Local firm buys South Eastern Book Co.

South Eastern Book Company of Murray has been purchased by Black Rock Investments, according to Chuck Jones, CEO of the investment firm.

"Around 18 to 24 months ago I invested in an online bookstore. That's when my interest peaked. We approached Jim Sims, longtime CEO at Southeastern, about selling and from there we worked out a deal," he said late Friday afternoon.

Jones, who owns several businesses in Murray, said his company would officially take over on July 1.

"We are naturally going to

evaluate what is going on and see what kind of things we can streamline. But we don't expect any major changes," he added. "We are happy with a lot of the management that is out there."

South Eastern Book Company deals in wholesale college textbooks and employs approximately 65 employees.

"South Eastern is a nationwide company that sells to bookstores and online. It has its main facility in Murray and a warehouse in Hickory," Jones noted. "We also deal in book buy-backs from college students."

Murray State University is also a client of South Eastern Book Company.

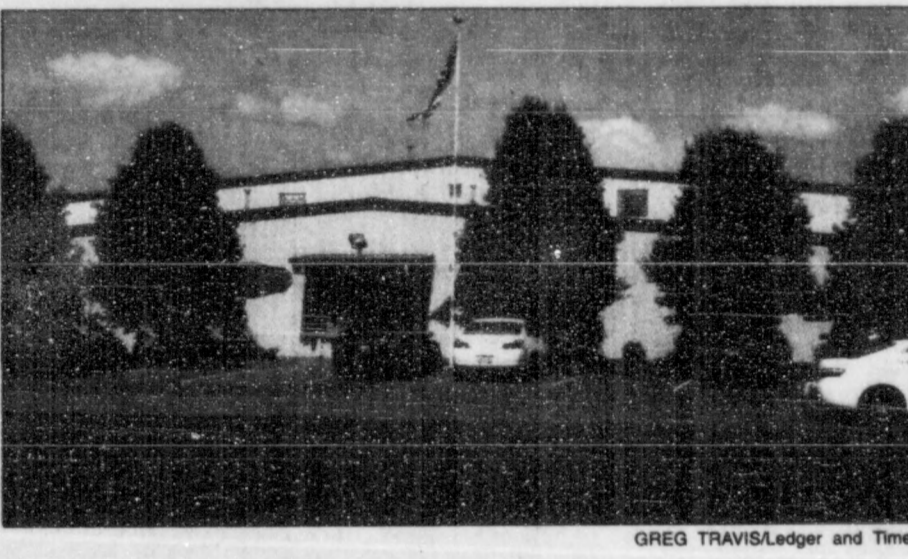
Jones said he will serve as CEO and be on the board.

"I will also have a lot of input into the direction of the company. We are going to try to grow South Eastern more on the Internet than it has in the past."

He said South Eastern was the fifth largest company of its kind in the country.

"The bigger companies are buying stores and then supplying their own textbooks to their stores. I think that we would also like to be involved in that aspect."

He said some campuses were even leasing out their bookstores, "but that probably isn't on MSU's radar at this time."

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Election board proposing 2 new precincts

The Calloway County Board of Elections is proposing the creation of two new voting precincts and a shuffling of a few others before the November General Election hoping to provide easier access to voting booths while avoiding electoral confusion.

But the job of compliance with state Board of Elections regulations and incorporating a hodge-podge of recent amendments is going to be challenging in the least.

Calloway County Clerk Ray Coursey, Jr. said during an special-called meeting of the elections board Friday morning that

a plan has been drafted that is workable and will be presented to state officials before a June 20 deadline.

While the ideal situation would be city voters voting in city races in city-only precincts and county voters voting in county elections in county-only precincts, the reality is that, no matter how the precinct cards are shuffled, there are going to be a few that will include a mix of voters.

"What will keep you awake at night when you're trying to sleep is thinking about having a precinct with 400 city voters and 200 county voters and wading up with 600 votes for mayor," Coursey told the board.

Of course that's a worst-case scenario, but mixing city and county voters will be a reality that likely can't be avoided and extra care will have to be taken to avoid potential problems come November.

"People who live in a particular jurisdiction, whether it's the city or a school board or whatever and whether they own property or not, those living in that area are supposed to vote on the issues that affect that jurisdiction," Coursey said. "Our objective is to get those voters voting in one precinct and not have too many people voting from outside that jurisdiction any more than you have to."

