## 'Like the phoenix...'

On Aug. 29, 1981, the front page of the Murray Ledger and Times read "Ledger building gutted by fire." A fire that started in the press room destroyed the building and left almost everything unsalvageable.

Although it occurred over 20 years ago, several Ledger employees remember and kept souvenirs of that day. Most can't believe it has been 20 years.

"I couldn't believe it," Publisher Alice Rouse said. "I felt like a part of your life was gone."

Rouse, who was the bookkeeper for the paper at the time, said her office was backed up to where the fire had started, so most of her office was destroyed.

"We were fortunate to have closed our books out that day," Rouse said. "We had closed out the books that day and had already sent out our files. We also had a safe where we kept deposits, and those had already been made."

Then-publisher Walt Apperson said the reason the fire started is still undetermined.

"Probably lightning was their guess, but they never came up with exactly what caused it," he said. "It rained a lot that night and there was a lot of lightning strikes."

At 3 a.m., a passerby saw the flames and reported the blaze, and at 7 a.m. employees showed up at the office, business as usual.

Community Editor Jo Burkeen said she remembered that the circulation manager at that time, Ted Delaney, went in the back door to get the circulation list so no one would miss the paper that day.

"After we got the paper out, we were only an hour behind schedule," Production manager Brian O'Neill said.

O'Neill and several others packed up shop and went to Mayfield to compose the paper for the day. "We were dedicated to the fact that the newspaper wouldn't stop," he added.

In the fire, many things to put the paper together were lost, including some of the standing artwork. He said Mayfield Messenger employees helped them find old copies of the Ledger so art could be clipped and reprinted.

He said when he returned to Murray, the office had been relocated across the street at a

former senior citizens' center. The telephone company had transferred phone service, the schools donated typewriters, and other stores offered their services.

"That was the hardest thing, going back to typewriters," Burkeen said.

O'Neill said although they tried to salvage as much as they could, everything had to be restocked in the office.

"We didn't have pencils, we didn't have anything," O'Neill said, remembering going to the old Twin Lakes store and grabbing piles of things from the shelves to resupply the

office. The supplemental office was not half as large as the previously housed building. The room held several departments of people and the newsprint. Space was so limited, the one restroom was for men, ladies and developing pictures.

"We had to coordinate the bathroom with the developing," Apperson said.

Burkeen said her desk was ruined from water and smoke damage, and she lost several books. When she was allowed to go through and collect salvageable personal items she took her notary stamp and her pair of scissors. Apperson said he managed to salvage some awards, plaques and personal items.

Most people who experienced the fire said they were mostly impressed with the commu-

## MSU Candidate Dr. Howard scheduled for Tuesday stop

With any luck, Dr. G. Daniel Howard will have conflicting emotions Sept. 15 when the University of North Alabama Lions travel to Murray to play the Racers in football.

"I would love to be at that game representing both my former and future employer," he said Friday afternoon via telephone from his office in Alabama.

Dr. Howard is currently serving as vice president for university advancement and administration at UNA. But on Tuesday, he will be touring the MSU campus as the first of three presidential candidates scheduled to visit the university next week.


Howard will be vying to replace retired MSU President Dr. Kern Alexander. Although he officially retired in June, Alexander is serving as acting MSU president until a replacement is hired.

The other two candidates, Dr. F. King Alexander, director/coordinator of the Higher Education Program at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Ill., and son of Kern Alexander, and Dr. Donald Bates, dean of the School of Management at California State University at Dominguez Hills, will visit the MSU campus Wednesday and Thursday, although the university has not announced which candidate will visit on which day.

Tuesday will not mark Howard's first trip to Murray, however. He said he was last on the MSU campus two years ago, and has been aware of the university's reputation as a quality educational institution for a number of years.

"Murray State has a long, distinguished history of providing a quality education at an affordable price," he said. "It also offers opportunities

for several first-generation students, and, being a first-generation student myself, that type of environment appeals to me."

Howard said he was raised in the greater-New York City area. He is married, but he and his wife, Anne, have no children, "which is something he said makes the university environment even more appealing to him."

"We do not have any children, unfortunately, so the college community sort of becomes like a family to me," Howard said.

His academic career spans over two decades. He holds two doctorates and two master's degrees from Indiana University and a bachelor's degree from Manhattan College. In addition to UNA, he has held positions at IU, Indiana State University,

## Murray church showcasing means to 'Financial Peace'

Nearly 16 weeks ago, a group of families at the Murray First Assembly of God church decided to enroll themselves in Financial Peace University, a 13-week course developed by financial counselor Dave Ramsey designed to help people pay off debt and build up savings.

After meeting at the church for the 13 weeks, those families, which included Randy Smith, part-time director of helping ministries at First Assembly, and his wife, looked back and realized that they had paid off an average of over \$2,000 in debt between them.

The results of the classes made such an impression on Smith that he began to make efforts to offer the classes to even more people in the future.

"I spent a lot of time earlier this

year listening to (Ramsey's) radio show," Smith said. "We looked at it, I talked to my pastor, and we got approval to be coordinators."

First Assembly will offer two orientation sessions for those who wish to participate in the FPU classes, which are scheduled to begin Sept. 12 at the church. The first session will be held this Sunday at 3 p.m. and the second will be offered Wednesday at 7 p.m.

Smith said it is crucial for those who wish to attend the classes to attend at least one of the orientation sessions because that is how the church will gauge how much material to order.

Plus, Smith said FPU usually takes two weeks to ship materials; but, in this case, will have less than one to make, a shipment that will, hopefully, be much larger than their average shipments.

"Usually when they give the advance materials to coordinators, they send out about 50 brochures," he said. "We ordered 5,000 brochures."

The church, Smith said, will make no money in sponsoring the classes. In fact, the church, along with help from various sponsors, is in charge of paying for all the advertising costs associated with bringing FPU to Murray.

"What we're doing is just hosting the university," he said. "We're a church. We're non-profit, and we're really offering this as a community service."

Ramsey's own story of financial redemption is well-circulated. He had accumulated over \$4 million in real estate by the age of 26, only to lose his entire portfolio and virtually

# West Nile Virus confirmed in Kentucky

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A sick horse on a Bourbon County farm has been confirmed as Kentucky's first case of West Nile Virus, a mosquito-borne disease that can be transmitted to humans and can cause deadly encephalitis.

State veterinarian Dr. Don Notter said a vaccine for horses has been given conditional approval, but he is not prepared to recommend its widespread use. Notter said the vaccine is pure and safe, but its effectiveness in warding off the disease is unproven. Nevertheless, Notter said

Kentucky's entire horse population could be at risk of the disease because there has been no previous exposure.

