Latest anthrax discoveries keep Capitol on edge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is struggling to edge away from one of the strangest periods in its history, but new, almost daily discoveries of anthrax spores are keeping Capitol Hill in a state of angst.

The three newest incidents were in the offices of congressmen on the opposite side of the U.S. Capitol from where anthrax first appeared in a letter to Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., on Oct. 15.

Anthrax spores have now turned up at a total of 11 locations on Capitol Hill, already on high alert from the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks when one of four hijacked airliners aiming possibly at the dome of the Capitol itself crashed in Pennsylvania.

Tests confirmed Friday that anthrax spores were in the offices of Reps. John E. Baldacci, D-Maine; Rush Holt, D-N.J., and Mike Pence, R-Ind., on the sixth and seventh floors of the Longworth House Office Building, said Capitol Police Lt. Dan Nichols.

Earlier Friday, officials disclosed that anthrax also had been found in the Supreme Court building, situated between Longworth and the Hart Senate Office Building contaminated by the letter mailed there to Daschle.

Small quake shakes New York

NEW YORK (AP) — A minor earthquake shook the New York City area early today (Saturday), a monitor for the U.S. Geological Survey said.

A magnitude-2.6 earthquake hit under lower Manhattan around 1:42 a.m., said Dr. John Ebel, director of the Weston Observatory at Boston College, which monitors seismic activity in the Northeast.


"That's more than a tremor. That's a small earthquake," Ebel said.

It's That TIME Again!

WASHINGTON (AP) — Say goodbye to daylight-saving time this weekend.

Clocks shift back one hour at 2 a.m. Sunday, local time, giving an extra hour of sleep to most people tonight — and an extra hour of work to those who work the overnight shift.

And the change to Standard Time means it will be dark an hour earlier on Halloween, calling for extra caution on the part of drivers and those watching the children on their rounds.

Most people set their clocks back before retiring tonight. Those who don't need to remember to set them back Sunday — or they'll be an hour out of sync with the rest of the country.

Transportation Secretary Norman Y. Mineta, whose department is in charge of the time change, issued a reminder that this is also a good time to change the batteries in smoke detectors.

Daylight-saving time returns April 7.

Calloway 2020 group's second stage addresses solutions for community

Now that the county has spoken, the question is what to do with what they had to say.

Last week, the Calloway County 2020 group met to go over the citizen survey results. From that meeting, the group wrote down several important issues of the community with over 75 issues identified.

Now the group, facilitated by the Murray-Calloway County Chamber of Commerce, has to determine how to solve each of these issues.

"We have hit the heart of the planning process," Phil Scherre of Tennessee Valley Authority said during a meeting of the 2020 group yesterday afternoon.

The issues were broken into eight groups and taped on the walls of the First Baptist Church's Fellowship Hall during Friday's session. Members were then asked to break into discussion groups under each of the topics.

"Today, I expect a good draft of goals and actions that will end up in the final plans," Scherre said.

In each of the categories, the group members organized issues under sub-topics and determined goals to solve those issues.

For example under the "Leadership and Unity" group, members felt the best way to solve having too many leaders is to create an Institutional Community Committee. They also agreed that the solution to solving problems like the need for visionary community leadership is by encouraging potential and existing leaders who can facilitate change.

The "Social Issues and Health Care" group agreed that most of their issues, such as unhealthy lifestyles, increasing health care costs and drug problems in the community, could be solved through early drug programs and education on all drugs, including alcohol and tobacco.

That group also listed as their goals more church and community involvement, more physicians, insurance companies and communication between the two, and the safety and protection of animals.

The main goal of the "Economic/Business Development" group was attracting new industries to the community as well as forming a study on economic weaknesses and the development of a local marketing plan.

Encouragement of Smart Growth was mentioned in the "Government and Infrastructure"

group, along with improving citizen and government communication, plus city and county government, the county environment and maintaining public safety.

"Education" goals include providing classes for adults and promoting life-long learning, encouraging university and community involvement and increasing school/business partnerships.

Under the category of "Recreation and Culture," issues were raised on providing opportunities for youth.

The group listed as their goals creating a single umbrella organization for arts and parks, providing a green space for recreation and educational purposes, and supporting youth organizations. And the "Community Livability and Transportation" committee believed that to improve this area, the community should create a communications impact study, support the Murray Main Street program, try to become a model Kentucky community, create an organization for volunteers under the United Way guidelines, create a Clark's River bypass, and study cross traffic.

Architect services sought for restoration

The Calloway County Courthouse will be getting a fresh look soon. The Calloway County Fiscal Court has released a public notice they are looking for architectural services for the historic renovation and restoration of the exterior of the courthouse.

"It is part of the downtown renovation project," Judge-Executive Larry Elkins said this week.

Robin Taffler, director of the Murray Main Street project, has received several grants for the project, so far. Approximately \$200,000 of that was allotted to go to the exterior restoration of the courthouse.

"It is going to be basic maintenance and repairs starting with the clock-tower and roof and working down," she said.

"We want to keep the integrity of the building and make more usable for city officials," Elkins said.

The exterior work is just phase one of the project. More work will be done when more grant money becomes available.

"To this point Murray Main Street has brought in \$1.5 million and everyone is going to start seeing it," Taffler said.

Funding for Breathitt Veterinary Center OKd by Senate

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) announced Friday that his request for \$50,000 in funding for agricultural research at Murray State University was approved by the Senate.

The funding is included in the Senate Agricultural Appropriations Bill, which now goes to a House/Senate Conference for approval. McConnell is a senior

member of the Senate Agricultural Appropriations Committee.

The funding will be used by MSU's Breathitt Veterinary Center to continue research on the effects of common agriculture chemicals on animals and plants.

"Murray State University will soon receive vital funding to continue its important research on the impact of chemicals on our nation's agricultural products," McConnell

said. "This funding will enable Murray State to study the effects of common agricultural chemicals on plants, animals, and ultimately, humans.

"In light of the recent bio-terrorism attacks, the implications of this type of research are enormous."

The Agriculture Appropriations Bill now goes to a conference where House and Senate lawmakers will work out differences between the

two versions of the bill. Once completed and passed by both houses of Congress, the Conference Report will go to President Bush for consideration.

Juggling hopes to solve state budget woes

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Gov. Paul Patton said the state will get some money from obscure funds, juggle a little bit, make some cuts in agencies and hope for better times to deal with the latest budget problems.

Education, from kindergarten to colleges and universities, will avoid the budget ax once again, but that may not last. "There may come a time when we cannot spare education," Patton said during a news

conference Friday.

That time may come as soon as December. Patton said the administration will delay implementing about \$35 million of the revenue shortfall until new estimates can be made.

"There's sort of a vague hope that maybe it won't be as bad as it appears now," Patton said. "The likelihood is it'll be worse."