"The situation is, with the city annexing 200 or 300 voters that are actually county voters, you have to move those people into the city so they can vote in city races," he added. "You want to save as much disruption as possible ... We want to make it simple for everybody."

Following approval of the plan by board members Dave Foley, Zee Enix and Chief Deputy Clayton Hendricks who represented the Calloway County Sheriff's Office, the proposal will be considered by state election officials and either approved or not by June 20.

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Enix steps down after serving county's voters

When Zee Enix looks over the work of the Calloway County Board of Elections the past 20 years, he sees a lot of good people doing a lot of hard work to ensure an efficient and accurate election for the people of Murray and Calloway County.

Enix, who has been involved in local politics since 1968 but has represented Democrats on the board since 1988, officially retired from his position Friday. But he said he'd rather talk more about the hard work and long hours put in by Calloway County Clerk Ray Coursey, Jr. and the office's deputy clerks than his own efforts during a period of three decades.

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Lake bridges public meeting postponed

PADUCAH, Ky. — A public meeting on the U.S. 68/Ky. 80 lake bridges project, originally scheduled for June 12 at Lake Barkley State Park, has been postponed.

Cabinet officials say the meeting is being delayed to allow cost adjustments to be made to the final four proposed designs before they are presented for public comment.

"In recent weeks our consultant came forward with more realistic cost estimates that put the total cost of the two bridges at up to \$540 million," said Bill Gulick, executive advisor in the Transportation Cabinet. "That cost estimate would have likely pushed construction of the bridges back 10 to 20 years, or more."

Officials will reexamine possible designs to see if project costs can be reduced before rescheduling the public meeting. A new date will most likely be set within the next

few months. "We appreciate the many citizens who have taken time to participate in the lake bridges design process. That input has been, and will continue to be, valuable in providing us with direction. We look forward to rescheduling the public meeting once the design team works through issues to help the bridges fit our budget restrictions," Gulick said.

Serving as gateways to the Land Between the Lakes, the bridges will be about eight miles apart, connected by a new four-lane section of 68/80. The new structures will replace the Egner's Ferry Bridge across Kentucky Lake at Aurora and the Lawrence Memorial Bridge across Lake Barkley at Canton.

According to the proposal, the number of precincts will be expanded from 28 to 30 to make balloting more convenient for voters living in those areas. However there will be "islands of county voters living in city precincts," according to Coursey.

"I don't like it but it's the lesser of two evils," he said. Some of the proposals include:

- the creation of a new "Pottertown" precinct that will also include a sizable block of voters now living in the Cherry Corner precinct.

- creation of a new unnamed precinct for new city and some county voters living south of Wiswell Road.

- creation of a new Murray 8 Precinct that will support one school board district instead of three from the current Murray 8 and Murray 11 precincts.

- allowing other city precincts to include a least some county voters long Ky. 94 West.

that we have and the girls, the deputy clerks, that we have here," he said. "They're the hardest working group that I know of. I have never seen them complain and they all work together from one side of the department to the other."

However Enix said it's time for some new blood on the board and he wants to give up the Democratic seat to allow someone else a chance.

"I just think it's time for me to quit," he said. "I'll still be around to help up until the election, but I'm going off the board so someone else can come in."

Enix was honored by Coursey and fellow board members Dave Foley and the Calloway County Sheriff's Office following a meeting of the board Friday.

"Zee, it's been an honor working with you," Coursey said after Enix took his last official action by adjourning the meeting.

He was then presented with a framed certificate of appreciation commending him for his work. Other honors are planned.

Afterward Enix told the *Murray Ledger & Times* that he has seen a lot of change over the years. One is the growth in the number of registered

Republicans he noted while looking at figures that showed 16,371 Democrats and 5,951 Republicans registered to vote in the county.