The virus is not known to be a particular danger to other livestock, with the possible exception of raijite birds, such as ostriches and emus, which are raised commercially in some parts of Kentucky.

Agriculture Department officials said the horse with the first known infection is recovering from the disease.

Until this summer, West Nile

Virus has been limited largely to the northeastern United States. But it has slowly been making its way south and west. An Aug. 11 death of a 71-year-old Atlanta woman was blamed on the virus. It was the first reported U.S. death from the disease outside the Northeast.

The disease is carried by birds, especially crows, blue jays and birds of prey. Mosquitoes acquire it from infected birds and can pass it along through bites to some livestock and humans.

People bitten by a mosquito car-

rying the virus will experience flu-like symptoms to varying degrees. Most will have a mild reaction, and a rare few will develop an inflammation of the brain.

The state has notified federal health authorities of the finding and the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service has sent inspectors to the farm where the infected horse was located.

The state agriculture department wants reports on dead birds, especially those of the type known to be especially vulnerable.

# Judge drops charges against restaurant owner

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A federal judge has dropped charges of harboring illegal workers against a Hispanic restaurant-chain owner and criticized authorities for targeting the man because of his race.

Octavio Correa Gomez, a legal immigrant who started the seven-restaurant El Rio Grande chain in Lexington and other cities in

Kentucky, had been charged with harboring seven undocumented workers at apartments he rented in Georgetown and Winchester.

Senior U.S. District Court Judge Henry R. Wilhoit Jr. said in Friday's ruling the government could have prosecuted 14 other cases against public or white-owned businesses the Immigration and Naturalization

Service had raided in eastern Kentucky between 1996 and 2000, but never filed charges against any of them.

Court documents show that during that time, the INS made 17 raids in eastern Kentucky that netted 218 illegal workers, 199 with false papers and 19 with no papers of any sort.

nity support.  
"We rose like the phoenix from the ash with a little help from our friends," Apperson said.  
"What was remarkable was the people coming together to help," Burken said.  
O'Neill said he was glad that he

went through the experience and saw how helpful everyone was. However, O'Neill said the saddest part of the fire was some of the historical items that were lost.  
He also said several etchings and wooden stamps the paper used for art early on were also lost in the fire. "All that history went up in flames," he said.

everything he owned. By age 30, he had gotten so far into debt that he had to declare personal bankruptcy.  
Since that time, Ramsey has rebuilt his financial life and is now host of the nationally syndicated radio talk show "The Dave Ramsey Show." His first book, "Financial Peace," topped the *New York Times* best seller list and has sold more than 700,000 copies.  
Smith said he believes Ramsey's message can be applied to people in all stages of their financial lives, whether those lives are in virtual ruin or seeming prosperity.  
"This isn't just for people who are financially stressed or struggling," Smith said. "Probably less than 50 percent of the people who come through are really financially struggling. Anybody from \$12,000 to over \$100,000 a year income can benefit."  
One thing Smith said the program is not, however, is a quick fix to all of life's financial pitfalls. "This is not a 'get-rich-quick' program," he said. "With this course comes accountability and also encouragement. We had one family that paid off over \$10,000 in debt."  
Each family that participates in FPU will receive a kit that includes a copy of "Financial Peace," 13 audio lessons, including Ramsey's personal testimonial; two debit card holders; a financial calculator computer program; monthly budgeting forms; and all 13 lessons.  
Smith said each session will be taught by Ramsey himself via videotape. He said none of the sessions should last more than two hours, and the church will be providing free child care for those who need it.  
Smith also said the local bankers and realtors will be on-hand to answer questions during the classes.  
"They're not here to sell anything," he said. "They're just here to answer questions and then maybe be there down the road. It's a mutual benefit."

and the State of New York Institute of Technology at Utica-Rome.  
Since 1992, Howard has reported directly to the UNA president. Before attaining his current position, he served as UNA's dean of research, assistant to the president and acting dean of enrollment management.  
As chief advancement officer, Howard has university-wide responsibility for alumni affairs, governmental relations, fund-raising, public relations, publications and the UNA Foundation, a non-profit fund-raising organization for the university that is very similar to MSU's Racer Foundation.  
Howard said UNA is in the process of complete a \$10 million capital campaign very similar to MSU's own \$25 million Vision Quest campaign, which was completed earlier this year. He said since state money for higher education in Alabama is becoming almost as scarce as it is in Kentucky, he fully understands the importance of outside funding sources.  
"One of the things that you almost have to do is raise a substantial amount of scholarship support from outside sources," Howard said. "That's one of the things I feel like is my strength, that fund-raising aspect."  
As UNA's chief administrative officer, Howard has university-wide responsibility for Affirmative Action, human resources, the university's physical plant and public safety.  
Even with that list of credentials, however, Howard said, should he be hired, he does not plan on being able to walk onto the MSU campus and immediately begin implementing plans and ideas.  
"There's a lot of studying that has to go on," he said, stressing the importance of listening to both on- and off-campus voices for support. "I think the biggest mistake someone could make is to come to a university and try to impose a predetermined plan on everyone."  
Each presidential candidate will meet with faculty, staff and students, as well as participating in meetings with alumni and community members, while on the MSU campus. Howard said he expects to arrive in Murray sometime Monday evening.  
"I'm honored to be one of the three candidates," Howard said. "When you get to this level, all of the candidates are going to possess a very high level of expertise. I'm sure Murray State will make the best decision."

# Conference on youth issues planned

PADUCAH, Ky. — The Odyssey Foundation Inc. is gearing up for its third Annual Odyssey Institute, scheduled for Sept. 6-7 at the Murray State University Curris Center.

The Odyssey Foundation Inc. began in 1998 based on the question, "What would you do if someone asked you to spend the next five years of your life making the world a better place for children to live in?" They will be posing the same question to institute participants as they begin "Investing in the Journey."

The Odyssey Foundation Inc. is

made up of several agencies from throughout the region, including Easter Seals West Kentucky, F.R.I.E.N.D.S. Family Resources and Youth Services Center, First Steps, Great River After School Program Helping H.A.N.D.S. for the homeless program, the Kentucky Department for Community Based Services, Murray Head Start, the MSU Department of Adolescent Career and Special Education and the Purchase Area Development District.

Designed as an "interactive" learning experience, the Odyssey Institute will begin each day with a

nationally known speaker who will set the tone, or "theme," for that day. Participants will be invited to choose two sessions from a "menu" of six springboard sessions - workshops with local and regionally known speakers - and this year will also feature a "networking" luncheon with legislative consultant Linda Likins.

