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MSU adjusts to tight budget

Budget woes at the state level, combined with continued emphasis on the recruitment and retention of students by the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education, is causing Murray State University to examine the way it does business.

That fact was in evidence during the university's board of regents meeting held Friday in MSU's Pogue Library. In addition to voting to raise three student fees, the board also voted to revamp the university's regional tuition rate policy.

With student regent Nikki Key casting the lone dissenting vote, the

board voted to increase housing fees increases and to keep up with inflain MSU's residential colleges by 4 percent and approved a 2 percent fee increase for students living in College Courts.

"Each percent increase is about \$60,000 in additional revenue," said Don Robertson, MSU vice president of student affairs. "It still puts us about in the middle of the pack of our benchmark institutions.

Robertson said the money generated from the housing increase will go toward a variety of university projects, including facilities renovations and telecommunications improvements.

"A lot of this is fixed cost

tion," said MSU President Dr. King Alexander. "It's right in line with what's happening with our sister or benchmark institutions.

The board, again with the exception of Key, also voted to increase student dining fees by 2 percent and raise the Greek housing exemption fee, which allows sophomores who are in fraternities or sororities to live off campus, from \$50 to \$100.

Key did vote in favor of a money-saving measure that will place a cap on scholarship money given to MSU Student Government Association officers each year.

The SGA president will now be

allowed to receive a maximum amount of \$6,000, while the vice president will be allowed to receive a maximum amount of \$2,000 and the secretary and treasurer will be allowed to receive no more than

"We just felt this was something we needed to do with our tuition going up," Key said. "We felt we needed to bring more events to campus, and this was a good source of

The changes to the regional tuition rate policy, Alexander said, are designed to keep MSU from

Alexander turns down own tenure

Just two months after the Murray State University Board of Regents granted him tenure, university President Dr. King Alexander is giving it back.

Alexander made the somewhat surprising announcement that he is refusing the tenure status the board bestowed on him at its December meeting during the regents' February meeting, held Friday afternoon on the MSU campus.

"It's a personal decision that I believe allows me to more objectively and judiciously address the issue of tenure," Alexander said following the meeting. "With the board giving me tenure, it isn't as clean as I feel it should be in the president having more of an objective view of probably one of the most complicated and delicate issues in higher education today.

When he was hired as MSU's 10th president last September, Alexander came to the university as an assistant professor from the University of Illinois at Urbana-

Jackson's agriculture bill gains approval

FRANKFORT, Kv. — A bill that would create new opportunities for state agencies to buy Kentucky perishables was approved Thursday by the Senate Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee.

Senate Bill 13 would encourage state institutions like prisons, parks and schools to buy fresh produce, fresh seafood, fresh eggs, freshwater fish or fresh meat products from Kentucky farmers.

Sen. Bob Jackson (D-Murray) sponsored the bill. He said the measure is vital to building new markets for Kentucky tobacco farmers.

We have spent millions of dollars in this commonwealth of tobacco settlement funds trying to diversify agri-

culture in Kentucky," Jackson said. "Yet we have still not focused all our energy and efforts on developing

The legislation contains an emergency clause so it would become law as soon as it's approved by both chambers of the General Assembly and signed by the


The owner of Hair Grafiks has found a safer way to keep the summer glow year round.

Terry Strieter criticized the board's decision to hire a president who did not have tenure himself. Both said after Friday's meeting, though, that they believed the board had made the right decision in granting tenure to Alexander in December and were surprised that he had chosen not to accept it.

"I did not know he was considering it," Call said. "It appeared that he was on the track to achieve tenure in Illinois, and it seemed appropriate that he be granted it here.'

Strieter said Alexander has asked both he and Call following the December meeting if they believed the board's decision would

"I did an e-mail survey to the faculty, and I had 97 responses, with only two negatives," Strieter said. "It was almost overwhelming support."

Alexander said the board's granting him tenure in December simply meant that should he ever step down as MSU's president, he would then become a Alexander

tenured faculty member in one of the university's departments. He said that department had not yet been decided

During his remarks to the board, Alexander again expressed strong support for tenure of faculty members. Strieter said he believes Alexander is committed to making tenure an important part of life at MSU.

"Tenure is essential to the academic freevery important point to make, and it can't be made too many times."

Alexander said his decision to turn down tenure for the moment does not mean that he would never accept it from the board. He said he believes now, though, is not the right time for him to accept it.

"It's easier to defend tenure when I don't have it," he said. "It just gives me better flex-

ibility as president.

"I feel completely confident that I can defend the principles and the value of tenure, as long as those values and principles are being upheld on campus."

The policy had consisted of taking one school from each of Kentucky's four border states (Illinois, Tennessee, Missouri and Indiana) and considering those universities'

tuition rates when factoring what an out-of-

state student would pay at MSU. With the changes made Friday, though, Alexander said that now the tuitions of three of four schools from those states would be factored together to form an average tuition rate MSU could use when offering tuition discounts to out-of-state students.

