TED SMITH FAMILY FOOTBALL CENTER

EAGLES GATA

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The new headquarters for the Georgia Southern Football program, the Ted Smith Family Football Center, encloses the eastern end zone of Paulson Stadium and provides a state-of-the-art facility for the day-to-day functions of the Eagles. Groundbreaking on the 50,000-square-foot facility took place in June 2013 and the landmark project was completed in July 2014.

The two-story, brick, glass and steel frame building is a visual attraction from both Lanier Drive and inside Paulson Stadium with the Bill W. Nelson Hall of Fame atrium connecting both wings of the center on the second floor. Coaches' offices, conference rooms and positional meeting

rooms, as well as an expansive team room with stadium seating for more than 120, are also on the top level.

The positional meeting rooms include tools and equipment for game planning, diagramming plays and reviewing game film. The academic study suite, adjacent to the team room, is equipped with numerous desktop computers. The players' lounge, located right above the Eagles' locker room, provides a place to relax in comfort, watch the flatscreen high-definition televisions or use the video game systems.

The program's football video and recruiting operations, as well as the control room for the new video display board, are also located here. Storage space and the facility's extensive IT

and mechanical rooms are available on both levels.

Spanning the majority of the field level, Georgia Southern Football's athletic performance area is roughly four times the size of Iron Works and contains nearly \$500,000 of equipment, including 12 customized Power-Lift Multi-Racks and four Power-Lift Half-Racks with 16 inlaid platforms, each stocked with an Eleiko weightlifting 177.5 kilogram set.

Flanking the new strength and conditioning space are the athletic training and equipment areas, giving the Eagles access to some of the finest equipment in the region.

Natural sunlight enters the locker room through the ceiling-height windows and is complemented by interior

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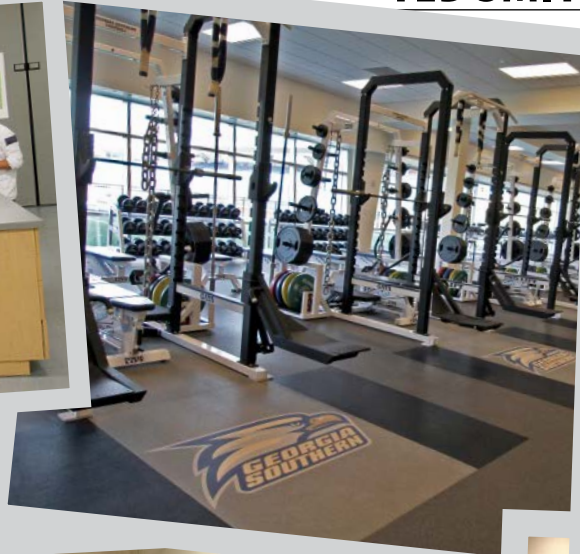
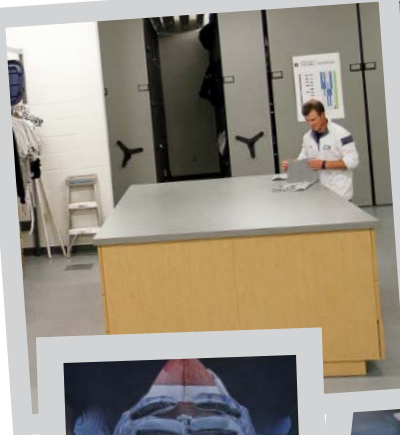
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pendant and ballast lighting fixtures. Each of the 132 lockers is branded with the Georgia Southern Athletics logo and feature a custom name plate for each student-athlete. Compartments for hanging clothes, storing helmets, shoulder pads and shoes are integrated into the design of the cherry wood veneer lockers.

Designed to maximize efficiency and storage, the equipment room includes pass-through lockers for laundry service, space for travel trunks and a rail-based shelving system. Four industrial washers and five dryers are easily accessible for both the athletic training room and equipment room.

The athletic training space includes more than a dozen treatment areas and eight taping stations for Eagle student-athletes, as well as offices for staff and a physician's exam room. Completing the modern training area is the large hydrotherapy room that features both hot and cold tubs as well as an underwater treadmill with video monitoring system for therapy and rehabilitation.

Thirty years after its first game on Sept. 29, 1984, Allen E. Paulson Stadium underwent a major expansion for the Eagles' first season in the FBS and the Sun Belt Conference. The newly expanded facility, now at a capacity of 25,000, offers incredible views of the playing field and modern amenities on its concourses.

The inaugural game at Paulson Stadium in 1984 saw the Eagles soar to a 48-11 victory over Liberty. That first contest was a fitting end to four years of planning and hard work – four years of dreaming of one of the finest football facilities in America.

What former Eagle head coach Erk Russell described as “The Prettiest Little Stadium in America” has been transformed into one of the finest facilities of its kind. The new mid-deck creates an architectural presence on the north side with the new 50,000-square-foot Ted Smith Family Football Center enclosing the east end zone.

The \$10 million stadium expansion project was student fee funded with private donations making possible the Eagle Football team's new building.

Winning is the one constant at Paulson Stadium where the Eagles have a stunning 186-34 home record (.845) and won 91.7 percent of their postseason games (33-3). That .845 winning percentage stands as the third best amongst current FBS stadiums entering the 2016 season.

More than three million fans have witnessed that success in Statesboro, creating a gameday atmosphere that attracts Eagle fans from across campus, throughout the Coastal Empire and southeast region.

Previous upgrades to the complex included renovation of the concourses and hospitality areas and the addition of a brick façade along the walls of Paulson Stadium prior to the 2005 season.

Initially constructed at a cost of \$4.7 million with just over 14,000 permanent seats and grass seating for thousands more, the addition of Paulson Stadium elevated the fledgeling program. The site for numerous nationally televised games, including the 1989 Hugo Bowl on ESPN, permanent light fixtures were installed for the 1994 season. In 2015, every home game was aired by the ESPN family of networks.

The stadium is named for the late Allen E. Paulson, former founder and chairman of Gulfstream Aerospace, who donated more than \$1 million toward construction of the facility.

In 2007, Georgia Southern University renamed the area surrounding the Stadium “Erk Russell Athletic Park” to honor the former Eagle coach.

The addition of the Ted Smith Family Football Center brought the nucleus of Eagle Football to the south end of campus and gave the Eagles' one of the finest team areas in the Sun Belt. This building features the team locker room, weight room, training room, equipment room, team room, meeting rooms and a lobby with all six FCS national championship trophies.

The Field of Dreams has also been a popular addition to the stadium complex, allowing children to play football on their own field alongside the Eagles during their game.

The 2014 expansion also brought a new Daktronics video board to the east side of the field. Following the 2015 season, the grass playing surface of Glenn Bryant Field was removed to make way for a brand-new turf surface.

GENE BISHOP FIELD HOUSE

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Dr. Eugene M. Bishop, 1934-2011

Thanks to the generous contribution from the late Gene Bishop, Georgia Southern University finished construction on the Bishop Field House in the west end zone at Paulson Stadium prior to the start of the 2006 football season.

Bishop passed away in March of 2011, but left behind a legacy at Georgia Southern. The former Athletic Foundation Chairman of the Board was a part of Eagle Nation for more than 20 years and his loyalty to the University and athletics department provided for two showcase landmarks on campus - the Gene Bishop Field House and the Eugene M. Bishop Alumni Center. The Gene Bishop Field House measures 13,600 total square feet and was built to accommodate team game day locker rooms and a game day training room on the lower level and meeting and hospitality spaces on the second level. From 2006-2013, Bishop Field House served as the home locker room for the Eagles and for the visiting team.

