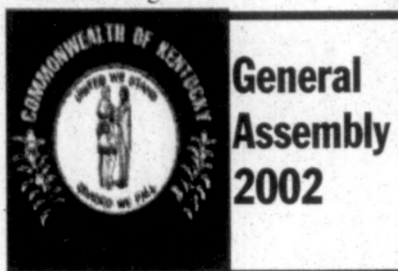

No ground being given on campaign finance

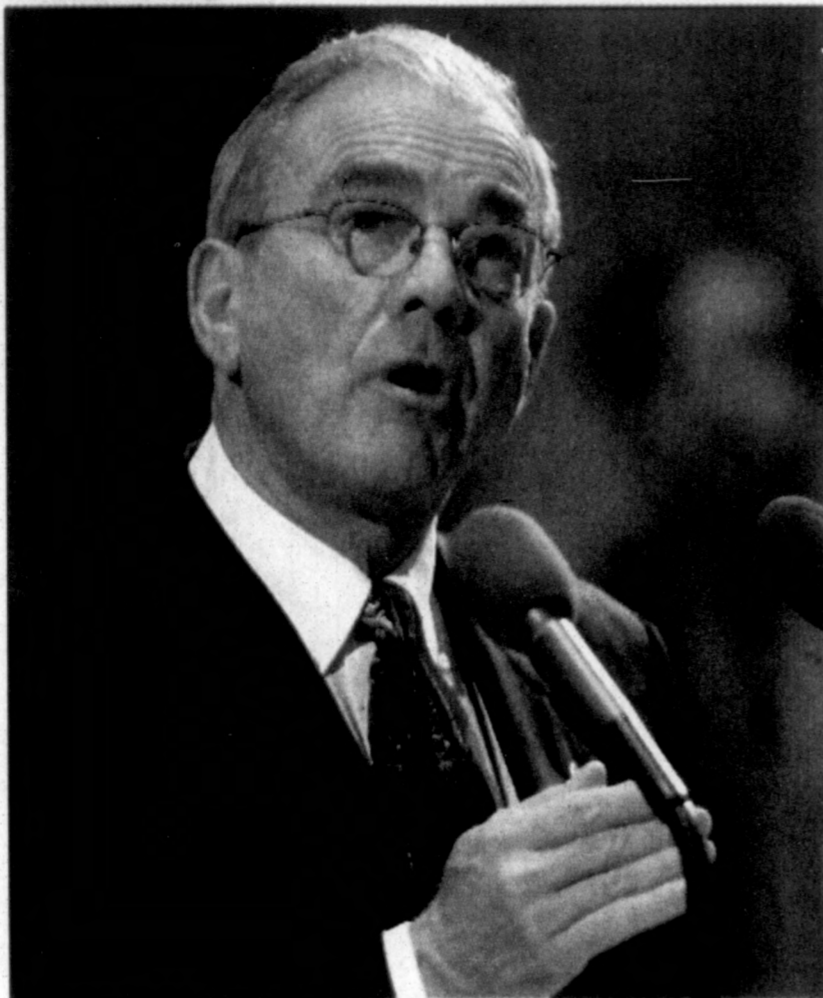
Technically, the Kentucky General Assembly has until June 30 to pass a new two-year operating budget for the state. However, state Sen. Bob Jackson and Rep. Buddy Buckingham are hoping it will not take that long.



The state legislature is scheduled to reconvene in special session Monday to review a budget that will be put before them by Gov. Paul Patton. Legislators missed their final opportunity to pass a budget they crafted themselves April 15, the last day of this year's regular session.

The Republican-dominated Senate and the Democrat-led House were unable to work out a compromise on the issue of campaign finance reform. Republicans want to remove public funding for gubernatorial races, while Democrats, including Patton, want it to remain.

Jackson and Buckingham, both Democrats from Murray, said it

Chandler to test gubernatorial waters

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Attorney General Ben Chandler took his first formal step toward a gubernatorial candidacy Friday, creating an exploratory finance committee.

Chandler, who has served in state offices for 11 years, becomes the second Democrat to create a committee. Louisville businessman Charlie Owen created his committee earlier this week.

An exploratory committee allows

a candidate to raise and spend up to \$90,000 to do preliminary campaign work, such as polling and organizing.

Chandler took an especially low-key approach to his announcement, distributing a single page release,

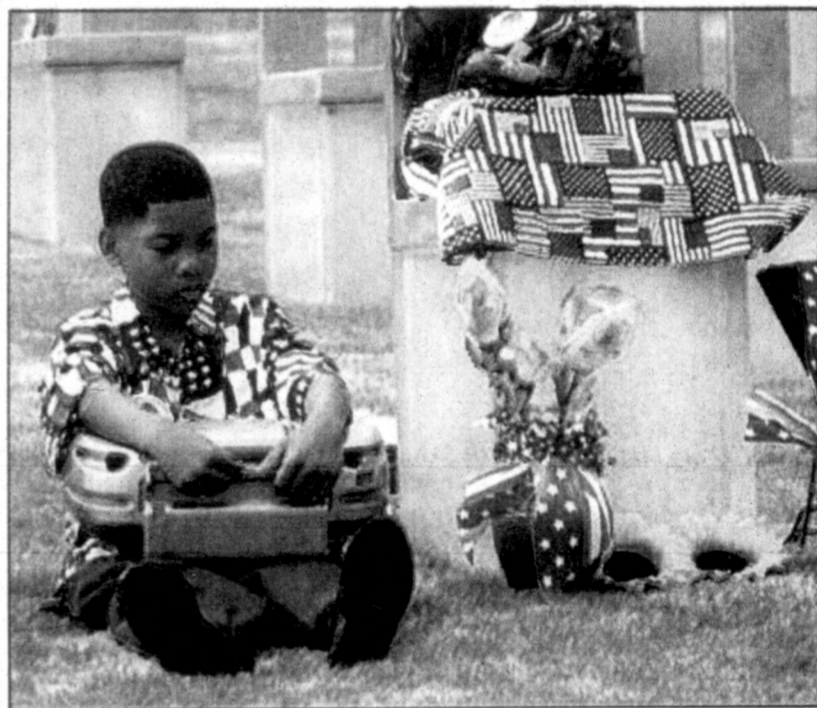
most of which is dedicated to information about his campaign chairman and treasurer. Former Democratic Party chairman Tracy Farmer is chief of the exploratory committee and the treasurer is long-time Democratic power broker George Helton. Helton served as campaign treasurer for Paul Patton during his two gubernatorial campaigns.

The 2003 Democratic primary is shaping up as a crowded field.

House Speaker Jody Richards of Bowling Green and Lt. Gov. Steve Henry of Louisville are also expected to run.

Republicans also could have a spirited primary for the first time in quite a while. Jefferson County Judge-Executive Rebecca Jackson has already formed her exploratory committee, as has state Rep. Steve Nunn of Glasgow. A committee was also formed by state Sen. Virgil Moore of Leitchfield.

