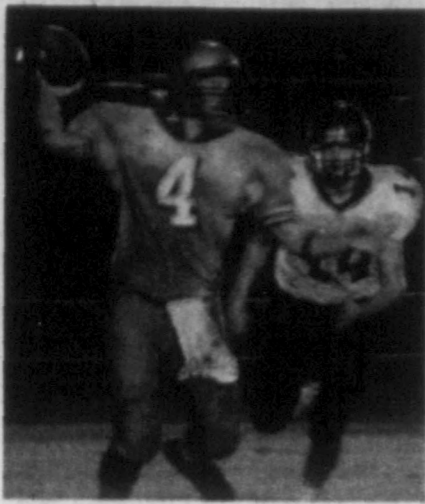

KenLake Foods celebrates 20 years in Murray

It is celebration time for KenLake Foods. The Kroger manufacturing plant located on North L.P. Miller Street turns another page as it celebrates its 20th birthday.

To commemorate this event, the company pulled out all the stops and hosted a celebration for current and former employees at Murray State University's Curris Center Ballroom Friday that welcomed previous general managers of the plant.

"They had a part in the success of KenLake and we want them to come back," said Human Resources Manager Tom Colson.

KenLake Foods, a Kroger Foods manufacturing plant, opened its doors in 1982. It specializes in the manufacturing of more than 800 items, mostly dry mixes and salted nuts, but also processes puddings, gelatins, drink mixes, instant oatmeal, and oats. The factory also roasts and cans or bags nuts of all types.

The local plant was the first of 41 Kroger manufacturing plants located across the United States.

When it began, there were only 38 employees. Thirteen of those are still employed there, and was only open four days a week with two 10 hour shifts. Now there are 329 people employed by the factory, runs 24 hours a day, seven days a week with three shifts during the week and two 12 hour shifts on the weekends.

Bill Germann, the first general manager at KenLake Foods, said they never dreamed that many employees would work there.

employing over 180 people," Germann said.

He stayed as general manager of the plant for eight years and is now the General Manager of Operation for the Kroger Grocery Products Group. "There is a tremendous amount of pride when you start up a facility and see it grow," he said.

He said when the plant opened it specialized only in sugar-based products. In an average day, the company went through two rail cars of sugar.

"People today consume a lot less sugar," Germann said. "The big growth has been in the instant variety oat products, which has replaced the sugar items. That has only been accomplished with the versatility of the employees here."

The employees and the "family feel" within the plant is another factor attributed to the company's success.

"Of all the plants I have been in, they are the most giving," said current General Manager Guy Folkman on the attitude of the employees.

Suspected snipers face first murder charges

ROCKVILLE, Md. (AP) — Maryland prosecutors filed the first murder charges against two suspected snipers — another signal a three-week terror spree has ended and that residents can safely venture outside without fear.

"I don't have to worry about walking outside and getting shot," said Ryan Burditt, an eighth-grader at Benjamin Tasker Middle School in Bowie, Md., where a student was critically injured Oct. 7.

In filing six first-degree murder counts against John Allen Muhammad, 41, and John Lee Malvo, 17, Maryland authorities said Friday they would seek the death penalty against the older suspect.

Malvo will be tried as an adult, but the death penalty cannot be applied if his reported age of 17 is verified. Maryland law does not allow for the death penalty against people under age 18.

As the first charges in the case were announced, federal and state officials began wrangling over whose case would take precedence — and new details emerged about the investigation of the shooting spree.

Justice Department officials are still deciding whether to bring their own charges. One official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said federal prosecutors could use the Hobbs Act, which allows the government to seek the death penalty in murders where killers try to extort money.

District Judge candidates have eyes on future

Calloway County District Court Judge Leslie Furches has several years of experience on her side. Her challenger this November, Murray attorney Jeanné Carroll, hopes voters will keep their eyes focused on the future.

Furches, a Murray High School and Murray State University graduate who obtained her law degree at the University of Louisville, has served as Calloway County's district judge since 1987 following a four-year law practice.

Carroll, meanwhile, has been practicing law in Murray for the past eight years, serving part of that time as assistant county attorney and assistant commonwealth attorney. After graduating from Calloway County High School and obtaining a political science degree from MSU

in just three years, she got her law degree from Southern Illinois University in Carbondale.

Carroll currently operates a general practice, and that was also the focus of Furches' law practice before she became a judge. Furches also worked as a public defender before becoming a judge.

Although Carroll may not have Furches' years of experience holding an elected position, she is not a stranger to the campaign trail, as she mounted a failed bid for the commonwealth attorney's office two years ago.

"I think it's the natural progression of my career," she said of her desire to serve as a district judge. "Primarily, I've practiced in district court here. I see it as a great opportunity to serve the public."

Furches, meanwhile, said she has enjoyed



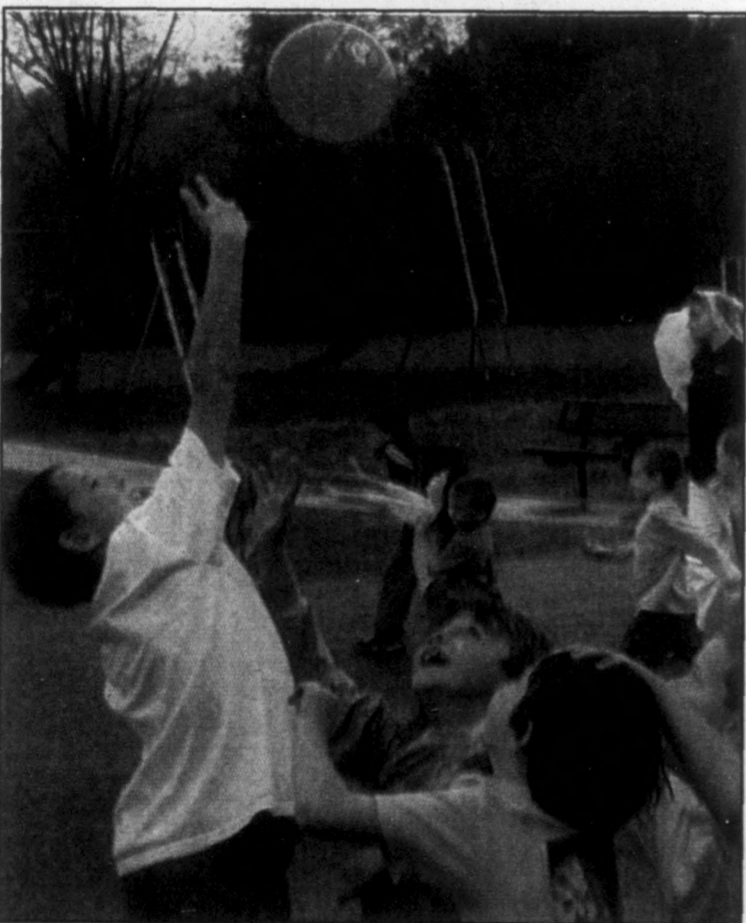

her work at the district court level so much that she has turned down opportunities to move to the circuit level. That dedication, she said, is what she will bring to the office of district judge if she is elected again.

"District court has a lot of different areas of the law," Furches said. "It's challenging work, (but) it's interesting. On a number of occasions, you feel like you've made a difference in people's lives. It's different every day."

Ethics commission briefed on Tina Conner interview

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A state ethics board was briefed Friday about its investigators' meeting this week with Tina Conner, who is suing Gov. Paul Patton for sexual harassment.

The Executive Branch Ethics Commission is investigating Conner's allegations that Patton pulled strings for her while they were having an affair, then used his power to damage her business after she ended the relationship.

Conner, owner of a nursing home in Clinton, met in private with commission staff members on Wednesday. The commission's members, all of whom were appointed by Patton, were briefed on the Conner meeting.

Chairwoman Cindy Stone of Louisville said the group was "caught off guard at how in-depth the briefing would be."

She declined to divulge details. Stone said it was not known whether Conner would be interviewed a second time.