Naomi Haynes Griffith, a national speaker and consultant on child advocacy issues in both the United States and Canada, will be the keynote speaker Thursday, and will also lead a springboard session titled "Count to 10 Backwards" - dealing

with angry children.

Jevon Thompson, also nationally known throughout the U.S. and Canada, will be Friday's keynote speaker, and will lead a springboard titled "Watch Out for the Quicksand!" - re-igniting hope in difficult times.

The Odyssey Institute is a piece of the larger effort known as the Odyssey Project, a community building effort to create a five-year process of "way-finding" designed to help communities learn how to better care for and protect their children. ## Dropout prevention works in Jefferson Co.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Since last year, the state Department of Education has been looking for ways to lower Kentucky's dropout rate.

One of Jefferson County's methods is by taking students out of their classes.

The program separates struggling students from the rest of the student body for a period of time, allowing them to focus on courses that give them trouble.

It is a modified version of Jefferson County High School, which was created to help students who had fallen behind earn high school diplomas.

The students work at their own pace, to catch up or finish their schoolwork. They must attend an 8-to-11 a.m. class every day; in the afternoons, they continue their studies or work in approved outside jobs for course credit.

As with Jefferson County High School, students in the pilot programs will stay in one classroom, working on individual courses either online or from books. They'll also be isolated from other students in their schools, taking lunch and bathroom breaks at different times.

## Sundquist announces park closings, reductions of hours as budget move

### InTennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — All or part of 14 state parks will close and dozens of others will open only five days a week to save Tennessee \$3.2 million, Gov. Don Sundquist announced.

The spending reductions in the state park system are the sixth in a series announced by the governor totaling \$36 million so far.

The closures and curtailment of operating hours will mean the layoff of 76 part-time employees in the coming days, said Kim Olson, spokeswoman for the Department of Environment and Conservation.

She said 108 full-time employees will be involved in a reduction-in-force effort that will take 90 days to complete. She could not say how many of those 108 people will lose their jobs; some may have to transfer.

"No one here takes any pleasure in any part of this plan," she said.

"But it's the only option we had left. I don't think this is a surprise."


The park closures and reduced hours are expected to save \$1.4 million.

Seven parks will close on Tuesday until further notice.

The 47 state parks that are not resort parks will be closed on Mondays and Tuesdays, beginning the day after Labor Day, at a savings of more than \$1 million.

The inn and restaurant at Reelfoot Lake will close the first week of October. Some parts of other parks will remain open, such as the golf course at Henry Horton and the marina at Norris. The inn, restaurant and gift shops at Montgomery Bell and Natchez Trace will close for the winter.

## Business paints sunnier Labor Day forecast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Labor Secretary Elaine Chao says America's work force this Labor Day weekend is stronger, safer and more skilled than ever. Organized labor offers a strikingly different picture: unhappy workers who distrust their employers.

"The state of the work force is strong," Chao said Thursday in her first Labor Day address, which she delivered to business and government officials at a forum of the Council of Excellence in Government. "But we can always do better, and we will if we focus on improving the lives of America's working families."

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce weighed in with a study that showed a half-million jobs were created in the past year, and wages of private, nonfarm workers increased 1.7 percent from a year ago.

According to an AFL-CIO poll, however, most workers think they need an improved job situation and don't trust their employers to treat them fairly.

"American workers, this study finds, have issued a report card to corporate America and stamped it unsatisfactory," said John Sweeney, president of the AFL-CIO.

More than half of respondents said their wages, benefits and working conditions need a lot of or some improvements. Nearly two in three said they trust their employers only some or not at all.

The telephone poll was conducted July 5-9 by Peter D. Hart Research Associates, which surveyed 1,792 workers who were not business owners. It had an error margin of 3.5 percentage points.

Layoffs since the economic downturn have driven the nation's unemployment rate from a 30-year-low of 3.9 percent last October to 4.5 percent in July. Many economists are predicting the jobless rate will continue to rise but will remain at or below 5 percent.

Chao said that unemployment represents a "skills gap" in the available jobs and workers' training, demonstrating a need for job training and education.

"A lot of Americans want to work, yet many of the jobs created by the economy go begging because employers cannot find qualified workers," she said.

In 1979, college graduates were paid 88 percent more than high school graduates. Now, college graduates earn 70 percent more, Chao said. The unemployment rate for a high school dropout is nearly four times the rate for a college graduate.

The United States also faces a labor shortage in the coming years as the large baby boom generation starts to retire. Younger workers who will represent the future work force are "more fluid, less tied down to one job and one career," she said.

Today's average 32-year-old already has changed jobs nine times — "from broke to flush, from worker to manager, from dreamer to company president and back again — in less time than many of us spent on our first apprenticeship," she said.


But Sweeney said worker protections should be a priority. In the AFL-CIO's poll, only eight of 100 respondents knew what work rights exist. Most erroneously thought they have more rights than they do.

For example, nearly two-thirds wrongly said an employer could not legally fire an employee with a good performance record without a good reason.

Three of five wrongly said an employer could not legally refuse to provide sick leave.

The poll also showed growing support for corporate responsibility laws that would hold corporations to higher standards in their treatment of employees.

In April 1996, respondents were evenly divided about such laws. In July 2001, 56 percent said new laws should be passed while 35 percent were against it.

# Governor races in N.J., Virginia different as blue, red

WASHINGTON (AP) — New Jersey and Virginia are the only states with governors' elections this year and Republicans have cause to be nervous about both races.

Each state has a Republican governor who is not running for re-election. And in both states the Democratic candidates are leading in the polls by double digits heading into the Labor Day weekend.

Beyond those similarities, the two races couldn't be more different than blue and red.

Democrat Al Gore won New Jersey by 16 percentage points in last year's presidential election and the state was marked blue on many post-election maps to signify the Democratic win. Republican George W. Bush carried Virginia by nine points and it was marked red.

"New Jersey and Virginia are fundamentally different," said Larry Sabato, a political analyst at the University of Virginia. "New Jersey has a large Democratic voter base and Virginia is the mirror opposite."

In New Jersey, Democrat Jim McGreevey had a 19-point lead over Republican Bret Schundler in two recent polls. In Virginia, Democrat Mark Warner had a lead of 14 points over Republican Mark Earley.

"A lead of 14 points for a Democrat in Virginia can easily melt away by November," Sabato said.

Schundler aides say there is time for him to broaden his appeal by contrasting his mayoral record with McGreevey's and talking about issues like his opposition to highway tolls.