Those touched by terror gathered for memorial

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Several World Trade Center families and those who lost loved ones in the Oklahoma bombing comforted each other Friday at ceremonies marking the seventh anniversary of what had been until Sept. 11 the deadliest act of terrorism on U.S. soil.

About 20 Sept. 11 relatives, survivors and rescue workers stood with Oklahomans for 168 seconds of silence in memory of the 168 people killed in the bombing of the federal building on April 19, 1995. Church

bells broke the quiet. "Today they look just as sad as us," said Nicole Petrocelli, whose husband, Mark, died at the trade center. "I can see from the expressions on the faces that the pain is never going to go away. But it gives me hope to see that they are a little stronger than we are."

Standing under the branches of an elm tree that survived the blast, many wiped away tears as a guitarist played "Amazing Grace" and a

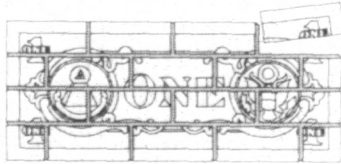
compete on a monthly basis to drive and eventually own BMW automobiles.

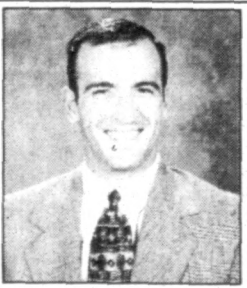

Tip reports threat against U.S. banks

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 1,200 banks in the northeastern United States are on heightened security alert after the FBI publicly warned of possible terrorist attacks. Authorities said the unconfirmed information that prompted the alert came in part from a high-ranking al-Qaida leader in U.S. custody.

Authorities cautioned that they had no information about a specific plot or threats to any financial institution, but a U.S. law enforcement source said authorities feared a suicide attack. Another senior official said the threat was not specified. The sources spoke on condition of anonymity.

Friday's warning of what the FBI described as possible "physical attacks" was based in part on information from Abu Zubaydah, the highest-ranking al-Qaida terrorist leader in U.S. custody, two officials said, but it was unclear if he was telling the truth. They said he could be lying in an effort to create a panic.

Abu Zubaydah is alleged to have

been one of Osama bin Laden's top planners of terrorist operations, with knowledge of al-Qaida plots and operational cells. He was captured in Pakistan on March 28 and is recovering from three gunshot wounds he received in the raid.

"We are not changing our national threat level," Attorney General John Ashcroft said. "We are not asking the banks to close, nor urging people to stay away from banks."

He said the information "may or may not be reliable."

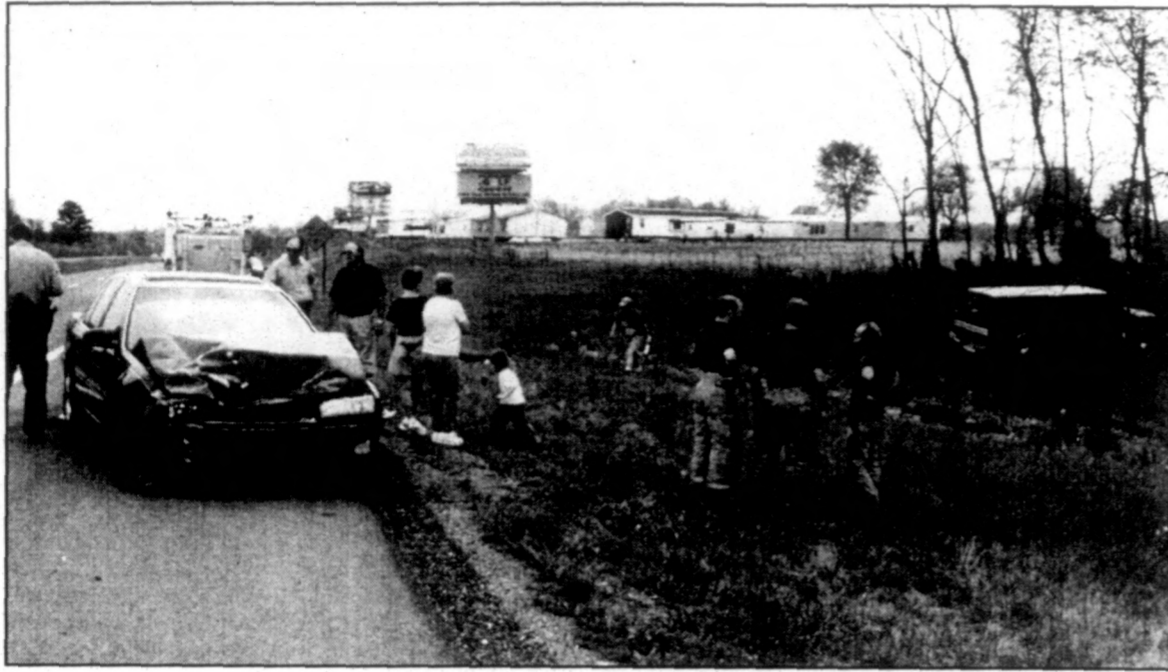
The government has issued industry-specific warnings since the Sept. 11 attacks about possible tar-

geting of trucking companies, dams and water-supply systems, crop dusters and nuclear plants.

The FBI warning went to more than 1,200 banks and savings institutions and to law enforcement in Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire and the District of Columbia.

The FBI said the nation's threat status remained at "yellow," using the new system of color codes. The threat status for the Northeast similarly was unchanged at yellow.

appears Patton is determined to give no ground on the issue. Jackson said Republicans might have had a better chance for some type of reform if their proposal had not been added late in the budget process.

"It we have a fair and open debate in regard to this issue, that's one thing," Jackson said. "The way it is, I don't see how the governor can take any position other than what he has."

Once Patton's budget is presented Monday, it will go through the House's appropriations and revenue for discussion and then to the floor for a vote. If approved, it would then go through the same process in the Senate.

"It goes through the exact same process, but I think the governor's going to try and make it so we can't change it," Buckingham stated. "I don't think he can do that, so we'll have to try and work out some type

of compromise."

The public monies that are contributed by the state during gubernatorial campaigns in Kentucky are used to place a cap on how much each candidate can spend. Jackson said the measure has made Kentucky a pioneer among states attempting campaign finance reform.

"Kentucky was on the cutting edge of how to finance gubernatorial campaigns in this country," he said. "I would hate to see us take a step backward."

In a special session, the legislature can only discuss what the governor puts on the agenda, and right now the only item on the agenda for April 22 is the budget. Neither Jackson nor Buckingham, however, could guarantee that a new budget would come out of Monday's meeting alone.

Jackson said he believes a new budget will not be passed until

sometime near the end of next week, while Buckingham, who predicted that the House will again vote to leave the public funding intact, said it is still too early to tell because no one has seen the budget Patton is going to present.

"We're basically waiting on the governor to decide what kind of budget he's going to give us," Buckingham said. "If the Republicans don't agree to back off, I don't know how we'll get it passed."

bombing survivor sang "Let There Be Peace on Earth."