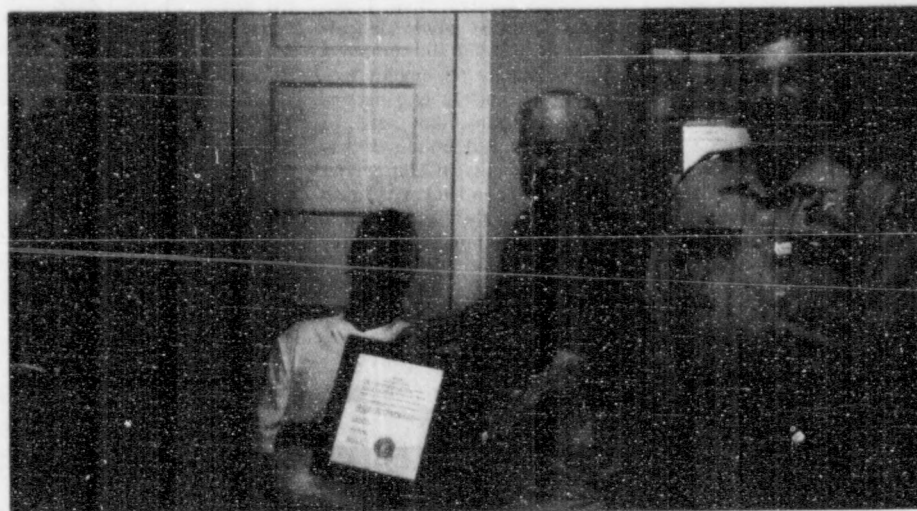
"I remember when I'd say we had less than 1,500 Republicans. So we have a better two-party system now and that's good," he said. "I believe in the two-party system. I just happen to be a Democrat."

The number of precincts has risen slightly from 25 to 28, soon to be hiked to 30 if a current plan is accepted by state elections officials (see related story). And there's also a lot more paperwork.

He said things were just a lot simpler 20 years ago.

"Years ago, you could draw boundary lines that would allow everyone that lived on a certain road to vote in the same place. Now, we must draw boundary lines down the center of roads," he said. "This was particularly troublesome when we split the Almo precinct and created the Van Cleave precinct. We were required to shift several Almo voters to Van Cleave who were unhappy. Some said they would never vote again."

However one of the most significant changes is the technology used to gather the vote. "We have switched from the lever type machines to the electronic kind," he said. "This was an attempt to remove

human error from the tabulation process, but it increased the threat of programming errors, and caused some of our older precinct officers to quit. We now appear ready to move to a paper type that will combine an electronic ballot reader with a paper-trail backup."

Enix, who replaced former Democrat Charlie Lassiter on the board, remembers working with Republican board members Tom Scruggs and Homer Bullard, who sat in current

al Election set for Nov. 4. A search for a new Democrat representative on the board is already underway. The Calloway County Democratic Party's executive committee is expected to submit about five nominees to the Kentucky Board of Elections.

"I've had a wonderful time on the board and I'm missing some of the people I've worked with. I'm leaving, but I'll be around," he said.

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

Mars lander poised to bake soil, then test it

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Phoenix lander is getting ready to sniff the Martian soil for signs of life-friendly elements after scooping up a handful of dirt near the north pole, researchers said Friday.

New photos sent back by the spacecraft show its 8-foot-long robotic arm hovering over a miniature oven, ready to dump seven tablespoons inside where the soil sample will be heated and studied for its chemistry.

Scientists hope to measure the amount of water and type of minerals in the arctic soil to determine whether the environment could support primitive life. In particular, they are looking for hints of carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and nitrogen in the sample.

"We're very curious whether the ice that we think is just

under the surface here has been melted and modified the soil," said chief scientist Peter Smith of the University of Arizona, Tucson, who leads the \$420 million mission.

NEW DOUGLAS, Ill. (AP) — One person is dead after a small plane crash in southern Illinois.

The Federal Aviation Administration says the single-engine aircraft crashed near New Douglas around 3:15 p.m. on Friday.

FAA spokeswoman Elizabeth Isham Cory says there was only one person on board.

According to preliminary information, Cory says the plane was en route to Louisville, Kentucky, from Denison, Iowa.

She says the National Transportation Safety Board will investigate.

The Madison County Coroner didn't immediately return a telephone message.

New Douglas is located about 40 miles northeast of St. Louis.

Ex-Gov. Patton named to CPE

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) —

Former Gov. Paul Patton, who reshaped Kentucky higher education a decade ago, was given a new role Friday with his appointment to the council in charge of coordinating the vast postsecondary education system.

Patton was one of three people chosen by Gov. Steve Beshear to fill vacancies on the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education. The appointments come at a time of budget cuts for universities and higher tuition for students.