"We've normally said, 'Southern Illinois University's price is our price," Alexander said. "Well, we've looked at it, and that tied us to drastic fluctuations at SIU. We're going to get an average in-state tuition so we can offer a more stable in-state rate.

The current policy had been paying dividends, as evidenced by a report given to the board Friday stating that MSU's spring enrollment had jumped by nearly 300 students from 2001 to 2002.

The new policy would not necessarily represent a savings for students, as Alexander said students from Illinois and Indiana will likely see a tuition increase, but it should give MSU a better idea of what type of tuitions it will need to offer.

"We're not changing our strategy at all," Alexander said. "We're just adjusting their

He said he is optimistic that construction will begin in February 2003 and be finished by December of that same year. Occupancy in the building, he said, should occur by January

Yeatts said the university already has a firm that is the front-runner to handle the project, but could not provide the name of the firm because it had not yet been notified. He also said the university has a location for the center in mind, but would not say where that is.

"We want to make sure it's located in a place that's convenient for the students," Yeatts said. "We also want to locate it somewhere we won't have to use student money to buy the land."

Yeatts said even though is issuing over \$10 million in bonds, the project can likely be completed for around \$8 million. He said construction costs on the estimated 42,000-46,000 square foot structure will likely be between \$5.7 and \$6.3 million.

"We are optimistic that we can put together a project that's second to none," Yeatts said. "When we open the building, we want it ready

The university plans to pay back the bonds with its student recreation fees, which were increased by \$3 per semester credit hour last October. The fee increase was endorsed by the university's student government association.



Agriculture experts say the recent economic downturn and competition from foreign markets are taking their toll on Kentucky's . catfish producers.

"It has thrown our industry into chaos, not only for us but for Mississippi and other areas," said Dr. John Murdock, Purchase Area Agriculture Co-op Director.

With any new business, "the biggest problem you encounter is cash flow," Graves County agricultural leader Bill Green added. "Entering into these markets would help get some cash flow and get these markets going.

Murdock says Kentucky's three-year-old catfish. industry is capable of producing two million pounds of catfish per year. Green says it's higher quality than the fish state agencies have purchased from Vietnam.

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


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

Plymouth Crock?

Despite cracks & holes, stone from Pilgrim's tale defines nation by JEFF DONN/AP Writer

PLYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — An ancient, icy Atlantic wind churns Plymouth Harbor, the sky spreads a slate gloom, and some teen-agers stare solemnly at a boulder caged in a sand pit, like a circus act.

The year "1620" is carved in its flank. A fat seam of mortar fills a diagonal crack. A marker for modern pilgrims identifies this pale, plump chunk of granite — just six feet across — as Plymouth Rock.

Tradition tells us that the Pilgrims stepped upon this rock when they arrived in Plymouth in December of 1620," drones the sign at Pilgrim Memorial State Park.

But Matt Souza of nearby Lakeville, a teenager with a baseball cap and pierced ear, heard it different.

"I heard it came from a quarry in Quincy. My dad supposedly knows the guy that moved it. That's how it got cracked," he says, seemingly in earnest.

The sign's version may be only slightly less cracked

Most historians have concluded that the widely accepted story of The Rock is likely a crock, a rousing myth first fanned by Revolutionary War passions and later by New England's regional superiority complex. Scholar John Seelye, who wrote the 1998 study "Memory's Nation: The Place of Plymouth Rock," says it stands at the center of "what amounts to an ongoing hoax."

Blarney or not, this stone and its story hold a lode of truth about conflicts in the national character: strong ideals and fast deals, faith and pragmatism, gullibility and guile. In the world after Sept. 11, when patriotic symbols gleam with new luster, Plymouth Rock is a place worth revisiting.

We all know the story: In the winter of 1620, the bedraggled Pilgrims from the Mayflower, rebuffing the Church of England, spilled from their scouting boat onto Plymouth Rock — a sort of welcome-to-America mat. They stopped there and struck noble or prayerful poses for the benefit of unborn illustrators. Then they set out to father a country.

The truth? Well, to start with, both Pilgrims and Rock were there. Geologists believe the boulder was deposited by a glacier about 30,000 years ago. The Pilgrims built their first homes just up the hill from The Rock. But William Bradford, their chief chronicler, later wrote that they simply "marched into ye land."

Not a word survives about ye rock until nearly a century later. In 1715, a town surveying record takes note of this boulder, the hulk of the beach. But it mentions it simply as a

rock - not The Rock. Born in local oral tradition, the story of The Rock only catches on more broadly decades later, as the colonists contemplate a split from England. They start to build their new identity

"It was kind of a ready-made symbol," says Robert Arner, a University of Cincinnati professor who has written about colonial America.

"It never was about a stone as stone. Otherwise, they would have blown it out of the way to make room for a wharf."

