No Pain, No Gain

Jones says balancing budget will hurt

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Gov. Brereton Jones says balancing the new state budget "cannot be done without some pain."

But Jones did not retreat from plans to spend \$100 million on state parks, and he said Friday he might seek more before leaving office in 1995. He said top priority would be renovation of existing park buildings instead of new construction.

The state began a new fiscal year Thursday in the red, having delayed paying 454,000 state income tax refunds in order to balance the books for last year.

To catch up, the bureaucracy will be squeezed as much as possible, Jones said, but cuts in public services and state funding of schools cannot be ruled out.

Jones declined to estimate how deeply projected spending for the year would have to be cut, though he said Tuesday it could be as much as \$300 million.

"It cannot be done without some pain," Jones said in a taping of "Your Government," a public affairs program scheduled to air Sunday on WLEX-TV in Lexington.

"People need to understand that everything is on the table," Jones said. But state government "has gotten too fat," he said. "We will cut out all inefficiencies we can identify."

All governors vow to eliminate government waste, but Jones said his pledge was different. He pointed to his appointment of a commission to judge the quality and efficiency of state government and to his order last week to slash the state's fleet of vehicles.

"There's a whole bunch of waste, and we're going to cut that waste in whatever way it exists," Jones said. "When this administration is over, I'm going to show you how much is humanly possible to eliminate."

As for a \$100 million revamping of the park system, Jones said: "We must make that investment."

The General Assembly approved a \$100 million bond issue for parks. The legislature also would have to approve specific projects. Jones' campaign promises included at least one new park lodge — at Kincaid Lake in Pendleton County — but he said renovation of existing facilities must come first.

House Speaker Joe Clarke said he had "a lot of reservations" about going farther in debt with a bond issue, but "I don't disagree that our parks are in bad shape."

A legislative staff report earlier this year said \$300 million was needed for renovations and additions to restore the park system to its former glory. Jones said he agreed the \$100 million bond issue would not be enough, and he might seek a second bond issue before leaving office.

Jones also said: "Kentucky needs to ensure a minimal loss of gaming dollars to riverboat casinos in neighboring states. The casinos figure to cut into pari-mutuel wagering at race tracks, and Jones last week said allowing tracks to operate their own casinos should be considered."

He personally was against a

Two face Tennessee burglary charges

Two Calloway County men were arrested Thursday night after a sheriff's deputy pulled their vehicle over for suspected drunk driving and were later charged in connection with a Henry County, Tenn. burglary.

According to reports from the Henry County Sheriff's Department and the Calloway County Sheriff's Department, Robert G.

Webb and Ralph W. Worley, Sr. were charged with aggravated burglary in Tennessee and receiving stolen property over \$100 in Calloway County.

The arrest resulted after Calloway deputy Greg Williams responded to a call from Puryear police officer Greg Underwood who said a possible drunk driver was traveling north towards Hazel on U.S. 641.

When Williams pulled the vehicle over at approximately 6:45

p.m., he noticed several suspicious items in the back of the van.

The driver, Worley, 44, who was released from the Henry County Jail Tuesday, was charged with driving under the influence, driving on a suspended license, no insurance and disorderly conduct.

The passenger, Webb, 42, was charged with alcohol intoxication.

Father, child drown in boating mishap

A father and his 3-year-old child both drowned near Bryd Bay on Kentucky Lake at approximately 1:45 p.m. Friday.

Details were still sketchy at 6 a.m. Saturday, however, initial reports from the Murray-Calloway County Disaster Emergency Services indicate the drownings occurred after the child fell off the boat and the father jumped in to save the child.

After the child, who had already died, was recovered and put back in the boat, the father apparently drowned, DES chief Kenny Reynolds said.

During the incident, the boat apparently began to drift away

England said the memorial

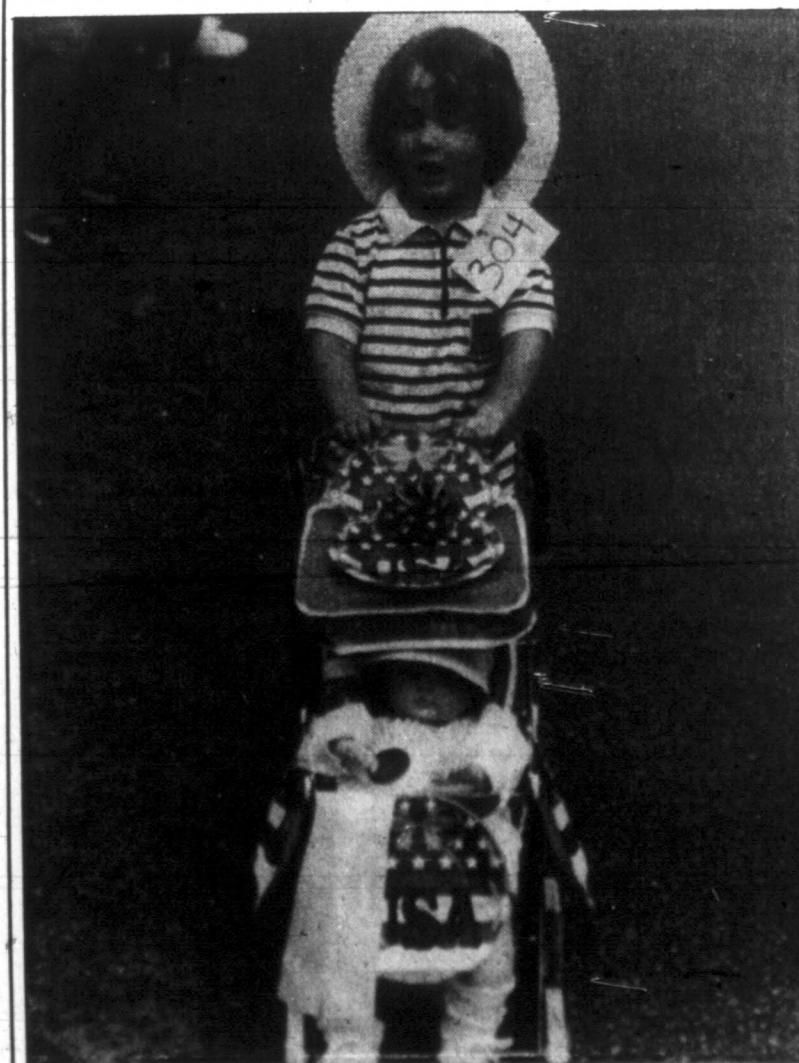

Sheik surrenders to Feds

NEW YORK (AP) — Amid fears of violence by his radical Muslim followers, authorities issued an alert to Americans traveling abroad as U.S. immigration officials took Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman into custody.

The blind Egyptian cleric, some of whose followers are accused in the World Trade Center bombing and a foiled plot to bomb buildings and tunnels in Manhattan, surrendered Friday after a 20-hour standoff.

In Egypt, Abdel-Rahman's followers had threatened to initiate a bombing campaign if the spiritual leader was taken into custody.

In Washington, the State Department issued a warning of possible adverse reaction in the Islamic world to the sheik's detention, said spokesman Mike McCurry.

Walking through a gauntlet of followers chanting "God is Great!" Abdel-Rahman left a Brooklyn mosque on Friday evening and turned himself over to federal authorities.

As Abdel-Rahman surrendered, a group of Hasidic Jews standing behind police barricades shouted "Go to Hell!" and "Drop dead!" The blind cleric, surrounded by aides, walked slowly

across the street and into an immigration service command post.

Escorted by a law enforcement caravan, the sheik arrived about 9:30 p.m. at a federal prison in Otisville, N.Y., about 75 miles northwest of New York City, said a spokesman for the facility, Rex Sproul.

Earlier Friday, the sheik gave a "kind of goodbye speech" to several hundred supporters in which he counseled against violence and proclaimed his innocence, according to a Saudi journalist who observed the half-hour sermon at the Abu Bakr mosque.

White House staffers reprimanded

WASHINGTON (AP) — The reprimand of four White House staff members in the firing of civil servants in the travel office does not go far enough to suit Senate Republican leader Bob

Dole. He wants an independent counsel to investigate.

And Attorney General Janet Reno has suggested that, in the future, the White House should consult with the Justice Department before disclosing any FBI investigation.

Dole, of Kansas, said there is "more reason than ever to get ... an independent counsel, which can be done by the attorney general."

"Somebody ought to be more than just reprimanded," he added.

The White House acknowledged Friday that there was a lapse of judgment and sensitivity in the May 19 firing of seven travel office employees and in efforts to have the FBI investigate them.

An internal report concluded that the matter had been badly handled by the White House, even though the report also maintained the travel unit had engaged in "seriously deficient" bookkeeping.

The travel office arranges press charters for reporters who cover the White House and bills news organizations for the trips. It also arranges commercial travel for White House workers.

"We did the right thing, but we clearly did it in the wrong way," said White House chief of staff Mack McLarty.

He announced that five of the seven dismissed travel office workers would be offered new jobs in the government and apologized to them and their families for the manner in which they had been dismissed.

John Dreyfeller, one of the suspended travel office workers to be offered a new job, said, "Obviously, I feel good" about the development. "I don't have much more comment right now. I'll just have to wait and see what happens."

Four Clinton staff members were publicly reprimanded by McLarty. None was fired.

McLarty asked Reno to review both the White House report and an internal FBI report on the matter to see if there were any discrepancies.

In a letter sent to the White House late Friday, Reno said there were no differences of any substance.