The ethics commission has no criminal jurisdiction, but Patton is under criminal investigation by the FBI, U.S. attorneys and Kentucky Attorney General Ben Chandler.

Time to set clocks back to standard reckoning

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the backyard barbecue season winding to a close, it's time to say goodbye to daylight-saving time.

Clocks shift back to standard time at 2 a.m. Sunday, local time, giving an extra hour of sleep to most people tonight — an extra hour of work to those who work the

overnight.

And the change means it will be dark an hour earlier next week when Halloween arrives, calling for extra caution on the part of drivers and those watching the children on their rounds.

Most people set their clocks back before retiring this evening. Those who don't, need to remember to set them back Sunday — or they'll be an hour out of sync with the rest of the community. If they still haven't remembered to do it by Monday morning, they could be an hour early for work.

The time change affects most of the nation, but not Arizona, Hawaii, the part of Indiana in the Eastern time zone, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and American Samoa. Those regions do not observe daylight-saving time, so they don't have to switch back.

Daylight-saving time returns for the rest of the country on April 6.

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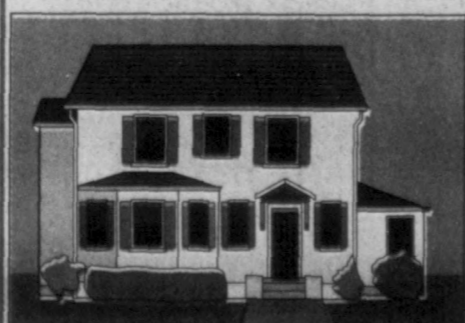

President announces plans to sign health care bills

CRAWFORD, Texas (AP) — President Bush is signing a pair of bills to keep hundreds of community health centers operating and to speed development of high-tech medical devices.

Bush, looking to take action on hot-button campaign issues such as health care, announced in his weekly radio address Saturday that he was approving the measures.

The first bill reauthorizes federal programs for the 1,000 community health centers that provide care each year for about 12 million people, half of whom have no medical insurance.

The bill allows health centers to form networks for purchasing and technical services to save money. It also lets the centers participate in the National Health Service Corps, which

pays off doctors' medical school loans in return for service in needed areas.

It establishes several new rural health programs to bolster emergency medical services and place more dental health providers in underserved communities.

Lawmakers must still approve money to finance the measure.

The White House has said the president wants to add or expand centers at 1,200 sites over five years, doubling the number of people served.

"The quality of American medicine is excellent, yet too many Americans live in communities lacking good clinics and basic health care," Bush said in his radio remarks. "Community health centers are America's health care safety net, providing prenatal care,

checkups and preventative treatments to anyone who walks in the door."

Also getting the president's signature was a bill that requires medical device manufacturers to pay tens of thousands of dollars in new user fees in return for speedier government review of their products.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., has said that because the Food and Drug Administration lacks adequate resources, too many critical devices are unnecessarily slowed.

The proposal mirrors an existing user fee system financed by drug companies for speedier review of medications by the FDA.

Under the bill, manufacturers of medical devices such as catheters, pacemakers and MRI machines will pay just over \$25 million

in fees over the next year. In exchange, the government would hire more staff and improve systems to allow for speedier reviews of products.

The compromise also gives small device manufacturers a break in the amount of fees they would have to pay.

"Medical devices are often very complex and require careful testing before they're approved by the Food and Drug Administration, but the FDA is overwhelmed by the volume of new technologies, making delays more frequent, and undermining the quality of device reviews," Bush said.

"Under the new law, we're going to speed up and improve the approval process," he said. "The entire nation will benefit from a faster approval of lifesaving innovations."

Carroll said that she has found in her discussions with local voters that what they want most is a judge that will exhibit fairness in dealing with the public.

"By and large, I think the voters are ready for a change," she said. "I think it's important to people that they are treated fairly and with respect. I think it's important to them that if they come before the court in district court that they have a fair shot."

Furches said those concerns are exactly what she has tried to abide by during her time in office. "I believe that I'm a fair and impartial judge and that I provide experienced judicial leadership," she said. "It's a pretty demanding job. You're on call 24 hours a day."

Furches said she has heard somewhere in the neighborhood of 50,000 cases while sitting on the district court bench. That total alone, she said, shows the level of experience she would bring to the office if re-elected.

While Furches describes the job of a district judge as never-ending, Carroll said she has picked up on concerns of availability from local law enforcement agencies.

"I work with all the different branches of law enforcement," Carroll said. "I think it's extremely important that the district judge be available to them to do things like signing warrants and to talk about cases."

Both candidates mention the words "fair" and "impartial" when describing their campaign, and both also refer to the work ethic and dedication they would bring to the judge's seat.

"It's my life," Furches said. "If I didn't like it, I wouldn't be running again."

Professor quits after probe into possible academic fraud

ATLANTA (AP) — An Emory University professor resigned after an academic panel skewered his research for a controversial book about the history of guns in America.

Michael Bellesiles, a history professor, said in a statement he "cannot continue to teach in what I feel is a hostile environment."

He said the controversy surrounding his book, "Arming America: The Origins of a National Gun Culture," had made it impossible for him to continue his research and teaching.

Emory officials said Bellesiles' resignation takes effect Dec. 31. He was on paid administrative leave throughout the fall semester.

The 40-page report, released Friday, concluded that Bellesiles was "guilty of unprofessional and misleading work" in his research.

The report, written by scholars from Harvard, Princeton and the University of Chicago, said Bellesiles' failure to cite sources for

crucial data "does move into the realm of 'falsification.'" It also suggested he omitted other researchers' data that contradicted his arguments.

Bellesiles denied the charges. "I have never fabricated evidence of any kind nor knowingly evaded my responsibilities as a scholar," he said.

Bellesiles' book received national attention for its contention that early Americans did not own or use firearms in great numbers.

Gun-rights and advocates had criticized the book, and scholars had suggested the author made serious errors, prompting Emory to form in February an investigative panel.

Bellesiles is one of several historians and professors to be accused recently of academic fraud.

In June, former Harvard professor Doris Kearns Goodwin resigned from the Pulitzer Prize board, four months after she acknowledged parts of a book she wrote were taken from another author without attribution.

