## A Soldier's Story Durant fears for his life

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — A captured American pilot, dragged through the streets by angry residents after a fierce battle, says he still fears for his life and believes the mission in Somalia has gone wrong.

A reporter from Britain's Guardian newspaper interviewed Chief Warrant Officer Michael Durant for a story published in today's edition. The French newspaper Liberation participated in the interview.

Durant, 32, was quoted by The Guardian as saying gunfire began as soon as his helicopter crashed after being hit by a rocket-propelled grenade. Durant couldn't move because of his injuries.

"I saw people coming out of tin shacks trying to get to us. I kept shooting at them, but then ran out of ammunition," the

story quoted Durant as saying. Durant only had a side arm. The story said Somalis pulled off his clothes, dragged him onto a main street and held him up in the air.

"Some people would break through the crowd and hit me. But there were other people shouting at them. It seemed as if they wanted them to stop the beating," he was quoted as saying.

Durant was the pilot of one of two U.S. Blackhawk helicopters shot down Sunday night at the start of a 16-hour battle between U.N. forces and fighters loyal to militia leader Mohamed Farrah Aidid.

Fifteen U.S. servicemen and a Malaysian peacekeeper were killed, and 77 Americans were wounded in the battle. It wasn't known how many Somalis died. The Red Cross said more than 700 were wounded, a third of them women and children. Aidid

supporters put the number at 315 dead and more than 800 wounded.

In The Guardian interview, Durant told of being taken to three houses and chained up. Speaking from his bed at a house in Mogadishu, he said he had been visited by a doctor each of the last three days to look at his broken right leg, facial injuries and bullet wounds.

He had a small radio he used to listen to news reports about the aftermath of the firefight, the story said.

"My biggest fear is that the people living around this part of town will find out that I'm here and try to kill me," he said.

"Americans mean well," he said. "We did try to help. Things have gone wrong."

Durant said he mutually thought all the crew members were alive when the helicopter crashed.

## Chief remembered L.J. Hortin papers dedicated at Pogue

Of all the attributes L.J. Hortin passed on to his students, many of whom affectionately called him "Chief," one stands clear. The truth.

Hortin is the father of the Murray State journalism program, and he passed his energy and enthusiasm for his profession on to generations of journalists.

Hortin, who died in November, is being remembered by two events at Murray State University as part of Homecoming 1993.

On Friday, a program and reception honoring Dr. Hortin and his wife Millie was held in the Pogue Library, celebrating the addition of his papers to the university's special collections library.

Today at 5:30 p.m., a reading room in Wilson Hall will be dedicated in Hortin's honor.

Hortin was a native of Albion, Ill. and a graduate of McKendree

College in nearby Lebanon, Ill. He earned his master's degree at Murray State College, and started journalism at Murray State in 1928. He served as director of journalism on campus until 1947, when he left to become director of the School of Journalism at Ohio University.

One of Hortin's students during his early days at MSU was Dr. Forrest C. Pogue, who was on-campus remembering Hortin at Friday's reception.

Pogue, an MSU graduate, was the first student editor of the College News under Hortin, and is one of the nation's foremost scholars on World War II.

"He (Hortin) played an important part in my life, and anything that I have accomplished in my time," Pogue said.

Pogue said Hortin taught students to "find the universal element in everything that will appeal

## County jail's fate decided in 30 days

State officials mainly criticized the Calloway County jail structural deficiencies and deemed the structure unsafe, according to County Attorney David Harrington.

Harrington and Jailor Pat Paschall attended an administrative hearing in Frankfort Thursday to appeal an order handed down by the Department of Corrections which stated the jail was to shut its doors Sept. 1.

Harrington said state officials were primarily concerned with the jail's physical features.

"Everyone agreed that those could not be corrected without building a new facility," Harrington said. "They had no problem with the way the jail is run."

He said the Department of Cor-

rections indicated that because of those deficiencies "the jail is unsafe for prisoners and the staff."

Harrington asked the department if all the state's regulations were uniformly applied to each county. He also questioned whether the department took into consideration a county's tax base.

"They said no," he said. All state regulations from the Department of Corrections are enforced across the board. When the mandates went into effect, many smaller, poorer counties across the state had to close their jails.

Harrington expects an answer on the hearing in the next four weeks. The answer can be appealed by either side in Franklin County Circuit Court.

## Calloway grand jury returns indictments

A Calloway County grand jury returned additional indictments against Billy Barnett Jr. and his half-brother James Ray Barnett Friday in Circuit Court.

The indictments charge both men with "tampering with physical evidence by removing the head from the body of Roger Dale Jones, as well as his tennis shoes, from a location in west Tennessee and placing them in an area of Calloway County."

Billy Barnett, 24, of Hazel is also charged on a grand jury indictment with first-degree murder in connection with the death

of Jones, the 20-year-old Hazel native who was first reported missing May 28.