Around 400 members socialize in the Field House prior to home football games. The Field House can be reserved for meetings, socials or luncheons and

has been the site for numerous events, including biennial Georgia Southern Athletics Hall of Fame induction ceremonies.

With his generous contributions, Bishop holds the distinction as the single-largest contributor to the Georgia Southern Athletics Department and is one of the largest contributors to the University.

The Eugene M. Bishop Alumni Center opened summer of 2009 on Akins Boulevard, just a short distance from Erk Russell Athletic Park and the epicenter of gameday Saturdays.

In 2003, the Southern Conference began the Distinguished Service Award program to recognize individuals who have made a great impact on their respective conference institution. Dr. Bishop was the first from Georgia Southern to receive the award.

In the spring of 2013, the GS Athletic Foundation provided additional premium seating with the creation of the Bishop Club at Paulson Stadium, an exclusive, members-only venue to entertain guests and clients on game day.

Two hundred new chairback seats allow fans to experience the atmosphere indoors or out while enjoying heavy hors d'oeuvres, beverages and soft drinks during the game. Members also receive entry to pre-game festivities throughout the season. For more information about the Bishop Club and donation requirements, contact the Athletic Foundation at (912) 478-5520.

SUN BELT CONFERENCE - TOGETHER WE RISE

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The Sun Belt Conference has been part of the collegiate athletics landscape for four decades, and in that time there may not be another conference that can match the Sun Belt's innovation, vision and progressive thinking.

This is, after all, the league that initiated basketball's shot clock . . . the league that was the first to partner with a fledgling ESPN cable television entity that is now the "worldwide leader" . . . the league that went against the status quo and inaugurated football to start the century, the first already-existing Division I conference to ever take that step . . . and the league that is on the forefront of "new media" and internet-based advancement.

The Sun Belt is all about being progressive – change for the better. The league's embracing of innovations and advancements, its constant efforts to adapt in the ever-changing world of college athletics, and its continuing process of evolving to better serve its membership has been well documented since the day the conference was founded in 1976.

But one thing hasn't changed: Since that founding, the Sun Belt Conference has always been a league of opportunity. Athletic and academic programs who have shown progressive thinking and the desire to improve have always found a home in the Sun Belt.

More importantly, opportunities exist for student-athletes in the Sun Belt in untold numbers. The league is not a member of the heralded "autonomous five" group of conferences, but it does share the table as part of the NCAA's powerful 24-member Board of Directors. In other words, the conference has a voice in determining the future as college sports continues to change and evolve. It is a decision-maker, along with being a trail-blazer.

And opportunity is not a word that the Sun Belt takes lightly. The conference is uniquely positioned to provide opportunities for its institutions and student-athletes that the "autonomous five" leagues and schools often cannot. Student-athletes that for one reason or another were not given a chance by those at a higher echelon have found a home in the Sun Belt, and many have gone on to find success athletically and academically that might not have been possible at more heralded institutions.

Last December, there were three teams in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) that played their first-ever bowl game. All three were members of the Sun Belt Conference – Appalachian State, Georgia Southern and Georgia State.

For student-athletes, Sun Belt institutions are leaders in providing career services and the tools to assist in the pursuit of personal goals. Sun Belt members all employ full-time academic advisors and have on average more than 20 tutors for academic support. During the 2015-16 academic year, Sun Belt member institutions awarded over \$50 million in scholarships to more than 3,100 student-athletes, while also providing life experiences such as team building, domestic and foreign travel, community service, mentoring, and recognition through honors and awards.

Individual opportunities also extend between the lines. The Sun Belt had 40 players on active NFL rosters during the 2015 season, with representation on 23 of 32 NFL teams. Professional teams in several other sports are dotted with Sun Belt alumni.

The league is an intriguing combination. It is a fixture on the national scene, involved in the conduct and competition of college athletics, but also provides chances for success on many unique and different levels. In athletic parlance, the Sun Belt has "upside," and that makes for even more excitement

as the league begins its fifth decade. Its motto, "Together We Rise," is just as applicable now as it was when the league was founded to give a home to some of the nation's premier mid-major basketball programs.

That very first year, one of those programs (UNC Charlotte) reached the pinnacle of NCAA men's basketball competition with a berth in the Final Four. Since then, the league's 40-year history is strewn with success in many different men's and women's sports, and that success continues to the present day.

But when the desire for a higher national profile and the desire of its membership brought about football sponsorship in 2001, the conference was figuratively reborn. No league in history had ever pulled off what the Sun Belt was attempting – an established league jumping directly into Division I-A (now FBS) competition. Now, the league stands as one of the 10 premier college football leagues in the country.

And with the College Football Playoff now an integral part of the nation's sports fabric, the Sun Belt is guaranteed universal access based strictly on performance. A worthy football team in the Sun Belt can be in the national championship picture, and the league is a permanent part of the "Group of Five" conferences (joining the American Athletic Conference, the Mountain West Conference, the Mid-American Conference and Conference USA) that sends its highest-rated champion to a "New Year's Six" bowl game every season.

The CFP has provided much excitement over the past two years, but bowl games have long been a tradition in college football and the Sun Belt has established its own bowl tradition. The league has secured ties to no fewer than five bowl games, having added three bowl games each of the last three years. In addition to the potential of the College Football Playoff, the league has guaranteed berths in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl — an honor it has held from its very first football season — the GoDaddy Bowl in Mobile, Alabama, the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl in Montgomery, Alabama, the AutoNation Cure Bowl in Orlando, and the NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl in Tucson, Arizona. No football conference in NCAA history has developed that quantity of bowl partners in its first 15 years of existence.

In the last four seasons, Sun Belt members have recorded 66 non-conference football wins including a record 21 wins outside the league in 2013, and league teams have won five bowl games in the last three years – two of them winning in their first-ever bowl appearance last year.

The league's success extends past football, though. When Little Rock upset fifth-seeded Purdue in the first round of last March's NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, the Sun Belt became one of 12 leagues – out of 32 with automatic qualifiers – to have a team win a tournament game in each of the last two seasons (joining the ACC, AAC, A-10, Big 12, Big East, B1G, C-USA, MVC, SEC, WCC). The Sun Belt and the Pac-12 were the only leagues to have members win an NCAA Tournament game and also post wins in two other postseason tournaments in 2015, and added an NCAA win and another postseason win this past season.

One year earlier, Georgia State upset third-seeded Baylor in the NCAA first round, and Little Rock's women's squad defeated sixth-seeded Texas A&M in the NCAA women's tournament. That same year, the Sun Belt became one of seven conferences nationwide to have back-to-back first round selections in the NBA Draft when Georgia State's R.J. Hunter was the No. 28 overall pick by the Boston Celtics. Former UL Lafayette guard Elfrid Payton went No. 10 overall to the Orlando Magic in the 2014 draft and was a participant in the league's All-Star Weekend the past two seasons.

In the spring, baseball and softball continue to put the league in the national spotlight with deep runs into postseason play and high visibility in national polls becoming a tradition. UL Lafayette's baseball team was the nation's No. 1 team for the final third of the 2014 season and reached the NCAA Super Regionals in 2014 and 2015, and conference newcomer Coastal Carolina won the national championship at the College World Series last season. The UL Lafayette softball team has advanced to the Super Regionals five straight seasons, including a trip to the 2014 Women's College World Series.

