### Several hundred US troops head to West Africa

WASHINGTON (AP) — Several hundred U.S. troops are heading to West Africa to prepare for a possible evacuation of Americans from Zaire, gripped in a civil war, the Pentagon says.

The action was taken Friday even though no formal order has been issued for an evacuation, officials stressed.

"This is continued prudent planning so we can respond rapidly in case a true crisis develops," Pentagon spokesman Col. Richard Bridges said.

About 500 private Americans are in Zaire, 320 of them in Kinshasa, the capital.

### FBI investigates activist's threats to cut off lobbyists

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI is investigating claims that the chairman of a House committee probing Democratic fund raising threatened to cut off access to a lobbyist who failed to raise donations for the lawmaker's own re-election campaign.

Federal agents will meet next week with Mark Siegel, a Democratic activist and former lobbyist for the government of Pakistan, Siegel claims that Rep. Dan Burton, R-Ind., threatened to cut off his access to influential GOP colleagues if he did not raise \$5,000 from Pakistani Americans for Burton's campaign.

Burton, chairman of the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee, has acknowledged asking Siegel to raise the money and complaining when it was not forthcoming. But he has denied voicing

## National educator blasts CHE report

After taking a professional beating during a Council on Higher Education meeting earlier this year, Murray State University President Dr. Kern Alexander now sees the pendulum swinging in the other direction.

Late last year, the CHE hired Ronald A. Phipps, a Washington, D.C. consultant with the Institute for Higher Education Policy, to analyze a study done by Alexander.

The MSU president's report found that the University of Kentucky gets more than its fair share of taxpayer money.

In a verbal report to the CHE in January, Phipps said Alexander's conclusions about UK fund-

ing was based on "inappropriate" and "missing data."

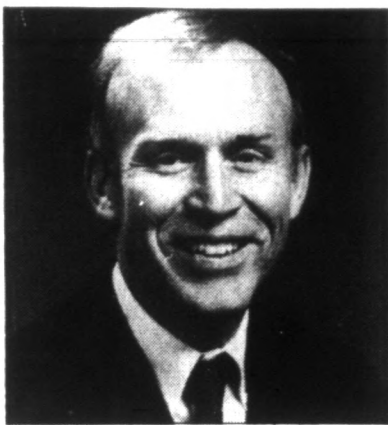
He also contended that Alexander's report had "methodological problems."

Provided with no avenue to respond to those allegations, the joke seemed to be on Alexander.

"I felt like they were trying to humiliate me and discredit me in the eyes of the public," Alexander said. "When you're dealing with the CHE, they will go for the jugular in defense of the University of Kentucky."

But because of recent developments that scale has been tipped in Alexander's favor, thanks to state Rep. Freed Curd (D-Murray).

In a letter to the U.S. Department of Education, Curd ex-

department director Deborah Inman.

Inman's response was in total support of the Alexander report. "Concerning the substance of the reports, I notice that Dr. Alexander relies on standard methodology in the calculation of fiscal effort among states and institutions," wrote Inman. "I have analyzed Dr. Alexander's methodology ... and I find his data to be appropriate and his study design to be sound and accurate."

She said she was unable to find "any justification" for Phipps' claim that Alexander's work was unreliable.

"To the contrary, it would ap-

pressed his displeasure with the actions of the CHE and the contents of the Phipps' report. Included with that letter was a copy

of both Phipps' and Alexander's studies.

On March 14, Curd received a response to his letter, written by

## Police make 'V'-burn public

■ Investigators say Ferrell used V as sign of group

TAVARES, Fla. (AP) — Attorneys for a teen-aged cult of self-styled "vampires" accused of double murder said Friday they don't want their clients tried together.

Rod Ferrell, 16, leader of the so-called Vampire Clan, Scott Anderson, 17, Dana L. Cooper, 19, and Charity Lynn Keesee, who also called herself Sarah Remington, are charged in the slayings of Richard and Ruth Wendorf. The Eustis couple were the parents of another clan member, Heather Wendorf.

Heather, was arrested with them for the Nov. 25 murders but a grand jury in January found no reason to believe that she took part in the slayings.

The other four were indicted on charges of first-degree murder. Anderson is from Mayfield, Ky., and the other three are from Murray, Ky.

During a preliminary hearing

Friday, Lake County Circuit Judge Jerry T. Lockett said Ferrell and Anderson would likely be tried apart from Keesee and Cooper. The judge tentatively scheduled Ferrell and Anderson's trial for February 1998.

Cooper, the only defendant not to waive her right to a speedy trial, could be the first to be tried, as early as May. Her attorney, Mary Ann Plecas, said Cooper didn't want to wait an entire year to face trial.

"She doesn't want to sit there and I respect her position," Ms. Plecas said.

Prosecutor Brad King said he wouldn't seek the death penalty against Cooper and Keesee even though he is seeking capital punishment for Ferrell and Anderson.

Ferrell and the others became

## Deputies seen as mixed blessing in county schools

When Calloway County Sheriff's Deputy Max Parrish was assigned to patrol the county schools, he received less than a warm welcome by some students.

"We've had a lot of negative things said about us in the school paper (last week)," Parrish said. "I knew coming in that there was going to be some negative feelings. They (the students) don't want anyone infringing on their territory."

Deputies began walking the halls three months ago. Now, students at Calloway County High School and Calloway Middle have grown somewhat used to Parrish and other local officers being on campus.

Assigning an officer to patrol the schools was the idea of Sheriff Stan Scott.

After receiving a state block grant of \$4,300, Scott decided to try something new with the money instead of using it for traditional departmental needs.

"We could have used it for anything we wanted in regards to the department. But as I was preparing that grant, I thought there

was a way to better utilize that money.

"We have had several calls requesting our assistance at the high school. Lots of those calls were a result of fights or accidents that we were having to pull an officer off duty to respond to. They were minor things, but we still had to respond to them," Scott said.

