# Transfer station pact signed

The Murray City Council approved an agreement submitted by a Hickman firm to operate a transfer station for the disposal of solid waste from Murray and Cal-loway County at a special noon meeting Friday

Brothers Waste, Inc. of Troy, Tenn. Murray City Planner Don Elias said although B&J Sanitation had submitted a proposal previously, its permit had not been approved by

Elias pointed out that the firm has now resolved those problems and the permit has been approved. He said by taking the city and

county's waste, the firm will be doubling the size of its present landfill operation.

B&J Sanitation will furnish all labor, equipment and services necessary to dispose of all the city and county's waste. The price structure begins at \$24 per ton July 1 and will rise to \$28 per ton through Dec. 31, 1994. This includes a \$1 surcharge mandated by Fulton County by Fulton County.

On comparison, rates in the Barker Brothers proposal would begin at \$27 per ton July 1 and increase to \$30 per ton in 1994. "B&J has been operating since 1979. The firm averages around 50

tons per day in its landfill," Elias Elias said the rate structure for city and county residents bringing waste to the landfill will be equal.

The fee on automobiles is \$2 and pickups are charged \$4 up to a

level load. If a pickup has modifi-cations that increase hauling capac-ity, it will be weighed and charged the same rate as commercial trucks, which is \$32 per ton. Murray Mayor Bill Cherry said although picking one of the two companies is a hard decision, he

prefers to do business with B&J Sanitation because it is a Kentucky company. "We're going to have to go into a big regional landfill in western Kentucky sooner or later. But for

now, we have to go somewhere quickly," Cherry said. Elias said because Liquid Waste Disposal (LWD) of Calvert City presently meets standards which will become effective in 1995, he feels it is possible that the city and county may examine a proposal from that firm in 1995 when B&J Sanitation's contract expires.



# Spurrier pleads guilty, will testify of Lexington, told reporters after the arraignment that Spurrier did not personally profit from the

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Ex-lobbyist Jay Spurrier apparently will become a star witness in a fed-

eral investigation of alleged cor-ruption in Kentucky government. Spurrier, once the state's top harness racing official and a power behind the scenes of the General Assembly, pleaded guilty Friday to federal extortion and conspiracy

He confessed to a federal judge that he passed \$20,000 to a state official and \$4,000 to a second person. Both were listed as unindicted co-conspirators in Spurrier's indictment but were not otherwise

Assistant U.S. Attorney Duane

Joseph Hood that Spurrier would

be testifying against others.

Spurrier resigned as chairman of the Kentucky Harness Racing Commission on Dec. 31. He was the second person charged in the investigation.

Former state Sen. John W. Hall of Henderson pleaded guilty May 5 to extorting payoffs from a Henderson harness track in 1990 for himself and other legislators, who have not been identified.

Spurrier's indictment also dealt with money extorted from the Henderson track, Riverside Downs, which was seeking extra racing dates from Spurrier's commission. The money was supplied by the FBI in a "sting" investigation. His attorney, Harry B. Miller Jr.

In court, Spurrier told Hood there was some irony in the crime because the harness commission's

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — The that the person was not connected ate official who allegedly took a to his administration. \$20,000 bribe from former Harness Racing Commission chairman Jay Spurrier is out of office, according

to Spurrier's attorney.

Harry B. Miller Jr. would not name the bribe-taker who was not identified in the indictment that charged Spurrier with fixing state decisions on harness racing.

However, Miller said, "It won't be too long before you find out. That's what I'm informed."

Gov. Brereton Jones reiterated during a radio talk show Thursday

"I have absolutely no idea (who it was), but I would guess, and would strongly state, that I don't believe it was anyone in our administration," Jones said.

The governor called news of the grand jury action "a black eye for the whole state.

When the investigation became public March 31, Kentucky's U.S. Attorneys Joseph Whittle and Karen Caldwell told Jones that his administration was not a target.

# McPherson says legislators wasting taxpayers' money

Joe McPherson, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for state senator in Kentucky's First District, contends that legislators are costing the state a large sum of money and have little to show for

In a telephone interview from his Graves County home Thursday night, he said on the occasions that he has observed them, legislators do not take their obligations seriously.