The Sun Belt's commitment to academic excellence remains a hallmark, with the league and its institutions annually rewriting the Sun Belt record book for grade-point averages and academic honors. This past spring, a record-tying 14 league programs were recognized for outstanding performance in the classroom, with those teams earning NCAA Public Recognition Awards for posting APR scores in the top 10 percent of their sport nationally. It was the second straight year for the Sun Belt to have 14 programs honored, doubling the amount of the previous years.

The strength of any league is in its membership, and the Sun Belt adds to its strength this year with Coastal Carolina accepting an invitation to join effective July 1, 2016. The Chanticleers begin competition in all sports with the exception of football in the 2016-17 season, and the football program begins a transition to the FBS this year with its first year of full FBS status coming in 2018. Coastal Carolina will compete as a Sun Belt football member beginning in 2017 and will have the opportunity to compete for the conference championship, but will not be eligible for postseason play until the following year. In 2018, the league will play its first conference championship game in football, as announced in June.

Coastal Carolina joins Appalachian State, Arkansas State, Georgia Southern, Georgia State, UL Lafayette, UL Monroe, South Alabama, Texas State and Troy to give the league 10 football-playing members in 2018. Little Rock and UT Arlington compete in all sports as non-football members. That group gives the Sun Belt a mix of the "old" and the "new," with many long-time Sun Belt institutions – South Alabama is a charter member dating back to 1976 – continuing to have success and a solid corps of conference newcomers ready to make their marks on league and national levels.

The varied campuses and locations reflect another league strength – its diversity. The mix of regions and regional cultures provide a rare opportunity for league student-athletes and staff members to experience many environments. Those same student-athletes can also experience that diversity without leaving their own campuses.

For every All-Pro linebacker DeMarcus Ware (Troy) and Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Charles Tillman (UL Lafayette), and for every World Series MVP David Freese (South Alabama) and U.S. Open Champion (Dustin Johnson, Coastal Carolina) coming from Sun Belt campuses, there are also U.S. presidents (Lyndon Johnson, Texas State), business icons (Chick-fil-A president Daniel Cathy, Georgia Southern), nationally known entertainers (Tim McGraw, UL Monroe; Ludacris, Georgia State; Luke Bryan and Cole Swindell, Georgia Southern) and royalty (Miss America Debbye Turner, Arkansas State).

These proud alumni, as well as the thousands of student-athletes and staff members at a dozen institutions, are proof that the Sun Belt Conference gains stature with every year and provides the promise of future success with every sunrise. It is a league of opportunity and a league of excitement, and "Together We Rise" has never been more true or more appropriate.

SUMMERS TABBED AS NEW LEADER OF EAGLES

GEORGIA NATIVE BEGINS NEW CHAPTER OF HIS COACHING CAREER

Tyson Summers is in his first season as the head coach of the Georgia Southern Eagles. Summers, who has ties to Statesboro from his time with the Eagles in 2006, has a coaching career that has spanned almost 15 years and seven schools and has been a part of seven bowl teams.

A native of Tifton, Georgia, Summers returns home from Colorado State, where he served as the Rams' defensive coordinator and safeties coach in 2015. Under his tutelage, the Rams defense is ranked 20th in the country in passing defense, giving up just 186.3 yards per game heading into the Arizona Bowl. After dropping two overtime games early in the season, the Rams closed the regular season on a four-game win streak, with three of those victories coming on the road.

Prior to his work at CSU, he spent three seasons at UCF, where he served as defensive coordinator in 2014 for a unit that ranked among the best in the nation.

In his first full season as a defensive coordinator in 2014, Summers, 36, guided the top defense in the American Athletic

Conference, and one that ranked in the top 10 among FBS schools in total defense (5th, 298.5 ypg), rushing defense (6th, 104.3 ypg), scoring defense (9th, 19.2 ppg) and red zone defense (6th, 71.4%). Summers' defense helped UCF to a 9-4 record, a second consecutive American Athletic Conference title and a berth in the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl. The Knights held six opponents under 100 rushing yards and nine under 200 passing yards.

Three of Summers' defensive players earned first-team all-conference honors, while three more garnered second-team honors. That included cornerback Jacoby Glenn, who was The American's Co-Defensive Player of the Year and UCF's first Associated Press All-American (second team) since it joined the FBS level in 1996. Glenn signed as an undrafted free agent with the Chicago Bears in 2015.

Under Summers' leadership, linebacker Terrance Plummer earned back-to-back first-team all-conference honors, who was on the All-American Athletic Conference First Team in 2013

and 2014. He also was a two-time national defensive player of the week his final two years at UCF.

Summers was hired at UCF as a defensive assistant coach in 2012, and earned the title of linebackers coach one month later. For the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and that spring season, he was named interim defensive coordinator before being promoted to full-time defensive coordinator in April when spring camp concluded.

Summers helped call the plays in UCF's upset victory over high-powered Baylor in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, capping an unforgettable season for the Knights. The win enabled UCF to set a school record with 12 victories overall and achieve a program-high by being ranked No. 10 in the final AP Top 25 Poll. Plummer was named Defensive MVP of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, along with his first-team all-conference honors.

Leading the UCF linebackers in 2012, Summers tutored three Knights into consistent starters en route to a Conference USA East Division crown, a Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl win and a 10-4 record. Plummer, in his first year as the Knights' middle linebacker, went on to rack up 108 tackles with seven for loss. On the outsides, Ray Shipman broke out in just his second full season as he amassed 91 tackles. Previously a running back, Jonathan Davis was named the team's Most Improved Defensive Player, capping off the year with 99 tackles, including nine for a loss.

Summers' tenure at UCF came after a five-year stint at UAB that began in December 2006. He served as the Blazers' linebackers coach and added the roles of safeties coach and co-special teams coordinator in the final season of his tenure.

In his first year working with the UAB safeties in 2011, Summers helped mentor Jamie Bender in his senior season as he led the Blazers with 119 tackles. Bender also posted 7.5 tackles for loss, two interceptions, six break-ups and four forced fumbles. He was voted on to the All-C-USA Second Team for that performance. On special

teams, UAB ranked 17th in the nation by allowing just 4.71 yards per punt return, while freshman kicker Ty Long was named a 2011 Freshman All-American by Phil Steele's College Football Preview.

In Summers' first year at UAB, linebacker Joe Henderson was named to the All-C-USA Second Team. In 2008, Henderson climbed up to the first team thanks to a team-high 87 tackles as well as 12.5 tackles for loss, and went on to play for the BC Lions of the CFL from 2010-11. With a new wave of linebackers under Summers' control in 2010, Marvin Burdette paced the Blazers with 114 tackles en route to All-C-USA Honorable Mention accolades. While Summers was with UAB, kicker Swayze Waters was an All-C-USA First Team pick in 2007 and 2008, and appeared in NFL preseason games highlighted by a stint with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2011.

Summers coached the safeties at Georgia Southern in 2006, a year after serving as a graduate assistant for Georgia in 2005. That season the Bulldogs won the SEC title and earned a berth in the Sugar Bowl. Summers worked with the secondary and witnessed three UGA defensive backs being selected in the NFL Draft: Tim Jennings (second round, first-team All-SEC), DeMario Minter (fifth round, first-team All-SEC) and Greg Blue (fifth round, first-team All-American).

