slumped in regular season losses to Heath and Calloway County traded in their stripes for a hard-nosed group of felines who rose up early against the Rockets, and clawed out of a corner thanks to a resolved defense.

"It was the right team tonight," senior Matt Krug, who celebrated his 18th birthday by putting the Tigers on the board with an 80-yard interception return midway through the second quarter.

After being the wrong team in losses to Heath and Calloway responded early on when the upstart Rockets had the Tigers on their heels.

On Crittenden's first four possessions, the Rockets moved within Murray High territory, only to be denied by Tiger defenders.

"I thought the key to the game was when we faltered early in the game and gave them great field

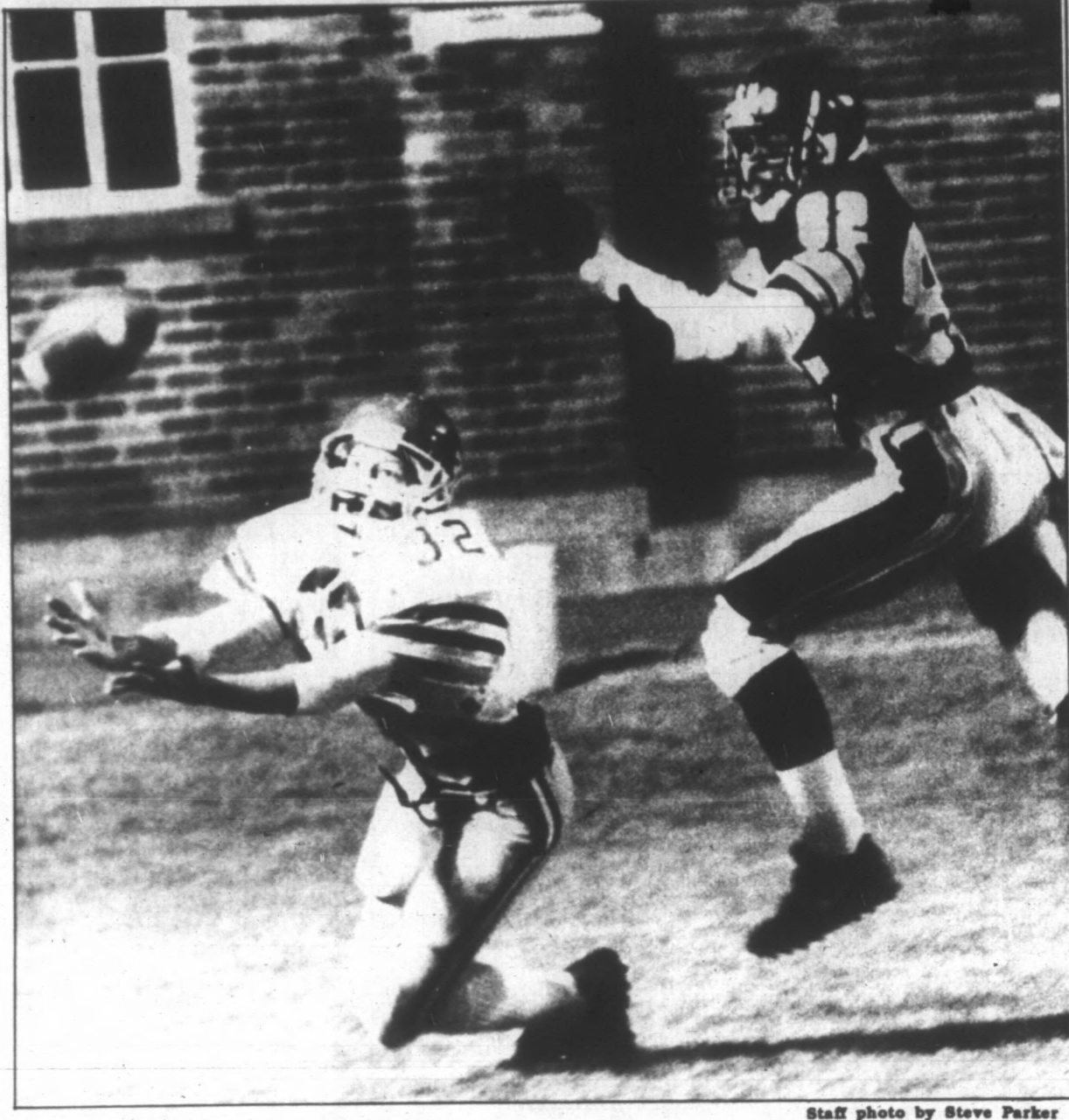

## McLeod starts new career under Dome

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — As hard as it is for some to believe Digger Phelps is gone from Notre Dame, so is it improbable to imagine John MacLeod on the sidelines coaching the Fighting Irish.