"It's not fun and games to me when they are spending taxpayers' money. They had plenty of time to do three times the work they did. It's ridiculous to think our elected officials would go to Frankfort to play games, waste time and then turn around and pretend they need to have special sessions," he said. McPherson also claims people

are unhappy with the way current

state Sen. Jeff Green assumed that position by winning a special elec-tion Jan. 30 in which he was the

only registered candidate. "People are disgusted with the way Mr. Green was put in office. Larry Wilson and myself were run-

ning at the same time and, of course, we didn't have a chance. We weren't even permitted to come before the committees and state what we believe in. He (Green) is a representative of the establishment. I feel that if things had been done properly, Mr. Wilson and I should have had the opportunity to have met with the committees from the various counties," McPherson said. McPherson said he and Wilson

favored having Lloyd Clapp of Wingo assume the office for the remainder of the term of Greg Higdon, who resident to accept a post in the Natural Resources Cabinet.

"Mr. Green served only about a month. His ad stating what great things he did is ridiculous. It's not a joke, it's a serious matter," he

McPherson said he frequently hears people say they are losing trust in their elected officials. "They feel like they're being bypassed, overlooked and not being

properly taken care of in a sense. Many elected officials are fine, decent people and are accountable for their actions. It's those that are not being accountable that are angering people," he said.

McPherson said ethics is a problem that needs to be addressed, but that it could be done in ways other than a special legislative session.

"I sometimes see when they get together and try to straighten things out, they do more covering up. To me this is a ridiculous situation also. I see nothing bright in a special session. If he (Governor Jones) calls a special session dealing with insurance and workman's compensation, they could have a part to deal with ethics. But to call a special session just for ethics would be a waste of taxpayers' money," he

He said insurance and worker's compensation are two areas that make it harder for small businesses to compete. McPherson said the fact that businesses are already closing shows it needs to be dealt with quickly.

McPherson also accused Green of allowing additional state funds to be drawn away from western Kentucky to other areas.

# Perot on ballot; called 'little dictator' by Demo chairman

as billionaire Ross Perot will appear on Kentucky's November ballot, a spokesman for the secretary of state's office said Friday after petitions containing about 40,000 signatures were certified.

Jim Curtis, a spokesman for Sec-retary of State Bob Babbage, said the petitions that Perot presented during a personal appearance in Frankfort on Thursday had met all requirements to be deemed valid.

Only 5,000 signatures are legally required to have a candidate's name placed on the Kentucky

Petitions to put the undeclared independent candidate on the ballot also were filed in Alaska on Thursday. The petition-certification process is under way in Texas, Florida and New Jersey, and Perot has been approved for the ballot in four other states: Tennessee, Utah, Delaware and Maine.

Perot's candidacy appears to have attracted two former governors who were major party adversaries for the governorship 13 years

Former Gov. Louie B. Nunn, a Republican, greeted Perot after the Texan spoke at the Capitol and the two exchanged pleasantries. Former Democratic Gov. John Y. Brown met with Perot in Texas this week, but both he and Perot refuse to answer questions about their

Nunn, who was governor from 1967 to 1971, was the GOP nominee when Brown won the governorship in 1979.

"I don't talk about private conversations, so I won't talk about " Perot said of the Brown visit. 'We're friends. We were just visiting.

Meanwhile, the chairman of the national Democratic Party, who was visiting Louisville on Thurs-

day, described Perot as a "little dictator" and predicted the poten-tial candidate will soon have a short fuse with reporters.

Party Chairman Ron Brown made the remarks to a group of white-collar Democrats.

"I think the press is now feeling a little guilty that he has gotten a free ride," Brown said of Perot. 'My own judgment is he's a little

Mayor Jerry Abramson, who was

the host of Brown's visit with community leaders and elected officials, later said that Brown didn't realize a reporter was present at the meeting.

But Abramson also said he believes most voters have little knowledge of Perot.

"I don't know Ross Perot from a load of coal, as they say in Kentucky, and I suspect most Americans don't know him from a load of coal," Abramson said:

Carson, the man who put the nation to bed laughing for 30 years, ended his reign over late-night television with a mix of sentimentality, nostalgia and his usual boyishly charming humor.

"I am taking the applause sign home, putting it in the bedroom, the 66-year-old host of the announced Carson with his tradi-tional yell, "Heeeere's Johnny!" Doc Severinsen struck up the band. But little else was the same during Carson's last stint on the "Tonight Show" before turning over the late-night institution to Jay Leno.

Carson acknowledged his wife, Alex, and sons Chris and Cory in the audience. He also remembered another son, Rick, who was killed in a car crash last year.