During the 2004 season, Summers was a graduate assistant at Troy, which reached the postseason and the Silicon Valley Classic, and in 2003, he helped guide the defensive backs at Presbyterian College. Summers earned his first coaching position at Tift County (Ga.) High School, where coached the defensive backs in 2002.

A four-year letterwinner at Presbyterian College, Summers earned preseason All-South Atlantic honors as a linebacker in 1999 and was selected as team captain as a senior. He received his bachelor's degree in political science from PC in 2002.

Summers is married to the former Beth King, and the couple has three sons, Jake, Walker and Anderson.

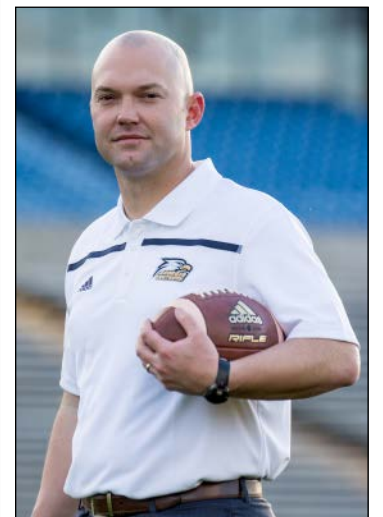

Lorenzo "Zo" Costantini is in his first year at Georgia Southern and serves as the defensive coordinator for the Eagles. Costantini comes to Statesboro after serving as the defensive line coach for UCF.

In his second stint at UCF, Costantini coached three seasons with the Knights, working as their defensive line coach. Relentless on the recruiting trail, Costantini was responsible at UCF for recruiting the Florida Panhandle (from Escambia County to Franklin and Liberty County), southern Alabama, Houston, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan and Mississippi.

A native of Houston, Texas, Costantini has been a defensive line coach at five schools in his career. He spent 2012 with Southern Miss after serving on the UAB staff from 2007-11.

UCF's sacks total increased from 29 in 2013 to 36 in 2014, in large part to Costantini's guidance up front. Both of those numbers led the American Athletic Conference. The Knights also led the conference those two seasons in tackles for loss. Eight players had multiple sacks, highlighted by Thomas Niles with 7.5 and Jaryl Mamea with 7.0. Both of those Knights went on to be named to the All-American Athletic Conference Second Team.

With the Knights ranking in the top 20 in several defensive categories that year, they produced a 9-4 overall record, received a trip to the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl and won back-to-back league titles.

Costantini was part of the memorable 2013 season in which UCF won a school-record 12 games, the American Athletic Conference title and the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl. The Knights finished ranked No. 10 in the country as they defeated two top-10 teams (No. 6/5 Baylor and No. 8/6 Louisville) along the way.

The UCF defense held 10 of its 13 opponents to under their scoring averages during 2013 even though it used several freshmen throughout the season. And UCF amassed 29 sacks while giving up just 22.

At Southern Miss, Costantini helped Jamie Collins earn a spot on the All-C-USA First Team as he led the team with 92 tackles,

20 tackles for loss and 10 sacks. He also forced four fumbles and broke up five passes. Costantini also guided Elliott Henigan to all-conference status at UAB following a three-year stint at Tulane.

UCF's defensive lines produced solid seasons under Costantini. The 2002 squad ranked third in the Mid-American Conference with 31 sacks, while both the 2000 and 2001 defenses placed in the top 30 in the country.

In 2002, Costantini played a vital role in coaching Elton Patterson to a spot on the All-MAC First Team. Patterson, who finished his career in the top five in school history in sacks, was a seventh-round draft pick by the Cincinnati Bengals in 2003. Costantini also coached Josh McKibben, who was named the team's defensive MVP and signed with the Baltimore Ravens.

Prior to his first stint at UCF, Costantini was the defensive line coach at UTEP from 1996-00 while serving as the strength and conditioning coach from 1995-00. In the 2000 NFL Draft, WAC Defensive Player of the Year Brian Young (St. Louis Rams) and Leif Larsen (Buffalo Bills) were drafted while Costantini was at UTEP.

Graduating from UTEP with a degree in education in 1990, Costantini was a four-year letterwinner and a member of the 1988 team that won 10 games and made an appearance in the Independence Bowl. He began his playing career for the Miners as an offensive lineman, but moved to defensive end and finally nose guard for his senior season. As a senior, he recorded 33 tackles, two tackles for loss, caused one fumble and recovered a fumble.

He began his collegiate coaching career at UTEP in 1995 as the team's strength & conditioning coach and was promoted to defensive line coach a year later. At UTEP, Costantini coached four players who earned All-Western Athletic Conference honors eight times during their careers. He coached at Jefferson High School in El Paso from 1992-94 where he was the defensive coordinator and strength & conditioning coach.

Born in Rome, Italy, Costantini and his wife Merritt have two children, Rocco and Sofia.

CO-OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR // QUARTERBACKS // FIRST SEASON // FOURTH OVERALL AT GS

Rance Gillespie is in his first season as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for head coach Tyson Summers at Georgia Southern.

Gillespie, who has previous ties to Georgia Southern Football as the offensive coordinator of the Eagles from 2007-2009, found success at the high school level as well, winning a pair state championships in the state of Georgia.

Gillespie spent the previous six seasons as the head coach of Valdosta (GA) High School, picking up 49 wins at one of the winningest high school programs in American football history. The Wildcats reached the state playoffs in each of Gillespie's seasons, including a quarterfinal berth in 2010.

In his first tenure at GS, the 2008 and 2009 offensive attacks led the Southern Conference in passing offense and also ranked high nationally. The Eagles also stood 20th nationally in scoring offense and 37th in total offense in 2008.

The running backs were one of the youngest position groups on the team, led by three freshmen in 2008. Adam Urbano led all backs scoring seven touchdowns, three coming in overtime periods and two which won the game (at Western Carolina, at The Citadel). He would go on to earn a spot on the SoCon All-Freshman Team. In 2009, receiver Raja Andrews earned second-team all-conference honors.

Gillespie also oversaw the kickoff return and returners. Andrews ranked 12th nationally averaging 14 yards per punt return in 2008. The punt return unit actually tied a program record with two returns for a touchdown.

During the staff's first year in Statesboro the offense put up some of the best numbers in program history. The Eagles' impressive offense, led by Walter Payton Award winner Jayson Foster, ranked first in rushing, eighth in total offense, eighth in scoring offense and 23rd in sacks allowed with Gillespie calling the plays.

Not only did the Eagles score nearly 37 points per game, but when it came to making a play in the clutch they did just that, finishing first nationally in fourth down conversions.

Working a running backs group hit hard all season long by injuries, Gillespie saw freshman Zeke Rozier earn Southern Conference Freshman of the Week honors in just his second collegiate game. Wide receiver-turned-running back Chris Teal earned the same honor in October.

Amid the record-setting season by Foster, Gillespie helped coach Lamar Lewis to a second-team All-SoCon honor. If it wasn't for an injury which required him to miss most of two games, Lewis would have surpassed 1,000 rushing yards (955 on 143 carries).

Prior to his first stint in Statesboro, Gillespie led Peach County (GA) High School to the Class AAA state championship in 2005 and 2006, the first two state titles in school history. He posted a 65-16 record as head coach during his tenure, including an impressive 50-8 mark his last four seasons. From 1995-99, he served as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator.