The 16-member council also is searching for a new higher education chief. Richard A. Crofts, a veteran higher education official, was selected as the council's interim president last month until a permanent chief is hired.

Patton said in an interview

Friday he was pleased to join the council, which received more authority from the 1997 higher education overhaul he championed.

The other appointees to the postsecondary education council Friday were former Lexington Mayor Pam Miller and Paducah attorney Glenn Denton.

Council members are chosen by the governor, with consent of the House and Senate. Patton's appointment is effective immediately for a term expiring at the end of 2013.

Patton, who left office in late 2003 after two terms, said he needs to "get back up to speed" on higher education issues but expects to have "a fast learning curve."

The overhaul strived to improve coordination of the state's universities, community colleges and technical schools. It removed commu-

nity colleges from direct control of the University of Kentucky and set a goal of making UK a top-20 research university. Community colleges were placed in a new system with technical schools.

Patton called the revamped higher education system the "hallmark" of his governorship. In the 11 years since, postsecondary education in Kentucky has made "substantial progress but has a long way to go," he said.

Another initiative during Patton's tenure was Bucks for Brains, matching public money with private donations to attract top university researchers to Kentucky.

Patton said he sees the council's role as trying to improve the efficiency of the statewide system.

He said the state's severe budget crunch has slowed progress in higher education. He said the economy will even-

tually rebound, and when it does he hopes the state will increase funding for postsecondary education.

He called sharply rising tuition a concern, but said that state-supported scholarships have also grown through the years.

"If you're going to have quality education, then you have to have a quality staff and faculty, and that's where most of the money goes," he said of tuition. "So there's a tradeoff. You may be paying more, but it's our job to ensure that for that extra money you get a quality education, and the council has a role to play in that."

Patton has kept a low profile since leaving office. His second term was marred by his admission of an extramarital affair.

Jones, who owns approximately 20 businesses in Murray, said this was a good place to raise children, and he and his company were working hard to keep jobs in Murray.

Jones said Sims, who was unavailable for comment Friday, has officially retired, but would remain as a consultant for one year.

Wanted: Employee who can play well with others

NEW YORK (AP) — A resume and a brief job interview can't answer the question that matters most to a new hire's co-workers: Is this person an absolute pain?
Despite a labor shortage in many sectors, some employers are pickier than ever about whom they hire. Businesses in fields where jobs are highly coveted — or just sound like fun — are stepping up efforts to weed out people who might have the right credentials but the wrong personality.
Call it the "plays well with others" factor.
Job candidates at investment banks have long endured dozens of interviews designed, in part, to see if new hires will get along with everyone they'll work with. Whole Foods Market Inc. holds group interviews, in which people who will work under a manager are part of the team that grills candidates and collectively picks hires.
Now other companies are setting up higher hurdles.
"In this bloggable, cell phone camera world, your brand on the inside is going to be your brand on the outside. If you have a bunch of jerks, your brand is going to be a jerk," said Tim Sanders, former leadership coach at Yahoo Inc. and author of "The Likeability Factor."

Employers from Microsoft Corp. to rural hospitals are worrying about finding enough workers. But companies like Rackspace Managed Hosting are bucking that trend, working hard to find reasons to turn people away.
Rackspace CEO Lanham Napier said, "We'd rather miss a good one than hire a bad one."
The 1,900-person computer server hosting company is divided into 18- to 20-person teams. One team is so close, the whole group shows up to help when one member moves into a new home, Napier said. Job interviews at the San Antonio-based company last all day, as interviewers try to rub away fake pleasantness.
"They're here for nine or 10 hours," Napier said. "We're very cordial about it. We're not aggressive, but we haven't met a human being yet who has the stamina to BS us all day."
There's a possible downside, however. In a *Harvard Business Review* article titled "Fool vs. Jerk: Whom Would You Hire?" Tiziana Casciaro of Harvard and Miguel Sousa Lobo of Duke University point