But Reno's letter also reflected some apparent irritation that the White House had announced at the time of the firings that the FBI was looking into the travel office books without first consulting the Justice Department, parent agency of the FBI.

She said Justice should have been consulted first "because this department will always be responsible for the eventual prosecution which may result from an investigation."

from the father, who was still in the water. His wife, who was still in the boat, could not get the motor started and her husband apparently drowned as well, Reynolds said.

Names of the victims and a description of the boat were not available at press time.

Reynolds said DES units searched the lake until 11 p.m. Friday and the searches resumed Saturday morning.

Volunteers from the Henry County Rescue Squad, Dover-Stewart County Rescue Squad and the Calloway County Fire-Rescue are also searching for the man.

had wondered the same thing since Ferri moved in about a year ago.

"He wasn't the type that could go out there and get the business. He didn't strike me as a salesman. ... He just sat up there alone 90 percent of the time. Sometimes I would come in on a Sunday and I would see him sitting there," said Mrs. Torabi.

State records show Ferri had tax problems. The California Franchise Tax Board filed a lien against Ferri on May 19 in Marin County for \$3,060 for nonpayment of his 1990 personal income taxes, records show.

Two Ferri firms also were suspended for failure to file 1988 corporate tax returns. General Financial Services of Larkspur was suspended Oct. 2, 1989, and GEF Financial Corp. of San

Rafael was suspended Aug. 1, 1990. Neither firm has filed any corporate returns with the state since then.

Suspension means the firms cannot legally do business in California.

Ed Torabi, a computer programmer, said Ferri had once asked to be shown the ropes of acquiring proper mortgage forms. Torabi said the only unusual thing about Ferri was that sometimes when he talked excitedly he would sweat profusely.

Several accounts of a hot temper emerged in interviews.

Ms. Schulman recalled an argument between Ferri and a co-owner of her office.

"He was trying to tell us how to run a corporation and he didn't know A to Z," she said.

Another scene was described

by a woman who in 1992 worked in a Las Vegas, Nev., office complex where Ferri ran Cypress Holdings and was involved in hazy and ultimately unsuccessful plans for a real estate venture.

The woman, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Ferri once became irate when a receptionist refused to give him a magazine she was reading. He went to the office manager to demand her firing.

"He'd get upset about little things."

Ferri was not ill-tempered to everyone, though.

"He was really a sweet kind of melancholy guy," said Diane Andrews, who cut Ferri's hair regularly for about a year in Woodland Hills.

Supreme Court. But Jones said he would appoint the best nominee — man or woman — to replace former Justice Dan Jack Combs in the state's easternmost court district.

A nominating commission is to submit names to Jones for interim appointment. "I would hope we have more than one woman on

that list," he said.

Jones was noncommittal when asked specifically about a political ally — Sara Walter Combs, widow of former Gov. Bert Combs.

"I think she's very qualified," Jones said. "Is she the only person qualified for that job? Certainly not."

Four killed in tank explosion

DIXON, Ky. (AP) — A gathering of friends at a popular meeting spot turned tragic when a oil tank exploded, killing four and injuring five others, police said.

The nine were "partying" around the 210-barrel crude oil tank on private property near Dixon when the tank exploded about 8 p.m. Friday, said Jimmy Oakley, assistant fire chief in nearby Providence.

The cause of the explosion was not immediately known, but fireworks or cigarette smoking was suspected, said Steve Nall, the state Division of Disaster and Emergency Services director in Webster County.

The spot is just off a gravel road tucked inside a wheat field and was a popular spot for young people in the county to gather, Nall said.

Police early today declined to say whether alcohol was found at the scene.

The blast almost leveled the 20-foot high tank and shook homes two miles away.

"You could see the smoke for miles. (Flames) shot several

hundred feet up in the air," said Nall.

Dixon is located in western Kentucky near the Ohio River, about 130 miles southwest of Louisville.

Four of the injured were taken to the Regional Medical Center in Madisonville, where stunned relatives huddled inside the lobby early today awaiting word.

Marian Frederick had been able to talk to her grandson, Terry Melton, a junior at Webster County High School.

"He told us he just had this feeling and he said he told his girlfriend, Melissa, 'Let's get away from there' and they walked away from the tank. A few seconds later in blew up and his clothes caught on fire, but he dropped to the ground and rolled," said Mrs. Frederick.

Melton was listed in good condition early today. The condition of his girlfriend and her last name could not be determined early today.

Another victim, 17-year-old Michael Ashcraft of Slaughter, suffered severe burns but man-

aged to drive to a farmhouse to summon help, said his father, Jerry Ashcraft.

"They told us he'd be OK. So I guess we were fortunate," said the elder Ashcraft.

Michael Ashcraft was in the intensive care unit of the hospital early today.

Hospital spokeswoman Alyssa Leasure said no information would be released on the other victims early today.

Another victim was flown to Wellborn Baptist Hospital in Evansville, Ind. and transferred to the Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, Tenn.

Doug Williams, a spokesman for the medical center, said the victim was in the hospital's burn unit in critical condition early today. He said the victim's name was not being released.

The names of the dead had not been released early today.

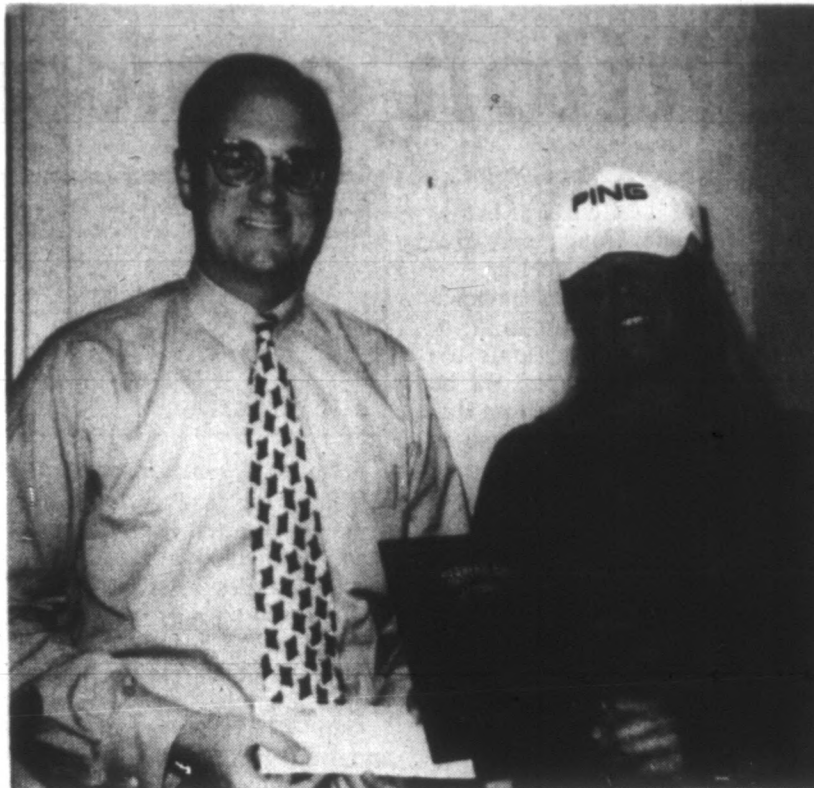
Dodds promoted at Westvaco Corp.

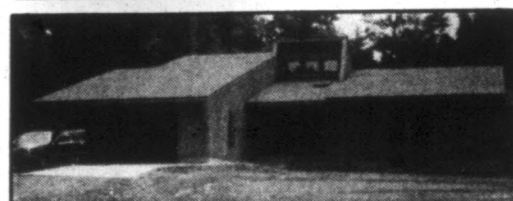

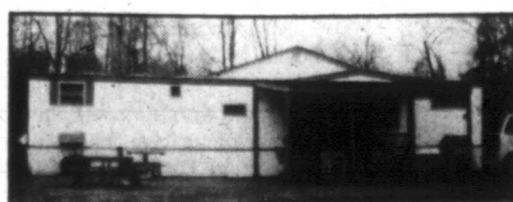

Children have the right to challenging, safe, nurturing growth.
Effort is the most important part of success.
Teamwork requires trust.
Learning is a life-long process.
Through vision, people have the capacity to create their own futures.

Excellence is the standard for which we are held accountable.
These are not arcane, socialistic formulae for subverting our young. These are the same simple, workable beliefs that we try to raise our children by every day. That's what KERA is all about. Let's get behind it and make it work!

Shiloh evokes eerie feeling

Nothing has changed. The surroundings of the Civil War battlefield at Shiloh, Tenn., still give me that same eerie feeling.

If I were inclined to embrace the theory of reincarnation or transmigration of the soul, the answer would be simple. I'd be convinced that I had been on that famous site at an earlier time in another body.

But that doesn't work for me. So I can't explain — except to interpret it as perhaps an extension of my longtime fascination with a conflict I consider one of mankind's saddest moments.

Even that notion, however, has a glaring gap. Nowhere else have I ever had a comparable feeling. Not at Chickamauga, Fort Donelson, Fort Henry nor Perryville. Only at Shiloh.

At my suggestion, that became one of the stops on the vacation my family took last week. It was either my third or fourth visit to the sprawling national military park between Savannah, Tenn., and Corinth, Miss.

My wife Margot, our 11-year-old son Kent and I spent most of a day there. It was hot, unlike the wet springtime weather of Sunday and Monday, April 6-7, 1862, when Union and Confederate forces clashed in one of the bloodiest battles of the bitter four-year struggle that claimed more American lives than any other war in history.