"It would have been a perfect evening if their brother Rick had been here with us," Carson said.

# Bush plan would weaken wetlands protection

By JENNIFER DIXON

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department wants to let farmers drain millions of acres of wetlands, from the Mississippi Delta to the prairie potholes of the Great Plains where migrating waterfowl rest and feed.

The department's draft proposal obtained by The Associated Press, would exempt the farmers from a 1990 law barring federal subsidies to producers who drain or otherwise alter wetlands in "bad faith."

"This is tantamount to USDA's authorization of the use of taxpayer subsidies to agriculture for the destruction of important wetlands resources," said Clark Williams, wetlands specialist for the National Audubon Society.

Galen Bridge, associate chief of the Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service, said the draft is merely one of many working papers under consideration and the environmentalists "are poking sticks at a non-policy.

The proposal, which still must be approved by Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan, would be in line with other efforts by the Bush administration to ease what the president has described as an undue regulatory burden on American business.

LONDON — In a policy shift, the Bush administration is imposing new sanctions on Serbia in a drive to end the bloodshed in the Balkans. Urging the Europeans to follow the U.S. lead, Secretary of State James A. Baker III

announced the pressure moves after dinner Friday night with British Prime Minister John Major. "The civilized world really should begin to contemplate what they might be able to do," Baker said. The secretary was flying today to Lisbon, where a conference on aid to the former Soviet Union is likely to be overshadowed by the ethnic strife in what used to be Yugoslavia and the expected signing of a protocol to the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty.

THAI KING SEEKS RESIGNATION OF P.M.

BANGKOK, Thailand — Thailand's king sought to speed the resignation of Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon, granting him clemency from any wrongdoing in a bloody military crackdown earlier this week, officials said

today. The move came a day after coalition partners withdrew their support of Suchinda and backed a proposed law that would force him to step down. Suchinda has come under increasing attack because he was not elected to

the parliament, was leader of last year's coup and allowed soldiers to week to fire on demonstrators. At least 40 were killed. Suchinda met with King Bhumibol Adulyadej Friday night, when it was agreed the prime minister should resign in response to mounting pressure from the public and factions in the military sources said

In a statement released in Kennebunkport, Maine, where Bush was spending the Memorial Day weekend, the White House said the lands being set aside "contain the highest wilderness qualities of naturalness and opportunities for solitude and primitive recreation."

However, Wilderness Society spokesman Richard Hoppe called the proposal "a ridiculous lowballing of what really needs to be protected. It will mean that more logging, more mining and more grazing will be permitted in numer-

ous ecologically sensitive areas."

Peter A.A. Berle, president of
the National Audubon Society, said the wetlands plan at the Agriculture Department would "sanction the destruction of literally millions of acres of ecologically valuable wetlands."

The proposal notes that about 58 percent of the wetlands in the prairie pothole region of the Dakotas and upper Midwest, as well as extensive areas of farmed playa lakes and farmed wetlands in the lower Mississippi valley would no longer be protected.

The evidence documenting the values of these wetlands for migratory waterfowl, water purification, flood water retention and ground water recharge is incontrovertible," Berle said in a letter to Madigan urging him to kill the

Under the 1990 farm bill, producers who had drained a wetland were forbidden from receiving federal farm subsidies unless they had met certain conditions indicating they had acted in good faith. The law was the result of an agreement between environmentalists and agricultural interests.

If USDA were to make these changes, it would greatly ease the tension and the controversy and the conflict out there in agricultural said Mark Maslyn, director of national affairs for the Farm

Maslyn said USDA's efforts should be concentrated on protecting "true marshes, swamps and bogs," and not farmland "that doesn't exhibit any wetland characteristics."

According to the draft, wetlands that had been farmed six out of 10 years would be considered "prior converted croplands," which means they are not subject to the law forbidding drainage or other alterations

The draft indicates that about 58 percent of all wetland areas in the prairie pothole region are farmed four out of five years.

Environmentalists say the potholes provide a breeding ground and resting stop for many migrating waterfowl.