Phelps' 20-year run at the helm of Golden Dome basketball ended last spring amid fellow coaches' expressions of dismay over the forced departure of one of the profession's most successful members as far as winning percentage and graduation rate.

His successor is MacLeod, who spent the last 18 years coaching in the NBA, most recently with the New York Knicks.

"I go from playing against Michael Jordan and the three-game series in New York, to 10 days later talking to high school kids on the phone," he said. "It's a major, major change."

He finds himself a teacher again, working with untrained and untested talent.

"My challenge here is to be patient when things don't go right," the 54-year-old MacLeod said.

His second challenge is teaching Notre Dame a fast-break offense and man-to-man defense as the Fighting Irish come off a 12-20 season.

"We know there will be teams that jump all over us defensively," he said. "There'll be times when we shoot it a little bit quicker than I'd like to see. But I'd rather see an uptempo pace."

MacLeod, who last coached collegiately at Oklahoma in 1973, is one of 38 new coaches on the sidelines in Division I, but he's the only one making the move from the professional ranks.

Notre Dame's uptempo offense will be powered by seniors LaPhonso Ellis, who missed most of last season because of academics, and guard Elmer Bennett.

"Everybody's hungry," Ellis said. "We've had what I consider losing seasons the last couple of years. Nobody wants to be a loser."

Bennett, who averaged 14 points per game last season as a shooting guard, has been recast by MacLeod as a point guard.

"It's like there's new blood," Bennett said. "Everyone's more excited."

Notre Dame opens at home Nov. 26 against Butler after exhibitions against a German team and Athletics in Action.

The Irish face a tough schedule, playing Louisville at home in early December before nine straight road games that include Kentucky and North Carolina. They will also face Duke and Syracuse on the road.

"We're making progress here in practice," MacLeod said. "Competing against some of these top ball clubs in a pressure-packed situation, with hostile crowds, is a different story."

MacLeod and Notre Dame stumbled into each other's arms. Phelps announced his retirement in mid-April. Nearly three weeks later, the Knicks fired MacLeod after the Chicago Bulls beat them on their way to the NBA championship.

In mid-May, MacLeod was hired by the Irish.

Now it's down to work, and coping with changes: lack of depth, a 45-second shot clock that seems an eternity, off-and-on execution instead of the sure-footed play of the pros.

"These players are just coming out of high school," said MacLeod who won 707 games in 14 seasons with Phoenix, three with Dallas and last year at New York. "Their knowledge base isn't anywhere near that of (Cont'd on page 9)

## Racers host Screamin' Eagles of Fort Campbell

The Murray State Racers open their 1991-92 season Saturday night at home with an exhibition game against Fort Campbell.

"I'll be coaching to win," Racer coach Scott Edgar said, "but I'm going to play everyone on our roster. Right now, I don't have a starting lineup. For this game, I might even platoon."

The Racers held their annual Blue-Gold game Tuesday and although Edgar tried to divide squads evenly, the Blues dominated play in winning 95-88. All-America center candidate Popeye Jones scored 29 points and had 16 rebounds for the Blues, who led 47-40 at halftime and 75-61 midway in the second half.

Frank Allen, Jamal Evans, Jones,

Scott Sivills and Bo Walden started for the Blues, while Scott Adams, Maurice Cannon, Cedric Gumm, Darren Hill and Rafael Peterson started for the Golds.

"I'm looking forward to improvement from everyone when we play Fort Campbell," Edgar said. "Also, I'm anxious to see what carries over into the game what we've taught in practice this week."

The game is the first of four Fort Campbell will play in an eight-day stretch against Ohio Valley Conference teams (the Screamin' Eagles face Tennessee Tech next Tuesday, Morehead State on Thursday and Austin Peay next Saturday).

The Racers host the Czechoslovakian Select Team of Sparta next Saturday and then host Illinois Tech Nov. 26 in their regular-season opener.

PHOENIX (AP) — Residents of Phoenix, most of them Laker-haters by custom, poured out their sorrow and support Friday night for Magic Johnson in a tribute to the long-time leader of the Los Angeles team.

