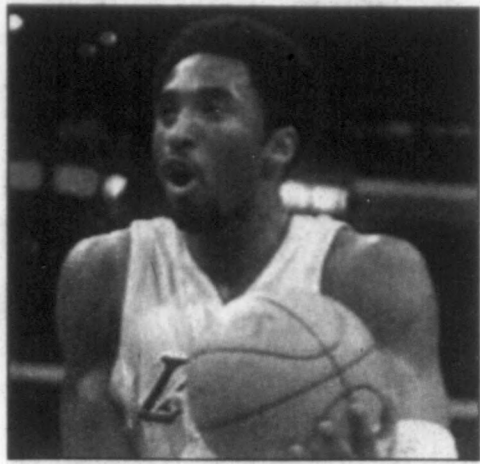

## IRS to send checks to 1.1 million Kentuckians

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The Internal Revenue Service and the Treasury Department will begin sending out advance payments later this summer under a new tax law passed by Congress and signed by President Bush.

Single taxpayers who paid federal income taxes for 2000 could receive up to \$300. Heads of households could get up to \$500, and married couples could receive up to \$600. Anyone who could have been claimed as a dependent on another person's 2000 tax return is not eligible for a check.

The first checks will go out the week of July 23, and most of the mailings will be completed by the end of September. Taxpayers will learn by mid-July how much they will receive. The IRS will send taxpayers a letter describing the check amount and the week it will be sent. The agency will also send a letter of explanation for taxpayers not eligible for the advance payment.

"We want to make this process as simple as possible for taxpayers," said IRS spokeswoman Pat Brummer.

Generally, the last two digits of the taxpayer's Social Security number will determine when the checks are mailed, so people may get a check at different times than neighbors or even other family members.

The IRS reminds taxpayers of several key points on the payments:

- Taxpayers don't need to do anything to receive the checks.
- Taxpayers should keep a copy of the letter sent in advance of the check for their records.
- Individuals who have not yet filed a tax return for 2000 will not get any advance payment check until the IRS processes that return.
- Taxpayers who have moved should file a change of address form with the U.S. Postal Service to ensure the checks go to the correct address.

## South Calloway town recognized for antiques in national magazine

HAZEL, Ky. — In the June issue of *Better Homes and Gardens*, Calloway County received a little bit of recognition as the southern town of Hazel was named as one of the places to stop in their summer "Antique Road Trip" article.

"It is always exciting when people like what you are doing," said Bill Price, owner of Miss Martha's Antiques.

Price opened the store with his wife Martha on Aug. 3, 1983. "It was 105 degrees the day we moved in," he recalled.

He said an antique store being in business for 18 years is quite a feat.

"In the business, consequently, when I say it has a high mortality rate it is usually because people use it as a retirement business and then after three or four years they want to retire completely," Price said.

He also said he was very proud of the recognition from *Better Homes and Gardens* and thinks in the long run business will improve.

"Anytime we get that kind of coverage, you will see people come in and it might be six months before someone comes in and says, 'Hey, we read about you in *Better Homes and Gardens*,'" Price said.

Murray Tourism Commission Executive Director Judy Gargus said she was pleased with the publicity.

"It is always great promotion for Calloway County when an asset such as the Hazel Antique Shops is noted in quality publications such as this," she said in a press release announcing the feature article, which highlights three other antiques communities.

Some of the store owners were not surprised at this recognition. Many

stores have been featured in publications before.

Ray Gough of Charlie's Antique Mall and Soda Fountain said his store was featured in the magazine a year ago.

"I knew it was out there, but I haven't seen it yet," Gough said.

Gough opened his store on a whim in November of 1994. "I had come over here on a whim, and a week later I was in the antique business for six months," he said.

A year later, he bought the building and began renting spaces to antique vendors.

"In three years, I went from 27 to 125 dealers," Gough said.

He said he thinks the article will help increase business, but only on a local element.

## Jail inmates help make homes for LBL bluebirds

As Calloway County jailer, Phil Hazle gets to determine what projects inmates at the Calloway County Jail will work on while they are incarcerated.

As a member of the Kentucky Bluebird Society, he is actively involved in trying to provide habitats for bluebirds in the western part of the state.

The two roles converged recently when Hazle learned that Land Between the Lakes was seeking to replace some of its older bluebird boxes that had deteriorated over the years. The solution? Put the inmates to work.

"I ran into a guy that maintains (the LBL boxes)," Hazle said. "It was a good project to give the inmates something to do."

After purchasing materials for the boxes using the jail's commissary fund, non-tax-funded revenue gathered from within the jail that is

earmarked for recreational purposes, Hazle gave the inmates the task of constructing the boxes in the jail's construction workshop on Fourth Street.

Once the work was done, Hazle was able to present LBL with 85 bluebird nesting boxes constructed of cypress wood. Robert and Judy Peak, who have monitored more than 150 bluebird nesting boxes inside LBL, assisted with the construction.

While constructing nesting boxes may not seem like an idea that would immediately appeal to jail inmates, who participate in activities ranging from working at the Murray-Calloway County Park to taking care of the City Cemetery, Hazle said the level of cooperation was extremely high.

"It gave them something constructive to do and made them feel good that they were helping out with a positive cause," he said.

"I think they were a little proud

of the results."

For the National Bluebird Society to recognize a bluebird trail, there must be at least six boxes posted. Inmates also constructed six boxes that were placed on poles in front of the jail, which Hazle refers to as the "Jail Trail."

Bluebird boxes are different from traditional birdhouses in that the entry holes are typically smaller, in order to keep larger birds out.

Sparrows, he said, are particularly troublesome, as they are small enough to enter the boxes and build nests. Hazle said bluebirds are fairly common to the local area, but the loss of suitable nesting boxes over the years has driven many away.

"They're coming back," he said. "They always have been in this area, but the reason there weren't as many had to do with not having any habitats."