# World Editorial Roundup

May 13; The Sun Herald, Biloxi, Miss., on hate crimes: Hate is ugly. Hate is malignant. It is a passion that poisons everything

it touches, even those who would inflict its manifestation on others. And yet, as destructive as hatred can be, there are at least two troubling aspects to the increasing number of "hate-crime laws" enacted by vari-

First, can a nation founded by people desperate for freedom to express their thoughts without fear now be moving to legislate what thoughts are

And second, when a harsher penalty is levied in one of two identical crimes because of the category of the motive, where does that place the victims, who in this country are guaranteed "equal protection of the

Hate for persons of different colors, genders and beliefs is undeniably harmful and unhealthy, but, as an emotion, it is not against the law. Neither is greed. Neither is anger. Criminal acts that may result from these emotions are against the law, however, and those acts call for punishment. Punishment for the crime, not for the motive. ...

What we need more of, rather then laws that mandate unequal punishment, are courts that mete out sentences that deter and punish, no matter who the offender might be or what his motives might have been.

The increase in the number of hate crimes deserves attention, but adding this responsibility to our overburdened legal system is not the proper avenue. Two words describe the idea of legislating a person's thoughts: unconstitutional and impossible.

May 13; The Leaf-Chronicle, Clarksville, Tenn., on accountability: People should be held accountable for their own actions. It's as simple

Unfortunately, the court dockets in the United States are filled with cases brought by those who don't adhere to this philosophy. One of the latest cases concerns Maureen O'Neill. She and her three

children died in a house fire in Boston two years ago.

Her estate is suing Philip Morris Co. — maker of Marlboro and other cigarette brands - in federal court, charging it with unfair and deceptive trade practices, negligence and other claims.

According to the suit, Myles O'Neill - Mrs. O'Neill's husband and the father of her children — caused the fire while smoking a Marlboro Light on upholstered furniture. The suit alleges he was under the influence of alcohol at the time and that the children and their mother were asleep when the fire started and unable to escape the blaze.

Mrs. O'Neill's estate is suing the cigarette manufacturer because it contends that the company should have made a safer cigarette — one more

It's tragic that four innocent people's lives were snuffed out in a preventable accident. But responsibility and blame for the fire should be placed squarely upon the individual who started it, and no one else.

May 13; The Daily News, Longview, Wash., on Healthy Start:
President's Bush's "Healthy Start" program, launched with great fanfare ..., is what could be characterized as a rhetorical assault on infant mortality. The central feature of Bush's effort to reduce the nation's high infant mortality rate is a 30-second television ad that commercial stations will be asked to broadcast for free.

"I know that public-service ad campaigns like this work," Bush said.
"Most of this death and disease is easily preventable."

Unfortunately, not so easily as Bush would have it. Encouraging pregnant women to seek a physician's care is a good idea when women can find a physician to care for them. A great many poor women cannot. All too frequently the only physicians available to these women reject their business because Medicaid will pay only a fraction of what the physicians consider their services to be It'll take more of a commitment than Bush has made ... to overcome that problem.

May 14; The News, Greenville, S.C., on NASA:

Space agency officials can take heart in knowing that Americans apparently are keenly interested in the exploits of the nation's astronauts. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration also is finding out that Americans are creative, even if we aren't always very practical.

While astronauts from the shuttle Endeavour tried to retrieve a disabled communications satellite, the great American mind was at work. Get out a rod and reel, one would-be satellite rescuer suggested to NASA, but make certain the hooks are big. To another, magnetism was the key; just tie magnets to the soles of the astronauts' boots and have the

spacewalkers point their feet toward the satellite. A Texan — no surprise there — had a Wild West solution: Round up the satellite with a lasso. There was no indication of whether the orbiting cowboy should be sitting tall in the saddle.

# Memories of M.C. Garrott

Considerable thought about the topic of my maiden voyage as a columnist for the Murray Ledger & Times kept taking me in circles - always coming back around to M.C. Garrott.

Finally, I thought, "Why not?" My purpose, more than anything else, will be the same human inter-est flavor that earned him such immense local popularity in the twice-a-week column he wrote for so many years right up until his death in January 1989. Please notice I said that will be

my purpose. But no amount of vanity on my part, not even in my most delusionary moments, could ever persuade me of an ability to tell stories about people the way he

His everyday manner, as well as his writing style, reflected an uncommon affinity for people. And it was obviously genuine. Often I have thought how successful he could have been if his career

path had been politics.