James Ray Barnett, 19, of Almo is also charged on a grand jury indictment with hindering prosecution. Commonwealth Attorney Mike Ward said James Barnett is accused of helping his half-brother in the transportation of Jones' body.

Both men pleaded not guilty to the murder and hindering prosecution charges Sept. 24. They are both lodged in the Marshall County Detention Center.

Hearing dates have not been

## Lawmaker questions new school tests

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A state legislator indicated he had doubts about the value of some problems contained in the new tests being given Kentucky's students.

Rep. Thomas Kerr also wondered how much students needed to know to score well on the tests.

The Taylor Mill Democrat raised these issues with Education Commissioner Thomas Boyesen during Thursday's meeting of the Interim Joint Committee on

Education.

Kerr called attention to a math question that the state Education Department released as an example of the new system.

The student who solved the problem multiplied four by four and got 17 instead of 16. The student explained the reasoning behind the problem, however, and was scored as proficient on the question, Kerr said.

Proficient is considered above average and the level that education officials eventually want all

students to reach.

"Does this reward someone's ability to shoot the bull?" Kerr asked Boyesen. "It's kind of like law school. It didn't matter what answer you gave as long as you could explain both sides."

Boyesen explained that the new tests are designed to measure what students know, but he did not explain how a student who

makes a multiplication error could be judged proficient.

Education Department spokesman Steve Swift said it could have been a typographical error on the scoring sheet.

The state tests were developed to better measure what students can do. Education officials have said that the all-multiple-choice tests of the past largely measured memory, and the students' scores were judged relative to other stu-

## Rally held against casino gambling

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Casino opponents rallied at the Capitol with a prayer for deliverance from "the leech of illegal gambling."

"This is just the first of a long, long fight. ... We really feel the gamblers have targeted Kentucky," said the Rev. Claude Witt, director of the Temperance League of Kentucky, which organized Friday's event.

About 150 church men and women demonstrated in opposition to making casinos legal in Kentucky. Some horsemen and race track owners are promoting

the idea, but Attorney General Chris Gorman has said it would require a constitutional amendment.

Kentuckians must "rid ourselves of the leech of illegal gambling" and "prevent this evil from becoming legalized," said the Rev. Bill Hancock of High View Baptist Church in Louisville.

Speakers at the rally said Kentucky has enough gambling, including a state lottery and off-track betting.

A "fast-buck mentality" has made gambling "the fastest

growing addiction in America today," said the Rev. Charles Stewart, president of the Kentucky Baptist Convention and pastor of Rose Hill Baptist Church in Ashland.

"People get hooked on gambling as well and as quick as on alcohol," added the Rev. George Childs of Shiloh Baptist Church in Lexington.

The nearest legal casino operation is a Players International riverboat on the Ohio River at Metropolis, Ill., near Paducah. Of Kentucky's other neighbors, Missouri and Indiana have legalized

casino boats but require local-option elections.

A Louisville minister alluded to a legislative bribery scandal, part of which involved horse-racing legislation, and said more gambling would bring more corruption.

"We are reminded of former legislators who were seduced and succumbed to the corrupt powers that sought their votes," said the Rev. Edgar Goins of Fourth Avenue United Methodist Church in Louisville. "They could not withstand the pressures of the powerful interests that sought and got their votes."

al to the widest number of people. Many of the things that I later used in writing biography and history were things I learned in journalism from Hortin."

Hortin also served as the debate coach during Pogue's days as a student on campus.

"He was constantly teaching you to think through the issue," Pogue said.

After building Ohio University's school of journalism into one of the largest in the nation, Hortin returned to Murray State in 1967, and served as chairman of the journalism department, upgrading it to a degree program and adding a master's program.

Dr. Robert McGaughey was MSU's first graduate student in journalism, and succeeded Hortin as departmental chair in 1974.

"He believed in the straight

and narrow," McGaughey said. "He wanted one thing, and that was the truth. And there was only one truth."

In addition to serving as a teacher (three of his students won Pulitzer Prizes and another, John Mack Carter, was named Outstanding Magazine Editor of the Half Century), Hortin had extensive experience working as a newspaper reporter, working with the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, Associated Press, United Press, the Louisville Courier-Journal and the Murray Ledger & Times.

"He brought real journalism experience to the classroom," said Johanna Comisak Rhodes, former news director at WPSD-TV in Paducah, and a Hortin student. "He was also very energetic, and that meant a lot. You couldn't help but be caught up in

his excitement. It was the way he lived his life, and journalism was a major part of it."

Hortin's energy couldn't help but rub off. After Hortin retired, he would still address the freshman journalism students, and his talk would light faces up in the room.

"You could tell that those who knew something about him were moved by what he said," McGaughey said.

Dwain McIntosh, who during his tenure in the university's public relations office, worked and studied under Hortin, wrote in a column after Hortin's death that Hortin "emphasized a path to success in journalism that has no shortcuts — that there is no substitute for hard work."