McGreevey, the mayor of Woodbridge, N.J., expects to campaign with Gore in September, and Schundler's aides say they hope President Bush will be coming to the state for the GOP mayor of Jersey City.

Virginia will offer no such echoes of the 2000 presidential campaign, even though the president will appear there for Earley next month.

Democrats believe Warner has a finan-

cial advantage over Earley of 2-to-1 or 3-to-1 now after Warner raised as much as \$9 million from 12,000 donors. The Warner campaign has been advertising throughout the summer. His aides expect the GOP will pour resources and surrogates into the state.

"I don't have any plans to bring in lots of outsiders," said Warner, a 46-year-old, self-made multimillionaire. "This is going to be a campaign on Virginia values ... and we'll let the chips fall where they may come November."

Warner has visited all parts of the state repeatedly for more than a year and a half, has laid out issue positions on issues from education to early childhood care to rural development. His campaign has its own bluegrass tune and he has courted everyone from NASCAR fans to hunters to high-tech businessmen. He talks about a need to clean up the fiscal mess in Richmond after state government was entangled in a budget impasse this year.

Earley, a 47-year-old former state lawmaker and attorney general, has been promoting his support for tax cuts, improvements in education and his accomplishments during his long service in Virginia government.

Earley, who appeared in northern Virginia with Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Ridge this week, says he's not worried about the polls. Ridge emphasized that Earley would continue a tradition of GOP leadership in the state.

"We feel real good about where we are," Earley said. "We wanted to wait until

September and October when people were paying attention (to buy television time). We'll draw a contrast between our experience and our opponents' lack of experience."

National Democrats are optimistic. "Heading into the Labor Day weekend, we could not ask to be in a better position," said California Gov. Gray Davis, chairman of the Democratic Governors' Association. "We know these races will be tough, but we feel very good about our prospects in New Jersey and Virginia."

While some Republicans privately concede they have their hands full, party leaders are more optimistic publicly.

Virginia Gov. Jim Gilmore, chairman of the Republican National Committee, says he likes Republicans' chances in both states and says the GOP will help in both races. Schundler's appeal in New Jersey will grow through the fall as he becomes better known, Gilmore said.

The governor was especially critical of Warner for his sometimes folksy approach to campaigning in areas like southwest Virginia.

"Mark Warner in bib overalls playing the banjo is pretty ridiculous and a little insulting to the people of southwest Virginia," Gilmore said. "These are sophisticated people who won't fall for it."

# Helping the church lead the way to Confederacy



Basil Manly is a name from Old South history with which to reckon. Unfortunately, he rests in nigh-oblivion. As much as any fire-eater southerner — whether John Calhoun or William Yancey — Manly caused the Civil War. But he did it from a pulpit rather than from a political

office. Born in North Carolina in 1798, the son of a Revolutionary War hero, Manly joined the Baptist Church in 1816, and soon began lay preaching. He attended an academy in Beaufort, S.C., and went from it to South Carolina College, then headed by the famous Thomas Cooper, graduating as valedictorian after two years.

From there, he went in 1822 to infamous Edgefield County (from which would come an array of controversial figures, such as Louis T. Wigfall and James Longstreet, and many South Carolina political leaders) as a Baptist minister.

Manly quickly made a mark as an amazingly successful revivalist. Interestingly enough, many Baptist churches in the early 19th century were integrated, and pro-missions evangelists such as Manly insisted that spreading the gospel was important, whether at home or abroad. Within a few months, Manly's work became known as "The Edgefield Revival," and he baptized hundreds of whites and slaves.

The revival spread to nearby Georgia, and in no time at all, the young Manly was famous. In 1825, he was invited to be minister of the Baptist Church in Philadelphia, Pa., but declined, but in 1826 was called to Charleston's First Baptist Church and went.

Eleven years later, Manly's advocacy of education and the strong ties between old South Carolina and young Alabama led to his election as the second president of the University of Alabama. The first president, Alva Woods, was also a Baptist — although from Harvard and Brown University — and left after six years, but played a strong role in selecting Manly as his successor.

For the next 18 years, Manly would be a prominent figure in Alabama affairs. He was on the lecture circuit almost constantly (mostly preaching at Baptist churches), presided over a rather good faculty that included two great scientists (F.A.P. Barnard and Michael Tuomey), was friend to a long line of Alabama governors, influenced legislators (the state capital was then in Tuscaloosa, near the university) and spoke out on political issues of the day.

Somewhere along the way — probably beginning with South Carolina's failure to secede during the Nullification Crisis — Manly became convinced that separation of South and North was inevitable. Sixteen years before the Confederacy was formed and Civil War came, Manly helped lead the withdrawal of many southern Baptist churches from the National Baptist Convention, to form in 1845 the Southern Baptist Convention.

In 1856, Manly would be president of that convention. He spoke often, in public and in private, of the inevitable separation of the states. A defense of slavery was at the center of the separation.

In 1855, he left the university and returned to Charleston, as pastor of the Wentworth Street church, but three years later he was back in Alabama, where he was more respected, at First Baptist in Montgomery.

Fate brought him late in life to the first capital of the Confederacy. He did battle fearlessly against the Garrisonian abolitionists of the North, but even late in his life and owning about 40 slaves, he contemplated seriously accepting yet another call to Philadelphia.

Manly served as chaplain for the Alabama secession convention that took Alabama out of the Union, and then a few weeks later, he served as chaplain to the new provisional Confederate government, which had chosen Montgomery as national capital.

And when Jefferson Davis stood on the state-house steps (the place marked by a star even today), Basil Manly stood beside him, along with Vice President Alexander Stephens, as President Davis took the oath of office.

Throughout his long and successful career, Manly had been an advocate of Baptist education, and while he was not technically the "founder" of Furman University, Howard College (now Samford University) and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, he was one of the most important partisans in their behalf.

Manly died in 1868 in Greenville, S.C., where both Furman and the seminary were then located, and is buried there.

Manly loved the limelight, and was a bit vain and obsessed with power and with recognitions, but in a South that was still virtually a developing frontier, he represented a radical regional consciousness and a drive for cultural institutions (schools, colleges and churches) to civilize the savage breast.

## Bankruptcy judge cuts off funding for Wilkinson Farms

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A bankruptcy judge has cut off funding for Wilkinson Farms, saying former Gov. Wallace G. Wilkinson has not justified continued spending on his money-losing cattle and grain business.

Judge William S. Howard said Wilkinson had to show that keeping the farm operating would benefit his creditors, but "the court simply has not been provided with the information to carry that burden."