out that people generally like people who are similar to them, so hiring for congeniality can limit diversity of opinions. One venture capitalist told the authors that a capable manager he worked with built a team that "had a great time going out for a beer, but the quality of their work was seriously compromised."
That's not the worry at Lindblad Expeditions, a 500-employee adventure cruise company. Kris Thompson, vice president of human resources at Lindblad, said, "You can teach people any technical skill, but you can't teach them how to be a kindhearted, generous-minded person with an open spirit."
In the mating dance of job interviews, employers traditionally put their best feet forward, trumpeting their wonderful benefits packages while leaving out the bit about working late, eating cold pizza.
Not Lindblad. It sends job applicants a DVD showing not one, but two shots of a crew member cleaning toilets. A dishwasher talks about washing 5,000 dishes in one day. "Be prepared to work your butt off," another says.
"It's meant to scare you off," company founder Sven Lindblad said. It does. After watching the DVD and hearing an unvarnished description of life onboard a Lindblad ship, the majority of applicants drop out, Thompson said.
New hires "undergo a drug test, a physical exam, they have to pack up their life, we buy

Beer Can Chicken

1 (12-ounce) can beer
1 (3 1/2 to 4 pound) chicken
2 tablespoons Basic Barbecue Rub, recipe follows
2 cups Cola Barbecue Sauce, for serving, recipe follows
3 to 4 handfuls apple or hickory wood chips, soaked in water for 30 minutes
Pop the tab off the beer can. Using a church key style can opener, make a few more holes in the top of the can. Pour out half the beer into the soaking water of the wood chips. Set the can of beer aside.
Set up the grill for indirect grilling and preheat to medium. If using a charcoal grill, place a large drip pan in the center. If using a gas grill, place all the wood chips in the smoker box or in a smoker pouch and preheat the grill to high until you see smoke, then reduce the heat to medium.
Remove the packet of giblets from the body cavity of the chicken and set aside for another use. Remove and discard the fat just inside the body and neck cavities. Rinse the chicken, inside and out, under cold running water, drain, and blot dry inside and out with paper towels. Sprinkle 2 teaspoons of the rub inside the body and neck cavities of the chicken. Rub the bird all over on the outside with 2 teaspoons of the rub. If you have the patience, you can put some of the rub under the skin being careful not to tear it.
Spoon the remaining 2 teaspoons of rub through the holes into the beer in the can. Don't worry if it foams up, this is normal. Insert the beer can into the body cavity of the chicken and spread out the legs to form a sort of tripod. Tuck the wing tips behind the chicken's back.
When ready to cook, if using a charcoal grill, toss all the wood chips on the coals. Stand the chicken up in the center of the hot grate, over the drip pan and away from the heat. Cover the grill and cook the chicken until the skin is a dark golden brown and very crisp and the meat is cooked to an internal temperature of 180 degrees, about 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hours. If using a charcoal grill, you'll need to add 12 fresh coals per side after 1 hour.
Using tongs, carefully transfer the chicken in its upright position on the beer can to a platter and present it to your guests.

Let rest 5 minutes, and then carefully remove the chicken from the beer can. Take care not to spill the hot beer or otherwise burn yourself. Quarter, or carve the chicken and served with the Cola Barbecue Sauce.

Cola Barbecue Sauce:

1 cup cola (recommended: Coca-Cola)
1 cup ketchup
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon liquid smoke
3 tablespoons steak sauce (recommended: A-1 Steak Sauce)
1 teaspoon onion flakes
1/2 teaspoon garlic flakes
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
Combine all the ingredients in a heavy non-reactive saucepan and gradually bring to a boil over medium heat. Reduce the heat slightly to obtain a gentle simmer. Simmer the sauce until reduced by 1/4, about 6 to 8 minutes. Use right away or transfer to a large jar, cool to room temperature, cover, and refrigerate. The sauce will keep for several months.
Cook's Note: You can also barbecue a chicken on a cage of cola, lemon-lime soda, or root beer.