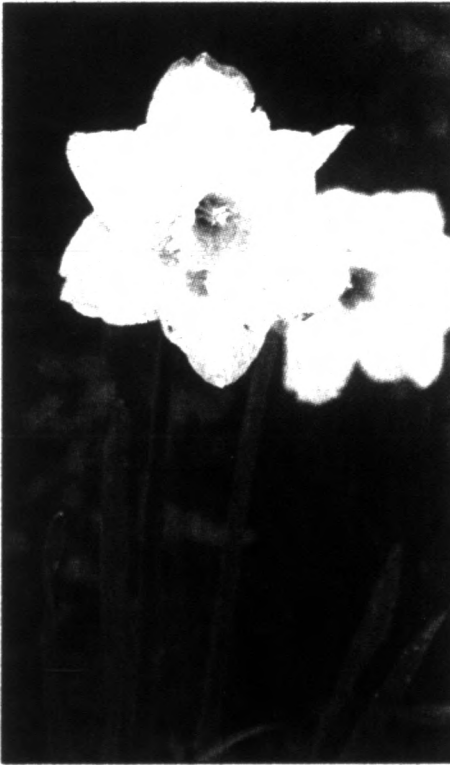
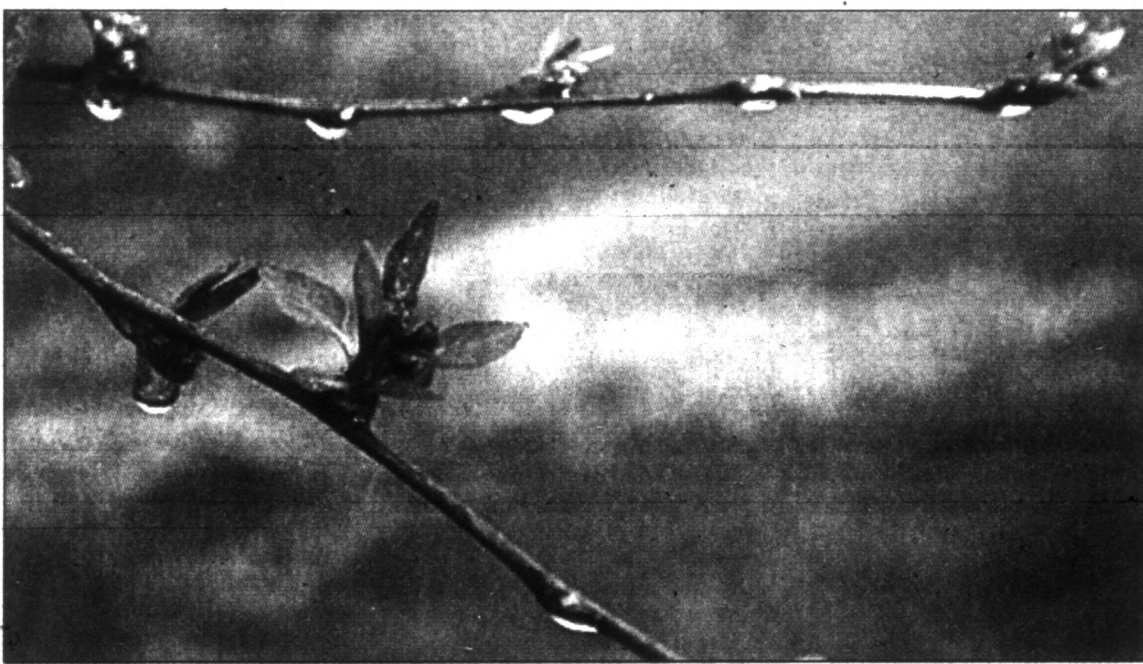
With cooperation from administrators, Scott set up two separate, two-hour shifts especially for the Calloway campus.

But the initial reaction to those officers was misinterpreted, Scott said.

"The first impression people got was that they have no need to be out there," Scott said. "The

## Gingrich seeks to mollify GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who upset some fellow Republicans earlier this week by suggesting a delay in tax cuts, took to the House floor Friday to declare himself "deeply committed" to cutting taxes, rescuing Medicare and balancing the budget.

"The precise way we do it is less important than getting it done," said Gingrich, R-Ga. "I am deeply committed to lowering taxes."

"I hope for anybody who is curious — among our members,

among activists, in the press corps — they now get the clear message. Lower taxes, balanced budget, less power in Washington, more freedom back home, save Medicare on its own terms," Gingrich said.

Gingrich's comments came after he and another member of the GOP leadership, Majority Whip Tom DeLay of Texas, caused unrest among conservatives by suggesting tax cuts could wait while Republicans first pursue a balanced budget.

"So let's take tax cuts away for a moment. Let's just talk about balancing the budget," Gin-

grich suggested in a hallway interview with reporters Monday. "Now what's the liberal excuse for not balancing the budget?"

The chairmen of the House and Senate tax-writing panels, among others, publicly disagreed, saying they wanted tax cuts included in a balanced-budget deal this year. "The notion of having to choose between balancing the budget and delivering tax relief is a false choice," the Senate Finance Committee chairman, Sen. William V. Roth Jr., R-Del., said earlier this week.

students see things from a different perspective. I understand their feelings. But this is not something where we have to be out there to watch every move these kids make.

"That was not the initial reason for doing this. Someone has to be on-hand to deal with the problems that take place. I don't think they understand the whole picture."

Stopping those problems, Parrish said, is one thing that the program has succeeded in doing. "Before we started this, there would be one or two fights every day," Parrish explained. "Since then, we may have one or two fights a week. So, we've pretty well stopped that."

"We don't want these kids to think we're coming out here trying to be macho or something. We're not trying to offend them, we're trying to protect them."

Trying to create that image has worked for many of the students. "I think they do a great job. It is a great idea," said senior Nicole Grogan. "I think they help the flow of problems. We've always had a drug problem out here. I think they've helped a lot with that."

Senior Tom Holcomb said the officers have provided the school with a safer environment.

"Some of my friends think of the officers as baby sitters," Holcomb said. "I think that occasionally the school has had problems in the past, but there are not as many now that the officers are on campus. It has cut our problems in half."

While many students feel that problems have been stopped, others are skeptical.

"I think it's a good idea for them to be here, but at the same

time I don't think it's solving any problems," said senior Ashley Glison. "It's not stopping fighting. They (students) just go outside of the schools to fight."

Sophomore Darrell Foster said high school students are guarded too heavily by law enforcement officials.

"It really doesn't bother me all that much, but it seems like we're constantly being watched," Foster said. "A lot of people feel like they shouldn't be here."

April Green, a senior, thinks police officers in the school system is not appropriate in this area.

"In a way it's good, but this isn't New York City. We don't have that many problems. I think it scares people more than anything," Green said.

Parrish said he can see a difference in the attitudes of students since the project began.

"No matter what these students have got to say, we're going to listen to them. When I first started, I didn't have too many of them wanting to talk to me."

"But I'm on a first name basis with a lot of them now. That's the way we want it. We want the students to come to us with any problems they might have at school or at home," Parrish said.

According to CCHS Assistant Principal Randy McCallum, an officer on campus is sometimes more mobile than school administrators when responding to a problem.

"We have a large campus with a lot of buildings and a number of people doing a variety of things," said McCallum. "An of-

ficer can immediately respond to something and help maintain safety. I think the students who have had direct contact with them can appreciate what they do."

Calloway Middle School Principal Cloyd Bumgardner said the officers are a much-needed commodity on campus.

"I have nothing but good things to say about them," Bumgardner said. "The students here have respect for authority. I don't think you're going to see these kids having problems when they get to high school because of that."

CCHS Principal Jerry Ainley said preventing problems before they happen is a big reason why the officers are on campus.

"I think it's always important to pre-act rather than react. I don't want people in our community to feel like we have big problems in our schools, but I also don't want them to think that

we are immune to those problems," Ainley said.

Ainley said many of the problems the school has start at home.

"That's not to say that our parents don't care about their children. There are just so many pressures that these kids are under. I think our students can seek out these officers and use them in a helpful manner," Ainley said.

Ainley feels the officers can be more approachable than maybe teachers or administrators.

"Students don't always understand community problems or realize what is going on all of the time," he said. "For that reason, I feel like the officers are accepted on this campus. We are very fortunate to have good kids and a great community. We don't have major discipline problems, but small problems can turn into big problems if you don't head them off at the pass."

governor, placing full weight, reputation and credibility of the CHE behind Mr. Phipps' report," Curd said.

"Dr. Cox, this episode is one among many examples of failure to provide the leadership necessary for the functioning of higher education in Kentucky. I hope that you will undertake appropriate measures to advise the Council regarding the inadequacies of Mr. Phipps' analysis and that suitable action will be taken to redress the situation," he cited.

According to Curd, the U.S. Department of Education's response was more harsh than he expected.

"It's worse than I really thought it would be," he told the Ledger. "They need to correct it if it is this bad."

Curd said the letter he sent to the department of education was about uncovering the facts.

"I wanted to get down to the real truth of the matter," said Curd.

In a Ledger interview Friday afternoon, Cox said he was caught off guard by Curd's letter.

"Rep. Curd and I have known each other for a long time," said Cox. "I guess the thing that struck me the most was the personal tone of the letter. It did not sound like him to me."

According to Cox, the status of the higher education battle has been taken in a totally different direction.

