Accident claims lives of three from New Concord Couple was delivering presents

Yet another holiday traffic tragedy has hit. This time, it is closer to home.

Three people, all from New Concord, died Wednesday night as the result of a head-on collision near New Concord on Ky. 444, approximately 3 1/2 miles from Ky. 121.

Bryan Luffman and his wife, Carol, were delivering Christmas toys in a Blood River Baptist Church bus at approximately 7:10 p.m. when an eastbound-vehicle driven by Patricia Lynn Yearry, 42, apparently crossed the center line and struck the van, according to Kentucky State Police reports.

Trooper Chuck Robertson said upon impact, the van burst into flames and was engulfed when emergency workers, including firefighters from the Calloway County Fire-Rescue and Murray Fire Department along with the Calloway County Sheriff's

Department, arrived. Robertson said "alcohol is a possibility" involving Yearry. "We'll know more when toxicology reports are back on that."

Coroner Dwane Jones said he is not sure when the reports will be ready.

Robertson said there was some evidence at the scene that led police to believe alcohol may have been a contributing factor in the crash.

Kentucky State Police accident reconstructionists were called in to try and determine exactly what happened. An investigation is continuing.

Autopsies on all three victims will be performed Thursday at the Regional Medical Center in Madisonville, he said.

The Luffmans and Yearry were pronounced dead at the scene by

Calloway County Deputy Coroner Damon Mathis, said Robertson, public affairs officer at the Mayfield post.

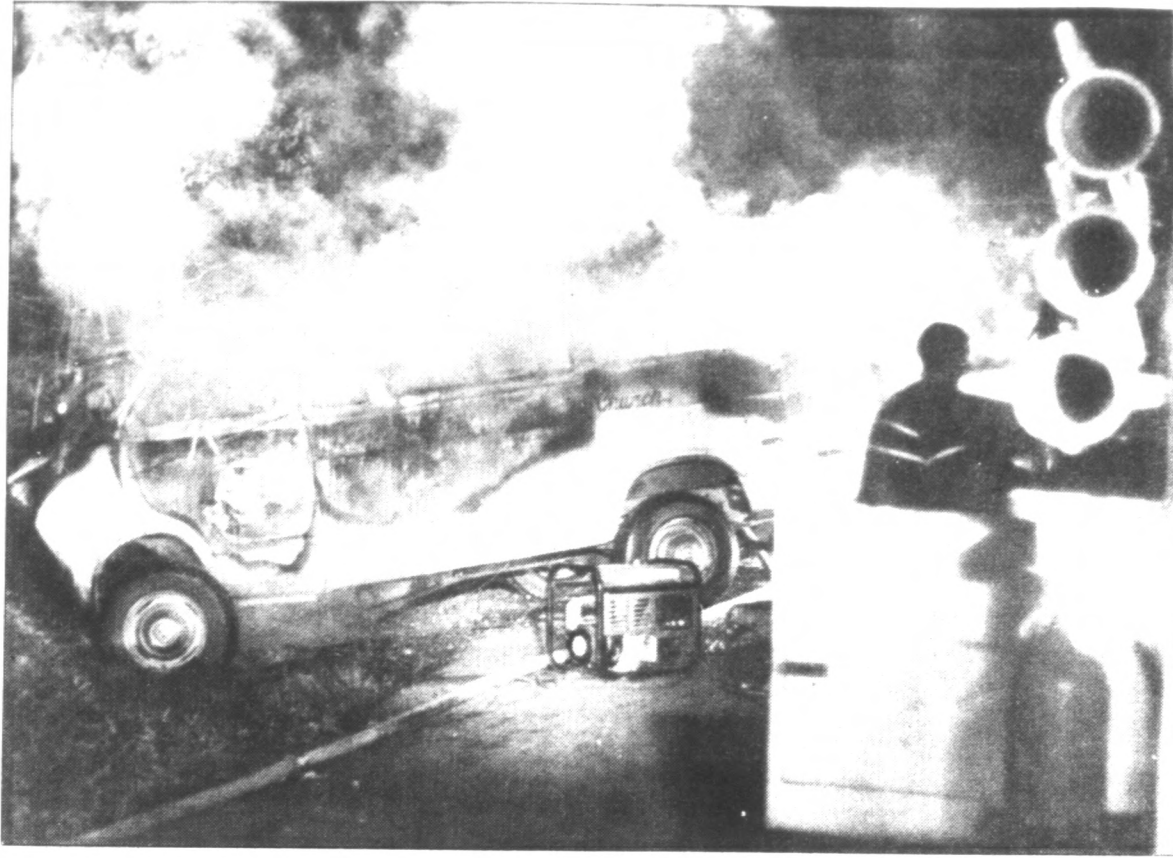
Bryan, 23, and Carol, 21, had just dropped off several children at the Blood River Baptist Church and were going back to deliver their gifts to their homes when the crash occurred.

The church and its bus ministry had been working to collect enough toys, clothes and food for more than 30 needy families in New Concord, one of Calloway's poorest areas.

Carol Luffman was the daughter of the Rev. Jerry Norsworthy, pastor of the Blood River Baptist Church, which owned the van. "They were out doing their godly mission and God saw fit to call them home," said Sherrie Holbrook, a member of the church.

Church members were gathering for their Wednesday evening service when they heard the news of the crash.

Donna Herndon, director of the Family Resource Center for Cal-

Judge considers motion for Pikes

Special Judge Dennis Foust is considering vacating the criminal charges against the 13 members of Pi Kappa Alpha in connection with a November 1992 assault.

The men, who were pledges of the Murray State University Fraternity, appeared in District Court Wednesday morning with their attorney Rick Jones.

Jones entered a motion to have the charges expunged — to have the charges completely erased from the men's criminal records. Foust said he will consider vacating and dismissing the charges. However, under Kentucky statute, charges cannot be expunged for five years.

"I'll treat this as a motion in accordance with what I set out in my original plea agreement and sentencing," Foust told Jones and Assistant County Attorney Warren Hopkins. "I said at that time I'd favorably consider some sort of motion."

Hopkins said the Commonwealth objects to the motion to expunge charges.

"Given the nature of the crime, they were given a break and that break was the plea agreement," he said. "This was no less a crime than any other crime."

If a criminal charge is expunged, all records of the charges and court proceedings will be stripped from the record. If charges are vacated and dismissed, the record stands, but includes that the charges were dismissed.

The men were arrested Nov. 23, 1992, and charged with third-degree criminal mischief and fourth-degree assault after they allegedly entered the trailer of Pike member Quentin Clark and his wife, Tami.

The men allegedly damaged the interior of the trailer, cut phone lines and struck Tami Clark, who was pregnant at the time, in the abdomen.

Twelve of the defendants entered Alford Pleas June 1 in District Court. An Alford Plea is not an admission of guilt, but a defendant concedes the Common-

Ex-Governor's husband gets 63 months in prison, fine

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Ten years earlier, Bill Collins had escorted his wife, the new governor, down a Capitol staircase to an inaugural ball.

On Wednesday, as Collins stood to receive a prison sentence and fine, U.S. District Judge Joseph M. Hood recalled that moment. Bill and Martha Layne Collins projected a "bright image" of promise for Kentucky, Hood said. In reality, "a Machiavellian scheme was already under way."

The government charged Collins with using his influence to extort money from people wanting state contracts. They included investment bankers whose firms wanted to handle Kentucky's bond issues and engineers who sought state contracts for bridge and highway work.

Hood said the former governor's husband had to be made "an example" to show that state government "is not for sale." He sentenced Collins to five years and three months in prison and fined him \$20,000 — half Collins' net worth. With good behavior, Collins could be released in 4 1/2 years.

He asked to be sent to the federal correctional institution at Montgomery, Ala., and Hood said he would recommend it to the Bureau of Prisons.

The 63-month prison term was the minimum under federal sentencing guidelines. The maximum was 78 months. Collins held no office while his wife was governor from 1983 to 1987. But the government alleged he exploited a perception that he controlled the awarding of state contracts.

He formed Collins Investments Inc. and sold limited partnerships in real estate and thoroughbred horses. Collins owned half the company, which collected hundreds of thousands of dollars in management fees from the partnerships.

Investors included executives of two bond underwriting firms — Donaldson Lufkin & Jenrette of New York and Cranston Securities Co. of Columbus, Ohio.

Union workers look at contract

MAYFIELD, Ky. (AP) — Hundreds of layoffs announced at General Tire's Mayfield plant could be negated under a revised contract.

Several hundred workers got a first look at the revised proposal Wednesday.

A copy of the contract obtained by The Messenger in Mayfield indicated members of United Rubber Workers Local 665 would have control over what was reportedly the main sticking point in the previous proposal.

That contract was rejected 944-558 on Dec. 9.

Union members had objected to a proposed work-schedule change under which production workers would put in 12-hour days — 36 hours in one week, 48 the next — with four crews working seven days a week, pos-

sibly. Workers also could be asked to work holidays.

The day after the first contract was defeated, General Tire announced it was phasing out radial passenger tire production at the plant, beginning with 190 layoffs Jan. 14 and 15. The union said a total of about 420 jobs would be lost.

The copy of the revised contract obtained by the Mayfield newspaper said workers will vote on three separate scheduling options — the 12-hour plan from the previous proposal, a plan that includes weekend 12-hour shifts, and one with an eight-hour schedule with rotating days off.

If one of the plans does not get at least 51 percent of votes cast, then the two plans receiving the most votes will be voted on.

Dreamers all worked up over \$90 million

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Somewhere out there are two tickets good for a share of a \$90 million lottery jackpot that had people in at least 14 states rushing to get in on the action.

The two tickets with all six numbers picked in Wednesday night's Powerball drawing were bought in the District of Columbia, lottery officials said today after a computer search of the estimated 50 million tickets sold.