In fact, there was a plan for a wharf around 1741. Fearing that a certain boulder would be buried underneath, Thomas Faunce, a 95-yearold church elder who had been town clerk, wanted to be carried down to the beach on a chair for one last look.

The tearful old man told how his father, who arrived in Plymouth three years after the Mayflower, had spoken of this rock as the place where the forefathers first stepped onto the new homeland. His father wanted it "perpetuated to posterity," he said.

The locals were moved, and The Rock wasn't. (Years later, a dock was finally erected but around The Rock.)

As early as the 1770s, there are a few surviving references to the legend of The Rock, including a news story and a map with a note written by a Pilgrim's great-great grandson. But it is largely thanks to Faunce — or the story of his day at the beach — that the hulk became known as Forefathers' Rock and later, Plymouth Rock.

The problem is, the Faunce story survives mainly through James Thacher's 1832 "History of Plymouth." Thacher had been a surgeon with a colonial detachment in the Revolution, more than 150 years after the landing. But he says he heard the Faunce story from church deacon Ephraim Spooner.

"It's almost comical anyone would have believed it," says Richard Shenkman, who writes about historical fictions and edits an online history magazine at George Mason

No matter. By 1774, townsfolk, swept up in anti-English fury, decided the First Rock deserved better treatment, as Thacher tells it. With the help of about 60 oxen, they set out to lug The Rock to a place of honor in Town Square beside a liberty pole, a hub for revolutionary activity.

They jacked it up, tried to heave it into a carriage, and — oopsies! — the darn thing cracked in two. Oh well, maybe it was a good omen for a breakaway war. Besides, it was now a whole lot easier to drag up the hill. The

base was left on the beach. With the legend spreading, souvenir hunters started chipping off pieces from both the top and bottom parts of the estranged Rock. "Its very dust is shared as a relic," wrote

Frenchman Alexis de Tocqueville in 1835. Nature writer Henry David Thoreau was offered a memento but declined. Others delighted in the offer. The Rock turned into paperweights, cornerstones, at least one door step, filling for a concrete floor, family heirlooms. Finally, guards were posted.

"You've got thrifty Yankees. If you got some damn fool tourist who wants to give you \$1.50 for it, you take it," says Peggy Baker, director of Plymouth's Pilgrim Hall Museum. The museum displays its own slab.

The top part of The Rock was finally enclosed in an iron fence and eventually reunited with the boulder's bottom at the shore beneath a granite canopy. For the 300th anniversary of the landing, the National Society of Colonial Dames of America erected a Parthenon-style portico over The Rock.

In the last several decades, its legend has been increasingly eclipsed by the story - also a mixture of fact and fancy — of the Thanksgiving feast between the Pilgrims and their Wampanoag neighbors.

"Now where does The Rock come in? It doesn't," says Mayflower descendant Jim Baker, a Plymouth historian and husband of the museum director. (Actually, American Indians have poured paint or dumped sand on it during Thanksgiving protests starting in the 1960s, after which it has been cleaned up.)

What remains of The Rock is estimated to weigh about six tons. High tides still slosh over it, exposing it to more natural damage on top of centuries of a nation's hard love.

Yet The Rock is still tended like a beloved, if out-of-step, great-grandparent. It is periodically waterproofed, its cracks mortared.

It's still a buttress for local tourism in what is promoted as America's hometown. (Never mind that English people settled 13 years earli-

er down in Jamestown, in the Virginia colony.) You can visit The Rock for free at any hour, even if more profitable attractions await just down Water Street, like whale-watching and a re-enacted pirate adventure. If you really do like history, the role-playing characters at Plimouth Plantation (which uses the old spelling) will interact with you.

The Rock says and does nothing, and yet an estimated 800,000 people a year still come from the far ends of this supersized nation, and beyond, and take a look.

Many are disappointed. "I should have known it was just a rock," griped college administrator Peter Dolce, a recent visitor from Nashville, Tenn.

Yet, many return again and again, even in the kind of weather that killed dozens of Pilgrims the first winter. "It's just something you always do: you just come here," said Evan Mazetis, another in the group of teen-agers stopping by the beach in winter.

The Pilgrims chose this spot for its protected harbor and flat, safe shoreline. Given a choice, they would probably have avoided Plymouth Rock as a hazard to their wooden boats, Seelye suggests.


But the legend and its followers endure. Ruth B. Walker, 83, a Plymouth native who acts as a state-park interpreter of The Rock, says the Pilgrims probably stepped on it to keep their feet dry in that cold, wet winter.

It would have made good sense," she says. That's argument enough for many New Englanders — and many other Americans.