Funding might be restored, Howard said on Thursday, if problems are resolved, including a dispute about an ownership interest in the farm by Wilkinson's wife, Martha Wilkinson.

Wallace Wilkinson, who is in bankruptcy reorganization with \$431.3 million in debts, owns 587 acres and leases 1,000 acres along U.S. 127 northwest of Harrodsburg

in Mercer County.

The properties have been maintained as working farms in the belief that they can fetch a higher price if they are well-kept.

Elizabeth Thompson, attorney for Wilkinson's unsecured creditors, said the farm "lost an incredible amount of money" — \$14.5 million — during recent years. Meanwhile, Martha Wilkinson is claiming a half-interest in the farm but not paying half the expenses, Thompson said.

Martha Wilkinson has agreed to give up her interest in the farm's grain crop, which could be worth \$100,000. But Thompson pointed out that \$100,000 would be less than half the cost of upkeep, which has totaled \$227,000 this year, so Martha Wilkinson was giving up nothing.

Mary Fullington, a lawyer for

Wallace Wilkinson, argued that Howard had no authority to force Martha Wilkinson to pay for crop production because she is not in bankruptcy and is not under his jurisdiction.

Thomas Bunch, a lawyer for one of Wilkinson's creditors, Union Planters Bank, said the judge's ruling meant Wilkinson shouldn't be allowed to write paychecks that were due to his farmhands. Bunch also said the ruling should force Martha Wilkinson to the negotiating table if she wants to protect her half-interest in the farms.

The judge also ordered Wallace Wilkinson to provide creditors with details about the grain crop or an acceptable budget for the farm or copies of the leases for the 1,000 acres. The leases are apparently oral agreements between Wilkinson and landowners in Italy.

## Kentucky Briefs

HIGHLAND HEIGHTS, Ky. (AP) — Northern Kentucky University is up by more than 600 more students this year.

Total enrollment is 12,903, compared with 12,267 last year. It's the largest number of students in the school's 33-year history.

With 4,116 freshmen, a record number of first-year students are also attending classes this fall.

OWENSBORO, Ky. (AP) — New student enrollment at Kentucky Wesleyan College increased 5 percent from last year. This year 230 new students, including freshmen and transfer students, are attending the school, compared with last year's 219 new students, according to the college.

Total enrollment slightly decreased this year, with 671 students compared with last year's 679.

Meanwhile, the college's trustees appointed Jack Wells as chairman. Wells, who is president of Wells Health System Inc., Owensboro, has been a trustee since 1994. He will serve a three-year term.

Five new members were also appointed to the 15-member board: Arba Kenner, a Frankfort physician; Cheryl Downing King, a deputy secretary for the Kentucky Cabinet for Workforce Development in Frankfort; Marcia Smith Lawrence, a retired Lexington accountant; Kenneth Peters, a family practitioner and senior partner at Jeffersontown Family Practice, Louisville; and Randall Raskin, president of Coach's Choice Apparel Inc., New York.

## Tentative agreement reached with USEC

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — U.S. Enrichment Corp. and union workers at the nation's only uranium enrichment plant have signed a short-term labor agreement that calls for no strikes or layoffs of hourly workers at the plant — at least until mid-November.

The agreement also gives the plant's 700 hourly workers a 4 percent hourly wage increase retroactive to July 31 when the former five-year contract expired.

The hope is that by Nov. 15, USEC and members of the Paper, Allied-Industrial, Chemical and Energy Workers union will have signed a permanent contract.

"We see this as a turning point for a new relationship with the union in which we can work together to ensure the long-term success and sustainability of the plant," said USEC spokeswoman Elizabeth Stuckle.

The company pledged to have a contract proposal between Oct. 1 and Nov. 15 for the union to accept or reject, said David Fuller, president of the local PACE.

"They're obviously interested in innovative and moneysaving ideas within the plant itself," Fuller said.

"I think they hope to establish a new relationship whereby there's more of a partnering atmosphere and attempting to look for new ways of doing business that would be more advantageous to the plant as a whole."

The two sides had been deadlocked since Aug. 2 when the union soundly rejected USEC's contract offer. After resuming for a day, negotiations broke off for three weeks until Wednesday.

Primarily, the union workers opposed language in the contract that it would expire after a year if USEC was not able to meet the terms it wanted regarding the purchase of Russian uranium.

Stuckle and Fuller said the Russian issue was not a part of the agreement reached Wednesday, but Fuller said the extension gives USEC time to learn more about the federal government's stance on the purchase of Russian uranium.

Both sides hope by September, the Bush administration will finish reviewing whether the Paducah plant should remain in business and if USEC should continue being sole agent for the purchase of Russian uranium.

## Tigers use ground game to top rivals

■ CCHS offense stymied in loss to rival Murray

It's often said that football games are won and lost at the line of scrimmage.

That was certainly true of Friday's showdown between crosstown rivals Murray High and Calloway County.

The Tigers (2-0) dominated the trenches on both sides of the ball, using a powerful rushing attack and a rock-solid defensive effort to down the Lakers by a 31-13 count at Ty Holland Stadium.

Murray's dynamic backfield tandem of tailback Anthony Cogdell (27 carries, 217 yards, 3 TDs) and fullback Jon Hedges (22-105, TD) chewed up the CCHS defense for a combined 322 yards rushing.

Meanwhile, the Tiger defense stifled the Calloway ground game, holding the Lakers to a minuscule 1 yard rushing.

Calloway (1-1) did manage 225 yards through the air, but a good chunk of that came on a 71-yard touchdown toss from sophomore quarterback Brandon Steele to junior tailback Jimmy Bynum after the game's outcome had already been decided.

"I thought we really whipped them up front," said MHS head coach Rick Fisher. "Our kids did a really good job on both sides of the ball. They couldn't stop our running game, and we really shut them down offensively."

Both squads' initial possessions set the tone of the contest as Murray took the opening kickoff and began a methodical 10-play drive that ended with a 5-yard scoring run by Cogdell with 7:45 remaining in the first quarter. Placekicker Gary Crass booted the extra point, and the Tigers led 7-0.

The Lakers' first offensive try resulted in the exact opposite — a three-and-out possession that included two Bynum runs of just 3 yards and an incomplete pass from senior QB Clay Lamb.

That possession alone forced CCHS into a passing mode. During the Lakers' next offensive set, Steele took over under center and threw passes on the first two downs of the drive — a completion to wideout Trent Travis and an incomplete on first-and-10 from the Calloway 29-yard line.

The drive, which included three more pass attempts in the next seven plays from scrimmage, appeared to end with a 23-yard field goal from placekicker Adam Yezerki. However, a roughing the kicker penalty against Murray's defense gave the Lakers new life at the 6.