"He enthusiastically nurtured curiosity and creativity, journalis-

tic virtues that are extremely difficult, if not impossible to teach," wrote McIntosh, who is now assistant general manager of the Ledger & Times. "And he was relentless in his quest to import to us how important it was to strive continuously to be fair in reporting."

But journalism wasn't Hortin's only contribution to the university and the Murray and Calloway County community.

He worked extensively for the Tennessee Valley Authority to bring a dam to western Kentucky, and also was a tireless trumpeter for the cause of Nathan B. Stubblefield, a Murray native who was one of the early developers of wireless telephony.

His collection of papers now in the university's Pogue Library also feature an extensive collection relating to the university's history.

State officials did not comment during the hearing on the steps Calloway County has taken

recently to solve the jail problem. For example, Judge/Executive George Weeks appointed a jail committee to look at funding and to do feasibility studies on the situation. Other local leaders, along with Judge/Executive-elect J.D. Williams, have been lobbying to get grant monies for a construction project.

Harrington said it would be difficult for the state to go back on its own orders.

"They would be setting themselves up for some liability," he said.

However, Harrington is hoping the hearing officer will take the county's action into consideration.

"It's just hard to tell," he said. Following the hearing, Harrington and Paschall spoke with officials from the Department of Corrections.

"They were very helpful and offered to assist us with building a new jail," Harrington said.

"The first thing I was told was that the people had killed them all. Chopped them up," he was quoted as saying.

An aide to Aidid has said Durant wouldn't be freed unless all Somalis held by the United Nations are released. U.N. forces are holding 32 Somalis, including four described as key aides of Aidid. It was their capture that touched off the fighting Sunday and Monday.

A Red Cross official met with Durant privately Friday at an undisclosed location in Mogadishu, and carried back a letter from Durant to his family, said Tony Burgener, a spokesman for the International Red Cross in Geneva.

In Washington, White House Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said the Clinton administration was encouraged by the Red Cross visit.

Since the Somalia operation began in December, 31 Americans and 90 peacekeepers from other nations have been killed. Scores of Somalis, including many civilians, also have been killed in fighting and during U.N. raids.

said separate tests could be developed to test students' knowledge in certain subjects, such as physics.

Kerr also asked about a social studies question that required students to refigure a personal budget to be able to afford a car payment of \$199 a month with an \$18,000 annual salary. He said he thought of social studies as studying history and geography, not personal finance.

Boysen said such a question likely was designed to focus on economics but that other social studies questions focus on history and geography. Kerr said he thinks of economics as supply and demand, not a personal budget.

Being able to defend an answer, whether it is right or wrong, can be valuable in some professions but not in others, Kerr said.

"If you were building a jet engine and got the wrong answer," he said, "it could be disastrous."

## Clinton wrestles with yet another Bush inheritance

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton shaped his belated policy on Somalia from a collection of no-win options. There's little consensus except that the situation needs fixing.

In the end, as is his custom, Clinton tried to please everyone. His new plan is to bolster the U.S. presence in the violence-ridden country, reassign an envoy to push for political progress and get all U.S. troops out by spring.

The multi-tiered approach may win him sufficient support in Congress to sustain his policy, at least if Americans can stay out of the gunfights of the Somali factions out to get United Nations peacekeepers.

But the Clinton policy can't guarantee success in Somalia, the nation George Bush decided to save from starvation in the final days of his presidency.

Earlier this week in San Francisco, AFL-CIO Lane Kirkland called the controversial North American Free Trade Agreement a "poison pill" Bush bequeathed to Clinton. Somalia is another one of those pills.

The Somalia intervention has exposed Clinton's weakest flank. He lacks foreign policy experience, his national security team has made some bad calls, and it's all happening during a period of great geopolitical upheaval.

It took the shock of 14 U.S. combat deaths in a week to raise urgent questions about the U.N.'s lead role in Somalia and Clinton's judgment in allowing the mission there to turn from humanitarian to military.

"We shouldn't be in the business of having ... the United Nations deciding what the objective is for U.S. military forces. That's a role that only the president can fulfill," former Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said this week.

Clinton, belatedly taking charge, is now coping with dozens of lawmakers who think they know better. "No matter what he decides, someone today suggested it," Senate Democratic Leader George Mitchell said Thursday after a heated congressional meeting with the president. He said many of the suggestions were in direct conflict.

Some lawmakers argued forcefully for a pullout of all U.S. forces as soon as possible. But others said what's the rush, let's stay as long as it takes to help the Somalis establish a legitimate government.

Some want an all-out attempt to seize Somali warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid. Others, meanwhile, decry that goal as misguided and futile — a throwback to Bush's vilification of Iraq's Saddam Hussein, and ultimate failure to bring him down.

Some fully support Clinton's decision to add troops in the short term in order to protect those that are there and support the political activities preceding the planned withdrawal. Others say they're uneasy about the escalation.