Keeping the boxes in good shape can often be quite a chore. The

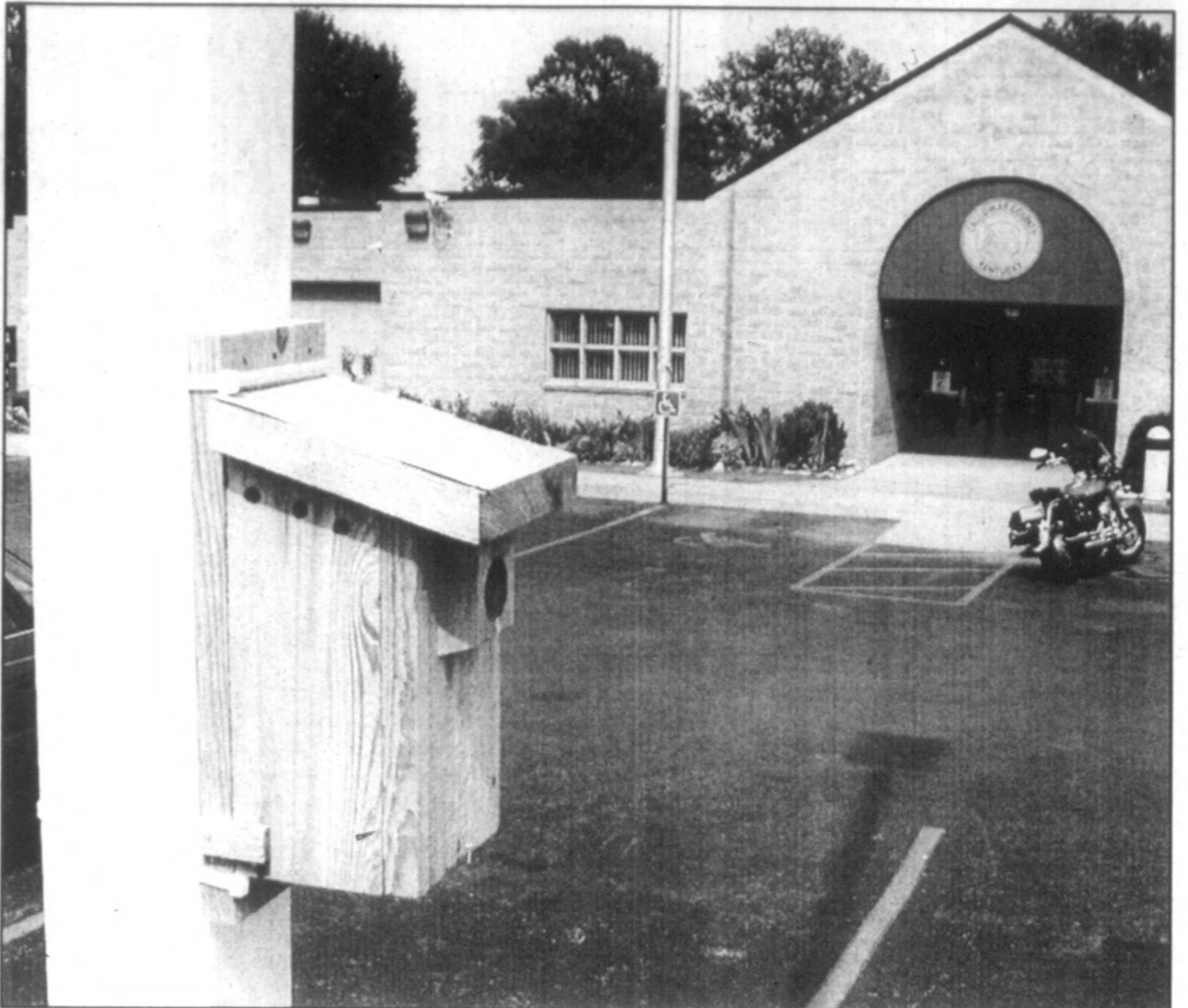

Peaks, along with Isaac and Eugenia Utley, volunteered more than 240 hours in April and May caring for the boxes the inmates donated to

LBL.

As for the participation of the inmates, Hazle said the construction of the boxes could be considered a rehabilitation activity, of sorts.

"Some of these guys may not know how to work when they come in here, so if we can teach them to do something, I think that's a good thing, even if it's just to build a bluebird box," he said.

**Patton: education funding 'secure'**

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The state can "get through '02 without a whole lot of pain," even if fears of a huge budget shortfall are realized, Gov. Paul Patton said Friday.

The pain will come, if it comes at all, when drafting a budget for 2003 and 2004, Patton said. In any event, funding of education is reasonably secure, Patton told a committee of legislators and higher education overseers.

The administration is speculating that revenues in the fiscal year that begins July 1 will fall well short — perhaps \$315 million short — of the \$7.2 billion already budgeted. Patton ordered contingency plans for spending cuts in everything but education, which is 57 percent of the budget.

State Budget Director James Ramsey said Friday that the rest of state government would have to absorb a 10 percent cut if a \$315 million shortfall occurred and education remained off limits.

"Our goal in '02 is to maintain our commitment to education," but it will be extremely difficult to balance the budget, Ramsey told the Strategic Committee on Postsecondary Education.

Patton, a member of the committee, said he did not want the public to be alarmed by Ramsey's theorizing.

"There's no way we're going to be making 10 percent cuts in programs next year ... because we've got some one-time revenue," Patton said. He was referring to money budgeted but not spent in the current fiscal year.

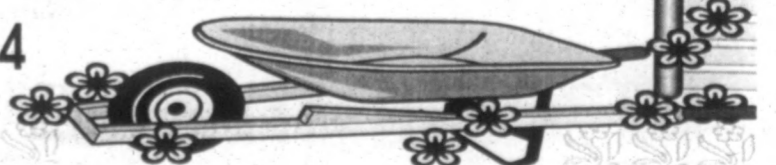

## Alabama church buys land for a song ... literally

FAYETTE, Ala. (AP) — Unity Gro Missionary Baptist Church needed no land for its cemetery. Church members it for a song.

James "Buzzie" Oswald handed over deed to three acres of land for the expansion in return for the church choir serenading him with the hymn "Down Here L. Waiting on You."

The exchange occurred on Easter Sunday. The odd thing is that Oswald, 65, is white, had refused for years to sell land to the church, whose members are black.

"I don't go into hugging men too much," said Dolphus Hughes, a deacon who hope he'll forgive me for hugging him this morning. We had a hugging reunion."

Hughes and other church members asked to buy Oswald's property for the cemetery beside their church, which has

about 100 members. Oswald, who has retired from the timber and land business, always politely refused.

"I'd tell them I wasn't selling any more right now," Oswald said.

That was just Buzzie Oswald. He's a 76-year-old bachelor with no wife or children. He stacks antique farm equipment on his porch or wherever he wants. He hosts domino games weekly. He likes to frighten visitors by offering them ice cream, then letting them look in the refrigerator where a coiled, preserved water moccasin sits on top of the box of ice cream.

"You don't understand him, and you ain't never going to understand him because you can't," Hughes said. "He does whatever he's going to do."

For all his quirks, folks in the Concord community say Oswald always shared his fish pond or blueberry bushes or anything else he had.

"I don't know of anybody who doesn't

get along with him," Hughes said. "He'll plant a big old field of greens and just invite everybody to go get them. He's just a generous man."

Not too long ago, Oswald found something in a magazine and clipped it out, about putting life into perspective. He says it every morning before he starts his day.

"If you have food in the refrigerator, clothes on your back, a roof overhead and a place to sleep, you are richer than 75 percent of the world," Oswald reads, staring downward through a pair of glasses. "If you have money in the bank, in your wallet or in a dish someplace, you are among the top 8 percent of the world's wealthy."

Oswald admits his decision to give away the land was a bit contradictory.

"They'd asked me several times about buying some land," Oswald remembers.

"They were shaking those dollar bills in front of me, and I've always thought you never had enough of those. I guess it's

because I woke up one morning and had a little money in my pocket."

Oswald was one of five children born to A.F. "Fleet" Oswald on a 180-acre farm. They raised cotton, corn, soybeans, hay and anything they needed to eat.

When he was old enough to work, Oswald's father sent him out to plow.

"The land just came right up to the edge of the church," Oswald remembers. "There was no electricity and all the doors and windows were open. I'd be working out there and I could hear them singing. Oh, they could sing now."

Sweating beneath the sun and aching from hours of toil, Oswald knew better than to lean against his plow in the shade while he listened. His father knew how much work he could do in a day and expected him to do it.

"My daddy's strap was a whole lot stronger than that singing was," Oswald chuckles.

When he began to consider giving the land to the church, the voices of Unity Grove's choir came back to him.

"It might have been foolishness on my part but that's what I remembered about the church," Oswald said. "And I didn't want them to feel like they were begging for it."

So he contacted Bryant and asked him if the choir would sing him a song. Bryant passed the request on to Pastor W.J. Sparks. Sparks was puzzled but acted on faith.

"I didn't have any idea," Sparks said. "We went out to him and after the choir sang, he gave us a deed."

Oswald remembered his father when he made the gift.

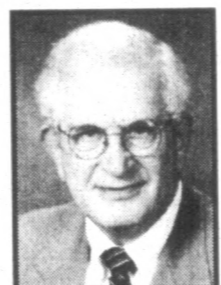
"I put the deed in honor of him," Oswald said. "It was his sweat that bought it."

Sparks said a higher power was involved in the deal: "The Lord, I imagine, just looked into his heart and he gave us the land. The blessing of the Lord came to him."

## Vacant kitchens for sale



A local shopping area has a large sign naming it "Historic Farmers Market". There is a sandwich shop, a wildlife store, a home decor shop, a children's clothing store — but no farmer's market.

Fifteen years ago, seasonal produce displayed in open-front booths filled the space, and on Saturdays a little old grandmotherly woman sold home-baked cakes she had brought from her own kitchen. Now, as the sign warns, that is all "historic," gone with the wind.

The nearest thing to a traditional farmer's market is seventy miles north, in Asheville, NC. There one finds fifty or so booths in two airplane-sized hangars. In season, they team with corn, tomatoes, okra, beans, squash, apples, peaches, melons, pumpkins, gourds, jams and jellies, and homemade bread and pies. At Christmas time, the booths add greenery and wreathes.

In our growing-up days, one found produce booths around court square in our little rural town in Tennessee. Later, living in Alabama in our early adulthood in the 1960's, we frequented a farmer's market in Tuscaloosa.

The South used to be speckled with roadside markets, with plate-dinner restaurants, with high school home economics classes, with flour company bake-offs, and with festivals celebrating strawberries, bananas, pickles, watermelons, and even the lowly okra.

People used to "pig out" on fresh produce and home cooking, but today there are only the pigs, human and otherwise — no produce. Local fruits and vegetables are vanishing, and only occasional barbecue gatherings remain.