The cuts and moves announced Friday are the fourth round the state

has taken during this two-year budget cycle to deal with revenue receipts that have fallen far short of estimates.

The revenue shortfalls, plus overly optimistic budget plans that spent more money than the state was actually expecting, totaled out to budget cuts of \$180 million last fiscal year and another \$533 million this year. This year's budget shortfall is the largest in the state's history.

The biggest piece of the revisions

announced Friday were a plan to take \$50 million from a fund that finances the cleanup of old underground storage tanks, and savings from debt service of about \$47 million.

State agencies, including the judicial and legislative branches, will have to cut 2 percent from their budgets, which should account for about \$52 million more. Patton said state agencies will have a relatively free hand to deal with their cuts.

From the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, an ever-growing array of police officers and security barricades on its grounds have changed the face of a pre-eminent symbol of democracy. Along with the exclusion of tourists, the Capitol has acquired the feel of a fort under

siege.

Police dogs are tested for anthrax, senators debate how to disinfect their offices and lawmakers' mail — their lifeblood — hasn't flowed for two weeks.

By Friday, officials had succeeded in reopening four of the six major buildings housing lawmakers' offices — Hart and Longworth remain closed indefinitely — only to learn later that spores had been discovered for the first time in offices of House members.

Confusion, conflicting information and rumor are a daily staple for aides, reporters and lawmakers trying to learn about the latest anthrax discoveries or when shuttered office buildings might reopen.

"You can assume most of us know very little," Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., told reporters at one point last week, a response that typified the information gap that has reigned in a building in which knowledge is power.

The 6,000 Capitol Hill workers and visitors who were tested for anthrax exposure — 28 tested positive — were not the only ones who were checked. The Capitol Police's 35 dogs were also given nasal swabs and all tested negative, said Nichols. Though none of the dogs were brought to Daschle's Hart building office, they have been used to check other locations.

2001 Flu vaccines arrive here

The Purchase District Health Department has received another shipment of the 2001 - 02 Influenza Vaccine.

In order to get the vaccine to the citizens of the area, clinics have been scheduled by each local Health Center. As vaccine continues to arrive, additional clinics will be scheduled.

Those persons at highest risk for complications of the flu are especially encouraged to attend one of the clinics.

Persons with Medicare or Medicaid should bring their cards with them to the clinics. Charges for all others are \$10.00 for adults and \$6.00 for children; however, no one will be denied because of inability to pay.

In Calloway County, vaccines will be administered at the Calloway County Health Center, Tuesday, October 30 beginning at 8 a.m. In Graves County, it will be at High Point Baptist Church, Thursday, November 8. Times to be announced.

According to Sharon Godec, Nursing Director, clinics may end earlier than the stated times if vaccine supplies have been exhausted. She reminded everyone that even though supplies are arriving late again this year, there should be adequate supplies in our area.

Symptoms of influenza include fever, chills, muscle aches, cough, headache and sore throat. Frequent hand washing is an important means of preventing the spread of influenza as well as most other communicable diseases.

Tobacco warehouse operator says burley crop should be good

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A Barren County tobacco warehouse operator believes Kentucky burley growers should be pleased with prices during the sales season.

While contract sales opened Friday, Tommy Bale, a contract receiving stations operator, told the Kentucky Farm Bureau his thoughts about what farmers could expect.

"I think the farmer is going to take home, just by looking at the crop, and the contract prices, probably around \$1.99 to \$2.03 net money."

Bale said farmers have an average crop, not as good as last season, but with some decent leaf that should do well.

Auction market sales open Nov. 13, which is a week earlier than usual. Farm Bureau Vice President Marshall Coyle said Friday that demand should be good and the price should top last year's \$1.95 average.

He believes very little leaf will go into surplus stocks because there's a strong demand for it.

Elementary students charged in powder hoax

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Two fifth-graders were charged with misdemeanor terroristic threatening after an envelope containing powder and a threat was left at the school, officials said.

The girls, who were not identified, have been suspended and will be screened to see if they need counseling or other services, said Shirley Fuqua-Jackson, principal of Cochrane Elementary School.

Jefferson County Police Chief Fred Roemele said the girls were charged Friday after an investigation of the envelope.

"It was a threat that if you smelled the powder you could die and something could happen to everybody in the whole school," Roemele told *The Courier-Journal*.

U.S. finalists announced for 2012 Summer Olympics

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The president of the U.S. Olympic Committee said all eight American cities vying for the 2012 Summer Games were up to the challenge, but only four have been given the chance to prove they can bring the games to the United States.

New York, Houston, San Francisco and Washington were named Friday as the finalists. The USOC plans to cut that list to one in November 2002.

"We want to win the international competition. I want all of them to focus on that," said Charlie Moore, chairman of a site selection committee that recommended the four finalists to the USOC's executive board.

Dallas, Los Angeles, Cincinnati and Tampa, Fla., were dropped from consideration.

"I don't see this as winners and losers," said USOC President Sandy Baldwin. "I believe all eight are great cities ... and I would be proud to have the Olympics in any of them."

The International Olympic Committee will award the 2012 Summer Olympics in 2005.

Each finalist offers strong bids and powerful images for the sailing regatta breezing under the Golden Gate Bridge, canoeists rowing down a manmade course below Houston's towering skyline, opening ceremonies on the National Mall, or rowers pulling near the Statue of Liberty.

The selection committee visited the cities and ranked them in 13 categories.

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

Union Planters announces record third quarter

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Union Planters Corporation (NYSE:UPC) reported cash operating earnings for the third quarter of 2001 of \$133.9 million, or \$96 per diluted share, an increase of 11.6 percent over the \$86 per diluted share for the same period in 2000.

Cash operating earnings exclude goodwill and other intangibles amortization and non-operating items, net of taxes. These earnings provided a return on average assets of 1.57 percent, a return on average common equity of 16.96 percent, and a return on average tangible common equity of 24.48 percent.

Net earnings for the third quarter 2001 were \$112.0 million, or \$81 per diluted share, an increase of 8 percent compared to \$75 per diluted share for the same period in 2000. Net earnings represented a return on average assets of 1.31 percent and a return on average common equity of 14.18 percent.

For the first nine months of 2001, cash operating earnings were \$377.2 million, or \$2.72 per diluted share, an increase of 7.9 percent compared to \$2.52 per diluted share for the same period in 2000. Net earnings for the first nine months of 2001 were \$327.7 million, or \$2.37 per diluted share, which compares to \$305.8 million, or \$2.24 per diluted share, for the same period in 2000.