Two plays later, Steele ran right on a bootleg and outran the Tiger defense to the corner of the end

zone for a 6-yard score. Yezerki's point-after try was true to knot the score at 7-7 with just under a minute remaining in the opening stanza.

"Our running game wasn't working, so we went out and found something else that did work," explained Calloway head coach Joe Stonecipher. "They (Murray) are big and strong up front, so we felt like we had to throw the ball in order to be successful."

Calloway's impressive scoring drive gave it some momentum and put the two clubs on even ground, but Murray would tilt the scales again with two crucial possessions just before halftime.

The Tigers entered just four plays on their second scoring drive thanks to the speed of Cogdell, who used his quickness to turn a third-and-1 into a 58-yard touchdown run.

The 6-1, 189-pound senior scampered around right tackle and turned on the jets down the right sideline for the score as the Tigers took a 14-7 edge with 11 minutes to go before halftime.

Following a three-and-out by the Laker offense, MHS ate up the remaining nine minutes of the first half with a 16-play, 32-yard drive that resulted in a 21-yard field goal by Crass, extending the Tigers' cushion to 17-7 at the intermission.

Despite the 10-point deficit, Stonecipher was pleased with his team's performance.

"We went into halftime down only 17-7, and we felt pretty good about how we had played," he said.

But Murray put the game out of reach with its first possession

of the second half, using 12 plays — all runs — to eat up 54 yards.

Cogdell later capped the Murray scoring with an 11-yard TD scamper at the 2:05 mark of the

third period, making the score 31-7.

Of Murray's 67 offensive snaps, only five were passes. Sophomore QB Blake Hoover completed just one of those five attempts, but was hampered by minor injuries to his receiving corps.

"We didn't really want to run the ball that much," Fisher noted. "But we just had to run it because

so many of our receivers were out with nagging injuries ... We still have a passing game, but it's going to take some time. We have a young quarterback and some young receivers."

Bynum — the main cog in the Lakers' season-opening triumph at Trigg County with 155 yards rushing — totaled 112 yards receiving on just four receptions, but never

got on track on the ground with just 6 yards on seven carries.

"We felt pretty good about how we played, but unfortunately we just didn't get anything going on the ground," Stonecipher said. "Still, we had some success."

"I'm proud of these kids ... This was an emotional game, but now it's over. We just have to keep working hard each week."

## Williams, Cards down L.A. 5-1

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Woody Williams pitched a four-hitter and Jim Edmonds homered Friday night as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-1.

Williams (11-9) cruised through the first three innings, holding the Dodgers hitless on just 31 pitches. During that stretch, the Dodgers only hit one fly ball into the outfield.

For the game, Williams got 14 outs on ground balls. Three of the Dodgers' hits came on grounders. Williams helped himself with

an RBI double.

Eric Karros hit his 14th homer in the Los Angeles fifth. Williams struck out three and walked one.

The Cardinals played without Mark McGwire, who missed his eighth straight game with a strained hamstring.

Edmonds, who 24 RBIs in the 16 games prior to Friday, homered just beyond the glove of right fielder Shawn Green in the third. It was Edmonds' 23rd home run.

St. Louis added another run in the fourth to make it 4-0 when

Fernando Vina doubled home Eli Marrero.

Marrero drew four walks, one of them intentional, and scored twice.

Eric Gagne (4-7) was pulled after the fourth inning having allowed four runs on five hits with three walks, two of which resulted in runs, and three strikeouts.

The Cardinals opened the scoring in the second inning when Marrero walked and scored on Williams' double. Williams has six RBIs this season.

Notes: St. Louis optioned rookie LHP Bud Smith to Class A Potomac and recalled C Keith McDonald from Triple-A Memphis. McDonald will be eligible for postseason play. Smith is expected to be recalled on Saturday.

Longtime Dodgers broadcaster Ross Porter will undergo surgery to correct a cerebral spinal fluid problem and will miss the rest of the season. The recovery time is expected to take a month. ... L.A. expects to activate LHP Jesse Orosco from the disabled list on Saturday.

## Smith unsure of what to expect

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Louisville coach John L. Smith isn't sure what to expect when his Cardinals travel east this weekend to take on bitter intrastate rival Kentucky.

For the past three seasons, Smith's defense focused mainly on the pass to slow down former coach Hal Mumme's high-octane aerial attack. The result: two wins in three tries.

But this year's situation is completely different. New coach. New offensive and defensive schemes. New problems.

"What we're going to see from them offensively, we have no idea," Smith said. "We just have to prepare for things we think we might see."

"What new things are they going to do? How much are they going to change? We're in the dark, and we don't enjoy that at all.

We would much rather know what's going to take place and how to prepare for it."

Kentucky coach Guy Morriss' task will be a little simpler in that he'll know exactly what to expect from Louisville. The Cardinals (1-0) opened their season with a 45-24 victory over New Mexico State.

Despite the 21-point margin, Smith was disappointed with his team's defensive effort. The Cardinals, who ranked fourth nationally against the run last season, gave up 407 yards on the ground and 544 yards overall.

Smith placed the blame for the lackluster showing on inexperience and overconfidence.

"I think we thought we were a little better than we are," Smith said. "When you start thinking you're neat, what's going to happen? Somebody's going to knock you on the ground."

Smith knows that opponents, including the Wildcats, will continue to test the Cardinals' run defense until it proves it can make stops.

"It fits (Morriss') personality as an old offensive lineman," Smith said. "That would kind of fit what he's about — 'Hey, let's go out and let's establish and be tough guys and let's run that football.' That fits his character."

Morriss said he expects a more relaxed and focused Louisville defensive unit.

"They obviously had some first-game jitters," he said. "I'm sure they gave up more yards on the ground than they actually wanted to or believed that they would. But it's a situation where they have good people and good coaches, and they will get that corrected."

# Almonte, 14, ruled ineligible

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Little League pitcher Danny Almonte is no longer perfect — because he's no longer 12.

The boy who dominated the Little League World Series with his 70 mph fastballs was ruled ineligible Friday after government records experts determined he actually is 14, and that birth certificates showing he was two years younger were false.

The finding nullified all the victories by his Bronx, N.Y., team, the Rolando Paulino Little League All-Stars, and wiped out all its records — including Almonte's perfect game and a no-hitter.

It also left his father, Felipe de Jesus Almonte, facing criminal charges for falsifying documents, and may lead to charges against his mother as well.