Gen. Ulysses S. Grant had been ordered to move down the Tennessee River with some 42,000 Union troops to Pittsburg Landing after a smashing victory at Fort Donelson. He was to link up there with an army led by Gen. Don Carlos Buell coming down from Nashville.

From that vantage point, the combined forces were to be in a strategic position to strike the enemy railroad center at Corinth, some 22 miles to the south. As Grant's raw recruits waited, they camped in the heavy woods and rolling fields in the vicinity of Shiloh Church.

Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston, commander of Confederate forces in the western theater, originally planned to attack Grant on April 4. Informed of the movement of Buell's army, his strategy was to strike before it reached Pittsburg Landing.

Unforeseen difficulties, however, including heavy rains, ineffective communication, confusion over the best roads to move troops from Corinth to Pittsburg Landing and the poor condition of narrow backwoods wagon trails, necessitated a 48-hour postponement.

And that delay likely changed the outcome of the battle.

As troops finally deployed within two miles of Shiloh Church by late afternoon April 5, Gen. P.G.T. Beauregard, Johnston's second in command, and other Confederate leaders were urging withdrawal. They argued that the noise of inexperienced troops and the delays had alerted the enemy and negated the element of surprise.

Johnston, however, was adamant. He ordered the attack at daybreak and said he would "fight them if they were a million."

As I read of the mood in the Confederate camp on the evening before the offensive, a memorable scene in "Gone with the Wind" came to mind. The young men and boys greeted the news of war with shouts of enthusiasm and visions of a grand adventure.

But they had never been to war. Nor had most of the soldiers from both North and South poised to do battle at Shiloh. They would learn a lesson in brutal reality over the next two days. For too many, it was a final lesson.

The assault at dawn did surprise the Union camps, and the Johnny Rebs overran one position after another — until about midday. At that point the Federals dug in along a half-mile stretch of a sunken road worn down by years of wagon use.

From the edge of heavy woods they made a valiant stand, many from behind a split-rail fence. They repulsed wave after wave of Confederate troops screaming the high-pitched Rebel yell.

Dead in gray literally covered the ground to their front amid the din and the smoke and the smell of gunpowder. It was a scene of death and destruction made somewhat incongruous by a peach orchard in full bloom.

Southern survivors later described the fierce fighting as like facing a swarm of hornets — and that Federal line of defense became known as "the Hornets' Nest."

Eventually, supported by heavy artillery fire, the determined Confederate infantry assault was successful. But the victory took more than five hours to achieve.

Meanwhile, Johnston had been killed, and Beauregard assumed the Confederate command. That transition in leadership and the gallant defense of the sunken road bought Grant enough time to set up a new defense line.

Supported by more than 50 guns firing from the heights around Pittsburg Landing, his troops held off the final enemy thrust as Buell's men began arriving and night closed in.

By morning, 15,000 fresh troops led by Buell had swelled the Federal armies to 55,000 men — and the tide of battle changed. Soon the Confederates were forced to retreat to Corinth.

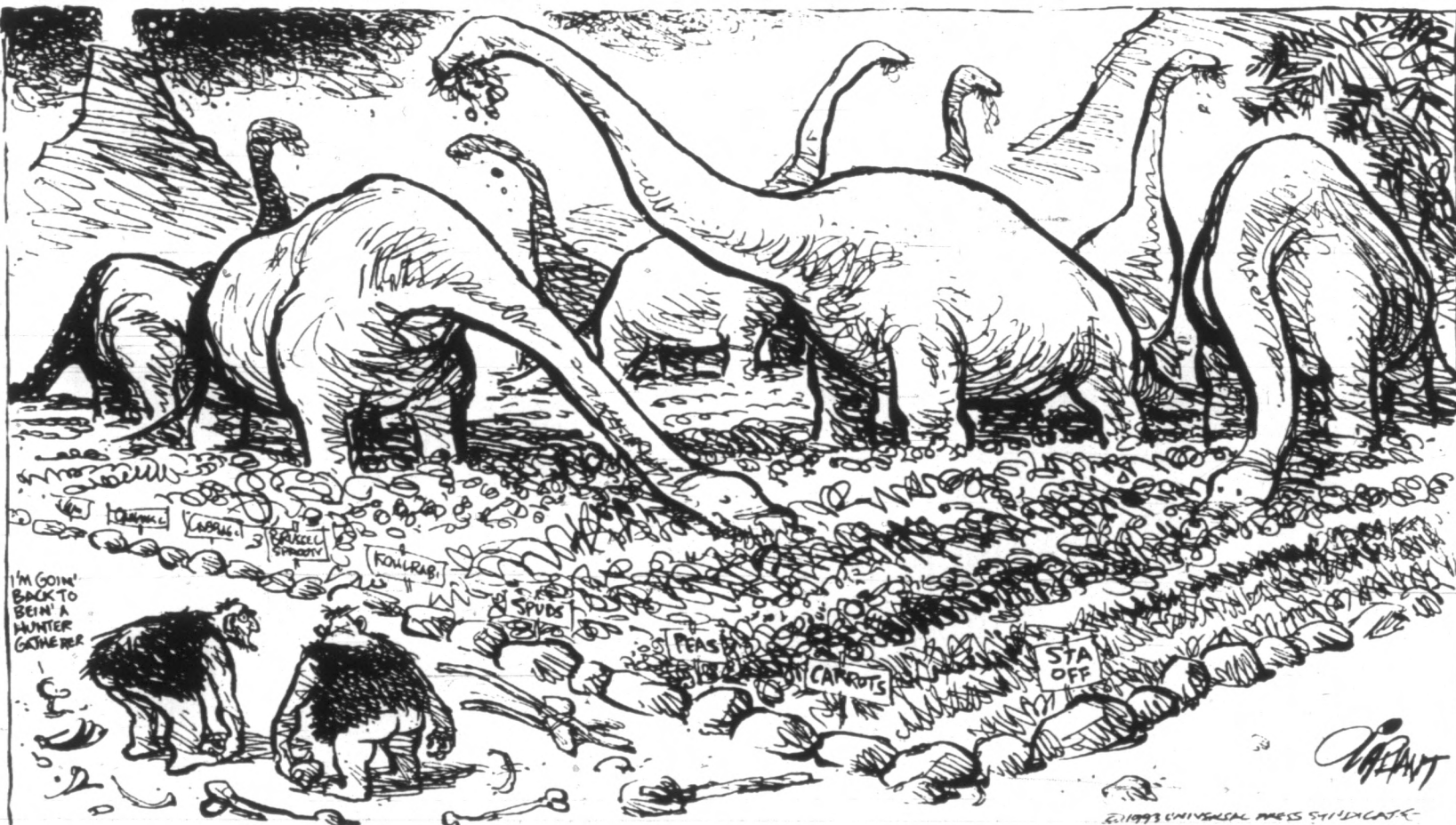
The price? About 13,000 Union casualties and almost 11,000 Confederate casualties.

A drive through mottled shadows cast by towering oaks winds through the park past most of the major sites. We stopped often to read markers and to listen for echoes from the past.

"Bloody Pond," the final tour stop, is not much bigger now than most golf greens around Murray. But my deepest meditation was there at its edge.

Soldiers in both blue and gray lay there side by side to drink and bathe their wounds in water that turned crimson as their lives ebbed away.

Some grand adventure.

Purchasing videos for one's personal permanent collection is also a booming business, almost as big as rentals. If you are lucky enough to have gotten on anyone's computerized mailing list, you surely are aware of the large number of video catalogs coming your way. One has to join Book of the Month to get a book catalog, or go to the store to get a Sears catalog that used to come automatically, but this hasn't eased the postman's burden or reduced our bathroom reading material. There are plenty of video catalogs to fill the void.

Most of them offer an inventory of several hundred films, usually available for about \$19.95 each, somewhere between the price of a good paperback and hardback book. Some classics and recent releases cost more. Educational documentaries and Shakespearean dramas especially cost more than entertainment videos, probably because the demand is lower.

The amount of money being spent for video purchases and rentals is, to use our daughter's favorite word, "awesome." In some homes the bookshelves in the dens contain nothing but videotapes.

And so far I've only been describing the pretaped videos.

There are actually people out there who know how to use their VCRs to record their own tapes off of television channels.

Such knowledge is too great for me to comprehend. I suspect them of having secretly acquired Ph.D. degrees in engineering or of having Japanese genes.

The recorders too, like the renters and purchasers, are growing in number. Stand by the check-out register of any discount store any Saturday. Blank videotapes outsell camera film and Crayolas.

Not a few people now have video cameras of their own. At a recent family reunion a major dilemma arose when no one was available to pose because everyone was shoot-

ing footage. The videos of that event were of relatives' left eyes peeking out from behind their hand-held cameras.

All of this is ominous. We may be building up for a big fall. The technology changes rapidly. The early debates about whether to buy Beta or VHS machines were only preliminary skirmishes in a world war for our wallets and minds.

Despite their popularity, videotapes and players will probably be extinct 10 years from now.

Look at what happened in audio. We went from Victorias and gramophones to 78 rpm disks to 45 rpm disks to 33-1/3 rpm disks to audio-cassette tapes and now to laser disks.

Once video laser technology catches hold, we will have to replace all of those videotape players, recorders, tapes, and cameras. If you play the stockmarket, count on this. You read it here.