Families of New York victims placed one white carnation on each of the empty bronze chairs where the Alfred P. Murrah Building once stood. William Rodriguez, who was pulled from rubble of the trade center, said he came to thank the Oklahoma City bombing victims who visited New York last fall.

"The support that they gave us was very important because we didn't have any cathartic, emotional exchange with anyone who had gone through what we were going through," he said. "They are actually teaching us how to keep going."

Survivors of both tragedies said they share a bond that is unbreakable.

After the ceremony, many toured a new exhibit in the memorial museum that focuses on the similar experiences of terrorist victims.

Security clashes with Derby's festive feel

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Charles Matasich has been to the last 35 Kentucky Derbies, annually adding to the festival-like flavor with his rose-adorned cowboy hat and green jacket covered with ornamental pins.

If Matasich and his pins can make it past the metal detectors at Churchill Downs this year, he will again be among the expected crowd of 150,000. But he fears the tightened security planned in the wake of the Sept. 11 attacks will do nothing more than frustrate fans and take away some of the fun.

"It's going to have a very different feel this year," he said. "Very, very different."

A force of 1,400 officers from various agencies — double the manpower for any previous race — will patrol the track on Derby Day.

Concrete barricades will limit the flow of traffic outside it, all buses and limousines will be swept for explosives and all vehicles entering the track will be subject to searches.

Everyone from infield patrons to the owners and trainers to the celebrities on Millionaires' Row will be scanned with magnetic wands upon entering, and the list of banned items includes many things people have lugged into the infield for years to add to their makeshift campsites.

Some Derby regulars are angered to the point where they won't attend this year. "It's going to be too much of a hassle," said Jennifer Hicks of Louisville, who's been to the last 13 Derbies.

Churchill Downs president Alex Waldrop said track and local law-enforcement officials labored to strike the right balance between protection and convenience.

Waldrop said the track will not hike the prices of other items to take advantage of the new restrictions.

That's not good enough for Dave Grisham of Louisville, who said the measures will keep him away from the festivities this year.

Grisham has taken his wife and children to the last eight Kentucky Oaks, the race for fillies the day before the Derby that's traditionally attended by local fans and their families.

"Most people don't go to the infield on either day to watch the horses run — they go there to have a nice day with friends and their kids," Grisham said.

"Most people don't want to bother purchasing a cooler. They want to bring their own.

"We realized we were in a no-win situation," Waldrop said. "Some people consider security a high priority. ... Then there's a large contingent who are used to the Derby atmosphere who are going to be dismayed if we were to change that environment."

The track has taken most of its criticism for the list of items that will be confiscated, including bottles of suntan lotion and water, cans, coolers, grills, thermoses, backpacks, duffel bags, luggage, trash bags, wagons, strollers, umbrellas and anything that can be used as a weapon.

Food can be brought in only in clear, plastic bags no larger than 18 inches square. Chairs, blankets and tarps will be allowed in, but only at certain gates. Purses and baby bags will be subject to searches.

"It's one thing to not allow me those items aboard an airplane," said Peter Nicolos of Hopkinsville. "But picture me in an open area in the midst of 125,000 or so people. I could hurt an individual or two with a corkscrew or a can of something, but I could inflict just as much damage with my fists. I mean, what are they trying to prevent?"

"If they're worried about a terrorist, the guy's not going to put a bomb in a cooler. He'll probably strap it to his body. So, instead of checking purses, they better have everybody pull up their shirts or pull down their pants."

Once infield patrons get through the gates, they'll be able to purchase most of the banned items — including sunscreen — at two temporary convenience stores that will be placed in the infield.

The food marts will not sell alcohol, but Waldrop said the track will not hike the prices of other items to take advantage of the new restrictions.

That's not good enough for Dave Grisham of Louisville, who said the measures will keep him away from the festivities this year.

Grisham has taken his wife and children to the last eight Kentucky Oaks, the race for fillies the day before the Derby that's traditionally attended by local fans and their families.

"Most people don't go to the infield on either day to watch the horses run — they go there to have a nice day with friends and their kids," Grisham said.

They want to bring in whatever they want, do whatever they want and make a day of it.

"This kind of eliminates a lot of that." Grisham also considered the long lines that are likely to form both at the gates and at the food marts.

He foresees thousands of Derby patrons setting up encampments outside the track and spending the day there, like tailgaters at a football game.

"I'm sure a lot of people will just say, 'It's just not worth standing in line, paying whatever it is to get in, and then having to buy everything once you get in. Let's have our own party,'" he said.

Waldrop said the potential lines were a chief concern as officials pored over the plan.

"The best thing we can do on Derby Day is get people in quickly and get them in their seats. The worst thing we can do is come up with a security plan that leaves people standing in line for hours," he said. "We're trying our best, but we're also trying to tell people to expect delays."

Unlike the Super Bowl and the Olympics, the Derby did not get the National Security Special Event designation that city officials asked for in December.

That left Churchill Downs without federal funds to pay for its measures, but with the freedom to devise its own plan. Waldrop said Churchill Downs will provide food and pay overtime for the officers who work at the track that weekend.

"It would've been nice to have the money, but we might've lost control of the event," Waldrop said. "Get that federal status, and it becomes a Secret Service-run event. Security is their only concern, and they could choose to crack down much, much harder than we feel we are."

Security will also be stepped up on the backside, where the Derby horses are stabled. In addition to 24-hour security, every jockey, trainer, groom and exercise rider — even those who've worked at the track for years — will be required to display credentials or risk being ordered to leave.

Kenny McPeck, who trains Derby contender Harlan's Holiday, doesn't mind the extra precautions.

"You certainly want the races to go off without a hitch," McPeck said. "Fans might not like it, but you're talking about well over 100,000 people. The track needs to do the things it's doing. It's very important."

A whirlwind in collegiate matters

David Shi was a historian and scholar long before being "demoted" to president of Furman University in Greenville, S.C., in 1994.

We first met him when he was a professor (17 years) at Davidson College, in which our daughter enrolled in 1993. A Furman alumnus, his graduate degrees are from the University of Virginia. He is a native of Atlanta.

As a scholar-teacher, Shi was co-author of a popular and frequently re-printed American history textbook — "America: A Narrative History" — with another long-time friend of ours, historian George B. Tindall of UNC Chapel Hill.

But Shi also authored "The Simple Life: Plain Living and High Thinking in American Culture," an inspiring book combining history and love for simplicity that we have shared widely with students and friends. Its re-release in paperback in 2001 made "The Simple Life" even more available as an ideal gift.

President Shi has reappeared in print this year with an easy-to-read patchwork quilt of a book, "The Bell Tower and Beyond: Reflections on Learning and Living" (USC Press). It is a compilation of some speeches and of frequent essays that Shi writes for assorted newspapers around the nation, especially for his local *Greenville News*.

The rivalry between his Furman alma mater he now serves as president and neighboring Wofford College, 30 miles away, is intense and of long-standing. But competition notwithstanding, it is very difficult not to admire both David Shi and the Furman campus that he energizes and uplifts.