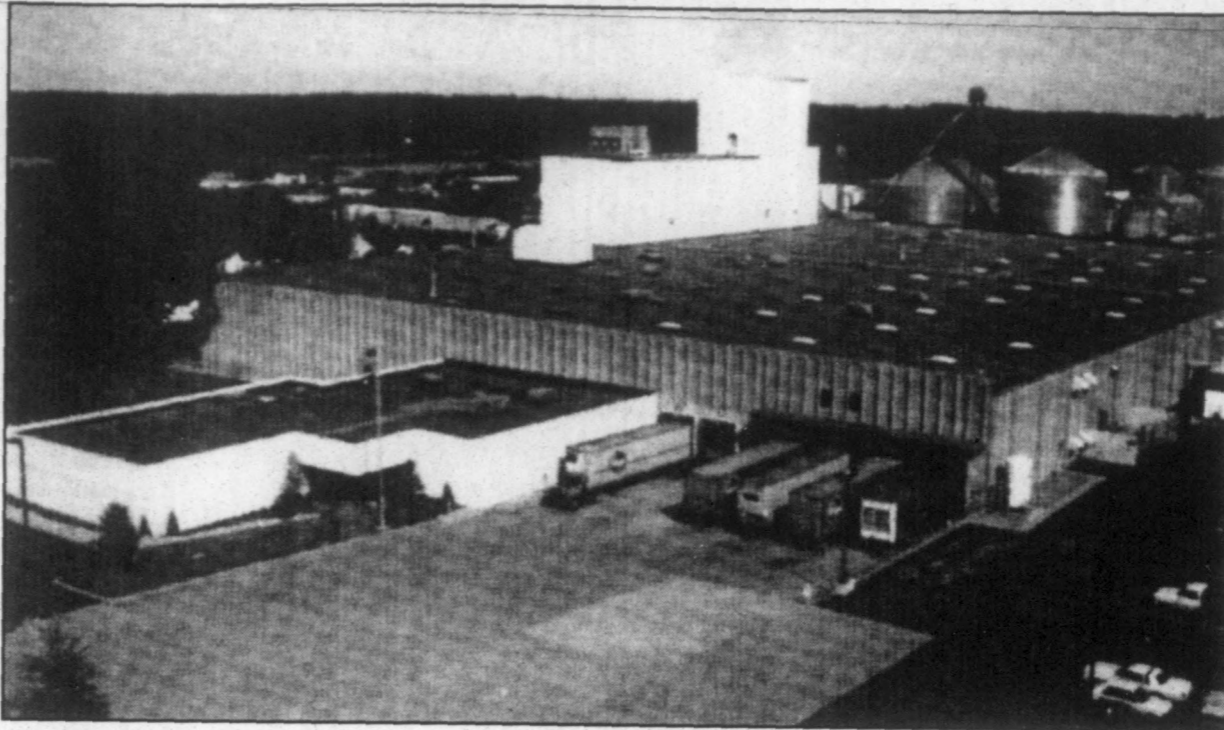

Although he has only been with KenLake foods for the past four years, he has worked for Kroger for the past 40. He said the employees at KenLake never back down when it comes to helping their fellow man, whether it is donating to the United Way or donating money to other employees in need.

"It is really marvelous what they do," Folkman said. Colson said keeping morale up at the plants is something they like to focus on.

"Everyone works hard and we try to enjoy our work as much as possible," Colson said.

He said in the past 20 years of the plant, there has never been one employee laid off. Colson said its not a promise but definitely a goal to not ever have to lay anyone off.

"Kroger Manufacturing is very positive in how they

handle their labor management," Folkman said. "When we eliminate a position, we are able to use that person some where else."

But regardless of how much of a focus they place on employee morale, KenLake Foods puts most of its focus on safety.

Colson said whenever there is a setting where numerous machines are running for an amount of time, people are at a risk of injury.


"We're probably more conscientious about safety than we have ever been," Folkman said.

The plant has seen changes in the past 20 years, but is still looking for ways to grow, expand and keep the reputation it has developed for itself.

"This plant has an extremely high reputation among the Kroger manufacturing plants," Germann said. "It is just an on-going success story with in Kroger."

Yeager to break sound barrier for last time

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — More than a half century after Chuck Yeager became the first pilot to break the sound barrier, the veteran flier wants to do it one last time.

Yeager, 79, was scheduled to pilot an F-15 Eagle to supersonic speeds Saturday, kicking off the annual open house and air show at this desert air base. The retired Air Force brigadier general's aircraft was to be joined by a second F-15 piloted by friend and colleague Joe Engle, a 70-year-old former NASA astronaut and retired major general.

Nursing home at center of Patton case flunks inspection

CLINTON, Ky. (AP) — A nursing home that figures prominently in multiple investigations of Gov. Paul Patton failed an inspection it needed to get back into the Medicare and Medicaid programs, officials said Friday.

The manager of the nursing home, Birchtree Healthcare at Clinton, said the inspection report was heavy on "paperwork deficiencies." He said a request for reinspection would be personally delivered to federal health officials in Atlanta on Tuesday.

Birchtree was dropped by Medicare and Medicaid after a devastating inspection report last summer. It now has 13 residents and 103 empty beds, manager Dan Dabney said.

Patton carried on a two-year affair with Birchtree's owner, Tina Conner. State and federal authorities now are investigating her claim that Birchtree got help from Patton's administration during the affair, then was hounded nearly out of business by regulators after she ended the affair.

Conner also is suing Patton for sexual harassment. Patton has acknowledged the affair but denied abusing his power to help or hurt Birchtree.

Dabney said a week ago that the inspection team from the Cabinet for Health Services and the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services wrote up eight deficiencies. He contended Friday that the deficiencies were comparatively minor and easily explained — a claim disputed by Health Services spokesman Gil Lawson.

The report describes "serious violations concerning the care of residents," Lawson said in a telephone interview. "I would also note the federal government agreed with the findings."

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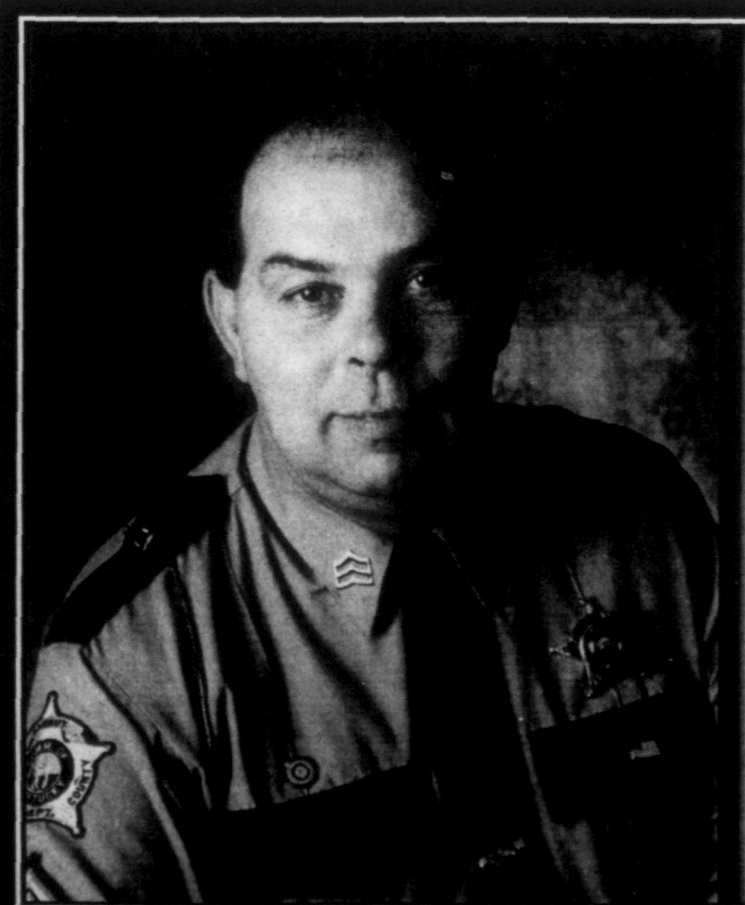

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Natural Resources Sec. James Bickford dies

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — James Bickford, a retired Army general respected by friend and foe alike in the contentious job of secretary of the Natural Resources Cabinet, died Friday after a battle with cancer. He was 65.

Born in West Virginia, Bickford was raised in Harlan County, Ky., and graduated from the Tennessee Military Institute. He obtained his bachelor's degree and a commission in the U.S. Army from Eastern Kentucky University. Bickford also received a master's degree from the Florida Institute of Technology.

His 32-year Army career took Bickford to posts in England, Germany, France, Korea and Vietnam and earned him numerous decorations. He rose to the rank of brigadier general. During the Persian Gulf War he commanded the Defense Fuel Supply Center

which bought, distributed and stored all the fuel for the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines around the world.

Bickford was one of Gov. Paul Patton's first cabinet selections in December 1995. After his appointment, Bickford set his primary focus on solid waste issues in the state.

"For seven years, he maintained the respect of the business community and the environmentalists and kept the interest of the commonwealth foremost with his honesty straightforwardness and sense of fairness," Patton said.

Among his accomplishments were the campaigns against straight sewer pipes and illegal dumps, the collection and disposal of millions of waste tires, the regulation of large confined animal operations and passage of legislation to improve logging operations in the state.

Democrats don't see return to pre-eminence this year

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky Democrats sometimes pine for the days when there were five of their own in the state's seven congressional districts.

These days, there are six congressional seats and only one Democrat. And there is little likelihood of turning that around this year.

