**Local plant announces pay cuts to keep jobs**

To prevent layoffs in a tough economy and to deal with seasonal downturns, Briggs & Stratton employees will take a mandatory 10 percent pay cut but will keep their jobs.

Briggs' spokeswoman Laura Timm told the Murray Ledger & Times Friday that employees at all company plants affected were informed of the decision Thursday.  
"We talked about some of the measures we were taking as are many, many companies around the country and around the globe to ride through the recession," Timm said.  
The pay cut involves all levels of management and labor.  
"These are measures that we are taking with all of our employees," Timm said. "We look at this as a team and we are doing this obviously to keep the team in place and keep our employees here."  
Earlier this year, company officials announced that the last day of production for one of its seasonal engine assembly lines in Murray would occur May 25. Including other plants, the cut involved 164 employees.  
Reasons cited were weaker seasonal demand for engines used on lawn and garden equipment. Further production schedules were planned accordingly to meet demand. Briggs & Stratton's Murray facility manufactures small engines for lawn mowers and other outdoor power equipment.

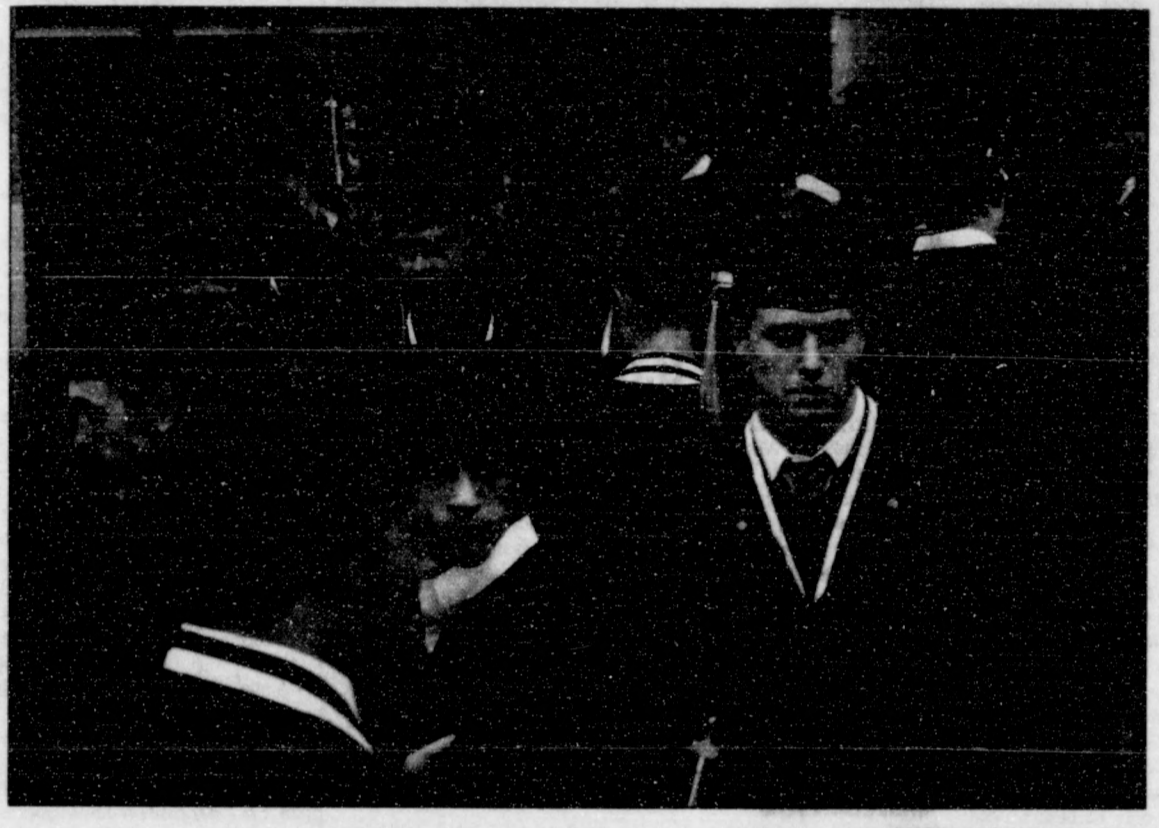

**City pool opens with safe drains**

Public pools and spas now opening for the summer must make sure drainage and filtering systems are safe following the death of a 6-year-old Wisconsin girl last year.  
The Virginia Graeme Baker Pool and Spa Safety Act took effect in December requiring all public pools to implement additional safety measures that minimize suction and entrapment hazards. The changes are the result of a June 2007 incident involving 6-year-old Abigail Taylor of Milwaukee. The girl suffered horrendous injury and later died after she sat on a drain cover in a child's wading pool and the suction ripped out part of her intestinal tract.  
Murray-Calloway County Parks Director Matt Martin says patrons can rest assured that Murray-Calloway Central Park pool will be safe when it opens today.  
"We've already installed the new filter covers and we're ready," Martin said.  
According to news reports, Taylor lost 21 feet of her small intestine leaving her with short bowel syndrome. While hospitalized, she died.

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**MSU Regents discuss enrollment figures**

The Murray State University Board of Regents discussed enrollment figures at their Friday meeting.  
Alison Marshall, executive director of student affairs, presented the board with figures comparing enrollment numbers from spring 2008 to spring 2009. The total number of undergraduate students was down to 7,490 from 7,666 and the graduate student total was down to 1,737 from 1,749, she said.  
Marshall said students had given various reasons for not coming back, some of them economic and some academic. She said she had been told by some that they planned to take a semester off and earn some more money before coming back and that many didn't want to take out any more student loans. She noted that universities across the state and country were facing some of the same problems with keeping enrollment up.  