"It appears to be a personal battle," he said. "That is certainly unfortunate. We have maybe wandered off into a debate of statistics and lost the big picture of what we're trying to accomplish."

While Cox declined to give a solution to the state's higher education problems, he did suggest a different focus.

"Maybe what we ought to do is take a page out of the governor's book and focus on policy issues rather than debating statistics," he said.

The CHE will meet Sunday and Monday.

attracted to vampires because of a best-selling, role-playing game and drank their own blood and that of mutilated animals, investigators said.

Detectives said that cigarette burns found on Richard Wendorf in the shape of a 'V' are symbols of Ferrell's cult.

According to an investigator's report released this week, Ferrell told friends in Kentucky that his sign was a 'V' with dots on each side signifying members of his cult. Investigators and lawyers handling the case have said in the past that there was no evidence of vampirism at the murder scene.

Detectives sketched the shape of five dots on their report, then connected the dots to form the letter 'V.' Four dots were added — two on each side.

"The above would indicate, what appears to be, burn marks located on the person of Richard Wendorf. The 'V' to indicate Ferrell and the outer marks to indicate his clan ..." the report said.

John Goodman, a friend of Ferrell's in Murray, Ky., told investigators that he played role-playing games with Ferrell since the fourth grade.

"Goodman stated that for a couple of months prior to the homicides, Ferrell had become possessed with the idea of opening the Gates to Hell, which meant he would have to kill a large, large number of people in order to consume their souls," detectives reported. "By doing this, Ferrell believed he would obtain super powers."

## Brochure answers questions of flood victims

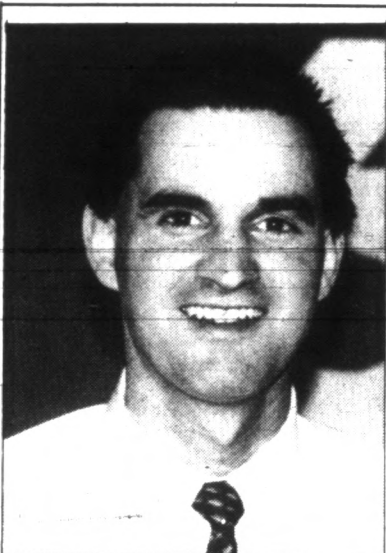

### Week 8 Question:

Middle School Social Studies

Alexander Hamilton felt that only educated, property-owning citizens should make government decisions. Thomas Jefferson felt that ordinary citizens could make good government decisions if they were well informed. Discuss the pros and cons of each of these points of view.

### Sample Student Response:

There were many different beliefs between Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton. Both of these gentlemen were good politicians and great American leaders. For Alexander Hamilton, his main pros were that those wealthy individuals knew politics and had been around things long enough to understand the system. They also had plenty of money to support and defend those ideas. His major cons were that this form of government gave those individuals too much power. They were wanting to run a monarchy not a democratic government. For Thomas Jefferson, his major pro was that they knew what the average American was for, and it was a basic form of democracy for the people. His major cons were that the people didn't have the power and money as the other wealthy individuals and the majority were unknown citizens who didn't know the government. In an overall perspective, these two ideas help make our wonderful government what it is today.

Student shows an awareness of arguments for and against citizen participation in the democratic process.

Student notes, as pros for Hamilton's ideas, that wealthy individuals knew about politics and had the money to support their ideas. Student notes, as cons, that the wealthy had too much power and wanted a monarchy.

Student discusses pros and cons of points of view of both Hamilton and Jefferson, and demonstrates an understanding of differences. Examples are accurate for the time period.

Student notes, as a pro for Jefferson's ideas, that he knew the average American supported democracy. Student lists, as cons, that the people had neither money, power, nor knowledge of government.

## KENTUCKY EDITORIAL

U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford undoubtedly stunned his Democratic Party when he announced he would not seek a fifth six-year term in the Senate. Ford also undoubtedly sent spirits soaring in the Republican Party, which has the chance in 1998 to capture, for the first time ever, the entire Kentucky congressional delegation.

But Ford has no reason to apologize for his decision to retire. At age 72, he has had a long and fruitful political career, beginning more than 30 years ago in the Kentucky Senate. He served a term as lieutenant governor and one as governor and then put in the

longest service in the U.S. Senate of any Kentuckian.

No matter who wins Ford's seat next year, Kentucky will lose a powerful voice in Congress.

In an era when loud, strident voices echo through Congress, insisting on rigid ideological conformity, Ford is of the old school made famous by another Kentuckian, Henry Clay, in which negotiation and compromise are the keys to resolving issues for the good of the nation. If only there were more politicians operating under that honorable tenet.

Republican U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers of the 5th District called Ford "a workhorse for the state, and that'll be missed."

Because of that workhorse, Kentucky has two international airports and thousands of low-income Kentuckians who have become homeowners through the Kentucky Housing Corp., among other accomplishments.

Ford has earned his fishing trips with his grandchildren many times over and given the choice between those trips and raising, in today's political climate, at least \$5 million for one last campaign, there's no question that he made the right decision.