The president is trying to offer something to everyone. In his speech Thursday night, he left open the possibility that troops will be withdrawn sooner than March 31.

He stressed the humanitarian nature of the U.S. mission and said it wouldn't turn into a "get-Aidid" campaign. He also made clear the United States would be in charge of its troops, not the United Nations.

Clinton and his aides also insisted that U.S. troops would leave the country even if the U.S. investment of extra time and diplomatic effort is a failure. "There is no guarantee that Somalia will rid itself of violence or suffering, but at least we will have given Somalia a reasonable chance," Clinton said.

The issue of the moment is what one analyst called "how to manage our exit," and some important lawmakers, including Senate Republican leader Bob Dole, suggested the president made a good case for doing it his way.

But the confusion leading up to the moment has not been forgotten, nor have its implications for the future. Somalia — why we're there, how this happened, when to get out — will be merely the starting point of the coming congressional debate.

The stakes are highest right now for Bosnia, site of another proposed U.N. peacekeeping mission, as lawmakers try to determine standards for future U.S. engagements and the U.S. role in U.N. peacekeeping.

## Consequences already 'dire'

One news report at mid-week said President Clinton "was surprised by the depth of congressional opposition to a continued U.S. presence in Somalia."

Maybe so. But I'm surprised — or astounded might be a more accurate characterization — that he was surprised.

He has reiterated many times his vehement opposition to U.S. involvement in Vietnam some 25 or so years ago. In fact, he continues even now to absorb flak from some quarters for his conduct then as a young man.

Somalia has too many similarities to Vietnam for him to be surprised by criticism of the American role there. Unless, of course, his perspective has become blurred in the ensuing years. Sometimes politics does that.

When Operation Restore Hope was launched some 10 months ago, the American motive seemed rather simple: to participate in an international effort to feed the starving masses in that African country.

Or so we were told. As we should have learned from that costly lesson in Southeast Asia, however, foreign policy mission definition tends to stamper toward complication. Once an entanglement begins, too many dynamic forces come into play.

A quest becomes a quandary becomes a quagmire.

It happened in Vietnam. Now it has happened in Somalia. Somehow the *deja vu* blunders seem hardly excusable. Especial-

ly when the price is young American lives.

When President Bush committed the U.S. to a humanitarian cause in Somalia last December, my feelings were a mixture of heartfelt sympathy and gnawing apprehension. And I never could resolve the conflict.

Few things could I imagine worse than what I was seeing on television from half a world away. Daily scenes of people, especially children, who were literally walking skeletons and dying by the thousands haunted me.

For a time I thought...maybe we could do something to help.

But a few days ago I saw worse — some of the very people we set out to save from starvation desecrating an American soldier's body by dragging it through the streets of Mogadishu. Reality refocused.

My unbounded fury made me stop short and rethink it all. What I concluded did nothing to make my anger subside nor to reassure me about the quality of leadership in our government (both Democrat and Republican) responsible for such a fiasco.

What started ostensibly as a

mission of mercy became something else. Instead of famine relief, our primary purpose shifted to a policy of bringing political stability to a country torn by ongoing civil war.

As the role of U.S. forces was expanding, the military effectiveness of our presence in Somalia was being diminished. Both the number of troops and the availability of armor and other heavy equipment were reduced.

Americans were put at risk in a deteriorating situation that no longer had a clear purpose or command structure. We were inviting disaster — and it happened.

Thirteen Americans were killed, 77 wounded and at least one taken prisoner in street fighting in Mogadishu Sunday. Military leaders said the GIs "lacked the muscle to adequately protect themselves." There have since been more.

Why?

My logic tells me that we have had only two real options in Somalia. Either get out or provide our troops there with the military wherewithal to prevail decisively in any confrontation.

Frankly, I had reached a point

where I favored the former. But if that were not the choice, Desert Storm had proved that we have the skilled personnel, the technology and the weaponry to assert military superiority.

We did neither. In fact, we came down in between. We continued with a commitment of troops — but reduced from 28,000 to 4,700 — with something far less than the best security we are capable of providing. Until now.

In a masterpiece of military afterthought, the plan now is to send a contingent of 1,500 to 2,000 more soldiers and, even more important, armor, heavy weapons and other equipment.

A request was made last month by military personnel in the field for basically that kind of reinforcement. Defense Secretary Les Aspin and his civilian advisers denied it.

Now, after too much loss of life and too many wounded, our government decides to take the advice of our people in uniform at the scene. What's more, it has also decided to seek a diplomatic solution to the anarchy in Somalia.

One radio broadcast I heard in the wake of all the confusion and ineptness was quoting some government source as warning of "dire consequences" if great care is not taken in our future course of action there.

I've got news for somebody. We've already suffered "dire consequences."

Most of them were in their 20s.

#### The Courier-Journal, Louisville:

Contrary to what some Hoosier politicians are telling their constituents, the Kentucky-Indiana border is a serious issue in the discussion of riverboat gambling.

