## Marcum: CCSO, KSP cooperating on bank robbery investigation

Kentucky State Police detectives and uniform troopers made a visit to the Calloway County Sheriff's Office this week to discuss several cases.

Calloway County Sheriff Bill Marcum said Thursday that one of the cases discussed was a bank robbery that happened in mid-July in Hazel.

"Really, it was just one of those things where we were comparing notes. We would ask, 'Well, what do you have that we don't have,' and they'd ask us the same thing. It's just cooperation between agencies," Marcum said.

"We are continuing to investigate this case, follow leads that develop and look at whatever information we can come up with involving this case," added Jay Thomas, public

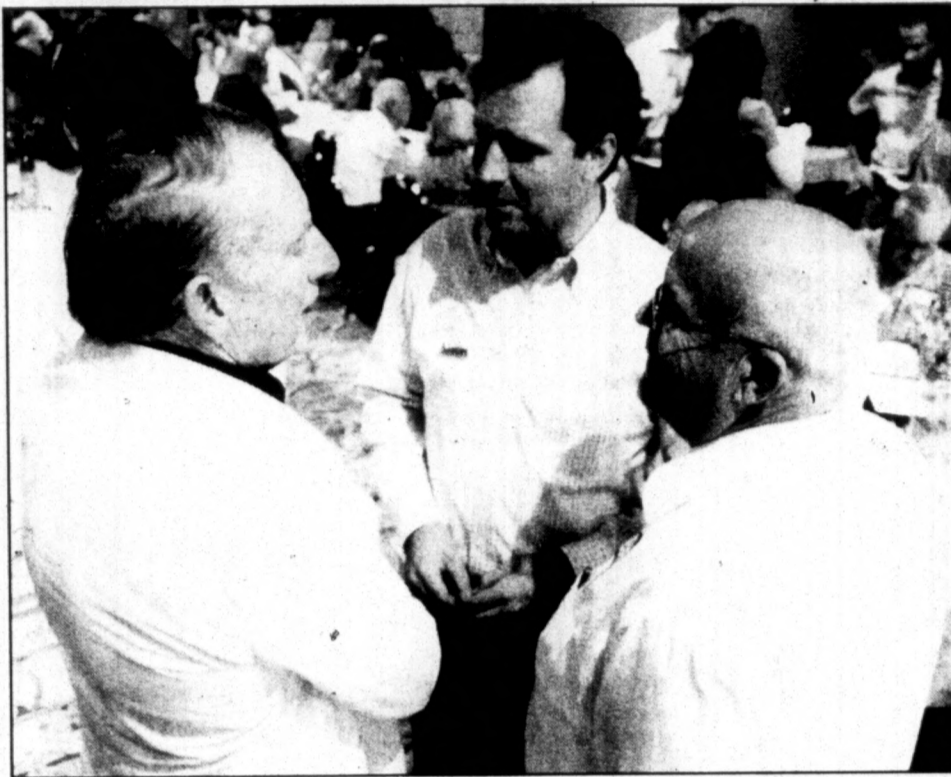

## MSU Arboretum takes big step for future

The Murray State University Arboretum was designed for much more than greenhouses and gardens.

Now, that idea is taking shape in the rear portion of the facility along the tree line of Sycamore Street. That is where work is ongoing to create a three-to-four-acre area of study that will include a fish-filled pond and a 25-foot hill that will open avenues of study previously not attainable.

"I guess you could say we have approached a plateau and now can pursue a new frontier," said Dr. Pat Williams, associate professor of Horticulture at MSU. "This just takes us beyond dealing with plants, though. Now we're going to be able to look

## TOP DOGS

### Murray park named one of the best in the state

Four years ago, a BMX bicycle park was converted into the first dog park in western Kentucky inside Murray-Calloway County Central Park.

With time, the Murray-Calloway County Dog Park has come to develop quite a reputation for being friendly for both pooches and their people. Now, the BringFido.com website has placed the Murray park in its annual top-10 of parks in the commonwealth of Kentucky.

"It's just another feather in the cap for Murray," said Linda Cherry, adoption and fundraising coordinator for the Lost But Loved Animal Rescue group based in Murray that undertook the construction of the park.

"We just felt people were ready for a dog park here in Murray and it's been great for the dogs, no question. What it's also become, though, is a people park, where you have people bring their dogs and find that they have similar interests and form friendships.

"We have a group that comes nearly every day, where they bring their dogs then sit in lawn chairs ... kind of like a mommies day out group. That has proven to be another way people utilize this park."

Cherry is particularly proud that the Murray park fell into a top 10 ranking that includes only two parks from west of Elizabethtown, the other being in Bowling Green. This, she said, validates the efforts of Lost But Loved in the days the park was being constructed.

at the future of our environment through studying wetlands and marshlands, things we haven't been able to offer before because we just didn't have it."

Matt Chadwick, Arboretum manager, said the project took shape in the summer of 2011 during a visit from Dr. David Slawson, a highly regarded landscape artist, who was in Murray as a guest lecturer. During his visit, Chadwick said Slawson, whose previous works include the garden at St. John's Episcopal Church and another in the center of the MSU Fine Arts complex, opened eyes with a drawing that detailed what such an addition would look like, along with expressing his thoughts of what it could mean for the program.

"We see the Arboretum (which operates under the flag of the MSU Hutson School of Agriculture) as a laboratory, and with this we're going to be able to simulate a swamp, essentially, complete with bald cypress and Tupelo trees."

Chadwick said, adding that plans had been for construction of the new additions to begin last summer. "It was just too dry, though. Now, this year, we've had the rains so progress has been kind of slow, but when work has been done, it's gone very quickly."

"Swift Environmental (of Kirksey) has donated all of the

earth work and they've been outstanding to work with so far."

Chadwick said, weather permitting, the pond — expected to range from six to as much as 15 feet in depth — may be filled with water in time for a grand opening of the pond and hill that is set for Sept. 5.

Kentucky Commissioner of Agriculture James Comer is scheduled to attend that event. He also said, eventually, the hill — being coined as a "mountain" by students and staff — is expected to feature waterfall and other features.

"I'm ready for this," said Megan Lawrence of Franklin, who will be a junior at MSU this upcoming year. "I'm anxious to see what kinds of things we are going to do around it. I've got to admit, though, I didn't expect a mountain. This is going to add a lot I think."

"I'm looking forward to seeing what goes around the pond, actually," said Xing Yang, a second-year graduate student from China.

Williams also said he hopes the hill and pond can be utilized by other departments on the campus to give them a chance to do studies closer to home.

"What's the saying from 'Field of Dreams'? If you build it, they will come?" Williams asked. "That's kind of what we see this doing."

Four dead in eastern Ky. shooting

JENKINS, Ky. (AP) - An eastern Kentucky coroner says a man fatally shot three people whom he suspected of theft and then turned the gun on himself.

Authorities found the four bodies early Friday morning in two different homes about a mile apart in the tiny community of Jenkins on the Kentucky-Virginia border.

Letcher County Coroner Marty Baker says 58-year-old Timothy Shelby used a Glock pistol. Killed

were 35-year-old Jennifer Walters, 25-year-old Joshua Wyatt and 31-year-old Amy Ratliff.

Baker says Shelby suspected the trio of stealing from him. Shelby and Walters lived together in a home on Oak Street, where Walters' body was found. Wyatt and Ratliff's bodies were found in a home on Ginseng Drive.

Police were called after two juveniles found a body around 2 a.m. on Friday morning.

Ky. Senate candidates to share stage at picnic

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell, up for re-election next year, will share a stage Saturday afternoon with his top challengers at the always raucous church picnic known for spicy barbecue and even spicier speeches.

The event - a holdover from the days before television, when politicians had to seek out crowds to solicit votes - draws thousands of people each year to the tiny western Kentucky community of Fancy Farm and is considered a must-attend for politicians.

It will provide voters the first side-by-side comparison of McConnell and his foes - Republican primary opponent Matt Bevin and Democratic front-runner Alison Lundergan Grimes - in a charged political climate with the candidates taking turns trying to shout their speeches over jeering hecklers.

"From a purely political standpoint, it's a test for candidates," said Greg Higdon, a former state senator who helps with the picnic, now in its 133rd year. "There have been some politicians who have handled it better than others. It's not easy. I know it's tough."

Two of the state's top Democrats - Gov.

Steve Beshear and Lt. Gov. Jerry Abramson - opted to skip the event this year, opening themselves to jabs from Republicans who stand ready to paint them as truants. Republican U.S. Sen. Rand Paul is skipping this year, too, and will likely be called out by Democrats.