Now it's up to the ticket holders to step forward and claim their prize.

The odds of one ticket matching the winning numbers were 1 in 55 million, but that didn't stop some people from dreaming.

"I'm going to rent a cruise ship," Dee Rumbaugh of Charleston, W.Va., fantasized Wednesday. "I know people all over the country. I'd get them all together and go on a cruise. Wouldn't that be great?"

In Portland, Ore., accountant

Steve Grammel calculated his purely theoretical winnings after splitting the jackpot with 75 co-workers. "I'd get about \$40,000 a year for 20 years," he said. "I'd still quit."

The Powerball game, played twice a week in 14 states and the District of Columbia, had gone eight weeks without a winner before Wednesday night's drawing. Players pay \$1 to choose six numbers.

In Wisconsin, tickets sold at the rate of about 3,000 per minute Wednesday. In Kentucky, it was 2,000 tickets per minute, and in Minnesota, 100 to 150 tickets per second.

A \$111 million Powerball jackpot won by a Wisconsin teacher in July was the largest payoff on a one-owner ticket in U.S. lottery history.

The winning numbers were: 1, 3, 13, 15 and 29. The powerball was 12.

'95 deficit projected to hit six-year low

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton has wrapped up work on his first full budget and says it will drive the deficit down to its lowest level in six years while still providing new spending for his top priorities.

However, Clinton and other administration officials are conceding that the budget they will send Congress on Feb. 7 is not without pain. It would end or reduce funding for hundreds of government programs while eliminating 100,000 federal jobs by the end of 1995.

Clinton noted that the proposed budget for the 1995 fiscal year, which begins next Oct. 1, would cut spending levels in nine of the government's 14 biggest agencies below current levels.

The administration was forced

to do this to find funding for Clinton initiatives in education, crime fighting and environmental cleanup while still meeting stringent budget caps for discretionary spending established by Congress last year.

The Clinton budget would reduce the 1995 deficit to \$190 billion, its lowest level since 1989. That would be \$68.7 billion below the projected deficit for this year and compares to an estimated 1995 deficit of \$301 billion when Clinton took office.

In an interview with radio reporters, the president called this "quite an important achievement."

He said the deficit reduction was accomplished while the administration was still able to provide "substantial increases in

the investments I think are important to our future" in such areas as education, crime fighting, job training, children's health and defense conversion.

However, to pay for increases in Clinton's "investment" categories, spending had to be reduced elsewhere to stay within a \$540 billion ceiling on discretionary spending imposed by last year's deficit reduction law.

White House Budget Director Leon Panetta said the administration had stayed within the spending caps imposed by Congress by making outright reductions in hundreds of federal programs and freezing hundreds of others at their 1994 spending levels.

"We've got a hard freeze imposed across the board,"

Panetta said. "We are talking about a very tight budget here."

Clinton signed off on the details of the budget after 23 hours of meetings with agency heads and his economic team.

The administration's full budget request will top \$1.5 trillion. In addition to discretionary programs, the budget includes so-called mandatory spending for such big government benefit programs as Social Security and Medicare that must be paid to all recipients who qualify.

The \$190 billion deficit reduction target for 1995, if achieved, would be the smallest since a shortfall of \$152.5 billion in 1989. The deficit for the fiscal year ending last Sept. 30 was \$254.7 billion.

loway County Schools, said Carol Luffman had been working diligently for months to collect enough gifts for all the children in the area.

"Carol had put together an album and made Polaroids and passed around the church for families to sponsor," Herndon said.

More than \$1,000 worth of clothes and toys were destroyed in the fiery crash, Herndon said. The church, with the help of the resource center and the Murray Fire Department, was able to collect enough toys for all the children.

"That's a small church and they had taken on an awesome task," she said. "But, these were the children in their ministry," Herndon said Carol Luffman's

heart was in this project.

"She felt she'd been led to do this," Herndon said.

The Luffmans, who had been married for two years, did not have children.

Although friends and family are experiencing a tremendous amount of grief, Herndon said work is beginning on replacing the lost gifts.

"Last night the toys seemed so insignificant," Herndon said. "But as we got our wits, we knew we had to do this for Carol."

A massive drive to get toys, clothes and food for the needy families is underway.

Herndon said another Baptist church in Marshall County is also coordinating efforts to help the Blood River congregation.

"It's the best tribute we can give Carol and Bryan," she said. Herndon said the church is "absolutely devastated and the children were torn to pieces."

She said Carol worked closely with the New Concord children and Bryan always supported her. "Someone mentioned how inconsequential the toys are but it was not inconsequential to Carol and Bryan."

"When you think about it, they really gave their lives for this," Herndon said.

Carol Luffman was a dean's list junior at Murray State. She was employed by Overbey and Hutchens Law Firm and Briggs

and Stratton.

Bryan Luffman was employed at Thornton Heating and Air. Co-worker Teresa Garland said Bryan and Carol were two of the finest people she knew.

"Bryan was always there when you needed him," Garland said. Employees are all in shock and wondering why this happened, she said.

"It should have been a festive day, but none of us got much sleep last night and we don't know what to do," she said.

Garland said Bryan Luffman had worked at Thornton's for about 3 1/2 years. Today, she said, is not normal like it should be.

"You wonder why it happens to people like that, but they're in a better place."

"Bryan and Carol have just always seemed to be meant to be together," she said.

J.H. Churchill is handling the Luffman arrangements. (Please see Deaths, page 12.)

Information about Yearry, who is married to Jesse Yearry, was not available Thursday morning. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

This is the second multiple-fatal crash in a week in west Kentucky. Seven Trigg County teenagers died in a two-car collision last Wednesday afternoon on U.S. 68.

Two die in separate bus accident

MONTICELLO, Ky. (AP) — Two other Kentuckians were killed in a wreck involving a church bus Wednesday night in Wayne County.

In Wayne County, a bus from the Sandusky Chapel Church caught fire and the Monticello Fire Department responded at about 6:30 p.m., Chief Brook Gibson said.

Gibson said two people were killed and four were injured when

the fire truck's emergency brake cable broke and the truck rolled back into some bystanders. Another person, a firefighter, was being treated for a hand injury, Gibson said.

The accident happened about three miles south of Monticello on Kentucky 167.

David Hale Troxell of Monticello, whose age was unavailable, was pronounced dead at the scene. Dorothy Worley, 64, of Monticello, was pronounced dead at Wayne County Hospital. Wayne County Coroner Marvin S. Hicks told the Lexington Herald-Leader.

Three of the injured were airlifted to hospitals in Louisville.

An 8-year-old boy, whose name wasn't given, was in serious condition at Kosair Children's Hospital with a fractured pelvis among other injuries, hospital spokeswoman Barbara Morris said.

Two women were taken to University of Louisville Hospital, where one was in stable condition and the other in critical condition.

Students caught carrying pistol at Calloway High

Two Calloway County High School students were charged with carrying a concealed deadly weapon Tuesday. The students allegedly had the gun on school property.

According to reports from the Calloway County Sheriff's Department, a 15-year-old and 16-year-old were charged with the Class A misdemeanor.

Apparently, one student brought a loaded semi-automatic pistol to school and sold it to the other on school grounds.

Assistant Superintendent Johnny Bohannon said he was unaware of the incident. Principal Jerry Ainley and Superintendent Jack Rose could not be reached for comment.

However, Bohannon said carrying a gun to school is prohibited.

According to the student behavior policy, "students shall not carry on their person or cause to be brought to school firearms, knives or another object which can be classified as a dangerous instrument."

Violation of that rule can result in suspension or expulsion, Bohannon said.

In the letter, Paterson goes on to say that because of an "unfavorable economy and unpredictable tire market," the company could not "predict or guarantee employment levels at the Mayfield facility."

Nearly 1,450 union members now work at the plant, which is the county's biggest employer.

majority in the second round will be implemented "in the event such a seven-day schedule is needed for future operations," the contract said. Voting must be completed by Feb. 15, 1994.

Union members will vote on the revised contract Dec. 30. It would be in effect from Jan. 3, 1994, until Oct. 15, 1997.

A letter to union president Danny Bruce from Rob Paterson, the plant's human resources manager, said approval of the new pact "would negate the competitive need to move tires and machines to other facilities in January, thereby canceling the scheduled Jan. 14 layoff."