"Clearly, adults have used Danny Almonte and his teammates in a most contemptible and despicable way," said Stephen D. Keener, president and CEO of Little League Baseball in South Williamsport, Pa. "We're clearly sad and angry that we were deceived. In fact, millions of Little Leaguers around the world were deceived."

The Bronx league's founder, Rolando Paulino, was banned for


life from any association with Little League, although the team's charter was not revoked. Almonte's father also was banned for life from associating with Little League.

"I feel like the government has sold us out," Almonte's maternal uncle, Jose Rojas, told The Associated Press in a telephone interview from the boy's hometown of Moca.

A week that began with Almonte pitching a two-hitter to win third place in the World Series started unraveling the next day, when Little League officials opened an investigation after Sports Illustrated uncovered a document that said he was born in 1987.

Almonte's mother, Sonia Rojas Breton, who lives in Moca, produced a handwritten, photocopied birth certificate that said her son was born April 7, 1989. But Moca's official records office had another birth certificate that said he was born April 7, 1987.

Another handwritten document from Dr. Toribio Bencosme Hospital in Moca surfaced, saying a woman named Rojas gave birth to a boy there on April 7, 1987. Rojas, who says she gave birth to Almonte at home in the nearby town of Jamao, insisted all documents but hers were false.

# Rams edge Vermeil, Chiefs

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Rams might have found a new backup quarterback, and the replacement referee finally found the on-off switch for his microphone.

Third-stringer Marc Bulger played the last three quarters after Joe Germaine struggled again, and the Rams' defense scored two second-half touchdowns on miscues by Bubby Brister in a 21-17 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Friday night. The Chiefs blew a 17-0 third-quarter lead.

The Rams won their fourth straight Governor's Cup, a trophy held in such light regard that all of the stars had cameo roles at best and in the case of Kurt Warner, didn't play at all.

Rookie Tommy Polley had an 83-yard interception near the end of the third quarter and Tyoka Jackson ran 35 yards after the ball slipped out of Brister's hand while he was attempting to pass, for the game-winner with 8:12 to go.

The game was Dick Vermeil's first in St. Louis since coming out of retirement this year to coach the Chiefs (2-2). Vermeil led the Rams (3-2) to the Super Bowl championship after the 1999 season and heard mostly cheers as he ran on the field for the first time, shaking his fist in the air.

The replacement officials appeared to have the proceedings under control most of the time, except just after the two-minute warning at the end of the first half when referee Mack Gentry's running commentary could be heard by all.

A sample: "It's over, hey, hey, hey, it's over," Gentry admonished after a play. "Come on, come on."

He also reminded players of the game situation: "Second down, second down, second down, second down."

Gentry also showed his lack of expertise when the Chiefs challenged a juggling reception by Rams wide receiver Az-Zahir Hakim in the second quarter. Gentry needed some coaching from Jim Daopoulos, a retired NFL referee and the umpire on the crew, who advised Gentry to remove his headset before removing the cover to view the TV monitor.

The Rams held out Warner to ensure he's healthy for next week's regular-season opener at Philadelphia, just as they did in last year's preseason finale. The team's other big star, NFL MVP Marshall Faulk,

had only two carries for 4 yards.

Bulger ended up getting the bulk of the playing time instead of Germaine, who angered coach Mike Martz by going 0-for-4 and getting sacked for a 13-yard loss in the first quarter. Germaine completed only 12 of his last 40 passes in the preseason, and also was sacked 10 times.

Bulger was 18-for-34 for 156 yards.

Chiefs starter Trent Green, who was supposed to be the Rams' starter in their Super Bowl season before suffering a season-ending knee injury in the 1999 preseason, played a little more than one quarter. Green, traded for a first-round pick in the offseason, was 8-for-15 for 110 yards.

He led the Chiefs to their first touchdown, a 3-yard run by Tony Richardson with 12:29 to go in the second quarter.

Brister, the Chiefs' third stringer, was the backup Friday because Todd Collins has bruised ribs and

a bruised shoulder. He hit Larry Parker for a 30-yard completion to the 1 to set up the second score, a 1-yard run by Mike Cloud with 7:54 to go in the half.

Todd Peterson, whose 39-yard field goal attempt bounced off the right upright in the first quarter, connected from 24 yards with 9:38 to go in the third quarter for a 17-0 lead.

The officials appeared to have a let-them-play attitude most of the game, throwing the first flag with 59 seconds left in the quarter. There were five penalties called in the first half, four in the second half.

A second Chiefs challenge, on a punt that was downed at the Kansas City 1, also was denied in the third quarter.

# Hot temps alter times for anglers



We are still faced with super hot temperatures as the area rains passed us by.

This makes the most favorable times to fish, as far as comfort is concern, in the early mornings and in the late evenings.

This doesn't mean that you can't catch fish during the middle of the day, because you can. In fact, this coming Saturday features a feeding time beginning at dawn, again at 11:49 a.m. and then peaking around 1:06 p.m.

Wear the proper clothing, sun screen and hats and take plenty of water to drink. By doing this,

you can have a great outing!

The first such trip last week was with long-time friends Erv Craig and Burton Young. We were out at first light, and the weather was looking perfect. A decent current was in effect, and our trip had that aura of excitement that comes with great expectations.

The stripes were ready for us. We had to find the right combinations as we began casting. A few changes later, the action became quite frantic as each man hooked a good striper several times in a row!

Erv had the back of the boat and Burton held the center position where most of the fish landed in the cooler!

The schools of shad were fair-

# Fall seasons full steam ahead for locals



Today at precisely 11 a.m. CDT, the 2001 dove season will swoop across Kentucky grainfields. This is the second season to open this fall, and other seasons are nipping at its tail-feathers.

We in Kentucky not only take dove hunting for granted, but view it as a specific "unalienable" right. In many states, however, this is not so. The animal rights group, Fund for Animals, this week found themselves a smoozy, moron of a judge who entered an injunction to stop the Wisconsin dove season.

Take note, folks: Liberty means nothing to these people. We have too many politicians (judges included) who would gleefully trample your rights and liberties to comply with a nebulous concept of majority rule — only when the majority agrees with them.

The same liberty that allows these people to oppose any form of hunting or use of animals for entertainment, food, clothing or research, allows me and you to hunt doves or any other critter.

Wisconsin is a state with a proud hunting heritage much like Kentucky. Every year, these whackos attempt to derail some facet of fishing, hunting and general wildlife management in the Commonwealth.

I'm sorry, folks, but I'm at the top of the food chain — a major predator. I'll be in the dove field today, and I guarantee that I will not feel any more remorse at killing a dove than the red-tailed hawk will, feel!