McConnell has been facing attacks from both Bevin and Grimes, who each claim that he has lost touch with Kentucky and become an obstructionist in Washington. McConnell refutes those claims and touts his leadership position in the Senate as vital to Kentucky's interests, particularly in standing against Obama administration policies that he considers harmful to the state.

More than 10,000 people are expected to attend the picnic at St. Jerome Parish, many of whom stick around to see the politicians make their pitches from a wooden stage in an open pavilion. After the St. Jerome priest opens in prayer, the mudslinging, name-calling and heckling begin in earnest.

Fancy Farm traditionally has been the place where Kentucky candidates kick off their campaigns. Newspapers, television stations and other media from across the state converge at the event, making it important not just for front-runners, but also for lesser-known candidates who need to get

their messages out.

Mark Wilson, who organizes the political speeches, said church leaders have considered cracking down on hecklers in years past but opted not to because their banter adds to the flavor of the event.

"It's not Fancy Farm if we don't have the hoopla and the raucous atmosphere," Wilson said. "We leave it to the respective parties to try to tone it down, but, hey, that's Fancy Farm."

Though politics is the major draw, the Fancy Farm picnic actually is a fundraiser for the tiny Catholic church that serves a sparsely populated farming community. By Saturday night, the church will have raised about \$250,000, primarily from sales of picnic food, a vehicle raffle and bingo games.

Nearly every family in the parish helps out in some way, largely cooking and dishing out food that includes mainstays like pulled pork, fresh corn and green beans. It's a major undertaking, considering they barbecue some 9 tons of pork and mutton and slice a half-ton of homegrown tomatoes.

information officer for KSP Post 1 in Mayfield.

Marcum said his department, KSP and surrounding agencies continue gathering information into the robbery that occurred on July 16 at the BB&T branch at the intersection of U.S. 641 and Barnett Street. He did say that there was discussion at one time as to whether or not this robbery had a connection with one that happened early this year across the state line in Puryear, Tenn., but that seems to have faded.

"I had a discussion with (Henry County Sheriff Monte Belew) about that and we've come to the conclusion that these two incidents are not related," Marcum said, adding that the Puryear incident is now being seen as having a

possible connection with a recent armed robbery in Paducah.

The suspect in the Hazel crime is described as a black male standing between 6 feet and 6 feet 6 inches. He was carrying a handgun at the time of the robbery and did get away with an undetermined amount of money.

"We had four people, pretty much, to build this and it was work we did ourselves," Cherry remembered. "We did get some funding help from the city and our parks board, but we didn't want this to have things still being left undone."

"I remember two of our women (Laura Cherry and Penny Green) stretch the fence, and they had never even done anything like that before. Yet they dug the holes and got it done."

"I also remember one night we were working on the wheelchair

ramp and our park rangers turned on the lights of their cars to allow us to keep working. It was the contributions of many that allowed us to do this."

"It's a difference maker in our town, not unlike the Lions Club Community Skate Park or the pool, our ballfields, soccer fields or anything else in our parks," said Tab Brockman, superintendent of Murray-Calloway County Parks & Recreation. "We get a tremendous amount of use in that park and we are very honored to have the dog park recognized in the top 10 of the state."

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## US issues global travel alert, citing al-Qaida

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States issued a global travel alert Friday, citing an al-Qaida threat that also caused the State Department to close 21 embassies and consulates this weekend in the Muslim world.

The State Department warned American citizens of the potential for terrorism particularly in the Middle East and North Africa, with a possible attack occurring or coming from the Arabian Peninsula.

"Current information suggests that al-Qaida and affiliated organizations continue to plan terrorist attacks both in the region and beyond, and that they may focus efforts to conduct attacks in the period between now and the end of August," the statement said.

It urged American travelers to take extra precautions when traveling overseas and suggested they sign up for State Department alerts and register with U.S. consulates in the countries they are visiting.

The alert was posted a day after the U.S. announced it would close diplomatic facilities on Sunday because of an unspecified threat. Spokeswoman Marie Harf said the department acted out of an "abundance of caution" and that some missions may stay closed for longer than a day. Sunday is a business day in Muslim countries. The diplomatic offices affected stretch from Mauritania in northwest Africa to Afghanistan.

Rep. Ed Royce, R-Calif., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said Friday the embassy threat was linked to al-Qaida and focused on the Middle East and Central Asia.

"We've had a series of threats," Royce told reporters. "In this instance, we can take a step to better protect our personnel and, out of an abundance of caution, we should." He declined to say if

the National Security Agency's much-debated surveillance program helped reveal the threat.

Rep. C.A. Dutch Ruppersberger of Maryland, the top Democrat on the House Intelligence panel, also supported the department's decision to go public with its concerns.

"The most important thing we have to do is protect American lives," he said, describing the threat as "not the regular chit chat" picked up from would-be militants on the Internet or elsewhere.

The State Department issued a major warning last year informing American diplomatic facilities across the Muslim world about potential violence connected to the anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Dozens of American installations were besieged by protests over an anti-Islam video made by an American resident.

In Benghazi, Libya, the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans were killed when militants assaulted a diplomatic post, but the administration no longer says that attack was related to the demonstrations.

Friday's alert warned that al-Qaida or its allies may target U.S. government or private American interests. It cited dangers involved with public transportation systems and other prime sites for tourists, noting that previous terrorist attacks have centered on subway and rail networks as well as airplanes and boats.

"U.S. citizens should take every precaution to be aware of their surroundings and to adopt appropriate safety measures to protect themselves when traveling," the department said. It recommended American traveling overseas register with consular authorities on a travel registration website. The alert expires on Aug. 31.

## Police: Shooting apparently stemmed from road rage

SOMERSET, Ky. (AP) - Police in Somerset say a man has been injured in a shooting that apparently stemmed from a road rage incident.

Media report that 54-year-old Luster L. Rose of Parkers Lake was taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center after being shot multiple times Thursday night at a highway intersection.

Police say 23-year-old Troy A. McAninch of Stanford is charged with first-degree assault in the shooting. It was unclear whether he had an attorney.

Police say it appears that McAninch's wife, who was driving a pickup truck, pulled out in front of a tractor-trailer driven by Rose. The couple told officers they were being tail-gated by Rose, who at some point passed them. Police say Troy McAninch apparently became so mad at Rose's driving that he decided to confront him when both vehicles stopped at an intersection.

## Ellen DeGeneres to host Oscars

NEW YORK (AP) - Comic and daytime television host Ellen DeGeneres was picked to host the Academy Awards for the second time.

Show producers Craig Zadan and Neil Meron announced DeGeneres' selection Friday. The movie awards show will air on ABC on March 2.

"There are few stars today who have Ellen's gift for comedy, with her great warmth and humanity," the producers said in a statement. "She is beloved everywhere."

DeGeneres quipped, "I am so excited to be hosting the Oscars for the second time. You know what they say - the third time's the charm."

Last year's host, "Family Guy" creator Seth MacFarlane, drew mixed reviews for an edgy performance that included a song-and-dance number, "We Saw Your Boobs," about actresses who had gone topless on screen. He had already taken himself out of the running for a return engagement next year.

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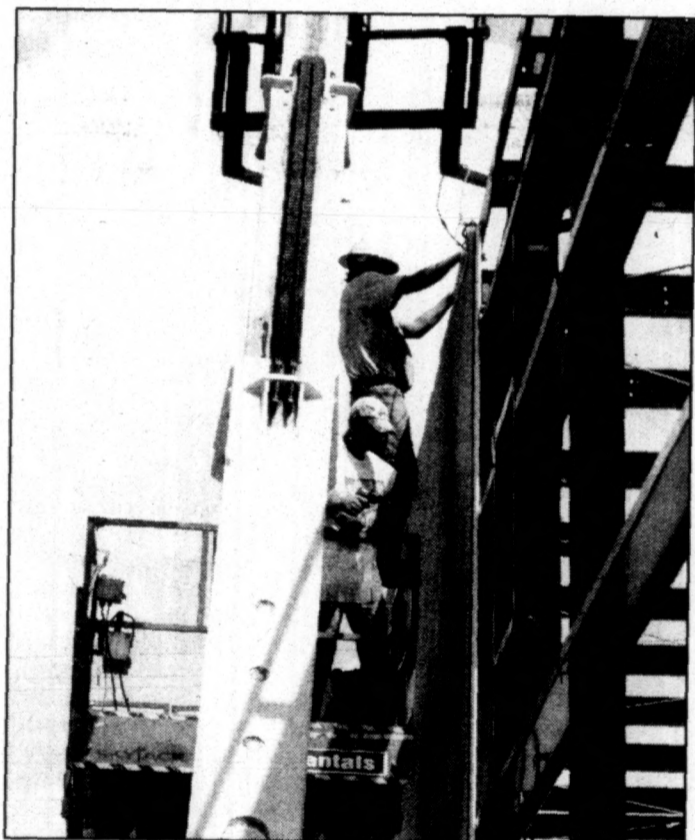

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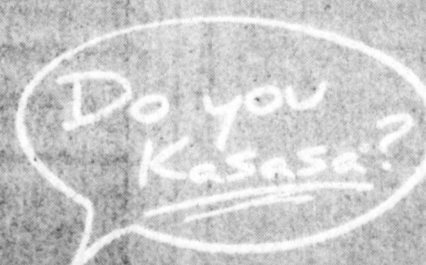

After months of uncertainty and debate regarding the number of county-zoned students who would be allowed to attend city schools, our community finally has an answer.