Johnson, the NBA's all-time assist leader, announced Thursday that he has the AIDS virus.

Friday night's clash with the Phoenix Suns, a Pacific Division rival, was the first for the Lakers since the announcement.

Phoenix forward Kurt Rambis, a former Laker, introduced A.C. Green of Los Angeles and asked the crowd to join in a prayer.

"We ask even at this apparently dark time that you intervene by your divine power and bring a bright new day to Earvin and his family," Green prayed.

Before the game, an estimated 2,000 people signed a 4-foot-high greeting card, offering their sympathy to Johnson and his wife.

Several people in the audience wore gold-and-purple jerseys with Johnson's No. 32. The Lakers did not wear anything to signify their sadness.

The atmosphere was gloomy earlier as the team loosened up in Veterans Memorial Coliseum.

The announcement less than 24 hours earlier took the fun out of hoops for Bryon Scott, Johnson's long-time partner in the backcourt.

"It's hard to fill a void like Earvin Johnson (left) on the court, and off the court it's even tougher, because he was more important to us as a person than as a player," Scott said.

"There's people out there that look at us and say we've got a job that we love to do, and we get paid a lot of money to go out and play basketball — something that we would probably do for free when we were younger," he added. "But the 11 guys on this team look at this as, like so many other people

who have jobs that they really don't want to be at that particular time."

"I think we could do a lot more things at this particular time than be playing basketball."

Scott, who played at nearby Arizona State, said he was trying to prepare for the game by focusing on pregame routine — "the things I've done for the last nine years."

The customary afternoon shoot-around before a road game was closed, and the players spoke with reporters only briefly afterward.

Johnson has not played this year, and the Lakers were 1-2 in three straight overtime games — an indication of the 6-foot-9 player's on-court value.

Coach Mike Dunleavy said he told his players to cope and carry on.

"We have to play the game tonight, and we've got to play the game the way he wants to play the game, and that's all-out," Dunleavy said.

Sedale Threatt and Scott will continue to start at the guard positions, with Terry Teagle and Demetrius Calip as backups.

Tony Smith, the No. 2 point guard last season, will have recovered from a sprained right ankle and be back off the injured list within a week, Dunleavy said.

Nevertheless, the team will try to draw on Johnson's special blend of (Cont'd on page 9)

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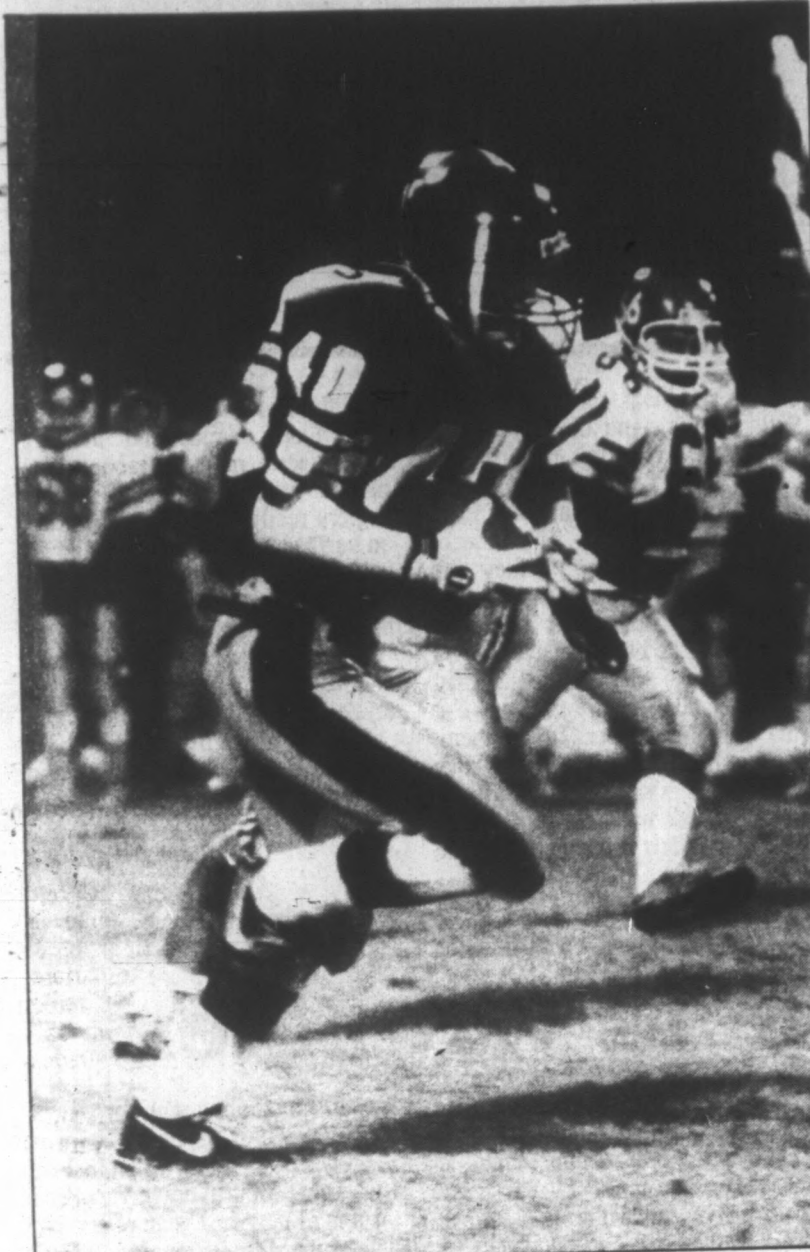
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Tiger senior Matt Krug, who celebrated his 18th birthday Friday, returns an interception 80 yards for the Tigers' first score against Crittenden County.