Frozen foods and fast foods, and melons and strawberries from Mexico, have become staples. Folks aren't eating less — just look at the stomachs hanging over the counters at Wal-Mart's or McDonald's. But they are eating differently.

To get a "remembrance of things past" old people eat thawed country vegetables and cornbread at a chain restaurant or luck into a Mary Mac's in Atlanta or a Wade's in Spartanburg.

The worst thing about the Americanizing of Dixie may be that its farms and gardens are disappearing even as its fast food restaurants and its

population escalate.

Southern tongues were tied to the land, and as long as the land was primarily rural farmland — which is to say, up through World War II — southerners had a sense of taste.

We should have known, as early as the 1960's, that the end was near. When we started buying four Morton's chicken pies for a dollar instead of killing a chicken, picking and chopping some vegetables, and rolling dough to make our own, we drove the nails in the coffin of southern cooking.

When television trays replaced dinner tables, taste had eroded too far to ever be reclaimed.

What was really happening was that people who had lived off the land with scarcely any hard cash ever passing through their hands moved to towns and then to cities for jobs the South had always lacked. Once every southern family had a mule, a cow, a few acres, some cane-bottomed chairs, and some church fans, but then every family moved "up" to having two cars and a ranch house, indoor toilets and running water, and air conditioning.

The two-lane dirt roads of the counties were graveled, and then asphalted, and then four-laned, forming a gigantic spider's web that drew farm folk to city lights.

Progress, we called it. The South was finally catching up with the rest of the nation. Some friends of mine blame the Republicans. The great change in southern cooking coincided with the South giving up its Democratic Party and voting for Eisenhower, builder of interstate highways, in 1952 and 1956, and persisting in pursuing peace and prosperity by GOP standards ever since.

Al Gore could have won his home state in the last election if he had campaigned for home cooking.

As the South aged, it lost its sense of taste. As we old southerners, survivors remembering repasts past, have aged, we find ourselves eating in a foreign land at dinnertime. At mealtime, we hang our hams in a willow, and weep.

Esau sold his birthright to Jacob for a mess of pottage. The South has sold its good tastes for a mess of progress.

I'd sell the whole mess of progress for a good mess of greens cooked with a two-year-old smokehouse-cured ham hock.

## Democrats now banging gavels

WASHINGTON (AP) — The change in political leadership by the man who transformed the Senate was not there when the curtain rose on the new order. Vermont Sen. James Jeffords dramatically gave Democrats control, but a dramatic entrance is not his style.

After all the opening flourishes — the prayer, the resolutions, the big speeches marking the transfer of

power — the newly independent senator drifted in, cast a vote, paused briefly before the wrong mahogany desk and sat down at the right one. He craned his head toward the gallery and gave a thumbs up.

His first vote? Against the Democrats on an education bill.

Thus began the complicated reality of a Senate changed overnight. Jeffords had held back his entrance to generate "as little hoopla as possible," said his chief of staff, Susan Boardman Russ.

Hoopla was hard to find anywhere in a chamber more than half empty.

Democrats did not gloat. They didn't have to.

They returned to power celebrating the "noise of democracy," as the new Senate leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota put it, but the racket was set aside for another time.

On their best, quiet behavior, senators from both parties marked the

change in political leadership by leading to do their all to get along. Polarized positions are an indulgence," Daschle warned, as if he didn't have a partisan bone.

The Republican he replaced as majority leader, Mississippi Sen. Trent Lott, said the "weight of the Atlas" now is on Daschle's shoulders.

At risk of making Daschle's prize sound like nothing but a burden, Lott added ruefully, "Some day I hope the weight will come back."

Democrats said their new power left them feeling humble. But they wielded their gavels with gusto.

Already, their agenda, or at least their thinking, was emerging.

"May we have order," Sen. Robert Byrd admonished from the Senate rostrum, rapping his gavel

if an hour into proceedings, ready impatient with the distracted murmur on the floor.

The West Virginia Democrat was cking up where he left off in 1994 — when his party lost the Senate — president pro tempore, the one who runs proceedings. Always a tckler for parliamentary rules and additions, he again presides over

em. The gavel sounded smartly from the hand of Sen. Barbara Mikulski, -Md., too.

Convening her appropriations panel, she complained from the chairman's seat about inadequate federal spending on science research and hinted of confrontations to come with the Bush administration.

The man she replaced as head of the committee made the best of his situation.

"I've been fat and I've been thin, I've been in the majority and I've been in the minority," said Sen. Christopher Bond, R-Mo. "We are moving on."

"I am pleased," he added, "to be playing the hand I've been dealt."

Other Republicans similarly put on brave faces. Maine Sen. Olympia Snowe, however, was still publicly lamenting the loss of Jeffords. "Something went terribly wrong," she said.

## U.S. no longer leader for human rights

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States no longer leads on international human rights issues and often sacrifices its concerns for political expediency, the U.S. branch of Amnesty International said this week as it marked its 40th anniversary.

"We have no prominent leaders in government sounding the clarion call for human rights," said William Schulz, the executive director of Amnesty International USA. "Instead, we have a U.S. government that has abdicated its duty to lead."

Presenting the organization's annual report, Schulz said the group's greatest disappointment was the decline of U.S. leadership on human rights. As examples he cited the U.S. failure to ratify a conven-

tion to ban anti-personnel land mines and opposition to establishment of an international criminal court.

"It is no wonder that the U.S. was ousted from the United Nations Human Rights Commission," Schulz said. "That defeat was precipitated by waning U.S. influence and double standards practiced by various administrations and Congresses."

State Department spokesman Philip Reeker said he disagreed with Schulz's criticism of the U.S. human rights record. "Anybody who has followed the cause of human rights around the world over the years will realize the United States has been and will remain the leading advocate of human rights."

He said the U.S. record "speaks

for itself," as do the annual reports the department issues that "painstakingly document the human rights' situation in countries around the world."

Amnesty International provided a platform for the husband of an American University researcher detained in China. He urged the Bush administration to step up efforts to get her released now that a U.S. Navy reconnaissance plane is being returned.

Xue Donghua said he had written President Bush to tell him "human beings are more important than expensive airplanes." His wife, Gao Zhan, has been held in China since Feb. 11.

China has accused Gao of "activities that undermine state security." Xue said the case of his wife and

at least four other detained academics is "just the tip of an iceberg. A lot of other people who are detained and released choose to keep silent."

Xue said when he asked the State Department for an update on efforts to get Gao freed, he was told the return of the aircraft from China was a diplomatic and military priority.

The Pentagon said Tuesday the plane will be returned home aboard a cargo plane and then repaired so it can resume surveillance flights. It has been stranded in China for nearly two months after it collided with a Chinese fighter jet and made an emergency landing on China's Hainan island.

Schulz said the group was doing everything it could to obtain the release of Gao and the other detained academics in China.

## Pension reform applauded

Pension reform measures included in the tax bill expected to be signed next week by President Bush will allow Americans to plan better for their own retirement, according to Heath Scott, the Murray investment representative for the financial services firm Edward Jones.

"This new legislation will have a tremendous impact on our clients, including those saving for retirement or for their children's education and small business owners setting up retirement plans," Scott said.

The last time we talked about estate planning, we focused on two things: the importance of preserving the federal estate tax credit for each individual, particularly in a marriage and timing your IRA withdrawals to take advantage of the 15 percent income tax bracket whenever possible.

There are two more techniques of estate preservation that I suggest you consider.

One is the purchase of long term care insurance. This can be so important in estate planning that many financial consultants and planners now offer these policies.

Notice I said long term care insurance, not nursing home insurance. This kind of insurance has evolved a great deal in the last 10 or 15 years.

You'll probably want to be sure that your policy covers home health care as well as nursing home care. You may also want the benefits to increase a little each year to offset future inflation in the cost of care.

As a matter of fact, a good policy will have a number of features that you can select, and pay additional premium for, or reject as not something you think would be helpful to you. This may let you save some premium cost.

Take the time to find a policy that will fit both your needs and your pocketbook.

I have heard it suggested that once your estate is larger than the federal estate tax exemption, long term care insurance may not make much sense.

There could be a lot of truth to that. After all, why should you pay a premium in order to preserve assets of which a significant portion are going to the government?

Another tax-saving technique involves single-premium variable life insurance.

Let's suppose you have a chunk of money, perhaps \$50 or \$100,000 or more. You don't really think you'll ever need it, but you want to keep control of it just in case you do. In the meantime, you don't want to pay taxes on what it earns.