In a 62-page ruling from the Kentucky education commissioner's office, it was determined that the Bowling Green Independent School District will get to keep 86 county-zoned students lost to a student cap set April 18 by Warren County Public Schools.

The ruling has several parts, setting the rules for the 2013-14 school year and future school years. It also calls for the districts to attempt to come to an agreement similar to the 2001 deal struck between the districts' superintendents regarding county-zoned students.

The finding increases the WCPS student cap to 750 from 664. The cap does not include 100 students who have one or more parents working in the city school district, who are covered under a new state law. In addition to the current cap for the upcoming school year, the 750 cap also applies for the 2014-15 school year.

The ruling also stated that the 2001 agreement's predictability helps parents' decisions when it came to their children's futures.

These are valid points in a common-sense decision on a very controversial issue, which is not final until Education

Bowling Green and Warren County are fortunate to have two outstanding school systems and some measure of school choice should encourage both systems to be the best they can be.

Too much division has occurred in our community since April. Let's move on and focus on what really matters - the kids and their education.

It has been a month since the U.S. House, including all of Kentucky's Republicans, abandoned a 40-year practice by dropping food stamps from the farm bill.

Despite assurances from the Republicans who control the House that they would consider reauthorizing the nutrition program before it runs out in October, a conference committee with the Senate has yet to materialize.

While Congress dithers, the

food security of millions of Americans and 800,000 Kentuckians is in jeopardy.

Even Rep. Hal Rogers, who represents the nation's second-poorest district, where one in three households depend on food stamps, voted for a farm bill without the nutrition assistance program.

Unbelievably, after the vote, Rogers said, "I didn't think it will have an adverse impact on my district."

Food stamps are especially crucial to the young and old. Of the 32 percent of households in Rogers' district that receive them, a quarter include at least one person older than 60; half include at least one child.

Of the 800,000 Kentuckians enrolled in the program, 60 percent live below the federal poverty line - an income of \$22,000 for a family of four.

The average food stamp benefit is a whopping \$134 a month.

While House Republicans created more uncertainty for the poor, they fattened agriculture subsidies, the vast majority of which go to the largest operations. House Republicans even did away with a limit approved by the Senate on federal farm aid to people making more than \$750,000 a year.

All five of Kentucky's Republicans - Reps. Ed Whitfield, Brett Guthrie, Thomas Massie, Andy Barr and Rogers - put lucrative subsidies for Big Agriculture above feeding their needy constituents. Kentucky's lone Democrat, John Yarmuth of Louisville, opposed the bill.

Kentuckians who depend on food stamps are not the high-flying, check-drawing caricatures that politicians invoke to justify drastic cuts in federal spending.

They have been left marooned, through no fault of their own, by a changing economy, or they are too young or too old to work.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has said that 92 percent of food stamp recipients are seniors, children, disabled or working adults.

Reauthorizing the program, without spiteful, draconian cuts, should be the House's top priority. Failure to do so would quite literally take food from the mouths of hungry children.

Kentucky got some welcome news this month when it comes to humane treatment of children who need compassion and help instead of a jail sentence.

Goaded by advocacy groups, many judges and most juvenile corrections officials, judges have significantly cut the numbers of youths they send to jail for minor "status offenses" - behavior that would not be an offense for an adult - such as missing school or running away from home.

Kentucky Youth Advocates has been at the forefront of the effort to educate lawmakers and public and deserves much credit for tracking statistics and presenting a compelling case for Kentucky's need to change its dismal performance.

In recent years, Kentucky has been one of the top states in the nation for jailing such youths, despite Federal laws that discourage the practice. The Courier-Journal reported in 2011 that Kentucky had the second highest-rate in the nation among states for using jail as punishment for such youths.

It currently ranks fourth. Clarence Williams, director of Jefferson County's detention center, opposes the practice. So does Kentucky Juvenile Justice Commissioner Hasan Davis, who runs the state's network of regional juvenile detention centers.

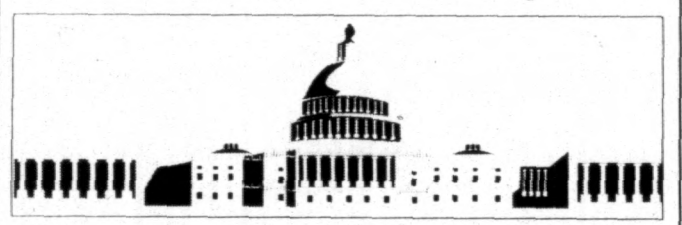
Typically, youths run away or become truant because of emotional problems, abuse, neglect, bullying, homelessness or other social ills. Treating a status offense as criminal behavior does nothing to solve the problem - and nothing to help youths who may be in desperate need of help from a caring adult.

But if that's not reason enough for some officials who believe jail serves as a "wake up call," they need to consider the bottom line. Jailing youths is expensive - about \$2 million a year compared to much cheaper options such as supervision at home.

The decline in jailing status offenders is impressive but local communities, judges and school officials need to work even harder to identify and resolve problems - such as multiple absences from school.

More pressure lies ahead by the fall of 2017 when the age at which students can drop out of school changes from 16 to 18, under a recent change in state law.

Every school system in Kentucky must be ready to figure how to keep students in school. We already know jailing them isn't the answer.

#### Gannett cuts jobs, won't say how many

MCLEAN, Va. (AP) — Gannett said Friday that it is eliminating an unspecified number of jobs in its newspaper division.

Jeremy Gains, a spokesman for the McLean, Va.-based company declined to say where the cuts are taking place. He said the newspapers are making the cuts to bring their business plans in line with local market conditions.

McLean, Va.-based Gannett is the country's largest publisher of newspapers by circulation. It publishes USA Today, the No. 3 newspaper in the U.S. by circulation, and operates television stations.

Jim Hopkins, who publishes Gannett Blog, an independent blog about the company, estimates that over 200 jobs across at least 37 workites have been eliminated so far. Hopkins, a former editor and reporter at USA Today, said the figures are based on information contributed by Gannett workers.

According to the blog, the newspapers making the most cuts include the Ashbury Park Press in New Jersey, The Burlington Free Press in Vermont, The Arizona Republic in Phoenix and The Courier-Journal in Louisville, Ky. No job cuts were reported for USA Today, but the newspaper has cut jobs as recently as 2010.

Like other newspaper publishers, Gannett has faced declines in print advertising and subscription revenue. Recently, the company has been shifting its focus toward television stations.

In June, Gannett announced plans to buy Belo Corp. and its 20 television stations for about \$1.5 billion in cash. The deal is expected to close by the end of the year. The move will nearly double Gannett's portfolio of stations from 23 to 43. The company's stations will reach nearly one-third of U.S. households.

#### Conway threatens lawsuit over Paducah plant cleanup

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky Attorney General Jack Conway is threatening to sue the federal government if its cleanup of a uranium enrichment plant in western Kentucky falls behind schedule.

The state's top political leaders are urging the U.S. Department of Energy to follow through on cleaning up the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant and finding a new plant operator.

USEC Inc. leases the plant from DOE. USEC has

announced it is ceasing operations and laying off most of the plant's approximately 1,100 workers.

Conway warned Friday he'll take "whatever action is necessary" to ensure DOE lives up to its cleanup obligations, including a lawsuit.

Gov. Steve Beshear, Sens. Mitch McConnell and Rand Paul and Rep. Ed Whitfield also are pushing DOE on the cleanup and the search for a new plant operator.

#### Lawyer: Snowden has a place to live in Russia

MOSCOW (AP) - National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden has a place to live in Russia after being granted temporary asylum, but he still hasn't decided what he wants to do next, his lawyer said Friday. The big question may be how much choice he actually has.

Russia granted a year of asylum to Snowden on Thursday, allowing him to quietly slip out of the Moscow airport where he had been holed up for almost six weeks as he evades charges of espionage in the United States. Authorities have suggested he will have wide freedom to work, but Kremlin watchers believe his moves are likely being closely controlled by Russian intelligence.

