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

## MSU community gets first look at budget task force recommendations

Shortly after becoming Murray State University's interim president over the summer, Dr. Tim Miller appointed several budget task force subcommittees of faculty, staff and students to look at ways the university could make cuts and increase revenue. On Friday, the university community got its first chance to review the subcommittees' recommendations and voice their opinions on them.

Miller said the budget task force subcommittees presented their final recommendations to him Thursday afternoon and they were sent out to the university community on Friday. In an email sent to university constituencies, Miller said the recommendations are preliminary and would be discussed and studied before final recommendations are submitted to the Board of Regents.

Miller told the Ledger & Times that the recommendations are meant to have the largest impact possible on the next budget's projected deficit while attempting to avoid laying off university employees. He said a projected \$3 million deficit has caused the university to push forward on planning next year's budget, making the process much further ahead than in past years.

"We've got some time because this is the earliest that the budgeting process has ever started at Murray State University, and the reason we're doing this is because we know we're going to have a \$3 million deficit to start off with," Miller said. "So that's why those subcommittees were appointed, and these are just their preliminary recommendations, so we're going to study those recom-


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## HBS marks 25 years of monitoring 500th cruise on Kentucky Lake observed

Every 16 days for 25 years, a team ranging from students to faculty to even scientists from well beyond the region have boarded a boat for a study that is the only one of its kind in the world.

Out of 600,000 reservoirs, Kentucky Lake is the only one that is the site for the work of Murray State University's Watershed Studies Institute, which is designed to monitor the water of the lake and track its changes. Friday, some of the 230-plus people who have been part of this program gathered at the program's base — MSU's Hancock Biological Station — to celebrate the 500th anniversary mission that was executed on Nov. 9.

"Through this, we've obtained data that is literally used all over the world," said Dr. David White, who has been with the program since its inception after it was rewarded an opportunity to be one of Kentucky's four centers of excellence. "Nobody ever thought Murray State would get one, but we did, and this has just proven so important. We utilize a satellite that flies over the lake every 16 days and, through these cruises and the data we accumulate we are able to see what happens in the

## Clere updates city with quarterly alcohol report

The City of Murray's alcohol revenues were up almost \$15,000 between the beginning of July and the end of September compared to the previous quarter, according to Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator Sgt. Kendra Clere's most recent report to the city council.

Clere reported to the Murray City Council

at this week's meeting that during the June 1 to Sept. 30 quarter, 45 establishments yielded \$251,247.88 in ABC revenues for the city. In the previous quarter, 44 establishments yielded \$236,493.84. In the next quarterly report, there will be one fewer restaurant, bringing the total number of establishments selling alcohol back to 44, she said.

The total revenue broke down as follows: 15 restaurants yielded \$20,665.81; 19 retail

malt beverage establishments yielded \$75,436.86; four taverns yielded \$15,860.51; and seven package stores yielded \$135,503.31. The city also collected \$2,000 in application and renewal fees, \$1,750 for one fine and \$31.39 for one penalty.

Clere said the number of driving under the influence cases increased from 36 in the

## Imes pre-files bills pertaining to four lanes, trap competitions



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# House GOP gets its say on insurance cancellations

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans renewed an assault on President Barack Obama's health care overhaul and his own credibility on Friday as they pushed toward House passage of a measure to let insurers keep offering health coverage that falls short of the law's standards.

A day earlier, the president changed course in the face of a public uproar and said he would take administrative action, — which doesn't need congressional approval — to let companies continue selling such plans for at least another year. Unlike the House GOP bill, he would permit such sales to insurers' existing customers only, not to new ones.

Obama's proposal drew derision from House Republicans, who have staged more than 40 votes aimed at repealing all or part of the 2010 law.

"Can we really trust the administration that wrote this disastrous mess in the first place and so mishandled the implementation, do we trust them now to fix it?" Rep. Michael Burgess, R-Texas, said Friday.

Burgess, a doctor, said that while the GOP measure wouldn't fix the law, "It is merely to stop the bleeding. It's an effort at triage."

Democrats said Republicans' only goal was to sabotage the entire law.

"I know you don't like the president," said Rep. James McGovern, D-Mass. "But get over it and do what's right for the American people."

McGovern said the GOP wanted to "undo all the protections that allow you to keep your kids on your insurance policy till they're 26" and forbid insurers from barring customers with pre-existing medical conditions.

An AP survey shows insurers have mailed at least 4.2 million cancellation notices to customers. But insurance companies and state commissioners are warning that premiums will rise if changes are made this close to the new year and insurers can keep selling substandard policies.

The impact of Obama's proposal was to shift responsibility for cancellations from the administration to state insurance regulators and the industry itself.

"What we want to do is to be able to say to these folks, you know what, the Affordable Care Act is not going to be the reason why insurers have to cancel your plan," Obama said Thursday of the millions who have received cancellation notices.

The president's shift also was designed to redeem his long-ago pledge that people who liked their coverage could keep it.

Republicans said they intended to push ahead with their plan to allow companies to continue to sell the plans to new cus-

tomers as well as existing ones, and challenged Obama to work with them.

"If the president were sincere in his apology and serious about keeping his promise to the American people, he would work with Congress on bipartisan proposals," said Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich., the main supporter of the GOP measure.