My image of M.C. never changes, and I don't suppose it ever will. I still see him in my mind's eye with his head thrown back and his mouth wide open in laughter as he traded tales with

His writing had the same kind of vitality that he demonstrated in his

Ledger & Times Asst. General Manager personality. It was alive because he loved people and relished telling

their stories. They appreciated his talent too. Readership surveys indicated that his column was one of the most popular features of the newspaper. Several times he was recognized by the Kentucky Press Association for

the quality of his work. He and I worked together at Murray State University for some 13 years. Because of that relationship, I sometimes have been inclined momentarily to believe I

knew him better than most. But that is not necessarily true -for two reasons.

First, his wide variety of interests put him in contact with so many people. He was a man per-petually on the move who derived great satisfaction from using his unique talent.

And second, as versatile as he was, he was easy to know because he was not a complicated individual but disarmingly open and honest, a classic example of "what you see

M.C. lived by a rather simple set of values that some of us would probably call old-fashioned. He believed in working hard, having fun, being fair and treating others with respect.

As I begin the challenge of producing a column on a regular basis, I intend to take many of my cues from my memories of M.C. Of course, I cannot write exactly as he did, but I fully expect to use his influence as a pattern.

My intent with the column is to avoid I-strain and to set my compass in a you-turn. From time to time, I may stray and write about some of my own experiences or inject some personal opinions, but generally I shall try to steer clear that temptation.

If I adhere to these principles and show half the empathy and interest in others that M.C. did, maybe I can tell some interesting

As enthusiastic as M.C. always was about his column, the only time I saw him get antsy was when a deadline was approaching and he was scurrying about for an idea. More than a few times, he called on me and others in search of a lead he could develop.

Running dry in the idea depart-ment must be an uncomfortable feeling. No doubt it will happen to me - and I'll be chasing some of my friends, as well as some of those who were helpful to M.C. through the years, to try to pick their brains.

Another concern has been what to call the column. As M.C.'s faithful readers will recall, his was known as "Garrott's Galley.

Late last month I retired from Murray State University after more than 24 years there with no really specific plans in mind, in fact, in a bit of a quandary about where I was headed next.

Then, almost overnight, the opportunity developed to join the folks at the Murray Ledger & Times -- and my "retirement" ended rather abruptly. An appropriate title for the column, therefore, seemed to be "On Second



# Has anybody seen my sheik?

Some colleagues and I were having breakfast in a downtown hotel one morning some years back when former president Spiro Agnew and an entourage of similarly welldressed American businessmen came rushing by. Agnew was shouting, "Where's the sheik? Where's the sheik?"


A bellboy told us that an oil-rich Arab sheik was looking at some Tennessee properties for which Agnew was the agent. Unpleased with his rooms, during the night he and his party moved to another section of the hotel. Apparently Agnew had found the empty rooms and panicked, more out of fear of losing the sale than of losing his sheik. Seeing this search for a between-the-beds sheik was both funny and ill-tasting.

Millions of acres of American land and other millions of American industries have passed out of home ownership into international hands in recent years. Few of us seem alarmed by that.

In the South, the trend is not recent at all. It is an old story here. Since the Civil War, the South has been highly susceptible to absentee ownership. Its railroads and industries have been owned by nonsoutherners for years. Its chief industry has become economic councils courting outside capital to replace cotton.

As Blanche DuBois, the withered southern belle, said for all of us, in A Streetcar Named Desire, "I have always depended upon the kindness of strangers."

Southern dependency upon absentee ownership somehow coexists with enormously strong southern traditions of independence



and rugged individualism. This is a paradox never lost.

These are but observations of what is happening in our economy. We can be wistful in wishing for more local prosperity and more home-owned success even as we understand the economic pressures that force the region into welcoming absentee owners.

One can only hope that the 21st century's international economy transcending familiar nationalistic boundaries, which all the pundits prophesy to be at hand, will bring the salve and salvation expected of it. But after 127 years under absentee owners, southerners can be pardoned for being sometimes a wee bit pessimistic and suspicious. At the same time, southerners ought to be admired for extraordinary patience in waiting in line at the trough of the American Dream.

There is a counter-trend that makes the irony of southern dependence/independence a threeway street, or at least a street with a median. In many places, the purchasers from outside are actually moving to their southern properties. The North is more panicked by the loss of dozens of major corporate headquarters to the South than by the purchase of its Rock-efeller Center symbol by international owners.

In some of these places, the outsiders are becoming more souther-nized than the southerners around them or working for them. It's not unlike the phenomenon of Rome and Greece. Rome conquered and occupied Greece, but adopted Greek learning, Greek art and architecture, Greek civic patterns, and even Greek gods. In the end, it was really a debatable question as to who conquered whom.