Shi is an eloquent and avid advocate for liberal arts education. At least a third of his 217-page book focuses on that topic, including personal salutes to great educators — Jim Barker at Clemson, former Wofford president Joe Lesesne, English professors and academic officers Francis Wesley Bonner and John Crabtree, historian William E. Leverette, Jr., and sociologist Robert McNamara.

Shi has collections of essays on writing and reading (with a great Phi

Beta Kappa address on books), on contemporary culture (one of which celebrates the return of Greek and Latin), on Greenville and its leaders, on the wider South (including tribute to C. Vann Woodward and a reflection on kudzu), and a long concluding collection of essays on American history (such as Andrew Johnson's impeachment, the Scopes Trial, Eleanor Roosevelt, and pre-September 11th terrorist John Brown).

Most impressive to us is a paragraph about Lafayette's triumphant return to America in 1824-25 — a little-noted visit that has long fascinated us.

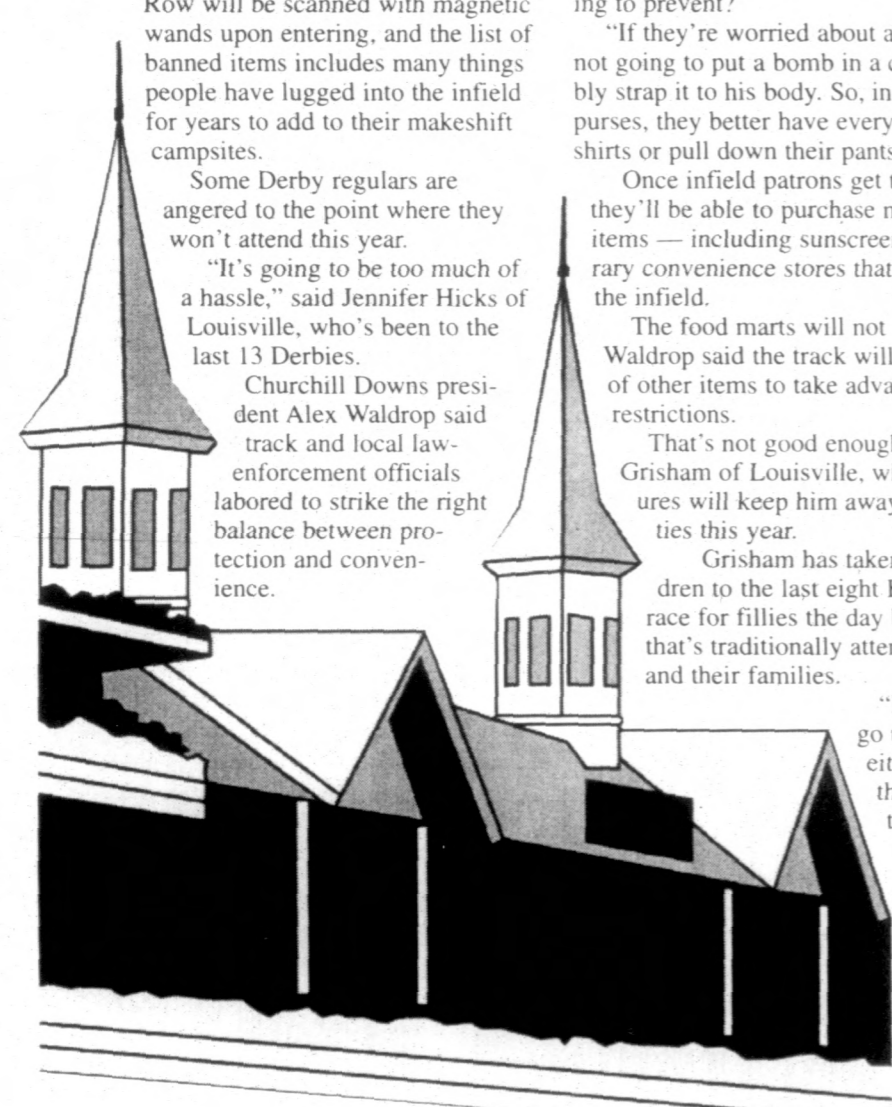
Shi's style is terse but prosaic. The book is laced and graced with pen-and-ink sketches by his Furman classmate, Ronald Boozer, an architect in Charlotte. The book's appearance was timed to coincide with Furman's celebration of its 175 years. It is a perfect way to celebrate old age — looking backward into history but looking forward with vision.

To his credit, Shi is exceedingly modest — perhaps too much so — about his own achievements at Furman — many new buildings, NCAA Division I competitive athletics, soaring endowment funds, elevated SAT scores, burgeoning admissions applications, innovative curricular reforms, exciting faculty growth and activity and enhanced national visibility and name recognition. He gives credit to others, never to himself.

But anyone who knows David Shi knows that he is a whirlwind in collegiate matters — academic, aesthetic, athletic, administrative and acquisitive.

Despite being demanding in expectations and exceptionally high standards of excellence from himself and his colleagues, he remains as faithful to simple living as Henry David Thoreau (author of Walden) — and more loveable as a person than Thoreau.

The liberal arts colleges of the country — some 640 in number today when all colleges (prior to the Civil War) were of that genre — are fortunate to have Shi out hustling for the undergraduate arts, humanities and sciences. And despite what we may be heard shouting at Furman-Wofford games, we at Wofford are fortunate to have Shi as a friend and Furman as a sister institution in our mutual passions to keep quality liberal arts education alive providing leaders who make the difference in higher quality of life for South and nation.

After the waiting period and the continued assurances from construction workers in the area that we would NOT have power today, the staff left the building. It was becoming very warm and stuffy, with no air-conditioning prior to the office closing.

Later in the morning, I learned that the power had been restored. By this time, I was unable to call employees back. However, I learned the power was lost again around late morning and restored again in the afternoon.

We can only operate on the information we are given, much like your newspaper. That is why I wanted to share with you and your readers a bit of (Thursday's) events. Lawsuits won't be reinstated against parents, teachers, classmates of Heath shooter

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The Kentucky Court of Appeals refused to reinstate lawsuits Friday against the parents, teachers, classmates and others who supposedly could have influenced teen gunman Michael Carneal.

Parents of three girls Carneal shot to death inside Heath High School alleged that his friends and family, as well as many school employees and administrators, bore some responsibility for what he did.

The appeals court, upholding a ruling from McCracken County Circuit Court, said the families failed to show evidence of factual disputes that would require a trial.

However, one of the appellate panel's three judges issued a limited dissent that said there was enough evidence for a jury on one point — whether six of Carneal's friends knew of his plan in advance and actually goaded him into it.

Carneal was 14 when he entered the lobby of the school on Dec. 1, 1997, drew a .22-caliber pistol from his backpack and opened fire on students who were standing in a circle, having a pre-class prayer service.