Middle Tennessee is more rocks than soil, on rolling hills of a plateau, where Old Hickory is planted at his Hermitage; Nashville with Ryman Auditorium for Saturday and the Parthenon to visit on Sunday; Commodore Vanderbilt on a pedestal; Cordell Hull's pappy on a raft floating down the Cumberland in his overalls past the waterfront warehouses below the Maxwell House to leave a roll of greasy bills at a torchlight rally for his son and then poling back like a stoic, solitary, solid-stock dinosaur swimming back to backcountry invisibility after having sniffed the dawn of modernity; fields full of minie balls at Franklin, the last battlefield in the South's last futile advance, the last cry of "Charge!" mocked thereafter by its echoes in the credit lines at company stores where the Yankee crusaders were replaced by carpetbag invaders; and a high school over in Dickson where a once-future Governor won an oratorical medal by asking repeatedly, "How Long, 0 How Long, America?".



In prose less poetic than this, but

far more informative, retired UT history professor John R. Finger traces the early history of Tennessee's Grand Divisions in "Tennessee Frontiers: Three Regions in Transition" (Indiana University Press, \$35.00), exploring the state's 42,244 square miles from Indian days and DeSoto's visit in 1540 to the Cherokee Removal and 1840 - some 300 years of history, over which time Tennessee moved from isolation and individualism to a market economy.

Tennessee was America's West before America had its Far West to replace it. The Finger book is a chronicle of a search for opportunity and of the closing of a frontier, all driven by a hunger for acquiring

It is a history of greed and strife, politics and race, but it is well to remember that it was also a history that bred heroes and poetry.



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Bills offer merger incentives for volunteer fire departments

SILVER GROVE, Ky. (AP) - On the back wall of the modest two-story building, at the only stop light in town, across the street from the gypsum factory, the Silver Grove Volunteer Fire Department boasts its logo. "We fight ... What You Fear" it proclaims in bright red

Like many small volunteer departments, there are fewer firefighters at Silver Grove. To save itself, and continue providing the service that many local governments cannot, the department merged. It is now awaiting the General Assembly to see if the merger was its salvation or its death sentence.

Last year, Silver Grove and its 20 active volunteers merged with adjoining northern Kentucky fire districts Eastern Campbell and Camp Springs. In doing so, says Silver Grove lifetime member Kevin Sell, they hung the future of all three volunteer departments on Senate Bill

The bill, written by Sell and sponsored by Katie Stine, R-Fort Thomas, would provide a financial incentive for departments that merge

Under the present law, volunteer fire departments receive \$8,250 a year in state funding. Departments that merge - sometimes to compensate for dwindling volunteer numbers or the need to pool equipment — receive the identical funds as a single department.

According to the Kentucky Fire Commission, there are approximately 18,700 volunteer firefighters in the state, working in 765 departments. The state considers a department to be volunteer if it has more volunteers than paid firefighters. The bill would multiply a merged department's share by the number of departments it comprises. That would mean \$24,750 for merged departments of Silver Grove, East Campbell and Camp Springs for the first three years of their new alignment.

The amount would be cut in half for the next three years. After the seventh year, the state stipend would return to the original \$8,250. But there would be a yearly "bonus" of \$4,000 for as long as the departments stay merged. But Sell is concerned about a similar bill sponsored by House Majority Leader Jim Callahan, D-

The House bill is identical to Stine's in all respects,

except that the funding returns to \$8,250 after six years instead of eight.

Some form of the merger proposal appears likely to

"This will reduce redundancy and increase service," said Sell, whose full-time job is with a construction company in Erlanger. "The fact is mergers are going to become more of an issue with consolidated government and dropping volunteer numbers, and do you want to do

it yourself or wait for the government to do it?" Stine's bill would prevent local governments from forcibly merging departments. But some volunteers aren't convinced their departments won't be merged against their will. David Owens, chief of the Crittenden Volunteer Fire Department, says his county judge-executive wants to merge all the volunteers into one Grant County fire department under one chief and redistribute

each department's equipment based on population. "He's a super nice guy, but he doesn't know anything about fire service," Owens said of Grant County Judge-

Executive Darrell Link Link said the county is studying how to best provide its residents with fire service, but that no decisions have

been made. For those opposed to mergers, lost equipment and larger districts are not the only possible casualties. Don Calecod, 62, is the training officer with the Flaherty

Volunteer Fire Protection District in northern Hardin County. The problem is, he has fewer volunteers to train. Where Stine and Sell see merger as an effective combatant against the thinning volunteer ranks, Calecod sees it as first step to closing down firehouses and weakening the role of volunteer firefighters in communities across

The Flaherty district covers 2,500 homes spread over 50 square miles with two stations and 34 volunteers, Calecod said. The 62-year-old Army veteran, a volunteer for 20 years, says merger represents the potential

end for community firefighting, not its salvation. 'When you start consolidating you lose that pride," Calecod said. "When you have that many people working that many hours for free, then you have to have something more than the thrill of turning on the red light and driving fast.

"There has to be a sense of pride and a sense of community and when you consolidate you lose that.'