As the controversies continue over celebrating the 500th anniversary of the arrival of Christopher Columbus, all of us aware that all Americans, perhaps even the Native Americans who were here before Columbus, are either immigrants or their descendants. Immigration into the South from other nations admittedly may have been considerably slower and less diversified than in the North, but most southerners are aware that before they or their ancestors were here were somewhere else.

In their habits of stoicism and passion, southerners are strikingly similar to the ancient Greeks. They have confidence in their abilities to

assimilate newcomers.
One easy error that southerners could make as they diversify their ethnic and economic portfolios is to assume too quickly that all out-

siders are alike. The truth is that newly-arrived owners/managers are as different from each other as they are from southerners. They come in

no single style, but in a spectrum. One should not, for example, in observing the recent re-settling of the south, equate the Amish with the Arabs. And Lord help those of us who confuse the French with the Germans. Though all incoming parties have philosophies and lifestyles conspicuously different from traditional southerners, they differ just as conspicuously from one another. Some settlers are more amenable to assimilation and sensitive to domestic mores than others.

Some southern subtlety and sophistication in reaching out to bring in new faces and monetary fuel needs to be nurtured. Simply accepting the premise that "any dollar gained is a dollar worth getting no matter what its source" will not do for the 21st century South.

The wisest outside investors will be those who actually believe and act in good faith on the litany all of them recite when they hold press conferences announcing their arrival: "The South is indeed a superior place to live, and southerners really are fine folks."

Only acceptance of mutual responsibility can make this inter-dependency work. Southerners have a responsibility for being selective in and then hospitable towards those whom they invite in, and newcomers have a responsibility for treating oldtimers with respect and for marrying into the family as quickly as possible. As the sheik and Agnew knew, choos-ing the right bed and bed-fellows is not something to take lightly.

The bidding: North East West South 2 9 Pass 2 4 Pass Pass 3 .

Opening lead — four of hearts.

Good bridge is based mostly on sound logic, and usually the logic involved is of a relatively simple sort. Even so, a player who applies his powers of reason to a particular situation may sometimes achieve a result that appears to border on the miraculous

Consider this case where South gets to four spades on the bidding shown. West leads the four of hearts, dummy follows low, and East takes the ace as South contributes the jack

At this point, any South worth

his salt knows all he needs to know to bring in the contract! He sees 15 high-card points in his own hand, nine in dummy, and also sees East play the ace of hearts at trick one. Since this accounts for 28 of the 40 high-card points in the deck, it follows that West must hold every one of the 12 missing points for his open-

ing bid. This knowledge of where the unseen high cards are located tells South it is safe to take a diamond finesse, and at the same time tells him it would be foolish to attempt a finesse in either spades or clubs.

So, when East returns a club at trick two, South goes up with the ace, cashes the ace of trumps, and leads the queen of diamonds, plan-ning to finesse. If West covers with the king, which he is apt to do, declarer wins with dummy's ace and exits with the jack of trumps. West wins with the queen but, whatever he returns, South makes the con-

follows low on the queen of dia-monds. In that case, South plays low from dummy and then puts West on lead with a trump. It does not matter whether West returns a heart, a diamond or a club - he simply cannot stop declarer from making four spades.

# Jekyll-and-Hyde Cavs take tied series home

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) - The emotional swings of a long playoff series are old hat to the Chicago Bulls but a brand new experience for the Cleveland Cavaliers.

The Cavs hope they've caught on in time.

"We've never been this far in the playoffs. We've never had these ups and downs before," Larry Nance said after the Cavaliers worked out Friday in preparation for today's third game of the Eastern Conference finals. "Now we're more conscious of it.'

Cleveland put on a Jekyll-and-Hyde act during the first two games of the series in Chicago, losing Game 1 103-89 on Tuesday night and then winning Thursday night's second game 107-81. The opening-game loss produced criticism by the Chicago media that

the Cavs were too soft. One writer called them "marshmallows."

The Cavaliers, however, say they were simply worn out mentally from their victory over Boston in a second-round series that went seven games. Chicago also played seven-game series against New York, but the Bulls got a boost because they got to stay at home for the opening of the Cleveland "In the first game at Chicago, the crowd really got to us," Cleve-land's John Williams said. "We know as a team, and coach (Lenny Wilkens) knows, that we were just flat. We didn't move the ball like we did last night. We didn't play good defense."