Marshall said, though, that the numbers for admitted students were up. The number of new, in-state freshmen was the most significant rise with a 21.2 percent increase. New, out-of-state freshmen were up 9 percent, she said. New in-state transfers were down 0.73 percent and new, out-of-state transfers were down 7.5 percent. In MSU's 18-county service region, new freshmen were up 28.1 percent and transfers were up 0.48 percent, she said.

Regent Bill Adams complimented Marshall for her office's work and said he was optimistic because enrollment figures typically go up by about 10 percent between spring and fall.  
Adams went on to voice concern over Regent Marilyn Buchanan's comments at the special-called May 7 meeting indicating that MSU was down 90 students on campus in the last three years. He said, in his opinion, her published comments that 900 more students would generate \$5.4 million were inaccurate not only because the number of students could be disputed but also because the tuition costs used to calculate the total was wrong.

**MPD continues investigation into recent burglaries**

The Murray Police Department is continuing to investigate the burglaries that have occurred in the city in the last two months.  
To date, there have been 27 burglaries since March 23, some of which police believe are connected. Twelve of them happened in a single night in the second weekend in May. So far, only one person has been charged. Terrence Silas, 19, is facing one charge of first-degree burglary for allegedly stealing firearms from Vernon's Pawn Shop and two charges of third-degree burglary for allegedly breaking into the Veterinary Medical Center and Harlan Automotive.  
Murray Police Chief Ken Claud said the department has been in contact with law enforcement in surrounding communities that have been investigating similar burglaries to see if there might be any links.  
"We're working diligently to solve

pitalized, the girl received a rare triple organ transplant to replace her small intestine, liver, and pancreas. She was unable to eat or drink and required total parenteral nutrition. She died nine months after the incident from resulting complications two months short of her seventh birthday.

The Kentucky Department of Public Health and Office of Attorney General said in a news release Wednesday they want the public to be aware of a new federal law addressing concerns related to pool and spa drains.

"As public health officials, it is our duty to try to ensure the safety and well-being of the people of our state, especially Kentucky's young people," said DPH Commissioner William Hacker, M.D. "The Virginia Graeme Baker law helps us better protect the public from swimming safety hazards, but it's also important for swimmers to keep some simple safety measures in mind, such as avoiding all drains and suction

outlets and tying back long hair."

DPH officials, as well as local health departments and the state attorney general's office monitor compliance of public pools and spas in Kentucky.