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP) — A compensatory damages. Burton caused him to develop peripheral vascular disease in 1993.

The companies said Friday they will appeal the verdict.

U.S. District Judge John Lungstrum will decide punitive damages at a hearing later that just involves R.J. Reynolds.

The plaintiff's attorney, Kenneth B. McClain, said his client was happy the case was decided in his

GAO sues Cheney over records

WASHINGTON (AP) Congressional investigators made good on a months-old threat and sued Vice President Dick Cheney to force release of names of Enron and other industry figures who met with Cheney's energy task force.

Comptroller General David Walker, the head of the General Accounting Office, has been trying to get the information since April and has threatened since August to sue. The White House has resisted the demands and promised to "defend our principles.

The lawsuit, filed Friday in U.S. District Court, marked the first time in the GAO's 81-year history as Congress' investigative arm that it went to court to force an executive branch official or agency to release documents.

'We take this step reluctantly," Walker said. "Nevertheless, given GAO's responsibility to Congress and the American people, we have no other choice. Now that the matter has been submitted to the judicial branch, we are hopeful that the litigation will be resolved expeditious-

The GAO contends Cheney's refusal to provide the information violates laws giving it broad authority "for evaluating programs and activities of the United States government" and requiring agencies to provide information about their "duties, powers, activities, organization and financial transactions."

Cheney's task force drafted the Bush administration's energy proposals, which environmental interests have attacked as pro-business to the detriment of the environment.

Bush has refused to hand over the information demanded by the GAO. The White House contends surrendering it would encroach on his ability to get candid views from people outside the government.

"These are important constitutional principles that we've been ready to fight for since they first threatened to file the lawsuit," White House spokeswoman Anne Womack said. "We're ready to defend our

The GAO names only Cheney as seek the records a defendant, both as vice president

and as chairman of the National Energy Policy Development Group, which drafted the proposals Bush proposed last April. Oversight of energy policy and

the investigation of Enron, the Houston-based energy conglomerate that collapsed in December, are "important institutional prerogatives" of Congress, the GAO insists. Enron has been the largest corporate benefactor to Bush's political career.

The congressional agency argues in its lawsuit that its statutory responsibilities give it broad powers to investigate government programs and demand almost all government documents required to help Congress.

"Revealing the names of lobbyists and campaign contributors may be unpleasant to the vice president, but, as previous administrations have learned, avoiding embarrassment isn't a constitutional protection," said Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., one of the first lawmakers to

Cheney's office said last month that Enron representatives met six times with Cheney or his aides about energy policy, including a discussion in mid-October, 1 1/2 months before the company's collapse. It also said that former Enron chairman Kenneth Lay met once with

The lawsuit sets up an unprecedented fight over just how far GAO as a congressional investigating agency can reach into the executive branch. It asks a federal judge to require Cheney to reveal who attended the energy tax force meetings, with whom the task force met to develop its energy recommendations, how it determined whom to invite and how much it cost to develop the policy.

A senior White House official said the administration will challenge GAO's right to the information because the law specifies the agency's purpose is to investigate only the expenditure and disbursement of public money.

Bugs Bunny animator Chuck Jones dead at 89

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (AP) - Academy Award-winning animator Chuck Jones, who drew such beloved cartoon characters as Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck, Elmer Fudd and Porky Pig, died at his home Friday. He was 89.

Jones worked on more than 300 animated films in a career that spanned more than 60 years. Three of his films won Academy Awards and he was awarded an honorary Oscar in 1996 for lifetime achievement. He also received an honorary life membership from the Directors Guild of America.

Jones died of congestive heart failure at his home in the coastal community of Corona del Mar, according to a statement released by his daughter's company, Linda Jones Enterprises.

Working at Warner Bros., Jones "So Much, So Little" and "The Dot Iwerks, helped bring to life some of the studio's most recognizable characters. In addition to Bugs and Daffy, he worked on the fast-moving, beepbeeping Road Runner and his hapless pursuer, Wile E. Coyote. He also drew Pepe le Pew, the romanticminded skunk with a French accent.

Jones also produced, directed and wrote the screenplay for the animated television classic "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas."

The animator's work won him admirers throughout the entertainment business.

"Chuck Jones' originality, his humor and his pacing still have no peer today," director Steven Spielberg once said.

Three of Jones' films won Academy Awards: "Frigid Hare,"

and the Line," for which Jones also received a directing Oscar.

One of Jones' most popular films, "What's Opera, Doc?" was inducted into the National Film Registry in 1992 for being "among the most culturally, historically and aesthetically significant films of our time.'

Born in 1912 in Spokane, Wash., Jones moved to Hollywood with his family, finding work there as a child extra in Mac Sennett comedies.

After graduating from Chouinard Art Institute (now the California Institute of Arts), he began making a living drawing pencil portraits on Olvera Street, a historic Los Angeles marketplace.