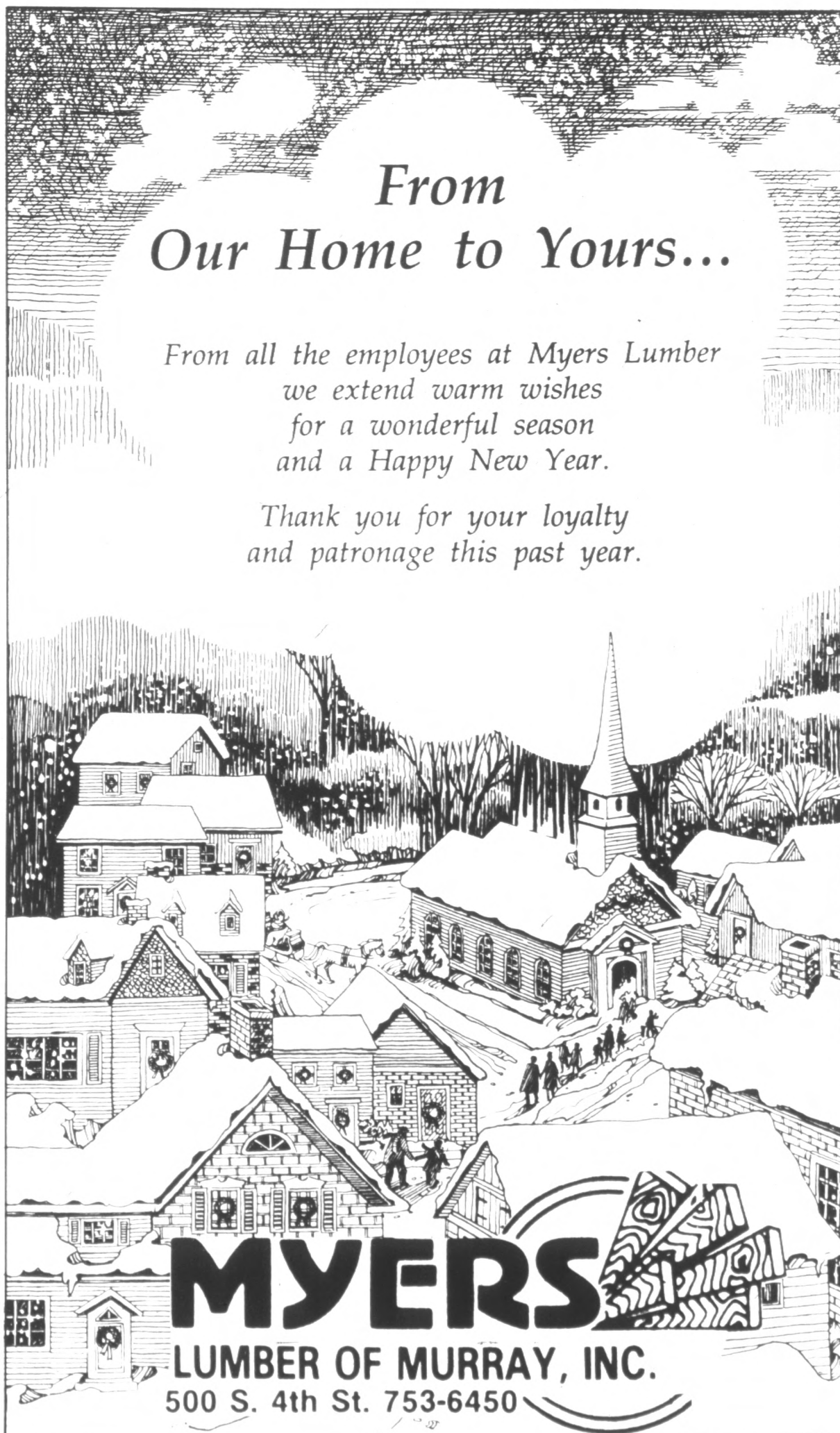

Expression must have some limits

Dear Editor:

I am writing regarding the reactions of several members of our community to the recently endorsed "Statement on Intolerance" at Murray State University. The overwhelmingly one-sided nature of the responses bespeak a need for such a statement, making explicit the value of tolerance of diversity within our community.

In our ongoing quest to deal with the effects of institutionalized intolerance, such as racism, sexism, and religious bigotry, we must deal with subtle issues critical to ending oppression. These issues were swept aside by a blanket of "free speech" and anti-P.C. rhetoric in many of the previous letters regarding the statement. The arguments appeared to be an Orwellian type of group speak that predictably made reference to our common enemies the Nazis and Big Brother. I'm surprised they did not make reference to the evil empire or the Commies. I'd like to take a different approach and appeal to your sense of justice and pragmatism rather than scare you into taking my position.

The first point I would like to make is that the document referred to is a statement. There is no personnel or student judiciary action associated with the statement. In other words, no one will be punished for what might be considered intolerance as a result of the university's endorsement of the statement. It is not a speech code. It simply states the university's commitment to tolerance of diversity which is essential to critical thinking and the education process.

Despite the fact that Murray State's "Statement on Intolerance" is not a speech code, it seems clear that there must be some limits on expression in a democracy to insure that all members have the opportunity to participate in the democratic process. The founders of our country understood this and placed limits in the constitution. Subsequent legislation and case law have also placed explicit and implicit limits on expression which help ensure a free exchange of ideas not only for those holding the popular opinion or empowered position in our society, but also for those who find themselves disenfranchised or holding an unpopular opinion.

My father frequently said, "Your rights end where another person's begin." A more precise interpretation relevant to this discussion might be that an individual's rights should be tempered when they begin to deny someone else their rights. Considering our right to free expression in this context ensures that all citizens have the opportunity to participate in our democracy. This includes assuring that people are able to work and learn in environments free of discrimination, intimidation, and abuse which are ultimately fed and sustained by intolerance.

Despite our frame of reference or opinion, we are all capable of tolerance. As a result it seems a reasonable goal, although I hope that we, as a society, might move beyond tolerance to acceptance of disenfranchised groups at some point in our future.

In conclusion, I would like to commend Dr. Don Robertson and the Board of Regents for taking a stand based on principle rather than popular opinion. In addition, I'd like to urge those of you interested in what the statement says to read the document yourself and draw your own conclusions, rather than to rely solely on the interpretations of those of us who have written letters.

I'd like to set the record straight on the issue of KEA's decision not to sponsor a statewide spelling bee this year.

KEA began sponsoring a statewide spelling bee in 1976 as part of the national bicentennial. Frankly, we originally saw this as a one-year event, but our members enjoyed their volunteer work in it and continued it each year.

When KEA made up its budget for this year, we found our limited resources were stretched. We reviewed our financial commitments and, even more importantly, our time resources. Our members' time is their most precious and most scarce resource, as we have already mentioned today. Our members don't have the time to do what they must do in their classrooms right now.

Since the spelling bee was conducted almost completely by unpaid teacher volunteers, we decided to take one thing off their plates this year and not conduct our spelling bee. This activity was by no means the only item eliminated from our budget. We also eliminated regional conferences, because our members found they took more time than training sessions conducted in their school districts and schools. We also reduced our public relations budget in order to be able to maintain all our KERA-related services to members.

Our decision was a practical one, not a philosophical one. We are NOT opposed to spelling bees or any other sort of healthy competition among students. We have traditionally given financial support to academic competition, to the Governor's Scholars program and to the Governor's School for the Arts. All of these programs are competitive. In addition, KEA is in its second year of sponsoring a competitive essay and poster contest.

I want to be very clear that we support healthy competition. We support students' learning basic skills. Our members work hard everyday in Kentucky's classrooms to teach students healthy competition and basic skills.

If there is another group that would like to adopt a big statewide project like the spelling bee, we would welcome them. We would be glad to sit down with them and tell them how we have conducted it and provide the guidance for their efforts.

Am I the only one confused by the recent message from Frankfort?

After three months of squabbling and sweating, Gov. Brereton Jones' Higher Education Review Commission has recommended the elimination of 203 college programs.

Wow!

No "wow" is in order. The commission admits this action won't save much money. Then they turned around and endorsed Jones' compromise to keep the two dental schools as well as the three law schools intact.

In other words, the commission did nothing that requires political courage.

And I guess I don't blame them.

Why should they?

Consider that Senate President John "Eck" Rose and House Speaker Joe Clarke held a press conference last week for the expressed purpose of saying the General Assembly wouldn't close the University of Kentucky's dental school nor did they expect the legislators to make any overhaul of the system.

I don't doubt Rose and Clarke know what they are talking about.

I also think it is a reflection of how ineffectual Jones is viewed by the General Assembly.

With his lack of focus and

shoot from the mouth tactics, Jones has talked away much of his political muscle.

The dental school compromise is maddening on two accounts.

First, Jones plans to let Medicaid account for more of their budgets, freeing state money. Then, the commission adds its own twist by recommending that the General Assembly devote the "captured" state money to UK's engineering program.

It amazes me that Jones is still clinging to the idea of developing a nationally ranked engineering program at UK. He can't even properly fund the eight universities now.

He has asked each university to justify its programs.

Governor, justify keeping two dental schools with combined budgets of \$14 million. Kentucky is the smallest state with two dental schools and they are both among the 10 smallest in the nation.

Governor, justify maintaining three law schools at UK, U of L and Northern Kentucky.

Governor, justify the \$60 million long-term price tag your engineering school will cost us.

It is disheartening to have Murray State University President Ronald Kurth support keeping the two dental schools when money used to support just one would help ease the financial drain on the six regional schools.

Kurth said in a *Ledger* story earlier this week: "The schools have worked out a funding relationship that makes them less dependent on state appropriations. There is tremendous support among the populace for both schools. They are serving the needy families in the region. My feeling is that it is easy to have a simplified view of the situation. The fact is both are serving very real needs in the state."

I don't doubt that U of L and UK dental schools do and could provide treatment for needy families. But a program can be designed — or at least explored — that could provide dental care under the direction of only one

school. Such a program could enlist the dental techs and nursing majors being trained around the state.

I guess some would call that a simplified view of the situation. I would call it trying to find ways to better use our resources.

Some have said, including Kurth, that it was not the commission's goal to generate a dollar figure of savings.

Yet, Jones told the commission in September: "The streamlining and restructuring of higher education would result in a system that focuses on performance and quality while reducing duplication and focusing support for expensive professional programs."

"Achievement of these goals would mean that higher education has undergone a very significant reform that places it on equal footing with the elementary and secondary reform agenda in Kentucky."

Come on, does he really think this was accomplished?

What was accomplished was many sleepless nights for faculty and staff who have worried about their jobs.

I think our assistant general manager Dwain McIntosh was right.

The commission's report should have been named after a Shakespearean play: "Much Ado About Nothing."



Solving the crime in our midst

NEW YORK — How predictable. After the carnage on the Long Island Railroad commuter train recently, politicians called for more laws to address the growing incidence of crimes against innocent humanity.

Congress and the 50 state legislatures pass more laws every year than used to be passed in the lifetime of an average citizen. Each anti-crime bill is styled as tougher than previous ones — yet crime increases and people are more afraid. The lawless do not respect laws. If they did, crime would have declined by now in the legislative and rhetorical avalanche.

Amazingly, some liberals and conservatives are starting to sing the same tune on the causes of crime and societal collapse. Though they don't agree on the treatment, they concur on the diagnoses.