"During our strategic conference call on Aug. 8, I emphasized that the single most important thing throughout Union Planters is to produce consistent quality earnings growth that equals or exceeds market consensus," said Jackson W. Moore, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

"We will continue to assess the full impact of recent events in a conservative manner, and based on current information, we expect a moderate increase in non-performing assets and related charge-offs over the next several quarters, consistent with current economic trends. The diversity of the loan portfolio and our conservative underwriting practices should mitigate significant credit losses. We remain confident with our earnings forecast for 2002."

Settlement could cost Ford nearly \$3 billion

HAYWARD, Calif. (AP) — Ford Motor Co. could end up paying \$2.7 billion to repair millions of flawed ignition systems in a settlement that saves the automaker from a recall but still puts a dent in its bottom line after a series of financial setbacks.

The deal, approved Thursday, ends years of litigation over the faulty ignition systems that are believed to have contributed to as many as 11 deaths and 31 injuries.

Ford admitted no wrongdoing in the settlement, but agreed to reimburse owners nationwide who paid or will pay to repair the ignition systems, so long as the vehicle had less than 100,000 miles at the time of failure.

Ford, which disputes the plaintiffs' \$2.7 billion repair estimate, also will cover related costs, such as towing fees. Wrongful injury and death suits are not affected.

The settlement in the class-action lawsuit was the latest hardship to beset the automaker.

Ford has seen a 15 percent erosion in vehicle sales. It is spending \$3 billion to replace 13 million Firestone tires. And in September, it recalled nearly 788,000 Windstar minivans with faulty parts that could catch fire. The company also is eliminating 4,000 to 5,000 white-collar jobs this year and has reduced auto production.

Ford lawyer Richard Warner said the cost to repair the vehicles "will not be something that will have a material effect on the company's financial position."

Ky.'s emergency response systems proven reliable



Since Sept. 11, more people have understandably been asking Kentucky officials whether our state is prepared to respond to any future threats or emergencies. Though the federal government is primarily responsible for fighting terrorism, there are also important roles that must be carried out at state and local levels to ensure communities are as prepared as possible for unforeseen emergencies.

Here in Kentucky, it's important to remember our health officials and emergency workers didn't just start emergency preparation on Sept. 11. They've been fine-tuning and shoring up our response systems for years, and continue to take steps to ensure we're ready to make any changes necessary to respond to new threats.

Over the years, our emergency response systems have proven their reliability by responding to tornadoes, violent storms, gas pipe explosions and major fires. Furthermore, Kentucky has had the foresight to develop an emergency plan for large disasters that allows all counties to work in coordination with each other. We also have large-scale emergency plans that outline the steps that must be taken during various emergencies.

As terroristic activity heightens everyone's concerns about emergency preparedness, state officials are adapting to be as prepared as possible. We've already seen a number of steps taken in Kentucky in recent weeks in response to new concerns about terrorism.

Gov. Patton has been working with officials throughout his administration to ensure emergency preparedness. He recently appointed Kentucky Adjutant General D. Allen Youngman as the state's new coordinator for homeland security issues.

Kentucky has also responded to President Bush's call for extra security at airports by placing members of the Kentucky National Guard at five Kentucky airports to oversee security.

Many of the most recent concerns that Kentucky's emergency and health officials have responded to stem from fear of an anthrax attack. Though police and emergency workers have gone to great lengths to investigate reports of suspicious mail and powders, there has not been a single case in which anthrax was found in Kentucky.

However, we must be prepared.

Our state's Public Health Commissioner is assuring people it's okay to simply throw unwanted mail away, even if they are not sure of the sender. If you think a suspicious looking letter deserves more attention than that, you can call 911 so the police can safely pick up the letter for evaluation.

It's always a good idea for communities and families to take precautions and remain alert. But it's also important for people to go on living their lives secure in the knowledge that we still live in a safe country.

The terrorists who thought they could divide America by filling our country with fear have failed. We're more united than ever, and even more determined to protect and appreciate the freedoms we enjoy every day.

Making their appointed rounds



In many ways, the current threat of biological sabotage has frightened people more than did the destruction a month ago. Law enforcement agencies and health centers have been swamped with calls reporting white powders.

Often, of course, the substances turn out to be salt, fertilizer, carpet cleaner or headache powders, but the concern is real.

Our local citizenry was relieved to learn that the white grains in a video case that closed our public library for three hours was roach powder rather than anthrax. Personally, I had second thoughts about eating a proffered Krispy Kreme cake doughnut adorned with powdered sugar. My waistline profited from my reluctance.

Few as actual cases of anthrax terrorism have been, those few cases were enough to disrupt major television networks and the U.S. Congress, and to panic the nation.

Ever since World War I, speculation about biological warfare has centered upon natural conveyers of germs — water supplies and air currents and foods. But recent events have shown that there are man-made channels to be considered as well-including mail services.

The U.S. Postal Service has always been a symbol for us of what America is all about, and the abuse of the system is agonizing.

The mail system was initiated by none other than one of the greatest of our Founding Fathers — Benjamin Franklin. In the expansion of this nation from a few million souls and 13 little eastern colonies, the mail service was the most important means of communication and national cementing of diverse peoples and ways.

Prior to the Civil War, misguided southern legislatures, recognizing that the mails could be used to "poison local minds," made the mistake of imposing censorship and inspection laws, aimed at prohibiting abolitionist sentiments from reaching below the Mason-Dixon line. The disruption of mail service between North and South was one of the contributing causes of the Civil War.

The great attributes of mail service were that it was democratically available to everyone in America, that it contributed to the pressures upon all Americans to learn to read and write (which only 10 percent of the people could do when Franklin started mails), that it was inexpensive to use, and that it built community, maintained kinships, and promoted business across distances.

Our mail system's centuries of purity and outstanding performance are impugned by misuse of it for terrorism. Our hope is that impugning doesn't lead to imperiling the system.


The nation's mail system has been much on our minds of late. This week alone, we have sung "God Bless Americas" at three different events. Each time we joyously sing "for spacious skies, for amber waves of grain, for purple mountains' majesty, across the fruited plain", our consciousness of concerns about contamination of the mail brings to mind the gratitude we owe the postal departments, past and present, for binding this nation together when it has been otherwise scattered and spread across a large continent.

Postal workers have looked out for us as well as they possibly could over the decades of national history, and they have done it invisibly, honorably, tirelessly, and well. We need to extend to postal workers everywhere the gratitude we have lately been expressing to firefighters and to law enforcement officers, and to airline pilots and stewards and baggage handlers — not to mention an army of schoolteachers who have met and overcome possible terrorism from their own students.

Franklin was also noted for bringing lightning down a kite string, somehow "harnessing" electricity without killing himself in the process. American affluence obviously has become a global key attracting lightning of a different sort these days.

In these twitchy times, we are grateful for all those who keep the mails running and America humming. Their vigilance and protectiveness are the stuff of silent heroism.