And from there it will be only a short step to the world of technological "Virtual Reality" in which the viewer is submerged and immersed in the action itself, replacing the outside world with fantasy.

Each of us will become his or her own Disneyworld or Six Flags park. But, enough of this. It hasn't happened yet. Right now, it's time to get back to that rerun of *Apocalypse Now*.

MSU libraries featured in company publication

The Murray State University library system is featured in the current issue of "Dynix Dataline" magazine published quarterly by Dynix, Inc. of Utah.

Dynix designs on-line computer systems for libraries, giving them the capability of cataloging all holdings in a computer-based file.

MSU was Dynix's 1000th client. The university is featured in a two-page article in "Dynix Dataline."

The MSU Libraries consist of the Harry Lee Waterfield Library, which contains the general collection; the Forrest C. Pogue Library, which houses special collections and the university archives; and the Legal Resources Library. MSU's collections total approximately 850,000 resource materials, including nearly 500,000 bound volumes. The Waterfield Library building was completed in 1978. The Pogue Library, which served as the university library for nearly 50 years, was renovated in 1980.

MSU libraries are staffed by 12 full-time professional librarians and 27 staff members.

Kentucky's tax system examined for fairness

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Everybody has a favorite tax to hate.

For many, it is the levy on property. For some, the inheritance tax is particularly burdensome. Others say the income tax on private pensions is most unfair. Some others say selected state taxes aren't just unfair, they're detrimental to the whole state.

Then again, for many people, the problem is not a particular tax, it is taxes in particular.

"Nobody wants to pay any of it themselves," said House Speaker Joe Clarke, D-Danville, who spent 20 years as chairman of the House budget committee. Often, the unhappiness ends up in court.

People who get federal government pensions won one suit that they had to pay income taxes while state and local government retirees did not. Now private pensioners want the same treatment.

A string of court rulings have overturned special property tax treatment for some businesses.

Bruce Lunsford, a Louisville businessman and secretary of the Commerce Department in the John Y. Brown administration, said Kentucky hurts itself with its tax system. "There are three taxes that don't make any sense," Lunsford said.

Lunsford said the tax on intangible personal property such as stocks and bonds, the inheritance tax and the lack of a capital gains tax break all work against entrepreneurs. Lunsford said taxing those people drives people away

from the state to live and start businesses. And those kinds of people are the ones who contribute most to communities.

Robert Thieman, chairman of the state and local tax committee of the Kentucky Society of Certified Public Accountants, notes some improvements among what he considers Kentucky's problem taxes.

Thieman said better assessments have improved the fairness of property taxes. He endorsed the theory of the intangible property taxes, but said it is poorly administered and might better be replaced with an increase in income tax for those above \$50,000.

Clarke said the inheritance tax has always appealed to him, "because it wasn't on something the guy made himself."

Often the complaints about taxes can be traced to the method of collection. The 6-cent sales tax seems relatively painless to most people until they pay a big chunk on a big purchase like a new car. But property tax bills come in one chunk, often just before the holidays at the end of the year.

A lot of the tax problem is "how it's extracted," Clarke said.

Ray Kring, a retired veteran policy analyst with the Revenue Cabinet, said Kentucky has done a good job of ensuring that its tax system hits everybody, and in good relation to how much they make.

"It just seems to me we've done a pretty darn good job over the years of getting to a good tax system," Kring said.

Assume you're West, defending

against three notrump, and that you

see only dummy's hand and your

own. Declarer wins your spade lead

with the king, East playing the deuce,

and returns a club, which you win

with the king. What would you play

now?

Actually, there's only one right

play — the ten of diamonds! If you

lead it, South goes down; if you don't,

South makes the contract.

If declarer goes up with the ace, you score three diamond tricks and the A-K of clubs. If declarer covers the ten with the jack, East wins with the king and returns the seven, enabling you to force out the ace. If declarer ducks the ten, so does East, and a low diamond continuation establishes the two additional diamond tricks you need to set the contract.

Note that if you lead the six of diamonds at trick three, South plays low from dummy and makes four notrump.

How can you be expected to know that leading the ten of diamonds is the right play? Well, look at it this way. After studying dummy, you can count eight tricks for declarer — three spades, a diamond and four clubs — and, considering the bidding, he is sure to have a ninth trick somewhere in his hand — if you simply stand pat.

If you make the "safe" lead of the ten of spades, you will unintentionally, but surely, hand South the contract! You must attack to succeed, and declarer's only possible soft spot is diamonds. You therefore exploit this possibility, hoping to find partner with the king, while at the same time being careful to lead the ten in case South has the nine.

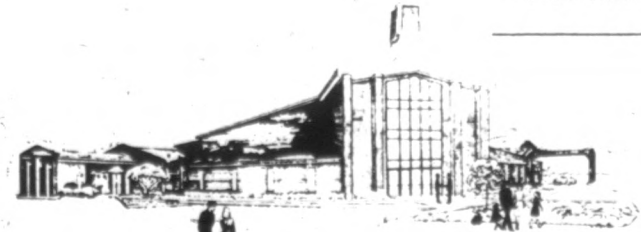

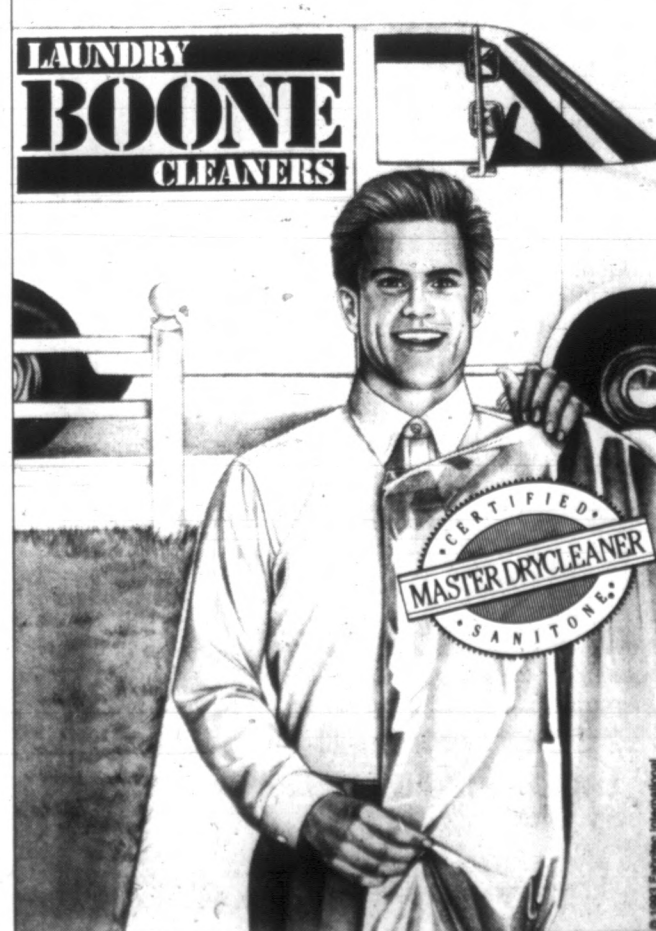

Astros end Magrane run with 7-1 win in Astrodome

HOUSTON (AP) — Things finally fell apart for Joe Magrane.

Magrane (7-7) held Houston hitless until the fourth, when the Astros scored five runs on four hits. Magrane, who had a five-game winning streak snapped, gave up five runs on four hits in four innings.

"Magrane was making it look easy on us early," manager Art Howe said. "But then we put the big inning together."

The big hit was Scott Servais' three-run homer.

Mark Portugal (6-3) was the winner, giving up one run and eight hits while striking out eight in seven innings.

Craig Biggio opened the fourth with a walk and moved to second on a single by Luis Gonzalez. Jeff Bagwell drove in Biggio with a single and Gonzalez scored from third when Ken Caminiti's grounder forced Bagwell at second.

Servais hit his eighth home run of the season after a walk to Eric Anthony.

"I had a decent breaking ball and it was sinking well," Magrane said. "I had a walk to start off the inning, but I was thinking that a double-play ball would get us out of it. The way I've been throwing and the way I've been holding runners, I was confident. I was in a situation where I thought I made the big pitch. I made a bad pitch to Servais — I got a changeup up. I didn't execute."

It was only the Cardinals' second loss in their last nine games.

Said Servais, "I didn't really hit it that well, but I hit it in the right spot. I was expecting a fastball and it was a changeup, but I've been having pretty good extension on my swing and I got enough of the bat on it."

The Astros made it 6-0 in the fifth when Bagwell walked, moved to third on a single by Caminiti and scored on a fielding error by center fielder Brian Jordan.

St. Louis cut it to 6-1 in the sixth on an RBI double by Jordan scoring Gregg Jefferies, who had singled to extend his hitting streak to 15 games.

Houston added a run in the seventh on a sacrifice fly by Bagwell.

Notes: The Cardinals were 20-7 in June, their best June record since 1968 when they were 22-9.

American men dominate Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — One men's finalist nearly skipped Wimbledon with a bad shoulder. The other nearly got booted out.

Nevertheless, Pete Sampras and Jim Courier outlasted everyone else, setting up an all-American final Sunday on the Fourth of July. Also at stake will be the No. 1 ranking, which Courier can reclaim with a victory.

Steffi Graf faced Jana Novotna today in the women's final. Graf was aiming for her fifth title,

while Novotna was playing in her first Wimbledon final.