During his tenure at Peach County, dating back to the 1995 season, Gillespie had every starting quarterback signed to a college scholarship. Following the 2006 state championship season, 10 of his players signed a National Letter of Intent, including four that went to Vanderbilt, Troy, Maryland and UAB.

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution named him Coach of the Year in consecutive years (2005-06). He also received coaching accolades from the Macon Touchdown Club and Atlanta Touchdown Club (Class AAA).

Following the first state title, Gillespie was named Region 4AAA Coach of the Year, marking the third straight year he won that award. In 2004 he was not only named Region Coach of the Year, but also Athletics Director of the Year.

Peach County's amazing run began in 2003 when they not only won the Region title but was a state runner-up. Over those four years Gillespie would lead his team to the Region 4AAA title and playoff berth every season. The 2004 team advanced to the quarterfinals, then Peach County won consecutive state titles.

During his days as offensive coordinator, Gillespie and Peach County won three straight Region 4AAA titles and was state runner-up in 1998.

Gillespie also served as head coach at Banks County (GA) High School from 1999-2001. He served as the running backs coach at Coffee (GA) High School from 1994-95, and from 1992-94 was the wide receivers coach at Thomasville (GA) High School.

Gillespie began his collegiate playing career as a walk-on defensive back at the University of Georgia, graduating in 1992 with a degree in history education. He was a four-year member of the program from 1987-90.

Originally from Clayton, Georgia, Gillespie is married to Claudette Giles-Gillespie and they have one daughter, Kennedy.

Two-time national champion head coach David Dean is in his first season as the co-offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at Georgia Southern for head coach Tyson Summers. Dean, who had unprecedented success in his nine seasons as the Valdosta State head coach, proved his name belonged among the top in the nation when discussing the best coaches in the NCAA Division II's ranks.

Dean twice led his team to the pinnacle of the NCAA Division II football world as his squad won national championships in both 2007 and 2012. Additionally, he led his squad to four more appearances in the NCAA Playoffs and tallied a career record of 79 wins against just 27 losses, a winning percentage of .745.

Twice Dean was named the American Football Coaches Association Division II Coach of the Year (2007, 2012) and received the organization's Super Region II Coach of the Year honor in 2010. He had a player receive All-America recognition on 27 occasions, including six in his final season, while a Blazer was named All-Gulf South Conference 66 times under his watch. Additionally, 10 Valdosta State Blazers that played for Dean have gone on to the NFL.

Dean accomplished what very few on any level and in any sport have ever done in their first year as a coach, leading his Blazer squad to the 2007 NCAA Division II national championship. Along the way, Dean's Blazers tallied a 13-1 record, including a 7-1 mark in the Gulf South Conference. In directing his team to the national championship, Dean became just the second NCAA Division II coach to win the title in his first year as a head coach, joining North Dakota State's Earle Solomonson as the only coaches to accomplish the feat.

After trips to the playoffs in both 2008 and 2010, Dean once again led his squad to the top of the Division II football world in 2012 as the team capped off a 12-2 season with a 35-7 rout of previously unbeaten Winston-Salem State in the title game. After starting the season at 2-2, Dean's squad reeled off 10 straight victories to end the season and made Dean just the 10th head coach in NCAA Division II history to win multiple championships during their career.

Dean became the eighth man to assume the title of head coach at Valdosta State in the program's history on Jan. 19, 2007. He brought a wealth of knowledge to his new position as he had spent 19 years in the collegiate coaching ranks, including the role of Valdosta State's offensive coordinator from 2000 through 2006.

Dean made an immediate impact on the Blazer football squad during his initial season in Valdosta in 2000 as VSU led the nation in both total offense, at 502.4 yards per game, and in passing offense (377.9) while finishing third in scoring offense, scoring 45.5 points per game. Dusty Bonner was named the Harlon Hill Trophy winner and was one of two VSU offensive players to earn All-America honors. The Blazers capitalized on the offensive success, tallying a 10-2 record while advancing to the second NCAA Regional appearance in school history.

Dean was once again instrumental in the Blazers' success in 2002 as he helped the team reach its first national championship game. With Bonner gone to graduation, Dean groomed Buster Faulkner into an All-Gulf South Conference quarterback while running back Aaron Jenkins earned the school's third straight GSC Offensive Player-of-the-Year honor. Valdosta State was 11th nationally in passing that season, throwing for 277.5 yards a game, and 16th in scoring, at 33.3 points per outing.

In 2004, the Blazers won their first national championship as Dean directed an offense that was 33rd nationally in total offense at 415.8 yards a game. VSU was 38th nationally in rushing offense, 46th in passing and 26th in scoring offense.

Overall, 14 Valdosta State offensive players earned All-America honors during Dean's seven seasons as the Blazers' offensive coordinator while 25 times a VSU offensive player was named to the All-Gulf South Conference team. Additionally, the Blazers set 21 single-season team offensive records during Dean's time as offensive coordinator while the special teams unit established five new school records. The Blazers won four Gulf South Conference championships during his tenure as offensive coordinator, tallied a 56-6 league record and advanced to six NCAA postseasons during that span.

Dean's success at grooming offensive players began prior to his arrival at Valdosta State. Prior to his VSU tenure, Dean also served eight years as an assistant coach at West Georgia, the last two of which was spent as the Wolves' offensive coordinator. He joined West Georgia in 1992 as the squad's running backs coach before adding the title of special team's coordinator in 1993. Prior to the 1998 season, Dean took over the school's offensive coordinator position as well as the quarterback coaching job. Wolves quarterback Jeremy Clements was named the Gulf South Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year during Dean's initial season as offensive coordinator, giving the coach four honorees in the five-year stretch from 1998-2002.

West Georgia accumulated an 18-5 record during Dean's two seasons as offensive coordinator, including an 8-1 mark and a GSC championship in 1999. Overall, West Georgia compiled a 59-28 record, won two GSC titles and beat Valdosta State seven times.

Dean began his coaching career at Valdosta State in 1988 as he began a four-year stint as wide receivers coach. He also served as wide receivers coach at Avondale High School during the 1987 season and spent the 1986 school year as a graduate assistant coach at Georgia Tech.

Dean walked on to the Georgia Tech squad in 1982 and earned a scholarship the following season as he played wide receiver for the Yellow Jackets through the 1985 school year. He graduated in 1987 from Georgia State University while working as a student assistant coach at Georgia Tech.

He is married to the former Stacie Stott, and the couple has three daughters – Caroline, Allison and Natalie.

Chris Foster is in his first season as Georgia Southern's running backs coach under head coach Tyson Summers. Foster has plenty of experience coaching the position as he brings 12 years of coaching involvement at three previous stops to Statesboro.

Foster comes to Georgia Southern from Maryville (TN) College, where he spent the 2015 season as a running backs coach. In his lone season there, he coached a rushing attack that averaged 257.4 yards per game and had 29 rushing touchdowns. Deshjon Whitlock averaged 5.9 yards per carry on his 154 attempts, accumulating 906 total rushing yards while scoring 13 touchdowns en route to first-team all-conference honors.

Prior to Maryville, Foster spent three seasons at Appalachian State, coaching a pair of his pupils to two of the best campaigns by running backs in school history. His efforts produced seven all-conference players and a pair of FCS All-Americans.