Jessica James, Kayce Steger and Nicole Hadley were killed. Five other students were wounded. Carneal pleaded guilty to murder and was sentenced to life in prison with no possibility of parole for 25 years.

The 106-page appellate ruling covered 10 separate lawsuits filed by the families. Defendants, besides Carneal himself, included his parents, classmates, teachers and school administrators. McCracken County school board members and the owner of the gun that Carneal had stolen. Special Judge William L. Shadoan in McCracken Circuit Court dismissed all defendants except Carneal.

Mike Breen, the attorney for the victims' families, had said the clearest case for negligence was against the gun owner — Carneal's neighbor, Wendell Nace. Carneal supposedly spotted the gun in Nace's shed while visiting Nace's son.

But the appeals court, in a majority opinion by Judge Joseph Huddleston of Bowling Green, noted that the gun was stored, unloaded and encased, in a cabinet behind several other items. "It was only after Carneal had loaded ...

stolen ammunition into the stolen pistol that it became a dangerous weapon," Huddleston wrote.

"Nace was under no duty to anticipate that Michael Carneal would ransack his shed, steal his gun and ammunition and use them in the intentional shootings of other students," Huddleston wrote.

Similarly, the court said it was unclear how Carneal's parents could have foreseen his rampage.

The families contended Carneal used his home computer to visited Web sites on violence and pornography, which John and Ann Carneal should have known about. But the court said there was "no evidence that Michael Carneal ever exhibited violent tendencies toward anyone. ... We, like the circuit court, fail to see the connection."

Court: Hubbard hid house as asset

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Ex-congressman Carroll Hubbard was hiding his house from creditors when he deeded it to his wife for \$1, the Kentucky Court of Appeals said Friday.

As a result, Carol Brown Hubbard cannot claim the house was a gift, exempt from division as marital property in their divorce, a three-judge panel said in upholding a ruling from Hardin Circuit Court.

Carroll Hubbard, defeated for reelection in 1992, began a two-year prison sentence in 1995 for campaign-finance violations. While he was under investigation, he deeded the couple's house in Elizabethtown

to his wife for \$1.

Mrs. Hubbard filed for divorce in 1998 and sought to claim the house as nonmarital property. She contended it was a gift, but her former husband disagreed.

The appeals court, in an opinion by Judge Julia Tackett of Lexington, said evidence "tended to support Carroll's assertion that he deeded the property to his wife to hide it from potential creditors."

The appeals court also ruled against Mrs. Hubbard's claims for an award of attorney's fees and a larger share of Hubbard's congressional pension.

Judges David Barber of

Prestonsburg and Tom Emberton of Edmonton joined in the opinion.

Stung by budget, Tennessee makes university changes

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Stung by a budget shortfall, Tennessee's Higher Education Commission approved a plan to raise admission standards, limit enrollment and cut \$25 million in state funding for athletics.

The commission, which oversees the Tennessee Board of Regents and University of Tennessee systems, approved the plan in principle but will continue discussions on the details. Should it give final approval, either at an annual meeting in July or before, the plan would be implemented immediately.

"This is serious," said commission director Rich Rhoda. "This is all substance. There are absolutely no theatrics here."

University of Tennessee interim president Eli Fly said it would be premature to comment on each of the plan's provisions but added: "It's a sad day when steps like these are necessary."

The state faces a \$350 million shortfall in the current budget year, and needs about \$775 million in new revenue to fund the same budget again next year. Lawmakers have been unable to agree on how to raise

new revenue for three years.

The plan is the culmination of efforts among higher education officials last year to find the best places to cut and reorganize in response to the state's financial situation.

'Promises to Keep' program examines multi-cultural issues

On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday — April 22-25 — the documentary radio series "Promises to Keep" will kick off a new season.

"Promises to Keep" will continue to examine end-of-life issues and, in its second year on WKMS-FM, sharpens the focus on stories about how diverse cultural groups deal with death and dying in their own countries and in western Kentucky. Each segment will air at 7:30 a.m. during "Morning Edition."

Monday's segment of "Promises to Keep" showcases a social worker from Paducah and a woman from Atlanta who forged a friendship when one helped the other's family make life-and-death decisions about kidney dialysis.

On Tuesday, Ron Crouch, director of Kentucky's Data Center at University of Louisville, talks about the 2000 census. Crouch discusses the implications an aging population has on our region, and explains how immigration is keeping the Jackson Purchase from being "older than we want to be."

On Wednesday, "Promises to Keep" stops in at a medical Spanish class at Lourdes Hospital. Instructor Ernie Romero administers a cultural competency test, and talks about the "cultural bumps" people encounter when they come in to a new country or a different environment.

Thursday's installment of "Promises to Keep" features a group in Mayfield that is planning "Celebremos!", a unique multi-cultural celebration and health fair that will be held at the War Memorial Fairgrounds May 11.

WKMS Manager Kate Lochte is pleased that the station is partnering with the Purchase Area Health Education Center and Murray-Calloway County Hospital for this second year of "Promises to Keep."

"We're interested in learning about our neighbors," Lochte said. "The international presence in our region presents fascinating opportunities for us to tell stories about how people of diverse cultures get along and care for each other."

In addition to the radio pieces, the series includes weekly newspaper articles in the Murray Ledger & Times, community outreach activities and arts events with multicultural, end-of-life themes.

A grant from the Kentucky Arts Council supports Murray writer and independent producer Constance Alexander as community artist in residence and project manager of "Promises to Keep."

Matching funds were provided by the Purchase Area Health Education Center and Murray-Calloway County Hospital, with St. John's Episcopal Church, Murray, providing additional support.

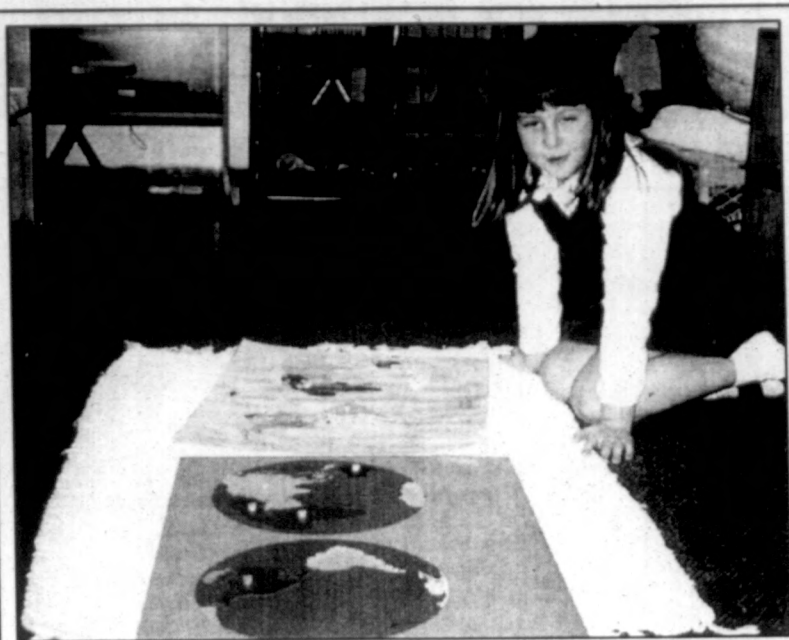

Tripp signs scholarship to play at Rend Lake

After four long, hard years of toiling in the gym and perfecting her craft whenever she could, Ashley Tripp got to do something simple Friday morning: write her name.