Although they are the world's top-ranked players, neither Sampras nor Courier was expected to get this far. The top-seeded Sampras was suffering from an inflamed tendon in his right shoulder and considered withdrawing on the eve of the tournament.

"The Wednesday and Thursday before this event started I really had my doubts about playing here, but I kind of sucked it up and got four or five hours of treatment to give myself the best chance to play here," Sampras said after his 7-6 (7-5), 6-4, 6-4

semifinal win Friday over Boris Becker.

The shoulder acted up at times in earlier matches, but Sampras showed no effects of the injury against Becker. He hit 12 aces and served at an average speed of 113 mph.

"I didn't feel any pain out there today," Sampras said. "I know now I'm going to be fine for Sunday. As things turned out, it's been feeling pretty strong for the most part."

Courier, the No. 3 seed who beat Stefan Edberg 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4 in the semifinals, was fortunate to be playing the second week.

During his third-round match last Saturday against Jason Stoltenberg, chair umpire Jeremy Shales was ready to default Courier for what he considered abusive language. Only the intervention of tournament referee Alan Mills kept Courier from being kicked out.

"The umpire thought I said something directed at him, which I didn't, and he reacted to default me, which was to say the least, I think, an overreaction," Courier said. "Luckily Alan came out on the court and straightened things out."

Courier swore out loud after an error during Friday's match. He

wasn't warned by the umpire, but he got into a heated exchange later with a British reporter who suggested his parents would be ashamed at his language.

"Keep your mouth shut, all right?" Courier said when the journalist persisted.

Now, for the first time since John McEnroe beat Jimmy Connors for the title in 1984, two Americans will play in the final.

Sampras won the U.S. Open in 1990, while Courier has won the French Open and Australian Open twice each. Both men said they would treasure a Wimbledon title.

Philadelphia, Padres play all night twin bill

The fans at Philadelphia and Cincinnati certainly got their money's worth.

By the time the Phillies and San Diego Padres completed their doubleheader at Veterans Stadium on Saturday morning, it was 4:40 a.m. EDT.

The first game was delayed nearly six hours by rain and didn't end until 1:03 a.m. with the Padres winning 5-2. Philadelphia gained a split by taking the second game 6-5 in 10 innings before a few faithful fans.

The opener was held up a total of 5 hours and 54 minutes by three delays. The longest previous rain delay in Phillies history totalled five hours, June 9, 1980, against San Francisco. That game was completed at 3:11 a.m. EDT.

"We treated it just like any other game," umpire Dana DeMuth said. "Our job is to get the game, in. That's what we did."

The announced attendance was 54,617, but less than a thousand fans were left in the stands by the

start of the second game.

Fred McGriff hit a two-run homer for the Padres to help give reliever Mark Eitles his first major-league victory. Terry Mulholland (9-6) took the loss.

In the second game, Mitch Williams (2-3) singled off Trevor Hoffman (2-3) to drive in Pete Incaviglia with the winning run.

Meanwhile, the doubleheader in Cincinnati didn't end until after 1 a.m. EDT as the Pirates and Reds split.

homered for the Twins. Winfield's hit was his 2,927th and tied him with Al Simmons for 25th place on the career list. Harper's ninth-inning heroics finished a wild game that took 3 hours, 36 minutes. It featured 28 hits and a seven-run inning by Milwaukee.

"We've played some funny games with the Brewers over the years," Harper said. "There's always lots of hitting and runs. We have very similar teams. We both like to swing the bats."

Milwaukee's Tom Brunansky didn't think anything about the game was funny.

"This game was ugly," Brunansky said. "Both teams were shaky and it seemed neither team wanted to win. It was tough to lose after scoring 10 runs and having that outburst in the sixth."

The Twins led 5-3 going into the sixth, trailed 10-5 coming out of it and then rallied with six runs in the final four innings. The victory was the Twins' fourth in 17 games; the loss was the Brewers' 10th in 13 games.

Kentucky, Barkley remain consistent

Conditions on Barkley and Kentucky lakes are pretty much the same but anglers report being able to catch fish on one lake but not the other. The shad minnows on Kentucky Lake seem to be a bit larger and this bears out the reports that the fish in Kentucky Lake spawned before the Barkley ones did.

I have found the bass very aggressive on both lakes nearly all day long but many of them were under legal size. It still makes for a good day when you have someone who isn't used to catching many fish of any kind. The soft plastics are working the best but a small spinnerbait or crankbait will produce for you. The water elevation has changed a bit since the Mississippi River is flooded but this should help us in some ways.

Going out at first light helps also but this coming weekend may be a little crowded all the time.

The water temperature is ranging from 79 - to 83-degrees on Kentucky Lake while Barkley is holding a steady 84.2-degrees. Most bays are clear especially where there is milfoil.

Milton Routh and I fished together last Tuesday after a little rain delay. We looked for white stripes for a while but didn't see any activity from the largers ones so it seemed like a good idea to switch to large-mouth and smallmouth.

We found mostly largemouth on the drops and they were willing to take a lizard. Milton did manage to connect with a decent smallmouth which was allowed to carry a lizard for 50 ayds before the hook was set.

I don't believe anyone has ever checked and rechecked so

many times before.

We caught a lot of fish and had a great time as always.

Several local and tourist anglers alike are coming into Fisherman's Headquarters in Draffenville and reporting catching big catfish and crappie while fishing the deep river channel. I'm sure Benson's Sporting Goods personnel are hearing the same thing whenever anyone comes in to restock their tackle supplies.

Many people who are visiting this area don't know all the good places to fish but there are so many they luck out and find one which holds fish.

Anyone can read a map and most can read a locator so put them together and "bingo!"

The bluegill and shellcrackers are really biting and we should have some more may-

flies hatching soon to help things along.

Audra and Clint Todd have been doing well without the flies however. Audra told me she has caught at least 35 so far by herself, plus one shellcracker and four smallmouth bass. Brother Clint also has a total of 35 but no bass yet. Sam Todd (dad) has a six-pound largemouth to his credit and evidently mom was along to supervise instead of fishing. (At least her total wasn't mentioned.)

All of the sunfish are fat and sassy so it looks like another good season for them.

Gary and Krista Crass caught some good sauger one afternoon using jigs. Krista said it was the first time she had fished that way and it was both productive and fun.

Fish and Wildlife stock plenty of rockfish fry

GILBERTSVILLE — Even through a pair of 7 X 35 binoculars the boat looked small, almost tiny, dwarfed as it was by Kentucky Lake dam. The big flat-bottom bobbed softly like a cork in the dark water, firmly anchored and stubbornly resisting the tug of the dangerous current.

Its three occupants appeared relaxed, apparently unconcerned that their boat was literally floating in the dam's shadow. They fished and talked and periodically reeled in their lines and checked their baits before awkwardly dumping their heavy tackle back into the churning water. Now and then a wave would slosh over the dam sending a gush of water streaming down the smooth concrete behind the boat.

About 200 yards downstream two fishermen were perched on the rock-lined bank throwing thick rods rigged with 20 pound line weighted with silver dollar-sized singers; weights that hit the water with a muffled "plunk." They then slowly pulled their lines taut and waited.

Each set of anglers — boaters and bank fishermen alike — were waiting for rockfish, also known as striped bass or stripers. The Tennessee River tailwaters below Kentucky Dam — along with the Cumberland River below Lake Barkley, the Ohio River, along with Lake Cumberland near Russell Springs, Ky. — receive annual stockings of rockfish fry from

the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The Ohio River and Tennessee and Cumberland tailwaters receive about 900,000 1½-inch fry per year. Lake Cumberland is stocked with approximately 250,000 fry annually. Natural reproduction does occur but it is effected by numerous factors — including water, levels and sedimentation — and is very difficult to track, especially considering the movement of rockfish.

Stripers are far ranging. For example, rockfish have been tracked moving from the Tennessee River tailwater to the lower Cumberland then back to below Kentucky Dam.

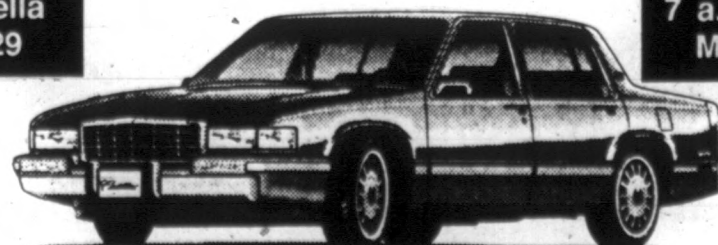

Actor Fred Gwynne dies

BALTIMORE (AP) — Fred Gwynne performed in plays by Shakespeare and Tennessee Williams and had acclaimed film roles. But when asked for his favorite character, he pointed to one millions of fans will remember best.

"I love old Herman Munster," he once said. "Much as I try not to, I can't stop liking that fellow."

Gwynne died Friday at his farm in Taneytown, 40 miles northwest of Baltimore, at the age of 66. He had suffered pancreatic cancer.

"Fred will be remembered for giving us all so many hours of laughter and enjoyment with his characterizations," said Joe Pesci, who played the smart-aleck Brooklyn lawyer to Gwynne's sly Southern judge in the movie "My Cousin Vinny."

The film's director, Jonathan Lynn, said he chose Gwynne because "there was nobody else

who could give it the same qualities of intelligence and impeccable timing, and weight and strength. It's very hard to find people with that amount of screen presence that are truly funny."