In 2013, Marcus Cox set App State freshman records with 1,250 rushing yards and 21 total touchdowns, en route to being named the Southern Conference Freshman of the Year, placing second in voting for the Jerry Rice Award (NCAA Division I FCS Freshman of the Year) and being the only FCS representative on 247Sports' True Freshman All-America team. Cox also set a new SoCon record by being named the league's Freshman of the Week six times in just 10 starts.

In Foster's first season with the Mountaineers (2012), Steven Miller rushed for 1,368 yards, good for 16th nationally in NCAA Division I FCS. Miller also caught 34 passes for 377 yards and scored 15 touchdowns (11 rushing, four receiving) in Foster's only season

as his mentor. Miller went on to sign with the NFL's Detroit Lions on their practice squad.

Foster came to Appalachian State from Gardner-Webb, where he served as the Runnin' Bulldogs' running backs coach for eight seasons (2004-11). He coached an All-Big South performer in four of his eight seasons at Gardner-Webb, including each of his final three campaigns in Boiling Springs. In Foster's final season at GWU, running back Kenny Little became the Bulldogs' first 1,000-yard rusher in 11 years.

In his eight seasons at Gardner-Webb, Foster also served as the staff's primary academic advisor and a top recruiter. Additionally, he oversaw the program's strength and conditioning activities on an interim basis in 2006.

Foster began his coaching career immediately upon his graduation from Gardner-Webb, where he was one of the program's all-time best rushers from 2000-03. A two-time all-Big South running back, Foster ranked sixth in GWU history at the time of his graduation (and seventh currently) with 1,883 career rushing yards.

He was also a two-time first-team academic all-district honoree, making him one of only two student-athletes in Gardner-Webb football history to earn the prestigious recognition multiple times.

A Chesnee, South Carolina, native, Foster was a South Carolina Mr. Football award finalist and the Appalachian 2A Conference Player of the Year at Chesnee High in 2000. He graduated from GWU in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in physical education.

Foster has a daughter, Journei.

Jimmy Lindsey is in his first year at Georgia Southern and serves as an assistant coach on the defensive side of the ball for head coach Tyson Summers. Lindsey comes to Statesboro after serving at Furman the previous four seasons. At Furman, Lindsey spent four seasons as the defensive line coach, adding the title of assistant head coach for the final season.

In his first season with the Paladins in 2012, Lindsey directed an improved defensive front that featured All-SoCon end Josh Lynn and pass rush that netted 25 sacks. In 2013, Lindsey crafted a unit that helped key Furman to a SoCon championship, headlined by consensus All-SoCon end Gary Wilkins. In 2014, Wilkins completed his collegiate career ascent under Lindsey by landing All-America honors en route to signing a free agent contract with the Oakland Raiders. In 2015, freshman defensive lineman Jaylan Reid garnered SoCon All-Freshman Team honors.

Lindsey joined the Paladin program following two seasons as defensive line and special teams coach at Chattanooga, his alma mater. In his short stint at UTC, the second of his coaching career, he helped mold a Mocs' defensive front into one of the best in the SoCon in 2011.

Four of Lindsey's players earned All-SoCon honors in 2011, including Josh Williams, a first-team selection, and three performers - Josh Freeman, Keyon Reed, and Davis Tull - were named to the SoCon All-Freshman Team.

Lindsey served as an assistant coach at Tennessee-Martin in 2009 after working two seasons (2007-08) as defensive

ends coach at Miami (Ohio), where in his first year he helped the Redhawks pace the Mid-America Conference in six statistical categories. He also served as co-special teams coordinator in charge of kickoff and punt return units.

Before Miami, he spent four years at Gardner-Webb (2003-06) coaching the defensive line and linebackers while also serving as recruiting coordinator. Harold Wells, one of Lindsey's products, was named 2004 I-AA (FCS) Football Gazette National Defensive Lineman of the Year, and defensive end Brian Johnston was drafted by the Kansas City Chiefs in 2008.

Lindsey went to Gardner-Webb from Chattanooga, where he coached UTC linebacker Josh Cain to second-team All-American honors in 2002. He spent the 2000 and 2001 seasons as a restricted earnings coach on the Mocs' staff.

The young coach played linebacker at Chattanooga and served as a team captain in 1999, his senior season. He was a three-time member of the Dean's List and 1999 recipient of UTC's Marco Sheppard Mr. Hustle Award.

Lindsey, who graduated from Chattanooga in 2001 with a degree in sports administration, has served NFL Minority Coaching Internships with the San Diego Chargers (2013), Denver Broncos (2010), Detroit Lions (2008), and Cleveland Browns (2006).

He married Lauren Thomas of Chattanooga in 2015 and has a daughter, Kiara.

The 2016 campaign marks the eighth season overall, and fourth in his current stint at Georgia Southern for Chad Lunsford. After working with the wide receivers in 2013, Lunsford worked two seasons working with the tight ends and serving as recruiting coordinator. He will continue to coach the Eagle tight ends, but will add the role of special teams coordinator to his duties in 2016.

Over the past two seasons, his tight ends contributed to the option ground game which led the FBS in rushing yards per game both of those two seasons and in 2015 led the FBS in rushing touchdowns. The Eagles won the Sun Belt Championship in 2014, posting an 8-0 record and won the GoDaddy Bowl in 2015 with a win over Bowling Green. On the recruiting side, Lunsford helped engineer signing classes which featured 22 players and ranked in the top half of the Sun Belt in 2015, also ranked near the top of the Sun Belt in 2014 and in 2016.

Georgia Southern's wide receivers in 2013 led NCAA Division I with most yards per completion, averaging 19.3 yards per catch. Fourteen catches ranked among Georgia Southern's big plays as the Eagle receiving corps contributed to one of the nation's top offenses.

Lunsford returned to Statesboro as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator in June 2013 after four years in an administrative position with the Auburn football program. He served in consecutive roles as the Tigers' Director of Scouting and Director of Player Personnel, assisting with the day-to-day operations of Auburn football, with an emphasis on recruiting, organizing and prospect evaluation.

Credited with making advancements in technology and introducing new concepts to help the Tigers win recruiting wars, Lunsford assisted with and organized numerous other aspects of Auburn's recruiting process. The Tigers boasted three of the nation's top recruiting classes in 2010, 2011 and 2012, and that success translated to the field where Auburn claimed the 2010 BCS national championship, 2010 Southeastern Conference Championship and made appearances in two other bowl games.

Lunsford coached the slotbacks in his previous three seasons (2003-05) on the Georgia Southern staff, including the Eagles' eventual all-time receptions leader Raja Andrews, who finished his career with 127 catches and as the record holder for receiving yards in a single season with 873. Armed with the ability to run and deliver blocks as well as catch passes in the option offense, his slotbacks provided physical and statistical support to three-

straight NCAA Division I rushing titles to go along with a Southern Conference championship in 2004.

After departing Georgia Southern in 2006, Lunsford spent a year at Griffin High School as a special education teacher and served as the outside linebackers coach. The Bears posted an overall record of 11-2 that season for a winning percentage of .917, highest in the program history to that point, and advanced to the second round of the state playoffs.

Two years back at Georgia Military College followed his time at Griffin with Lunsford taking a familiar place as linebackers coach and adding responsibilities as special teams coordinator. The Bulldogs continued their winning ways, posting an 18-4 record over those two seasons, with trips to the Pilgrim's Pride and Mississippi Bowls. A punter and two linebackers earned national accolades with another linebacker, eventual Eagle Calvin West, recognized as an honorable mention for NJCAA All-America honors.