You might consider a variable annuity, where the earnings are tax-deferred. The problem here is that, eventually, someone will pay income tax on those earnings. If you don't, your beneficiaries will. That will be in addition to any estate tax due, of course.

There's a way to avoid that income tax by using variable life insurance. Of course, you want the same kind of investments in the life insurance policy as you would have had in the variable annuity. After all, your initial concern was to be tax-wise as you made your investments.

So, look first at the investment characteristics of any policy you're considering. Remember the term "variable" means that the investment itself can be in what is called a "variable account" that's invested in

stocks, much like a mutual fund. Therefore, this is a growth style of investment in either an annuity wrapper or a life insurance wrapper.

In a life insurance wrapper, the investment won't grow quite as fast as it would in an annuity wrapper, because the cost of the insurance

will come out of its earnings.

But the advantage is that the whole value to which the life insurance has grown at the time of your death will pass to your beneficiaries income tax free. This is unlike the annuity, where eventually somebody will pay income tax on the earnings.

I have heard the tax code described as the rules of the game of investing, rules that can be changed whenever Congress takes a mind to. Always remember to take those rules into account.

## Dowdy to attend Marine Studies

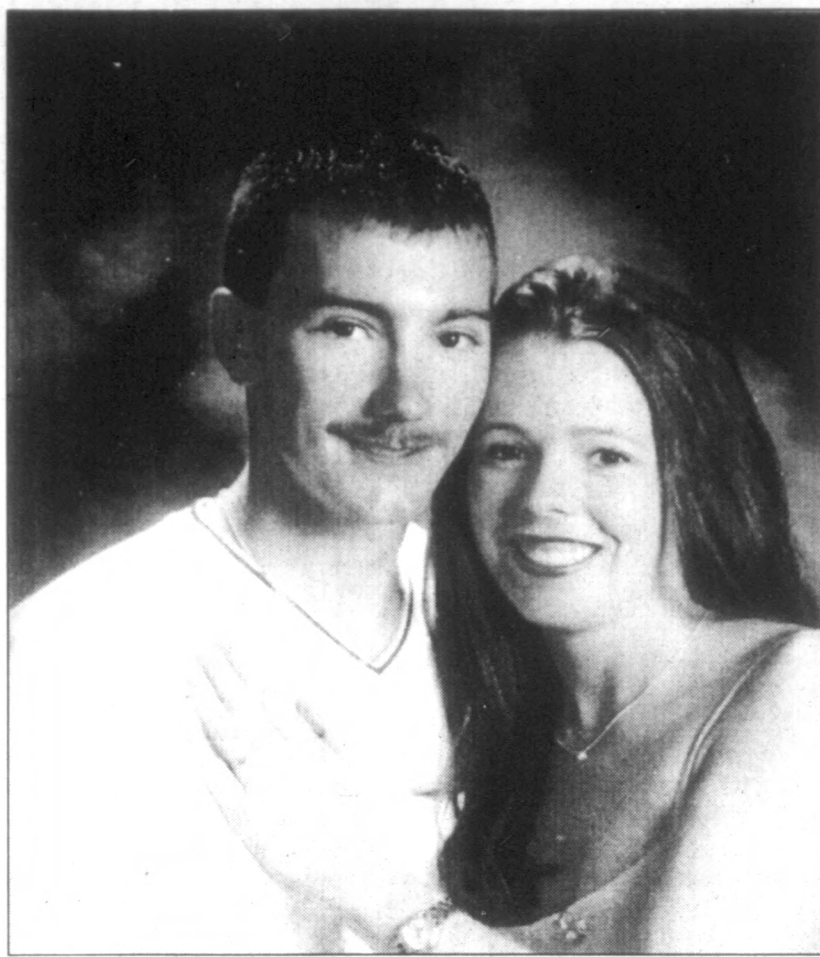

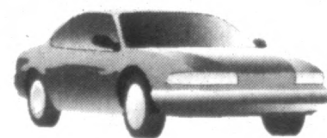

# Lakers even series

## Iverson struggles as Sixers fall 98-89

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Allen Iverson stared at Kobe Bryant, tugged defiantly at his jersey, and let him know the Philadelphia 76ers aren't going away.

Iverson scored just 23 points Friday and the Los Angeles Lakers beat Philadelphia 98-89 to even the NBA Finals at one game apiece.

But the NBA's MVP and the Sixers proved the favored Lakers won't have an easy time winning their second straight championship.

"We think we can win every game," Iverson said. "It's everybody else that don't think we can. We think we can. If you see the last two games, we kind of proved that. Nobody is going to walk over top of us. Won't happen."

Bryant wasn't buying any of it.

"With Allen, he's doing whatever he can to inspire his team and fire them up," Bryant said. "But I really don't care. We're here, we're the world champions, and no matter how inspired your team may be, the championship has to come through the city of Los Angeles."

**MISSION ACCOMPLISHED...Allen Iverson was held to 23 points in Game 2 as the Los Angeles Lakers evened the NBA Finals at 1-1 with a 98-89 win over Philadelphia Friday at the Staples Center, but Iverson and the Sixers will hold home-court advantage in Games 3-5.**

Iverson never got his game going Friday night, shooting just 10-of-29, including 3-of-10 from 3-point range.

He missed his first five shots from the field and missed all four free throws — just one game after scoring 48 points to lead the Sixers to a series-opening win.

"I'm not going to score 40 points every night," said Iverson, who hit 81.4 percent of his free throws in the regular season. "I'm one of the smallest guys on the court and they can't play me one-on-one."

Iverson was frustrated with the lack of fouls called and he let referee Steve Javie hear about his displeasure after Derek Fisher appeared to hit his elbow on a long 3-pointer at the end of the third quarter.

It was Iverson's 22nd shot of the night without a single visit to the foul line. Iverson didn't make a free throw for the first time all season.

"We couldn't get them to call a foul on Allen," Sixers coach Larry Brown said. "Couldn't get to the line, he took 29 shots."

Just as he had after a loss in Milwaukee during the Eastern Conference finals, Iverson walked off the court clapping and encouraging his teammates.

"It's the effort we gave, not throwing in the towel," Iverson said. "This is a team that

is supposed to dominate us, supposed to sweep us and almost didn't get out of here with a win."

With Iverson struggling, Philadelphia got some offensive help from an unlikely source: Todd MacCulloch.

The reserve big man scored a career play-off-high 13 points and had five rebounds in 16 minutes. MacCulloch, who played two minutes in Game 1, averaged 3.1 points and 7.8 minutes in 14 of the 19 playoff games he played before Friday.

"I just tried to be aggressive, tried not to be intimidated," MacCulloch said. "O'Neal is going to (block) some of my shots, hopefully not all of them. My game has always been to try and score."

The Sixers got a total of just five points from starting forwards Jumaine Jones and Tyrone Hill.

Surprisingly, with center Dikembe Mutombo on the bench for 8:56 from the end of the first quarter to the middle of the second, Philadelphia increased its lead from one point to seven.

O'Neal scored five straight points once Mutombo exited, then was shut down by Matt Geiger and MacCulloch. O'Neal scored six straight when Mutombo returned with 6:28 left in the first half and the Lakers outscored Philadelphia 16-7 to take a 49-47 halftime lead.



# Titans stop Cornhuskers

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Cal State Fullerton's experience silenced Nebraska's vocal and partisan fans at the College World Series.

Cal State Fullerton took a one-run lead in the fifth inning and made it stand up, beating Nebraska 5-4 in the CWS Friday.

The Titans won the opener of their 11th series and second in three years. Nebraska lost its series debut.

"The biggest thing for us was to make sure the crowd didn't get to us. Emotionally for us we were able to do that," said David Bacani, whose leadoff homer in the fifth inning supplied the eventual game winning run.

Aaron Rifkin hit a two-run homer for the Titans (47-16), who were out of 8-7.

The Titans will play Stanford, a 13-11 winner over Tulane earlier Friday, on Sunday. The Huskers and Green Wave will play Sunday afternoon in a game that will knock out one of the CWS newcomers.

Three Fullerton pitchers struck out 14 Cornhuskers. Jon Smith (11-2) lasted only until the sixth inning but got the win after allowing four runs on seven hits and striking out seven. Freshman closer Chad Cordero struck out four of the seven batters he faced to earn his 14th save.

"He doesn't get hit. When we see him running out there we just know it's lights out," Rifkin said of the Titans' closer.

Shane Komine (14-2) struck out nine as his streak of 14 straight wins ended.