Frederick Hubbard Gwynne was born July 10, 1926, in New York City, the son of a stockbroker. He served in the Navy during World War II and graduated from Harvard in 1951.

Gwynne began his career with the Broadway production of "Mrs. McThing" with Miss Hayes in 1952 and went on to alternate among stage, screen and television for the next 40 years.

His two 1960s TV series each lasted just two seasons but have had a long life in reruns and in viewers' memories.

From 1961 to 1963, he played Officer Francis Muldoon in "Car 54, Where Are You," the straight man in a mismatched pair of New York City cops.

"He was fabulous, absolutely terrific," said Charlotte Rae, who

played the wife of Officer Leo Schnauser in "Car 54." "He had a wide range of talent and acting styles."

The following year, Gwynne took up the role of Herman Munster in "The Munsters," playing a comic Frankenstein's monster in the popular CBS series whose two-year run was almost simultaneous with ABC's "The Addams Family."

Gwynne also did voices for commercials, which he joked were "the sweetest, most generous thing that could happen to an aging actor." The onetime art school student also wrote and illustrated children's books such as "The Story of Ick," 1971; "A Little Pigeon Toad," 1988; and "Easy to See Why," coming out later this year.

Gwynne's film career began with a small role in "On the Waterfront," 1954. More recent roles include a mobster in "The Cotton Club," a thief in "Disorganized Crime," a co-worker of Michael Douglas in "Fatal Attraction" and a curmudgeon in "Pet Sematary."

He appeared in such plays as "Love's Labour's Lost," a revival of "Cat On a Hot Tin Roof," "A Texas Trilogy," "Our Town" and "Hamlet." He won an Obie, the off-Broadway equivalent of a Tony award, in 1979 for "Grand Magic."

He last appeared on Broadway in 1983's "Whodunnit."


Gwynne is survived by his wife, Deborah Gwynne, and four children. Private funeral services were planned.

Opening lead — king of spades.

This remarkable deal occurred in the 1964 national Open Pairs Championship. At one table the bidding went as shown (believe it or not), and South became declarer at seven notrump redoubled. Needless to say, West was not frightened in the slightest by North's redouble! He led a high spade and South missed his mark by seven tricks, going down 4,000 points!

This catastrophe was caused in part by West's interference bid of five spades over South's Blackwood four notrump bid. Apparently South interpreted his partner's six club response as showing two aces, and hoped they were in the minor suits, in which case seven hearts would be laydown.

South was right, but unfortunately North misread the situation and decided to shoot for a top score by bidding seven notrump. North couldn't bring himself to believe his partner would open a strong two bid with only one ace.

Incredibly, the same contract was reached at another table, but this time North was the declarer. The bidding went:

South West North East
2♥ 3♦ 4 NT Pass
6♥ Pass 7 NT Pass
Pass Dble Redble

Here North interpreted his partner's six heart bid as showing two aces and a void in an unspecified suit. (That is the treatment used by most players in this situation.)

Despite the misunderstanding, the North-South pair at this table fared much better. East thought his partner's double was conventional and forbade a spade lead, so he led the jack of clubs.

As a result, North made the grand slam and scored 2,930 points. This was 6,930 points better than the North-South pair at the previous table had scored!

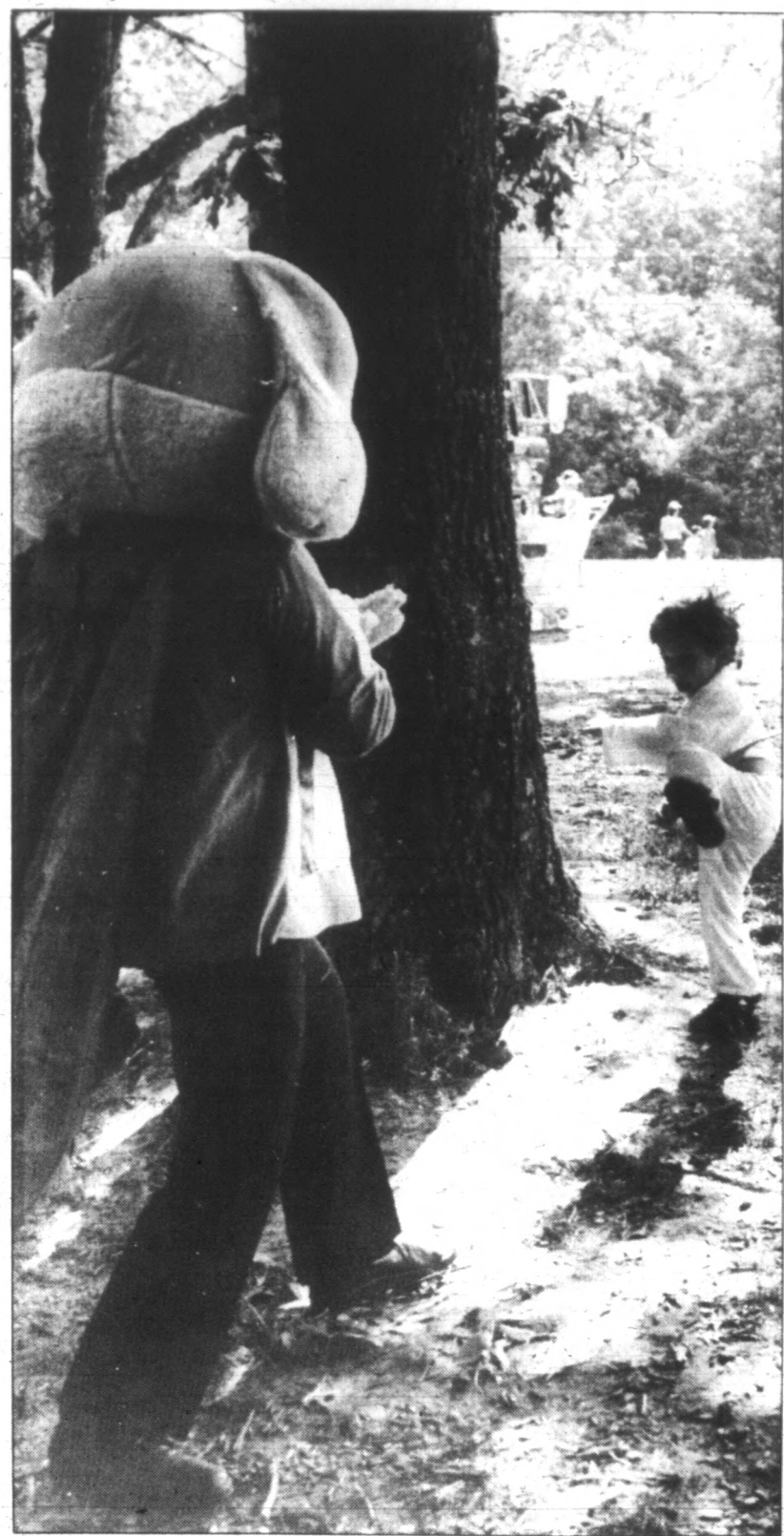

whether the attic has a powered fan to remove hot air, etc.

According to my air-conditioning expert, the very best way to operate air-conditioning equipment is to set it at the desired temperature and leave it there. This is the most convenient method — but also the most expensive.

The next best method is to turn on the cooling (or heating) about an hour before arriving home. (This can be done with a clock-timer.) In some cases, the differences in cost will be minimal.

Dr. Gott

DEAR DR. GOTT: My brother has relapsing polychondritis. Numerous doctors have indicated nothing can be done to help him. His arms are black and blue, he's losing weight and has no energy. Any suggestions?

DEAR READER: Relapsing polychondritis is a fascinating and unusual disease that is often associated with other autoimmune diseases (such as lupus and rheumatoid arthritis). It causes recurring episodes of inflamed connective tissue (the tissue that holds organs together) and cartilage.

The most common initial complaint is pain, redness and swelling of the ears, often in conjunction with arthritis. The cartilage in the nose may be affected as well. Other organs that are affected include the eye, the larynx, the trachea and bronchial tubes, the arteries, the kidneys and the skin.

During each attack of inflammation (which heals after a few weeks), more cartilage is destroyed, leading to "saddle nose," floppy ears and visual difficulties.

Even with treatment, patients eventually succumb to collapse of tracheal cartilage, aneurysms (swelling of arteries), heart-valve damage, or a diffuse and malignant form of arterial inflammation (vasculitis).

The pattern of repeated inflammation is characteristic; the diagnosis is confirmed by biopsy of affected tissue.

Mild cases are treated with aspirin and similar drugs. More severe disease requires the use of cortisone medicine or therapy, such as cyclophosphamide, to suppress the immune system. Unfortunately, there is no treatment to prevent the fatal consequences of relapsing polychondritis; 30 percent of patients die within five years.