"Kentucky is working to balance federal requirements with community needs and safety," said Guy Delius, director of the division of public health protection and safety in DPH. "We have informed pool owners of the federal requirements, conducted statewide training for public health staff, coordinated efforts with other agencies like the Kentucky Attorney General's Office, and are conducting active inspections and monitoring to confirm compliance."

Adams said the methods for counting students had changed since Dr. Randy Dunn became president of MSU. While the most recent enrollment numbers were not embellished, figures before Dunn's presidency were misleading, he said.

Buchanan said she stood by her assertion that the university was down 900 students on campus. She said her statement was based on an article published last fall in the Ledger & Times that was submitted by MSU's public relations department.

Later in the meeting, Buchanan said she had received several phone calls asking her if she had heard that several departments, including the president's office, could be moving from their current locations. Dunn said there had been discussions, but that no decisions had been made. When Regent Peg Hays asked if there

was an estimated cost, Dunn said there was not, because no plans had been set.

Dunn said the board had a right to set a policy to approve all special projects if they wanted, but projects would be delayed while staff members waited for the next board meeting.

Near the end of the meeting, Alan Stout was re-elected as board chairman and Adams was elected as vice-chairman, replacing Faculty Regent Jay Morgan in that position.

The board voted to honor outgoing Regent Gina Winchester, who will be replaced by Phil Schooley, with a resolution of appreciation for her service on the board. They also voted to honor Beverly Ford, whom Buchanan said was the longest serving board member in MSU's history. She was first appointed by Gov. Brereton Jones in 1992 and Friday was her last meeting. Gov. Steve Beshear has yet to appoint her replacement.

new White House office of

cyber security.

these crimes and developing new leads, although there are none that we can announce publicly at this time," Claud said.

Claud said similar burglaries occurred in Henderson a couple of days after the 12 overnight burglaries in Murray and there were 10 burglaries in one night in Madisonville, he said.

Claud said the burglaries are similar not only because several happened at a time but also because the burglar(s) gained entry by breaking windows and appeared to be looking for cash and electronics.

It appears that the crimes have not spread outside of the city, although there was one burglary reported Sunday night at Hazel Baptist Church, Calloway County Sheriff Bill Marcum said. There was also a burglary reported two days later at a residence on Gilbert Street, the street where the church is located.

The Crime Stoppers of Murray and Calloway County are offering a \$10,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the people responsible for the crimes. The Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development Corporation both pledged \$1,000 each and the other \$8,000 was pledged by anonymous business owners.

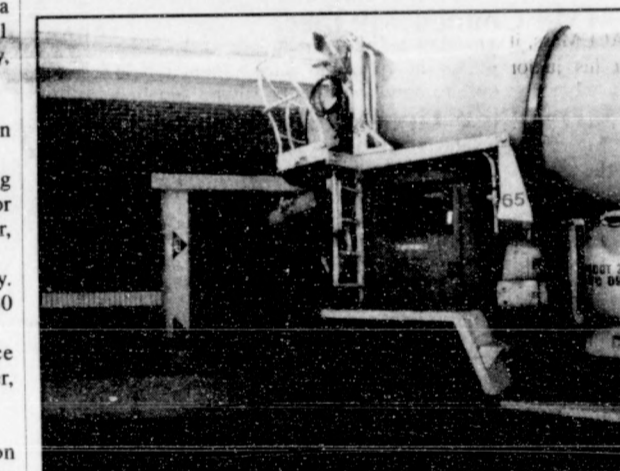

## KENTUCKY BASKETBALL

Calipari in wrong  
place at wrong  
time — twiceMEMPHIS CASE RESEMBLES COACH'S  
BRUSH WITH NCAA AT UMASS

Freshly minted Kentucky basketball coach John Calipari hasn't been accused of wrongdoing, just being in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Twice. First at UMass, and now Memphis, Calipari walked out on programs ahead of allegations of major NCAA violations. Also coincidentally, both cases involved the best players he ever coached.

At UMass, it was Marcus Camby, who left for the NBA after his junior season in 1996 and later admitted he'd accepted money, jewelry, rental cars and prostitutes supplied by two agents while he was still in school. The NCAA vacated the Minutemen's Final Four appearance, but not before Calipari had vacated the premises for the greener pastures of the NBA.