He landed his first job washing animation cels in 1932, working for legendary Disney animator Ub

A few years later, he became an animator at the Leon Schlesinger Studio, which was later sold to

Dept. until it closed in 1962. He also worked for MGM Studios, creating episodes for the "Tom and Jerry" cartoon series.

Warner Bros. He headed up his own

unit at the Warner Bros. Animation

Jones opened his own company, Chuck Jones Enterprises, in 1962, producing nine 30-minute animated

Abdullah, his country's de facto ruler, said Saudi Arabia would be prepared to establish full diplomatic relations, normalize trade and guarantee Israel's security if the Israelis agreed to withdraw entirely from the territories they occupied at the end of the 1967 war. That would include the West Bank, Gaza and east Jerusalem, areas that many Israelis would be loath to give up.

"I wanted to find a way to make clear to the Israeli people that the Arabs don't reject or despise them." the crown prince said in the interview. "But the Arab people do reject what their leadership is now doing to the Palestinians, which is inhumane and oppressive. And I thought of this as a possible signal to the Israeli people.

The U.S. official noted that a few days later, Saudi officials suggested

agree to having portions of Jerusalem and perhaps even small parts of the West Bank under Israeli

Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres in an interview with Saudi TV this week called the proposal "an interesting and positive one, radiating a willingness to advance toward

Bush has been pushing moderate Arab leaders to further pressure to Arafat to crack down on violence against Israelis.

The Saudi crown prince, in turn, has long pushed the United States to apply more pressure to Israel to resolve the crisis, criticizing Bush heavily on the issue last summer.

The Palestinian issue is crucial to Abdullah and other moderate Arab leaders because it is a source of potential unrest in their countries.

Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak is to visit Washington at the end of next week to meet with Bush and discuss both the war on terrorism and the Middle East.

Some U.S. analysts discounted the Saudi proposal, saving it was intriguing but could not solve a situation that has spiraled out of control. Robert Satloff of the Washington Institute for Near East Policy called in another interview that they could it "at least 19 months too late.



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



Fitch, **Daniels** suspended for using fake ID's

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) -Kentucky's embattled basketball team took another major hit Friday with the suspension of two players for using fake South Carolina driver's licenses to try to get into a local nightclub.

Coach Tubby Smith suspended sophomores Gerald Fitch and Erik Daniels indefinitely Friday, less than 24 hours after the two were cited for third-degree criminal possession of a forged instrument.

According to the citation, the two were caught about 12:40 a.m. trying to enter the Varsity Blue, a bar near campus. They were cited by police and scheduled to appear in court on March 25.

"We've had so many distractions this year, and this is one you just hate to see," a somber Smith said during a news conference to discuss the Wildcats' game with Arkansas on Saturday. "Although this is something that may go on other places, it will not be tolerated here.

"I've talked to each player and his parents. They all understand the consequences and that there may be further punishment."

Fitch, a starting guard from Macon, Ga., did not play in the Wildcats' last game, a 64-61 victory over Tennessee on Tuesday. He was suspended for the game after a scuffle with teammate Cory Sears on a flight from a loss at Georgia last

weekend.

Fitch has been the team's most consistent player this season, averaging 9.5 points and 5.8 rebounds per game before his earlier suspension.

Daniels, a key reserve from Cincinnati, has averaged 3.9 points and 2.9 rebounds in

about 13 minutes per game. Kentucky (18-7, 8-5 Southeastern Conference) was expected to challenge for a national championship this season. Chaos both on and off the court, however, has placed a dark cloud over college basketball's winningest program.

Distractions have been plentiful for the Wildcats this season and may have played a role in their erratic play as the season has progressed.

First it was Rick Pitino's return to Rupp Arena. Then Marvin Stone's transfer to bitter rival Louisville. Then an injury to senior guard J.P. Blevins that kept him out of the lineup for nearly five weeks.

Then came Smith's clashes with freshman sharpshooter Rashaad Carruth, who missed two games for disciplinary reasons, and junior guard Keith Bogans, who was benched for the final 18 minutes of a victory over LSU.

In addition to the suspensions of Fitch and Sears for Tuesday's game, Smith also had a confrontation with freshman guard Adam Chiles during the game and again benched Bogans for the final 17:50 against the Vols.

On Monday, Smith issued an ultimatum to his players that future distractions would result in significant penalties.





U.S. looks to add medals

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The United States slalom race left Saturday. Short-track speedskater Apolo enters the final weekend of the Winter Olympics with a lot more medals than expected.

And it's not done yet.

Despite being shut out Friday for the second time during the games, Americans are contenders for many of the nine medals up for grabs Saturday and Sunday. The United States goes into the last two days with 30 medals, 17 more than its previous play for the bronze medal in men's hockey. record and 10 more than the U.S. Olympic Committee predicted.

The men's hockey team is guaranteed at least a silver after beating Russia 3-2 in the semifinals Friday. The Americans will play Canada in the final Sunday.