To paraphrase a popular adage among hunters, I did not claw my way to the top of the food chain to each sprouts!

Now for the good news: The duck, coot and merganser season will begin Nov. 22 and will extend through Jan. 20. Bag limits will remain the same as last year, except for canvasbacks, which have been reduced to one per day. To stem the recent decline, canvasbacks may be taken only Jan. 1-20.

Season for the big Canada honkers will be Dec. 13 through Jan. 31 in the Western Goose Zone (part of Fulton County extends to Feb. 15). The dates for the Pennyrile Coalfield Zone, which includes much of Kentucky and Barkley lakes, is also Dec. 13 through Jan. 31.

The regular snow goose season starts Nov. 22 and runs through Feb. 3, at which time the Conservation Order Season kicks in and extends to March 31.

Don't forget that we have an early Canada goose season coming up Sept. 8-12 and an early wood duck and teal season, Sept. 19-23. And of course, archery season for deer opens Sept. 15.

There were a lot of doves in the area a few weeks ago, but they seemed to have thinned somewhat. Doves are a migratory bird and typically move south during fall and winter, but specifically move to available food services. As the corn harvest cranks up this week, there should be more opportunities for the fleet flying fowls.

At present, if you find a field with food that the birds are using, you should be in for hot barrel and a pile of empty shells. Thank goodness we will not see the three-digit temperatures this year that we had on opening week last year.

Still, don't forget to pack plenty of water. If you use a retriever (dog or otherwise), be sure to provide plenty of liquid nourishment.

I hope you find a good field. Don't forget your hunting license AND the Kentucky migratory bird or waterfowl permit. By the way, if you have the "over 65" license, you do not need to buy the extra permit. If you are hunting on your own property, you do not need a license or a permit.

If you find or are invited to a dove shoot, remember to be courteous to fellow hunters and especially the landowner. Don't forget to pick up your trash, and be sure to thank the person supplying the field — a little ham around Thanksgiving or Christmas might not hurt, either.

Have fun and thank the Lord for this wonderful opportunity. There are others this season who are not so blessed.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have chronic disc problems for which my friends have offered conflicting advice. How do I solve the issue?

DEAR READER: The vertebral bones in the neck and back are shaped like doughnuts to permit the spinal cord to pass through them. Each vertebra is separated from its neighbor by a ring of gristly tissue called an intervertebral disc. The discs act as washers between the bones; they absorb shock (during walking and running), separate the vertebrae and provide an area of non-bone through which spinal nerves enter and exit from the spinal cord.

When a disc becomes too thin (as can occur with age) as when its normal architecture is disrupted (as happens when the soft center portion slides out of position), the spinal nerves — or the spinal cord itself — can be pinched or pressed. This is called "discogenic disease," a common condition marked by spasms of the surrounding muscles, shooting pain into the buttocks or thighs and — sometimes — weakness and numbness of the lower extremities.

Treatment depends on the severity of the misalignment. A mild degree of protrusion can be treated by special exercises to relieve muscle spasm, and by bed rest, hot packs and pain medicine. Chiropractic manipulation is often successful in releasing spasm and allowing the disc to regain a more normal configuration.

Moderate degrees of disc herniation may respond to epidural steroid injections, corsets or lumbar supports, in addition to the therapy I mentioned above.

Severe disc protrusion is almost

always a surgical problem. A neurosurgeon must repair or remove the offending disc in order to prevent irreversible nerve damage, leading to permanent weakness (often in the form of a "foot-drop") and other disability.

Thus, the treatment of discogenic disease depends on the extent of the disc slippage and the location of the abnormal disc. Deteriorated discs in the neck, for instance, are generally treated with surgery because, if not repaired, they can cause extensive neurological disability. Slipped discs in the lower back, on the other hand, tend to cause fewer serious potential problems.

The extent of your "disc problem" should be assessed by an MRI scan. If you haven't had such a test, you should obtain one. I also suggest that you ignore your "friends'" advice (even if they are M.D.s!) and seek a consultation with a neurosurgeon. Such a specialist can determine which type of treatment would be appropriate for you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Following cataract repair, I have watering eyes and sticky tears. Is this related to the surgery?

DEAR READER: Cataract surgery involves the implantation of an artificial lens, which can cause eye irritation during the post-operative period, until the tissues have adjusted to the new lens. Although temporary tearing and discomfort are relatively routine, such symptoms should disappear within a few days after surgery. Therefore, depending on the duration of your symptoms, you may or may not have a problem. Ask your ophthalmologist about this.





CONTRACT BRIDGE

A Matter of Self-Preservation

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH: ♠ K 5, ♥ 10 7 6, ♦ K 10 3 2, ♣ K Q 10 5. WEST: ♠ 9 8 4 2, ♥ K Q 9 5 4, ♦ A 7, ♣ 8 2. EAST: ♠ 6 3, ♥ A J 8 2, ♦ 8 6 5, ♣ 9 7 6 4. SOUTH: ♠ A Q J 10 7, ♥ 3, ♦ Q J 9 4, ♣ A J 3.

The bidding: South West North East 1 ♠ Pass 2 ♣ Pass 2 ♦ Pass 3 ♦ Pass 4 ♣ Pass. Opening lead — king of hearts.

The most common form of defense against a suit contract is to force declarer to ruff at every opportunity. One advantage of this procedure is that it keeps the defenders from breaking new suits, but the primary purpose is to force declarer to use up his trumps, after which the defenders will be in position to cash whatever cards remain in their long suits.

When declarer has a plentiful supply of trumps, he can usually withstand this attack on his trump

suit. But when he has only seven trumps divided 5-2 or 4-3, his situation often becomes precarious.

Consider this deal where declarer reaches four spades as shown. West leads a heart, and hearts are continued. Declarer ruffs, and if he now draws trumps, exhausting his trumps in the process, he goes down one. He finishes with only nine tricks — five spades and four clubs. When he leads a diamond at trick 11, the defenders score the ace of diamonds and two more heart tricks.

This result should not come as any great surprise to South. The 4-2 division of the opposing trumps is more likely than any other, occurring nearly half the time.

To defuse this potential threat to his contract, declarer should adopt a more cautious approach. After trumping the heart at trick two, he should lead the jack of diamonds. If the jack holds the trick, he can then draw trumps and romp home with 10 tricks.

If the jack of diamonds is taken by the ace and a heart is returned, South must be careful not to ruff, which would reduce him to three trumps and leave him prey to a 4-2 trump split. Instead, he discards a club or a diamond, leaving his trump holding intact. A heart continuation can then be ruffed in dummy, after which he has the rest of the tricks and his contract.