Television producer and political activist Norman Lear addressed the National Press Club last week, and a lot of what he said could have come from Bill Bennett or Dan Quayle. "At no time in my life," said the 71-year-old Lear, "has our culture been so estranged from spiritual values ... our problems lie beyond the reach of politics alone."

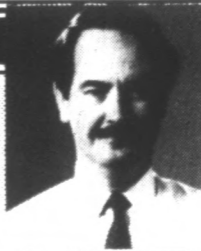
Lear blamed materialism and "a numbers-oriented culture based on what we can grasp and count. We have lost touch with the best of humanity — the inner life."

Charles Colson, Richard Nixon's tough on crime "hatchet man," is in harmony with Lear when he writes of the most terrifying thing that can happen to a society: the death of

conscience in its young people.

"Crime is a mirror not just of a community's families," writes Colson, "but also of its moral state. A society cannot long survive if the demands of human dignity are not written on our hearts."

The Clinton Administration's initial response to the Long Island commuter train massacre was more money for more police and more gun control laws. But Colson correctly notes: "No number of police can enforce order; no threat of punishment can create it. Crime and violence frustrate every political answer, because there can be no solution apart from character and creed."

No government program can solve America's core problem,

which is, as Norman Lear put it, "a hunger for connectedness." Our problems are not economic and political. They are moral and spiritual — and must be addressed on that level if real solutions are to be found.

Both President and Mrs. Clinton have been experimenting with the rhetoric of the spirit in recent months. Even if they are not right about everything, they (and Norman Lear) are on to something that all of us know to be true. We are missing the link of virtue that holds a nation together. It is not a crisis in government — it is a crisis in us.

Virtue, morals, respect for law and other people are not concepts that are caught, like a strain of flu.

They are not acquired by human nature. In fact, they must be taught, even imposed. Today, tragically, our culture, steeped in the deviant and the base, seems to create sick souls, who kidnap and kill children in California and Missouri and mow down innocent commuters in New York.

News reports suggest the beginning of what may be a spiritual revival in Russia. It appears many Russians are recovering what they once had but lost. It also appears too many Americans have abandoned what we once had but gave away — not to a dictator but to decadence. These two nations are like huge ships passing in the night, headed in opposite directions.

Russia, a nation whose leaders for most of this century sought to eliminate God and impose a rigid political and financial system that caused poverty, death and destruction, is now embracing capitalism and rushing toward God like a repentant sinner.

At the same time, America is heading toward Russia's old port, embracing bigger and more centralized government and throwing off the blessings of liberty and its Creator.

Which nation will have the merrier Christmas and brighter hope for the New Year? Which nation has the better chance for revival and reformation? In Russia, there appears to be "room in the inn" for the One who has the answer. In America we have hung out the "no vacancy" sign.

Trooper says Clinton never offered job for silence

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — An Arkansas trooper says neither he nor his colleagues were offered jobs by President Clinton in return for their silence, contradicting a key allegation by two troopers who say they helped arrange extramarital affairs for Clinton when he was governor.

"President Clinton never offered or indicated a willingness to offer any trooper a job in exchange for silence or help in shaping their stories," Danny Ferguson said in a statement.

Larry Patterson and Roger Perry, and their attorney, Cliff Jackson, have said Clinton offered jobs to troopers in exchange for silence about his alleged affairs with various women. Lengthy stories in the Los Angeles Times and the American Spectator contained this allegation.

The White House acknowledged this week that Clinton had

spoken recently with members of his old Arkansas security detail, but the White House said the calls were proper and Clinton denied he made any job offers.

Robert Batton, Ferguson's attorney, supported the White House's story.

Batton said his client did speak by phone with Clinton in early September and inquired whether the president received a memo from Perry requesting a position on one of the president's councils on drugs.

Clinton was unaware of such a request, Batton said, but said he would try to track down Perry's request and asked Ferguson to get in touch with Perry to find out the content of Perry's memo and to get back in touch with Clinton. Batton said no further discussions took place.

Jackson said in response that his clients "stand by their full

story, specifically the calls from Bill Clinton to Danny Ferguson offering a job both to Ferguson and to Perry."

Jackson said a former aide to Clinton was running interference for the president. Betsey Wright, a Washington consultant who was Clinton's former gubernatorial chief of staff, was in Little Rock this week and returned to Washington on Wednesday. She said she spoke with several people about the episode and the desire for a statement disputing the allegation of jobs for silence.

Earlier Wednesday, Patterson and Perry said going public has left them isolated.

"I'm scared to death. I've never felt so alone in my life," Perry told reporters. He said he decided to come forward with the allegations against the president because "I thought the American people ought to know this man."

At the White House, Clinton denounced their allegations and said, "They're outrageous and they're not so."

The troopers accused Clinton of promising other troopers jobs to keep quiet about his exploits, but said they had not asked for or received a job offer.

"I did not ask Bill Clinton for a job. I would have liked to have been offered one but I wouldn't have accepted it," Patterson said. He said all he ever asked Clinton for was a lateral transfer within the state police and to take a photograph with him. Both were promised but neither was delivered, he said.

Jackson and co-counsel Lynn Davis said they hadn't been paid and wouldn't be unless the troopers profit from a possible later book deal or some other kind of deal.

wealth probably has enough evidence to make a case.

Jones said restitution has been paid and all those sentenced to 100 hours of community service have fulfilled that requirement.

"We'll check on restitution and at some point in time, probably after the first of the year, we'll get an order out," Foust said.

Foust will consider the motion to expunge as a motion to vacate and dismiss.

The 13 men include: Jason Aaron Miller, Roy Dane Chandler, Todd Wilson Throgmorton, Chad Allen Parker, David Cowger, David L. Jackson, Michael T. Dock, David Bumpus, Frederick D. Casey, Brian Berryman, Scott Tyler Curling, Nicholas Winsett and Brandon L. Hayes.

Criminal charges against Cowger were dismissed in June. At that time, Hopkins told the court the Commonwealth did not have enough evidence against Cowger to convict.

Dock agreed to a pretrial diversion in which he performed 100 hours of community service, have no other criminal offenses other than minor traffic violations, abide by the rules and regulations of MSU and pay restitution.

Dock's case was handled separately because Hopkins said the

circumstances were different.

The plea agreement the 11 other defendants entered into included 60 days in jail suspended for two years under the following conditions: perform 100 hours of community service, commit no criminal offense other than minor traffic violations, follow all rules of MSU and pay restitution.

Tami Clark filed a civil complaint in Calloway County Circuit Court Aug. 16 which included her son, born March 25, and her sister, Tari Tucker.

The civil complaint charges that the pledges "overpowered the husband of Plaintiff Tami Tucker Clark, blindfolded him, handcuffed him, taped his feet together and removed him from his home, all in the presence of plaintiff."

These actions, along with the destruction of some of the Clark's personal property, caused Tami Clark to suffer "severe and permanent bodily injuries, physical pain, suffering and great mental distress, aggravated by her fear of losing her baby, incurred medical expenses and will continue to suffer said pain, suffering and mental distress and incur future medical expenses for the rest of her life as a result of the incident," according to the complaint.

Other claims were filed on behalf of Clark's infant son which include charges that Allen Quinn was "severely and permanently injured."

Tari Tucker, who was present during the incident, has claimed she was assaulted and abused and has incurred medical bills as well as pain and mental distress.

Other allegations stated in the complaint are against the local and national Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity.

The plaintiffs charge that the 13 pledges and other members have "harassed and abused plaintiffs...including altering their schedule of course work at Murray State University to avoid such harassment, and causing them great mental anguish."

"Clark, her son and Tucker also allege that both the national and local fraternity were negligent in its control of the defendants and "hazing" activities.

Action was also taken against the Pike Kappa Alpha local fraternity by Murray State's judicial board Feb. 2.

The board found the fraternity guilty of hazing and issued several sanctions, which included excluding the fraternity from the spring 1993 rush.

One defendant named in the

suit has filed a counter claim.

Parker, under counsel of Paducah attorney Mary E. Byrd, alleges that the plaintiff, Clark, was negligent in not exercising ordinary care for her own safety and that of her unborn child.

Parker demands the complaint against him be dismissed and the plaintiff be awarded no recovery or judgment and that he be awarded judgment against plaintiffs for his costs and all other relief to which he may be entitled.

A court date for the civil action has not been set.

Cold sores may be traced to food allergies

CHICAGO (AP) — People who suffer from recurrent cold sores may be experiencing food allergies, according to the Academy of General Dentistry. "About 10 percent of all cold sores could be caused by an allergy to food," says Dr. Michael Goldstein, spokesman for the academy. Goldstein says researchers at the Glasgow Dental Hospital and School in Scotland conducted patch-testing for food allergies on 21 patients with repeated cold sores, and 20 of the patients exhibited allergic reactions. Eleven reacted to benzoic acid, a common food preservative. They were asked to avoid the substance. When they were checked three years later, 10 reported great improvement. "Cold sores can also be caused by too much stress, a deficiency of the iron protein complex ferritin, or a lack of vitamins such as B12, folic acid, B1 or B6," Goldstein adds.

Easy-to-use methods given to help insomnia

Almost everyone experiences insomnia now and then. Fortunately, there are easy-to-use methods that can help one get a good night's sleep.

The most typical kind of insomnia is temporary difficulty in falling asleep because of a tense or disturbing situation.

Any stressful situation, including a death in the family, a financial problem, or a stressful situation at work or at school, can cause insomnia. This type of insomnia goes away when the situation is resolved. In severe cases, temporary use of a prescription sleeping pill can help.

Generally, sleep medications shouldn't be taken for more than about a week, and then only under medical supervision. Prolonged use can actually make insomnia worse because of rebound effects or dependency.