At Memphis, the player in question was almost certainly Derrick Rose, who left after his freshman year and justified most of the hype during a sometimes-spectacular rookie season with the Chicago Bulls. Though Rose wasn't identified in a letter from the NCAA to the school alleging that someone took the SAT for a player who only played on the 2007-08 team, he was the only member of that Final Four squad who played just that one season.

Like UMass, Memphis is facing the possibility that the NCAA will decide to erase what arguably had been its finest performance to date. And just like at UMass, where he was cleared of any involvement with the mess, Calipari won't be around to find out how things turn out.

He skipped town in April for an eight-year, \$31.65-million, perks-laden deal at Kentucky that made him the highest-paid college basketball coach in the land. Such is the state of the game, of course, that what happened to Calipari could happen to anybody.

Not the part about the stratospheric pay package, because only a handful of his colleagues could demand that kind of money with a straight face. Instead, we're talking about kids taking money under the table from agents or having a pal take their entrance or course exams without too many people being any the wiser.

The first sin has been occurring since "sports agent" became a job description, the second since the NCAA drew up rules about athletes' eligibility. Whether kids cheat more now than in the past remains anyone's guess. What isn't in doubt, though, is how much more money is at stake. The people at Kentucky who hired Calipari just two months ago hardly need reminding of that.

On Wednesday, Billy Gillispie, the coach Kentucky hired two years ago — after considering Calipari, according to reports at the time — sued the school claiming breach of contract and asked for at least \$6 million in pay, punitive damages, attorneys' fees and court costs. Kentucky countered Thursday, even while it waged a counteroffensive on another front, rebuffing critics who suggested they hadn't performed due diligence in hiring Calipari.

In a statement, Kentucky said it knew all along that Memphis might face violations because Calipari was "forthcoming" during the interview process about "issues under investigation" at his old school.

Hard to say whether that bit of diligence made Calipari's hiring more cynical than it originally seemed. Either way, it helped explain why Kentucky athletic director Mitch Barnhart made a point of boasting at the time about how his own "compliance folks talked with the NCAA and checked records and facts" relating to Calipari, and how people at the highest levels of that organization "assured us how much they enjoyed working with John in that process."

No doubt. Calipari can be charming when he wants, as evidenced by his bank account and the steady stream of talented recruits who flow to wherever he sets up shop. On short notice, he's already assembled in Lexington what some scouts consider the best freshman class in the past decade, including John Wall, the consensus No. 1 prep point guard in the nation.

Wall pleaded guilty Wednesday to a misdemeanor charge of breaking and entering, and entered a program for first offenders that could eventually clear his record. The charge came about after police in Wall's hometown of Raleigh, N.C., found him walking out of a vacant house, apparently little more than being in the wrong place at the wrong time. And as Calipari can attest, it can happen to anyone.

## JOCKEY HAS CHANCE FOR TRIPLE CROWN OF A DIFFERENT KIND

NEW YORK (AP) — So far, it's been quite a compelling Triple Crown season despite a 31st consecutive year without a horse sweeping the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes.

A gelding named Mine That Bird produced a shocker in winning the Kentucky Derby at 50-1 odds. Rachel Alexandra became the first filly in 85 years to win the Preakness — by a length over the Derby winner, and Calvin Borel, the winning jockey in both races, will have a chance for a "Calvin Crown" if he wins the Belmont next Saturday.

Adding even more intrigue, is this: Whom will Borel ride — the filly or the gelding?

"It may not be a Triple Crown year, but it's as far as you can get without having one," trainer Todd Pletcher said. "It just all adds up to a lot of great stories going into the

The field for the final jewel of the Triple Crown is almost set, but the racing world awaits a decision on Rachel Alexandra. It could come Monday, according to co-owner Jess Jackson, after the filly has a workout at Churchill Downs. If she's in, Borel will be aboard. If she's out, Borel gets back on Mine That Bird.

"We've just got to be patient," Mine That Bird co-owner Mark Allen said. "We want Calvin, but Mr. Jackson owns the world. We just live in it."