Snowden "is in a safe place," but the location will remain secret out of concern for his security, his lawyer, Anatoly Kucherena, told Russian news agencies. The systems analyst who revealed him-

self as the source of reports in the Guardian newspaper of a vast U.S. Internet surveillance program needs time after his ordeal in airport limbo to figure out his next steps.

He was seen only once in his weeks in the transit zone of the Sheremetyevo airport. Despite troops of photographers and reporters camped out inside and outside the airport, no one apparently saw him leaving, except for someone who snapped a photo of Kucherena talking to blurry figures who the attorney later said were Snowden and Sarah Harrison, a WikiLeaks staffer who has been advising him.

Kucherena said he expects Snowden to speak to journalists soon. "As soon as he decides what he will do, I hope he will announce it himself," the ITAR-Tass news agency quoted the lawyer as saying.

#### Former Ohio captive says she knew she'd escape

CLEVELAND (AP) - Free and safe, one of three women kidnapped and raped over a decade in a ramshackle home smiled lightly as her tormentor was led out of court in chains, a method he had used to control them.

Michelle Knight, the first of the victims kidnapped after accepting a ride from Ariel Castro, spoke in a soft but determined voice Thursday in front of a judge who followed a plea deal and gave Castro life in prison without parole plus 1,000 years.

"We said we'll all get out alive someday, and we did," Knight said.

"You took 11 years of my life away, and I have got it back," she said in the hushed courtroom. "I spent 11 years in hell. Now your hell is just beginning."

Knight, who spoke just a few feet from Castro in the courtroom, finished her statement and returned to her seat without looking at him.

Earlier, he had tried to make eye contact, but deputies quickly stepped into his line of vision.

Knight, 32, belittled Castro's routine of going to church and returning to abuse the women in the darkened Cleveland home, which was equipped with chains, locked doors and windows boarded up from the inside.

"What does God think of you hypocritically going to church each Sunday and then coming home to torture us?" she said. "The death penalty would be the easy way out. You don't deserve that. We want you to spend the rest of your life in prison."

Castro, a 53-year-old former school bus driver, pleaded guilty last week to 937 counts including aggravated murder, kidnapping, rape and assault. A deal struck with prosecutors spared him from a possible death sentence for beating and starving Knight until she miscarried.

##### Feeding America announces fundraiser

ELIZABETHTOWN, Ky. (AP) — Feeding America, Kentucky's Heartland is hoping people will want to have their picture associated with being part of the solution to hunger.

The News-Enterprise reports the Elizabethtown office of the nonprofit agency has begun a capital fundraising campaign called "Picture Yourself Solving Hunger."

The agency says it hopes to raise enough money — about \$10,000 — to purchase a new truck to make food deliveries. It has 200 food distribution points in 42 counties in central, south-central and western parts of the state.

The organization says people can send in pictures they take of themselves along with at least a \$10 donation and their face will be included on a mural forming a larger photo on the side of the vehicle.

##### Martin County keeps high school closed

INEZ, Ky. (AP) — Education officials in Martin County have decided to keep the county's only high school building closed because of nearby blasting.

The blasts from a construction site have caused cracks in the walls and floors of Sheldon Clark High School to widen. WYMT-TV in Hazard reported the school board voted Thursday night to move classes and keep the county's only high school shuttered this academic year.

The high school students will have classes at Inez Middle School. The middle school students from Inez will be consolidated with those at Warfield Middle School.

The board moved back the start of the school year to August 21 to make the classroom adjustments.

##### Driver killed when SUV crashes

SHELBYVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A man trying to outrun police has been killed when his sport utility vehicle crashed central Kentucky.

Kentucky State Police said the Shelby County Sheriff's Office got a 911 call about a driver in red Chevrolet Blazer driving recklessly on I-64 shortly before 4 a.m. Friday. The county requested help from the KSP. Troopers said the SUV reached speeds of over 100 mph as police chased it.

The driver got off the interstate onto Ky. 148. After about 8 miles, the SUV ran off a curve and struck trees, throwing the driver from the vehicle. The SUV overturned and burned.

The driver was identified as 29-year-old Marcus A. Slone of Brandenburg. He was pronounced dead by the Shelby County coroner.

##### Three airports getting federal funding

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Three Kentucky airports are sharing more than \$1 million in federal grants.

The grants will go to the Fleming-Mason Airport in Flemingsburg, the Marion-Crittenden County Airport and Frankfort's Capitol City Airport.

The money was awarded by the Federal Aviation Administration, and it will cover a large percentage of the project costs.

The Flemingsburg airport is receiving \$518,576 for property acquisition near a runway. The Marion-Crittenden County Airport will get about \$500,000 for construction of a 10-unit hangar and Frankfort's airport is getting \$100,000 to conduct a wildlife hazard assessment.

##### General: Budget cuts could hit Army hard

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. (AP) — A top-ranking Army official says a proposed \$50 billion budget cut in 2014 would leave the armed forces with tricky choices about how to balance manpower and modernization.

Army Vice Chief of Staff Gen. John F. Campbell says military leaders are trying to juggle personnel requirements with the ability to keep equipment and training up to date. Failing to make those choices correctly, Campbell says, runs the risk of leaving "a hollow force." Campbell made his remarks Thursday at Fort Campbell.

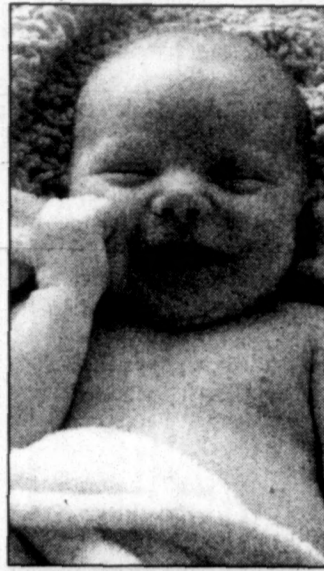

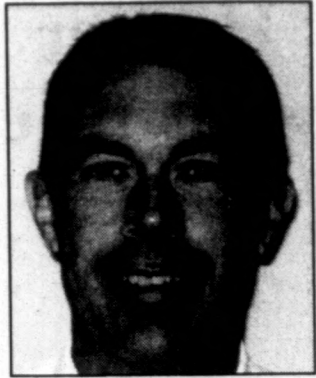

## HopFed Bancorp reports second quarter results

HOPKINSVILLE - HopFed Bancorp, Inc. (NASDAQ: HFBC), the holding company for Heritage Bank USA, Inc. has reported results for the three and six-month periods ended June 30.

For the three-month period ended June 30, the company's net income available to common shareholders was \$1.2 million, or \$0.16 per share, basic and diluted, compared to net income available to common shareholders of \$903,000, or \$0.12 per share basic and diluted, for the three month period ended June 30, 2012.

For the six-month period ended June 30, the company's net income available to common shareholders was \$2.2 million, or \$0.29 per share,

basic and diluted, compared to a net income attributable to common shareholders of \$1.4 million, or \$0.18 per share basic and diluted, for the six-month period ended June 30, 2012.

John E. Peck, president/CEO, said operating results improved modestly during the three-month period ended June 30 as compared to the three-month period ended March 31 due to an increase in gains on the sales of securities, an increase in the amount of service charge income and an increase in the amount of financial services commissions.

The company continues to carefully control non-interest expenses, as linked quarter operating expenses declined by \$150,000 and total operating

## Tiger running away

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Tiger Woods had a shot at making history with a magical 59. He swore he wasn't disappointed to come up short.

"Disappointed? Absolutely not," he said. Then he cracked, "A 61's pretty good. I'm not bummed."

Like a pitcher having to settle for a shutout instead of a perfect game, Woods could console himself by tying his career best and building a seven-shot lead Friday through 36 holes at the Bridgestone Invitational.

Pursuing his eighth victory at Firestone Country Club, Woods opened birdie-eagle — stuffing an approach to 3 feet at the first hole and holing a 20-footer for 3 at the par-5 second. He had two more birdies on the front nine, and had four in a row to start the back nine in a light rain.

Needing to go only 2 under over his last five holes, he missed birdie putts inside 10 feet at 15 and 17. He saved par on the last with a 25-footer after an errant drive and a shot that hit into the trees and ended up in a bare spot short and right of the green.

"How about just pleased?" he said, when asked to rate the round. "I'm very happy I was able to post that. I just kept thinking, whatever lead I had, 'Let's just keep increasing it.' It's at seven now, I believe. So that's not too bad after two days."

The 61 — matching his career best at the 1999 Byron Nelson, 2005 Buick Open and on the same Firestone course back in 2000 — left him at 13-under 127.