While passage was expected in the GOP-controlled chamber, a combination of the president's announcement and a Democratic alternative measure seemed likely to make the vote a clearly partisan one. The White House said late Thursday the president would veto the GOP legislation.

The Democratic version, which faced certain House rejection, would let insurers continue coverage deemed substandard under the law for many existing customers, but only through 2014. It would also require insurance companies to tell people they could purchase other policies on federal or state-run insurance exchanges that might be better and cost less.

Meanwhile, Obama was set to meet Friday with health insurance CEOs to discuss helping people enroll in new plans and ways to minimize disruptions as people switch to new plans, a White House official said. The official asked to speak anonymously because the person was not authorized to talk publicly about the meeting ahead of the

session.

The maneuvering on many fronts came on an issue that has been a constant cause of controversy since Obama called for sweeping health care legislation in his first inaugural address nearly five years ago on the steps outside the Capitol.

His remarks on Wednesday marked a reversal with his personal and political credibility on the line, even though the impact on consumers is unclear.

Obama's approval ratings in polls are also ebbing, and he readily conceded that after recent events the public can legitimately "expect me to have to win back some credibility on this health care law in particular and on a whole range of these issues in general."

Shortly after Obama spoke, the major industry trade group, America's Health Insurance Plans, warned in a statement that prices might rise as a result of his new policy. "Changing the rules after health plans have already met the requirements of the law could destabilize the market and result in higher premiums for consumers," it said.

A few hours later, the head of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners added a fresh word of caution. Louisiana Insurance Commissioner Jim Donelon, president of the group, said Obama's proposal could lead to higher premiums and market disruptions next year and beyond.

mentations as well as other items that haven't been recommended.

"We'll look at everything because a \$3 million shortfall is pretty significant, and we don't want to hurt any individuals at all. So what we're trying to do is just look at different ways to save money and not lose any positions."

The email sent to the university community said the vast majority of recommendations on revenue enhancements, expenditure reductions and operational efficiencies would be considered for the 2014-15 budget year. Employees were asked to inform their supervisors of any concerns, questions, suggestions or comments they have so the information could move up the chain of command before the vice presidents meet Tuesday to discuss the preliminary recommendations. Miller also encouraged employees to submit questions to him through email, by phone or appointment if they had any additional concerns after talking with their supervisors and vice presidents.

"Our budgeting process will be open and transparent and I encourage your participation," Miller said in the email. "Remember, as I have said many times, enrollment growth can provide additional revenues to cover our budget shortfall. Thank you and I look forward to your comments."

best chance of receiving action from both the state House of Representatives and state Senate this winter.

"With this being a budget session coming up, that means there will be a lot of attention given to the budget so, by getting these in early, we might have a chance of having committees looking at them in January," said Imes, who will be seeking to increase speed limits on Kentucky four-lane highways to 65 mph where feasible, as well as attempting to make it possible for school districts to recognize trap shooting as a sanctioned sport.

The first of these measures covers a topic that has received much attention the past year in the Purchase Area. Of particular interest is KY 80, where it passes through Calloway and Graves counties, where the speed limit is 55 mph, which has been the limit since that section was opened to traffic several years ago.

Both the Calloway and Graves chambers of commerce, as well as those counties' fiscal courts have adopted resolutions asking for the increase on the highway. This comes after a section of KY 68/80 from Cadiz to Bowling Green was increased to 65 mph in 2012.

"It's obviously working well from Cadiz to Bowling Green, because I haven't heard of any problems coming from there. It would make sense that we could do it here I would think," said Imes of an issue that has resulted in several inquiries from Calloway County Judge-Executive Larry Elkins to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet in the past year. "With this, though, I'm not just looking at 80 here. We've also got U.S. 45 between Mayfield and Lone Oak, as well as U.S. 641 from Radio Road to the Purchase Parkway at Benton that are also still 55, and I know that my fellow legislators in

those communities are supportive of an increase in those places as well."

Imes said he is also hoping to perhaps build support with lawmakers from other parts of the state, particularly in eastern Kentucky, where two highways — U.S. 25 and U.S. 127 — both carry four-lane traffic to several states. He said co-sponsoring a measure adopted by 22nd District state Rep. Wilson Stone of Scottsville that would redirect half of the state General Fund's share of Tennessee Valley Authority in-lieu-of tax payments back to Kentucky's 36 TVA counties by fiscal year 2019 for local economic development and job creation, particularly in areas depending on coal as a resource for that development.

As for the second pre-filed bill, Imes said competitors would have to undergo a mandatory firearms safety course before being allowed to shoot in an event. He also said there is precedent in that the Indiana State Legislature passed a similar measure recently to clear the way for such events.

"I've received many, many comments from people interested in this, not just here in Calloway County, but throughout the state," he said. "We've got many, many schools engaged in archery and, in other parts of the country, there is trap shooting, so this would give those school boards the right to adopt this is a sport if they so choose."

"You've got many colleges that have archery teams, plus there are competitive trap and rifle teams (including a rifle program at Murray State University) so this could create an opportunity for students to perhaps gain a scholarship. Again, though, this would be done with safety being of the utmost importance."

same quarter in 2012 to 55 in 2013. The number of alcohol intoxication cases increased from 21 to 39 this year during the July 1 to Sept. 30 time span. She attributed the increase to targeted DUI enforcement from patrol officers.