Pletcher knows all about a filly in the Belmont. He won it two years ago with Rags to Riches, who became the first filly in 102 years to win the "Test of the Champion."

"It could lose some of its luster if the filly doesn't run, but there's still Mine That Bird going for the third leg after winning the Derby and running so competitively in the Preakness when he had a question mark coming in," Pletcher said.

For now, let's just call this Belmont one for the birds.

Mine That Bird is a son of 2004 Belmont winner Birdstone, who spoiled Smarty Jones' Triple Crown bid with a dramatic come-from-behind, one-length upset. Among the 10 or so 3-year-olds ready to take on the tough little gelding is Summer Bird, another son of Birdstone, who ran sixth in the Derby in only the fourth start of his career.

"He's blossoming at the right time," Summer Bird's trainer Tim Ice said. "What I really liked about the Derby was the way he galloped out. I think the (Belmont) distance will suit him."

There's also the Nick Zito connection.

The two-time Belmont winner, who trained Birdstone for owner Marylou Whitney, is pointing three horses to the race — Brave Victory, Miner's Escape and Nowhere to Hide.

All will be long shots, but Zito isn't worried. Birdstone won at 36-1. Da' Tara won for him last year at 38-1.

"We've done well in the Belmont, been consistent, so why not?" Zito said. "I don't have Secretariat with these, but I don't have to. You never know. Mine That Bird is definitely the horse to beat, no one can say he's not. Anyway, there will be a lot of birds."

## One more season left for spring of 2009

Back in the days when the only things to hunt in these parts were squirrels, rabbits, and quail (yes, there used to be quail), a person had to wait from the middle of January until the third Saturday in August to be able to hunt small game.

For a youngster, that wait was interminable. Adding insult to injury, the first season to roll around in the fall was squirrel season and it always managed to begin along about the time that school reloaded in the fall. For years I wished and prayed for a squirrel season that would open while school was out on summer break, but noooo.

Gradually, it began to dawn on wildlife managers that hunting really wasn't having that great of an impact on squirrel populations as long as the critters had plenty of groceries to keep them fat and happy. A fat and happy squirrel, it seems, will engage in quite a bit of procreating and will thus deliver new litters of new squirrels at least twice per year.

"Yeehaw!" they said (the wildlife managers, that is). "We could have a whole 'nother squirrel season sometime in the late spring if we wanted to!"

Evidently they "wanted to" as we now have a Spring Squirrel Season in the Commonwealth. It will run from June 6 through 19 this year with the usual 6-squirrel per day limit. Rimfire rifles, shotguns, muzzle-loaders, .22 caliber handguns, bows and crossbows may be used to hunt squirrels. Air rifles may also be used provided they are .177, .20 or .22 caliber. Once again, sling-shots are not legal for the taking of squirrels.

Coyotes, groundhogs, and wild hogs may be hunted anytime during daylight hours in Kentucky. Wild hogs are finding their way into the Commonwealth probably with a little help from their friends, but are not at all welcome as they wreak havoc on habitat, private property, and even on folks who get a little too close.

In case you haven't heard, Kentucky will hold its first black bear season in over 100 years this fall. The date is set for December 19 - 20 in Harlan, Letcher, and Pike counties only. From what I can see, all a prospective bear hunter need do is buy a \$30 bear permit and then secure a place to hunt. The limit, however, is 10 bears or 5 female bears, whichever comes

first. If the quota is met on the first day, that's it for bear season.

In the "just what we needed" category, a local dentist (I promised not to reveal Dr. Young's name) found a big ol' armadillo that had lost an encounter with a vehicle on the highway adjacent to his farm last weekend. Wee-doggies, we have "possum-on-the-half-shell" in Calloway County now. I can't wait to see

what wanders next. Being that the armadillo is considered an exotic critter to these here parts, it's okay to dispatch them with impunity and a firearm at each and every opportunity. As a matter of face, it's greatly encouraged - along with any wild hog found rooting about.

By the way, as of June 1, it will be legal to resume the feeding of wildlife again. I'm sure everyone is counting down the hours until they can get out in the woods and refill all those deer feeders that have been empty since March. Haven't they?