And for all the attempts to dismiss Chris Gorman's persistent, but neighborly warnings as "grandstanding," the communities and companies that hope to cash in on floating casinos actually owe the Kentucky attorney general a debt of gratitude.

He, after all, is the only official in either state who alerted Indiana to a potential obstacle. The issue of border violations was destined to come up. Better to confront it now than a year hence when expectations will be high and launch dates near.

A couple of Indiana legislators suggest that Gorman acted out of "childish" pique or political motivation. They seem intent on starting another of those interstate feuds that have made differences all the harder to solve. That's the wrong approach when they'll need all the goodwill they can get.

Even neighborly feelings won't open Kentucky's part of the river to gambling boats, however. It's unthinkable that any state's chief legal officer would look the other way if laws he is sworn to enforce are violated in such an open and blatant way. ...

Kentucky may yet legalize a wider range of gambling activities, changing everything. Until then, Mr. Gorman has to stand behind the laws now in force. Indiana can adjust to that reality without the bitter recriminations that so damage relations between the states.

It's usually a mistake for young people to look at an athlete as a role model. But not when the athlete is Jamal Mashburn.

The former University of Kentucky basketball star recently announced he was donating \$500,000 to UK. The gift is an extraordinary example of a successful person helping those who really need assistance.

Mashburn's donation will be used to set up a scholarship fund for poor and minority students from Fayette County. The money won't just be used to reward deserving students. It also will be used to identify promising students in the eighth grade and to offer them the guidance they need to succeed academically.

Donations of this size are rare enough to be notable in any circumstances. What makes Mashburn's gift so special is both his youth and his noble aims. Any parent should be so lucky as to have a child grow up to be like him, on the basketball court or off.

## ChiSox find bats, down Blue Jays

TORONTO (AP) — Just one big hit. That's all Frank Thomas and the Chicago White Sox said it would take to get them back into the AL playoffs.

Well, the White Sox got that hit and more Friday night. Thomas started it with a single — at least, it was scored that way — and by the time the third inning was over, Chicago had five runs that Wilson Alvarez protected on the way to a 6-1 victory that cut Toronto's lead in the series to 2-1.

"I told myself, and I think my teammates felt the same way, that when we came up with one big hit, it would open the floodgates," said Tim Lincecum, who doubled twice and singled twice.

"I think maybe the guys might've been trying too hard," he said. "But baseball is a weird game. Toronto got those hits in the first two games and had chances tonight, but didn't get them. The game swings in weird ways, and it swung our way tonight."

Even though the White Sox changed their lineup, inserting Bo Jackson as the designated hitter and putting Thomas back at first base, it was a change of scenery that seemed to help the most.

Away from booing crowds at Comiskey Park, away from the fallout from Michael Jordan's retirement and away from the controversial comments by Jackson and George Bell about who should be the DH, the White Sox reinforced their reputation and record as the AL's top road team.

## Pilots cruise past Lakers

The Fulton County Pilots backfield navigated its way through Calloway County for an easy 27-0 victory.

The Lakers appeared to be in a first half fog as head coach Billy Mitchell watched his over-matched defense give up 276 yards on the ground, including 198 in the first two quarters. Senior Kirk Barnett, with 220 pounds and sprinters speed, raced past the Lakers for three touchdowns and 149 yards on only 13 carries.

Mitchell admitted that he is still looking for the intensity that pushed his Lakers to back-to-back wins in the last two weeks of September before falling to Dresden, Tenn., last week and

Fulton Co. Friday.

"They're (Fulton Co.) a lot better football team than we are right now. But we just didn't come out to play in the first half," said Mitchell.

Fulton County head coach David Gallagher agreed that intensity did play a big part in the game, but fortunately for him, his squad had more than enough early in the game to coast in the remaining two quarters.

"We came out really fired up in the first half. We were ready to play from the very start," Gallagher said. "I'm not sure what happened in the second half, but it just didn't feel the same."

Although the Pilots came out fired up, it looked as though they were willing to give the Lakers every opportunity Calloway

needed to shoot down the 5-1 Pilots.

Tyrone Ervin dropped what would have been an easy interception for the Pilots safety on the first pass play of the game. Lakers quarterback Sam Arnett overthrew his intended receiver only to hit Ervin on the numbers, but Ervin was unable to gather the ball in.

Once Fulton County gained their first possession they drove 15 yards before fumbling. Laker Tyler Bohannon recovered at his team's own 38.

Following a dropped pass, Calloway County returned the ball back to the Pilots when a poor exchange between Arnett and fullback Brandon McCuiston resulted in a fumble.

It then got ugly for the Lakers. Quarterback Ervin connected with Jason Lattus and Lattus made his way to the Calloway County 17 for a 24-yard gain. The Pilots then went 15 yards on

## Cowboys set for George or Trudeau

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — It makes no difference to Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson who starts for the Indianapolis Colts at quarterback Sunday.