The four-man U.S. bobsled team led by Todd Hays grabbed first place after two heats Friday. With two clean runs Saturday, the sled almost certainly will pick up a medal, ending a 46-year drought for American men in the sport.

Other events Saturday include the men's 50-kilometer classical cross-country race, women's 5,000meter speedskating, and the women's 1,000 meters in short-track speedskating. Also, Russia and Belarus

Paced by junior guards Mitchell McClure and Jimmy Bynum and their 17.0 and 14.6 points per game, respectively, Calloway finished the regular season on an eight-game winning streak and 11 victories in their last 12 contests.

one side, but flip it over and it becomes a super-duper ledger. The Department prefers to call on while hunting deer and turkey.

This thing is a ledger. According to the hot-off-thepress 2002 Turkey Hunting Guide, all turkey and deer hunters are required to write down their harnumber for each turkey or deer they take. Reading from the guide: "You Mossyoak pattern. will need to take a pen with you in

Any good turkey hunter worth his spurs knows that the big birds are adept at color perception — so much so that they can discern a Bic yards.

One click of the clicker or twist of the barrel will be enough sound and motion to stampede a whole herd of deer into the next county.

What the sportsmen and women of Kentucky need is a good quality instrument that can be armed quietly with little or no movement to match the hunter's chosen attire.

Since the first intrepid sportsmen required to produce a field journal are turkey hunters, here's

First, everyone who hunts a turkey can be purchased at sporting goods stores everywhere, along with a turkey tag.

The turkey tag is not for tagging the turkey, however. It's just for, well, \$20.

On the back of the license is the general ledger, where the successful hunter will record the details of the harvest — unless you are a landowner who is exempt from a license, or if you purchased your license via the telephone.

In any case, you will need to make your own if you don't actually have a pre-printed paper license.

There's a handy sample in the hunting guide — you could just cut it out, but the paper is so cheap that it wouldn't hold up. Plus, you would mess up impor-

tant instructions on the flip side about tele-checking your bird. So just get a piece of paper and copy the blasted thing.

So let's say that you have made it a log, but logs are what you sit it to the woods on opening morning and have set up on a good bird gobbling his fool head off. You let out a yelp or two, and

- sure enough - the bird pitches down and heads straight for you, closing the distance to less than 40 vest and tele-check confirmation yards because he can't see your new Bic in authentic Realtree or Immediately after the shot (suc-

cessful, we'll assume), you'll pick up your camo document portfolio and make a bee-line to your bird.

When you reach the bird, set up your handy sportsmen's folding table from a Parker Brothers at over 100 and writing chair, sort through the portfolio for the appropriate documents, retrieve the dandy all-pur pose camo pen from your chest pocket and set about the process of correctly filling out your harvest ledger before you even consider moving the turkey.

Whatever you do, don't use your license, whether homemade or storebought, for a carcass tag because you then would be without your ledger in case you are audited by the local conservation officer.

So see, that wasn't too hard now was it?

All you have to remember is that your license isn't just a license, but also a ledger.

Your turkey tag isn't a tag at all, but just a receipt for your \$20.

All of this is so much neater than those messy pre-printed peelum-and-stick-um tags of yesteryear unless you use a fountain pen. But that's another story.

Just keep me in mind if you want to start up a company to make those special camouflaged ball-point pens. I might be willing to kick in a few bucks — especially if I get a free

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — While the next Kentucky deer hunting is long months away. what a whitetail hunter does in late winter themselves. A hunter's rambles shortly can determine much of what happens when before he hunts can spook and push out the season does arrive.

Postseason scouting — fact-finding foravs into deer habitat after the close of hunting - is the ideal occasion to determine hunting locations for the next autumn.

Visibility of deer sign is greater now and other sign now have had many weeks to accumulate atop autumn's fallen leaves. In weeks to come, that physical evidence

will be more obscured by spring's new

Another timing factor that favors postseason scouting is disturbance of the deer deer, or at a minimum put them on guard. Late winter scouting, however, gives deer months to disregard incursions before the next hunting.

Mere comfort is another plus for late winter woods walking. It's far more pleasthan at any other time of the year. Tracks ant now than it will be in the sweaty, insectridden days of summer, when many hunters do their preseason deer scouting.

Hunters may seek out buck sign in the

Scrapes, those hoof-cleared patches of bare dirt under overhanging limbs, are the breeding cycle message boards among competing bucks and available does. Most were made before the mid-November peak of the rut, but they still can be seen along travel routes and in the thick of rut activity zones. Many choice scrape sites are reused every season. The overhead branch, usually one with scars of antler thrashing, is the confirming sign of any suspected scrape.

Rubs are small trees and bushes that have been worn bare of bark in places by one or more bucks scouring them with their antlers. They become territorial, rut-relat-

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— larger than the hunter's forearm, say indicate bigger bucks. Rubs, too, tend to be most plentiful in a buck's core area, usually a thick place where he spends most of his time.