John Cole was 3-for-4 with a pair of solo homers and Matt Hopper also connected for the Cornhuskers (50-15), who rallied to tie it twice after falling behind 3-0 but never took a lead. Nebraska had won nine straight coming into the series.

"I have mixed emotions right now. It felt pretty good to get a few hits but at the same time it feels pretty bad to lose by one run," Cole said. "I would have taken an 0-for and a win."

Bacani's leadoff homer in the fifth came off a changeup.

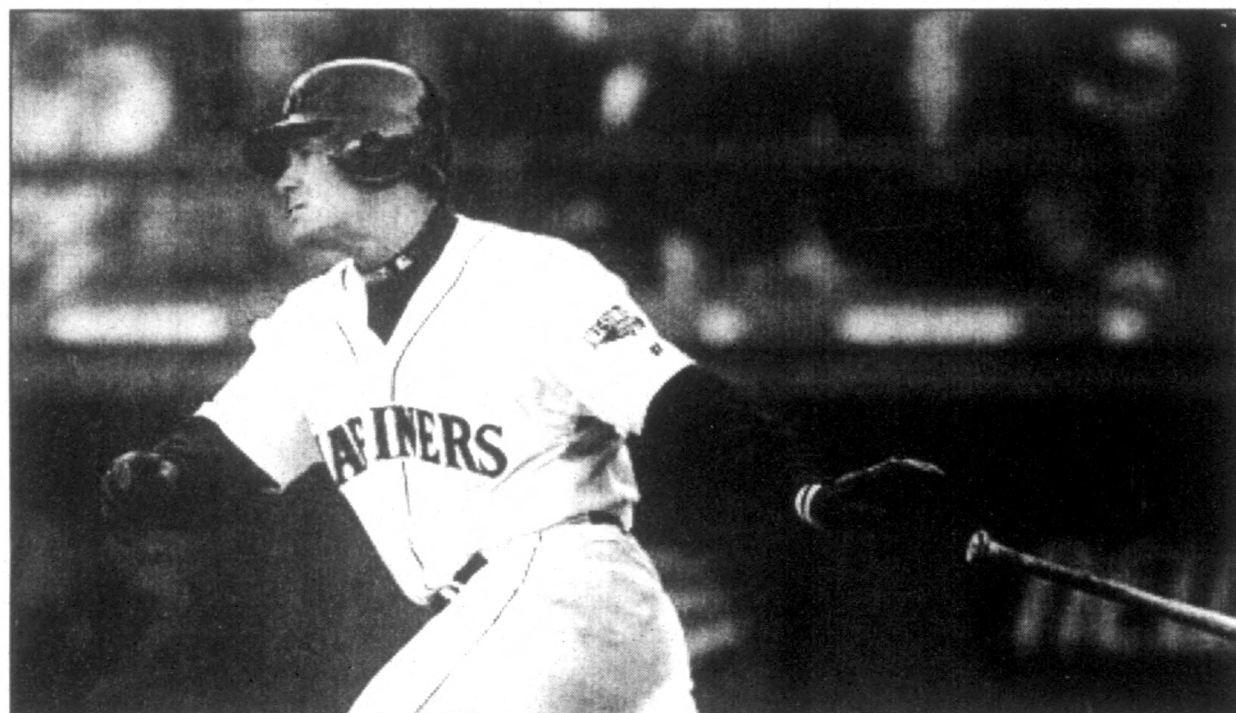
"He came in again with a change up this time and I was able to stay back and got a good part of the bat on it. It ended up being the winning run," Bacani said. "I didn't think it would turn out that way but it did."

Nebraska had just tied it in the top half of the inning on a homer by Cole to center, his fourth in the last five games.

The Titans silenced the crowd of 22,889 with a three-run first inning. Bacani led off with a double, moved to third on a sacrifice and scored on a single by Jason Corapaci. Rifkin followed with a shot deep into the bleachers in left field, leaving the Husker-friendly crowd in stunned silence.

"It's a little disappointing to lose by a run. It just felt like we could have won the game and didn't get it done," coach Dave Van Horn said.

They came to life in the second when Nebraska scored a run and had runners on second and third with nobody out, but the Huskers didn't take advantage.

# Mariners' streak at 15

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Mariners extended their winning streak to 15 games, the longest in the American League in 10 years, powering past the San Diego Padres 7-1 Friday night.

Edgar Martinez, Bret Boone and John Olerud homered for Seattle, whose streak is the longest in the major leagues since Atlanta won 15 in a row from April 16 to May 2 last year.

At 47-12, Seattle is on pace to finish 129-32. The Mariners matched the 1907 Chicago Cubs for the second-best 59-game start since 1900, trailing only the 1912 New York Giants (48-11).

The Mariners' streak is the longest in the AL since the 1991 Minnesota Twins won 15 straight. The AL record is 19, set by the Chicago White Sox in 1906 and tied by the New York Yankees in 1947.

Paul Abbott (5-2) won his third straight start, allowing one run and five hits in 7 2-3 innings. He gave up three hits in the first inning, giving

up an RBI grounder to Mike Darr.

Kevin Jarvis (3-6) gave up seven runs and 10 hits in five innings as San Diego lost for the ninth time in 10 games.

Seattle manager Lou Piniella returned after missing four games to attend his father-in-law's funeral.

Boone raised his major league-leading RBIs total to 66, and Martinez went 3-for-4 with four RBIs. He's the leading hitter in interleague play at .383 (64-for-166) with 14 homers and 40 RBIs.

Seattle came back in the first when Ichiro Suzuki singled, Martinez hit his ninth homer and Boone followed with his 14th.

Mark McLemore, returning after missing five games with a groin injury, had an RBI double in the second and Martinez made it 6-1 with a two-run double. Olerud homered in the fifth.

Suzuki, who leads the major leagues with 98 hits, went 2-for-4 and raised his average to .363.

# Kentucky linebacker ineligible

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky senior linebacker Ryan Murphy is academically ineligible, ending his career with the Wildcats, according to defensive coordinator John Goodner.

The 6-2, 240-pound Murphy was a two-year starter who was expected to see significant time at inside linebacker this season.

Murphy is the second UK player declared academically ineligible for the coming season, joining offensive lineman Kip Sixbery.

"First Kip Sixbery, then Ryan. Those things happen," Goodner said Friday. "I guess we just have to go on down the road."

Murphy, a Cincinnati native, recorded 65 tackles and five tackles for loss last season and would have been the Cats' leading returning tackler this year.

Murphy missed almost all of spring practice to rest a surgically repaired shoulder and to try to catch up academically.

# Ali edges Frazier-Lyde

VERONA, N.Y. (AP) — Madame Butterfly stung just hard enough.

Laila Ali scored a majority decision over Jacqui Frazier-Lyde on Friday night as the daughters of two of boxing's greats slugged it out for eight rounds at Turning Stone Casino.

"She's wild," the 23-year-old Ali said after upping the record of her 20-month pro career to 10-0. "It's always a little surprising when you're actually in the ring with the person fighting them. I know she had feeling behind this fight."

Only Joe Frazier was at ringside — Muhammad Ali had a prior commitment — and he watched his oldest daughter fight a game fight.

Frazier-Lyde entered ring first. She smiled and waved to the audience. Ali followed moments later, quickly raised her arms in premature triumph, and began a staredown just like their famous fathers once did in their three memorable bouts of the 1970s.

This was no "Thrilla in Manila," but it was easily the toughest bout for either fighter in their brief careers. And it was fought at a fierce pace, with both women slugging it out in the middle of the ring almost incessantly.

Frazier-Lyde stormed after Ali in the first round, intent on scoring the knockout she had promised. But Ali withstood the barrage and countered with several shots to Frazier-Lyde's head.

The second round produced more of the same, and it ended with both slamming each other toe-to-toe.

In the third, Ali stunned Frazier-Lyde with two

# Gottfried extends Alabama contract

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — Alabama coach Mark Gottfried has signed a four-year contract extension worth \$650,000 annually.

Gottfried guided Alabama to the NIT championship game last season and its best record since 1992. He now has a seven-year contract, athletic director Mal Moore said Thursday night at Gottfried's charity golf tournament.

"Mark took over a program that was down and brought it back up by creating excitement throughout the state," Moore said.

"The Ali camp did not want a rematch called, but maybe public demand will change that," Frazier-Lyde said. "I feel fantastic. My family is here and I feel like a winner."