Jeff George, who lost the starting job during his 36-day preseason boycott of the team, was expected to make his first start of the season in the Hoosier Dome. However, he hurt his passing hand while mopping up in the final minutes of last week's loss in Denver, so he's questionable. If he can't play, Jack Trudeau will.

"Jeff's a very, very talented individual and can make a lot of plays," Johnson said. "I've also been very impressed with the way Trudeau has played. It really won't affect our defense, as far as how we prepare."

Both teams are 2-2, but seem headed in opposite directions. The Cowboys have won two straight since two-time NFL rushing champion Emmitt Smith ended his holdout on Sept. 16.

"I don't think he's as sharp as what he would have been had he been in training camp," Johnson said of Smith, who has gained 116 yards on 21 carries. "I think it will be a few weeks before he really gets as sharp as we'd want him to be."

Indianapolis, which allowed four touchdowns and 228 yards on four consecutive possessions to start last Sunday's 35-13 loss in Denver, has more than Smith to worry about.

Troy Aikman leads the Cowboys on their first trip to Indianapolis since the Colts arrived in 1984. Aikman has the NFC's highest quarterback rating at 98.9 and is second in the NFL in passing with 1,162 yards.

The defending Super Bowl champions have the league's second most productive offense, averaging 385.8 yards. Only the New York Jets at 412.8 have a higher average.

"We feel that we have all the pieces back in place. Now it's a matter of going out and executing," Aikman said. "We feel like we're playing well."

## Muzzleloaders ready to fire away next week

HENDERSON, Ky. (AP) — It's about time for the annual mid-October black powder explosion in Kentucky, but there's no need to dive for the storm cellar.

The powder will be exploding in the barrels of thousands of muzzle loading rifles used by sportsmen representing the fastest-growing segment of the state's deer hunters.

There has been an early-December whitetail season exclusively for front-stuffers for many years, but it appealed primarily to hardcore "buckskinners" of which the state has always had its share.

These enthusiasts build their hunting and shooting around the firearms available in the early part of the 19th century and before. They also limit their clothing and accessories in the field to items available at that time; you don't see beverage coolers and propane lanterns in their camps.

The cutoff point for "new" stuff is about 1840, the year that saw the end of the beaver fur trade in the West and of the era of mountain men. A few limit themselves to only those things that could have been used earlier by Daniel Boone and his Long Hunters.

But the majority of folks afield during the Oct. 16-17 weekend are less concerned with recreating history than in extending their days of deer hunting.

While their firearms and shooting accessories may be reproductions from the early 1800s, their other equipment, including telescopic sights, are strictly late 20th Century.

Manufacturers anxious to get in on the action now offer "modern muzzleloaders" which look very much like present day rifles and incorporate some of their features. Others produce front-loading rifled barrels for the hunter's modern shotgun.

Much of the new interest in black powder hunting was sparked when the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources announced the first early, two-day season in October 1990.

The autumn weekend offers hunters the chance to get a roundball shot at a trophy whitetail buck before swarms of hunters with modern firearms send the oldest, wisest and biggest deer out of sight into the big woods and swamps during the modern firearms season a month later.

And hunters rose to the occasion by immediately beginning to take record bucks with their 19th century arms.

It's impossible to say how many trophy whitetails may be taken this season, but one record is almost certain — a record number of hunters will be out there with their muzzle loaders.

Experienced shooters warn that the use of modern muzzle loading firearms requires more care than the use of modern breech-loading rifles, especially for beginners.

Extra caution is required largely because the ammunition components, caps (or flints), powder, and bullet, are separate and must be combined carefully for safe and proper results. In addition, black powder and the synthetic propellant Pyrodex are easily capable of accidental ignition.

## Warm front leads to hot catches

Many of the big bass took topwater lures but several were caught on spinnerbaits and soft plastics. Milton and I fished a small section of Barkley Lake on Wednesday and we found the bass very active. We will fish over there in a couple of weeks so it was good to check out a few places and get some idea of what to expect.

I fished on Thursday with a super nice couple from Chicago who are staying at the Early American Motel in Aurora. Bob and Leslie Strauss enjoy the outdoors and do a lot of hiking and camping in many parts of the country. I think they really enjoyed their stay here and will surely be coming back.

We started the day off fishing for bass after another non-caring boater roared across the flat and mossedbed we were planning to slip up on.

The fish left the flat after this goon came through so it was several casts later and much farther down the bank before we caught anything.

Bob has a lot of experience from fishing lakes in the north but wanted to learn some of the techniques or tricks we use around here.

Casting artificial lures was totally new to Leslie, so we spent a

lot of time teaching and learning the basics and what each lure would do when retrieved. She caught on quickly and did a fine job in all areas. I was told in advance that Leslie normally took a good book along to read while Bob fished, but not today.

I kept changing lures for her so often she didn't get bored with casting because each lure change brought new expectations.