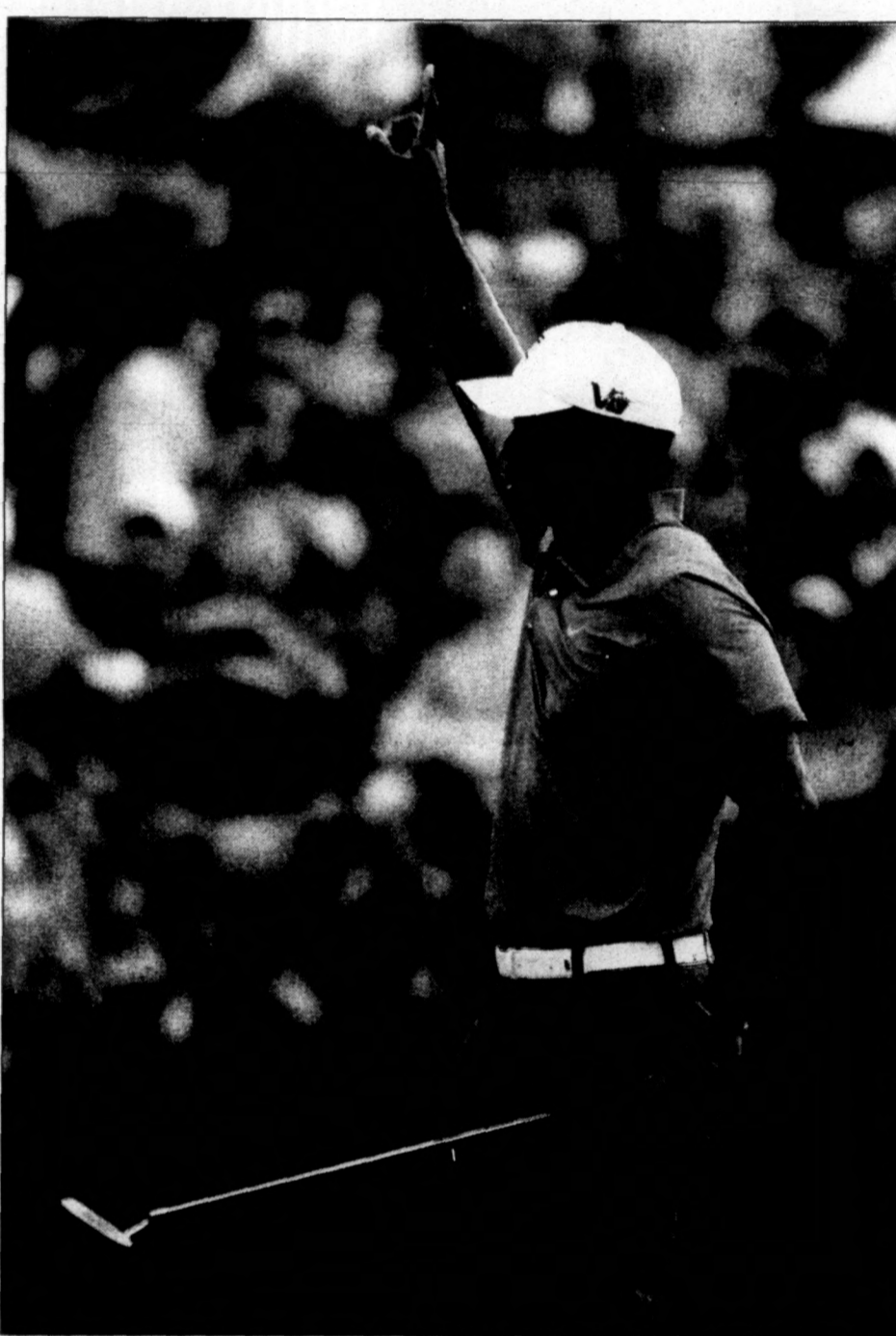
Defending champion Keegan Bradley and Chris Wood, playing the tournament for the first time, were tied for second. They each shot 68.

Bradley finished well before Woods, but was asked if it was disheartening to take the lead and then have Woods retake it after the opening two holes.

"Tiger, those first couple holes out there are definitely birdie holes, so I'd expect him to do that," Bradley said. "You know, I hope he doesn't go too low."

Sorry, Keegan. Woods, a four-time winner this year.

## Dyer chooses Cardinals for next football stop

"I am ready to start a new chapter in my life," Dyer said in the statement. "I have learned from my past and feel that Louisville is the best place to play the second half of my collegiate career."

Louisville and coach Charlie Strong cannot confirm Dyer's decision or comment on the 2011 BCS championship game MVP until he has officially enrolled. He has not played since 2011 and will be eligible immediately.

## Titans' Britt feels healthy like it's 2011

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Kenny Britt feels like it's 2011 all over again, and the Tennessee receiver is leaping for catches and looking like the player who dominated defenses catching lots of balls that season.

"I'm feeling back to my old self, not weighing 230 that I was last year lifting weights," Britt said. "I'm out there running routes and making catches and making plays because I'm not worried about my injuries. I'm more focused on the moment of catching the ball."

Britt certainly needs to be in the final year of his rookie contract.

That Britt feels healthy is exactly what the Titans and coach Mike Munchak want to hear, even as they watch his work giving him a day off here and there during training camp. Munchak said they can see the difference in Britt not worrying about anything anymore.

"He's not worried about my left knee, my right knee, understanding the offense," Munchak

said. "Those things are out of his mind and he's just playing now. This is when we saw him, at his best, when he came into the league with us. Hopefully it'll make a big difference this year."

The 6-foot-3, 223-pound Britt led Tennessee with 1,476 yards receiving in his first two seasons and tied for the team lead with 12 touchdowns. When the 2011 season started, Britt looked like he had blossomed into the dominant receiver the Titans wanted after drafting him in the first round out of Rutgers in 2009.

Unfortunately, Britt tore his right ACL and MCL in the third game of 2011, ending his season after catching 17 passes for 289 yards and three touchdowns. That led to three knee surgeries over the next nine months, the last on his left knee after continued swelling.

Britt played 14 games last season despite having to ice his aching and swollen knees. He still caught 45 passes for 589 yards — well short of the 80-yard receptions he turned in in 2010 and 2011.

The receiver spent the offsea-

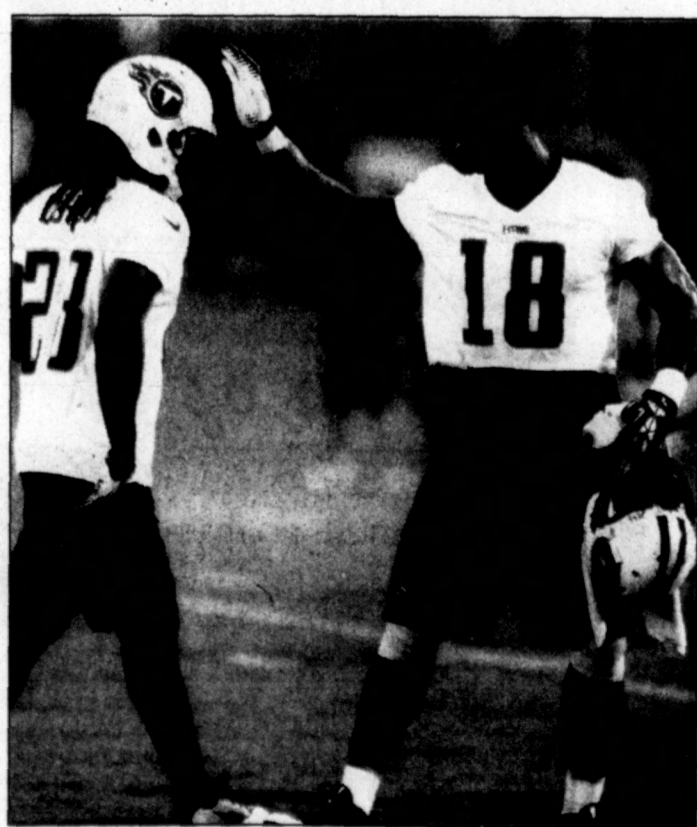
son building back his legs, working in Florida and California. He also stayed away from his old home in New Jersey where he has had more than a few incidents with police. But Britt finally got the confidence he so needed that his knee issues finally were behind him once he stepped onto a basketball court.

Britt went one-on-one and even teamed up with his wife for a three-on-three game. Winning all three games he played did wonders for his confidence.

"You have an injury like that it's hard to play basketball because it's more of a stop and go game," Britt said. "Once I got out there on the basketball court, my knees felt good and I played a couple games. Just coming back to camp the first day, I felt great. I actually felt back to myself."