Walking through thickety bedding cover, a winter scouter might have the chance to see some deer directly, jumping them from their beds. As winter advances, more bucks will have dropped the past year's antlers, providing information as to the deer's quality as well as trophies of sorts for those who find the shed headgear.

Deer travel routes are important discoveries, especially when they are long-estab-

ed signposts. As a rule, rubs on bigger trees lished, heavily traveled and prone to be used season after season. Tracks in soft ground, leaves chopped by hooves and furrowed depressions in the earth from sheer volume of traffic make habitual trails stand

Food sources are prime factors that can be identified during strolls through the whitetail woods. DEAR DR. GOTT: Do you clone yourself? How do you manage to have a medical practice and write your daily column? However you do it, congratulations - and keep up the good

P.S. How can I get a copy of your new photography book?

DEAR READER: Thank you for your compliment and encouragement. They mean a lot to me when, as often happens, I've put in full day at the office, been to the hospital and made rounds at the nursing home - only to discover that the column calls. At that point, my evening (or weekend) turns out to be more demanding than I thought it would be.

I suppose that if I didn't enjoy my work, it would be a drag. Wearing two (sometimes three) hats is, however, very rewarding - not from the standpoint of monetary income, you understand, but from the perspective of helping others. The column is simply my way of making "housecalls" on new friends. I write in my "off hours." My public is a vital part of my patientnetwork; I take each letter seriously even though some may be humorously bizarre and offbeat. I would die on the vine without the constant responses from my readers, even though these responses are occasionally critical. I try to answer pertinent correspondence in print; for obvious reasons, I cannot reply personally to

readers' questions, because the column generates about 2,500 letters a week. I am in the process of developing a Web site. That will take time, because I am most loyal to my newspaper-reading consumers, and - dare I admit it? - I am computer-illiterate. I simply haven't had the time to become familiar with these electronic marvels. (Perhaps I will once I retire. But I won't now, because I have too many car payments!)

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother has been prescribed atenolol. What is this drug, and what sickness does she have's



DEAR READER: Atenolol is one drug in the class of beta-blockers, medication ordinarily used to combat hypertension and to treat cardiovascular conditions, such as angina. Beta-blockers have three major effects on the circulation: they slow the pulse rate, reduce the work of the heart and lower blood pressure (by dilating many arteries in the body).

Atenolol has a long and distinguished track record. It is inexpensive, convenient and has been in use

for decades. It should be prescribed cautiously in patients with heart failure and asthma because it may worsen these conditions.

Although I have given a very brief overview of your mother's therapy, this is not sufficient. Rather than attempting to guess her disease by analyzing her medication, you should approach her physician for an indepth discussion of your mother's health. This direct strategy will give you far more useful information than does the Agatha Christie option of simply examining the clues. For example, atenolol is occasionally prescribed for patients with alcohol withdrawal, migraine headaches and certain forms of anxiety (such as stage-

While your mother's illness is likely to be related to her cardiovascular system, you need to talk to her (and her doctor) about her general clinical status and health problems.

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
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


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
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Reelfoot duck blinds suits sent back to district court

TIPTONVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Arguments over the state's removal of four duck blinds on Reelfoot Lake can continue, a federal appeals court ruled Thursday.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the federal district court in Jackson must take another look at two lawsuits filed against the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency by Reelfoot area residents.

In one suit, Gary and Shelly Arnett contend the TWRA overstepped its authority in 1997 when it tore down three duck blinds they say they owned on Reelfoot.

Duck blinds are camouflaged structures from which hunters shoot waterfowl

In a separate decision, the appeals court also said the district court must reconsider a similar lawsuit filed by Reelfoot residents Jamie and Bonnie Hamilton.

The Hamiltons say state employees wrongly removed a duck blind they had put up near a resort they run at Reelfoot.

The district court rejected both lawsuits on summary judgments for the state.

Vincent Sikora, the Hamiltons' lawyer, said his clients are question-

ing how much control the state has over Reelfoot.

They contend that a North Carolina land grant from before Tennessee was a state gives them possession of some of the lake bottom under Reelfoot, Sikora said.

The state issues permits for duck blind construction and use on Reelfoot. Both lawsuits argue, however, that the blinds owned by the Arnetts and Hamiltons were outside the state's jurisdiction.

Reelfoot is a prime fishing and hunting lake in northwest Tennessee near the Kentucky and Missouri lines. The state regulates about 200 Reelfoot blinds, most of them privately owed.

In his suit, Arnett also argues that the TWRA was particularly harsh in destroying his blinds because of his prior complaints about the state's regulation of Reelfoot.

'They've been just making up their rules as they go," Arnett said when informed of the 6th Circuit

The state attorney general's office said no decision had been made on whether to appeal the 6th Cir-
