Proverbs $23: 13-14$ do so say＂Do not withhold discippline from a child； and save his soul from death．＂Instead of＂beating．＂other Bible translations speak of＂punishing＂or＂spanking．＂In today＇s culture， ＂beating＂is a cruel and abusive act．＂This is not what the writer of
the biblical proverts had in mind．The word translated＂child＂ encompasses everything from an infant to y young man or woman
almost old enough to marry．I find it difficult to believe that the write of these proverts had in mind the use of a＂rod＂on a young Also，the Proverbs are statements of general truths thathave been derived from life＇s experiences．They are not statements of law like ＂Thou shall not steal．＂In other words，no one has been command－ ed to use spanking or＂beating with a rod＂as a form of discipline．
These proverbs on discipline of children should never be used to justify abusive punishment．
In addition，these proverbs are addressed to parents who exercise
their discipine only from hearts of love，The proverts do not grant permission for individuals to punish someone else＇s child in this，
way．For example，Proverbs $13: 24$ says：＂He who spares the rod
hates his son，but he who loves him is careful to discipline him．＂