Sixth District Rep. Ernie Fletcher has no Democratic opponent. Two other GOP incumbents, Ron Lewis in the 2nd District and Hal Rogers in the 5th, have Democratic opponents who have not had active campaigns.

Democrat Clint Alexander faces an uphill battle in his challenge to four-term U.S. Rep. Ed Whitfield, R-1st District.

The two most competitive races involve two of the newest members of Kentucky's congressional delegation — Republican Anne Northup in the 3rd District and Democrat Ken Lucas in the 4th District.

"Experience counts for a lot in this election cycle," said Kentucky Republican Chairwoman Ellen Williams.

Williams spins it so that Northup's six years in Congress mean much more against Democrat Jack Conway than Lucas' four years of service mean against Republican Geoff Davis.

The campaigns have taken unusual twists.

During a campaign appearance with Davis, a Hebron businessman making his first political race, U.S. Sen. Jim Bunning

noted that Lucas is a close friend of Gov. Paul Patton. Left unstated was the clear implication that Lucas should somehow be tainted with the sex scandal that has sidelined Patton, who is being sued for sexual harassment, from campaigning.

And Davis has tried to make issues out of seemingly minor matters. Davis accused the Lucas camp of sending a "spy" to a campaign event.

A Davis campaign statement last week made much of a note from a Lucas campaign worker asking friends to come out to appear in a campaign commercial that was supposed to show "blue collar workers" supporting Lucas. Davis said the Lucas camp was "begging people," though the note from the Lucas campaign worker is clearly to friends and asks if they "are interested in helping."

Lucas, a former judge-executive of

Boone County who has taken his own road as a Democrat, often joining with GOP supporters of various initiatives, touts his experience and bipartisanship. A Lucas commercial even shows him with President Bush, but he is otherwise pretty much ignoring his Republican opponent.

Golf courses, meanwhile, have become an issue in the 3rd District race.

Northup has accused Conway, a former deputy cabinet secretary in the Patton administration, of funding golf courses instead of prescription drug benefits for seniors. Conway countered that Northup voted for budgets that included golf courses when she was in the General Assembly.

Voters in the 3rd District have not been told what golf courses in the state budget, or a prescription drug program that has never been considered as the state level, have to do with a congressional race.

Democratic Chairman Jerry Johnson hopes his candidates can grab voters' attention by emphasizing their wallets.

"The vast majority of people in this country today believe this country is headed in the wrong direction," Johnson said. "Democrats win when voters concentrate on the economy."

Johnson says Alexander could be a "sleeper." Williams calls Whitfield a "compassionate conservative," a phrase made popular then discarded by Bush. Mostly what he has been is a solid Republican in a district that had never before elected one.

While Fletcher is unopposed by a Republican, independent candidate Gatewood Galbraith is challenging and has tried to make an issue of Fletcher's gubernatorial aspirations.

But incumbents usually win in Kentucky unless something unusual happens.

The man was an erudite Methodist minister who had seen combat at Normandy in World War II, and I have pondered several times over the years since that board retreat whether he was aware that his request was almost identical to that of General Zachary Taylor in the battle of Buena Vista during the Mexican War.

When Captain O'Brien's cannon had been disabled and the Mexicans were about to break the American line, the cannon of Captain Braxton Bragg (later a major Confederate general) came to the rescue, and General Taylor allegedly quietly ordered, "A little more grape, please, Captain Bragg."

As it turned out, that particular board retreat in 1986 turned into a landmark meeting for our organization. Pages and pages of observations and ideas were sifted down to other pages of consolidated plans, timetables, objectives, and rationales that became a master-plan that guided that organization for the next 16 years. It created momentum that escalated annually and completely transformed the direction and energy of the organization, making it a major player in national circles of similar organizations.

At that board retreat every person spoke and was heard, every aspect of the organization's operations was scrutinized, every dream and adventuresome idea in anyone's heart or mind got attention. Consolidated goals, priorities of importance, cost approximations for changes and progress, timetables for achievements, and ownership of projects, were made.

What 27 board members and an organization of 200 staff members could not do individually, they discovered they could do together. They compiled a hymnbook and they sang together from the same pages; they compiled a gameplan and proceeded to run the plays together; they

identified an enemy (apathy and lack of coordination) and planned a battle strategy and went to war.

Junctures in human decision-making come frequently — in our world, in our nation, in our local community, in our organizations, and in our families. Calls for "a little more grape, please" come often in human affairs.

America is at a major juncture in its history right now, in its national debate over Iraq. Our commander-in-chief and his closest advisors, scenting danger, are calling for more grape from our cannon, while a less organized but sizable segment of the American public and their congressional representatives is calling for more grape from the colored markers. The nation is dividing into its old hawk and dove camps.

It may well be that more cannon grape needs to be fired, but some folks argue passionately that a little more marker grape should be well-expended before the nation moves into battle. Offensive-defense through the military might be better aimed if there were more deliberative master-planning and more voices at the table could be heard before we fire a first shot. We might be better off rallying around the tables of debate at home before we march off divided toward the mysterious Middle East.

A vote for the Family Courts amendment

On Nov. 5, Kentucky voters can choose to formally adopt the state's Family Courts system as a permanent part of the Kentucky Constitution.

Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert of the Kentucky Supreme Court has called Family Courts the greatest innovation in Kentucky law in a quarter century. For the first time ever, courts are giving children and families their undivided attention.

Before Family Courts started in

1991 as a pilot project in Jefferson County, families and children dealing with the distress of divorce, child custody, adoption, termination of parental rights and domestic violence competed for court time with felony offenses, medical malpractice and other criminal and civil law cases.

Family Courts changed all of that by focusing on better outcomes for families and children. To provide continuity, one judge hears all of a family's issues and problems. The program also improves access to social service resources to help families recover from difficult situations.

Today, Family Courts serve more than a million Kentuckians in 26 counties and the program is considered a national model. But that means that 3 million Kentuckians

still don't have access to the continuity provided by Family Court.

On Nov. 5, Kentuckians will have the opportunity to vote on an amendment that is necessary to make Family Courts a permanent part of the Kentucky Constitution.

Lambert has been a guiding force behind the process to adopt Family Courts as a formal amendment. As a result, 132 members of the Kentucky General Assembly voted earlier this year to pass Senate Bill 58, which placed this as the first of two amendments on the Nov. 5 election ballot.

Many prominent and concerned organizations, including the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, the Kentucky Education Association, the Kentucky Farm Bureau, the Kentucky Burley Tobacco Growers

Association, the Kentucky Association of Retired Teachers and the Kentucky Circuit and District Judges associations, have endorsed the Family Courts amendment.

If approved, Family Courts will continue to use the state's existing court system in a more efficient way. And as additional funds become available through the state budget, the program will expand to all of Kentucky's counties. If the amendment doesn't pass, this invaluable program will be disbanded throughout the state.

Please take time to vote on the important Family Courts amendment on Nov. 5.

An educational battle for the next governor

FRANKFORT — As a rule, after too many years of wading through thick studies of ways to deal with government problems and challenges — not to mention the language used to impress those paying the bill — I have a cynical disregard for most of them. The studies generally find and propose pretty much what the financing agency wants to be found and proposed.

But occasionally a study comes along that, despite the avalanche of multi-syllable words, appears to be on the mark as far as its subject is concerned.

The Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence just released a study it commissioned of the results of five years of higher education reform in Kentucky. The study was made by the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems, which performed a 1996 study of Kentucky's system of higher education that spelled out most of the most glaring failures of the system and helped spark much of what happened the following year to correct that system.

That first study spelled out in telling detail how Kentucky had one of the highest adult illiteracy rates in

the nation. Its system of higher education had low rates of student retention, serious barriers to students seeking to transfer from community colleges or technical school to two- or four-year universities, low numbers of students completing degrees and equally low numbers of students specializing in the areas of the new economy like computer science, engineering and the sciences themselves.