the ball up on downs. "When our defense rose to the occasions and stopped them twice like that, that was the ballgame," Fisher said.

After a Murray punt, Crittenden moved into Tiger territory, but penalties halted the drive. Murray continued to struggle offensively and punted, and behind the running of Donnie Beverly, Crittenden moved to the Tiger 24.

But on fourth and eight, Curtis, under heavy pressure from the blitzing Tigers, tossed an errant pass that Krug snared from the air. The senior started to slip, but regained enough footing to cut to the outside where he went the distance to put Murray up 7-0.

"All I saw was the ball," Krug said. "I don't know if he was trying to throw the ball away. I just stepped in front of it."

"Matt Krug is a ballplayer," Fisher said. "We've been talking all year that we had to get the ball to Matt Krug more, because he makes a big play. That was a real big play, because that put us on top, and got us going and gave us a lot of confidence."

After Krug's run put Murray up 7-0, Crittenden fumbled and Murray's Brad Nunnally pounced on it on the Rocket 34. Tiger quarterback Brent Keller tossed two strikes that were dropped, and then found Chip Greene and Fred Sowerby for completions before Gary Sims scooted 18 yards to put Murray up 14-0 after Casey McNutt added the PAT.

Crittenden, thanks to two dazzling catches from Chad Perryman, threatened late in the first half, but Victor Perry picked off a Curtis pass on a play where Perry battled a Rocket receiver for possession. "It looked to me like it was offense interference," Fisher said. "Victor clearly had the ball."

Starnes saw it differently. "They ruled it an interception, and the kid didn't have control of it, and if he did have control of it, the ball was on the ground."

After all, they both play in Texas, where football comes ahead of family on fall weekends. And they represent the state's two biggest cities, with their different lifestyles.

Plus, both teams have enjoyed success through the years, and have competed for attention in the off-season.

So guess what? Going into Sunday's game at the Astrodome, they don't hate each other. Actually, the Cowboys and Oilers get along quite well.

"It hasn't been what you'd call a heated rivalry because we don't play each other every year except in the preseason," Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson said. "I know the Cowboy people have tremendous respect for Houston over the years and what they've done this year."

The Cowboys and the Oilers

have played only six times in the regular season, with Houston winning the last meeting 25-17 in 1988. Dallas leads the series 4-2.

"Over the last few seasons we haven't played too well and that takes away from a rivalry. Hopefully, that part will change," Dallas quarterback Troy Aikman said.

The Cowboys are 6-3 for the first time since 1986. They are three games behind undefeated Washington in the NFC East.

Houston is 7-2 and leads the AFC Central by three games over Cleveland. The Oilers have won seven straight at home.

The rivalry may mean more personally to Houston coach Jack Pardee, who battled the Cowboys as a player for the Los Angeles Rams and the Redskins.

"They were called America's Team and they were the first with the computers and we had the work ethic," Pardee said. "We wanted to beat the computers."

In other games Sunday, it's

Atlanta at Washington, the Los Angeles Raiders at Denver, Kansas City at the Los Angeles Rams, Detroit at Tampa Bay, Buffalo at Green Bay, Seattle at San Diego and Philadelphia at Cleveland.