Sleep disturbances may persist for weeks, months, or years. Older people complain more frequently about sleep disturbances. One of the easy-to-use methods to get a good night's sleep is an improvement of sleep hygiene.

For example, napping during the day can interfere with sleep at night. And going to bed early just to toss and turn is counterproductive.

It makes sense to go to bed at the same hour every night in a quiet room.

Getting up at the same hour every morning and not going back to bed also will help the body find a comfortable sleep time.

Having a glass of milk before bedtime can help. Taking a drink can hurt, because alcohol can interfere with the normal pattern of sleep. Eating a large meal in the evening, the use of excessive fluids and the use of stimulants such as coffee or tea in the afternoon or later can interfere with sleep. All should be avoided.

Sometimes, however, these measures don't work, perhaps because there is an underlying problem, either medical or psychological. It's when ordinary measures don't help that professional assistance should be sought.

For example, arthritis and other conditions that cause pain and discomfort can make sleep difficult. Sometimes medications interfere with sleep — for instance, some drugs prescribed for asthma.

Persistent anxieties or psychiatric disorders can underlie insomnia. Undiagnosed depression is one condition that often results in sleeplessness.

Psychiatric therapy or counseling can help by revealing and easing the underlying problem.

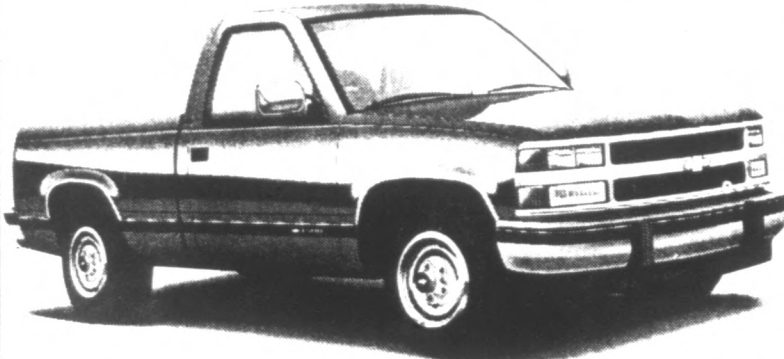

Study suggests 'good fat' may fight obesity in humans

NEW YORK (AP) — A helpful kind of body fat actually fights obesity in mice, and may play the same role in people, a researcher says.

The fat is unusual because it burns off more calories than it needs, said Dr. Bradford Lowell.

"It's a tremendous way to waste a lot of calories," said Lowell, an endocrinologist at Harvard Medical School and Beth Israel Hospital in Boston.

He and colleagues tested its effect on obesity by creating two strains of mice with greatly reduced amounts of the fat, which is brown rather than white and is called brown adipose tissue. That was done by giving the mice a synthetic gene that destroyed most of their brown fat.

Mice in one strain, which had about a 70 percent reduction, became "massively obese," Lowell said in a telephone interview.

Mice in the other strain, which had a 95 percent reduction, also became quite obese by the time they were 16 days old, he said. But then, for reasons not well understood, their brown fat returned and their obesity went away, Lowell said.

The work is reported in Thursday's issue of the journal Nature.

Brown fat burns lots of calories because its metabolic fireplaces, called mitochondria, keep working regardless of how much energy the fat itself needs.

Since brown fat has been found in human adults, "it is certainly possible that it plays an important role in humans, too," Lowell said. "That will require further studies."

Lowell said some pharmaceutical companies have been trying to develop drugs to activate brown fat in humans as an obesity treatment.

Dr. Jeffrey Friedman, who studies obesity at the Howard Hughes Medical Institute Research Laboratories at Rockefeller University in New York, said the work "suggests that brown fat can be an important player in the pathways that control body weight."

"It's just not known yet to what extent differences in body weight among humans can be accounted for by the differences in the activity of brown fat," he said.

Military delegation rebuffed by Haiti Army, heads home

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Left cooling their heels all day in the French embassy, military representatives from the United States and three other countries abruptly returned to Washington after threatening Haiti's army with expanded sanctions.

The U.S., French, Venezuelan and Canadian officers, in a mission backed by the United Nations, left behind a note Wednesday. The army has until Jan. 15 to "comply actively and comprehensively" with a U.N.-brokered agreement calling for the army to allow the return of exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide.

If not, Haiti's military leaders could face expansion of the current U.N. oil and arms embargo into a universal trade embargo, a blockade limiting non-commercial air traffic in and out of Haiti, and further personal sanctions such as the freezing of overseas assets, the officers' memorandum said.

In a statement read at the airport, the four representatives said they had waited all day to tell army chief Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras personally that they supported a national conference to seek a solution to the political stalemate.

"Unfortunately Gen. Cedras replied negatively to the request of the four friendly countries for a direct interview," the statement said.

A high-ranking Haitian officer, who spoke on condition of anonymity, called it "infuriating" that the officers came without invitation.

The French embassy wrote to

Cedras last week asking for an appointment, charge d'affaires Philippe Selz told The Associated Press. Cedras replied he did not want to receive the delegation, and a second letter was never answered, Selz said.

Asked why the delegation would fly to Haiti knowing it was not welcome, Selz replied, "We can't just sit still and do nothing."

"The fact that we were not received is not important. The essential thing is that the army has the (memorandum) in hand," he said. "Now it is up to them."

The French delegate, Maj. Gen. Daniel Roudelle, said he did not consider the visit a failure.

"One cannot fail when one is working for peace," he said.

Diplomatic representatives from the four countries met Monday with Aristide, Haiti's first democratically elected president but considered too far to the left in his politics for the military and some of the Haiti elite. He was ousted by the army in September 1991.

Aristide, who now lives in Washington, refused to support the conference. He said he would need to be physically present and it was too dangerous for him or his aides to return home now.

Army-backed gunmen have terrorized the country, one of the poorest in the world, for months.

Haiti has been sent further reeling from the international oil embargo, which is aimed at pressuring the army to allow Aristide's return. Critics say the embargo is hurting Haiti's people more than the military.

No end to shelling, sniping in Bosnia despite cease-fire

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Shelling and sniping in Sarajevo and heavy fighting in central Bosnia today made a mockery of a Christmas truce hours after it supposedly took effect.

In the battered Bosnian capital, hundreds of explosions were heard in the early morning. The deadly stretch of road known as "Sniper Alley" was active, with sniper fire at many intersections.

The few people who ventured onto the streets did so only in relatively safe areas, dashing across exposed intersections.

In central Bosnia, dozens of people were reported killed in heavy fighting between Bosnian Croat and Muslim-led government forces in the hours before the cease-fire was supposed to take effect at midnight Wednesday.

Vesko Vegar, a spokesman for Bosnian Croat forces, put the casualty toll at 49, mostly civilians, in the hotly contested areas of Vitez, Novi Travnik, Busovaca and a village near Gornji Vakuf.

Bosnian radio had reported Wednesday that Croat forces lobbed more than 3,000 shells at Gornji Vakuf.

Vegar blamed government forces for what he called "the worst casualty number" of any day in central Bosnia.

"There is no cease-fire at all," Vegar said today, charging that government forces had continued their offensive after capturing a village Wednesday near Gornji Vakuf.

Leaders of the warring factions were to meet international mediators Lord Owen and Thorvald Stoltenberg today in Brussels, after a similar gathering with European foreign ministers yielded only the accord on the supposed Christmas cease-fire.

Countless truces have been agreed and immediately broken in Bosnia's 20-month war, which has left at least 200,000 people dead or missing and made more than 2 million people homeless.

Heavy fighting accompanying peace talks abroad also has been typical during the war, as each side tries to grab land ahead of a possible peace settlement.

Today's fighting followed sharp Serb and Croat attacks on government forces Wednesday.

Serb gunners on the hills ringing Sarajevo lobbed an estimated 1,800 shells onto the town and Bosnian government forces dug in on Zuc mountain immediately to the north.

It was the heaviest shelling of the capital in two months.

Fighting also was reported Wednesday along battle lines in northern and central Bosnia.

In other developments: —No progress was made on the land issue in Wednesday's talks in Brussels, despite the efforts of the European Community and international mediators to seal a peace by year's end.

—The United Nations resumed relief flights to Sarajevo after a one-day suspension because a cargo plane was fired on Monday. U.N. officials said Serbs were responsible for the attack.

—The New York Times said today it erred in calling a CIA report about Bosnia a formal statement.

The report, purportedly embodying the agency's conclusions on the conflict, said the economic embargo imposed on Serbia would deteriorate, and that the West would probably have to accept the ethnic partition of Bosnia.

But today, the newspaper said the report reflected only discussions among analysts and not the judgment of the agency.

Community updates 'A Christmas Carol'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Ghost of Christmas Present is a rotund rapper. Jacob Marley shows up as a CNN anchor and Tiny Tim — now T.T. — is paralyzed from a random gunshot.

And in this variation of the Charles Dickens classic, "A Christmas Carol," the story unfolds in inner-city Washington instead of 19th century London.

"When Dickens wrote it, it was a completely modern, urban event. But it has become a cliché for nostalgia," said Bill Rauch, the director of "A Community Carol" at Washington's Arena Stage.

The script follows Dickens' 150-year-old novella closely, but it adds some references to contemporary culture — jokes about President Clinton's cat, Socks, references to Whoopi Goldberg and jibes at Congress.

The 2½-hour musical is not only an entertaining remake of a holiday classic, it also has been an ambitious experiment in bridging established theater with underserved communities.

The play is set in the Anacostia neighborhood, separated from the rest of the nation's capital by a river. It is an area with a rich civil rights history and strong working class but suffers from the effects of violent crime and poverty.

Neighborhood residents helped shape the play, make up about half of the 35-member cast and fill crucial backstage roles.

Like much of the cast, Ebenezer Scrooge is black, played by film veteran and Howard University artistic director Al Freeman Jr.