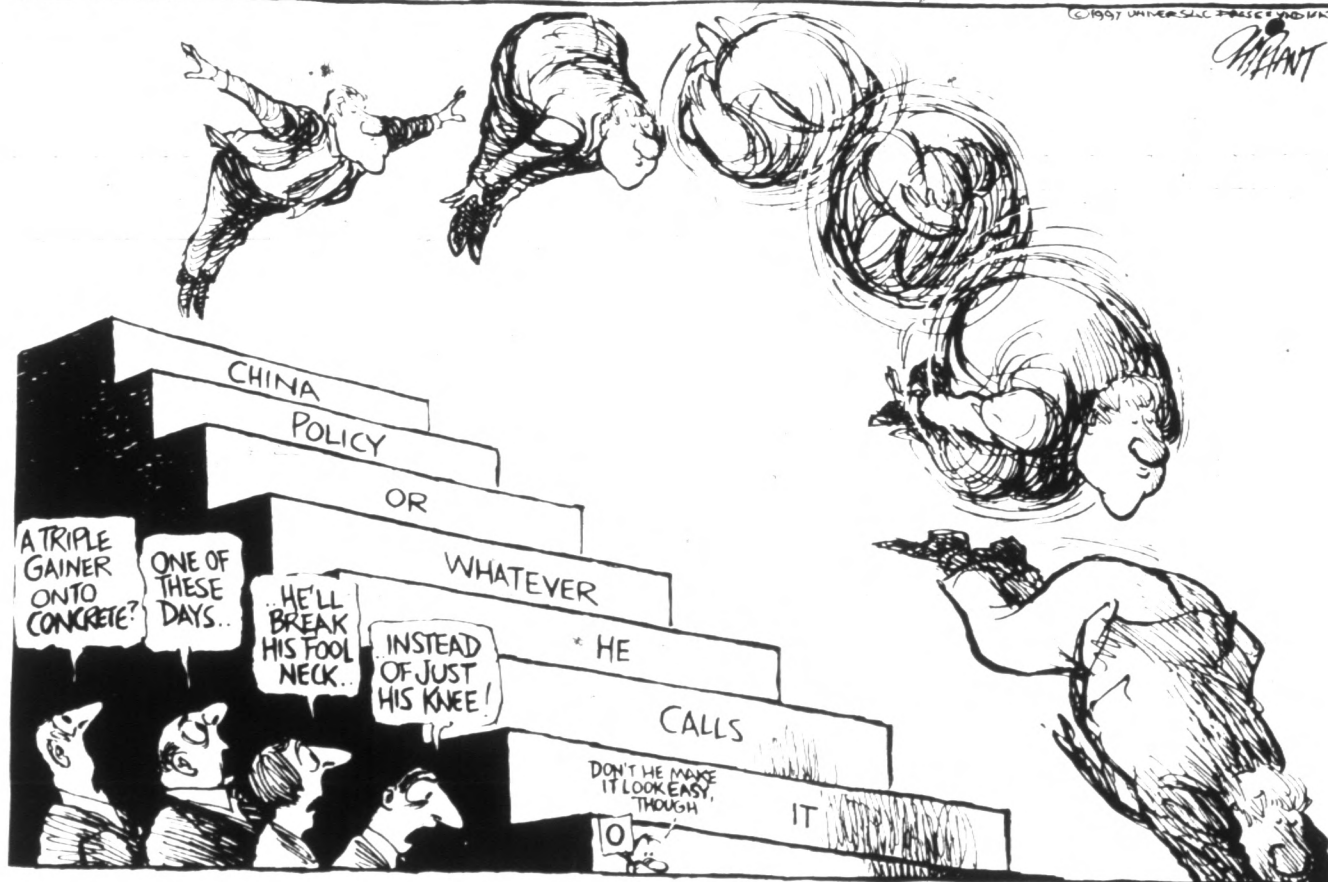

## How fickle we have become

One sign of our times is how fickle we Americans have become in our affections. We may love well, but not for long.

Celebrities are a good example.

In earlier times, we were loyal for decades in baseball to New York's Babe Ruth or St. Louis's Stan Musial or Boston's Ted Williams, or to radio's Jack Benny or Fred Allen or Edgar Bergen. The baseball giants were synonymous with the teams for which they played. The radio comedy shows, especially Bob Hope and Red Skelton, Burns & Allen and Benny, held their audiences even into television days. They stuck with us because we stuck by them.

Nowadays, things are different. This year's star baseballer may be playing for another team next year. Greg Maddux won Cy Young awards at two different places in a row. Love the Braves this year because they won't have the same line-up next year.

This year's "hit" television series has a life expectancy of no more than five years. Shows that were considered classics have come and gone: "Hill Street Blues," "Cheers," a hundred police and detective shows, another hundred hospital shows, two hundred situation comedies.

What is true of games and shows is also true in real life. The average car "life" in one family is three years. Fifty percent of all marriages end in divorces. A third of all births

are to unwed mothers. Vacuum cleaners that once lasted twenty years now last five. Even the newspaper you are now holding will disintegrate more rapidly than newspapers made from rags did twenty years ago.

In Abe Lincoln's day, the average political speech was two hours long. The average sermon thirty years ago was thirty minutes long. Political speeches today are short "sound-bites," ten seconds usually, 30 seconds max. Sermons that go ten minutes are tuned out by churchgoers. Absenteeism from 50- or 80-minute lectures in college classes has mounted steadily in recent times.

Social visits between homes, once so commonplace, have declined, replaced by a few rare "special occasions." Why have several seated dinners for twelve when one can have a stand-up buffet for two hundred every three years?

Henry David Thoreau saw all of this coming 150 years ago. He said, "We lead our lives in quiet desperation." He wondered why folks being

able to communicate instantly by telegraph from Massachusetts to Texas was seen as Progress. What if they have nothing to say to each other? he wondered.

We live our lives in snippets. Our attention spans have contracted like released rubber bands. We measure our lives in the jerks of moments, not in the sweep of movements. We demand to be entertained, and we want instant gratification — one-liners, no "shaggy-dog" stories, please.

Ironically, however, as we are inattentively listening less and less to each other, reading others' writings less and less, and meeting less and less, we are talking and writing more and more ourselves. The phone companies are capitalizing on the insatiable urge to talk long distance and incessantly, warring with each other for long-distance credit-card users. The phone manufacturers are vying with each other for cellular phone sales and car phones. Every other driver on any given street in any given town these days can be seen talking into a

phone as he or she drives. I followed a lady down the aisles of Walmart last week as she talked to someone on her pocket phone, describing displays and prices, bargains and dreams. She was still talking at the check-out counter, even as her two children screamed and stole chewing gum, while the clerk rang up her charges.

And the Internet has made it possible to talk by writing to strangers or people unable to come to the phone. Miles and miles of verbiage, most of it one-way ramblings, flit from one computer to another, a long line of connecting barnacles on the bottom side of the quality of life.

The brevity of the entertaining moment and the longevity of our own monologues are not contradictory at all. We have found, apparently, that adjusting to the world we have invented together is too arduous a task for most of us to achieve. We have retreated, not necessarily to mountaintop or beach retreats or forest cabins, but into ourselves. Our best protection against the pace and responsibility of public life, we seem to be saying (judging from what we are doing each day), is our privacy.

Each I protects its most important possession: itself. It takes courage and wisdom to venture outside our own "me" perimeters.

We already have ourselves to love. Why complicate that by bringing in clones?

This has been one fantastic week for fishing on Kentucky Lake. It started when Jeanne and I were able to get a day to fish together and the sun was shining. It was her first trip of the year and we had really planned to do a lot of different things. It took a little while to find what the bass wanted, but then we settled down to some serious bass fishing. We worked hard too!

In a short three hours we caught 12 bass and Jeanne was the big bass champ of the day. She expertly hooked and landed a beautiful 7 pound 2 ounce largemouth. We admired it a few seconds after weighing and then released it to do battle another day. All of the other bass were smallmouth, topped by a 6 pound 9 ounce hunk of brown lightning. We released all of the bass.

Three more great days were spent in the rain and waves, but Gene and Eugene Medley had come to fish.

They bit even better than before and when one shook loose, it didn't matter. We had to wear heavy, insulated rain gear and boots to keep dry and warm. The chill factor had dropped as the wind increased, making it difficult to keep the chill out of our bones. It's always harder to do when your hands are wet and the rod handle is cold. We were confined by the high winds much of the time so there were a lot of good areas left unfished. The currents

were strong but not a factor as to where we could go. We worked entire bays around and then sometimes rather than tackle the main lake again, we would circle the same bank but farther away. We threw spinnerbaits, crankbaits, jigs and roadrunners hoping to find even a few hungry crappie. We had 13 fish at the end of the day.

The second day out was a lot warmer and having no rain made a big difference. We did about the

same pattern but the bass responded better even though it was cloudy. I noticed the water had begun to fall slightly and remembered that TVA had planned to pull the elevation about 7 inches each day.

Eugene had been wanting to catch a good smallmouth for a long time and this was his day! He had switched to baitcasting tackle last year because I told him he could handle a big smallmouth much easier. We caught largemouth, smallmouth, Kentucky's and a rockfish striper and lost several big fish again because they were so aggressive. We ended the day with 18 fish boated. The largest was a 7 pound 9 ounce largemouth, a 6 pound 5 ounce smallmouth and four more between 4 and 5 pounds each. The others brought the total catch weight to 51 pounds.

Gene came back once more and brought Travis Scott for the first time. The bass were stubborn for a

time but we figured out what they wanted and let them have it. Scott caught his first ever smallmouth and became an addict. We did about the same pattern except I included a twitch bait which worked. We lost several again but still did well. The five fish weighed 27 pounds and we caught a total of 19.

The clarity is excellent and the temperature ranges 63 to 65 degrees depending on the sunlight. I need to mention that the ramp at Irvin Cobb Marina is open and launching is possible.

The promotional dinner given by Randall and Betty Mabry at Willow Pond Restaurant was for the area business owners and operators of resorts, hotels, groceries, tackle shops, boat dealers, and motels and it was a huge success.

More rain is forecast but the fish are hungry and the crappie will turn on soon.

## Government seeks to protect reptile

WASHINGTON (AP) — Humans have become so dangerous to one kind of scarce snake that the federal government is moving to protect it.