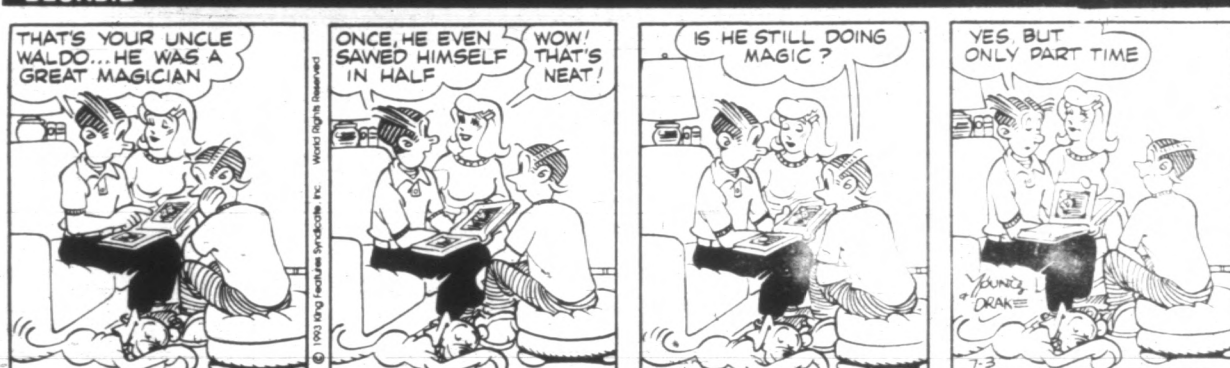
DEAR DR. GOTT: Here is a simple solution for people who suffer rectal spasms. Fold a thin bath towel. Run hot faucet water over the towel until very hot. Wring it out and sit on the towel tucked against the rectum and up the lower back. If the spasm is caught in the early stages, it can be controlled in a very few minutes.

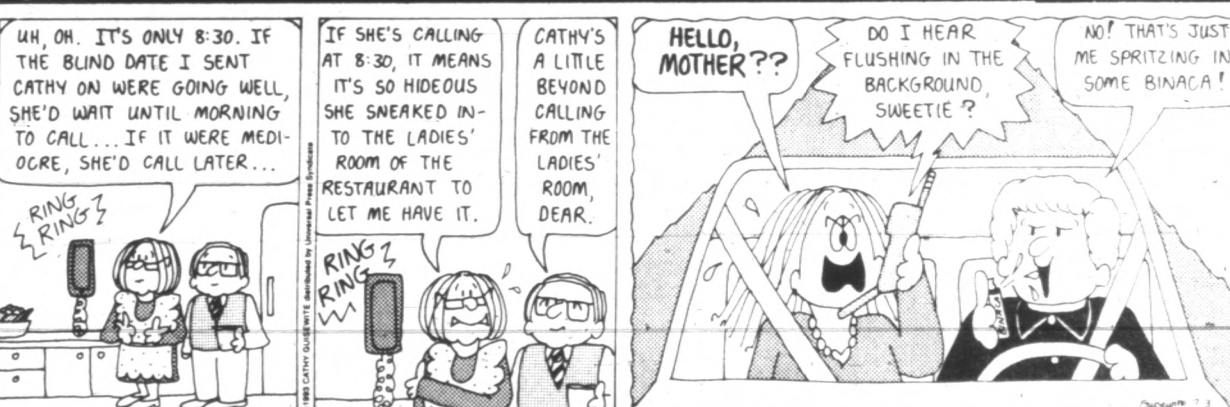

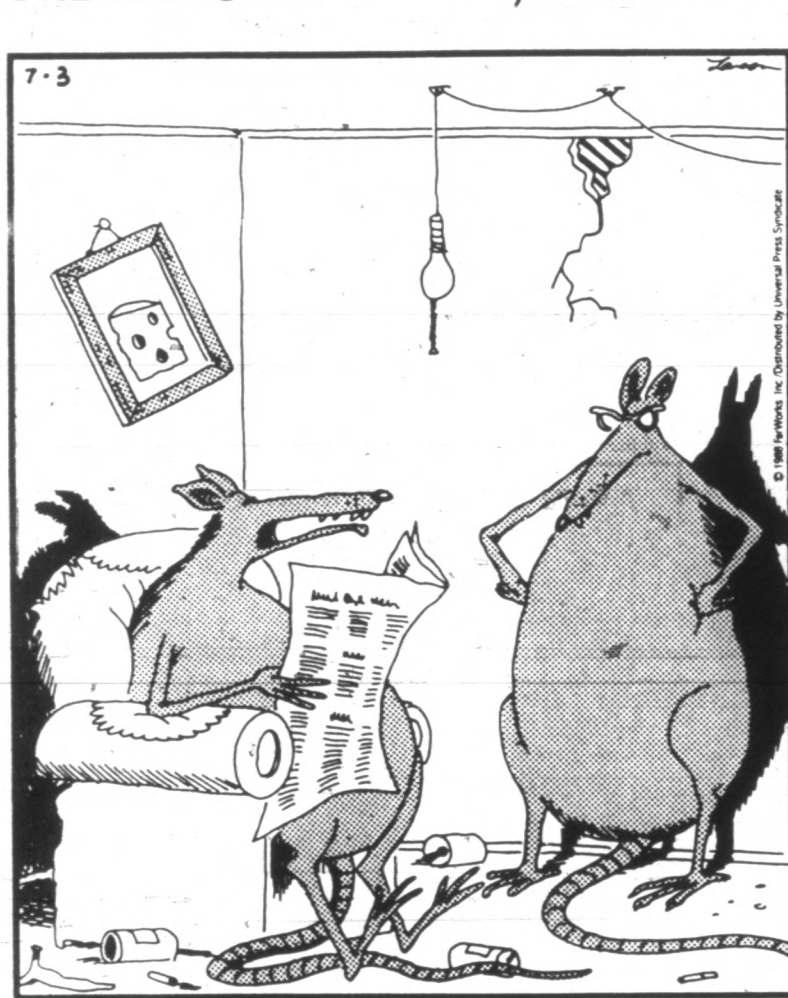

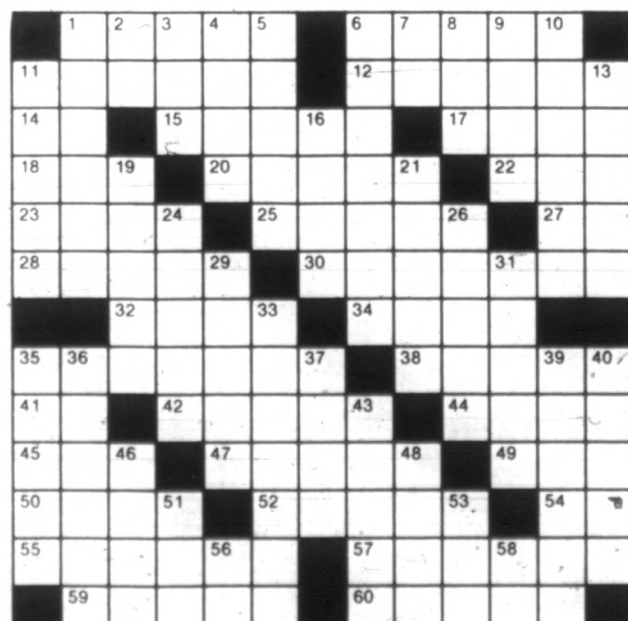

Dr. Gott

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 15-year-old female and have never had any serious health problems, nor have I suffered any injuries. My problem is that my fingers tremble, especially when I hold them still. What could the cause be?

DEAR READER: To a degree, my answer depends on how long you've had the tremor.

If it has been present for several years, you may have benign essential tremor, a harmless tremulousness that is inherited and needs no treatment. It is worsened by stress and emotional upset.

On the other hand, if the trembling is new, you should be checked by your family physician, because some diseases may begin with a tremor. For example, hyperthyroidism, an overproduction of thyroid hormone, causes nervousness and a tremor; this disorder is diagnosed with blood tests and treated with medication.

Also, tremors are sometimes related to anxiety. Could your symptoms be caused by stress? Adolescence is a time when stresses may be especially acute and can cause shakiness. Your doctor can sort this out.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm suspicious that I might have a muscle disorder because whenever I do anything that causes a little extra strain, my muscles get sore and limp. Could arthritis or rheumatism affect my muscles this way? I'm under 40, so age shouldn't be a factor.

DEAR READER: Many healthy people experience muscular soreness when they overexert. I am more concerned about the limpness. This could indicate a potentially serious disorder, such as myasthenia gravis, a disease marked by periodic muscular weakness.

You should see a doctor. After examining you and obtaining blood tests, he can identify the cause of your problem, which may be simple fatigue but could also be anemia, muscle inflammation, hyperthyroidism, or a host of other diseases for which you need to be tested.

I don't believe that you have arthritis or rheumatism because these disorders always cause pain and stiffness. See your doctor.