Also, it's Indianapolis at the New York Jets, the New York Giants at Phoenix, San Francisco at New Orleans, Pittsburgh at Cincinnati and New England at Miami.

On Monday night, Chicago is at Minnesota.

The Redskins will try to become the 14th NFL team to start out 10-0. They'll take on Atlanta at RFK Stadium, where they're 5-0 and have outscored opponents 200-30.

The Falcons will be the third run-and-shoot team to play Washington this season. Washington beat Detroit, which was without injured Barry Sanders, 45-0 in the opener and got past Houston

16-13 in overtime last week.

"They're tough, but we won't see things that we haven't seen before," Redskins linebacker Matt Millen said. "We're getting used to this."

The Falcons (5-4) field a modified version of the system coach Jerry Glanville first tried in Houston, typically using four wide receivers and a running back who can become a fifth receiver.

"The run-and-shoot has some real good points to it," Glanville said. "If we didn't put it in when we were in Texas, I don't think we ever would have had the success that we had."

Atlanta beat San Francisco last week on a Hal Mary leave on the final play. Billy Joe Tolliver, who threw the winning pass, may play again instead of quarterback Chris Miller, whose ribs are bruised.

a 10- or 12-year veteran in pro ball."

Bill Foster is also making a collegiate comeback, although his year off was spent in retirement rather than the NBA.

Foster ended 24 years as a collegiate head coach in 1990 when he retired from Miami. A year off with a little TV work woven in made him hungry to get back and he is at Virginia Tech.

"I was bored stiff," Foster said. "I'm a lot happier when I have problems to face."

The 55-year-old Foster is the winningest coach at three different schools — Shorter College, North Carolina Charlotte and Clemson.

Eight coaches moved from one Division I school to another: Jim Molinari from Northern Illinois to Bradley; Stew Morrill from Montana to Colorado State; Paul Cormier from Dartmouth to Fairfield; Mike Dement from Cornell to

Division I newcomer North Carolina-Greensboro; Oliver Purnell from Radford to Old Dominion; Steve Newton from Murray State to South Carolina; Frankie Allen from Virginia Tech to Tennessee State; and Tony Barone from Creighton to Texas A&M.

Barone had won consecutive Missouri Valley Conference titles at Creighton and the Bluejays advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament last year. 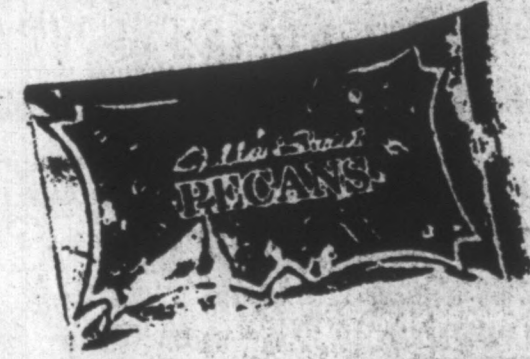

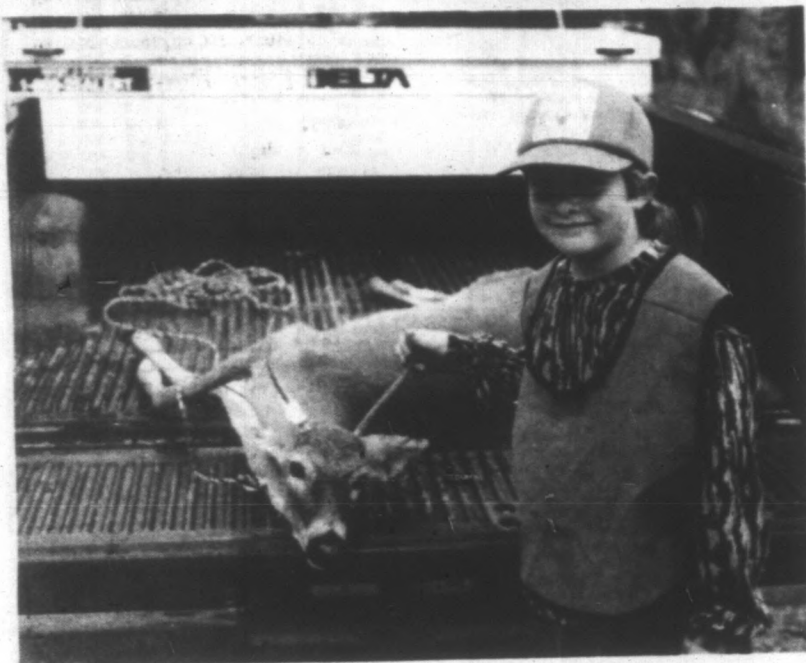
## TVA lake information only a phone call away

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Boaters and fishermen are only a phone call away from the latest conditions at Tennessee Valley Authority lakes.