The copperbelly water snake became an officially threatened species on Friday.

But not all copperbellies. The snake will have protected status in northern Indiana, Michigan and Ohio.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service decided not to give the rare Midwest reptile protected status in southern Indiana, Illinois, and Kentucky after much

negotiation and a deal last year in which the coal industry, agriculture and government agreed to protect snake habitat.

Indianapolis will be the rough dividing line between exempted southern snakes and protected northern snakes.

By snake standards, copperbellies are good-looking: very dark, even black tops contrasting with bright orange-red bellies.

Unlike other big water snakes, copperbellies aren't aggressive. Once they've been grabbed, they won't try to flee or strike, said wildlife biologist Scott Pruitt.

"It doesn't necessarily want to be held but it won't attack you,"

he said.

But snake-fanciers who try to cuddle up to copperbellies have to put up with another defense mechanism: "a kind of a musk odor that's very strong."

Despite the smell, there's a market for copperbellies.

The Federal Register notice announcing the protected status offered anecdotal evidence: an amateur snake collector who disclosed being offered \$260 for a breeding pair of copperbellies.

The snake-trade interest is one reason the government did not precisely map out where they are protecting the snakes, limiting the descriptions to: one unidentified

county in northern Indiana; one unidentified county in northwest Ohio; and four counties in southern Michigan.

Pruitt said the government's next step will be to figure out how many fragments of historical copperbelly habitat still maintain snakes, and what can be done to either repair that habitat or connect it to another cut-off parcel.

A species is considered threatened under the Endangered Species Act if it is likely to become "endangered in the foreseeable future throughout all or significant portions of its range."

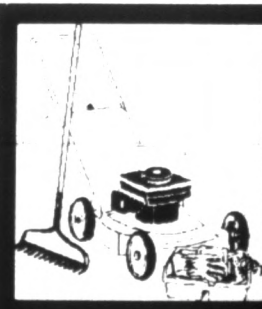

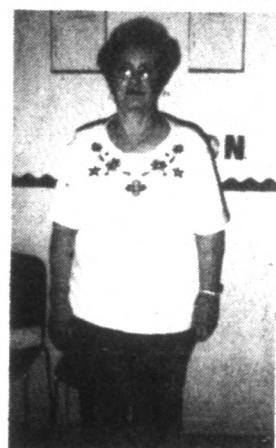

## Louisville moves on after topping 'Horns

■ *U of L loses Wheat in 78-63 East victory over 10-seed Texas*

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — When DeJuan Wheat sprained his left ankle with about 16 minutes left and had to be carried off the court, things looked bleak for Louisville.

But the Cardinals overcame the loss of their leading scorer and beat Texas 78-63 Friday night to reach the East Regional final.

Alvin Sims scored a career-high 25 points and Damien Dantzler and Alex Sanders added 17 apiece for sixth-seeded Louisville (26-8), which will play the North

Carolina-California winner Sunday for a trip to the Final Four. "Without DeJuan we didn't have a ballhandler, we didn't have a point guard," Louisville coach Denny Crum said. "Everybody had to contribute. It's one of the things we've done all year long."

Wheat, averaging 18 points a game, missed seven of eight shots before hurting his left ankle with 15:52 left when he landed on the foot of a Texas player. He was carried off the court and didn't play again.

But Dantzler took over, scoring all of his season-high 17 points in the second half. Sims carried Louisville early in the game, scoring 15 in the first half when Wheat was struggling.

Sims said Wheat's injury "inspired our team to play harder. It's his senior year and we didn't want to disappoint him. We had to give all we had."

When Wheat went down, Louisville was clinging to a 44-43 lead. Texas later took the lead on a 3-pointer by Brandy Perryman and seemed set to take command following Gabe Muoneke's dunk with 8:42 left, which gave the Longhorns a 56-53 lead with 8:42 left.

## Gottfried withdraws name at UT

MURRAY, Ky. (AP) — Murray State men's basketball coach Mike Gottfried announced Friday that he had withdrawn his name from consideration for the head coaching vacancy at Tennessee.

Gottfried guided the Racers to a 20-10 record this year, including the school's fourth straight Ohio Valley Conference title and the program's fifth NCAA Tournament appearance in the 1990s. The Racers narrowly lost to second-seed Duke in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Gottfried is the first Murray head coach to begin his coaching tenure with back-to-back league titles.

"I am honored and flattered to have been considered for the UT job," said Gottfried. "However, it would take a very special situation for my family and I to leave Murray State at this time. I am excited about the future of this program."

Gottfried was offered a four-year contract extension by Murray this past Tuesday.

## Arizona upends Kansas

■ *Top-ranked Kansas falls 85-82 in semifinals of Southeast Regional to game Wildcat team*

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Roy Williams choked back tears. Jacques Vaughn couldn't believe he was taking off his Kansas uniform for the final time. Raef LaFrentz had a hollow look in his eyes as he recounted the shot that could have extended a remarkable season.

Kansas, recognized throughout the season as the best team in the country, was knocked out of the NCAA tournament Friday night by an Arizona team that was a step quicker and didn't show the least bit of respect for the mighty Jayhawks.

"Life isn't always fair," Williams, the Kansas coach, said after Arizona stunned the Jayhawks 85-82 in the semifinals of the Southeast Regional. "We had a fantastic, fantastic year. It was a dream season, but we didn't reach our final dream."

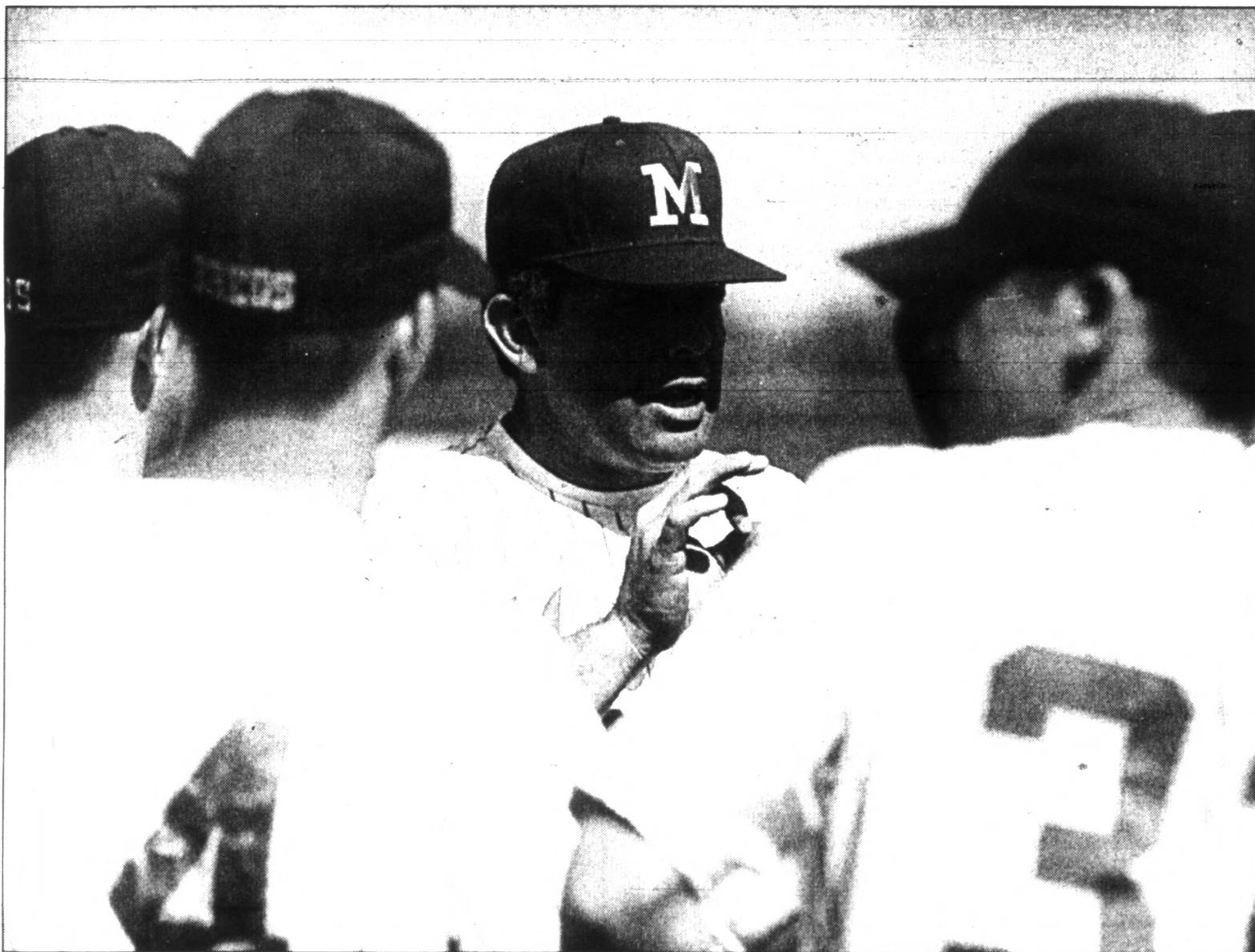
Top-seeded Kansas (34-2), which defeated Arizona in the regional semifinals last year, displayed the will of a champion, coming up with two steals and three straight 3-pointers to cut a 10-point deficit down to 83-82 with 21.1 seconds remaining.