The Titans are seeing the results so far in camp. Britt didn't make a catch Thursday in practice only to come back and make a leaping grab for the ball even with safety Michael Griffin and cornerback Alterraun Verner defending him. Britt is the only receiver being kept only at one

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# Fall seasons getting ready to roll

On August 17, two weekends away, the fall squirrel season will begin in Kentucky. This fall season is important for several reasons because nearly all hunters can trace their love for hunting back to an early morning in the squirrel woods, hunting squirrels in the early fall helps hone the hunting instincts, and because the opening of squirrel season marks the beginning for the progression of fall and winter seasons.

For early season squirrel hunters, the best bet is to get into the woods right away to locate particular trees where squirrels are feeding. Because of last year's drought conditions, some mast producing trees like oaks and hickories may not be very productive this year. Other trees may be loaded with acorns and hickory nuts. That's why the prospective hunter needs to cruise the woods right now, to find those "special" trees.

For those new to the sport of squirrel hunting or those who just like to enjoy nature to the fullest, there are tell-tale signs that squir-

rels are in the area. Early mornings are the best time to find the bushy-tailed rodents as they tend to be active at sunrise. Squirrels move through the treetops by jumping from limb to limb which produces quite a bit of motion in the canopy and also a swishing sound as the limbs and leaves are disturbed. Look for motion in the treetops in otherwise quiet woods in the still of the morning.

As squirrels feed, they gnaw on the tough outer layers of acorns and hickory nuts which produces a raspy, grinding sound that is easily heard, especially on quiet mornings. As the squirrels gnaw away, they produce "cuttings" that fall from the treetops though the leaves with a sound not unlike raindrops. When they have finished with a large acorn or hickory nut, they will drop the nut to the ground with a resounding "thud."

During the middle of the day when squirrels are not as active, look for the scattered "cuttings" underneath nut-producing trees. Fresh cuttings will have a bright appearance. Squirrels like to find a favorite limb or fork in a treetop where they will sit and gnaw all

morning resulting in a pile of cuttings at the base of the tree.

The firepower needed for squirrel hunting is rather simple. Any shotgun from the diminutive .410 to the big twelve gauge will suffice. Use shells with number 5 or 6 sized shot for best results. Additionally, a modified or full choke is typically used, especially when hunting in the tall trees. Many hunters have graduated from shotguns to rimfire rifles like the .22 or the .17 calibers. For the .22 caliber, use hollow-point bullets which tend to perform better than the solid bullets.

As I've mentioned before, .22 caliber rounds are in short supply for some reason or the other this year. If you are going to need to buy ammo for opening day or even beyond, I'd make every effort to locate someone who has rounds to sell as soon as possible.

On the fishing front, son-in-law Chip and I ventured onto Kentucky Lake last weekend in the big Triton to try our luck at catching bass. Our first stop was a point jutting out into the bay where we were fishing. Not much happened until we trolled around to the west side of the point where

Chip immediately boated a couple of two-pounders. I finally connected with a similar fish and we were off to the races.

Moving from point to point, we continued to find bass on the west sides of the points — thirteen in all ranging from a pound to two pounds. I was throwing a six-inch purple worm while Chip was working some kind of lizard looking contraption. Once we got into the areas where the fish were feeding, the bass would slam the lure almost as soon as it hit the water. It was a great morning of fishing — and all of the fish were returned to the lake relatively unharmed.

Time is flying by and the bulk of the fall seasons will be upon us before we know it. Now is the time to get out in the woods for a little preparation that will pay dividends on opening day. Don't forget the deer, either. Now is the time of year to keep salt available for the deer — a good ol' 50 pound block of cattle salt works as well as anything. Have fun in the woods and by all means, spray for ticks!

Louisville is coming off an 11-2 season that ended with a Sugar Bowl victory against Florida. The Cardinals have already been picked as the overwhelming favorites to win the American Athletic Conference and have star quarterback Teddy Bridgewater leading the offense.

Adding Dyer could give a huge boost Louisville's running game. The Cardinals averaged only 122 yards per game on the ground last season and the top two tailbacks on their depth chart — Senorise Perry and Dominique Brown — are both coming off knee injuries.

"I thank God for Coach Strong's belief in me," Dyer added. "I am not going to let him down."

Dyer, who attended high

school in Little Rock, ran for more than 1,000 yards in each of his two seasons at Auburn, but left the school after the 2011 season and transferred to Arkansas State.

He never played for Arkansas State after getting suspended after a run-in with the law, though he was never charged with a crime. Dyer was cited for speeding and a handgun was improperly confiscated from the car by a state trooper.

Hill said Dyer had no issues at Arkansas Baptist, where he earned an associate's degree.

"We hold everybody accountable, not just Michael," Hill said of the school's policy, "but we try to be a support system to help them move on and become responsible husbands, fathers and community leaders."

position, while the others are busy learning all receiver responsibilities in this offense.

Offensive coordinator Dowell Loggains said he keeps asking Britt how young he feels with the receiver saying he feels young.

"I say, 'Well you should feel young. You're 24 years old,'"

Loggains said Friday. "But he's done a nice job. He had one drop yesterday, comes back makes a big play with two guys hanging on him, and that's what we expect. And that's what we need from him."

A healthy Britt also can only help Jake Locker, though Britt said the Titans' other receivers are so good that opponents will not be able to double-team him.

If Britt breaks through with the kind of season they've expected from him, he'll be in line either for the Titans to tag him as their franchise player or a big money deal from another team. Tennessee has tried to protect against both injury and losing Britt to another team by drafting Kendall Wright in the first round a year ago and Justin Hunter in the second round in April.

Veteran safety Bernard Pollard, who signed with Tennessee in March, jokes often with Britt on the field. Pollard said he sees a gifted player just working hard.

"You put the ball in his hands, he's a playmaker," Pollard said.

The Titans can't wait to see that in the regular season.

needed only 22 putts, eight fewer than he had Thursday in an opening 66. He hit 10 of 14 fairways and was on in regulation on 16 of 18 greens.

The next best score on a threatening day with a slate-gray sky and precipitation was a 66.

It seemed every fan on the course took notice as Woods started stacking up birdies. The magic number 59 — shot five times on the PGA Tour — dominated conversations.

"Oh, they were excited," Woods said. "You could hear it more than feel it. You definitely could hear it. They were into it."

Asked if that kind of electricity helps out a player, he joked, "It's nice to be playing in front of people who are excited like that, especially people who aren't yelling just because your ball gets in the air. You know, we are pros."

How good were things going for him? He yanked a drive into the trees at 13, but it ricocheted into the middle of the fairway. From there he hit an iron to 15 feet and drilled the putt.

At the 14th, Woods hit his drive on the other side of the cart path beneath a canopy of huge

trees to the right. He was forced to hit a low, hard, slicing shot to the green that ran to the back fringe. From there, he chipped 10 feet past but rolled in the par putt.

The gallery seemed to swell with each hole, the crowds growing in hopes of seeing history.

He stepped off his shot into the 216-yard, par-3 15th because he was bothered by a bug, then hit an iron 10 feet short of the pin. After playing partner Hideki Matsuyama of Japan putted out, Woods missed his birdie putt on the right side.

The 667-yard 16th, dubbed "The Monster" by Arnold Palmer, resulted in another par. Woods hit a long drive that dribbled into the first cut of rough on the left side of the fairway, then laid up to about 100 yards. His wedge carried too far, however, spinning back to 30 feet. With a light sprinkle turning into a steady drizzle, he two-putted, leaving the birdie attempt short and right of the hole by 2 feet.

A huge throng, several deep around the lengthy hole, responded with polite applause as he tapped in.

He still had a chance for a 59.

He hit a long drive along the left side at 17, but misread a 7-footer for birdie that missed on the low side of the break.

"I had opportunities to make putts there at 15 and 17," he said.

With the rain now falling hard, and Woods needing to hole his second shot on the par-4 18th for a 59, he drove far to the right on the slight dogleg to the left. He muscled a shot out of a difficult lie to a bare spot near a huge scoreboard right and short of the green. From there, he chipped to the back fringe — and made the 25-footer coming back for par.

He pumped his fist as the crowd roared.

Matsuyama, a 21-year-old who was sixth at the British Open, got a close-up view.

"It was great looking at great play at the top of the world," he said.

The last player to shoot 59 in a PGA Tour event was Stuart Appleby in the final round of the Greenbrier Classic in 2010. Al Geiberger was the first in 1977, and Chip Beck, David Duval and Paul Goydos also accomplished the feat.

Bill Haas shot a 68 and was tied for fourth at 5 under with

Henrik Stenson, who had a 70. Jim Furyk, Luke Donald, Jason Duffner and Bubba Watson were 4 under.

There have been 27 rounds of 60 in tour events, including Phil Mickelson this year in the Phoenix Open.