The agency has expanded its lake user information service to include a 24-hour hotline that can give callers lake elevations for most TVA dams, unregulated stream flows for 21 locations and water release schedules for most TVA and Army Corps of Engineers

dams. Ralph Brooks, TVA's water resource manager, said service is "in response to the numerous requests we've received" from lake users.

## FISHING LINE

We needed some cold weather to get the fish into their winter feeding mode but I personally wanted something around 60 degrees!

A couple from another state were using minnows for crappie and the bait was shaking like a rattlesnake.

It worked for awhile, though; they caught about a dozen decent crappie about 12 foot deep. That's where I found them last week, except they were snuggled up against the edge of the drop. The folks I spoke with had asked where they could fish because it was their first time to Kentucky Lake.

I think it's more fun to catch crappie on ultra-light tackle than on set poles in a holder. However, if you move six poles into a school of active fish on a drop or over a brushpile, the action is fast and furious and unforgettable!

The way the weather is now will keep a lot of folks off the water but at the same time, the gamefish should be gathering in large concentrations.

We also should have a warming trend or two before December and then all species will be more active. I talked with several bass anglers who are fishing the Red

Man tournament this weekend at Paris Landing and discovered that many of them hadn't been on the lake before. I think some of the ones who know Kentucky Lake will catch good bass. The time of the year is right, so if they can handle the cold you will see some big fish caught.

Huge flocks of gulls have moved onto the lake to feed on the shad baitfish and sometimes you can find gamefish under all of them. Especially if they are in a bay where there is some shallow flat or ledge. I think we will see some of the big rockfish strippers chasing the

shad this winter on this lake. On Lake Cumberland the big strippers are a major attraction during the winter months. I'm told anglers really catch some big ones on surface lures while the shad are being knocked around.

They probably do the same thing here but nobody sees them, yet! We know the water temperature is still falling but as soon as it stabilizes the action will pick up. The elevation is still above 355 feet, so maybe it will hold there awhile.

## Contributors' support allows LBL to construct stable at Wranglers'

A thirty stall stable is now available for visitors to Land Between the Lakes (LBL) Wranglers Campground. Volunteers and the staff of Tennessee Valley Authority constructed the new structure after contributions of materials and funds were made to the Land Association.

"The well designed and constructed stalls are truly an example of a private/public partnership working for the visitors to LBL," said Sue Reid Draper, Executive Director of the LBL Association who coordinated the promotion and fundraising for the \$15,000 project. "Wrangler's users at LBL were aware of the lack of public funding to improve the horseback riders 27 year old camp on LBL so they have worked with the Association to provide additional improvements that will be available for use at the camp."

Wranglers Campground is centrally located on the Lake Barkley side of LBL. The 25 acre campground is surrounded by marked horseback riding trails and is used year round by riders from throughout the nation. During the 1960's when LBL was newly funded as a national recreation area, Wranglers users worked with

TVA to cut trails into the woodlands. Since that time the camp has grown through user projects that have included a modern shower building and a multipurpose activities court. Both of these improvements were provided with contributions of materials and money to assist TVA's efforts. West-Vaco, Inc. of Wickliffe and Smith Contracting of Calvert City were two of the major contributors but thousands of dollars for the previous projects came from individuals who donated through auctions and other fundraising events during the late 80's.

Charles and Nancy Smith of Mayfield, Ky have been coming to Wranglers since 1965. Charles, better known as "Coondog," is not shy about his belief that Wranglers is just about the most perfect place on earth. "Seems like we've always used Wranglers as a place to bring our family and our horses. I helped make the first trails and worked with all the fundraisers to get the showers. We formed a Wranglers Committee to work with TVA and the Association when we decided to build the stable. About ten of us who live around LBL and use Wranglers a lot are on that committee."