After Mike Bibby made two free throws for Arizona with 18.2 seconds remaining, Kansas had a chance to send the game to overtime. But all three attempts from 3-point range were off target, the last coming when the All-American LaFrentz rebounded a miss under the basket, dribbled to the corner and fired up a shot that bounced off the front of the rim as time ran out.

"I saw a clear lane to the corner, so I ran out there and let it

## Friars finish off UT-Chattanooga

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Providence, which nearly blew an NCAA bid at the end of the regular season, moved within one victory of the Final Four with a 71-65 win over Tennessee-Chattanooga on Friday night.

Jamel Thomas hit three 3-point

ers during a late 15-2 run that helped the 10th-seeded Friars (24-11) survive in an unexpected matchup of underdogs in the Southeast Regional semifinal.

In beating 14th-seeded Chattanooga (24-11), the Friars became the first No. 10 seed to make a regional final since Temple in 1991. They advanced to play Ar-

izona, an 85-82 winner over Kansas earlier Friday. A win over the Wildcats would put Providence in its first Final Four since 1987, when Rick Pitino was coach.

It would also mark a huge turnaround for a team that lost three straight games to end the regular season, then had to win two of three at the Big East tournament

to sneak into the NCAA.

Thomas shrugged off a scoreless first half to hit three 3-pointers after Chattanooga had tied the game at 51 with 7:56 left.

Thomas' last 3-pointer and a dunk by Ruben Garces put the Friars ahead 66-53, and they survived 5-for-11 free-throw shooting down the stretch to win.

## UK's Mills surprising even Pitino

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — When Cameron Mills first caught Rick Pitino's eye at a basketball camp, the Kentucky coach quickly assessed the guard as a guy who was "too slow, couldn't dribble, couldn't shoot and couldn't jump."

Now Mills, a player that Pitino tried to convince not to attend Kentucky, is one of the stars as

the Wildcats head into Saturday's West Regional final against Utah.

Mills, who had 19 points off the bench in Thursday's win over St. Joseph's, has been a key reserve over the last few weeks. And with injuries to guards Derek Anderson and Allen Edwards, he has become even more important to the Wildcats.

"He's been giving us a big lift all through the tournament," said teammate Wayne Turner. "Once

he gets hot, it's pretty tough to stop him."

Mills, who grew up near the Kentucky campus in Lexington, is the son of former Wildcats player Terry Mills.

"He came to my camp and he was no big deal in my camp," Pitino said. "He wasn't even the best player on his high school team."

Mills' father was friendly with the Kentucky equipment mana-

ger, though, and passed a message to Pitino that he wanted Cameron to be considered as a walk-on for the Wildcats — even though he had been offered scholarships elsewhere.

"I said, 'Your son's good enough to play somewhere, he's not going to play at Kentucky,'" Pitino recounted Friday. "That's what I can't fathom because I'm

## Tar Heels rally late to defeat California

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — North Carolina didn't look like the same team that had won 14 straight games until Antawn Jamison erased a seven-point second-half deficit by himself.

The top-seeded Tar Heels (27-6) beat California 63-57 Friday night in the East Regional semifinals to continue a comeback season.

The Tar Heels' 15th straight victory moved them on to the regional final for the 18th time. They will meet sixth-seeded Louisville, which beat No. 10 Texas 78-63, on Sunday with the winner advancing to the Final Four.

"I thought we woke up midway through the second half," North Carolina coach Dean Smith said. "Antawn did give us a lift with his shots."

Vince Carter, who scored the final five points of a 15-3 run that gave the Tar Heels the lead for good after Jamison scored the first 10, described his teammate's play in glowing terms.

"It was amazing. He just gets the job done," Carter said. "Every player on this team just didn't give up. He really just put us on his back and carried us. He really got us some momentum and everybody picked up from there."

Fifth-seeded California (23-9) had used its size and an unexpected outside shooting source to take a 45-38 lead with 9:48 to play. The Bears were trying to keep alive an impressive run of their own as they had won four of five games since leading scorer and Pac-10 player of the year Ed Gray broke his foot.

Jamison, the team's leading scorer at 19.2 points per game, scored 10 straight points for the Tar Heels and Carter, who injured his right groin in the second-round win over Colorado, had the last five in the run. His alley-oop dunk on a pass by Ed Cota gave North Carolina the lead for good at 50-48 with 5:58 to play.

"I wasn't ready to go home," said Jamison, who was putting ice on his back after the game because of some twinges that weren't considered serious.

fly," LaFrentz said. "I thought it was a good shot, but then it started to drift right."

He let out a weak chuckle and added, "Damn."

The fourth-seeded Wildcats (22-9) celebrated at midcourt and a few players jumped atop the press table to acknowledge their contingent of fans at the Birmingham-Jefferson Civic Center.

"I'm proud of this team and we don't want it to end," said Arizona coach Lute Olson, his team just one victory away from the third Final Four in school history. "We're having so much fun."

After the initial celebration, Arizona was more subdued in the locker room.

"I asked them how many could tell me the teams that made it to the Elite Eight and they came up with like one," Olson said. "We don't want to be one of those teams that had a great game in the Sweet 16 and then was out."

Arizona advances to the regional final Sunday against the winner of the late game between Tennessee-Chattanooga and Providence. The Southeast has proven to be the region of upsets, with all three of the top-seeded teams already eliminated.

"The thing I loved all week long was their attitude," Olson said. "It was like, 'You think

we're in awe of them? We're not in awe of anybody.'"

Kansas, which spent the final 15 weeks of the regular season atop The Associated Press rankings, committed 20 turnovers, many caused by Arizona's swarming defense but others simply a result of a team that looked sloppy and disorganized.

"We're used to being the guys who put the foot to the pedal," said Vaughn, who decided not to enter the NBA draft so he could return for his senior season. "But there were a lot of plays, a lot of shots we normally make that we

just didn't make."

Williams credited Arizona's quickness for taking the taller Jayhawks out of their game.