"You'll see a significant increase between this year and last year, and the reason for that is because we are doing more targeted patrol and more DUI enforcement, putting extra people out there, and we're actually targeting AIs and DUIs and restaurants serving to minors

and other alcohol-related things," she said.

Several bar checks were conducted during the quarter using undercover operations and DUI patrol, Clere said. The checks resulted in the following charges: 11 charges of possession of alcohol by a minor; four charges of unlawful transaction with a minor; nine DUI charges; one charge of assisting a minor to purchase alcohol; six AI charges; one charge of a person between 18-20 years old entering a premise to purchase alcohol and two charges of possession of an open alcohol container.

Clere said that if any establishment is charged three times with the same violation of their alcohol license — such as serving alcohol to a minor — she would ask the state to revoke its license. She said it would have to be the same violation instead of three different types of violations for this step to be taken.

water. We're able to measure the effects of climate change and even track the Asian carp population and how it has invaded the lake."

Hancock joined MSU's Mid-America Remote Sensing Center and its Chemical Analysis Laboratory in launching the study.

Gary Rice, a 1980 MSU graduate from Paris Landing, Tenn., has attended 455 cruising runs, the most of any participant.

"I've always been interested, though, in aquatic biology," said Rice, who served as a field technician at Hancock for several years during the time the facility's namesake, Dr. Hunter Hancock, still made frequent appearances. He said Hancock was proud of this program. "He indicated that several times. This has been a pretty big operation."

Dr. George Kipphut, chair of MSU's Geo-Sciences department, is not quite as experienced as

Rice, having taken 15 cruises.

"My interest was water chemistry, though, and looking at trends that have developed and it's been quite beneficial," Kipphut said. "I wish I could go on more."

Graduate student Kirk Racer of Cookeville, Tenn., is now a field team leader and said he has great pride in being part of something of such longevity.

"It has created a lot of opportunities out here, especially being that some of us actually live here. It's really nice being right beside

the lake," Raper said.

White said it is important for reservoirs to undergo such studies because natural lakes are losing water. However, he said a common misconception is that the creator of such waterways — i.e. the government — should be the one to conduct such studies.

"Somebody has to do the science, though," he said, adding that the data gained is based on chemical, physical and biological characteristics that has yielded many valuable data sets archived at Hancock.

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House OKs coverage plans short of Obamacare rules

By DAVID ESPO AP Special Correspondent WASHINGTON (AP) — Brushing aside a White House veto threat, the Republican-controlled House voted Friday to let insurance companies sell individual health coverage to all comers, even if it falls short of the required standards in "Obamacare." In all, 39 Democrats broke ranks and supported the legislation, a total that underscored the political importance of a controversial issue likely to be front and center in next year's elections for control of Congress. The overall vote was 261-157 on a measure that supporters said would ease the plight of millions of consumers reeling from cancellation notices. Those cancellations have been arriving from companies despite President Barack Obama's oft-made promise that anyone who liked his plan could keep it. The bill now goes to an uncertain fate in the Senate. Friday's vote came as Obama arranged a meeting later in the day at the White House with insurance company CEOs, and as the industry and state insurance commissioners began adjusting to an abrupt change in policy he announced a day earlier. Under the shift, Obama said insurers should be permitted to continue to sell to existing customers individual coverage plans that would be deemed substandard under the health care law. Without the change, many existing plans would have been banned beginning next year, and the president's announcement was an attempt to quell a public and political furor triggered by millions of cancellation notices. The House measure went one step further. It would give insurance firms the ability to sell individual plans to new as well as existing customers, even if the coverage falls short of the law's requirements. "For the last six weeks the White House stood idly by ignoring the pleas of millions," said Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich., chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee and lead sponsor of the legislation. "Our straightforward, one-page bill says, if you like your current coverage, you should be able to keep it. The president should heed his own advice and work with us, the Congress, as the founders intended, not around the legislative process." But Democrats said the measure was just another in a long line of attacks on the health care bill from Republicans who have voted repeatedly to repeal it.

Staff Report A Murray man was cited by Kentucky State Police Friday for driving without insurance after being involved in an accident on KY 94. According to KSP, police responded to a single-vehicle injury collision at 4:45 p.m. Friday on KY 94 East approximately 11 miles east of Murray. Upon investigation, it was determined by police that James Evans, 43, of Murray, had been driving a 1999 GMC Jimmy west on KY 94 when his vehicle veered off the left side of the roadway and struck a concrete ditch and a tree. Evans was transported by ambulance to Murray-Calloway County Hospital for treatment of injuries received during the collision. He was cited for not having insurance. KSP was assisted on the scene by the Murray Fire Department, Calloway County Fire-Rescue, and Murray-Calloway County EMS. The investigation continues by Trooper Jody Cash. Individuals facing charges are innocent until proven guilty.

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Kentucky News in Brief

Fire marshal issues warning about silent killer

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Fire Marshal William Swope is warning Kentuckians to beware of carbon monoxide buildup now that cool temperatures are forcing them to heat their homes and cars again. Swope calls the odorless, colorless gas the "silent killer." It's produced by fuels like natural gas, propane, oil, wood, coal and gasoline. In particular, Swope said people need to understand that vehicles and generators left running in attached garages can produce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide. He urged Kentuckians to install carbon monoxide alarms in their homes. Symptoms of overexposure include shortness of breath, nausea, dizziness, lightheadedness or headaches. Swope also warned that high levels of carbon monoxide can be fatal within minutes.