The system of technical schools, community colleges, four-year institutions and research universities was fragmented, under-funded and uncoordinated. The community colleges, in particular, were subordinated to the interest of the University of Kentucky that controlled them. The technical schools were operated in a bureaucratic manner more appropriate to the state Transportation Cabinet than an education system.

And everywhere there was duplication of academic and technical programs, as well as facilities and off-campus sites.

No one familiar with that pre-1997 reform system can argue that the earlier study was anything but on the mark.

So at the initiation of Gov. Paul Patton, the General Assembly passed the 1997 overhaul of the

entire system. The old and generally powerless governing board, the Council on Higher Education, was replaced with the Council on Postsecondary Education with real powers and headed by a president with real authority.

The community colleges were wrestled away from UK in a bitter legislative battle and joined with the technical schools under a separate board. By any measure, they all are thriving as a result.

And Patton challenged the state's two research institutions, UK and the University of Louisville, to reach national stature by 2020, and he gave them hundreds of millions of dollars to be matched with private funds to accomplish that task. The four-year regional universities likewise were challenged with tens of millions of matching state dollars to go toward developing programs of national ranking.

The latest study by the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems found that progress since the 1997 reforms "has been nothing short of remarkable."

"To a striking degree the reforms have addressed most of the issues identified just five years earlier and established the foundation for step-by-step progress over the next decade and beyond," the study says.

Maintaining that progress will be

the next major challenge for Kentucky's system of higher education.

Already, the old rivalry among regional universities over everything from increased funding to new programs and satellite campuses is threatening to slow if not undermine reform.

The Council on Postsecondary Education's first and only president got the ax early this summer because he fought against regionalism and ran smack into the influence the regional universities have with powerful legislators.

And there is no guarantee that the governor who succeeds Patton next December will have as strong a commitment to future progress as Patton and the current administration.

So a key issue in next year's governor's race will be to secure strong commitments by the candidates of both parties to continue higher education reform. Otherwise, the next study in five years is likely to find a return to waste, fragmentation, regional rivalry, insufficient funds and mediocrity on Kentucky's campuses.

Bielish's husband, pianist Garnet Ungar, has appeared extensively as a soloist and chamber musician in the United States and Canada. His solo performances have been broadcast on public radio in Texas and Indiana, and by CBC in Canada.

Ungar has been a soloist with the Clear Lake Symphony, the University of Calgary Orchestra, the Oakville Chamber Ensemble, the Brampton

Symphony, the University of Evansville Orchestra and the Evansville Philharmonic.

During the past five years he has given master classes at major universities throughout the U.S. and has performed in Illinois and Oklahoma in this country, and in Canada, Switzerland and England.

Ungar recently released a CD on the Americus label of the Brahms Second Piano Concerto, recorded in Bulgaria with the Varna Philharmonic.

Changes in weather plague anglers

Constant changes in our weather are making it difficult for anglers and fish alike to get a steady feeding pattern and fall movement established.

The anglers are faced with a new game each day and are forced to start all over again with their search for a pattern.

There have been bass anglers galore from many different states who are looking for that magic formula that will allow them to key in on areas where they can

catch some big fish and win some money.

Our local talent would enjoy the same patterns, simply for the self-satisfaction of being able to catch and release some big bass. It is always a great subject to talk and brag about over the cold winter months!

I come in contact with dozens of bass anglers who know me, and they are all asking, "Where are the large bass?" Everyone has been catching dozens of small bass on several different types of lures and with different techniques.

But the absence of the big bass are still a mystery to them. There could be several solutions to the problem — weather, rapid fluctuation of the elevation, current to feed into and high winds.

I personally think the key to finding the big bass is simply time. We must wait until the weather has settled and the waters have cooled a few more degrees.

I am seeing temperatures that are ranging from 62 to 64 degrees. I believe that it is still warm enough for the big bass to come up and spend the next month feeding all day.

Past experiences have indicated that we must be patient and look for our brood stock to come out to feed and play later on this month.

They are already fat and healthy, and will only need a couple of weeks of constant feeding to get

their bodies in condition enough to survive the winter cold.

We may not have a severe winter again this year. God's creatures already know this. They will eat if the winter is going to be bad!

Slight winds will allow the shad baitfish to resume their gathering on the surface in gigantic schools. These big bass will feed several times each day, or as soon as they can digest the last shad!

Our crappie have been elusive for a short time, but they are now back to feeding and schooling in growing numbers. They love this season because the bait is so plentiful and easy to catch.

Much like the bass, the crappie eat the shad as they congregate in giant schools. If this should happen near a brushpile, stake bed or any time of artificial lure, the crappie will come after them.

Many times during the fall, we will see huge schools of crappie attacking the shad on the surface — much the same as the stripers do! They can be spooked more easily than other species. So be careful not to get too close when casting into them.

We have a full moon now, but it will change by the weekend. Conditions should be much better.

I tried to fish before and during the last winter front that came through. It was a tough system to deal with. I fished out of the Kentucky Beach Resort with Terry Chumbler and his dad. I had intentions of catching some crappie in Blood River.

We went out early. No sooner had we located a good school when we heard a loud roar. Looking at the mouth of the river, we could see a solid wall of white water coming from the north. We tried to stay on the fish, but the boat was like a chip of wood in the severe winds.

Forced to retreat back into the bays, we tried casting the ledges without a single crappie. However, we did catch a few small bass each place we tried. The Chumbler were after meat to eat, so I tied on some small, black flies for them to throw. This worked out really well on the big bluegill.

I was reminded of similar days earlier in the spring, and we made the most of it. We caught enough

large bluegill to make a meal. The guys were going to rent a boat from Joe and Susan at the resort, so I traveled a bit further in order to show them the good areas.

Don, Mary Lou and John Kohne came down on Sunday, hoping to find some big crappie. The win was still with us, so we did the next best thing and fished for bass in the shallow areas.

There were dozens of other bass anglers out on the lakes. Our choices were limited, unless we traveled some miles. It was no problem for us, so we moved from place to place and found the bass to be more aggressive as the morning progressed.

Don usually leads the way with the first three bass. Mother Mary

Lou is a tough competitor every day of the year. We soon found a lure that would prove to be the best for her to throw. She made me proud!

Mary Lou began casting better and better. With good lure placement, one will usually catch more fish. She is a kind and gentle soul, and didn't rub it in that she was now catching more and large bass than Don or John. She only reminded the guys once each cast. That was all!

She caught one that possessed some unusually sharp teeth on its lower jaw. It was tough to hold for a photograph. John took the bass to release from the back deck. As he neared the edge, the bass clamped down on his thumb real hard.

Out came the thumb, down went the bass and it began flopping to get back in the water. We were all yelling at John to get the fish in the water, but the memory of those sharp teeth was still on his mind.

He instantly started a new dance that we later called the "Bass Scoot Boogie". He used his feet to dance the bass back into the lake safely. It was a hilarious sight that just made our day!

After that, all the fish we caught was just for the pure fun of it. We tried to put some words to the song to compliment that dance!

These folks are great, and they're dear friends forever — I hope? We had so much fun together. Happy Fishing!

What Kentucky hunters need to know about CWD

It was nearly noon on a warm Sunday, the second day of the 2001 Wisconsin deer season.

Eighteen-year-old deer hunter Todd Schulerberg had hunted all morning before joining his father and others on a deer drive. As he walked out of the woods for lunch, Todd saw the deer of his life — in more ways than he imagined.

Todd could see the antlers of a wide, symmetrical 12-pointer through the grass about 100 yards away.

He quietly stalked to within 30 yards when he noticed the deer was unusually thin with ribs clearly visible. Thinking the deer had been wounded in an automobile collision or by another hunter, Todd shot — and missed.

The deer did not run. Three shots later, Todd stood over what should have been a nearly 200-pound 2.5 year old buck. Instead, the deer was no bigger than a large dog.

Three months later, Todd found out that his deer and two others shot nearby were the first confirmed cases of Chronic Wasting Disease east of the Mississippi River.