"I knew their quickness would be a factor against our size," Williams said. "Today, quickness won out."

The Wildcats surged ahead with an 11-0 run, capped off by Bibby's 3-pointer that made it 75-62 with 3:29 remaining. Vaughn characterized his team's night with two turnovers during Arizona's clinching run. First, he threw a lob pass out of bounds, then he committed the Jayhawks'

20th turnover when he was called for carrying the ball.

Bibby, hardly looking like a freshman, scored 21 points and had five assists to lead Arizona, but the Wildcats' win was a true team effort. Michael Dickerson scored 20 points, Miles Simon added 17 and A.J. Bramlett did yeoman's work under the basket with 12 points and 12 rebounds.

Paul Pierce kept Kansas in the game by scoring 27 points, 11 above his season average, but he got hardly any help from his teammates until the final two minutes.

But a tip-in by Dantzler, a layup by Sanders and a 3-pointer by Dantzler put Louisville ahead to stay. Wheat, then watching from the bench with an ice-pack on his ankle, pulled a towel from his head and began to cheer.

Wheat was taken to a hospital, where X-rays showed his foot wasn't broken. However, Crum said he didn't think his star would be able to play in the next round.

Texas star Reggie Freeman was held to a season-low six points, 16 below his average. Freeman, who scored 34 points earlier this season in an overtime loss to Louisville, was 2-for-14

from the field in his last college game.

"This game was so different from the first game," Freeman said. "It was strictly one-on-one in the first game and I had the opportunity to do a lot of things. This game they jumped out more and it was very difficult to do a lot of those things. Once I got in there, the shots just weren't falling."

Perryman said Freeman wasn't solely responsible for the loss.

"We need Reggie to have a good game usually, but we don't have to have it," said Perryman, who scored only three points. "We don't have to have it, though. We can pick up the slack

just like Louisville did. But they played some good defense."

Muoneke led 10th-seeded Texas (18-12) with 19 points.

Louisville stormed out after the break and regained the lead for the first time since midway through the first half. Dantzler scored six points and Sanders added five to key a 16-6 run. A baseline drive and dunk by Sims gave the Cardinals a 47-43 lead with 14:56 left.

Wheat got his only points of the game on a 3-pointer with 1:40 left in the first half. He sat out three minutes in the opening half as the Cardinals struggled to find another hot hand to complement Sims.

## MSU alumni elected chairman of AACC

Dr. Walter G. Bumphus, president of Brookhaven College in Farmers Branch, Texas, has been elected chairman of the board for the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC). The association includes more than 1,000 community colleges across the United States. Bumphus will assume his duties as chairman of the 32-member board on July 1 and will serve a one-year term.

Bumphus attended Murray State University, graduating in 1971 with a bachelor of science degree in speech. In 1974, he earned the M.A.E. in guidance/counseling. He was named an MSU Distinguished Alumnus in 1992. His wife, the former Aileen Thompson, also graduated from MSU earning a bachelor of science degree in 1972 and a master of science degree in 1973, both in communication disorders.

Bumphus has served as president of Brookhaven College since 1991, where he has been instrumental in leading the college in the creation of innovative programs and services to meet the changing needs of the communities Brookhaven serves. The college enrolls approximately 9,000 credit and 10,000 non-credit students each semester and employs 300 full-time and 950 part-time personnel. As president, he oversees an operating budget of almost \$24 million.

Bumphus said that during his tenure as AACC board chairman he will encourage the association's efforts to broaden the use of advanced

technologies to improve access to quality instruction and to increase collaborative partnerships with business and other segments of the community — on both the national and local levels.

"Community colleges have become known for innovation in distance learning technologies. Through its national telecommunications satellite network and in cooperation with its member colleges, the association can expand both access to and the quality of instruction received in our classrooms. That technology support, plus collaborative partnerships with business and industry, other segments of education, and community organizations are key areas of emphasis of AACC," Bumphus said.

## Adron Doran to be named to Morehead Alumni Hall of Fame

Dr. Adron Doran, a alumnus of Murray State University, will be inducted into Morehead State University's Alumni Hall of Fame as part of the 1997 Founder's Day celebration in April.

Doran, a resident of Lexington, served as Morehead State's seventh president from 1954 to 1977. He is considered by many as the father of the institution in modern times.

He received his bachelor's degree from Murray State in 1932, followed by his master's in 1948. He received a doctorate in education from the University of Kentucky.

Doran served four terms in the Kentucky House of Representatives, including one as Speaker of the House. Active nationally, he was the 1971 recipient of the Horatio Alger Award given by the Association of American Schools and College. He was a 1972 recipient of Murray State's Distinguished Alumnus Award and a recipient of the Lincoln Key Award from the Kentucky Education Association and the Lincoln Foundation for the integration of Morehead "without fanfare or incident." serves as an honorary trustee on the Murray State Foundation board of trustees.

A minister of the Church of Christ since 1928, Doran devotes much of his time to research, writing and lecturing on the history of the American Restoration Movement.

Other inductees will be U.S. Army Col. Mark W. Dille and Linda Steiner.

Today is Saturday, March 22, the 81st day of 1997. There are 284 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 22, 1895, Auguste and Louis Lumiere showed their first movie to an invited audience in Paris; this is generally regarded as the first-ever public display of a movie projected onto a screen.

On this date:

In 1638, religious dissident Anne Hutchinson was expelled from the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

In 1765, Britain enacted the Stamp Act to raise money from the American Colonies. The Act was repealed the following year.

In 1820, U.S. naval hero Stephen Decatur was killed in a duel with Commodore James Barron near Washington, D.C.

In 1882, Congress outlawed polygamy.

In 1894, hockey's first Stanley Cup championship game was played; the home team Montreal Amateur Athletic Association defeated the Ottawa Capitals, 3-1.

In 1933, during Prohibition, President Roosevelt signed a measure to make wine and beer containing up to 3.2 percent alcohol legal.

In 1945, the Arab League was formed with the adoption of a charter in Cairo, Egypt.

In 1946, the British mandate in Transjordan came to an end.

In 1972, Congress sent the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution to the states for ratification. It fell short of the two-thirds approval needed.

In 1978, Karl Wallenda, the 73-year-old patriarch of "The Flying Wallendas" high-wire act, fell to his death while attempting to walk a cable strung between two hotels in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Ten years ago: A garbage barge, carrying 32,000 tons of refuse, left Islip, N.Y., on a six-month journey in search of a place to unload. The barge was turned away by several states and three countries until space was found back in Islip.

Five years ago: Twenty-seven people were killed when a USAir jetliner crashed on takeoff from New York's La Guardia Airport; 24 people survived.

One year ago: The shuttle Atlantis, carrying astronaut Shannon Lucid to a rendezvous with the Russian space station Mir, blasted off from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

I watched the fabric and finished product go through many chemical processes, including being soaked in a milky alkaline solution to soften and prepare the fabric, a dye solution to give color even to white fabric, and other chemicals. I also received numerous letters from women who wore new unwashed lingerie and pajamas, complaining that the dye from the fabric had bled and ruined their dresses or bed sheets.

I have had many plant managers say to me, "If people only saw what their clothes went through, they would never wear them without washing them first!"

If every school were to implement a love-based discipline policy, not only would test scores rise, but also eventually we would see a decline in drug abuse, delinquency, drop-outs, crime and unemployment in society.

## DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor told me to take Caltrate for extra calcium, but it is too expensive. Are there other, cheaper products?

DEAR READER: Yes, there are, but you will have to shop around to find them, and — I'm sorry to say — they may not be as effective as Caltrate, because some generic calcium preparations do not readily dissolve and are not digested. (If your calcium pill doesn't dissolve when left in a glass of water for about an hour, you'd best find another brand.)