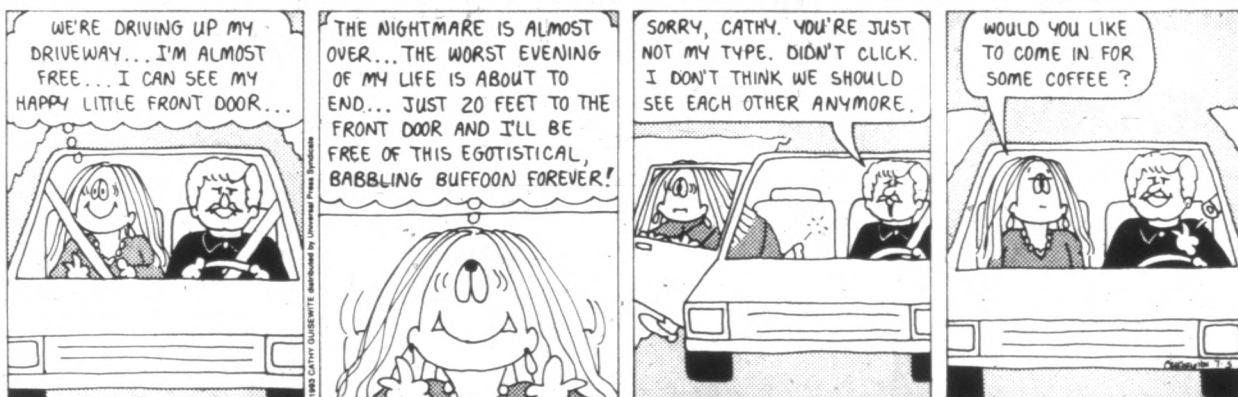

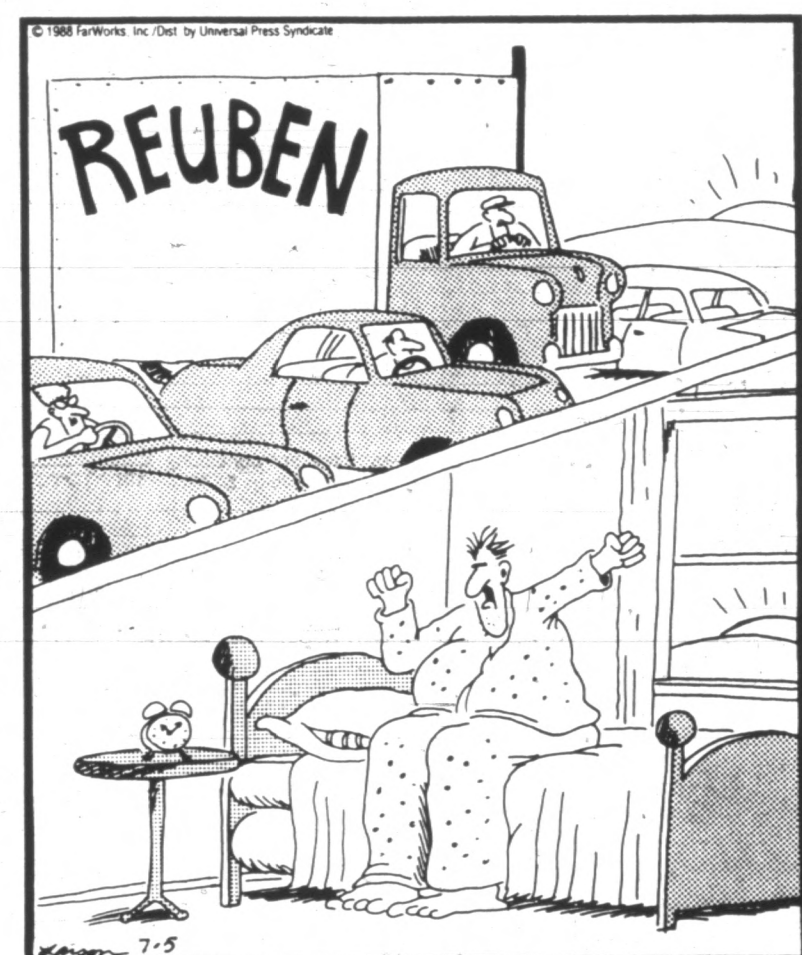

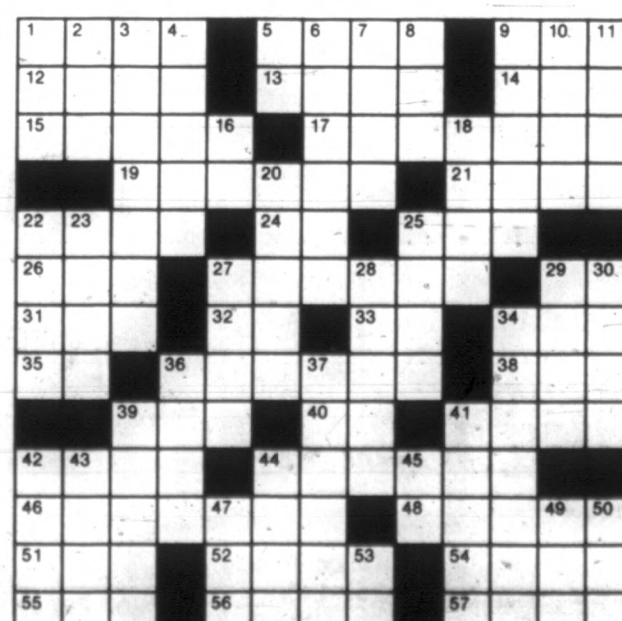

Town claims plan will make little difference

MCCLEARY, Wash. (AP) — Already resigned to defeat, townsfolk who have relied on logging for decades were unfazed by President Clinton's plan to reduce the number of trees cut down in Northwest federal forests.

The proposal would make little difference to an industry already devastated by battles with courts and environmentalists, they said.

"With the way things have gone, this won't hurt logging any worse than it's already been hurt by court (shutdowns) and things," said Jack Young, who loaded logs on ships before retiring recently.

He sipped a beer Thursday at the Waterhole Tavern, the town's only bar, hours after Clinton announced his proposal.

Clinton's plan, intended to protect the habitat of the threatened northern spotted owl, drew protests from the timber industry and environmentalists, both portraying their side as the loser.

But McCleary residents said the logging industry lost long before Clinton's plan.

"Hell, the woods have been all but shut down for four years anyhow. What difference does it make what the president does?"

said Wally Remington, Jr., who with his father runs an auction house in McCleary, about 22 miles west of Olympia, the state capital.

In fact, the logging level proposed under Clinton's plan is close to the amount now permitted by federal courts, said Tom Ingham, president of Simpson Timber Co.

Clinton's plan might even help McCleary's biggest employer, a Simpson mill that makes doors, because it increases the amount of old-growth trees available for logging, Ingham said.

The mill, which averages about 300 employees depending on the season, relies exclusively on fine grain old-growth timber.

Clinton proposed to limit Northwest logging in federal forests to an annual average of 1.2 billion board feet, well below the 4.4 billion board-feet level of the late 1980s. He tried to sweeten the proposal by offering \$1.2 billion in economic aid.

"We know that our solutions may not make everybody happy," Clinton said. "Indeed, they may not make anybody happy."

On one side, an Oregon group burned coffins representing timber towns, while on the other environmentalists spoke of loo-

phos so big that "thousands of log trucks can head through them."

Clinton called the plan "a departure from the failed policies of the past," a reference to logging levels in the Northwest's oldest forests that have pushed the spotted owl near extinction.

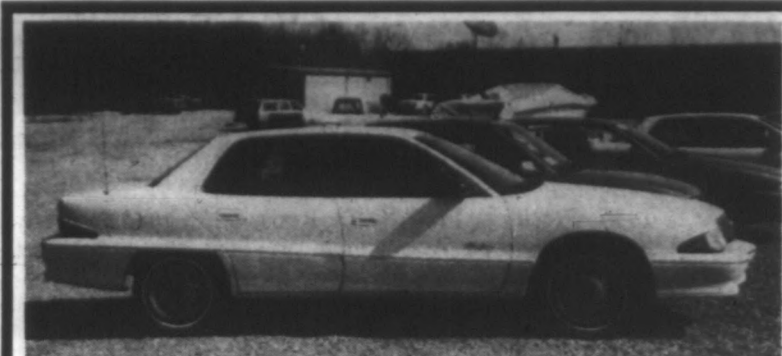
His plan, which will be submitted to a federal judge, is likely to be seen as an early indication of how he will put his pro-environment talk into practice as president.

He refused to seek exemptions to existing environmental laws, as advocated by the timber industry and many Northwest lawmakers, to allow for more logging.

But he also disappointed environmentalists, who don't like a proposal to allow limited logging within forest reserves set up to protect the owl and other troubled wildlife.

Clinton maintains the net effect will be an increase in jobs over five years, but timber industry leaders predicted the logging cutbacks would cost tens of thousands of jobs and said they might challenge the plan in court.

"They've spent 90 days developing a solution that will leave us exactly where we were when it began — in court-ordered gridlock," said Mark Rey of the American Forest and Paper Association.

Study finds placebo effect has great healing power

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Call it the power of suggestion, but a study of the placebo effect says people with certain diseases get better 70 percent of the time even when they receive worthless treatment.

"Even if a treatment is not effective, large numbers of people will feel they've been helped if both the therapist and the patient believe in its effectiveness," said Alan H. Roberts, principal author of the study being published today in Clinical Psychology Review.

The findings suggest doctors and patients may be too quick to use promising experimental treatments that eventually prove ineffective, said Roberts, chief psychologist at Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation in La Jolla.

He said the research also indicates people seek unconventional, unproven therapies because they often seem to be helped by them, but that they would do even better with scientifically proven treatments.

William Jarvis, a medicine professor and president of the National Council Against Health Fraud, called the research an ingenious "landmark study." He said doctors have known about the placebo effect but that the new study documents it better than ever.

Doctors describe the placebo effect as the improvement patients get from inert drugs or ineffective treatments purely because of belief the treatments will work.

Roberts and colleagues at San Diego State University and the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, analyzed dozens of old studies on five treatments that were medically accepted in the 1960s or 1970s but later found ineffective.

The treatments were glomectomy, an asthma-relief surgery; briefly freezing the stomach lining in an attempt to treat peptic ulcers; and three drugs applied to herpes simplex sores.

Of the 6,931 patients treated in the old studies, the outcome was excellent for 40 percent, good for 30 percent and poor for 30 percent.

"The study is important" and carefully performed, said Sey-

mour Fisher, a psychology professor at the State University of New York Health Science Center in Syracuse.