We laughed a lot at each other's flub-ups and just kept on fishing. We caught bass and Bob caught a couple of nice crappie before the

Some anglers are taking white stripes in the bays where they are chasing shad minnows around. The striper aren't in all of the bays so you may have to spend a little time looking around.

Catfish are still taking minnows and blood baits on the river banks but seem to be moving back out into the deep again before cold weather sets in.

Crappie fishermen have done well for two weeks at least on minnows and jigs so check them out. Have a safe week.

## New pledge helps conservation

ATLANTA (AP) — Tom Taylor thought teaching children to care for their land ought to be part of any conservation effort, so he included that idea when he wrote an entry for a national contest.

The 29 words penned by the Fort Wayne, Ind., police officer were presented to the nation last week as the new Conservation Pledge. The pledge was given to Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt and the Congressional Sportsmen's Caucus by Outdoor Life magazine, which received more than 10,000 entries in its contest.

The new pledge, which replaces one accepted for the nation by President Harry S. Truman in 1946, reads:

"I pledge to protect and conserve the natural resources of

America. I promise to educate future generations so they may become caretakers of our water, air, land and wildlife."

Taylor said he believes the second sentence is the critical one.

"Today conservation is more and more about educating future generations so they become our partners in preserving our resource," he said. "It's not just for hunting. It's for everyone who wants to come and help protect the natural resources in this country."

A 14-year police veteran, Taylor said he wrote and entered three pledges in the contest.

"I'd like to say I worked and worked on them," he said by telephone from Washington, where the presentation ceremony

took place. "But it took me about an hour to put all three together. I wanted one to have the education theme. I honestly can't remember the other two."

The new pledge succeeds one written by L.L. Foreman, a harvest hand, ranch cook and mechanic. Second place in that contest went to Rachel Carson — who went on to write "The Sea Around Us" and "Silent Spring."

Second place this time went to Erin Stevens of Barre, Mass., and third place to Roger W. Lane of Lula, Ga.

Taylor had to develop his own hunting tradition; he didn't come from a hunting family.

"It wasn't until the early '70s, when I went hunting with some

friends, that I got started," he said. "I've hunted ever since."

With his wife, Libby, and children Christine, 6, and Cole, 3, Taylor goes camping whenever possible.

"She loves to fish," Taylor said of his daughter, "and unless it's too cold, she wants to go out and sit in a duck blind with me."

Taylor's pledge was chosen from 10,000 entries "for its strong conservation message, its contemporary concern for our future and for the awareness it creates that our children's education is the key to natural resource conservation," said Outdoor Life Editor Vin Sparano. "The pledge re-emphasizes a balanced ethic in our changing outdoors."

Now, Sparano said, the pledge belongs to the American people.

## Northern forest could be in trouble

JAY, Vt. (AP) — The "leaf peepers," as people up here call them, are back for their annual revel of fall color. They poke along Route 242, snapping pictures of forest vistas and looking for places to eat.

It's the season New England restaurateurs and innkeepers wait for.

"One way or another, we all make our living from the forest," says Dennis Naughton, a tour company owner. "Like everybody else's, my business depends on it staying the way it is."

But will it?

The northern forest, a 26 million-acre tree belt across Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and New York, could be in jeopardy. The forest-based economy, which has maintained the region's verdant wildness while much of the country has urbanized, is in decline.

Conservationists fear that the woodland, one of the largest undeveloped stands of trees left in the contiguous United States, could give way to vacation-home developments within a few decades.

Characteristically, environmentalists and business interests would feud over such an issue, as they have in the Pacific Northwest. But here all sides tend to agree: To save the forest, save the timber industry.

"If there's anything we've learned in hours and hours of testimony, it's that a healthy, forest-based economy is good for the land," says Charles Levesque, executive director of the Northern

Forest Lands Council, whose 17 members are charged with finding ways to preserve the woodlands.

If there is disagreement, it's about whether a crisis really exists.

"The nature Nazis have trumped up this issue to keep themselves in business," says Robert H. Whitney, of Landvest, a Boston company that brokers big Northeastern land transfers.

"With few exceptions, I advise my clients to plan on managing their land for timber," Whitney says. "People have lost their shirts trying to get these large developments off the ground."

For decades, timber and tourism have supported the million people who live between Maine's woods and New York's Adirondacks. More than 85 percent of the land has been privately owned for 300 years. It was owned first by farmers who left a century ago for more fertile soil to the West, and then by timber interests that have logged the land since it reverted to forests.

These same forests provide wooded playgrounds for the 70 million people who live within a day's drive.

The first indication of trouble came 10 years ago with the collapse of Diamond International. The giant timber company, with land holdings of 1.7 million acres in Maine, New Hampshire and New York, was acquired by James Goldsmith, a British financier.

Goldsmith dissolved Diamond and put the land up for sale. The

property changed owners several times, winding up in the hands of two development companies five years ago. They subdivided the tracts, offering them as housing lots.