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Beshear says Ky. to comply with directive

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Gov. Steve Beshear directed the Kentucky Department of Insurance on Thursday to comply with President Barack Obama's edict that could allow some 280,000 Kentuckians to keep their current insurance policies, at least for another year. Beshear said the decision ultimately will be left to insurance companies, many of which he said have already invested heavily into developing coverage plans that meet the requirements of the Affordable Care Act and may not want to reverse course. Obama announced Thursday his decision to allow insurance companies to continue offering existing policies for another year even if they don't meet minimum standards of the law. He had been under intense pressure, even from within his own party, to allow people to keep existing policies. In Kentucky, about 130,000 people with individual insurance coverage face discontinuation of their policies in the months ahead, as do about 150,000 people with small group policies.



The J.N. Williams 805 chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy met Wednesday, Oct. 23, for its regular monthly meeting.

Following the meeting, several members carpoled to the home of Jim and Pat Thompson in the Blood River area of Calloway County. The home, named "Seclusaval" by the original owners, Peter Stainback Hamlin and Virginia Ann Michaux Hamlin, was built around 1839. It is one of the oldest surviving houses in the

Jackson Purchase area and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The bricks for the home were molded on the farm by slaves using clay and sand and were also fired in a kiln there. All of the decorative woodwork was carved by hand. The doors are 2-1/2 inches thick and the walls are 13 inches thick.

The Thompsons gave a tour of their home and explained their efforts in restoring the building to its original state. One event of historical interest was the raid on the home by guerrillas during

the War Between the States. The guerrillas confiscated \$600 from the basement where the family had placed it for hiding during the War. The original Hamlin owners had two sons who fought in the War Between the States for the Confederacy. Richard Franklin Hamlin and William Michaux Hamlin both served in Company H, 3rd Kentucky Mounted Infantry. The chapter presented a copy of the war records of both of these men to the Thompsons as well as a gift card in appreciation of their hospitality.

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## US stocks push through latest record highs

NEW YORK (AP) — Investors stayed upbeat Friday, pushing U.S. stock indexes deeper into record territory.

Stocks were headed for a third straight close at all-time highs as investors assessed the prospect for further economic stimulus from the Federal Reserve.

Agilent Technologies, which makes scientific instruments, was the biggest gainer in the Standard & Poor's 500 index after reporting earnings that exceeded analysts' expectations. Exxon Mobil rose after billionaire Warren Buffett's company disclosed late Thursday that it had taken a stake in the oil company.

The S&P 500 is on track for its sixth straight week of gains, part of an impressive rise this year. The index is up 25.6 percent so far. If it ends 2013 with a gain that big it would be the best performance in a decade.

Several factors have been driving the market higher this year. The Federal Reserve has kept up its extraordinary efforts to stimulate the economy. And while U.S. economy's recovery

has been plodding, rather than spectacular, it has been strong enough to enable corporations to increase their profits.

"It's bland, it's vanilla, but it's sweet," said John Manley, chief equity strategist at Wells Fargo Fund Management.

Despite the surge, stock prices remain reasonable compared with earnings, Manley said. Stock valuations are "not cheap, but they're not prohibitive," he said.

The ratio of stock prices to forecast earnings for S&P 500 companies is currently 15, according to data from FactSet. That's slightly below the average ratio of 16.2 over the last 15 years and far below the peak of 25 recorded in the late 1990s and early 2000s.

The S&P 500 added three points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,794 as of 2:05 p.m. Eastern Time. Nine of the 10 industrial groups in the S&P 500 rose.

The Dow Jones industrial average gained 58 points, or 0.4 percent, to 15,935. The Nasdaq composite rose five points to 3,978.

Agilent jumped \$4.35, or 8.6 percent, to \$54.89. Exxon

Mobil, a member of the Dow, rose \$1.32 cents, or 1.4 percent, to \$94.53.

Investors may be getting more comfortable with the prospect of the Fed cutting back on its stimulus as long as the economy is also improving, said Jim Dunigan, a managing executive at PNC Wealth Management. The stock market's biggest setbacks this year have come when investors worried that Fed policy makers were close to paring their \$85 billion per month in bond purchases, which are intended to keep interest rates low.

"The path of least resistance (for stocks) seems to be higher right now," Dunigan said. Investors also got some mixed information on the economy on Friday.

U.S. factories increased production for a third straight month in October, as stronger output of primary metals and furniture offset declines in auto production, the Federal Reserve reported. However, overall industrial production dropped 0.1 percent after a 0.7 percent September gain.

Manufacturing output rose 0.3

percent last month, up from 0.1 percent in September. Factory output is the biggest component of industrial production, which also includes mining and utilities.

In government bond trading, the yield on the 10-year note rose to 2.71 percent from 2.70 percent from Thursday.

In commodities trading, the price of oil was flat at \$93.71 a barrel. Gold rose \$1.10 to \$1,287.40 an ounce.