So forget the days when hunting seasons were brief and the wait was long. The 2009-10 installment of squirrel season will begin August 15 and deer season (archery) will follow on September 5. There will be some sort of season in play from August 15 through the end of February 2010. Then the spring turkey season will fly down from the roost and another June squirrel roundup will take place.

That only leaves the span from June 20 until August 14 without an officially sanctioned hunting season somewhere near. do it," Rogers said. "We have to back each other up and stay positive, so I've been focusing on doing that lately."

Prior to the 2009 season, leadership hadn't been required of Rogers.

Sam Butts and Meagan Starks were seniors in 2008 and formed the emotional core of the team.

Webb placed the onus of the offense on Rogers' back going into this season, hoping it would inspire her to leadership.

It didn't work right away, but in Rogers' defense, there's something to be said for good timing.

"We talked about that all summer and into the early part of the spring, how we needed her to be a leader," he said. "We talked about her being more vocal, but she's doing a great job down the stretch run here."

The Lady Lakers will need Rogers' leadership and hitting stroke in the three-spot more than ever on Saturday.

Calloway is 0-2 against Heath this season and hasn't scored a run against the Lady Pirates in 14 innings.

The Lady Lakers faced ace pitcher Kelleigh Jones in both of those games and will see her again in the region's second semifinal.

Jones hasn't completely baffled Calloway, however. The Lady Lakers left seven runners on base and squandered numerous scoring opportunities in a 1-0 loss on March 26.

Calloway didn't fare as well in the return game at Heath on May 14, falling 4-0.

"We've got to get timely hits," Webb said. "When we get runners on, we've got to get them in. Getting off to a good start will be the key, I think. If we put up a couple of early runs and

put the pressure on them, I think we can win."

Heath assumed the role of tournament favorite after Reidland fell to Marshall County in the first round without star pitcher Cassee Layne.

The Lady Pirates already have one title to their name this season — an All 'A' state championship they captured earlier this month.

After Gardner pitched seven scoreless frames against Graves Thursday night, Webb will give Ashton Futrell the starting nod on the mound against the Lady Pirates in keeping with the two-pitcher rotation he's followed all season.

If Calloway defeats Heath, Gardner will start the championship game at 6 p.m. against either Marshall County or Ballard Memorial with a break that isn't likely to last longer than a half hour.

The two-in-one setup due to rain delays throughout the week could work in favor of Calloway, which has a deeper pitching staff than most region squads.

"I think it does work to our advantage," Webb said. "We have two good arms and hopefully that will come into play, but we've got to get by Heath first."

"I think everybody pretty much looks at them as the favorite now. But I think we're ready. We're a lot more confident than we were last time we faced them. Hopefully, it's like last year and we're peaking at the right time."

Calloway and Heath are not strangers to one another in the region tournament. The Lady Lakers defeated the Lady Pirates 4-2 in last year's first round, answering a 9-3 loss handed them by Heath in the 2007 semifinals.

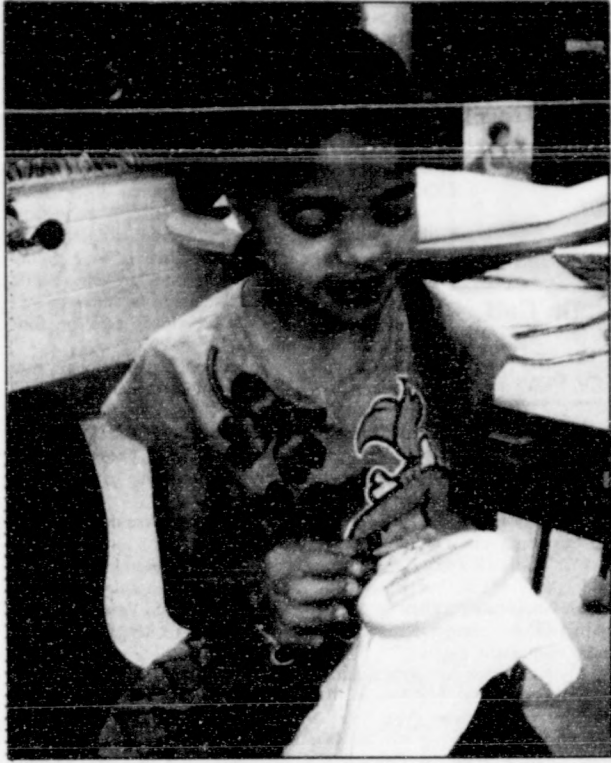

Sister can't shoulder burden of caring for younger brother

DEAR ABBY: I have just found out that my younger brother has been placed in foster care because he was abused in my mother's home. My family and I have been discussing who will take care of him, and every-