Lunsford played at Elbert County High School for legendary coach T. McFerrin, Lunsford was a two-way starter at linebacker and center for the Blue Devils. During his high school career, Elbert County made four-straight appearances in the state playoffs and posted a 20-3 record in his junior and senior years. He graduated from Georgia College in May 2000 with a B.S. in biology and minor in mathematics and earned a Master's of Sport Science degree from the United States Sports Academy in 2002.

While at Georgia College as an undergrad, he served as a student assistant with Georgia Military College, beginning his career coaching the tight ends. In February 1997, he was hired as the running backs coach and handled several of the program's administrative areas. The Bulldogs would play in three straight Golden Isles bowl games, capture the 1998 National Junior College Athletics Association (NJCAA) rushing title with an average of more than 300 yards per game, and bringing home the 1999 Golden Isles bowl championship.

Lunsford moved to the defensive side of the ball for the 2000 season and his coaching efforts helped GMC rank second nationally in total defense that year. An opportunity to coach on the offense again prompted him to accept an assistant coaching position at Appalachian State where he would coach the tight ends for the 2001 and 2002 seasons.

Married to the former Tiffany "Tippy" Hyde of Macon in 2002, the Lunsfords have three children, Sophie, Rhett and Josie.

ALLEN MOGRIDGE

OFFENSIVE LINE // FIRST SEASON

A veteran of the college ranks in the coaching profession, Allen Mogridge is in his first season as the offensive line coach for head coach Tyson Summers. Mogridge began his UCF career as its tight ends and special teams coach in 2012 before working with Temple's offensive line in 2013. He came back to the Knights as their tight ends and H-backs coach in 2014, and finished his first year as the offensive line coach in 2015.

Mogridge helped mentor the Knights to a 9-4 overall record, a spot in the Bitcoin St. Petersburg Bowl and an American Athletic Conference title in 2014. Tight ends Justin Tukes and Kevin Miller along with H-back Joseph Puopolo were key contributors throughout the year, with Tukes closing out his career with 30 receptions overall.

With the Owls, Mogridge's offensive line protected true freshman quarterback P.J. Walker, who broke out with a 60.8 completions percentage and 20 touchdowns compared to eight interceptions. Temple rushed for 17 touchdowns as well.

UCF was dominant on special teams in 2012 as the Knights went 10-4 and won the C-USA East Division title as well as the Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl. They ranked 12th in the nation in kickoff returns, led by All-American and C-USA Special Teams Player of the Year Quincy McDuffie, who was first in the country with a 34.24 average. He tied a school record with three returns for touchdowns, highlighted by tying the NCAA mark when he had two kickoff returns for scores at Marshall.

Meanwhile, J.J. Worton entered UCF's top 10 with 266 punt return yards en route to being named to the All-C-USA First Team. And in his first full season as the Knights placekicker, Shawn Moffitt ranked second on the team with 89 points and went 10-for-14 in field-goal attempts.

Mogridge worked as North Carolina's special teams coach, tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator from 2009-11. He helped guide the Tar Heels to the 2009 Meineke Car Care Bowl, a double-overtime victory over Tennessee in the 2010 Music City Bowl and a berth in the Independence Bowl in 2011.

A 1999 graduate of North Carolina, Mogridge's 2011 tight ends combined for 33 receptions for 488 yards and two touchdowns. In 2010, they led the ACC with 85 catches, highlighted by Ryan Taylor's 36 and Zack Pinalto's 30. Pinalto holds UNC's career record with 94 catches by a tight end and played in 13 games for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2011, while Taylor was picked in the seventh round of

the 2011 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers.

On special teams in 2011, North Carolina ranked 11th in the nation by allowing just 4.63 yards per punt return, and 23rd in the FBS by permitting opposing kick returners to average only 19.54 yards per attempt. In Mogridge's first year, the Tar Heels were 19th in the country in punt returns and 18th in punt return defense.

Mogridge was on the coaching staff at the University at Buffalo from 2004-08 where he led the running backs before ending his stint leading the offensive line and serving as the Bulls' recruiting coordinator.

While in Buffalo, Mogridge coached freshman running back James Starks to the All-MAC Second Team in 2006 - the first time a UB freshman earned all-league honors. Starks went on to become the school's first 1,000-yard rusher (in the FBS era) a year later. During that 2007 season, the offensive line paved the way for a school FBS record 291 points and 258 completions by quarterback Drew Willy. On the O-line was center Jamey Richard, who was an All-MAC honoree and eventually taken in the seventh round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts.

In Mogridge's final season, Buffalo claimed the 2008 MAC title with a victory over heavily-favored Ball State and earned the school's second bowl berth.

Mogridge spent one year as a strength and conditioning coach at UNC while pursuing his master's degree. He also worked in the Carolina Panthers 2000 training camp before playing for one year in the Arena Football League with the Carolina Cobras. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant on defense at Buffalo from 2001-02, helping the Bulls jump from near the bottom of total defense to 45th in the nation in 2001. He then helped lead Western Carolina as its defensive ends coach and recruiting coordinator in 2003.

Mogridge lettered at North Carolina from 1996-99 while playing four different positions - tight end, fullback, offensive tackle and defensive end. He earned the Kenan Award for Leadership as a senior, and went to four bowl games highlighted by the 1996 and 1997 Gator Bowls. DEFENSIVE BACKS // FIRST SEASON

Jeremy Rowell is in his first season on the Georgia Southern football staff as the defensive backs coach. The veteran coach brings 15 seasons of college experience to Statesboro, including six as a defensive coordinator.

Rowell spent the previous three seasons coaching at the high school level, helping lead Colquitt County (GA) High to a pair of GHSA Class 1-AAAAAA state championships. In his final season at CCHS, the Packers went 15-0 and finished as national champions by High School Football America and were ranked No. 2 in the country by USA Today.

A native of Crestview, Florida, Rowell spent 15 seasons at Troy University, the final six as the Trojans' defensive coordinator. He was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2005 after six seasons overseeing the defensive backs.

From 2006-2010, the Trojans won the Sun Belt Conference title outright or shared the title each of those five seasons.

In 2011, the Trojans had two players honored for the defensive work by being selected by the coaches and media for the All-Sun Belt Conference team. The 2010 defense was a young squad as they had to replace several starters from a year before who departed for the NFL and CFL; however, the team came together and helped lead the team to the 2010 R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. They were able to hold opponents to 14 points or less three different times.

In 2008, Rowell coached Sherrod Martin, a 2009 NFL Draft selection and All-Sun Belt Conference selection Terence Moore along with 2010 Arizona Cardinals draftee Jorrick Calvin. Three seasons ago, Rowell coached the 11th overall pick in the NFL Draft in Leodis McKelvin, along with the nation's leader in interceptions, Elbert Mack, in the defensive backfield.

The defense in 2008 ranked in the top 35 in several categories, including pass defense (23rd), total defense (30th) and scoring defense (31st). They also ranked 17th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (104.03).

Under Rowell, the Trojans flourished in the defensive backfield, becoming one of the mainstays of a stingy Troy defense. In 2004, the Trojans ranked sixth in the country in pass efficiency defense (100.56) and 16th in total defense (311.00 yards). Their 32 turnovers gained were tied for second in the country, while the turnover margin (+0.92) was tied for 10th. In 2003, despite returning just four starters, the defense ranked sixth nationally in turnovers gained (35), 26th in rushing defense (125.5 yards) and 39th in total defense (349.67 yards).