Among other stocks making big moves:

— Zulily surged in its first day as a publicly traded company. The Seattle-based online retailer of baby products stock jumped \$16.30, or 74 percent, to \$38.39 after it had priced it at \$22.


— Vanda Pharmaceuticals soared \$1.66, or 13 percent, to \$14.70 after FDA advisers recommended approval for the company's potential sleep disorder drug tasimelteon.

— Western Union fell 91 cents, or 5.1 percent, to \$16.56 after the money-transfer company said late Thursday that its longtime chief financial officer would step down.



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

Just a day before Daniel McGee begins his final season in the pool as a Tiger, he made his next step official.

And with his family, friends, teachers and teammates in the room he became a Hilltopper.

Daniel signed his national letter of intent to swim for the Western Kentucky swim and diving team Friday afternoon in the Murray High library.

A list of his accomplishments and accolades were read along with kind remarks by coach, Rich Tobergte, and Murray High principal, Teresa Speed.

And while the competitions that led to those achievements and his eventual signing with WKU were pressure packed, Daniel said he was only thinking one thing while signing his letter - don't mess up.

"I was kind of nervous (while signing)," he said. "I didn't want to mess it up but it was exciting."

Rick, who is also Daniel's head coach said it was a moment he and his wife won't ever forget.

"How proud his mother and I are of him, we could never express in words," Rick said. "Not only is he a good athlete, he is a wonderful student, he is a good and kind caring young man."

"We've been blessed with a child like Daniel and there is just not words for the amount of pride we feel for him right now."

The senior swimmer is one of the most decorated in Region I aquatics.

He is the reigning Region I Male Swimmer of the Year, Region I 200 meter freestyle champion, 500 meter freestyle champion for the past three years, breaking a 30 year old record in 2013 in the 500 free. He is also a USA Swimming Academic All-American qualifier and a 2011 and 2012 KHSAA Academic All-State award winner with a 4.14 GPA.

# Racers hit the road for WKU, look to move to 3-0

Monday, the Murray State women defeated Evansville on the road for the first time since 1997.

Tonight, the Racers look to end another long away drought.

Murray State travels to Bowling Green today to face Western Kentucky at Diddle Arena, a place the Racers haven't won since 1975.

In fact, MSU has only beaten the Hilltoppers four times since its last road win at WKU, all four of which came at home before 1989.

Head coach Rob Cross takes a young team into Diddle this year, as the Racers add another chapter to their longest active series.

Cross was pleased with how his team responded in its road opener against the Purple Aces, but said there's still some unknowns with such a young team.

"You are never really sure what you are going to get, especially that first road game," he said. "I think we settled down throughout the game at Evansville, but initially we were too tight and nervous and too jacked up to play."

"That's a concern going into this game, because Western Kentucky may be one of the best teams on our schedule."

Murray State's defense has been suffocating through its first two games, holding opponents to just 18 percent shooting from the field this season.

The Racers get an entirely different type of test against WKU, however, especially with the Hilltoppers considerable scoring talent - starting with Sunbelt Preseason Player of the Year Alexis Govan.

"She's the most athletic guard we will face all year," Cross said of Govan. "She's a great athlete, a great athlete and a first-team Sunbelt player. She's probably the best player in the Sunbelt, and very similar to Ke'Shunan James, who is sitting out a year on our team."

"We are going to have our hands full with Govan."

Bianca McGee is WKU's leading scorer, averaging 18 points per game off the bench. McGee started her career at Eastern Illinois, before transferring to a junior college where she was tabbed as an All-American.

Chastity Gooch averages a double-double, leading the Hilltoppers with 10 rebounds per game.

# Return to sender

## DEFENSE FORCES FIVE TURNOVERS, RETURNS THREE FOR TDs IN WIN

OWENSBORO - Defense early. Defense late. Defense often.

Tigers' junior Dante Darcus forced a fumble and returned it for a 20-yard touchdown on the game's first play, while a late interception touchdown from Tigers' defensive back Desjahvonni Miles and a blocked field goal returned for six sent Murray High (8-4) over the Owensboro Catholic Aces (9-3) 37-20 and into the third round of the playoffs.

Despite a lop-sided score in the end, the game was anything but - living up to previous contests between the long-time playoff foes. The matchup had been decided by a score - or less - for the past three years, with Murray having the upper hand in the last two years.

Tied 20-all with just under six minutes left in regulation, Owensboro Catholic Aces' tight-end Ryan Clark caught a short pass over the middle and raced up the left sideline, catching a key block along the way en route to a 37-yard gain and what would stand as the longest play from scrimmage for the Aces.

The completion put the Aces deep in the redzone and poised to take the lead, but Aces quarterback Houston Hartz's third-

down pass (40-70, 376 yards, 3 TD, 3 INT) harmlessly hit the turf, forcing the Aces' kicking unit onto the field to attempt a short field goal.

Snap, set...but the kick never made it to the uprights, as Miles and defensive back Dylan Upchurch rushed the edge and blocked the field goal, returning it 95 yards to the touchdown and a 30-20 lead.

"We hadn't blocked one yet," said head coach Steve Duncan. "We couldn't just said, 'We've been doing this all season and hadn't blocked one yet!' But

they got it, and that's why we kept practicing it."