When one counts the millions of pieces of mail handled daily, the surprise is not in knowing that some fanatics abuse it, but in realizing that it is abused so little. Public service is finally getting some appreciation that is long over-due.

FROM TWIN TOWERS TO TABLOIDS ... WHAT'S NEXT?!!?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Twin Towers and a New Jersey mailbox, the Pentagon and a Coca-Cola bottling plant, Dan Rather and the *National Enquirer*.

Terrorists have gone after a bewildering array of symbols, with only their pronounced Americanness in common, raising the question: What next?

There are, of course, countless possible targets that shout "America." Some seem more obvious than others to people who study the terrorist mind.

A short list: Livestock, Hollywood, Minorities.

If it's hard to figure, that's the point, said Stephen Gale, a University of Pennsylvania professor who writes about the psychology of terror.

"A terrorist is like a venture capitalist, investing a little here and there," he said. "A lot doesn't pan out, but then there's the big payoff: 20 men, a few hundred thousand bucks add up to 6,000 dead — and 300 million people terrified."

Authorities have yet to establish a credible link between the Sept. 11 attacks and the anthrax mail threat. If such a link exists, Gale believes it could be explained in part by Osama bin Laden's signoff in a 1998 interview with ABC.

"We predict a black day for America and the end of the United States as United States," bin Laden said. "Instead of remaining United States, it shall end up separated states ... Allah willing."

The idea that any onslaught could cause the defederalization of the 50 states may be absurd, but the goal might explain such varied targets.

Air travel, the cherished symbol of American mobility, has been crippled since the hijacking of four aircraft on Sept. 11.

The postal service, one of the nation's primary means of communication, has been dealt a body blow by the anthrax scare. Mail was a

logical follow-up to air travel, said Joan Deppa, who teaches public communications at Syracuse University. "It's gone from how we move around to how we move information around."

Shutting down part of Congress stymies the work of the federal government. The same threat extended to the presidency on Tuesday, when anthrax was discovered in an offsite mail facility for the White House.

Anchor men at the three major TV networks have been targets of anthrax sent to their offices or companies. Reliable American totems are now as rattled as the rest of us. "In Cipro we trust," was Tom Brokaw's now-famous signoff.

"The anchor's role is to steady you by projecting his calm to you, the viewer," said Robert Lichter, president of the Center for Media and Public Affairs. "When you shake him up, you shake the viewer up."

It's easy enough to see why the Pentagon, nexus of the military, and the World Trade Center, embodiment of American financial power, were hit.

Less evident to Americans is why a company that owns tabloids would be a target. That might be more obvious to people overseas.

"Most Americans wouldn't know or care that the Sun, the Globe and the *National Enquirer* are owned by American Media Inc.," said Deppa. "But think of how that name plays on Al Jazeera, the Arab TV service."

Tabloid subject matter also would be of interest to attackers. "They're filled with sex and drugs, scandals — all the things that make American society look sinful and bad," Deppa said.

Robert Littlejohn, a New York-based security adviser to Fortune 500 companies, says financial power remains a likely target, and his clients are on the alert.

"We've always had access control, ID cards, mailroom security," he said. "Now everything — is

enhanced, companies are paying attention to the sorting of mail, scribbled names, incorrect or misspelled names. It's not just routine anymore."

Overseas, at least one U.S. behemoth has already felt the brunt of wartime resentment. Guerrillas dynamited a Coca-Cola plant in southern India this week.

If large American corporations have been spared the anthrax scare, Littlejohn said, it's because they have tough security measures already in place.

Not so journalists and politicians. What for Littlejohn's clients might have been alarms — smudged, handwritten envelopes — are par for the course for those whose constituency is the public at large.

"Politicians get a lot of stuff like that, scribbled, from people with no access to a computer, younger people," he said.

Experts don't like speculating what could be next. "You have to have someone in custody, like the Unabomber, before you can truly figure out the logic," Littlejohn said.

But it's something authorities have to consider.

The attractiveness of Hollywood — prime disseminator of immoral fare, in some minds — as a possible target is not lost on that community.

"For the time being, we are just not opening fan mail," said publicist Pat Kingsley, who represents actor Tom Cruise, among others.

Why livestock? Agroterrorism — a staple of Iraq's war on the Kurds — might cause states to isolate themselves from each other.

"An outbreak of hoof-and-mouth disease would have state cops guarding borders," Gale said.

And terrorists closely monitoring America's internal divisions might be interested in an attack on a racial group, made to look as if it came from local extremists.



Laker seniors, 'D' blank Maroons 28-0

Having scored just three points in its last four outings of a five-game losing streak, the Calloway County football team was well overdue.

Having missed the playoffs, the Laker upperclassmen made sure Madisonville-North Hopkins knew it was Senior Night Friday at Jack D. Rose Stadium.

The CCHS offensive and defensive units each scored two touchdowns apiece as the Laker 'D' allowed just six first downs and 106 yards of total offense while forcing five turnovers — returning half of Calloway's four interceptions of Drew Scott for TDs — in a 28-0 shutout of Madisonville.

"We really got after them," said Joe Stonecipher after his Lakers finished the 2001 campaign with a 4-6 record thanks to the collaborative efforts of defensive coordinator Billy Mitchell — still designing game plans just weeks after suffering a heart attack and undergoing quadruple bypass surgery — and assistant coaches Chris Bynum and Jared Lencki.

"Coach Mitchell's defense got our players in the right positions, our young coaches coached it and our players rallied around our young coaches. We asked our defense to score for us, and we felt like if we could score quickly, (Madisonville) would start looking to get back on the bus."

That wish was granted when Jimmy Bynum made a diving catch worthy of the highlight films, reeling in Seth Barrow's 35-yard fade pass at the Maroon 7-yard line.

That grab set up Barrow's 1-

yard sneak two plays later for a touchdown with just over four minutes elapsed in the first quarter as Adam Yezerski's extra point put Calloway on top 7-0.

While Barrow threw interceptions on the Lakers' next two offensive possessions, Calloway's

seniors and defensive unit put its toughness on display, holding Madisonville (1-9) to one first down over its first six series.

Barrow, a sophomore wide receiver playing his second varsity game at quarterback, rewarded the Laker defense with an 86-yard

TD strike to Bynum at the 8:48 mark of the second period.

Both sides then traded punts and giveaways as Tyler Collins picked off a Scott pass and brought it back to the Maroon 38, only to watch as Barrow was blind-sided on a sack and fumbled the ball

back to Eric Stroud.

But Josh Young stepped in front of the fallen Matt Waddle to seize another Scott interception and bring it back 47 yards for a score and a 21-0 CCHS advantage with 5:10 left in the first half.

Stonecipher was pleased with the way his leaders came through in a game that otherwise meant very little, with Calloway's post-season chances having been erased Oct. 12 at Hopkins County Central.