Judge Frankie Adams scored the fight 79-73 for Ali, Tommy Hicks had it even at 76-76, and Don Ackerman had it 77-75 for Ali.

The bout attracted a great deal of attention worldwide, with more than 300 media credentials issued. It took place in an 8,000-seat tent promoters erected on a parking lot behind the casino, and just about every seat was filled at fight time.

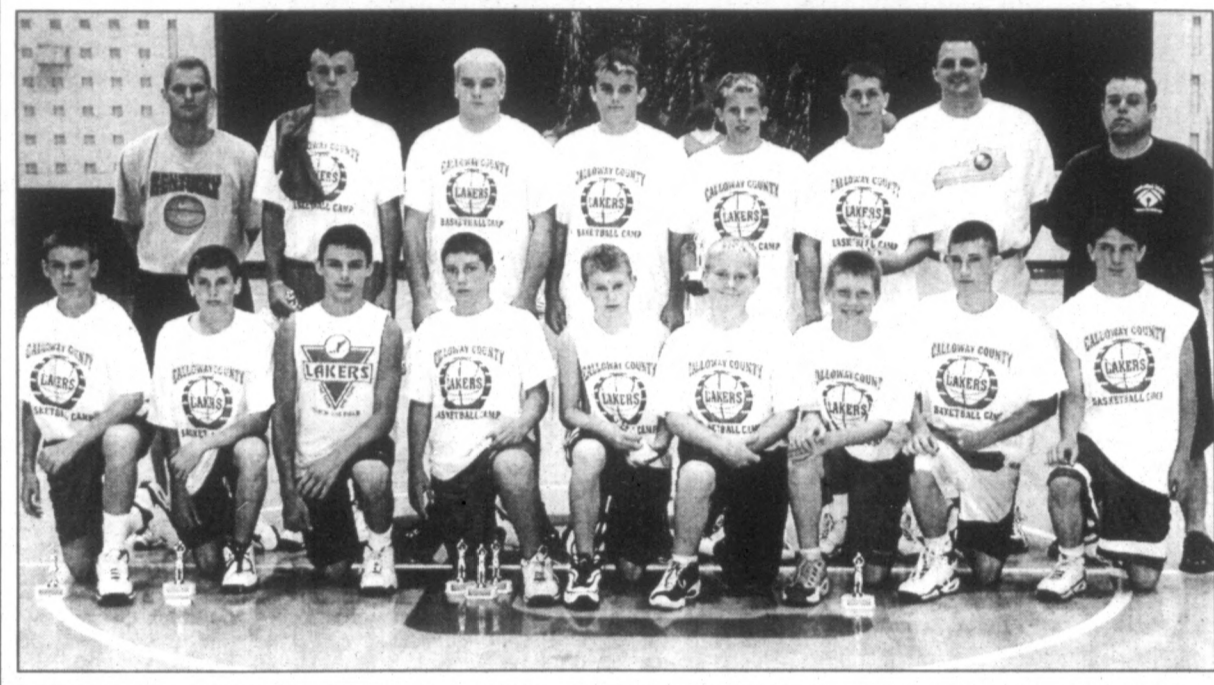

# Wells hurts back, but White Sox beat Cubs

CHICAGO (AP) — Carlos Lee watched as the ball hurtled toward the left-field wall, keeping his eyes on Rondell White as the outfielder inched backward before finally stopping.

Gotcha!  
Lee's two-out grand slam in the bottom of the 10th inning Friday night gave the White Sox a dramatic 7-3 victory over the Cubs in the first game of the Crosstown Series.

"I'm really excited right now," Lee said. "You've got to be inside me to feel the way I do right now."

It's not hard to see why the White Sox are ecstatic. They overcame a disastrous outing from David Wells, who allowed two runs — one earned — before leaving with back spasms after facing only five batters in the shortest outing of his career.

Wells went back to the clubhouse and iced his back for the rest of the game. He also took a muscle relaxant, and said he doesn't plan to miss any starts.

"The left side is normally the side where it hurts, but tonight it was the right side. It just spasmed up," Wells said. "I had a good warmup and once I walked down the steps to the dugout, that's when

it started grabbing."  
But the White Sox tied the game in the seventh on an RBI single by Sandy Alomar Jr., and Lee gave them the lead when it counted most.

Courtney Duncan (3-2) came in to pitch the 10th and walked Tony Graffanino with one out. Chris Singleton hit a liner just over the head of diminutive shortstop Augie Ojeda for a single.

With Ray Durham at the plate, Duncan threw a wild pitch, moving Graffanino to third and Singleton to second. He then walked Durham intentionally to load the bases with only one out.

"I've been doing pretty well as far as walking guys and then getting guys out," Duncan said. "Tonight, it hurt me."

After another out, Lee hit a shot over the left-field wall that brought the record crowd of 45,936 at Comiskey Park to its feet. Lee pumped his fist as the ball sailed over the wall, and his teammates mobbed him at home plate.

"As soon as I hit it, I thought I had a chance," he said. "I saw the guy go back and stop. And when he stopped I thought, I got it."

Lee also had an RBI single in the first inning. Graffanino added another RBI for the White Sox.

# Easley hits for cycle in Detroit win

DETROIT (AP) — Damian Easley saved the hardest part of hitting for the cycle for last.

After hitting an RBI double in the third inning, a three-run homer in Detroit's six-run fifth and a single in the sixth — Easley lined a triple down the right-field line in the eighth inning as the Tigers beat the Milwaukee Brewers 9-4 Friday night.

Easley became the ninth Detroit player to hit for the cycle. The previous Detroit player to hit for the cycle was Travis Fryman on July 28, 1993. That's also the last year the Tigers had a winning record.

"I was close one other time in 1997 in Cleveland," Easley said. "All I needed was a single and they walked me in my last at-bat. I've been on the other end of the spectrum, when all I needed was a simple single."

"I was very fortunate to put that ball in play and put it in the right spot. But this is a park for triples. If you get it past an outfielder, you get a triple."

# Kuerten in French final

PARIS (AP) — One point from elimination six days ago, Gustavo Kuerten is now one win from his third French Open title.

The gangly Brazilian nicknamed Guga earned a berth in the final by beating Spaniard Juan Carlos Ferrero 6-4, 6-4, 6-3 Friday.

Kuerten won the championship at Roland Garros in 1997 and again last year. On Sunday against Spaniard Alex Corretja, Kuerten will try to become the sixth man to win three French titles and the first since Mats Wilander earned his third title in 1988.

"I really never expected this to happen to me," said Kuerten, 24. "I don't try to compare myself with other guys. Not even in my best dreams was I able to win three times here."

This year, Kuerten admits, he has been lucky. He was one point from a straight-set defeat in the fourth round against American qualifier Michael Russell, an upset that would have ranked with the greatest in Grand Slam history.

But Kuerten survived a harrowing 26-stroke match point, with one of his shots landing on a line, and he then rallied for the victory.

"I was blessed that day," he said. "I feel myself with nothing to lose anymore. I shouldn't have won that match."

From that close call, the top-seeded Kuerten has gradually found

his footing on his favorite surface, and he was in top form against the fourth-seeded Ferrero.

The speedy young Spaniard came into the match with four titles this year and a 27-2 clay-court record, the best in tennis. But he was no match for Kuerten, whose experience on the big stage helped him win most of the key points.

Ferrero had eight break-point chances in the final set but failed to convert any, and finished the match 2-for-16.

"Today was pretty much close for my perfection," Kuerten said in his broken English, which is often accompanied by a smile. "I feel like playing my best tennis. I cannot wish to play better than this."

When Ferrero sent a service return into the doubles alley on match point, Kuerten reacted with a gleeful hop-skip behind the baseline, fist raised. His coach since 1989, Larri Passos, applauded and pointed to his right arm.

Why the gesture?  
"Because he had to practice with me two days, and he couldn't move his arm anymore," Kuerten explained.

Kuerten is ranked No. 1 largely because he has won 43 of his past 46 matches on clay, and he's not likely to soon shake the label of clay-court specialist because he expects to skip Wimbledon later this month. He has complained about

the seeding system there and said he simply needs a rest.

"To maybe stop only three or four days and start to practice on grass again to play in Wimbledon maybe is going to be too much for myself," he said.

In the second semifinal, the 13th-seeded Corretja disappointed the crowd by beating No. 10 Sebastian Grosjean of France 7-6 (2), 6-4, 6-4. Corretja's only other Grand Slam final was at Roland Garros in 1998, when he lost to Carlos Moya.