Tripp, a Murray High School senior and standout forward for the Lady Tiger basketball team, signed scholarship papers to continue her roundball career at Rend Lake Community College.

"Getting offered a scholarship is the culmination of the four years of hard work she's put in as a Lady Tiger," said MHS head coach Rechelle Cadwell Turner.

"Finishing a high school career with a college scholarship requires a good work ethic, and we're excited that Ashley will get a chance to play at the next level."

Rend Lake, a two-year school located just roughly two hours north of Murray in Ina, Ill., is a member of the Great Rivers Athletic Conference.

"I'm pleased that her hard work paid off. She's earned it," said Tripp's mother, Tina, who noted how Rend Lake's proximity will allow her and husband Rudy to watch their daughter play.

"It's a big plus for us because we liked to watch as many games of hers as we could."

A two-time member of The Paducah Sun All-Purchase Team, Tripp averaged 11.9 points per game to garner all-state honor-

able mention from The (Louisville) Courier-Journal and help MHS finish the 2001-02 season with a 22-8 record.

During Tripp's senior campaign, the Lady Tigers also captured the Fourth District regular-season championship and Murray's fifth All 'A' Classic First Region title — and subsequent state tournament appearance — in the last seven years.

Tripp, who will play for Lady Warrior head coach Ronnie Ressel at Rend Lake, credited Cadwell Turner, among others, for her preparations for an extended future in basketball.

"Playing for her is demanding, and playing for her helped me develop my basketball skills," said Tripp, who was moved from small forward to power forward as a senior to take advantage of her 5-11 frame as well as her 3-point range. She will play small forward at Rend Lake.

"(Cadwell Turner) wanted me to become a multi-dimensional player, and I worked really hard at it."

After averaging 4.6 ppg. as a sophomore reserve, hitting the game-tying 3-pointer that sent the 2000 All 'A' Classic regional final against Fulton County — won by Murray 58-53 — into overtime, Tripp exploded during her first season in the starting lineup.

Tripp poured in 15.4 points a night as a junior to direct Murray to a 19-8 mark, but although

her scoring numbers dipped this past season, her rebounding, defense and passing all improved.

With senior center Paige Adlich averaging a double-double and junior guard Sherrie Sexton and sen-

ior forward Delanda Olive adding a combined 19.5 ppg., Tripp didn't mind sharing the limelight as the Lady Tigers earned a berth in the First Region Tournament.

"You've just got to do what

you can for the team, and we got as far as we did not because of anything anyone did individually," Tripp said. "I owe most of this to my teammates and the coaching staff because without

them, I wouldn't have been able to play at this level."

Ressel, whose seventh Lady Warrior squad went 14-17 last year, learned about Tripp while attending the Honeywell Invitational in Metropolis, Ill., even though Tripp was not in action.

Murray did not participate in the tournament, but made the trip to scout its district rivals.

"I found out about Ashley when coach Turner told me about her when I watched Marshall County play Calloway County at Massac County," Ressel said. "I then came down to see her play five times after that."

"With her size and her ability to shoot the three and run the floor, she fits very nicely into our system."

Tripp, eager to go back to the wing, agrees.

"I think I'll fit in really well because I like the fast-paced game (Ressel) plays," she said. "I got the opportunity to post up and shoot the three this year, but I think I'm better outside than I am inside."

Tripp, who has a 3.0 grade-point average at Murray, plans to study criminal justice at Rend Lake while looking to further her basketball career.

"They have a really good criminal justice program up there," she said. "Hopefully I can improve my game."

Quevedo snaps losing streak as Brewers down Cards

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Ruben Quevedo snapped a career-long four-game losing streak and the Milwaukee Brewers won their second

straight game under interim manager Jerry Royster, 6-1 over the St. Louis Cardinals on Friday night. Quevedo scattered seven hits

Vizcaino finished for his first save, striking out two more in the ninth.

Weather good for local anglers

Can you believe the radical change in our local weather?

All of the anglers for miles around are very happy that we are now getting some crappie weather!

Unfortunately for the tourist anglers who have faithfully filled the cottages and resorts for a couple of weeks, the bite came too late to make their vacation pleasurable.

For those of us who do business with these fine people, we rely on their bulldog tenacity to understand, tough it out and come back for another try.

We will try to talk about the good things that are happening now. I believe all of you local anglers will soon be wearing big smiles and speaking of the numbers of fish you've caught.

The water temperatures over a 40-mile section range from 62-68 degrees, and this is the ideal beginning for the famous Kentucky Lake crappie run.

Most areas didn't receive much silt wash from the last rain, and they are warming quickly. The lake elevation now stands at 358 feet, and it will continue to rise unless the now-predicted flood watch actually strikes here.

Most folks are aware of the water changes that are possible if we are under heavy rainfall in this section of the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers.

The Tennessee Valley Authority may be forced to release our waters if floodwater conditions strike the upper Tennessee and Cumberland lakes to the south of us.

Hopefully, this will not happen because a drop in elevation will stop our crappie from moving into shallow water overnight. At the time of this writing, most anglers are having moderate to very good success at catching crappie on roadrunner jigs or other brand ball-head jigs.

Colors of jig bodies vary from pink, blue, black, chartreuse, white, yellow, green and red, as well as many other combinations.

Casting the flats and shorelines seems to be the most popular right now because one can move slowly and find small concentrations of crappie willing to bite. The wind changes still affect the bite and can shut down the whole area if it switches to a wrong direction.

Our moon phases are in the dark now and are very favorable to catching these pre-spawn crappie.

The few females we have caught are filled with eggs, and the large blood vessels are swollen properly to allow the extra blood supply to reach the waiting eggs. This is essential to the development and maturing of each egg.

When all conditions are good, the eggs begin to absorb the blood, which by now is mixed all through the egg sacs. As they begin to mature, a tiny red dot appears in each egg. Now it is ready to be dropped and covered with male spermatozoon so the species can continue.

There is a lot of luck involved, and the timing of the water temperature, elevation, clarity and movement must coincide to help these eggs and sperm occupy the same space at the same time.

Maybe the good Lord will smile on us and help us have a great spawning season!

Last week, I had the pleasure of fishing with George Huckill and Albert — a couple of good ol' boys from the Frankfort area. We cast roadrunner jigs (chartreuse) along some deep banks and found some super crappie that hadn't moved up yet.

And yes, a few gobblers that I never saw managed to call me up the mountainside yet again. It was a great trip — one of the best ever!