one is saying it should be me because I am the only one of my siblings who has a job and my own apartment. I love my little brother with all my heart, but I don't feel all the responsibility should be placed on my shoulders.

I live in a two-bedroom apartment with my two children. My son is disabled. Yes, I do have a job, but I earn a low hourly wage and I'm on a tight budget. I am also concerned that my brother will need counseling to help him get over what he has been through.

When I explain my concerns to my family, they get angry and say I'm being selfish, and to be honest, I am feeling very guilty. Please help me because I have no idea what to do. - CRYING AT NIGHT IN MILWAUKEE

DEAR CRYING: Dry those tears and do not allow yourself to be manipulated into something you can't handle. As a single mother, you already have your hands full caring for two children -- one of whom has special needs.

Your family is wrong to

expect you to shoulder this additional challenge alone. Because none of them is offering to help you, and your brother was abused in the care of the family, accept that he may be better off in a supportive foster-care environment.

DEAR ABBY: When my husband and I moved into our new home, one of the neighbor kids, "Rachael" (age 9), took a liking to me. She came over with her mom, introduced herself and asked for my phone number. I thought nothing of it. But as time has passed, she has been calling more and more to invite me over. Abby, I'm almost 30!

It has reached the point where we no longer answer our phone. Rachael also shows up at our door with her friends and wants to "hang out." Sometimes she just stands there and doesn't say anything. It's awkward because I have never been wild about kids.

The girl is also constantly in our yard, playing with our dog (even though she has pets of her own), using our outdoor furniture, etc. I thought her mom would discourage it -- but one day she actually left Rachael with me when she went out on a Saturday night.

Rachael has a response to all my excuses about why I can't see her. When I get home from work, she and several other young kids are playing in my driveway as I pull in. I have told her no one is allowed in our yard without our permission.

We are a young, happy couple with a lot of work to do on our house. We have a large yard to maintain and, frankly, I don't want to be the neighborhood baby sitter. How can I get this point across? -- STUCK IN SAN DIEGO

DEAR STUCK: You are addressing your comments to the wrong person. You should take this up with Rachael's mother. You do not have to make "excuses." There are valid reasons Rachael and her friends should not be on your property unless they are supervised. If she or one of the others should somehow injure themselves, you could be held legally responsible. If there are no restrictions on fences in your neighborhood, consider fencing your yard.

Home remedies for high cholesterol

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 69-year-old woman. I live a fairly active and healthful life. For decades, however, I have been troubled by poor circulation. Through diet, I have eliminated coffee, most fats and fried foods, and

have tried to include whole grains and fresh fruits and vegetables each day. Owing to a busy schedule, daily exercise is limited to 10 to 20 minutes.

Instead of medicine (to which I have an aversion, mainly due to bad side effects), I am striving to lower my cholesterol by taking vitamin C, vitamin E, ginkgo biloba, Vitamin B50 complex, calcium, magnesium and zinc. To fight off my high cholesterol of 254 and an LDL of 167, I was also taking niacin 100, but it seemed that my body would flare up quite red with no temperature. So I have eliminated niacin.

My circulation has gotten quite bad, especially at night when I have to refrain from even bending my elbow to keep my hands from tingling. How can I improve my blood circulation?

DEAR READER: From the sound of your letter, I surmise you are doing everything you can to maintain a healthful lifestyle by eating well and exercising as much as time allows. You don't indicate, however, whether you eat red meat, hot dogs, lots of cheese, sausage, cold cuts, pastries, whole milk and other foods

that could have "hidden" cholesterol. If you do, you might try to reduce some of those items.