In a remarkable career spent in the spotlight, a 59 would have been just another check mark on Woods' to-do list. Instead, he didn't think it was even anything special.

"(One of my) top 10 rounds," he said, repeating the question. "I don't know about that."

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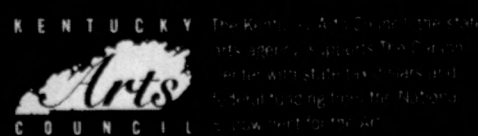

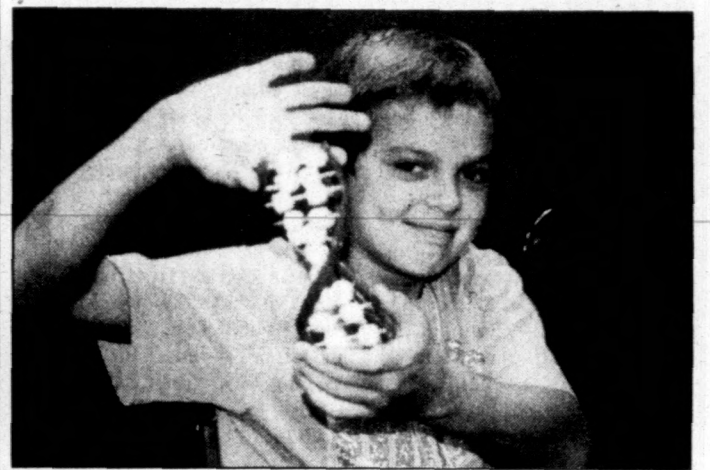

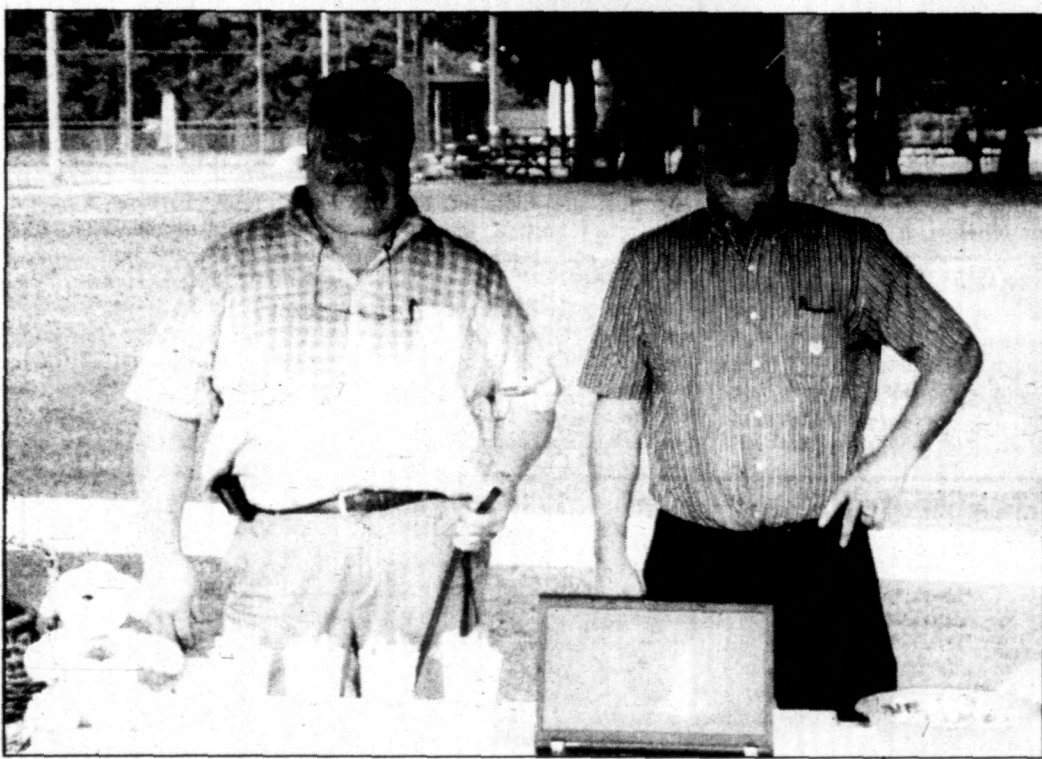

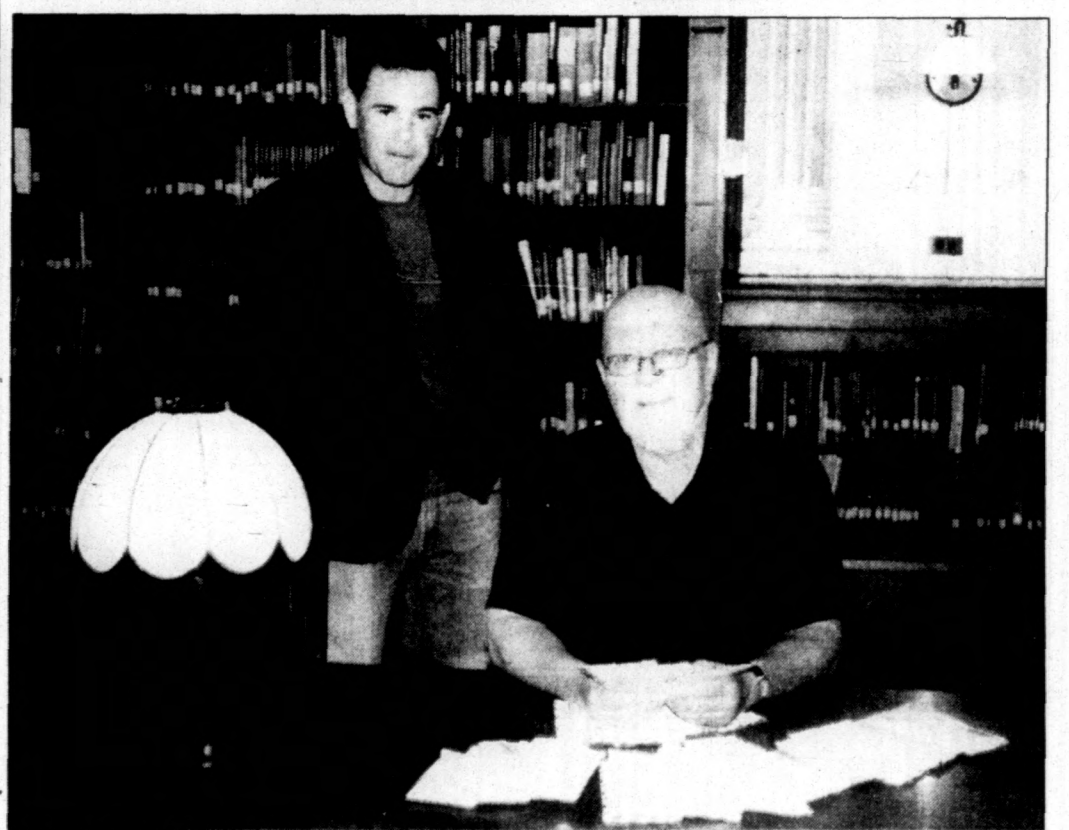

**Teen bemoans the influence boyfriend has on her mother**

**DEAR ABBY:** I am a 17-year-old girl who lives with my mother and my mother's boyfriend. This man has changed my world, and not for the better. The one person I ever cared about has practically turned against me.

My mom tried killing herself for this man and chose him over me after she was released from the institution. I have been diagnosed with depression and have also tried to kill myself. I also have a habit of cutting myself.

I stopped, but lately I have been wanting to start again. The only thing that has held me back is her threats of committing me to an institution.

She threatened my boyfriend with the police if he ever spoke to me again after we broke up. When I confronted her, she insisted that she was right and someday I'd understand. She has turned into this person I hardly know, and it's because of her boyfriend's influence. Before, when she was upset she would just not talk to me, but now she calls me the most horrid things and won't apologize unless someone besides me tells her.

I feel so alone. I honestly do want to kill myself, but I haven't because I know it isn't the right thing to do, even if it may seem right. I have tried talking to her. She won't listen to me. What should I do? -- HOPELESS AND ALONE IN FLORIDA

**DEAR HOPELESS AND ALONE:** Because you honestly do want to harm yourself, contact the doctor who diagnosed you with depression. However, if this is about your mother breaking up your romance by threatening to

involve the police, you need to understand that the tactic wouldn't have worked unless he had something to fear.

The level of conflict in your home is not healthy. If you are still in school, discuss this with a trusted teacher or counselor.

**DEAR ABBY:** I hate funerals. My grandfather died when I was 6, and one of my relatives held me over the casket and made me kiss his cold, dead face. It terrified me, and it's all I can remember of my grandfather. I force myself to recall any of the good times we had together, but that event still taints the good memory.