# Point Given ready for Belmont Stakes

NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Baffert thinks Point Given will get better with age. By then, the trainer's nerves could be shot.

"Anybody can train Point Given," Baffert said of the Preakness winner and Belmont Stakes favorite. "Not if you have a heart condition, though."

The strapping chestnut colt, who will oppose eight other 3-year-olds, including Kentucky Derby winner Monarchs, on Saturday, can quicken the heart in the afternoon. He can cause heartburn in the morning.

He's gotten loose a couple of times at Santa Anita. He reared and unseated exercise rider Pepe Aragon the morning of his disappointing fifth-place finish in the Kentucky Derby. He reared several times, but did not unseat Aragon, while on the way to the track the day before his Preakness win.

Before Point Given got his first look at the Belmont Park track Thursday morning, he reared in the barn, but Aragon managed to dismount before it happened. The colt then behaved himself on the way to the track for a gallop and on the way back to the barn, and he was a model of deportment for his final gallop Friday.

"He needs very high maintenance," Baffert said. "He's accident-prone because of his antics."

Point Given has escaped serious injury, but he did cut his head while playing in his stall last week at Churchill Downs. He returned to that track after the Preakness to prepare for the Belmont.

"This horse has aged me 10 years," the white-haired Baffert, 48, said. "He's a fun-loving horse, a big kid. He never gives you a chance to take a breath. He keeps you on your toes."

## Weather not good for anglers

The local weather hasn't been exactly what the anglers needed, and now the lake elevation has climbed back up to 360.3 feet.

This rise isn't exactly what the doctor ordered because the majority of our gamefish had moved out and deeper into the bays from the last drop in elevation.

The constant and major fluctuation upsets and prevents any fish from establishing a routine or regular feeding habits. As a result of this, most anglers have difficulty in locating and catching any particular species.

Many spend hour after hour searching for catchable fish. But most are actually fishing in the wrong waters because of the rapid change in elevations.

Another hindrance has been the cool air coming from the north. This coolness has kept the water temperature from climbing into the 80s and helping the mayflies to hatch. It's only 74-76 degrees right now.

This insect hatches by the uncountable trillions and provides all species of fish — and most other aquatic critters — with highly-nutritional foods.

For most of our years, the mayflies only hatch from the water after it has been at least 80 degrees for 10 days to a couple of weeks. Once these hatches begin, all species of our gamefish move closer to the surface so they will be able to feed on this bounty.

Most of the old timers who used their fly rods as if they were painting a work of art still have the skills to do just that. They just don't fish with them anymore.

I'm not sure why exactly, but I think maybe it's because an angler can duplicate the moves with an ultra-light spinning rod and a tiny lure. That will help them do it faster.

When the flies are hatching and hanging along the shorelines, a tiny popping bug skillfully placed near the shoreline will draw a strike everytime.

Often times, we are pleased with a largemouth or smallmouth bass taking a popper and giving us a real ride! I can recall a couple of trips when I saw fish working the surface, so I dropped a chartreuse and black popper in range of them. Instantly, there was a solid strike and a hard run.

Another factor was the rising waters keeping us away from the bluegill beds. The elevation change — more or less — shut the bite down to almost nothing. However, we made several location changes and eventually could get everyone onto some longear sunfish and small bluegill.

Jeanne "Olive Oil" Peterson caught the first fish of our trip, and the fun began as she did the famous oohh! of the cartoon character, Olive Oil. It was a perfect imitation, and it was spontaneous each time. That made it more enjoyable.

We had time to talk to the songbirds and listen to their songs in response. We are blessed with 1,500 different species of birds using the shorelines and forests around Kentucky Lake.

They are magnificent. Many came very close to us as they searched for the "big birds with strong voices."

As I stood among these good people, I realized how truly blessed I was to be able to join with them and enjoy some of God's finest works of art, the human spirit and the folks who portray it. I was very proud to be able to call them friends.

## Plan early for good fall dove field

What could be easier than preparing a good dove field?

After all, that field you shot over last September was nothing more than a cornfield that had been disked and sown with wheat after harvest.

And what about that great sunflower patch? All they had to do was mow down a few rows just before opening day, right?

Wrong!

For years, I've tried unsuccessfully to have a good dove field. I've fall-plowed fallow fields to sow a cover crop of wheat, I've chopped corn stalks, planted sunflowers — all to little or no avail. I never knew what I was doing wrong until now.

In the June issue of Field and Stream magazine, Phillip Bourjaily has an exceptionally insightful interview with the king of dove fields, Mike Weller.

Mike runs the Schudwell Dove Club in Green County Ill., and has dove fields whittled down to a fine science.

The first mistake people make when preparing a dove field is timing, according to Mr. Weller. Because the dove migration begins in August (yes, doves are migratory birds), it is important to have a food source available by the middle of July.

Local doves will get into the habit of using the early field, then will pass over better fields because they feel safe and secure where they've been feeding all along. When the migrating doves arrive, they will fall into the same pattern as the locals.

The second problem is field selection. The farm where I was raised is situated along a narrow creek-bottom with steep hill on either side.

Try as I might, I simply could not pull a significant number of doves into those small, narrow fields. That is because, according to Weller, that does like large, wide-open fields where they can circle and look for danger before alighting to feed.

This doesn't mean you have to have a hundred acre patch of sunflowers to attract doves. It does help, however, if the field is open and has good visibility from the air. The KDFWR likes their dove fields to be around 20 acres.

On CRP land, a good practice is to plant strips on large fields to get the effect of size without planting the entire field.

The Schudwell field is about 60 acres in size — half of which is planted to wheat and half to sunflowers. Weller burns the wheat in July to achieve a bare-ground situation with scattered grain that draws birds like a magnet.

In August, he works the ground to provide loose dirt where the birds can dust and gather grit. When rain compacts the ground, he works it up again. He has found that the ideal mix for doves is one acre of sunflowers for every acre of bare dirt.

Although it's getting late, we still have time to plant sunflowers that will mature in time to attract the early doves. The black oil-seed varieties work best for dove fields and should be planted at the rate of 7 to 10 pounds per acre.

Mixing the sunflower plots with milo or one of the millets will benefit a wider range of wildlife each as quail and wild turkeys.

Wheat, of course, will have to be sown in the fall. It is possible to sow wheat on sunflower fields that have been disked-down prior to dove season. Just don't get carried away with the amount of seed sown so that the field becomes baited.

It is legal to plant crops for wildlife that are to be left in the field. It is also legal to sow wheat in the fall as a cover crop, it is not legal, however, to supplement fields with corn or other grains brought back into the field. Also, practices that are legal for doves may not be legal for waterfowl.

As the great philosopher Snuffy Smith says: "Time's-a-wasting!"

The window of opportunity for a quality dove field is rapidly closing. The optimum time to plant sunflowers is May, but we're far enough south to extend into June somewhat.

Like everything else worthwhile, a good dove field takes a little work. But come Sept. 1, all the sweat and sore muscles could pay a huge dividend.