The Cavaliers were careful to avoid getting into a war of words or elbows - with the Bulls after Game 1. Instead, Cleveland stuck with the same finesse game that got it this far in the first place.

# Crickets are the hot bait items now

Even though we are getting some nice rains around the lake the water remains clear and this is forcing the fish out to depths they normally wouldn't be at until June.

The early morning and late evening anglers are having the best success, however, some midday fishermen are switching from bass to bluegill and redears. You can plop a cricket into the water and it doesn't have time to get wet before it is swallowed!

I fished four days with Joe and Dorothy Phillips and we really worked hard to catch bass. We had three over six pounds and the rest were threes and under. What we found to be the easiest was take along a couple of tubes of crickets and after the bass quit in the morning, start after the sunfish in the shallows.

They can be found a lot easier than bass at times and once you do locate a "bed" fast action will follow. We set floats from two feet up to three and just worked the area until the fish of quit. We kept 78 the first time and 84 the next and Joe said that's it, I don't want to clean anymore! I think Dorthy caught the most!

26-plus pounds.

# Improvements made at Hillman

Camping out at Land Between the Lakes (LBL) has always been a favorite for thousands of visitors to the 170,000-acre outdoor recreation and environmental education area located in western Kentucky and Tennessee. But recent renovations at Hillman Ferry Campground (one of three major camping facilities at LBL) should make LBL campers happier than ever.

Construction workers recently completed a major upgrading at

Hillman Ferry to reflect changes in camping trends over the past sever-al years. "Our objective," explained Larry Contri, manager of recreation services at LBL, "was to bring Hillman Ferry up to standards that would accomodate campers of the

Hillman Ferry was built in the mid-sixties. Campers today demand more space and amenities than what LBL offered, Contri added. "So we reduced the number of campsites and upgraded the camp-

We also increased the number of sites with electricity and added water and sewer hookups to a num-

The project, which cost more than \$1 million, was started in June 1991 and completed in mid-August of this year. Contri said that LBL reworked the sewage treatment plant to reduce its operating noise. More than two miles of sewage lines were added, about six miles

water lines and about 20 miles of underground electrical conductor. In addition, the swimming and beach area were doubled in size and 245 new picnic tables and grills- were added.

The Hillman Ferry renovation is among the first of several projects underway which reflect TVA's commitment to quality service and facilities at LBL. Later this year, similar work will begin at Piney Campground in the Tennessee portion of LBL. As LBL strives to continuously upgrade the services provided to the public, other facili-ties will undergo similar improvements.

Hillman Ferry Campground is open March through November. Basic fees are \$8 per night with additional charges for electricity, water and sewage. The campground has launching ramps, biking and hiking trails and is accessible for the physically-impaired. Reservations are not required.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Former President Jimmy Carter told a seminary commencement crowd Friday that rifts in the Southern Baptist Church could begin to heal if members refocus their attention on helping the poor.

Citing one Baptist missionary who has dug 120 wells to provide drinking water for the needy in Africa, Carter told about 240 people receiving masters or doctorate degrees that they each can make a difference in the world.

"No doubt words mean a lot, but actions combined with words are what exemplifies the teachings of Jesus Christ," Carter said at the 169th commencement of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville.

But he said the gradates also should focus their religious mission heavily upon assisting the impoverished in America. He said poverty is a key impediment to social justice in this country.

"I grew up in the South in Geor-

LONDON (AP) - The Major Oak, the tree of Sherwood Forest popularly associated with Robin Hood, has been cloned through propagation by a company that

hopes to offer saplings for sale.

"Our research in cloning the Major Oak ensures that if it dies we can replace it with an exact replica and, given 500 years, it will grow into an identical tree," Neal Wright, a director of Micropropa-

gation Services, said Thursday.
Trees could be grown from acorns but they would not be genetically identical to the 80-feettall Major Oak, believed to be cen-

Supported by Nottinghamshire County Council, Micropropagation removed buds from the tree and got them to take root in compost.

"Next, we will work to make the clones commercially viable. That will take another year or so," he

"Where do the poor live? Obviously in Bangladesh ... but they also live next door."

He said churches sometimes mistakenly judge success by the size of their budgets and congregations. The former president said a true measure of a church should be its efforts to end discrimination against the poor.

Carter also touched upon the ongoing feud between conservatives and moderates in the Southern Baptist Church.