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD)

is a contagious neurological disease affecting deer and elk. It causes a characteristic spongy degeneration of the brains of infected animals, resulting in emaciation, abnormal behavior, loss of bodily functions and death, according to the Chronic Wasting Disease Alliance.

CWD is in the family of Transmissible Spongiform Encephalopathies (TSEs), which include Scrapie — a condition identified in sheep and goats for the past 200 years — Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) — or Mad Cow Disease — and Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (CJD) in humans.

It is suspected that CWD is caused by a prion (PREE-on), an abnormal protein that attacks brain tissue and causes the brain to develop a sponge-like appearance.

The most famous outbreak of a TSE was Mad Cow Disease in Great Britain, caused by feeding scrapie infected feed (made from sheep by-products) to cattle.

In this case, the disease made a species jump from sheep to cat-

tle and ultimately to humans, who ingested the infected beef. But out of the millions who were exposed, less than 150 cases of CJD were confirmed. CJD occurs naturally in human populations at the rate of 1 per 1 million.

CDW has been known to exist in some deer herds in Colorado for more than 30 years. Deer are more susceptible than elk. So far, CDW has only been confirmed in whitetail, mule deer and Rocky Mountain Elk populations.

Infection rates for states that have had CWD for a long period are less than 6 percent for deer and less than 1 percent for elk. There are several theories regarding the spread of CWD. Some think that the disease is spontaneous or naturally occurring — the "if you look for it you will find it" group.

Others believe that CWD appeared spontaneously in an isolated herd, but was then spread about by natural migration and by transportation of wild deer and elk by game ranchers.

The disease is quite prevalent in captive herds. Connections have

been made to outbreaks in wild herds, caused by escaped animals or through-the-fence contact. Concentrating deer or elk in captive herds or by artificial feeding increases the likelihood of direct or indirect infection.

Mortality rates have been as high as 90 percent in some research herds. Most researchers agree that the best action is to attack infected areas aggressively. Wisconsin is trying to eliminate all deer within the area of infection. Of the deer killed in that area, only 2.6 percent were infected with CWD.

Kentucky plans to test at least 1,000 deer from this year's harvest. Many states are banning the importation of deer and elk, as well as artificial feeding.

The most troublesome aspect of the CWD debate is whether CWD can jump the species barrier to humans as a variant of Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (v-CJD). So far, there have been no reported cases of CJD that can be attributed to contact with CWD.

Reports of people who have eaten deer and elk for several

years dying of CJD are unfounded. Even in the areas of the west where the disease has existed for years, the incidence rate of CJD is no higher than that found in the rest of the population.

According to the Center for Disease Control, "the risk of infection with the CWD agent among hunters is extremely small, if it exists at all . . . it is extremely unlikely that CWD would be a food borne hazard."

Their simple precaution is to not shoot an animal that is acting abnormal or appears to be sick.

Dr. Elizabeth Williams of the Wyoming Veterinary Laboratory in Laramie, Wyo., a recognized authority who has studied chronic wasting disease in deer and elk since 1977, was quoted in the Minneapolis Star Tribune, saying: "If you see a skinny animal, contact authorities. Otherwise, enjoy your hunt and enjoy your venison. I say that as a hunter myself. . . . I'm not about to stop hunting deer or eating venison."

The best tool in the fight against CWD is hunters keeping deer pop-

ulations in check. If we allow unfounded fears to prevent us from harvesting deer, the likelihood of disease outbreaks will be infinitely greater in severely overpopulated herds.

Just use common sense and enjoy the upcoming deer season. If you are concerned, wear rubber gloves while dressing deer, don't eat eyes, spleens, brains, or lymph nodes and avoid cutting into the spinal column.

Tools may be disinfected with strong chlorine bleach.

At present, there is no immediate reason for concern in Kentucky — other than preventing the spread of CWD to our state. There have been no instances of CWD in the state, and wildlife managers do not expect to find any evidence this year.

So hit the woods and do your part by taking a few does along with your buck. Fill your freezer and your neighbor's freezer with healthy venison and enjoy your time in the great outdoors.

Remember: These ARE the good ol' days!

Tornado sweeps through Lakers 32-8

When Paducah Tilghman approached the threshold of the end zone Friday at Jack D. Rose Stadium, it turned to the fastest battering ram in the West, Joe Casey. When Calloway County's offense was ready to kick down the door to the scoreboard, the Blue Tornado installed deadbolts that kept the host Lakers locked out of the house at a most inopportune time.

Trailing sixth-ranked Tilghman 13-0 with just over two minutes left in the second quarter, Calloway's short passing attack manufactured a 10-play, 59-yard push to the Tornado 4-yard line.

But Brandon Steele's third-and-2 pass was batted away at the line of scrimmage, and the Laker quarterback's bootleg around left end following a fake handoff came up a yard short on fourth down.

Meanwhile, Casey — Tilghman's 6-1, 205-pound running back — scored three touchdowns from 1 yard out while amassing 135 yards on 31 carries as the guests claimed a 32-8 victory on Calloway's Senior Night.

"I don't know how many shots we had at the end zone from inside the 15, but we've just got to score right there," said Laker head coach Joe Stonecipher regarding his team's final drive of the first half. "If we score right there and kick the extra point, it's 13-7 going into halftime. It was a big series for us; we came right back out and scored and we played our hearts out, but (Tilghman) has a good ballclub. It's going to be a great matchup with them and Hopkinsville."

The win and No. 7 Hopkinsville's 19-7 victory over Hopkins County Central Friday assured that next week's game between the two Class 3A First District behemoths — both squads are 7-2 overall and 4-0 in league play — will determine the district champion.

Calloway, meanwhile, finished with a 2-3 district mark and will take a 5-4 record into Madisonville-North Hopkins Friday before heading to No. 3 Warren Central for the first round of the state playoffs.

The 8-1 Dragons will host the Lakers, the First District's fourth seed, Nov. 8 in Bowling Green after winning the Second District

title over No. 14 Allen County-Scottsville 29-19 Friday.

Against Tilghman, CCHS was only able to produce a 2-yard touchdown run by senior tailback Jimmy Bynum that, followed by Bynum's two-point conversion run, closed the deficit to 19-8 midway through the third period.

Bynum, the state's fifth-best rusher with 170.6 yards per game heading into the contest, touched the ball only nine times for 15 yards on the ground and minus-6 as a wide receiver.

With Bynum lining up mostly in the slot as Calloway tried to catch the Tornado defense off-guard and create opportunities for its other offensive weapons, the Lakers registered 13 first downs.

Steele completed 20-of-35 passes for 131 yards, Mark Farmer ran for 42 yards on four carries and Seth Barrow picked up 59 yards on nine receptions for CCHS.

"The bad rap on us the last couple of games is that with Bynum, we're one-dimensional running the football," Stonecipher said. "We feel like Brandon has a good-enough arm and sees the field well enough that we could split Jimmy out there and create some matchups

that they haven't seen with our short passing game.

"We know Seth Barrow is a great receiver, we know Josh Young does a good job and (receiver) is actually (Bynum's) natural position, and Logan Collins and Mark Farmer made some good plays for us. We caused them some problems, and now we've shown that we can (run and pass)."

That was never a problem for Tilghman, which complemented Casey's running with Hunter

Cantwell's 12-of-18, 178-yard effort through the skies.

Cantwell's strikes to Anthony Barton for 25 and 11 yards on the Tornado's first series set up Casey's first TD run with 6:18 left in the opening frame.

Calloway started to pick up steam on its next possession, but Steele's seam pass to Farmer slipped in and out of his hands in the end zone on second-and-8 from the 28 and the Lakers turned the ball over on downs.

In the second quarter, Jonathan Craft turned a hitch route from Cantwell into a 26-yard gain on third-and-3 from the CCHS 39, and five straight Casey runs yielded a 13-0 Tilghman lead.

Cantwell started the second half with a 38-yard spiral to Barton, keying a seven-play drive that ended with Casey notching the hat trick.