The side effect you experienced from the niacin is a common one. The nonflushing version contains inositol that renders it ineffective for lowering levels in some people. The tip to taking the sustained-release form is to take an antihistamine 15 minutes before. Niacin should always be taken with food to avoid stomach upset. An initial dose should be no more than 250 milligrams daily with a gradual increase to 1,000 milligrams as long as no side effects are present. While difficult, this can be done by taking smaller doses two or four times each day.

Some people have found success by adding cinnamon to their daily diets. It can be used on toast, over cereal and in baking. Still others have used over-the-counter drugs with plant sterols and stanols.

Peripheral vascular disease (poor circulation) occurs when there is limited blood flow to the heart, extremities and other areas of the body. Blood vessels become blocked with a fatty tissue known as plaque.

Home remedies include quitting smoking, eating well, exercising regularly, wearing support hose and reducing stress through meditation, such as yoga. Supplements include vitamins B6, 12, C, E, niacin, magnesium and omega-3 oils. It appears you have done your homework and are taking positive steps already.

I might suggest you sit with your legs elevated, take warm baths or showers in the evening to improve circulation, and join a local fitness center.

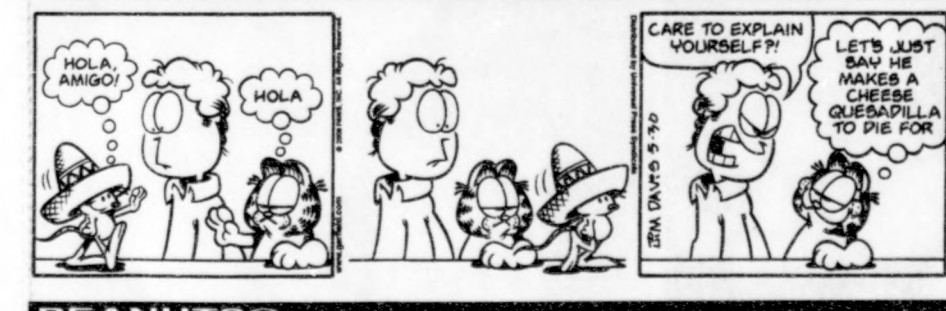

Actually, declarer is in an excellent position at trick two to visualize the scenario that will ultimately materialize — provided he has the presence of mind to duck West's ten-of-spades lead in both hands. All he has to do is think of it!

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### Power boats race in Kentucky, too



Power boats like this will race across Lake Cumberland in this first time ever event.

Horses aren't the only thing that race in Kentucky in May. Lake Cumberland will be the site of the Lake Cumberland Grand Prix on May 15-17. It will be the first race of its kind on Lake Cumberland, says Hilda Legg, coordinator for the event.

The boat races are part of an Off Shore Series much like N.A.S.C.A.R.

There will be an admission charge to get into the Race Village, near the pit crews. Food vendors and entertainment will be on hand.

"Some of the best viewing spots will be from the pleasure boats in the area," offered Legg. "But we expect to see a lot of people with lawn chairs sitting on the shoreline watching."

So far 30 boats in several classes are scheduled to race, and according to Legg the teams will begin arriving May 12 and 13. On Thursday, May 14 the boats will be on display in the Race Village. Saturday will be qualifying with the finals on Sunday.

For those who don't know, Lake Cumberland is one big lake. Its shoreline measures 1,255 miles, covers 65,530 acres, and has an average depth of 90 feet. The main portion of the lake measures 101 miles long and, at its widest point, is 1.5 miles across. From this it's easy to see why the area involved with the boat races won't impact anything else going on here.

The six mile, seven turn course will provide thousands of fans a rare opportunity to see

something on Lake Cumberland never seen before.

Fans will be able to get up close and personal with the boats and teams throughout the weekend," offered Ron Polli, president of the OSS organization. "We hope this race turns into an annual event."

Event organizers are quick to point out that it has taken a collaboration and support from the

Kentucky Sport Authority, local governments and tourism bureaus, as well as private businesses and individuals.

The racing boats will be on the water from noon to 4 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday. All times are central time.

So get up, get out, and get going.