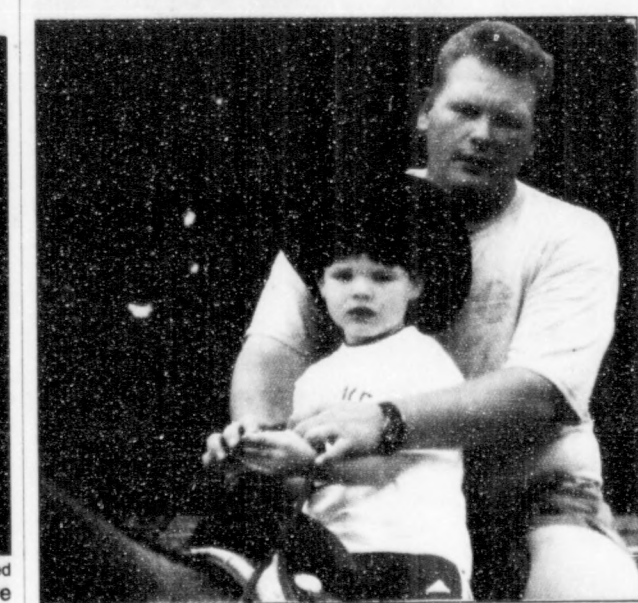

Big Brown set for patch on ailing hoof

NEW YORK (AP) — Big Brown has an appointment with his manicurist. The bay colt was set for some last minute patch-up work Friday afternoon, the day before he races in the Belmont Stakes for a shot at winning the first Triple Crown in 30 years.

Hoof specialist Ian McKinlay, who was to apply the patch to the colt's cracked left front foot, isn't concerned about the patch hampering Big Brown's bid for history.

"As far as everything I see, it couldn't be better," McKinlay said Friday morning. "The patch we put on today will be very routine at this point."

Trainer Rick Dutrow Jr. wants to shield the heavily favored Big Brown from the media horde that has been packing the barn. Dozens of reporters stood outside Barn 2 at Belmont on Friday morning, watching Big Brown go through his usual routine.

Rather than do it with the whole world watching, Dutrow will wait until later in the day to have the patch applied.

"He won't make one move," Dutrow said. "He's very, very nice to work on. Some horses, you've got to wait until they settle in, maybe tranquilize them. They're moving around a lot. That takes more time. Not with Big Brown because he's so cool."

Big Brown has been the picture of cool this Triple Crown season. He loves to strike a pose for the cameras and saved his best performances for the Kentucky Derby and Preakness Stakes. The only thing that has tied to slow Dutrow's colt is the quarter crack.

The injury is having about as much luck at stopping Big Brown as the competition. Several veterinarians characterized the quarter crack as innocuous and said racing on Saturday'sraeling 1 1/2-mile Belmont shouldn't pose an additional risk to the strapping bay colt.

PARIS (AP) — As the points piled up and the light faded, it was tough to decide which scenario had seemed less likely at the outset of the French Open semifinals Friday.

That Rafael Nadal would be so dominant during a 6-4, 6-2, 7-6 (3) victory over Novak Djokovic, a man who is, after all, ranked No. 3 and a Grand Slam champion?

Or that Roger Federer would run into so much trouble before winning 6-2, 5-7, 6-3, 7-5 against Gael Monfils, a man who is, after all, ranked 59th and a major semifinalist for the first time?

Then again, by the end of the day, Roland Garros once more produced the likeliest of all championship matches: No. 1 Federer vs. No. 2 Nadal.

"Rafa again, across the net — it's the ultimate test on clay. It was tough to decide which scenario had seemed less likely at the outset of the French Open semifinals Friday. The showdown Sunday is their third consecutive French Open final, their fifth Grand Slam final overall, and plenty is on the line. SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds has pleaded not guilty to 15 felony charges of lying to a federal grand jury about his performance-enhancing drug use. Bonds was re-arrested Friday on 15 felony counts of lying under oath. Prosecutors say he lied when he told a grand jury investigating the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative in 2003 that he never knowingly took steroids or other performance-enhancing drugs.

Baseball's home run king pleaded not guilty to similar accusations in December, but a judge ordered prosecutors to rewrite the indictment.

I met with Jerry Schatz and Vince Marascuilo at the Paris Landing boat ramp for a couple of days of good fishing. I was very apprehensive at what we would find in that area since the 350 Triton boats and their anglers had been there for five days tournament fishing!
We had to travel north both days to raise any bass which was respectable but we did it and both guys had their string stretched a few times! Some were feisty and fought very well but some were four pounders and they were aggressive about showing their displeasure about being fooled and then hooked! Both Vince and Jerry are knowledgeable anglers, plus being nice guys with great attitudes and very willing to learn new techniques.
Hopefully they can come back before long and we can put them on some hot water, top water action! By the looks of the weather patterns we will have plenty of hot water to fish.
Some of you know how much fun it is and most of the time, how productive it is to troll for your dinner! It isn't done as much now days especially since the price of gasoline is so outrageous. There are several ways or techniques to troll the lures you prefer but the easiest is just use the crankbaits which will dive to a depth of eight to twelve feet at idle speed of your engine. Most of the time you let out enough line, 20 to 30 yards depending on where you are, to allow the lures to make contact with the bottom. Keep the engine in gear at idle speed and pull the lures along the bottom.
You will soon learn where the brush pile attractors or stake beds are and how to retrieve