Since then, every funeral I have been to has had the same poisoning effect. Funerals are for the living, and I understand that many people feel the need for closure and the sharing of grief to begin healing. But I need to keep my grief and my faith private in order to heal.

I'm sure some people think my not showing up at a service is a sign of disrespect or just not caring. Nothing could be further from the truth. I prefer to remember the good times with the loved one, not the passing. My way of honoring that person is to keep my happy memories untainted.

Am I wrong? Selfish or lazy? Weird or crazy? Please let me know because at my age I'm sure more of these events will happen. -- KEEPING MY DISTANCE IN WASHINGTON STATE

**DEAR KEEPING YOUR DISTANCE:** You are none of the above. People grieve in different ways. An appropriate way to express your respect for the deceased and your support for the survivors would be to write a condolence letter expressing those feelings and sharing a happy memory with the grieving widow, widower or child. No rule of etiquette demands that you show up to a funeral -- unless it happens to be your own.

**Gestational diabetes requires careful monitoring**

**DEAR DOCTOR K:** I was just diagnosed with gestational diabetes. What are the risks to my baby? And what do I need to do to keep her safe?

**DEAR READER:** Gestational diabetes is high blood sugar that occurs during pregnancy. Normally, the hormone insulin moves sugar (glucose) from the bloodstream into cells that use it for fuel. In gestational diabetes, hormones produced during pregnancy make the body resistant to insulin's effects.

In most pregnant women, the pancreas produces extra insulin to overcome the insulin resistance. In women with gestational diabetes, the pancreas does not produce enough extra insulin. As a result, sugar accumulates in the bloodstream.

If your gestational diabetes is not treated carefully, you are at increased risk of high blood pressure and swelling, a condition called pre-eclampsia. And your baby is at higher risk for prematurity, lung problems at birth and stillbirth.

To prevent these complications you'll need to carefully control your blood sugar through the remainder of your pregnancy. You may be able to do this by managing your diet. If diet does not control your blood glucose, your doctor will prescribe insulin. Insulin will not harm your baby as long as you closely monitor your blood sugar to keep it at safe levels.

It is really important that your obstetrician follow you and your baby carefully during pregnancy, and during labor and delivery.

Gestational diabetes can create complications during delivery. That's because your baby may be larger than normal. Why? Because the baby is exposed in the womb to your high sugar levels. If the baby is too big to exit the birth canal, natural childbirth may be difficult. For this reason, many doctors recommend inducing labor or delivering by surgery if you haven't naturally delivered your baby by 38 weeks.

Complications also can affect your baby right after birth. Before delivery, your baby's pancreas has been making large amounts of insulin because of the high sugar levels in your blood. The minute your baby is born, she is disconnected from your blood supply. For a brief time, there may be too much insulin in your baby's blood, given the normal amount of sugar in her blood. As a result, dangerously low blood sugar may result. If necessary, your baby will be given sugar to counteract this.

Once the baby is born, the hormones that make the body resistant to insulin go away, and the high blood sugar levels return to normal -- until your next pregnancy. However, once you have had gestational diabetes you are also at increased risk of developing Type 2 diabetes later in life. So protect yourself: After your pregnancy, reduce your risk with regular exercise and a reduced-calorie diet.

What I've written may sound frightening: Gestational diabetes does increase your and your baby's risk for various health problems. But with careful medical care, and possibly with lifestyle changes, you can protect both yourself and your baby.

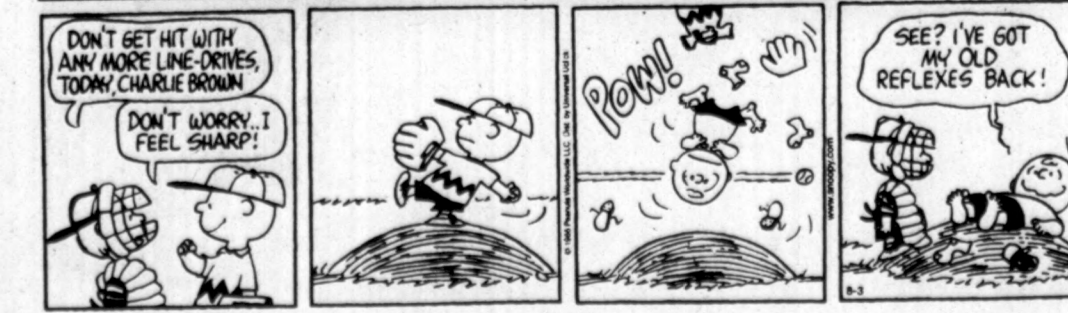

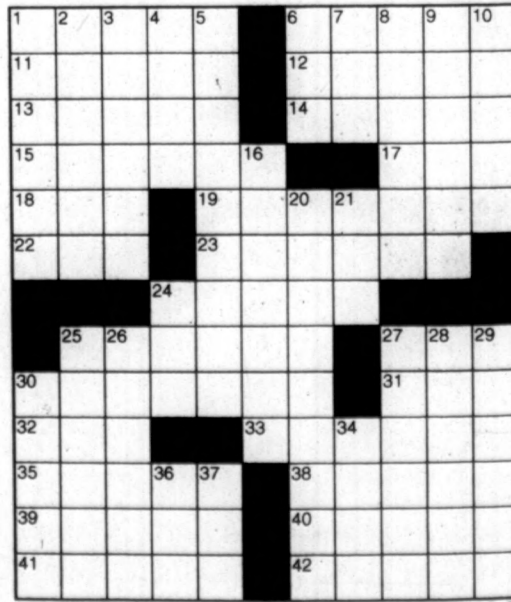

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# Man repays insurance money with 4 tons of coins

ST. LOUIS (AP) — An Illinois businessman outraged by a court order that he return more than \$500,000 in insurance money related to a 2001 wreck that killed his teenage son wanted to pay the money back in pennies in protest, only to recognize that was unfeasible.  
So, Roger Herrin settled on quarters — four tons of them.  
Packed in 150 transparent sacks each weighing about 50 pounds, the \$150,000 in coins were nearly one-third of the money an appellate court required Herrin to pay back to resolve years-long legal feuding among the crash's survivors over how \$800,000 in insurance proceeds were apportioned.  
Obtained from the Federal Reserve in St. Louis, the back-breaking load of quarters were brought in Wednesday by an armored vehicle and delivered on a flatbed truck to two law firms that represented other victims of the wreck.  
"There was no satisfaction from doing that," Herrin, who also serves on the Southern Illinois University system's governing board, told The Associated Press on Thursday. "The loss of a child is the loss of

a child, and all the money doesn't replace that."  
"I just wanted to draw attention to what went on here," the 76-year-old man added before mustering a laugh. "I really wanted to do it in pennies."  
It ended the legal wrangling that's happened since Herrin's 15-year-old son, Michael, was killed in June 2001. He was a passenger in a Jeep Cherokee that was broadsided by a truck that blew through a stop sign near Raleigh in southern Illinois' Saline County. Three other occupants of the Jeep were injured.  
Roger Herrin got \$1.6 million compensation through his own coverage. Of an additional \$800,000 paid out through other insurance, the Herrin estate got the bulk of it because of Michael Herrin's death, with the remainder of that money distributed to survivors.  
Those survivors appealed and won when the Mount Vernon, Ill.-based 5th District Appellate Court ruled against Roger Herrin, a retired foot surgeon whose business holdings include three southern Illinois nursing homes. Herrin has owned seven community banks,

but he's sold those off in recent years.  
Herrin complied in paying back the money, but "obviously in protest" with the plastic-sacked quarters he called "heavy as hell."  
"I've had 10 years to think about this a little bit, and I'm very, very bitter at this ruling," he said. "It's wrong, and everybody knows it's wrong."  
Mark Prince, an attorney for the Jeep's driver and her son, who was also a passenger, declined to discuss the case's merits Thursday, calling that "counterproductive" and a potential violation of a confidentiality agreement.  
While saying Herrin's choice of repayment method was his prerogative, Prince said he did find the unannounced delivery "surprising" — and a burglary risk for his law firm in Marion, Ill., given the media attention instantly foisted onto the thousands of dollars in coins.  
"We've been on pins and needles because we had a lot of cash suddenly laying around, it was publicized," Prince said. "We don't have safes or vaults, and we lock our front door. Advance notice would have

been nice, because we could have made arrangements to have it delivered to the bank."  
Douglas Dorris, an attorney for the Jeep's fourth occupant, agreed.  
"I am not going to criticize a man who lost his son, who is obviously upset with the decisions of the court," he said. "But I believe the decisions of the appellate court follow the law correctly."