And unlike many renditions of "A Christmas Carol," Rauch and the other writers used several choruses to weave in Dickens' narrative voice, in this case a cadre of lawyers, electric utility workers and homeless people.

Residents decided that the chorus of gang members should have white and black members and that Scrooge's former girlfriend, Belle, would hold traditional African-American Kwanzaa celebrations with her family.

"That meant something to me, to have my concerns listened to," said Kemi Morten, a local community activist who plays Belle and fought for some of the changes.

Thirteen-year-old D'Vaughn Spencer was so excited about his first acting part — Scrooge as a young boy — he dreamt that the greedy businessman's younger sister should reach out from his past and touch the elder Scrooge's cheek with a kiss.

Rauch listened, and a scene was born. By combining the talents of enthusiastic novice actors with that of seasoned professionals — and doing it at a nationally known theater — the play's crea-

tors say they are trying to forge the future of American theater.

"This project has been a kind of microcosmic picture of the kind of dimension that American theater can attain," said Doug Wager, the artistic director for Arena Stage.

Wager saw the project — a collaborative effort between Arena, the Smithsonian's Anacostia Museum and Rauch's ensemble, Cornerstone Theater Company — as both a risk and a necessity.

Now permanently in Los Angeles, Cornerstone has put on cooperative projects like this one since 1986, revamping classic productions to reflect communities' histories and concerns.

Donna Norris, Arena's receptionist who landed a minor role in "A Community Carol," said the experience has been breathtaking. She sees the community's involvement as a much-needed chance to be seen in a positive light.

"It has changed many lives," said S. Robert Morgan, an accomplished stage and film actor who plays Dick Wilkins, a friend from Scrooge's past.

Money from the play's proceeds will benefit future theater projects in the community.

Josephine Wharton, a 47-year Anacostia resident and self-described "wrangler" of the 13 local children in the play, hopes the experience will encourage some of Anacostia's young people.

"It was an opportunity for the disadvantaged children in this community to come from a little bud to blossom into actors," she said.

"A Community Carol" plays at Arena Stage, 6th Street and Maine Avenue SW, Washington, through Jan. 2. Some tickets are available on a pay-as-you-can basis.

KENTUCKY BACKROADS

MANITOU, Ky. (AP) — When a grateful Virginia legislature honored its Revolutionary War heroes, the lawmakers didn't forget the Prussian officer who whipped George Washington's bedraggled, half-frozen army into shape at Valley Forge.

The legislature voted Friedrich Wilhelm Augustus von Steuben an 11,000-acre land grant around what would become the Manitou community in Hopkins County. "It was called Steuben's Lick for many years," said J.T. Gooch, a history professor at Madisonville Community College.

A soldier of fortune who styled himself a "baron" to impress the Americans, von Steuben visited his land in 1787. According to one story, he wasn't exactly welcomed by the previous owners.

A band of Indians, possibly en route to the salt lick and sulphur spring on von Steuben's property, attacked the baron's party. There wasn't much bloodshed, Gooch said. Nonetheless, the encounter may have convinced von Steuben to sell the land on which the tiny Steuben's Lick community sprang up about three miles northwest of Madisonville, the Hopkins County seat.

The baron, who became an American citizen and settled in New York City, apparently never returned to western Kentucky, Gooch said. In any event, von Steuben's New York home was a far cry from the rude huts of frigid Valley Forge, Pa., in the snowy winter of 1778.

Washington's chief training officer, von Steuben forced the ill-disciplined colonial troops through a tough regimen of marching and drill, which emphasized, among other things, that bayonets weren't for roasting

chickens over campfires.

Resplendent in a Prussian blue uniform, von Steuben awed the Americans, cursing them in German and broken French. Reputedly, when he ran out of German and French expletives, he ordered his American aide to swear for him in English.

Almost a century after von Steuben visited what became Steuben's Lick, it was renamed Manitou. According to Robert M. Rennie's book, "Kentucky Place Names," a local man had visited Manitou Springs, Colo., and was struck by "the close similarity of the 2 springs." Rennie added, "Manitou, an Algonquian word referring to the spirit or presence believed to pervade all living things, has a secondary meaning of 'powerful,' which was said to describe aptly the healing effects of water."

Rennie also wrote that Steuben's Lick originally may have been called Tywhopity, which was supposedly the Indian name for the mineral spring.

There are two other versions of why Steuben's Lick became Manitou. But both seem unlikely.

Rennie wrote that the Louisville & Nashville Railroad allegedly sent a man to investigate the possibility of running a rail line through Steuben's Lick. The man reported that there wasn't much to the place, adding that he saw just "a man or two."

John Robertson, a Paducah Community College history professor who had relatives in the Manitou area, suggested, tongue-in-cheek, another variant. "Supposedly, Steuben's Lick was a thriving place until a big tornado hit town. Afterwards, there was only a 'man or two' left."

Mussel diver drowns

PARIS, Tenn. (AP) — A Henry County mussel diver has drowned in Kentucky Lake.

Darrell McFadden, 38, was diving Tuesday afternoon off the Piney Campground area of Land Between the Lakes, his cousin, Mark Medlock, told authorities.

Medlock said he was on the boat when he noticed there were no bubbles coming to the surface

from McFadden's air supply. Medlock said he hoisted McFadden to the boat and took him to Paris Landing Marina.

A park ranger attempted cardiopulmonary resuscitation and emergency workers continued the efforts for the 30-minute drive to Henry County Medical Center.

McFadden was pronounced dead shortly after his arrival there.

Anthrus Carter, stabbed in the chest last Sunday, returned to Racer Arena Wednesday night after a 10-day fight for his life in the hospital. The Denver, Colo., native was announced before the game as an honorary starter.

crowd of 3,193. "I wouldn't say it made us play any better, but it was great to see him there and not in the hospital.

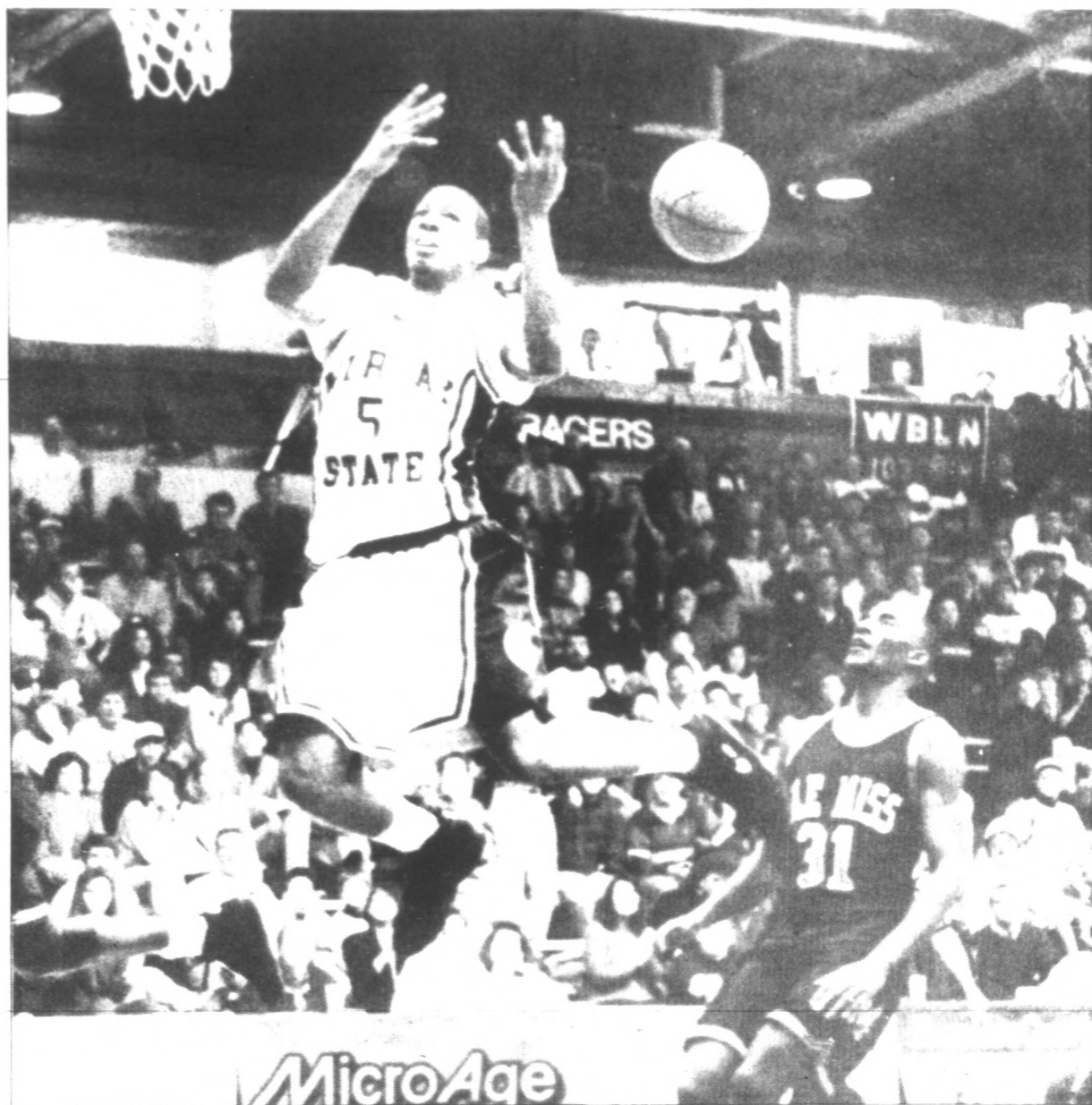
"Last week was so emotional, it was great just to see him up," Brown added. "We have to thank the fans for caring and showing their dedication to Anthrus."

Cardinals force issue in OT win over WKU

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Louisville wanted to win so bad it almost lost.