Smith continued, "Our next project is going to be getting electrical hookups. Most other campgrounds at LBL have hookups so TVA is going to do their part and we are going to ask for donations and contributions to get Wranglers up to date. Horse people today travel with trailers and expect to find electricity available for their air conditioners and heaters. Horseback riding is the fastest growing sport in America today and LBL has the space to develop the best horseback riding facility in the country."

Supporting Smith's claim that horseback riding is increasing, Wranglers Campground has hosted numerous national rides in recent years including The Race of Champions, an internationally celebrated endurance race.

John Mechler, Recreation Department Manager at LBL, agreed that the expansion at Wranglers couldn't have happened without the support of the volunteers and the Association. "Behind all the work that has been done are the volunteers who have solicited materials and money. Using a combination of TVA staff support and private time and dollars, we have been able to get these projects done years ahead of schedule. We are looking

forward to working with these dedicated users of Wranglers to provide improvements that will increase LBL's quality customer service to our visitors. Many LBL supporters have helped the Association and TVA in this partnership for Wranglers Campground."

Voicing pride in the Wranglers volunteer's accomplishments, Draper urges the LBL region to experience Wranglers for themselves. "Working with the citizens who use LBL is an important objective of the Association. I hope that the improvements at Wranglers will attract even more people to LBL. The more people who use LBL, the more our regional businesses will benefit from visitors expenditures."

## Standing tall

Deer stands can be either helpful or harmful to hunters

HENDERSON, Ky. — One of the most popular methods of deer hunting is from a tree stand, but the elevated platforms can be dangerous. More outdoorsmen are hurt annually from falls than from any other kind of accident.

In selecting a tree stand, the hunter can choose security or portability, but it's tough to have high degrees of both — the lighter or more portable a platform, the less secure it is likely to be once it's in place.

The most dependable type is a good "permanent" stand — a well-built platform big enough for the hunter's necessary movement and made of sturdy lumber

attached to the tree. The steps or ladder used to climb to the stand must also be carefully made and securely attached for safety. Although new, well-constructed platforms are generally safe, the same can't be said for their older counterparts. Time and weather weaken even the best lumber and metal and an old stand should be thoroughly inspected and tested

before a climber attempts to use it.

Ladder stands are essentially ladders with a platform at the top. The platform is fastened to a tree with a strap, rope or chain, and once the legs are set firmly in the ground, the ladder should also be attached to the tree.

Many commercially built ladder stands are made of aircraft aluminum and weigh between 20 and 30 pounds. They break down into three or more pieces for reasonably easy transportation.

A somewhat similar device employs a ladder and platform with two additional legs and is free-standing for use when there are no sizable trees available.

The most portable and generally least secure stands are the hangers and climbers. They may anywhere from less than 10 pounds to more than 30, depending on materials and construction. The safety of these metal platforms depends largely on the quality of construction and the user's skill.

Cantilevered from a tree trunk and secured by straps chains or the user's weight, the devices are not usually recommended for hunters weighing more than 250 pounds.

Well-made hanging stands firmly attached can provide reasonable security and comfort for a hunter, but it is smart to inspect all straps, welds, bolts and other stress points frequently.

Two-piece climbing stands which require the user to "caterpillar" up a tree, raising the seat with his hands and the foot rest with his feet offer the greatest likelihood of injury. The hunter is especially vulnerable while climbing; a slip can send the whole affair down the tree trunk to the ground.

The best advice from both manufacturers and veteran users of climbing stands is to get the best-built product you can find, understand thoroughly how it works, practice climbing until you have mastered the procedure and examine the stand regularly for signs of stress.

## Dear Abby

DEAR ABBY: I have a strange and wacky problem that I have never seen addressed in your column. I have an intense fear of bees, hornets and wasps. I'm sure this will seem silly to many, but there may be others who share this crazy fear, although I have never met them.

Over the years, my fears have intensified. It is very embarrassing at times. Whenever I hear anything that sounds like a bee — an electric razor, a buzzing sound on the radio — I have a panic attack until I can locate the source. I rarely go outdoors in the sum-

mer time (thank God, I work in an office), and I never wear perfume in the daytime during bee season. When I do gather the courage to go to a barbecue or some other outdoor event, I either leave early or stay inside the car. There must be a place for me to "escape" to or I won't even consider going.

My last apartment was chosen with great consideration for its landscaping. There are no flowers or bushes to attract bees. I am so deathly afraid of bees that I have (a) jumped out of a moving car, (b) left a 2-year-old child in the middle of the street,

(c) run out into traffic, and done other outrageous things in a panic while trying to escape from bees.