"Each one of our seniors have contributed to our program, and this Senior Night will be important for them in the years to come," he said. "We didn't get thing s done this year, but life isn't won on the scoreboard — it's won in the trenches."

Corey Hendon's 40-yard field goal just prior to intermission fell short for Madisonville, and although the Lakers were unable to gain any of their 189 total yards in the second half, Calloway held the visitors to 28 yards after halftime.

Greg Ryan capped the scoring

with 3:52 remaining in a defensive-minded fourth quarter, snagging a Scott screen pass to Stroud for a 1-yard TD return off the interception.

Despite injuring his shoulder on the game's second play, Laker senior All-West Kentucky Conference lineman Joe Dolchan played the entire first half before sitting out the rest of the contest.

Friday was the last game in a CCHS uniform for Dolchan, Yezerski, Landon Barrow, Brian Couch, Justin Fox, Dean Futrell, Clay Lamb, Jacob Payne, Gatlin Rowland and Aaron Stewart, who did not play because of a shoulder injury.

"The record really didn't show it, but we played really hard (this year)," said Fox, whose recovery of Scott's fumble at the Maroon 1 with 1:40 remaining iced the victory.

"We played some tough teams that were supposed to blow us out, but our defense stepped up and kept the score down. The seniors showed what we could do."

No. 12 Tigers roar through Flash 57-0

LONE OAK, Ky. — Since a humbling 48-0 loss to First District rival Mayfield earlier this month, the Murray High Tigers have played with one eye on the upcoming Class A state football playoffs.

But "one eye" is all they've needed the last two weeks against region doormats Fulton County and Lone Oak — the latter receiving the brunt of the Tigers' frustrations in a 57-0 thrashing Friday night at Flash Field.

Murray, which finished the regular season at 8-2, scored touchdowns on its first six offensive possessions and was aided by three

first-half interceptions on its way to a 35-0 lead after one quarter of play.

After taking out the majority of their starters following the first 12 minutes of action, the Tigers tacked on 22 more points in the second period and coasted to the easy victory.

"Obviously, we wanted to play well early and put them away pretty quickly," said MHS head coach Rick Fisher. "Since we lost to Mayfield, we've been getting ourselves ready for the playoffs, and this is certainly another step in that direction."

The Tigers jump into postseason play next Friday when they travel to Hawesville to take on

Second District runner-up Hancock County, which defeated district rival Russellville 26-3 Friday to set up a rematch with MHS — a 49-0 victor over the Hornets Sept. 28 at Ty Holland Field.

Following a three-and-out possession by the Flash during the opening series of the contest, Murray wasted little time in putting points on the board.

Three plays into the 38-yard drive, senior tailback Jason Rhone scrambled 25 yards for a touchdown with 9:08 remaining in the first quarter.

MHS found paydirt again just seconds later when Lone Oak quarterback Chris Jett threw the first of his five interceptions on a first-and-10 play from the Flash 13.

Senior back Mario Lawrence stepped in front Jett's pass attempt and then raced 15 yards down the middle of the field for the score and an already insurmountable 14-0 Tiger advantage.

Three scoring runs totaling 8 yards from senior tailback Anthony Cogdell, an 11-yard toss from sophomore QB Blake Hoover to junior receiver Nathan Williams and another scoring strike from Hoover to Williams provided more than enough points at 49-0 with still 6:58 remaining in the half.

Murray's final touchdown of the night would come with just 21 ticks left before the intermission when sophomore fullback Anthony Schneider took an inside hand-off from freshman signal caller Alex Boles up the gut for a 1-yard score.

In all, the Tigers racked up 294 yards in total offense, tallying 175



yards on 39 rushes and 119 yards through the air on 9-of-12 attempts, while limiting the Purple Flash to a mere 93 total yards — a paltry 38 rushing yards on 39 carries and only 55 passing.

"We wanted to get some of our starters some reps, but — at the same time — we didn't want to

get anybody hurt," noted Fisher, who is still without senior fullback Jon Hedges (ankle sprain). However, Hedges should be ready for the playoff opener.

The Tigers did get a starter back from the injured list as senior nose guard Jason Wilkins returned to the lineup with a heavily-wrapped cast on his right hand.

"Getting Jason Wilkins back was a big plus for us," Fisher noted. "I was glad to see him back in there, and he made a big

play with a tackle for a loss on the first play of the game."

However, the news was not all good on the injury front as linebacker Bryan Nixon went down early in the fourth quarter with a neck injury.

The freshman laid motionless for several minutes after colliding with a Lone Oak player, but did have sensation in his extremities. Nixon was transported by ambulance to Lourdes Hospital for precautionary X-rays.

Yankees look to repeat Game 1 Series history

PHOENIX (AP) — Kevin Brown couldn't beat them. Greg Maddux and Al Leiter couldn't do it, either.

All top aces, yet all of them wound up on the losing side when they faced the New York Yankees in World Series openers.

Now pitching: Curt Schilling. The Arizona Diamondbacks' best chance to end the Yankees' run of three straight championships could come Saturday on a hot night in the desert when Schilling opposes Mike Mussina.

Along with Derek Jeter and Bernie Williams, Schilling will be taking on two other strong forces — the Yankees' history and tradition.

"When you use the words 'mystique' and 'aura,' those are dancers in a nightclub," Schilling said Friday. "Those are not things we concern ourselves with on the ball-field."

Schilling, 3-0 with an 0.67 ERA and three complete games in the NL playoffs, drew the start over fellow ace Randy Johnson.

"I recognize Game 1 as being the game that can set the tone," Schilling said. "I recognize the first inning of Game 1 is the inning that can set the tone for the game and all of the things that come with that."

More likely, what happens much later will determine the outcome. Because as potent as the Yankees are in the early going, no team becomes as dangerous in the late innings — particularly at this time of year.

Since manager Joe Torre took over in 1996, the Yankees have won an amazing 15 postseason games they trailed in the seventh inning or later.

In that span, they've outscored opponents 113-57 in the late innings.

"I don't think it's just by chance," Jeter said. "This is a group that really understands what the postseason is about."

In the 1998 opener, Brown and the San Diego Padres led 5-2 before the Yankees struck for seven runs in the seventh inning.

In the 1999 opener, Maddux and the Atlanta Braves took a 1-0 edge into the eighth before the Yankees scored four times.

Last year, Leiter pitched the New York Mets to a late lead, but the Yankees scored the tying run in the ninth and won it in the 12th.

Every time, the Yankees' pen-

chant for patience paid off. Their strategy? Take a lot of pitches early, tire out the starter and then try to beat the other team's bullpen.

"It's going to be our job to match what they do and keep the game close," Torre said. "That's been our formula."

Then again, that approach seems to run contrary to what works against Schilling. Batters who swung at Schilling's first pitch this season hit .429; on all other pitchers, opponents hit only .210.