"We were trying too hard," Louisville center Clifford Rozier said after the No. 11 Cardinals defeated No. 25 Western Kentucky 78-73 in overtime Wednesday night. "We all got frustrated. If we let things come to us, I think we would have beaten them bad."

Freshman guard DeJuan Wheat scored 24 points, including a 3-pointer at the start of overtime to give Louisville the lead for good over its intrastate rival.

"We knew if we either stayed tied or a little ahead we'd be OK," Wheat said.

Louisville (5-1) squandered a 65-56 lead in the final 4:08 of regulation as the Hilltoppers rallied to pull even at 66 on Mike Fralix's layup with 49.8 seconds to go.

Greg Minor hit two free throws to give Louisville a 68-66 edge at 37.5, but Fralix, who led Western Kentucky (3-2) with a career-high 24 points, hit an 8-footer in the lane to tie the game with 6.4 seconds to go.

Western Kentucky deflected Louisville's ensuing inbounds pass out of bounds with three seconds to go, and then stole the ball but Danyell Macklin's 60-foot shot fell short of the goal.

Louisville, which lost 78-77 to the Hilltoppers last season, went up 71-68 when Wheat hit a 3-pointer from the corner 34 seconds into the overtime period.

Western Kentucky's Cypheus Bunton made two free throws 21 seconds later. Louisville's Clifford Rozier countered with a dunk off a pass from Tick Rogers, and after Fralix misfired on a 3-pointer from the right wing, Minor scored a layup off a goaltending call for a 75-70 advantage with 3:11 to go.

Western Kentucky's Darius Hall slipped inside for a layup and Jeff Rogers hit a free throw to slice the margin to 75-73 with 1:38 left. Jason Osborne came back with a 15-foot baseline

Wildcats shoot past Buckeyes

LAHAINA, Hawaii (AP) — Rick Pitino was really happy with Kentucky's offense and pretty upset with its defense.

The fifth-ranked Wildcats (6-1) beat Ohio State 100-88 Wednesday night to advance to the championship game of the Maui Invitational.

"We did great things offensively, but I was disappointed with our defense," he said even

though Ohio State (5-3) committed 22 turnovers against the pressure defense, most in the early stages of the game. "Last night, I thought we were over the hump defensively, but tonight we just tried to outscore them. Defense has to be the mainstay and we're not there yet."

What was there for Kentucky was the 3-pointer. Tony Delk was seven-for-11 on 3s and Travis Ford was four-for-10 and the long-range bombing offset Ohio State's advantage inside.

"In their last game they took the inside away," Pitino said. "Tonight we knew we could kick it out to Travis and Tony. We were just attacking their pressure and going for the shot just as

soon as we could find it." Tonight, the Wildcats will meet No. 13 Arizona, a 70-65 winner over No. 18 Boston College in Wednesday's other semifinal.

"We believe in having fun on offense and playing with intensity on defense," Pitino said. "Tonight all we had was fun. We've raised our level of intensity and this tournament atmosphere really helps."

"When we came out here we weren't as good as either Arizona or Boston College. Now, I think we can compete with whoever we play tomorrow night."

Ford finished with 27 points, including a 13-for-13 effort from

the free throw line, and Delk had 23 points.

"Kentucky's guard play was the big difference," Ohio State coach Randy Ayers said. "Delk and Ford are the best tandem we'll face this year. Their big-time 3s were the difference. We thought they'd try to isolate (Rodrick) Rhodes. Instead they were more assertive on the perimeter than we expected."

Ohio State's problem taking care of the ball was evident in the first half when the Buckeyes shot 58 percent from the field (14 of 24) yet trailed 53-43 after committing 12 turnovers.

The game started at a frantic

Lions' Sanders makes big deal of knee injury

DETROIT (AP) — Barry Sanders' knee injury may have been the key to the four-year, \$17.2 million deal he signed with the Detroit Lions.

"I believe the injury was a blessing in disguise because it didn't jeopardize his career but it let the Lions see just how important he is to the offense," agent Lamont Smith said Wednesday. "Sometimes it's difficult to see what you have until it's gone."

The Lions have won just once since Sanders sprained his knee Thanksgiving Day, and their playoff hopes have been hampered by the slump.

The contract signed Wednesday makes Sanders the highest-paid running back in the league, topping the four-year, \$13.6 million deal Emmitt Smith signed with Dallas. It also makes him the third-highest paid player overall, behind San Francisco's Steve Young — who makes a reported \$4.9 million a year — and Denver's John Elway, who gets a reported \$4.7 million.

Smith said he always assumed that Sanders, 25, would be the league's highest-paid back. He wanted to make sure he was among the top-paid players.

"He's more than a running back," Smith said. "He's the focus of the Detroit Lions' offense, the player they build the team around. And he accounts for about 40 percent of the Detroit Lions offense."

Mavs fall to Bucks; inch closer to mark

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Coach Quinn Buckner sees a bright future for his Dallas Mavericks — if only they can work past the misery of the present, including a 20-game losing streak that ties an NBA record.

"It is a struggle, but it's one we have to push through," Buckner said after his Mavericks built an early lead, only to lose 96-86 Wednesday night to the Milwaukee Bucks. "We have yet to put together 48 minutes (of good play). Until we do that, we will continue to struggle."

The Mavericks' season record slipped to 1-23 going into tonight's game with the Timberwolves at Minnesota — the same place Dallas won its only game on Nov. 12.

A loss would surpass the record of 20 consecutive losses in

a season set by the Philadelphia 76ers from Jan. 9 to Feb. 11, 1973. Cleveland has the overall record for losses with 24 straight over a two-season span in 1982.

That same 1972-73 Philadelphia team holds the record for least wins in a season with nine — a record Dallas threatened last season before a late spurt to 11 wins.

"The last two years have been a nightmare," said veteran guard Derek Harper of the Mavericks. "It's been frustrating. This is tough for anybody to deal with."

"It's extremely tough because you go out and work hard every night," said Mavericks guard Jim Jackson, a first-round draft pick last year. "Every time you lose, I don't care if it's one game or 20, it still hurts."

Jamal Mashburn, the Mavericks' top draft pick this year, finished with 29 points Wednesday

night and agreed with Buckner that once the team is able to play consistently well through an entire game, "we will be capable of beating many people."

"We can't just play half a ball game," he said. "We can't put that type of pressure on us."

Buckner says he's not distracted by the loss record and resulting media attention.

"The record just says something, quite frankly, historical, and it's a media kind of thing," he said, adding that his focus is on trying to improve game to game.

The Mavericks scored the first five points of the game on a three-point play by Mashburn and a reverse layup by Jackson. A jump shot by Fat Lever and free throw by Mashburn made it 25-18 after one quarter, but the Bucks took their first lead at

39-38 on Vin Baker's basket late in the half. Milwaukee led 46-42 at halftime and 71-60 after three periods.

Tim Legler's 3-pointer pulled Dallas to 71-63 early in the fourth quarter, but the Bucks scored on a layup by Baker, who later added two free throws to make it 76-64.

Dallas came back to 92-84 with 2:52 left on two free throws by Sean Rooks before a dunk by Day helped the Bucks pull away.

Buckner, in his first year of coaching at any level, said he doesn't regret taking the Dallas job.

"I knew we were going to have some trying times as you go through the success process," he said. "We're in one of those lulls and we've got to fight our way out of it. We're the only people who can fix this problem."

Simpson's top performance came in the regional playoffs when he rushed for 282 yards and four touchdowns against Meade County.

Simpson started the season by being named Most Valuable Player in the Recreation Bowl. He also was selected recipient of the Hornung Award and the Kentucky Network's overall Player of the Year.

Raines, others sign with former teams

NEW YORK (AP) — After nearly two months of negotiations, outfielder Tim Raines returned to the Chicago White Sox, agreeing to an \$11 million, three-year contract.

Several others also returned to old teams, with first baseman Gerald Perry and St. Louis agreeing at \$650,000, down \$150,000 from 1993.

Just two days after teams tried to avoid salary arbitration, infielder Keith Miller and outfielder Chris Gwynn re-signed with the Royals, pitcher Shawn Boskie with the Cubs and infielder Bill Spiers with Milwaukee.

The Yankees signed Sam Horn, who had four homers and eight RBIs in 12 games for Cleveland last season, to a minor-league contract.

Infielder Tim Jones agreed to a minor-league contract with Cleveland as did outfielder Chris Jones with the Rockies. Pitcher Chris Hammond and Florida agreed at \$925,000.

Vaughn's buzzer-beater sinks Hoosiers

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — When Bob Knight visited Jacque Vaughn last year, hoping to convince the star point guard to come to Indiana, neither could have foreseen what a cold December night in Kansas would bring.

Vaughn ended up picking Kansas over the Hoosiers and on Wednesday night he hit a 3-pointer with less than a second left to give sixth-ranked Jayhawks an 86-83 victory over Knight and No. 12 Indiana (5-2).

"It seemed very strange to beat him. I have so much respect for coach Knight," Vaughn said. "That's what college basketball is all about."

Of the final shot, Vaughn said "I gave a head fake. I was just trying to draw a foul (Todd Leary retreated enough for me to get my legs under me and get up in the air and it went in."

Vaughn has shown signs of possible stardom during his 12 games with Kansas (11-1). He has become the starter at point guard for a coach who is suspicious of playing freshman.

"Sometimes special people are put in special situations like that," Kansas coach Roy Williams said. "Sometimes youngsters are given an opportunity to make big plays and Jacque made that. That was a shot and a prayer and it was answered. He'll remember that for the rest of his life."

After a sloppy first half in which each team struggled to shoot 37 percent, Damon Bailey came alive for the Hoosiers to score 30 of his career-high 36 points.

The teams shot just over 37 percent in a first half that ended with Kansas leading 33-30. The top scorers for each team had trouble. Bailey had only six points and Woodberry was scoreless.