Postmenopausal women need about 1,500 milligrams of calcium a day to help protect against osteoporosis. Remember that you also need to consume about 500 international units of vitamin D for the calcium to be effective.

Here's a compromise. Take two Caltrate 600+D a day and chew two TUMS in addition. This combination should adequately satisfy your calcium needs.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 5-year-old daughter constantly puts her fingers in her mouth and refuses to give up a torn and ragged doll whom she calls "Baby." How can we discourage this behavior?

DEAR READER: Finger thumb sucking and a treasured doll are commonplace in 5-year-olds. I wouldn't make a big issue out of this except to try and distract her when you can. These behaviors are not harmful.

By the time your daughter enters college, she will probably have outgrown them. Psychologists tell us that constant negative reinforcement is more likely to lead to further stress in the family, may worsen the problem, and is really unnecessary.

Give your daughter lots of love, attention and cuddling — and be patient.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because I have what my urologist calls "scar tissue" in my penis, I cannot have relations. He suggested an implant. Is it safe? Painful?

DEAR READER: For some men, penile implants are a blessing, particularly when other treatments for impotence have been ineffective. During a relatively simple operation, a urologist places cylinders in the penile shaft. Before having intercourse, men expand the cylinders by pumping water into them from a small reservoir beneath the abdominal skin.

The technique is safe, the cylinders are painless, and — I'm told by satisfied customers — the results are usually quite satisfactory. Return to your urologist for further explanation and advice.

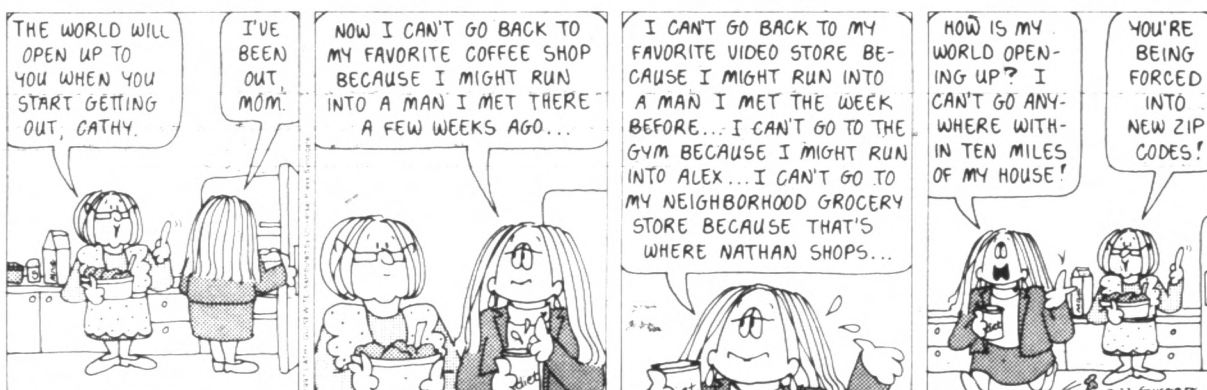

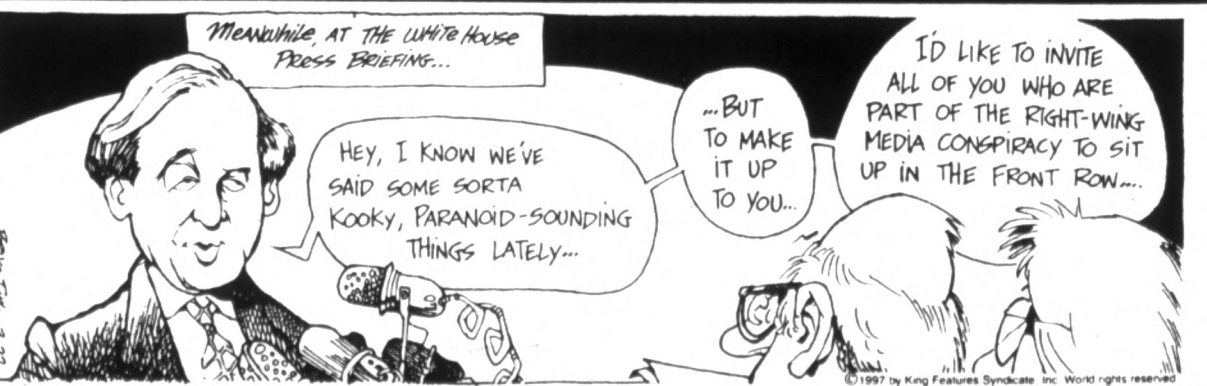

There is a play in bridge that has to be seen to be believed, and even after you've seen it, you may still not believe it. It rarely occurs in actual practice, but virtually every serious student of the game has encountered the play in bridge literature or theoretical discussions, and eagerly awaits the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to execute it at the table.

Today's hand provides a good example. A study of all four hands

reveals that South has two inescapable losers — one in spades and the other in trumps. From West's viewpoint, once dummy appears, he has every right to feel certain of scoring a trump trick with his king, come what may. But if South pays close attention to his knitting, West will wind up a sadder but wiser man.

Declarer wins the club lead with the ace and finesses the queen of hearts. West does not cover, of course, and also does not cover when the jack is led. South now abandons trumps, leading a club to the king and ruffing a club. These plays are followed by the A-K of diamonds and a diamond ruff.

Declarer next leads the A-K and another spade, East winning with the queen. At this point, South has the 10-9 of hearts, West the K-7 of hearts, and dummy the ace of hearts and seven of spades.

When East now returns a diamond or a club, South ruffs with the nine and West's "sure" trump trick disappears. Whether he overruffs with the king or underuffs with the seven makes no difference whatever. Either way, the king is dead. In effect, West's king is "smothered."

And, as a matter of fact, that's how the "smother play" got its name. But don't hold your breath waiting for it!

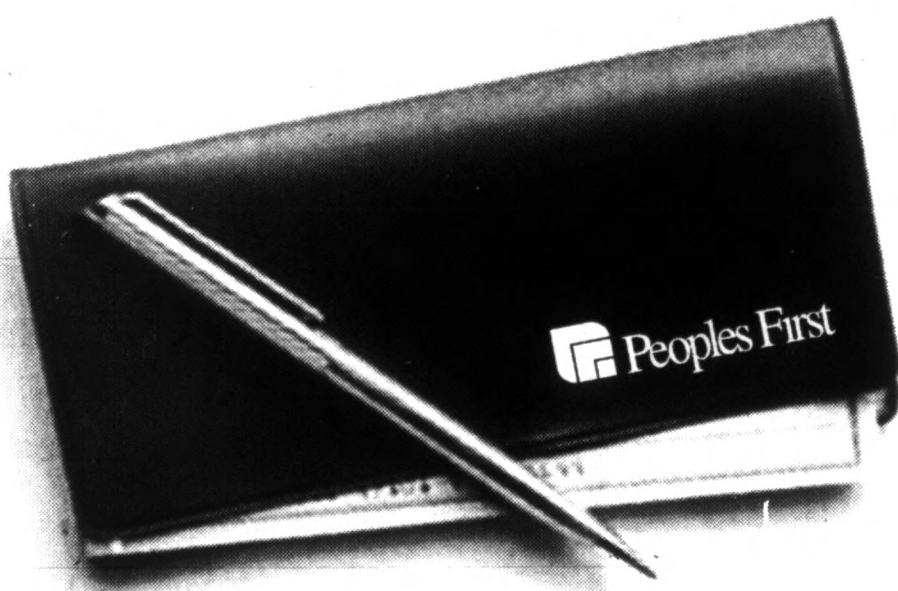