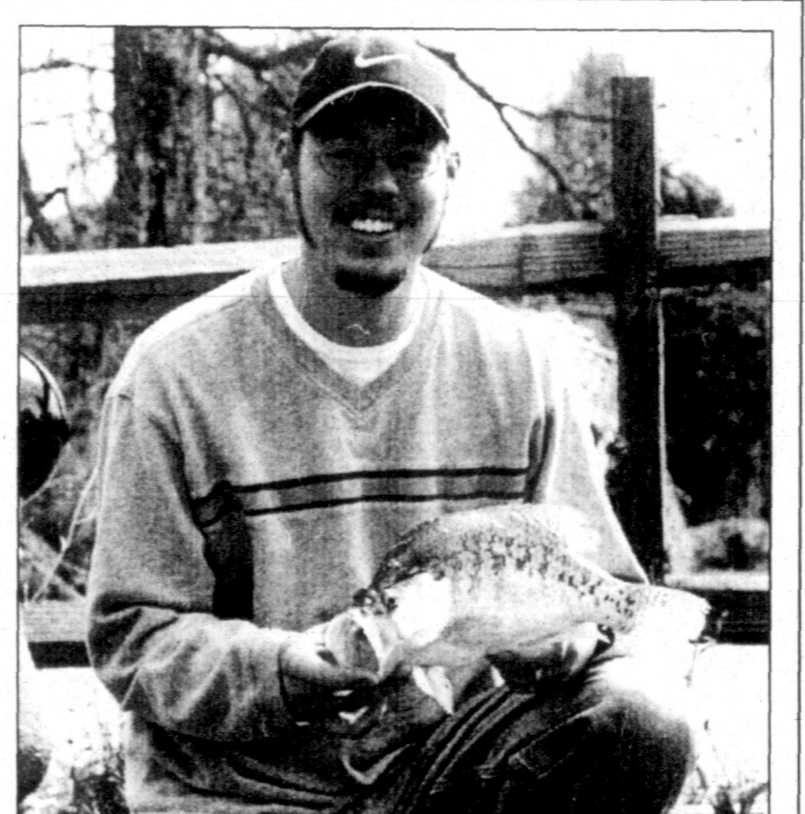

Squirrel season set to open

GOLDEN POND, Ky. — Spring squirrel hunting season will be open at the Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area in Tennessee from May 11 through June 9 and in Kentucky from June 1-14.

Hunters must have state hunting licenses, and hunters age 15 and older must also have an LBL hunter use permit.

LBL permits are available at LBL welcome stations and wherever Kentucky and Tennessee state hunting licenses are sold.

Hunters must abide by all applicable regulations and stay within legal hunting areas.

The Tennessee daily bag limit is 10 with a possession limit of 20. In Kentucky, the limits are six and 12, respectively. Hunters are encouraged to use a tick repellent that contains Permethrin.

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: At 59, I am unlucky to have a variety of medical ailments, including diabetes (controlled with Avandia 4 milligrams a day), high blood pressure (treated with Avalide once a day) and high cholesterol (treated with Zocor 20 mg. a day).

These medicines are so expensive that my life is disrupted. Also, I detest taking pills. What do you think would happen to me if I just up and stopped my medications altogether?

DEAR READER: You could become ill and die an untimely, preventable death.

Untreated diabetes can quickly progress to metabolic acidosis, a dangerous excess of acid in the body that may lead to coma or other serious consequences. Hypertension often causes stroke and severe cardiovascular complications, unless the blood pressure is kept under control. High cholesterol levels are associated with an increased risk of cardiovascular events, but only after a relatively long period.

I believe that you would be better served by working with your doctor to find less expensive, generic remedies. For example, Avandia is a relatively new drug and is, therefore, pricey. Your physician might well be able to prescribe a generic substitute that would save you hundreds of dollars. Likewise, Avalide is also new; there are many appropriate generic substitu-

tutes that would be equally effective. Finally, perhaps you don't need a Zocor every day. I have patients who take cholesterol-lowering drugs every two — or even three — days with excellent results, not to mention the substantial savings of the reduced dosage.

Most patients on prescription drugs are appalled at the expense. Yet pharmaceutical companies have every right to recapture the costs of research and development and to return profits to their shareholders. It is precisely because of this reality that patients, who do not have prescription plans with their health insurance must "shop for bargains" rather than harm themselves by discontinuing medication altogether. This is a situation where honest patient/physician communication is vital. Review your financial distress with your doctor. I am sure that you can work out a compromise using cheaper, equally effective generic equivalents.

As an aside, I am like most practitioners: I really don't factor in the cost of the medications that I prescribe. There are multiple reasons for this seemingly inconsiderate attitude and, when my patients express concerns

about the high cost of pharmaceuticals, I apologize and bend over backward to help them find generic substitutes that they can afford, even if this practice goes against the hallowed medical principle of "Prescribe the Newest Drug." Talk to your physician to resolve this issue, after first reviewing the situation with your pharmacist, who is the professional most versed in the effects, advantages, drawbacks and costs of medications.

DEAR ABBY

DEAR ABBY: I am a woman who has known my entire life that I was adopted. It made no difference to me.

Mom always answered any questions I had when I was curious about my birth parents. After my first child was born, I became curious and decided to see if I could find them. I talked it over with my mom. She encouraged me and even suggested ways I could try to find them. I had little money to spend on registries and investigators, nor did I want to be intrusive in case they had families who had not been told about me. I started registering with various adoption Web sites. After almost 10 years, I found my birth parents. They are wonderful people, and I'm happy to know them and for them to know me.

Now for the problem: When I told my mom I had found my birth parents, she was initially happy for me. Then, the very next day, she informed me that I was "messing with the foundation of the family" by doing this. I was devastated. I had never hidden the fact that I was searching. I love my parents dearly, but they have now put up a wall I can't breach, and they refuse to discuss it. They have started shutting me out of their family, to the point of failing to tell me my grandmother was dying until after she was gone.

I don't want my children to lose the only grandparents they have known their entire lives, but seeing me miserable every time we get together can't be good for them. How do I handle this?

HURTING IN OHIO

DEAR HURTING: Although your mother initially helped you with your adoption search, on some level she never really thought you would find your birth parents. When you announced that you had, she felt threatened and betrayed, and (putting it mildly) overreacted and became punitive. Not telling you that your grandmother was dying was inexcusable.

Since she and your father won't discuss it, write them a letter. Tell them how much you love them and remind them that they are the only family you have ever known. Explain that you have no intention of hurting anyone. If that doesn't work, ask their clergyperson to intercede.

If they don't have one, perhaps another trusted relative would do it for you.

If that doesn't work, then I agree that exposing your children to an atmosphere with an undercurrent of hostility is not healthy. Continue to cultivate a relationship with your birth parents and other relatives — and know that you did what you could to heal the breach and go on with your life with a clear conscience.

DEAR ABBY: Please settle an argument: How long should one wait for somebody?

I recently had a date with a friend. We agreed to meet at a specific time and place. After my friend failed to arrive 15 minutes past the appointed time, I left. Evidently he showed up five minutes later.