Despite a few pre-game jitters, Tigers senior quarterback Dylan Boone put on a rushing clinic, carrying the ball 25 times for 174 yards and completing two passes for 35 yards and a touchdown - a 15-yard toss to sophomore wide receiver Peyton Glynn to make it 17-7 just before the first half ended.

Boone's touchdown pass to Glynn came just moments after Tigers' senior defensive back Jacob Mayes picked off a tipped pass at midfield to give the

Tigers the ball with 23 seconds left in the second quarter and a slim 10-7 lead.

"We pounded it out and played all four quarters, and we're lucky enough to come away with the win," Boone said after the game. "Our secondary played really great; that's the best game we've played all year. We did a good job stopping them on the goal line and blocking the field goal."

Unlike their normal gameplan, the Aces came out of the

# Racers fall despite halftime lead

The Murray State Racers saw their seven-point halftime lead slip away to a 70-60 loss Friday night to the Old Dominion Monarchs at the Ted Constant Center in Norfolk, Va.

The Racers (1-2) held a 36-29 halftime lead, but were unable to keep it going and were outscored by the Monarchs (2-1) 41-24 in the second half.

MSU had a slate of four in double-figures with Cameron Payne leading the way with 17 points and five assists, while Jeffery Moss added 11. Jarvis Williams scored 10 points and grabbed 12 rebounds. Dexter Fields also added 10 points to the Racer attack.

The Racers enjoyed a seven-point halftime lead after they climbed out of a 17-10 hole with 10:21 to go. MSU answered the call with their own run of 16-4 to take a 26-21 lead with 4:12 left in the run. Moss hit the Racers' first three point basket of the game with 4:55 left.

In the first half, the Racers made an amazing turn from the field after they started 5-of-14, then finished with a flurry hitting 11-of-16. MSU started 0-of-5 from three-point range until they hit three straight in the final minutes of the half with one from Moss and a pair from Payne.

Murray State's good fortune ran out when ODU started the second half with a 15-3 run for a 44-39 lead with 15:17

remaining.

Tyler Rambo scored to cut the ODU lead down to 46-43 at the 11:39 mark, but MSU never got closer than four when the score was 61-57 at the 2:58 mark.

Shooting from the field was a stark contrast as both the Racers and Monarchs struggled in one half each. MSU shot 53 percent in the first half (16-of-30) with ODU coming in at 31 percent (9-of-29). But the hosts turned the tables with 52 percent in the second half (16-of-31) while the Racers slumped to 33 percent (8-of-24).

ODU held a big advantage from the free throw line where they shot 55 percent (15-of-27). The Racers managed 39 percent (7-of-18).

Murray State comes home to the CFSB Center for a Tuesday game with Bethel. Tip time is 7 p.m. with the game available on radio on WFGE 103.7 FM and online on Froggy103.com and GoRacers.com. Free streaming video is provided by OVCDigitalNetwork.com.

Former Racer star B.J. Jenkins was the guest of Racer Radio at halftime as the native of Virginia Beach attended the game. Jenkins is one of 25 Racer players that were two-time All-OVC picks. He was part of MSU's 2009-10 team that won 31 games and advanced in the NCAA Tournament with a win over Vanderbilt before a close loss to Butler. Jenkins also ranked in the top-5 in the nation with a free throw percentage of .905.

# Kenseth wins pole at Homestead for finale

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) — Matt Kenseth and his Joe Gibbs Racing team took a huge step away from their bad performance last week by winning the pole Friday at Homestead-Miami Speedway for the championship-deciding race.

Kenseth turned a lap at 177.667 mph in his Toyota to claim the top starting spot for Sunday's race. He called it "a confidence booster" after his 23rd-place finish at Phoenix essentially ruined his title chances.

He was trailing Jimmie Johnson by seven points going

into Phoenix and left the race down 28 with just one race to decide the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship. But the pole, his third of the season and 11th of his career, is a start toward a big rebound.

"I think more than morale, it's probably a confidence booster," Kenseth said. "The thing is, Jimmie is so far ahead, that even if he does have a problem we need to be in the front to be able to capitalize on that. This is a good start to that, hopefully get a bonus point right away, get the best pit stall. I think it's important, we need to be up front and try to lead as much as we can and be in the mix at the end."

Whether it's enough remains

to be seen. Johnson, who needs only to finish 23rd or better Sunday to win his sixth championship, qualified seventh.

He feels good about his situation.

"It's a great position to be in, there's no doubt about it," Johnson said. "It's nice, but it doesn't guarantee anything. I have to run all 400 miles on Sunday and that's really the goal for this Lowe's car."

Kevin Harvick is the only other driver mathematically eligible to win the title and goes into the race 34 points behind Johnson. He qualified one spot ahead of Johnson in sixth after internalizing too long about how to make his qualifying run.

"I argued with myself for an hour or two there, before that qualifying session, as to where I was going to run," Harvick said. "I thought I needed to run the bottom in (turns) three and four. All-in-all it was a good lap."

Kurt Busch qualified second to earn his ninth front row starting position of the season and Joey Logano was third.

Brad Keselowski will start fourth in his final race as defending Sprint Cup champion and was followed by Denny Hamlin.

Martin Truex Jr. will start eighth in his final race with Michael Waltrip Racing, while Ricky Stenhouse Jr. and Elliott Sadler rounded out the top 10.