Woodberry hit a 3-pointer to start the second half and the Jayhawks went on to take a 39-30 lead.

Kansas led throughout the second half until Pat Graham consecutive 3-pointers put Indiana ahead 68-65 with 1:14 to play.

Kansas made all six of its free throws in the overtime Indiana 4-of-5.

Graham finished with 22 points and Alan Henderson had 17 in the first half.

Richard Scott led the Jayhawks with 23 points and 10 rebounds. Vaughn and Woodberry had 10 points each.

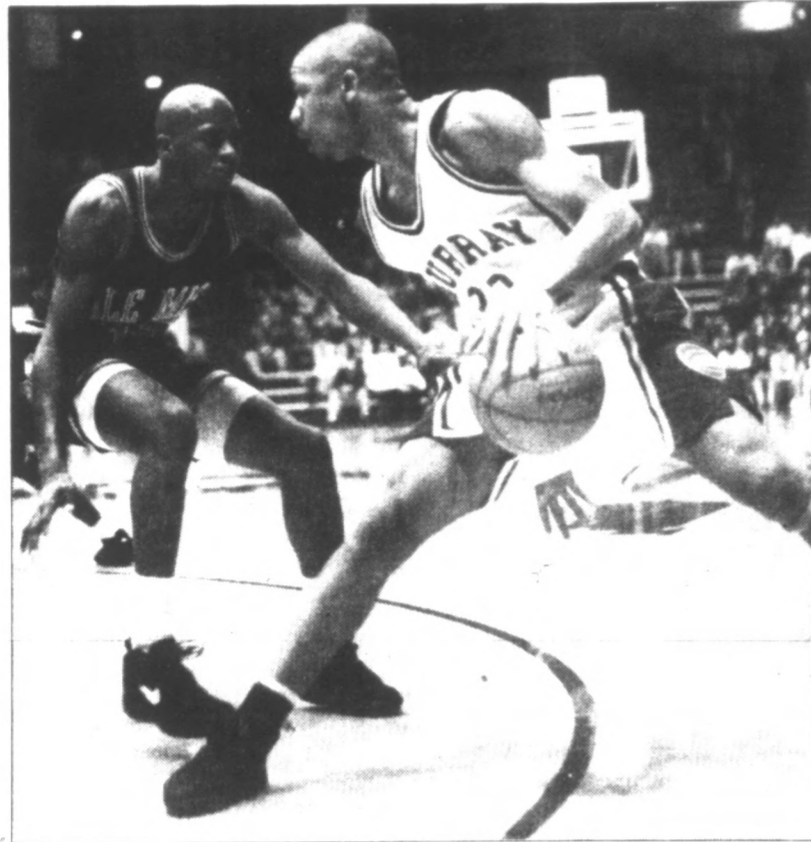
Both teams have had trouble shooting this season and each finished at 42 percent after better than 50 percent in the three previous games.

Racers forced the Rebels into 19 turnovers and limited them to 30 percent shooting. Offensively, Murray was 18 of 30 (60 percent) from the field, 6 of 8 from three-point range.

"We didn't handle the press like we have to," Ole Miss coach Rob Evans said. "They (MSU) were very aggressive. They got all the credit. They were just too tough for us."

"We came out fired up with them being an SEC team," said senior guard Cedric Gumm. "We had to get out to a good start."

"That was one of the better halves I've seen a Racer team play. We were clicking on all eight cylinders."

Gumm, who found his shooting stroke in leading the Racer comeback in a 92-89 loss to Saint Louis last Saturday, hit 6 of 8 shots from the field in the first half for 16 points.

"I told Ced at halftime that he played like an all-American," Edgar said of Gumm, who finished with 20 points. "I saw (the real) Ced tonight. He was racing the ball up the court and hitting the 'three.'"

Gumm followed with a layup and Antwan Hoard hit two free throws and a layup to push the lead to 29-17.

With 10:09 to play, Brown and Hoard hit back-to-back 3-pointers to make it 35-19. Murray then converted three-straight Rebel turnovers into five points and led 40-19. Leading 44-24, Murray sank 8 of 10 free throws to take a 25-point lead into the locker room.

"That was the best I've seen us play," said Brown, leading all scorers with 26 points on 12 of 14 free throw shooting. "The press suits us well. We have a lot of athletes going upstairs to finish the break. And, we like pressing."

Brown led the Racers with five

steals. He was most valuable in the second half when the Racers had to fight off a mild Rebel comeback.

Murray State had scored just 10 points in the second half when the clock read 8:53. Ole Miss outscored the Racers 22-10 during that stretch to cut the lead down to 68-55.

"The only disappointing thing about tonight is that we didn't play as smart down the stretch," Edgar said of his team, which shot 23 percent in the second half. "In the final two or three minutes the only way you can lose is if you beat yourself."

Opening lead — queen of spades.

In playing a hand, it is usually correct to use well-established principles. Their efficacy has been confirmed by the highest authorities, and they tend to be a good guide in most hands. But — and here's the rub — "most" implies "not always," and the sound player must constantly watch for the exception that proves the rule.

Consider this deal where South failed in a frequently encountered situation. He won the spade lead with the ace, played a low trump to the eight and returned a club. When East followed low, South played the jack.

West took the queen and returned a trump. Declarer played dummy's jack and led another club. The king lost to the ace and West returned a third trump. Eventually, South lost a diamond and another club to go down one.

In effect, South was led astray by his holding of the K-J-x of clubs facing two small. Had he held the 4-3-2 of clubs, he surely would have made the contract by leading a club from his hand at trick two and later ruffing a club in dummy.

It was the initial trump lead to dummy — to lead towards the K-J-x — that opened the door to defeat. It is true that in most hands, with such a combination, a declarer would not dream of playing the king, jack or four towards dummy's 6-5.

But that is precisely what South should have done here. Granted that such a play seems sacrilegious — it grossly violates the rule of leading towards strength instead of from it — the fact remains that violating the rule insures the contract, while following it jeopardizes the contract.

Suggestion: Do it in stages, so they will know what is expected of them now -- and why -- and what more will be expected in six months or so. It will be less traumatic than a sudden "sink or swim" edict. And please don't label them as "bums." If they have never been expected to contribute to the household, it's not their fault.

DEAR ABBY: I am an incest survivor. I have been married for almost nine years and have two

beautiful daughters, ages 8 and 6. Their father parades around naked in front of the girls. I don't mean in his underwear, I mean in his birthday suit!

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife suffers from thrush on her lips and on the inside of her mouth. She's seen four different doctors, has been prescribed medication costing \$6.85 per tablet, and we're at our wit's end. With all due respect, we feel these doctors don't know what to do next. Do you?

DEAR READER: Thrush is a yeast infection caused by the fungus called candida. The term "thrush" is usually reserved for children; the term "oral candidiasis" for adults.

Candidiasis is common in people with impaired immunity and a susceptibility to infection, such as caused by AIDS and diabetes. Therefore, your wife needs appropriate blood tests to confirm or reject these diagnoses. Also, ill-fitting dentures can cause yeast infection in the mouth.

With respect to therapy, I've had success with Nystatin oral suspension ("swish and swallow"). Patients swish the anti-fungal preparation in their mouths and then swallow it. Ask your wife's family doctor about this -- and the tests I mentioned. Further, if she wears dentures, she should have a dental examination. Fortunately, candidiasis is not particularly contagious.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I haven't read anything in your column about the role 15 mg of zinc can play in curing acne. Apparently the diets of young people are often lacking, and I've found this simple addition is a sure-fire remedy.

DEAR READER: Zinc, a mineral vital to many of the body's enzyme systems, is abundant in meat, eggs and seafood. The Recommended Daily Allowance is 15 milligrams.

Zinc deficiency can cause abnormalities in sexual functioning, including poor sexual development and low sperm counts; it can also lead to a diminished sense of smell, poor wound healing, night blindness and birth defects.

Too much zinc can cause anemia and vomiting. The mineral has been reported to reduce the severity of acne, a common skin disorder in adolescents. However, doses above 50 mg a day should be avoided because of the risk of side effects.

To answer your question specifically, 15 mg of supplemental zinc is not harmful and may, as you stated, improve the complexion, especially when used in conjunction with standard treatment such as cleansing creams.

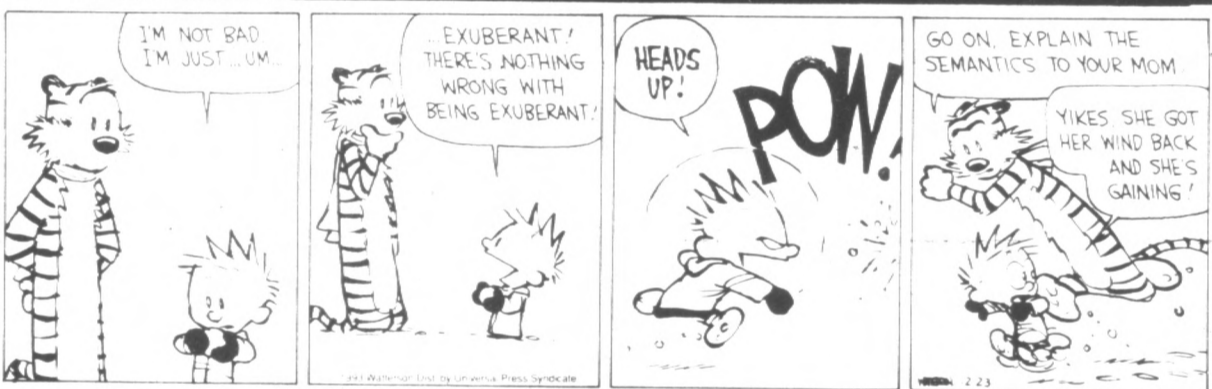