Otherwise, I am a sane and sensible person. I wish there were some kind of device I could wear to discourage bees from coming to me.

DEAR PAULA: Your problem is not bees, it is your inappropriate overreaction to the buzzing. Your irrational fear is making you a potential danger to yourself and others. Therefore, I urge you to work through your

phobia with a therapist who specializes in banishing such fears. (Ask your family doctor for a referral.)

Meanwhile, ask your local pharmacist and/or the proprietor of the nearest sporting goods store for a reliable bee repellent. And good luck.

DEAR READERS: "As our society ages and people are living longer, many older people suffer from aches and pains which they dismiss as signs of old age, and choose not to consult a physician," says Dennis Boulware, president of the Louisiana Arthritis Foundation.

"While over 37 million Americans suffer from arthritis, it is not a normal part of aging. (The symptoms of arthritis include pain and swelling in the affected joint.) Pain and swelling are not natural, and should not be tolerated — especially when there is medical treatment available."

This reminds me of a very old story my dear, departed father used to tell: An elderly man went to see his doctor about a pain in his right leg. The doctor examined the patient quickly, then said, "Well, what do you expect, Mr. Goldberg — that leg is 80 years old."

Mr. Goldberg replied, "Well, doctor, the other leg is also 80 years old and it doesn't hurt."

## Dr. Gott

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been considering taking Bee-Thin Naturally tablets that contain phenylalanine. Does this ingredient have any side effects or properties I should be aware of?

DEAR READER: Phenylalanine is an amino acid needed for good health. It is plentiful in many foods, including dairy products. The substance is harmless and will cause no side effects.

If phenylalanine is the active ingredient in Bee-Thin products, you're being taken for a ride; phenylalanine will not affect your weight. Read the label again and check out the other components. Many non-prescription diet pills contain phenylpropanolamine, a mild appetite suppressant, that should not be taken by patients who are under treatment for diabetes, thyroid disease, or irregularities of heartbeat. In addition, the compound can cause jitteriness, nervousness and insomnia.

I advise against appetite suppressants of any kind. They are of temporary benefit at best and do not help people maintain an ideal weight. Studies have shown that more than 90 percent of people who lose weight with medication (or in a weight-reduction program) regain the lost pounds within a year or two.

I believe you would be better off following a diet you can stick to, year in and year out. Start by eliminating sugar, sweets, alcohol and junk food. Munch on raw vegetables for snacks. Eat modest portions of meat/fish/poultry/vegetables/raw fruit. Most people can lose about a pound a week (and keep off the weight) on this simple diet.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I understand there is a fairly new blood test available for determining prostate cancer, yet I don't know what the antigen level should be. What is considered a safe level as opposed to one that should require follow-up?

DEAR READER: The test is called prostatic specific antigen. It is not 100 percent accurate, but it certainly is a valuable adjunct to the standard rectal examination in diagnosing prostate cancer. Normal values of PSA vary from lab to lab and depend on age and smoking history (smokers have higher levels). Ask your family doctor what the normal values are for PSA in your community.

## November is National Diabetes Month

November has been designated as National Diabetes Month by the American Diabetes Association. The Purchase District Health Department, in conjunction with the Kentucky Diabetes Control Program, has set a goal to increase public awareness about diabetes.

Diabetes is a major public health problem in Kentucky as well as in the nation. According to Vital Statistics, it is listed as the sixth leading cause of death in Kentucky.

Most cases of diabetes fall into two types: insulin dependent and non-insulin dependent diabetes mellitus. In both types of diabetes, people must

follow a daily regimen of diet, physical activity, medications, and blood sugar testing as prescribed by the person's physician. Diabetes seeks to control the disease by keeping blood sugar and blood fat levels as near to normal as possible. Early detection and good control of diabetes can help an individual to lead a healthy and productive life.

Signs and symptoms of diabetes may include hunger, blurred vision, drowsiness, increased urination, nausea, and increased thirst. Many times, however, there are no symptoms present. Obesity, family history

of diabetes, and little physical activity can increase the risk of developing diabetes.

In the Purchase District, your local health center offers blood sugar testing as well as an education and monitoring program. The Purchase District Health Department has a Diabetes Team consisting of a nutritionist and a registered nurse. They offer comprehensive diabetes education classes and other projects for people who are interested in diabetes in the eight county area. Further information may be obtained by calling the Diabetes Team at (502)247-1490 or your county health center.