A pass interference penalty, a 15-yard draw by Farmer, Steele's 12-yard scramble and a roughing the passer penalty on fourth-and-

8 from the 21 helped set up Bynum's TD.

But Cantwell put the game on ice, connecting with Curtis Hamilton for a pair of 24-yard throws before handing the Tornado a 25-8 cushion on a 9-yard TD pass to Barton late in the third.

Cantwell then capped a 12-play, 56-yard scoring march that chewed up 4:57 before Cantwell scooted 2 yards on a bootleg to the left and across the goal line with 7:48 to play.

Tigers KO Fulton Co. with early offense

HICKMAN, Ky. — It's no secret that the Fulton County Pilots are a mere shell of their former selves.

Nearly five years to the date of hosting First District rival Murray High in the Class A First Region championship game, the Pilots welcomed the Tigers back to Sanger Field on Friday night.

This time, the two programs met under much different circumstances.

The struggling Pilots, who list just 22 players on their 2002 roster, were easily outmanned and overmatched by a Murray squad that dominated early and often in a 35-8 triumph during what basically amounted to a glorified scrimmage.

With the victory, the Tigers (6-3, 3-1) officially locked up the No. 2 spot in the final Class A First District standings and can now look ahead to the upcoming state playoffs.

"We really feel sorry for David (Gallagher)," said MHS head coach Rick Fisher, who is a good friend of the Fulton County head coach. "His program is just way down right now. He had a top program a few years ago, but he just ran out of athletes."

"What we tried to do (Friday) was come out and take care of

business. We've worked hard to get that No. 2 seed, and we wanted to make sure we secured that (Friday)."

Murray wasted little time in doing so, scoring 35 unanswered points in the first half while racking up 242 yards of total offense — 151 yards on the ground and 91 more through the air — and limiting the Pilots to just 124 yards for the contest.

Senior fullback Lorne Stanfa paced the Tigers' high-powered offensive attack with 64 yards on only six carries while scoring a pair of touchdowns.

Fellow backfield mate Nathan Williams also had an outstanding evening, tallying 42 yards on four rushing attempts while catching a 26-yard touchdown toss from sophomore quarterback Alex Boles. The 6-3, 198-pound senior shined defensively as well, returning a second-quarter interception 60 yards for a touchdown to cap Murray's first-half onslaught.

The MHS starters gave way to the Tigers' second- and third-string units midway through the second period. The Murray backups finished out the game, which included a second half that was reduced to two 10-minute quarters with a running clock. The two coaches agreed to the unusual conclusion during the halftime break.

Fulton County's only score of the contest came with 5:56 remaining in the fourth quarter when freshman tailback Zach Curlin

scored from 1 yard out. The Pilots completed a two-point conversion attempt to produce the final score.

Williams put Murray on the board with 6:30 left in the opening stanza on a 7-yard sweep around right end. Seconds later, the Tigers took advantage of a Pilot fumble as Stanfa took the first play from scrimmage 21 yards for the score at the 6:07 mark.

On the next Murray possession, Boles' 42-yard strike to Williams set MHS up with a first-and-goal at the 5-yard line, where Stanfa rumbled in for a 21-0 lead.

Boles returned to the air late in the second quarter, hooking up with Williams on a 26-yard pass-and-catch for the Tigers' fifth and final touchdown.

Murray will step out of district play next Friday for the season finale against a much improved Lone Oak squad, which is under the direction of former Paducah Tilghman coach Allan Cox. The Tigers will then begin playoff action at home against the third seed from the Class A Second District.

"We need to continue to work hard and improve," Fisher explained, "because we're going to continue to see better competition down the road."

The Giants will bring their own good-luck charm — 3 1/2-year-old bat boy Darren Baker, son of the manager.

They're 8-0 when he's in the

dugout. But when he runs off the bench, the adventure really begins.

Darren broke loose Thursday night in a 16-4 romp over the Angels at Pacific Bell Park, heading out to retrieve Kenny Lofton's bat. Trouble was, three Giants were running the bases at the time.

Quick thinking by J.T. Snow, who scooped up Darren by the collar of his black jacket, prevented the wobbly boy from being run over at the plate.

"My wife was a little upset last night, not terribly upset," Baker said. "It was a strange situation. It's not going to happen again."

"I'm hoping they don't come

"We don't intend to prohibit it. But, on the other hand, I'm sure even Dusty would agree great care is appropriate for someone of his age under those circumstances."

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Secretary Paige urges nations schools to set standards high

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary Rod Paige this week used a sternly worded letter to warn school districts nationwide not to lower their academic standards, saying those who do are "the enemies of equal justice and equal opportunity."

While praising states that are working to implement the "No Child Left Behind" reforms sought by President Bush and passed by Congress, Paige called those resisting the reforms "apologists for failure" and predicted, "they will not succeed."

Wednesday's letter, one of several Paige has dispatched over the past few months, was the most strongly worded yet, suggesting that federal officials will keep tabs on states that lower standards so more students can be labeled "proficient."

The law singles out schools with high numbers of students whose basic math and reading skills are substandard, but lets states decide

what those standards will be. Paige has said that giving a national skills test, the annual National Assessment of Educational Progress, or NAEP, will show which states' standards are low, but the law attaches no penalties to low NAEP scores.

Education Department officials have said the public embarrassment of low NAEP scores could urge states to raise their standards.

But several state education officials say the new law already punishes states with high standards, forcing them to offer school transfers and expensive tutoring using federal funds that would otherwise go to classrooms.

For instance, in Texas, which has 4.1 million students, state officials there have identified only 46 underperforming schools. But Michigan, with only 1.7 million students and higher standards, has 1,513 underperforming schools.

"There are states, like Michigan, that don't see that they can comply with it," said Brenda Welburn, executive director of the National

Association of State Boards of Education.

"It was something that we almost anticipated, because there are such differences in state standards," she said. "We've got one federal law, but we've got 50 state standards."

Welburn said she knows of no state officials who are consciously lowering standards, but added, "They certainly are terrified that they're going to lose federal dollars if they can't fully comply with the law."

Ross Wiener, director of policy for The Education Trust, a Washington organization that advocates for urban and minority students, said Paige's letter is a clear signal that the federal government will monitor state standards.

"States set their standards, and this law says we've got to try ways we haven't before to help kids meet those standards," Wiener said. "The secretary is right in acknowledging it's hard work, it's not going to be easy, but it's important work."

The release stated that Butler was charged with possession of meth; possession of drug paraphernalia; manufacture of meth; possession of anhydrous ammonia with intent to manufacture meth; trafficking in meth; possession of anhydrous ammonia in other than an approved container; and first-degree criminal abuse.

Another resident at the Cherry Corner Road residence, 30-year-old Deanna D. Butler, was also arrested and was charged with manufacture

of meth and first-degree criminal abuse.

Both James and Deanna Butler are both currently lodged in the Calloway County Jail on \$15,000 cash bond each.

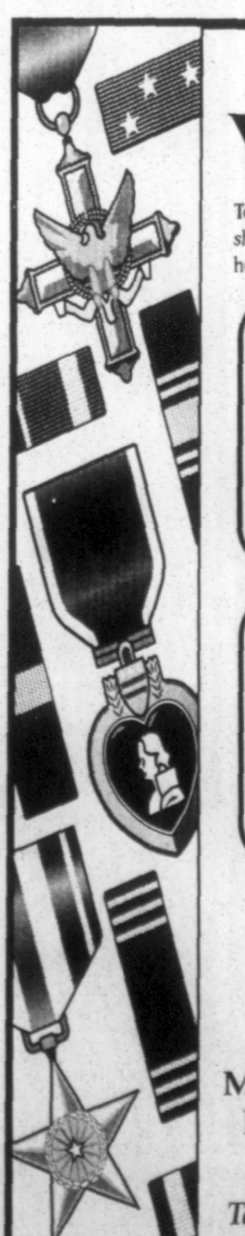

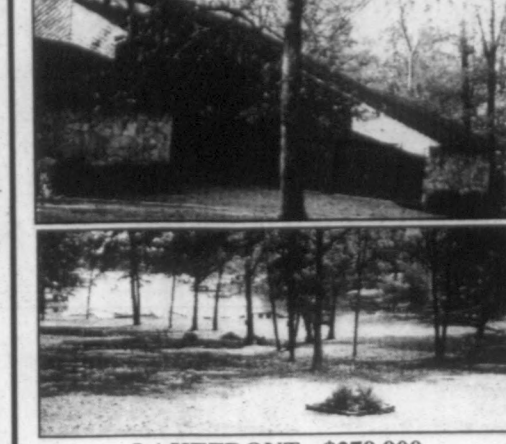

Second lawsuit filed in dispute between 'South' universities

SEWANEE, Tenn. (AP) — A second federal lawsuit has been filed in a name dispute between University of the South in Sewanee and South University in Savannah, Ga.