Schilling tied for the major league lead with 22 wins this season. To get ready for his start, he's been watching tape of his performance on Sept. 1, 1997, when he struck out a career-high 16 in eight innings against the Yankees.

"One of the comments that I've heard about this club, not only this year but in past years, is that they tend to make guys throw a lot of pitches by taking early in the count," he said. "If I'm on tomorrow, there will be a lot of 0-1, 0-2 counts quickly in the game."

Arizona manager Bob Brenly would be glad to see Yankees' hitters standing with the bat on their shoulders.

"If they try to be more patient with him, I'm sure Curt can make an adjustment and do what he has to do," he said.

Brenly said Schilling and Johnson both volunteered to pitch on short rest, raising the possibility that they could work three times in the series.

Fishing Line

Cooler temperatures enter lakes area



Our cooler temperatures slipped on through the area Friday night and early Saturday morning.

I was below Kentucky Dam shortly after daylight with Brian Stedelin and Ben Parker. We had intended to fish for the large rockfish strippers there, but there were four gates open and the currents were so strong that it would have been foolish to stay.

We retreated to the upper reaches of Kentucky Lake and the vicinity of Blood River so that we could possibly find some active crappie, smallmouth and largemouth bass.

Brian and I have fished together several times and shared some excellent catches of big bass. Ben is another of Brian's buddies who loves the outdoors but had never used a bait casting rod and reel before. It didn't take long to learn.

We started out with shallow cranks in some of the areas where the current pushed the shad bait-

fish around. It was the right move from the first. The water has risen four feet and now was on the way back down.

The bass instinctively know that their food is being swept along with the current, so they position themselves where they can intercept the shad as they come along. We found the bass very aggressive. When they were hooked, it was hang-on time!

Several good areas already had boats surrounding them, so we traveled more miles in order to fish alone.

Parker continued to improve on his casting. Then, a few spunky bass decided he was ready. They struck hard and jumped often, bringing a few yells of encouragement from us.

We found so many bass active that we failed to try the crappie this day. The wind increased in the afternoon, causing a big slowdown to the bass feeding. We took a vote and decided to come back before cold weather became permanent.

We made some pictures of Ben's nearly four-pound smallmouth and

welcomed him to the art of bait-casting. The three of us had many light hits, which turned out to be decent-sized bass.

The moving waters had fired the gamefish into a feeding spree. And now that they seemed to be full to their limits, the strikes were soft.

A day later, I had the pleasure of launching out of Kentucky Beach Resort on Blood River. We fished with Dave Hokola and Gary Gettlefinger. These guys fish all over the country, and they sure do love all types of fish.

We took off on a learning mission so they could fish by themselves for a couple of days.

They were interested in catching some crappie first, and then play around with some bass. We threw the chartreuse roadrunner jigs down some rocky banks where a few brushpiles have been dropped and some were quick to respond.

With the shad population being good this season, most of our gamefish are super fat and healthy. The crappie we caught were thick-bodied chunks of some great-tasting table fare.

The strong current always takes its toll on how long the crappie will stay in a single location. We had discussed this early last week, and I had come to the conclusion that — because of the strong current — a limited number of crappie will occupy an area for a short time.

It seems that a larger stake bed will hold more than anything else.

Dave and Gary were game to try the stripes, and it was a good move on our part. The shad were stacked in a few places. That's where I expected the stripes to come looking for lunch.

We threw a combination of colors, and all of them caught fish equally well. Silver black or silver blue will get you some action fast. As the morning passed and the sun crossed the sky, the southwest winds came blowing along and the bites stopped.

We could move around and locate more strippers that would promptly strike our lures, this was good fishing for a time, but the winds kept getting stronger and the bites were slower.

The guys were staying at Ken-

tucky Beach, so I gave them a tour so they could find some good fish by themselves.

I met with an old buddy — Fran Weber — a day later, and we decided to keep up the trend. It was another good call because the winds were slack.

We worked the open lake areas where the shad had been coming through all week. The larger whites and yellows also came to play.

Actually, these aggressive strippers were hunting the same as we were, and they struck hard. Frank had the hot hand as he continued to catch large whites and the ultimate yellow stripes of the year.

He made one cast that caused a row. The fish struck and headed down-stream for awhile, then up-stream and finally across the main lake.

Frank was using very light tackle we were not sure if he could ever get the big fish to come up out of the depths. After a considerable time the fish began to show signs of tiring and keep the boat close to the line so I could net the critter.

When Frank and Ester saw the perfect 25-pound drum, they couldn't believe it was possible. It was a perfect specimen and gave Frank a real run for his money. I made some photos, but they won't be ready this week.

I will fish two more days with Frank and Ester, and hopefully they will be able to lock onto a big smallmouth. Both are good anglers and matched about even on luck, so I ham it up sometimes about them taking a state record of some kind.

They are great people to be with anytime! I look forward each day to the next. We kept 21 strippers the first day, and one was over two pounds.

The lake has dropped down the four feet it had climbed last weekend. The water temperature has climbed back to 65 degrees.

I hope the waters settle a lot before the cold front comes in. It could still be a great fall, though.

Writer experiences deer camp



It was the best of times — it was the worst of times.

Maybe it wasn't quite that dramatic, although definitely Dickensian, as the Chairman and I loaded up the truck we referred to as "the antichrist" and headed for a weekend alone at the deer camp for the early muzzle-loader season some years ago.

When the blackpowder smoke cleared, I had a 10-pointer on the ground. Not a good bragging-size buck by any means, but it did have 10 points. And if you didn't see it, it sounded big!

After recruiting the Chairman to help drag the beast back to the cabin, I concluded that we needed the truck nearer than a quarter-mile before we broke camp on Sunday.

Now, this line of reasoning always gets me into trouble. I decided that — with enough speed — I could make it across the soggy soybean field with "the antichrist" being four-wheel drive, of course, jump the slough and park within 50 yards of the cabin. I guess I didn't get up enough speed.

The result of that endeavor was a mile-long hike to a nearby farmer who had to postpone a trip to the hospital to visit his poor, sick mother so he could pull my miserable carcass out of the mud with his tractor.

We polished off the wonderful weekend by borrowing an ATV from the Chairman's father to drag both



Popular sports may hurt kids

WASHINGTON (AP) — The eight activities that cause the most muscle and bone injuries to children — bicycling and basketball top the list — stick America with a bill of about \$33 billion a year, a new study says.

The sports tracked by the Consumer Product Safety Commission caused about 2.2 million bone and muscle injuries in 2000 to children ages 5-14, the report said.

Play is good, but children of these ages may not understand how to play safely and are not getting enough encouragement to do so, the study said.