them after you hang them in some enormous monofilament messes! Be calm but be sure to purchase a lure retriever or bait knocker to slide down the line that is caught. It takes a little patience but you develop skills at retrieving those lures believe me!
Should you locate an area where the brush or stake beds are too numerous, relocate to another where there is maybe a creek channel which you can cross from the top of the bank down into the creek itself and then come up the opposite bank side.
Sometimes an angler can catch a limit in a couple of hours or less depending on the weather and the wind. Be aware of the moon phase and go by what it advises you to do as far as the best times to fish. My two daughters, Krista and Lesa would go in a heartbeat if they didn't have to work and we always caught good fish.

Lesa was with me on one trip and it only took two hours to catch a limit of sauger along with a healthy catch of white striped bass. She did catch the largest yellow striped bass I have ever seen, on that trip! I photographed it because it weighed two and one half pounds and was eighteen inches long! Now that is a rare stripe!
Krista always had a job but when there was time and the big white stripers were jumping, she would go early with me, we would catch our limit of one hundred and twenty stripers and then she would go to work on time before noon!
Maybe I can get the two of them together again this summer for some real stripe fun! Their daughters love to fish also, so maybe we can get Sarah, Samantha and Catherine to come along for some fun competition? All three of them are very good anglers also!

Business gets condor expert's silence in land deal

floor," said Snyder, one of the foremost experts on North America's largest flying bird. "It was very clear to me I could've asked for \$10,000. I could've asked for \$50,000."
The Portal, Ariz., scientist said he turned the job down for fear it might prevent him from objectively evaluating the plan and, if he disagreed, from testifying against it in court. He has since decided the project could significantly harm the condor.
But others have taken the offer from Tejon (TAY-home). The developer has retained the services — and secured the public silence — of three condor experts. That's a signifi-

cant portion of the half-dozen or so scientists specializing in condors on Tejon, according to the developer's chief consultant on the bird, Peter Bloom.
In truth, many environmentalists are delighted by the deal, under which Tejon will set aside an extraordinary 375 square miles for the bird and other wildlife. It would be the biggest parcel in California history to be designated for conservation.
Five of the nation's most influential environmental groups, including the Sierra Club, the Natural Resources Defense Council and Audubon California, helped negotiate the plan and gave it their blessing when it was announced earlier this month.
But critics say that with hundreds of millions of dollars at stake, Tejon is systematically trying to stifle any remaining opposition to its plans, which are still awaiting approval from various government entities.
"Given the small number of experts with knowledge of this land and given Tejon's behavior to now, I think one of their tactics is to bottle up some or all of those experts so there can be no dissent if this lands in court," said Adam Keats, an attorney with the Center for Biological Diversity, which is considering suing over the project.
Tejon spokesman Barry Zoeller bristled at the criticism.
"If there is any assertion or implication that any attempt was

made to get an opinion or buy an opinion from someone, that is absolutely incorrect and flies in the face of the independent evaluation" of the conservation groups, he said. "They're putting their credibility on the line as well."
Zoeller said Tejon routinely requires consultants to sign confidentiality agreements because information leaks can harm the company's stock and its shareholders.
Companies often hire environmental experts as consultants with the expectation they will give an honest assessment but not publicly bash a plan. In the past decade, however, developers have increasingly required consultants to actually sign contracts with clauses preventing them from speaking out, said Tom Scott, a former biological consultant who is now a natural resources spe-

cialist at the University of California, Berkeley.
The condor has near-mythical status in California and virtually any project seen as even remotely threatening to its habitat faces stiff opposition. Getting the conservation groups and the condor experts to sign off on the deal — and, in the case of the experts, not publicly criticize any parts of it — gives the project a major boost.
David Clendenen, a condor expert who declined to work for Tejon, criticized those who accepted the consulting job, saying the arrangement "destroys their credibility completely."
"For us, the ultimate line in the sand is you don't allow development in designated critical habitat, and it's that simple," he said.