When I tell people I am a Southern Baptist, it is treated with something of a joke," Carter said. 'The term Southern Baptist is related to schism and incompatibility.

Nevertheless, Carter urged the graduates to avoid complacency and to be afraid of questioning their faith. Carter said all disagreements over church philosophy may never be resolved, but he said Southern Baptists need to find

He said ministering to poor can be a starting point to heal the divisions have been particularly apparent at the Louisville seminary where moderate faculty members have left the campus under fire from conservative trustees.

"All Baptists can find common ground in dealing, church by

# Dr. Gott

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been a diabetic for about two years and do not fully understand my condition.

DEAR READER: Diabetes is a disorder of metabolism, marked by abnormal insulin secretion, elevated blood sugar levels and a host of consequences, including hastened arterio-sclerosis, heart disease, retinal disorders and renal disease.

Regardless of whether a diabetic needs insulin injections (type I) or can be managed by eating prudently and possibly taking anti-diabetes pills (type II), he or she still needs to follow a diet without sugar. Basically, for di-

a diet without sugar. Basically, for diabetics, sugar is poison.

The complications of diabetes can be delayed — but not avoided altogether — by efforts to keep the blood sugar in line. Thus, diabetics require close monitoring of sugar levels, strict attention to diet (and weight loss). loss, if appropriate), supervision of prescription drugs (such as insulin and pills), and as much information as the patients can assimilate.

It's this last point that has me concerned in responding to your question. You seem to have been given little education about your disorder. In my view, it's your responsibility and your doctor's obligation to correct this.

You should return to your physician for educational sessions detailing the facts about diabetes, the rationale be-hind your therapy and the potential consequences you may suffer in the future. In short, you must become a more active participant in your ongoing treatment; for this, you need more information.

In addition to your doctor, other re-sources are available. Check out your local library for books, written for laymen, that will help you. Furthermore, many hospitals and clinics of-fer diabetes education courses. Finally, the American Diabetes Association, 2 Park Ave., New York, NY 10016 will send you information about your disease, including tips about other educational services in your community.

To give you more information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Diabetes Mellitus."



"I have directed that those nine principles be made part of Defense Department policy," Defense Sec-retary Dick Cheney said in a statement Thursday.

Representing the news media oup — 20 organizations — Louis D. Boccardi, president of The Associated Press, said in a

'It is the consensus of our group that the guidelines offer the promise of the kind of coverage the citizens of a democracy are entitled to have, while they also recognize the need for security ground rules in combat zones.

'We began this effort because what unfolded in the Persian Gulf was unacceptable in many ways," Boccardi said. "Despite the appearance of a flood of coverage, the restrictions on reporting were severe, well beyond the undisputed need for military security."

Cheney agreed in September to seek common ground on methods that would improve combat coverage.

The guidelines unveiled Thursday establish "open and independent reporting" as the principal means of covering U.S. combat operations. They restrict the use of pools of journalists to report to the entire press corps. The Pentagon imposed pool coverage as the principal means of covering the Gulf

The new guidelines require reporters to abide by military security regulations and state that disregard of the rules could lead to a reporter's expulsion from the combat zone.

They commit the Pentagon to permit reporters access to all large military units and to give journalists the means to transmit news reports. Liaison officers are forbidden to intervene in the reporting process.

The guidelines have been endorsed by the American Society of Newspaper Editors, the Associated Press Managing Editors Association, the American Newspaper Publishers Association and the Radio and Television News Directors Association, as well as by the chiefs of many major newspapers and broadcasters.

While agreement was reached on the nine principles, Pentagon offiby the news media to prohibit prior review of news reports by military officers.

"The military believes it must retain the option to review news material to avoid the inadvertent inclusion in news reports of infor-mation that would endanger troop safety or the success of a military mission," said Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams.

Representatives of the news organizations said they believe journalists have proved they can be trusted to act responsibly and that prior review is "unwarranted and unnecessary."

Crit Luallen brings "experience, credibility and vision" to the Cabinet, Gov. Brereton Jones said in a statement.

Luallen is president of the Greater Louisville Economic Development Partnership, which oversees the Louisville area's efforts to attract jobs and investment.

She was commissioner of the state Department of the Arts under former Gov. Martha Layne Collins. Issel, a former University of Kentucky basketball star, was appointed tourism secretary by Jones in December.

Issel was to complete a broadcasting contract with the National Basketball Association's Denver Nuggets, then return to Kentucky.