## Vandy looking for bowl eligibility against Kentucky

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Senior wide receiver Jordan Matthews has heard the talk that the Commodores might not be ready for Kentucky, even if Vanderbilt would become bowl eligible for a third straight season.

That Vanderbilt will get caught still celebrating its big win over Florida.

Matthews doesn't buy it.

"It's football," Matthews said. "I don't care who it is. It's football, so there's no trap games. It's a football game. Everybody's going to be jacked up to play ... We take that 0-0 stuff to heart. I know being as old as I am a senior, you only got so many left."

It'd be easy for the Commodores (5-4, 2-4 Southeastern Conference) to overlook Kentucky. Vanderbilt is coming off a 34-17 win at Florida that is the program's first win at Florida since 1945 and also snapped a 22-game skid to the Gators. That win

also marked the first time the Commodores have beaten both Georgia and Florida in the same year — ever.

Kentucky (2-7, 0-5) has lost six of its last seven with the Wildcats losing 48-17 to Missouri last week. The Wildcats have settled down with sophomore Jalen Whitlow expected to start his seventh game this season against Vanderbilt, but the Commodores have won the last two in this series.

First-year coach Mark Stoops has been busy trying to replicate at Kentucky the kind of success Franklin has had in rebuilding Vanderbilt. Having the chance to delay the Commodores from becoming bowl eligible is something that Stoops said means nothing to him.

"If that's good for us to stop them from going to a bowl game, I mean, we need the win for us, for our fans, for all the things we're talking about ...," Stoops said. "That's motivation enough for me."

## No. 19 Louisville, Houston aim to save AAC hopes

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Louisville and Houston have to resolve some issues between them before either can think about catching Central Florida and salvaging hopes for a conference championship and a BCS bid.

"It is out of our control with what UCF does," Louisville center Jake Smith said this week of the team's AAC prospects. "Obviously, you want things to fall in our favor but we can't concern ourselves with that."

That scenario makes Saturday night's American Athletic Conference showdown more intriguing since the No. 19 Cardinals (8-1, 4-1) and the Cougars (7-2, 4-1) have similar strengths.

The game pits two of the AAC's top quarterbacks in Louisville junior Teddy Bridgewater and Houston freshman John O'Korn, who rank first and fourth respectively in passing efficiency. Both schools feature stingy defenses that rank 1-

2 in turnover margin with the Cougars proving adept at intercepting passes.

Both have also suffered close losses to UCF and will meet for the first time since Louisville won 65-27 in 2004.

In many areas, the Cardinals have bounced back well since falling to UCF last month. They've beaten South Florida and Connecticut by a combined 65-13 margin and forced five turnovers last week at UConn including touchdown returns off a blocked punt and an interception.

Houston's late rally fell 10 yards short in last Saturday's 19-14 loss at UCF, but the Cougars still have one of the league's best offenses. Louisville and Houston are both averaging a league-best 38 points a game and are 2-3 in total average yards with the Cardinals holding a 481.2-470.2 advantage.

Though the numbers hint at a shootout, Louisville's defense is allowing just 10.6 points per game while Houston has forced a league-high 32 turnovers.







DEAR TOFU-ED OUT: No law says you must dine at your brother's home. Either alternate hosting the Thanksgiving dinner (when it's at your house, Kelly can bring tofu turkey for herself) or make other plans for a traditional dinner elsewhere.

Diet rich in fruits and vegetables has true health benefits

DEAR DOCTOR K: I try to cook dinner most nights, but by the end of the day, I'm too tired to make sure the meals are balanced. Can you suggest easy ways to incorporate more fruits and vegetables into our dinners?

DEAR READER: When I come home from work, hungry and tired, I'm apt to snack on whatever's in the fridge. If what I see in the fridge is a slice of pizza, I'll reach for it. But if I see some hummus to spread on a cracker -- a much healthier option than pizza -- I'll snack on that.

In other words, if I'm hungry and tired, I'll grab what's convenient and not think a lot about healthy eating. So if you're like me, you'll need to be organized to make healthy eating a priority.

Start by scheduling a regular time to plan your weekly menu. This will give you a chance to plan nutritionally balanced meals before the kids start asking, "What's for dinner?" Make a shopping list to help you stock your kitchen with the foods you'll need to cook these healthy meals.

Now that you have a strategy, here are some easy ways to work more produce into your evening meals:

-- Roast vegetables. Bake cut vegetables at 375 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes until they're lightly browned. You can roast any vegetable -- from mushrooms, onions, eggplant and zucchini, to tomatoes, broccoli and carrots. Enjoy roasted veggies as a side dish or toss them into pasta.

At the end of the week, puree leftover roasted veggies with chicken broth to make soup. -- Poach vegetables. Boil enough liquid (water or low-sodium chicken broth work well) to cover the vegetables. Add them and turn down the heat. Cook for five to seven minutes, until the vegetables are brightly colored and tender-crisp. -- Smuggle fresh vegetables into main dishes. Add mushrooms, peppers, zucchini or carrots to pasta sauce, casseroles, soup, stews, scrambled eggs and chili. -- Have a salad with dinner most days. Build your salad with dark, leafy greens. Toss in peas, tomatoes, celery, carrots and peppers. Limit yourself to 1 1/2 tablespoons of low-calorie dressing. -- Choose fruit -- fresh, frozen, stewed or baked -- for dessert. It all counts toward your daily produce quota.