The Tennessee university filed a lawsuit this month in U.S. District Court in Winchester, Tenn., claiming the Georgia university is infringing on its trademark.


The Georgia university filed a separate federal lawsuit related to the name dispute in September.

South University officials said they wanted the venue to be Savannah, but University of the South spokesman Joe Romano said Winchester is the proper venue because the school is trademarked there.

The University of the South, a liberal arts school, has educated students since 1857 and the name is registered with the U.S. patent office, Romano said.

South University is a private, for-profit institution with small campuses in Savannah, Montgomery, Ala., West Palm Beach, Fla., and Columbia, S.C. Its primary focus is on degrees in business and health professions. Founder John T. South said his institution's name is not a description of its location but his last name.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I found your perspective about the advantages of constant exposure to micro-organisms that stimulate the immune system to be provocative at best, sheer nonsense at worst.

DEAR READER: As a practicing physician, I am exposed daily to infections of one kind or another: colds, respiratory ailments, pneumonia — you name it.

I do not believe that my position is either incorrect or medically irresponsible.

Since I published that column, an intriguing study was reported in the New England Journal of Medicine (September 19, 2002). The scientists investigated the backgrounds of 812 children to discover if environmental factors played a role in preventing (or causing) infections.

Perhaps we adults should alter our perception that dirt and bacteria are, by definition, harmful.

The precise, long-term consequences of chronic exposure to environmental endotoxins remain to be defined.

Anyone, regardless of age, who experiences any five of the following symptoms for two weeks or more should consult a mental health professional:

- (1) Feeling of sadness and/or irritability. (2) Loss of interest or pleasure in activities once enjoyed. (3) Changes in weight and appetite. (4) Changes in sleep patterns. (5) Feeling guilty, hopeless or worthless. (6) Inability to concentrate, remember things or make decisions. (7) Fatigue or loss of energy. (8) Restlessness or decreased activity noticed by others.

(9) Thoughts of death or suicide.

Rescuing a Lost Cause

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Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH

- ♠ Q 5 ♥ K 6 5 3 ♦ 9 8 4 2 ♣ A K Q

WEST

- ♠ J 10 9 4 ♥ 9 8 7 4 2 ♦ Q J ♣ 9 3

SOUTH

- ♠ A K 7 ♥ A Q J 10 ♦ 7 6 3 ♣ 10 7 4

The bidding:

- West North East South Pass 1♣ Pass 1♥ Pass 2♥ Pass 4♥

Opening lead — jack of spades.

Assume you're declarer at four hearts and West leads the jack of spades. There seems to be nothing to the play, but when you win the spade with dummy's queen and lead a trump to your queen, East shows out, and you discover that the 10 "sure" tricks you started with are not nearly as certain as you thought they were.

Let's say you next cash the A-K of spades, discarding a diamond

from dummy, and then, with fingers crossed, play the A-K-Q of clubs, hoping West will follow suit.

You might lament that you were very unlucky to run into such a terrible trump split as well as a 5-2 club division, but when you think about it some more, you realize that you could — and should — have made the contract.

Instead of discarding a diamond from dummy when you cashed the A-K of spades, you should have discarded the queen of clubs! You could then cash dummy's A-K of clubs, getting by this hurdle safely, lead a low trump to your ten and then play the ten of clubs, ruffing with dummy's king, if necessary.

Actually, there's nothing fancy about this play — it just looks fancy. It cannot cost you a trick to discard the queen of clubs, and at the same time it significantly increases your chances of making the contract. Indeed, had the queen of clubs been the deuce of clubs, you would surely have adopted this approach and easily made the contract.

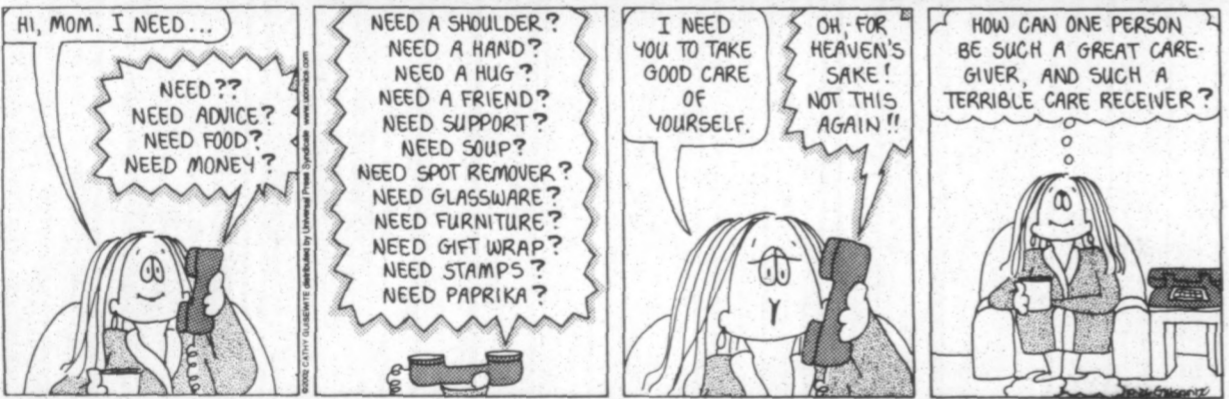

and his medical colleagues in the season two opener called "My Overkill." Hay's song "Overkill" is among the musical numbers featured on the recently released "Scrubs" soundtrack album songs that have been inventively used on the NBC comedy hit.

Q: Why did the character of Matt Callan get killed off on "The Agency"? — Dean C., Amherst, Ohio.

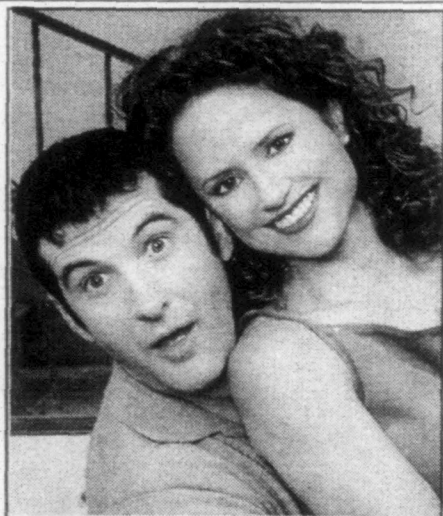

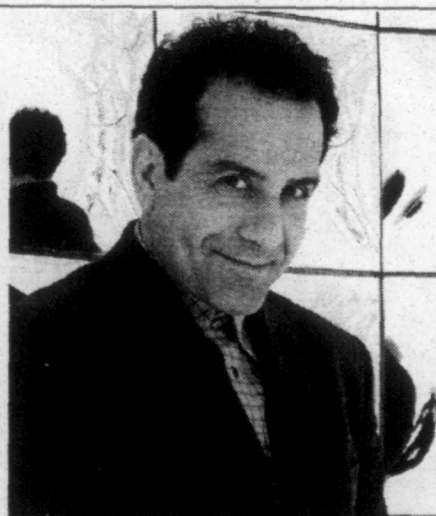