"It's reminding us that kids do get hurt, but there are lots of steps we can take" to prevent injuries, said Dr. John M. Purvis, coauthor of the study. "We are not going to eliminate them, but reduction is something that could certainly happen."

The study, which was presented Oct. 17 at an American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons' meeting in New York City, focused on injuries that orthopedic surgeons would see.

The report relied on CPSC data on hospital visits, and on agency formulas that project how many additional injuries are seen in doctors' offices and clinics. Data on costs were based on CPSC formulas that cover medical expenses, liability suit damage awards, a money value for pain and suffering, and wages lost by parents who take time off work because of a child's injury.

Bicycling led the list, with 764,251 reported injuries, of which 414,739 were musculoskeletal, said Purvis, an orthopedic surgeon in Jackson, Miss. Total costs of injuries were \$13.2 billion, of which \$6 billion was for musculoskeletal problems.

In second was basketball, with a total of 507,865 injuries, of which 406,747 were musculoskeletal. Musculoskeletal injuries ran up about \$4.8 billion of an all-injury total cost to society of \$6.39 billion. The study totaled only those costs related to orthopedic injuries; the overall costs would be far higher.

The rest of the injury big eight: football, roller sports such as inline skating and skateboarding, playground equipment, soccer, baseball and softball, and trampolines.

The study did not attempt to determine how common the injuries are among all participants. To do that would require data on the num-

ber of children who took part. CPSC does not tally that, although sporting goods industry groups make estimates based on surveys.

Nor did the report attempt to spot trends by looking at previous years of CPSC data. No one before had teased out muscle and skeletal injuries separately, Purvis said.

However, most of the injuries could have been prevented, Purvis said. For instance, in bicycling, wearing a helmet sharply reduces the risk of a potentially devastating head injury. But only one child in five wears a helmet, he said.

Similarly in basketball, mouth guards, eye protection and ankle braces can reduce injury, the report said.

In organized sports, the findings should serve as a heads-up to coaches, because full warmups and stretches could have prevented many of the sprains, Purvis said.

Community agencies could prevent many of the playground injuries by installing safer equipment, and arranging it so that bigger and faster older children do not mix with smaller and slower younger kids, Purvis said. Also, parents and doctors can do more to teach children how to play safe, he said.

CPSC and private groups such as the orthopedic surgeons organization have been trying to foster improvements.

"I think we have had an increased effort over the last 10 years to have an impact," said Dr. Vernon T. Tolo, the society's first vice president and head of orthopedics at Childrens Hospital, Los Angeles. "But we can't measure it."

And treatment has gotten better over the years, said Dr. Paul Stonseller, head of childrens' orthopedics at Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions. "We are not placing children in bulky body casts for 8 to 10 weeks like we used to," he said. "There's more appropriate use of braces. And spinal injuries are not missed like they used to be."

DEAR DR. GOTT: Six years ago, I had thyroid surgery. Ever since, I have experienced regular hot flashes. My doctor insists that at my age (72), I'm too old for hot flashes, yet they remain. What can I do? I'm reluctant to return to my doctor because he is so unemphatic and unyielding.

DEAR READER: Although you are "too old for hot flashes," you are having them. Therefore, the problem isn't going to evaporate merely because your physician believes you shouldn't have hot flashes. In my view, his thinking is a bit grandiose.

Your previous thyroid surgery is an unlikely cause of hot flashes; even so, you should have blood tests to check your thyroid gland. It's possible that either underproduction or overproduction of thyroid hormone has led to metabolic imbalances that could alter your vascular stability. Ask your surgeon about this.

If your thyroid tests are normal, I'd advise a consultation with a gynecologist. Your doctor notwithstanding, I have seen women in their 60s and 70s who suddenly developed symptoms of menopause, although they had uneventfully completed the change of life years before. Hormone therapy usually solves the problem.

You do not have to be intimidated by an "unemphatic and unyielding" practitioner. Both these qualities can be very positive in moderation for a good physician. But it sounds to me as though these traits have become liabilities for your doctor. I say this because patients need to feel free to discuss issues openly with their doctors. When personality characteristics — such as rigidity, authoritarianism, inattentiveness and arrogance — get in the way, doctors no longer function as they should. Then, patients must remind them of who is serving whom.

For example, I think you could appropriately address the issue with your physician in the following manner: "Doctor, I have a lot of faith in your abilities and judgment. However, sometimes you dismiss my complaints and don't seem to take me seriously. I'm not comfortable with this, because it interferes with the good relationship we've enjoyed for years. Now, how do we go about getting to the bottom of my hot flashes?"

If he is a good doctor, he'll take the hint and listen to you. If, on the other hand, you get the same old runaround, change physicians.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've always been tired and run-down. I'm 49 and, a year ago, was diagnosed with anemia due to "depleted iron stores." Oral iron supplements were of no value, so my doctors gave me the iron intravenously — with astonishing improvement. Apparently, I cannot absorb oral iron. My ferritin level proved this, which was low. Why didn't I ever have a ferritin level? Because insurance wouldn't pay for it. Please print this for all women who can benefit from my years of searching and frustration.

DEAR READER: Iron metabolism, although usually straightforward, can be complex. While most iron-deficient patients respond promptly to oral iron supplements, there is a small subgroup that cannot absorb oral iron. The reasons for this are not entirely clear. In such instances, iron by injection is needed. The ferritin level is useful in monitoring (and diagnosing) such unusual situations.

While we were there, my father-in-law, "Hank," told us he was tired of taking care of her and not getting any relief. This was the first time we heard that he was in need of help.

Two weeks later, Hank called to say that Gertrude was very ill and the doctors didn't give her long to live. My husband is a long-haul truck driver and was on the West Coast. It took us three days to get to his parents. When we arrived, we found Gertrude's health had drastically deteriorated. She was bedridden and could hardly speak. It was obvious it was only a matter of days.

As we were about to leave, Hank said he wanted us to meet someone. He left the house and returned 10 minutes later with a woman. He introduced her as his "special friend." Abby, she was his girlfriend! He brought her into the house while his wife of more than 40 years lay there dying. Two days later, Gertrude was gone.

While we were at the funeral home making the burial arrangements, Hank called his girlfriend on his cell phone and asked her to accompany him to his grandson's graduation. (It was the same day.) When she arrived at the funeral home, they clung to each other to the point of being sickening, and he told us he loved her.

Can you believe anyone would have so little respect for his wife and family? My husband and his sister are appalled. Had he waited a reasonable length of time to introduce us, we could have accepted it. Granted, Gertrude wasn't the easiest person to live with, but Hank was sick for many years himself, and Gertrude stood by him, worked and took care of her family, too.

What do you think of his behavior? HORRIFIED IN HICKORY, N.C.

DEAR HORRIFIED: It appears your father-in-law was experiencing caregiver burnout for some time. He was overwhelmed by the responsibility and needed someone to lean on. Since no family was there to help him, he turned to a "special friend."