"It was a wake-up call," says Steve Blackmer, chairman of the Northern Forest Alliance, a Boston-based coalition of several dozen environmental organizations. "Everyone realized the beautiful forest they once took for granted could fragment into roads and second homes."

Environmentalists mobilized, persuading Congress to create the lands council in 1990. Those involved assumed that the council's job would boil down to mediating an argument among the factions.

The council's consensus — that the timber industry keeps the land wild — surprised many. The idea has caught on, uniting landowners, environmentalists, government officials and scientists.

"Timber harvesting produces jobs for the people who live up here and ensures that the forest is kept from development," says Rainer Brocke, a wildlife ecologist at the State University of New York in Syracuse. "All of the new studies show that forests managed for timber produce excellent levels of biodiversity."

Even the controversial practice of clear-cutting can benefit a forest, says Brocke. "It mimics nature's disturbance regime and gives you far greater diversity after a number of years," he tells National Geographic.

Far more threatening to northern woodlands, Brocke says, are cars that kill thousands of animals each year, tree diseases that threaten to eradicate major food sources for wildlife, and fire-suppression practices that prevent nature from periodically revitalizing the soil.

The biggest problem facing the forest lands council is how to rejuvenate the northeastern timber industry, which is gradually abandoning the area for the Southeast, where timber grows faster and production costs are lower. The northern woodlands have lost 17,000 forest and paper-making jobs in the past 20 years, according to a Wilderness Society study.

Timber interests still own most of the 26 million acres that make up the northern forest, but pressure to sell intensifies. The vacation-home market pushes land values up, causing higher real estate taxes. People who inherit land often must sell it to pay their taxes, which can run as high as 50 percent of the land's value.

But for the time being, recession has slowed the sell-off.

"My business is 25 percent of what it was in the mid-'80s," says Roger Morin, one of many real estate agents in Jay whose livelihood depends on the second-home market.

The lands council will hold public hearings in January on draft recommendations and will submit its final report to Congress next summer.

Opening lead — four of spades.

It is not easy to make five diamonds on this deal. But the fact is that South made it and, moreover, accomplished the feat in a relatively simple manner.

East won the spade lead with the ace and returned the queen, taken by declarer with the king. South realized that if he drew trumps and led a heart to the queen, East would win

with the ace and cash the jack of spades to put the contract down one.

Faced with this unacceptable prospect, South chose a different line of play that offered an unlikely but legitimate chance for the contract.

He began by cashing the A-K of clubs, then crossed to the ace of trumps, led the ten of clubs and, after East followed low, discarded his singleton heart on it!

As a result, South had the contract in tow. West was on lead and helpless. A club continuation would yield a ruff and discard, while a heart return through the K-Q would trap East's ace and provide a parking space for South's spade loser.

West did as well as he could when he returned the nine of trumps. Declarer won with dummy's ten, led the king of hearts through East's ace, and in that way made the contract.

It is true that South was very lucky to find West with the Q-J of clubs, which allowed the contract to be made. It is also true that East could have beaten the contract by playing the ten of spades at trick one instead of the ace, but this play is much easier to make with all four hands exposed.





**DR. GOTT**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My husband gets a metallic, sour taste in his mouth following meals. This is followed by bloating, nausea and gas. He's been tested for an ulcer and was told he only had irritations. A specialist recommended different medicines and couldn't really find the problem either. What are we dealing with? We can't afford to continue going to doctors who don't give a proper diagnosis.

**DEAR READER:** I can't determine from your brief summary the cause of your husband's problem, although I suspect that he has a digestive abnormality that might result from gastritis (stomach irritation) or hiatal hernia with reflux (backwash of stomach acid).

He should be examined by a gastroenterologist, who may choose to perform gastroduodenoscopy, a test during which the specialist examines the upper stomach and upper intestine with a flexible, lighted tube. In some instances, this test is superior to standard intestinal X-rays because the doctor can actually view the tissues to identify inflammation.

Ask his doctor to refer your husband to the appropriate specialist.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My husband had a tumor of the right lung that is presently in remission. The doctor thinks he developed a peripheral neuropathy that he attempted to treat with plasmapheresis and prednisone without marked improvement. He's been totally crippled for a year, and all his doctors tell us nothing can be done. Do you agree?

**DEAR READER:** Unfortunately, some lung tumors cause malfunction of certain nerves (neuropathy) that may be due to substances secreted by the malignancy, even if it is in remission. These substances can be filtered from the blood (plasmapheresis) or neutralized by cortisone drugs, such as prednisone.

Evidently, in your husband's case, these methods failed to improve. I'm afraid that there is no specific remedy for his nerve disorder.

Nonetheless, he might be able to maintain a degree of independence by special exercises and physical therapy. For example, with training, he may be able to transfer himself from bed to chair or bed to commode. This would make life much easier for him and his care givers.


Entry fees are \$4 per class, with the exception of payback classes which include open western plea-