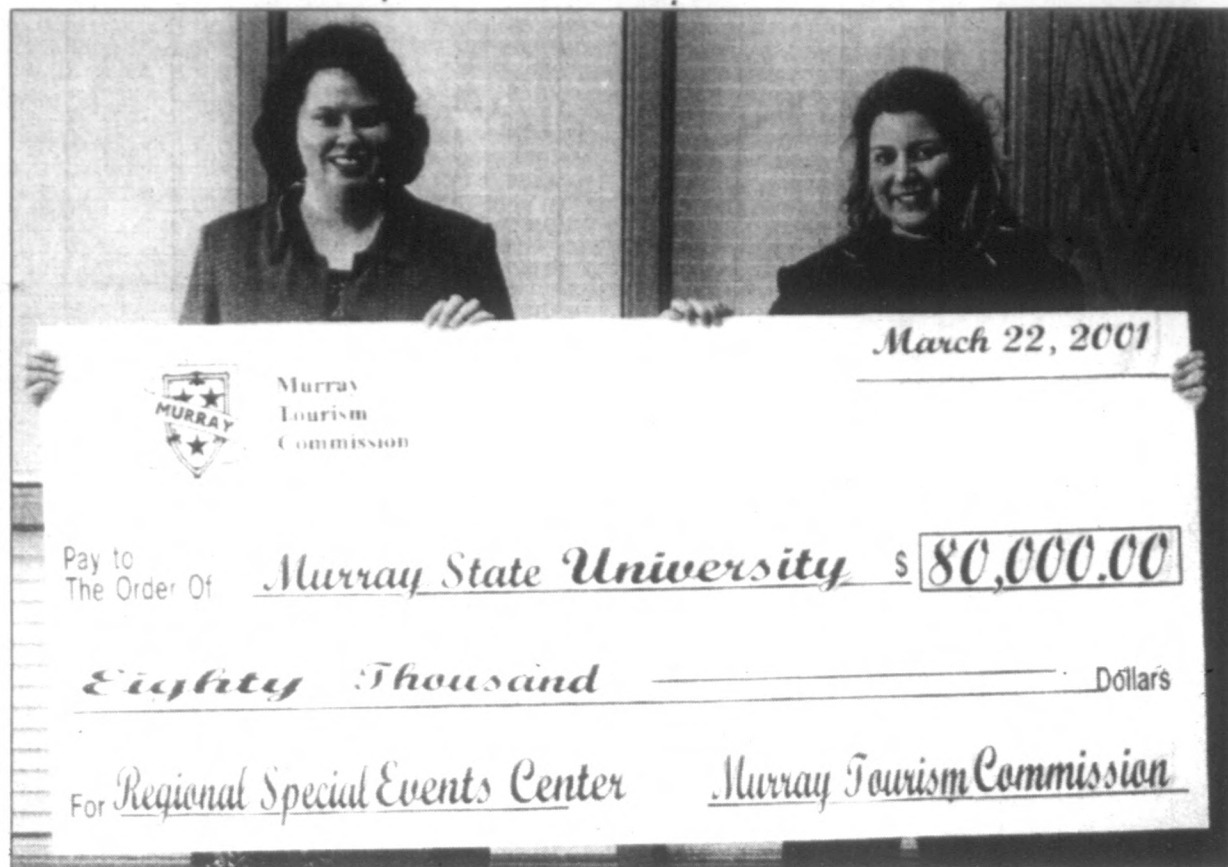

## RSEC meeting room to be added

used for business/community meetings, receptions, pre/post RSEC events and banquets. Decorations for the room will include pictures of Murray and Murray State Athletics and paintings from local artists.

"The Tourism Commission is pleased to have the opportunity to support the RSEC in this way. We feel the benefits of having this completed hospitality room available will be an added incentive for groups to host meetings and conferences in Murray," Gargus said.

## Academy warns of global warming

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a study commissioned by the White House, the National Academy of Sciences said Wednesday that global warming "is real and particularly strong within the past 20 years" and said a leading cause is emissions of carbon dioxide from burning fossil fuels.

The report was requested to help prepare Bush for his trip to Europe next week, but the academy was not asked for policy recommendations and it made none.

In Europe Bush has meetings on global warming scheduled with various officials. Many Europeans protested vigorously after Bush, citing looming energy shortages, in March reversed a campaign promise to limit CO2 emissions from power plants.

The 24-page National Academy of Sciences report, an assessment based on previous studies about the phenomenon, says, "The primary source, fossil fuel burning, has released roughly twice as much car-

bon dioxide as would be required to account for the observed increase" in temperature.

The report also blames global warming on other greenhouse gases directly affected by human activity: methane, ozone, nitrous oxide and chlorofluorocarbons.

"Despite the uncertainties, there is general agreement that the observed warming is real and particularly strong within the past 20 years," it says.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My fiance, a 45-year-old sun worshiper, suffers from chronic itching that is so bad he has to use a hairbrush or fork for relief. He has very dry skin that emollients don't seem to cure. Is this a dietary deficiency? What alternative might help him?

DEAR READER: Dry skin from sun damage can be a challenging problem to cure, in large part because, as we age, our skins become less tolerant to ultraviolet radiation and the effects of cold, dry winter weather.

I suggest that your fiance see a dermatologist for advice and treatment. For obvious reasons, he should protect himself from UV light by using appropriate clothing and sun blocks. While he is awaiting the doctor's appointment, he might try Curel or Vaseline Intensive Care Lotion, both of which, in my experience, are effective moisturizers.

Dietary deficiencies in this country are rare in people who consume balanced, nutritious diets. Therefore, I'd focus on the most probable cause of his problem: skin damage.

I see from your letter that you live in Phoenix, Ariz. In environments such as this, UV-induced dermatological problems are commonplace. The dermatologist will probably echo my sentiments: namely, that sun protection is the answer.

I remember that as a youngster, I was encouraged by my mother to "go outside and play. It's a beautiful, sunny day." Later, in high school, a suntan was as much a part of adolescence as was use of the family car.

Boy, were we wrong. For those of you in my generation, do you remember using baby oil spiked with iodine? This combination was guaranteed (we

were told) to increase the depth of the tan. Consequently, we were programmed to believe that sun exposure was healthful — and the more, the better.

This view is not only incorrect, it is unhealthy. Nonetheless, I continue to adore the sun, so that I tan every summer. Cross this off to continuing adolescent independence, coupled with pig-headedness. However, in your fiance's case, some sort of intervention is necessary. Forgive my detours. Get him to a dermatologist.

To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "What You Should Know About Skin Cancer."

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can you help me with what is probably a trivial complaint? I have small veins. Every time I undergo blood tests, I am subjected to a repeated — and painful — procedure. How can I overcome this problem?

DEAR READER: Small or collapsed veins are a real challenge to the technicians who are responsible for drawing blood. To a large degree, this is less your problem than it is a technical difficulty. Often the discomfort can be overcome by an experienced phlebotomist who can find small veins and utilize them.

When you require blood tests, ask for the most experienced technician, who may use a small needle to obtain blood. In my experience, this option often solves the problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 10-year-old grandson wets the bed nightly and regularly messes in his pants. He is of average intelligence, but seems to be real lazy. Could this be a medical problem that we should raise with his pediatrician?

DEAR READER: Unfortunately, yes. Your grandson could have a physical basis — such as a colon abnormality — that should be addressed along with the bed-wetting. The doctor can advise you and refer your grandson to specialists or counselors as needed.

Opening lead — queen of hearts.

When a contract appears to be hopeless, that's the time declarer should put on his thinking cap and see whether he can pull some kind of miracle out of the air. We've all had the experience of biting off more than we can chew, but occasionally an overly ambitious contract can be brought home in an unexpected manner.

South is in six spades, and the outlook is certainly dim. It seems that he must inevitably

lose a diamond and a club and go down one. But the slam can be made, and, furthermore, it should be made.

Declarer's only real chance is to find East with the ace of diamonds and length in clubs. Accordingly, he cashes the K-A of hearts and ruffs a heart high in dummy. He then plays a low diamond, winning in his hand with the queen. (East cannot afford to rise with the ace, which would give South an extra diamond trick and the contract.) Declarer now leads four rounds of trumps, producing this position:

When South cashes the nine of spades and discards a club from dummy, East cannot afford to part with a club, so he discards the jack of diamonds. Declarer thereupon leads the seven of diamonds and plays low from dummy, forcing East to win with the ace, and the king of diamonds becomes South's twelfth trick.

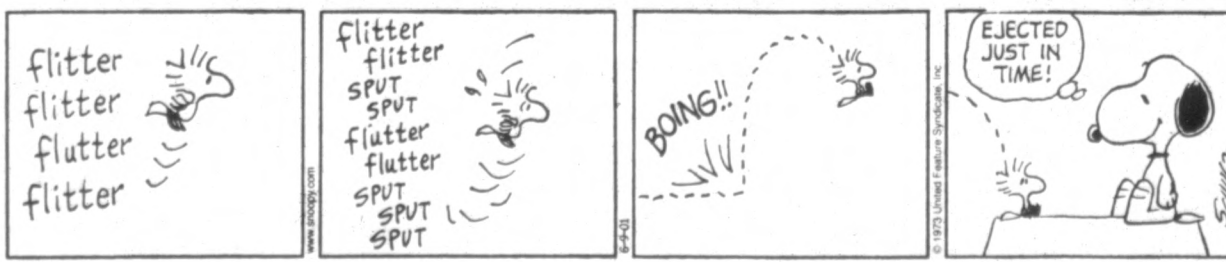

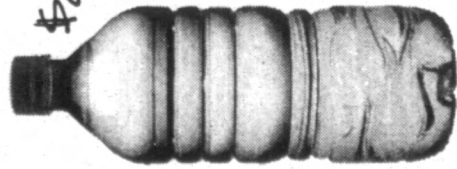