While I agree the timing of his declaration of love leaves

something to be desired, please do not judge him harshly.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a married man who happens to have a girlfriend. My wife knows her and likes her, and her husband is a fine man for whom I have the greatest respect.

We are not cheating. There are no tears, no recriminations, no lies, no guilt, no screaming, no divorces, no dead bodies on the floor. Everyone's heart is big enough to accommodate this situation.

Sometimes It Pays to Worry

South dealer. North-South vulnerable. NORTH ♠ Q J 8 3 ♥ A 8 7 3 ♦ Q 6 ♣ A 7 5 WEST ♠ — ♥ Q 10 5 ♦ J 10 9 7 2 ♣ J 9 6 3 2 EAST ♠ 7 6 4 2 ♥ J 9 6 4 ♦ A 8 5 4 ♣ 10 SOUTH ♠ A K 10 9 5 ♥ K 2 ♦ K 3 ♣ K Q 8 4

The bidding: South West North East 1 ♠ Pass 3 ♠ Pass 4 NT Pass 5 ♥ Pass 6 ♣ Opening lead — jack of diamonds.

Assume you're declarer in six spades and West leads the jack of diamonds. East wins with the ace and returns a diamond to your king. At this point, making the rest of the tricks appears routine. But when you cash the ace of trumps and West shows out, you have good reason to start worrying about the slam.

For example, if you decided to

draw East's remaining trumps at this stage, you would wind up with a club loser unless the opposing clubs were divided 3-3. Without the 4-0 trump split, you would have been able to ruff your last club in dummy. Going down one in a slam is never a happy prospect, so you start looking for a way to avoid the possible club loser.

And if you look hard enough, you find that there is a way out of your difficulties. You therefore stop leading trumps and instead cash the K-A of hearts. After East follows suit, you become certain to make the contract.

You next ruff a heart low, lead the nine of trumps to dummy's jack, then ruff dummy's last heart with the king of spades before leading the ten of trumps to dummy's queen.

As a result of these plays, you have exhausted the trumps in your own hand. This is no real hardship, however, because you still have the eight of trumps in dummy to draw East's seven.

When you cash the eight, you discard the four of clubs on it, and just like that, the potential club loser disappears. The A-K-Q of clubs then take the last three tricks, and the slam is home.

Team researches New Madrid zone

BLYTHEVILLE, Ark. (AP) — An international team of researchers is at work in a dry pond bed north of Blytheville unearthing information on activity along the New Madrid Seismic Zone.

According to team member Kenji Satake of the Geological Survey of Japan, his organization has developed new equipment, called a Geoslicer, to try to determine the severity and frequency of earthquakes along major seismic fault lines and areas.

The Geoslicer is drilled as much as 30 feet into the ground to take a slice of the subsoil, where the earth-

quake features exist. A plastic mold is made of the slice of earth, enabling researchers to study liquefaction, a phenomenon which occurs when water and subsurface soils force their way to the surface during earthquakes.

Sharon Diehl of the U.S. Geological Survey in Denver is also in the area. She explained that the plastic mold not only shows liquefaction and earth movement features, it picks up particles of subsurface soils that have been pushed up by the earthquakes. This can help researchers determine how many shaking episodes have occurred in a particular area and determine the severity of the shaking.

Another team member, Brian Atwater of the Geological Survey in Seattle, explained that he first began working with Satake when the Japanese researcher discovered evidence of a tsunami that occurred in the 1700s in Japan and is believed to have originated from an earthquake off the coast of North America. This project, he said, is a continuation of that collaborative effort.

The team has taken samples from the San Andreas Fault in California and from an unidentified fault area in Seattle over the past several weeks. They are working in Blytheville, he said, because this area is famous for its earthquake liquefaction features, which he said are some of the most significant in the country.

The New Madrid zone runs for 125 miles through parts of Illinois, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and Arkansas. An 1812 quake, which was one of a series of three tremors, was centered near the town of New Madrid, Mo., and is believed to be the largest earthquake in the United States. Based on today's measurement standards, experts

estimate the quake at an 8.0 magnitude.

Memphis is about 35 miles from the fault, making it the closest large city. At the time of the New Madrid quake, the area was sparsely populated. Witness accounts say it caused church bells to ring a far away as Boston.

It also created Reelfoot Lake in northwest Tennessee, the largest natural lake in the state.

Arch said local accounts on the severity of the quakes make the research unique since there are no other accounts of earthquakes during that time period.

One of the primary reasons for earthquake research, Atwater said, is to help engineers design earthquake-resistant structures.

Buddy Schweig, of the U.S. Geological Survey in Memphis, said the cooperation in the research is important, and the new equipment will allow researchers to study the earth at a depth that was not possible before.

"This will give us an idea of where all the sand in the farmers' fields is coming from," he said.

Farmers helping Trade Center produce sellers who lost everything

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — When Garrard County farmer Karin Rasmussen heard of produce seller Kerry Kernan's losses on Sept. 11, she decided to reach out.

Kernan sold farm-fresh vegetables at the World Trade Center Greenmarket at the base of the south tower on Tuesdays and Thursdays. On Sept. 11, he lost his truck, stall, scales and other equipment.

When Rasmussen found that out on a farmers' market chat room some days later, she talked to others at the Lexington Farmers Market about what they could do to help.

The farmers have collected money and are inviting the public to a Nov. 11 benefit, called A Feast for the Farmers.

"Farmers are farmers. They love raising food. They love the land, and even if we don't know them, in our hearts, we're linked," Rasmussen said.

After the attacks, Lexington farmers donated the weekly fees they normally pay to the farmers market association. And since Sept. 15, customers have dropped money into jars set out at the Saturday market.

So far, \$823 has been collected. Already, a check for \$450 has been mailed directly to New York's Greenmarket.

A Feast for the Farmers is being organized by John Foster, who along with other chefs, will prepare a four- to five-course dinner with vegetables and fruits donated by local farmers.

A spokesman for Greenmarket said the farmers there lost over \$200,000 in physical property and \$25,000 in produce on Sept. 11.

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Orchestra sued so son can play

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — A judge has said no to a complaint filed by a Lexington couple that would have kept their son tooting his french horn in a local youth orchestra.

The Central Kentucky Youth Orchestra said Joey Dougherty is ineligible because he didn't play by the rules, which required him to enroll in band or another music class at Henry Clay High School.

Circuit Judge Rebecca Overstreet refused to issue an emergency injunction that would have kept their son playing second chair french horn with the group.

Dougherty's parents filed suit because of an orchestra rule that requires all participants to play with a musical group at their school.

Because of Joey's busy schedule, his parents wanted the requirement waived. He has a full academic load at Henry Clay High, and is on a swim team before school.