I've put a few more fruit- and veggie-heavy recipes on my website. AskDoctorK.com. This won't be the first time you've heard that lots of fruits and vegetables in your diet are healthy. In fact, you may be sick of hearing it. It may sound preachy, and you may even wonder if it's true. You've seen enough recommendations that then get overturned, so perhaps you find it hard to take any nutritional advice seriously.

I understand. But the health benefits of diets rich in fruits and vegetables have been demonstrated time and again by high-quality studies involving millions of people. And, yes, I eat a lot of fruits and vegetables myself.

Brown, of Hopkinsville; and James Wallace, of Cadiz.

With more than 25 years experience covering local governments and public affairs in Christian and surrounding counties, Jennifer P. Brown is currently opinion editor of the Kentucky New Era. She has written extensively about local history, particularly African-American history in Hopkinsville, and recently received the prestigious James Madison Award for Service to the First Amendment from the Scripps Howard First Amendment Center at the University of Kentucky. Jim Wallace, retired superintendent of Trigg County Schools, was born in Golden Pond, a community between the Cumberland and Tennessee Rivers that was dissolved and leveled in the 1960s to make

way for Land Between The Lakes (LBL), a National Recreation Area. Wallace has been active with the Trigg County Historical Society, and is a sixth generation Trigg Countian with interests in genealogy and Kentucky history. He helped publish "Lest We Forget," a pictorial history of Trigg County, covering the era in which the right of eminent domain displaced local residents to establish LBL. According to Constance Alexander, who served on the nominating committee, "Our region is typically overlooked on state boards and committees. We are so fortunate to have three new members who are willing to invest time and energy to ensure that the voices of our region are heard in Frankfort. All three of the new members bring special skills and talents to the committee. It will

be a privilege to serve with them." Five executive committee members were sworn in on Nov. 8, along with a slate of new officers: Brian Mefford, president, of Bowling Green; Renee Shaw, first vice president, of Lexington; J. McCauley Brown, second vice president, of Harrods Creek; and Michael J. Hammons, third vice president, of Park Hills. The Kentucky Historical Society Executive Committee serves as the policy-setting body for the Society and functions as a board of directors with sixteen members from every region in the commonwealth. **The Hunter's Guide**

**Great opening weekend for deer season**

I'm going to go out on a limb right here and proclaim that this season will be one of the record books in Kentucky. Two elements have combined to make this one of the best seasons we'll see in a long time - the weather and the timing of the season with the rut. As for the weather, it has been nearly picture perfect for the first half of the season. Opening weekend had the best weather we've seen in years. Not even the passage of a cold front Monday night slowed things down. In fact, the cooler temperatures may even have helped. As for the timing this year, deer season always opens on the second Saturday in November. This year the second Saturday fell on the ninth which is closer to the beginning of the month. Thanks to this, season opened during the last stages of the "chase" phase of the whitetail rut. That's when the big bucks are out cruising the woods for does that don't happen to be quite receptive yet. If you spent any time at all in the woods on opening weekend, you should have seen scads of deer. Of course, things may have been different where you hunt, but I've never seen as much deer activity - especially buck activity. As a direct result of these near perfect conditions, hunters in the Commonwealth have taken nearly 80,000 deer as of the time of this writing. With two more weekends to go, I feel a record harvest coming on. Up at Squire Barrett's deer camp in Livingston County, six of our eight hunters had already tagged their buck by Tuesday night. Squire Barrett has almost tagged a buck, having shot a deer that then ran away. As far as I know, the Squire is still looking for this deer. Dr. Young, Bwana Bill Wilson, and the

Squire's nephew Barry took their deer on Sunday. Dr. Young's brother Bill took his deer on Saturday. Roscoe Rouse finally got his buck on Tuesday afternoon. I should have had a deer on Sunday, but somehow I managed to miss the biggest deer I have ever had the privilege to shoot at. No, it wasn't buck fever - it was more like "git-r-done" fever as I shot too quickly before having the crosshairs properly aligned with the big buck's shoulder. Was I sick? You better believe it! But hey, that's hunting for you. Get in too big of a hurry and you'll pay the price. I finally took my buck Tuesday morning as I sat with my nose headed into a fifteen mile per hour wind with the temperature in the low thirties. After seeing several does and a small buck, I tried a little rattling - that's where you attempt to mimic the sound of two bucks fighting with their antlers. I can't say for sure that it worked, but thirty minutes later a nice

buck came slipping down the creek right in front of me. He was a mainframe eight but if you include all the sticker points, was a thirteen pointer. Believe me, on a cold, raw morning like Tuesday I was more than happy to take that deer. Now all we need is for Squire Barrett to find his deer and for Dr. Young's son-in-law Jesse to connect on a buck and our deer camp will be eight for eight. Back home at my farm in Marshall County, son-in-law Chip Wood took a nice big nine-pointer Sunday evening. So if you haven't connected yet, stay out there and keep trying. The rut should be peaking right about now and it's a great time to be in the woods. Just remember: Wear your hunter orange, use your harness and restraint device when in a tree stand, and always hunt safely and ethically. Good luck to all - let's get out there and be a part of this record-breaking season.