Now he is annoyed with me. He says good manners require that one wait 30 minutes for friends or family and 15 minutes for business associates or new acquaintances.

What do you make of this, Abby? Some people are perpetually late, so I need some reasonable guidelines.

DEAR CLOCK-WATCHER: Nowhere is it written that one "must" wait a certain amount of time for someone who is perpetually late. Common sense dictates that if someone knows he or she is running late, the person should call and inform whomever is waiting. (Almost everyone has a cellular phone or pager these days.)

P.S. I'll bet your friend is on time next time!

The Sure Way Is the Best Way

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

The bidding:

Here is a hand on which it would be very easy to go wrong. West led the queen of clubs against five diamonds and continued with a club, ruffed by declarer. South drew two rounds of trump, both defenders following suit, led a heart to dummy's king and the heart ten back to the ace.

When West showed out,

South realized he was in serious trouble, but there was nothing he could do about it. He could not ruff all three of his heart losers, since only two trumps were left in dummy, and he also had to lose a spade trick, so he finessed down one.

Actually, declarer had a sure way to make the contract. After cashing dummy's king of hearts at trick five and leading the ten, he should have played a low heart from his hand instead of the ace.

Even if the ten lost to the queen, the contract would be 100 percent certain. After West took the trick with the queen, South would still have the A-J-7 of hearts on which to discard three spades from dummy and thus assure 11 tricks.

The outcome would be the same if the ten of hearts held the trick, as it would have in the actual deal. There would be no heart losers at all in that case, as South would need to ruff only the J-7 in dummy.

Finessing the ten of hearts could not possibly cost South the contract. In fact, by finessing, he has a slight chance to gain an overtrick (if East has the Q-x-x of hearts). More importantly, though, the finesse guarantees the contract beyond the shadow of a doubt.

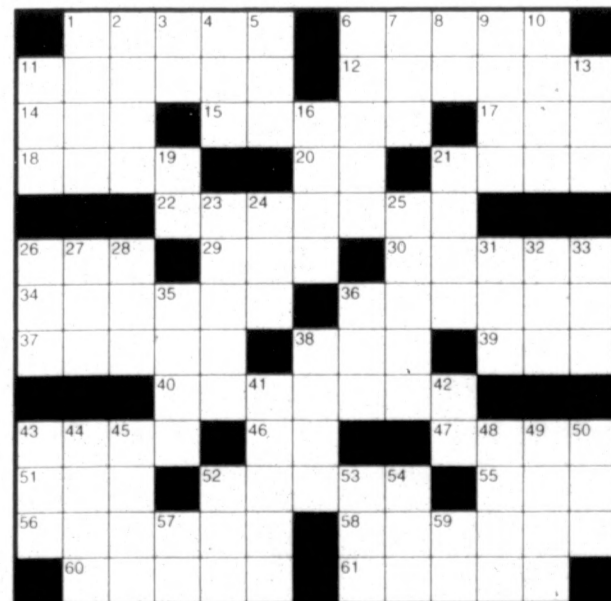

Five planets line up in array

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The five brightest planets visible from Earth have lined up in plain sight to form a spectacular celestial array that won't be seen again until 2040.

Through the next four weeks, Jupiter, Mars, Mercury, Saturn and Venus will appear tightly clustered in the Western sky. They will be visible in the evening with the naked eye.

"The five naked-eye planets are converging in one part of the sky and from now until mid-May you can see all five at one glance, which is pretty unusual," said John Mosley, an astronomer at the Griffith Observatory in Los Angeles.

Each evening, the alignment will assume different shapes, as the five planets take their orbital paths around the sun. The planets orbit in the same plane, like grooves in a phonograph record, only at different distances from the sun.

Similar bunchings occur every 20 years or so, though they are not always visible. The last they were this visible was in 1940.

In May 2000, the five planets formed a tighter bunch but were so close to the sun that they were washed out by its glare.

In 2004, they will appear together again in the night sky, but will be spread over a much wider area, said J. Kelly Beatty, executive editor of Sky & Telescope magazine. They will be as easy to spy at a single glance again until 2040.

"This is the nature of the clockwork of the solar system," Beatty said. "We like to think of it as a way to remind people there is a simple beauty in the heavens that doesn't require any special training to appreciate."

Astronomers stress there is no astronomical significance to the pileup.

Quinstate discusses issues

Since 1983, the Quinstate forum has traveled among Kentucky, Illinois, Arkansas, Tennessee and Missouri looking at varying community development issues. Kentucky will host the 2003 event.

Event chairman Jim Becker, with the University of Illinois Extension Service, said this year's topic was the brainchild of Doug Wilson, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service agriculture and natural resources agent.

Wilson said the idea came to him because of what he saw happening in his own community with the increased diversity as people have moved in to work on farms, in restaurant and even in factories.

In recent years, he's become more and more aware of the problems these new community members face from language barriers to the unscrupulous actions of others.

Much of his knowledge has come through his meeting and working with Tomi Warren, direc-

tor of the Migrant Education Program in McCracken County, and Pilar Fondaw, a native of Peru who is the recruiter for Migrant education in the county.

The three participated in a panel discussion on educational issues at last week's forum.

"The growth in the Hispanic community is advancing at a phenomenal pace because of tobacco, poultry and vegetable production," Wilson said. "They want the same things in life we do — a better life for their wives and their children."

Warren noted that Kentucky's Latino population is the eighth fastest growing in the country. In just the rural areas of the quinstate area, the Hispanic population has increased from 35,000 in 1990 to an estimated 152,000 in 2000, while overall population in those same areas has increased by less than five percent, according to Roger Beck, an agricultural economist at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale.

Beck said the key to survival and economic revival of rural communities is going to depend on this group.

"The growth of the Latino population has breathed new life into rural communities," he said. "Increasingly they are going from agricultural jobs to many occupations."

Quinstate includes the five northern most states that bordered on the

Mississippi Delta — Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, Illinois and Missouri. Cooperative Extension Service members from these states thought it was important to get together and share.

"Hopefully something that was working in Kentucky could be adapted to Missouri or vice versa and a lot of that has happened," Wilson said. "If someone else has a success story, then hey, let's take it back to Kentucky and use it, and we heard one today."

Wilson was referring to Steve Scates, a grain and vegetable producer near Shawneetown, Ill., who has integrated education, health, recreation and housing into his workers' day-to-day lives. Scates converted an old high school into housing for his 30-80 workers while maintaining the gym and outdoor ballfield. Mostly single, young men live there, but there are a few families with apartments in the building, he said.

Access to health care and education were two issues discussed at the conference and two areas Scates has addressed by having classes for his workers and health clinics. Housing issues and simple day-to-day living were also a part of the day-long meeting.

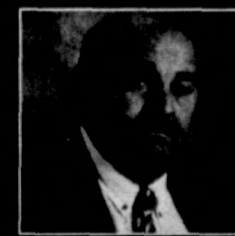