Defensive back Derrick Ansley finished third in the nation in interceptions in 2003, behind Miami (FL) safety Sean Taylor and Nebraska's Josh Bullocks. Ansley tallied nine interceptions, earning College Football News All-Independent honors, as well as an honorable mention selection on the ESPN.com All-Independent team. Rayshun Reed joined Ansley on both All-Independent teams, and earned an invitation to participate in the Blue-Gray All-Star Football Classic on Christmas Day.

The 2002 defense ranked fourth nationally in total defense. The Trojans allowed just 276.83 yards per game to opponents in 12 games, ranking behind only Texas Christian, Kansas State and Alabama. Troy was ranked 11th in pass defense, 13th in rushing defense and 30th in scoring defense.

A solid field general during his playing career, Rowell is considered one of the top quarterbacks in school history. He led Troy to a 19-3 regular season record as a starter in 1994 and 1995. With Rowell under center, the Trojans finished with the only perfect (11-0) regular season record in school history. Rowell accounted for 3,300 passing yards in his career with 22 touchdowns. He also scored 15 rushing touchdowns in a season (1994) and finished with 20 for his career.

A graduate of Troy University, Rowell received his bachelor's degree in mathematics & science in 1997 and his master's degree in foundations of education in 1999. He is married to former Jessica Owens, and the couple has two children, Jacob and Jaxon.

In 2004-2005, he was the Sports Performance Director at Velocity Sports Performance in Cordova, Tennessee, and spent three years (2005-2008) as the head strength coach at Georgia State University, overseeing 17 sports. Travis Taylor is in his first season as the director of football operations under head coach Tyson Summers. Taylor, from Unadilla, Georgia, spent two seasons with Western Kentucky as the assistant director of football operations. In his first season, WKU went 8-4 and won the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl over Central Michigan. The Hilltoppers won 12 games in 2015, highlighted by an undefeated conference record, WKU's first appearance in the top 25, and a Conference-USA championship. The Hilltoppers defeated South Florida in the Miami Beach Bowl 45-35, ending the season with a 12-2 record.

He re-located to Western Kentucky after five seasons at UAB, spending the final two as the director of football operations for the Blazers, where Summers coached from 2007-11.

Taylor earned his bachelor's degree at Valdosta State in 2008 in exercise physiology, and then his master's in 2009 in higher education with an emphasis on educational leadership.

Taylor played at VSU from 2004-2007 and was a three-year starter for the Blazers at wide receiver. He was a part of the 2004 and 2007 Valdosta State teams that captured NCAA Division II national championships.



STEVE DENNIS // DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL ADMINISTRATION // FIRST SEASON

Former Troy Director of Athletics Steve Dennis is in his first season as the director of football administration at Georgia Southern. Dennis spent seven full years running the Troy athletics department and saw his student-athletes flourish both on the field and in the classroom. The Trojan student-athletes regularly posted grade point averages of 3.0 or better, allowing Troy to enjoy the highest level of success possible under the NCAA's Academic Progress Report for the 2008-09 and the 2009-10 school years as all 16 NCAA sports registered above the mandated 92.5 percent.

Under his tutelage, Troy's baseball program had 17 players drafted or signed to professional contracts while the football program sent 27 players into professional football, including first-round draft picks DeMarcus Ware and Leodis McKelvin. The Troy football program was especially successful under his watchful eye. The Trojans won five consecutive Sun Belt Conference titles and appeared in four bowl games during his tenure as director of athletics and Troy led the Sun Belt Conference in football attendance in five of his final six seasons.

His tenure as athletics director was marked by construction and growth of Troy University's athletics facilities. The soccer and track teams moved into a brand-new facility. Riddle-Pace Field underwent \$5 million in renovations that included the construction of the Lott Baseball Complex. Veterans Memorial Stadium saw the addition of two new luxury boxes and prior to the 2012 season a brand new playing surface. The crowning achievement of the facility improvements under Dennis was the new Trojan Arena that opened for the 2012-13 basketball season.

Externally, Dennis was instrumental in the formation of the Trojan Warriors, the athletic department's booster club, as well as "The Legion," a student support group. Both groups grew to more than 1,000 members in a short time and continued to grow annually. The athletics department also entered into a marketing agreement with IMG College, an agreement that was renewed in 2009.

Dennis went to Troy from Auburn University, where he served in a variety of capacities beginning in 1985. His final assignment was as the Associate Director of Tigers Unlimited, the Athletics Department's Development office. In that position, he was responsible for identifying, cultivating and soliciting support from individuals, private industry and corporations for the Athletics Department.

A native of Macon, Georgia, Dennis graduated from the University of Georgia, cum laude, in 1978. While at Georgia, he was the Bulldogs' defensive captain in 1978 and was an Academic All-Southeastern Conference selection that same season. During his playing career, he played in three bowl games for the Bulldogs.

Dennis started his professional career as a high school teacher, football coach and baseball coach in Windsor, Georgia. He started his collegiate coaching career at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga in 1981. In four-plus seasons, he coached outside linebackers, the defensive line and special teams for the Moccasins. Dennis went to work as the defensive backs and special teams coach at Auburn in 1985, and he remained on the Tigers' staff for eight seasons. He was named the SEC Working Coach of the Year in 1986 by The Birmingham Touchdown Club. Dennis returned to his alma mater in December of 1993, and worked as the defensive backs and special teams coach for the Bulldogs for two seasons.

From 1997 until 2002, Dennis was out of college athletics. Dennis returned to Auburn to coach tight ends in 2002, before moving to fund-raising within the Auburn Athletics Department in 2003. During his college coaching career, he was part of seven bowl teams and one Division I-AA playoff team.

Dennis and his wife, Lisa, have four children - Chris, Cale, Corey and Allison.

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CHRIS BALL // VIDEO COORDINATOR // FOURTH SEASON

Chris Ball, a veteran video coordinator who has served multiple athletics programs, joined the Georgia Southern Football staff in 2013. The native of St. Marys, West Virginia, directs all coaches film from practices and games as well as film exchange with Eagle opponents. He manages and troubleshoots technology for the program utilizing the XOS software system.

With the assistance of a number of students and a graduate assistant, Ball uses up to six cameras at practice and games to provide footage for daily review and highlight videos. He maintains the program's recent film archives and a 50 terabytes of storage to make clips available to the staff on demand.

Ball spent three years at Georgia State, starting as the first football video coordinator for the Panther program. He organized all video efforts for Georgia State in its inaugural competition year and handled equipment purchases and maintenance while hiring and overseeing a student staff of four.

Prior to his time in Atlanta, Ball was the football video coordinator at Yale, Furman and Eastern Michigan. He started his career in video at West Virginia University as a student assistant for two years and was hired as a video assistant for the Mountaineers in 2007.

Brandy Clouse organizes and runs the Athletic Sports Medicine department at Georgia Southern since being promoted to the Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine in 2014. Clouse oversees four full-time assistants and a number of graduate and student assistants, who work with all 17 of the Eagles' Division I sports programs. 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STUDENT-ATHLETE SERVICES AND NCAA COMPLIANCE

Cone Hall is the home to the Academic Enhancement Center in the Office of Student-Athlete Services. The former mid-century residence hall was completely refurbished to provide individual and group study areas, a computer lab, meeting rooms for tutorial work, a lecture room, conference room and offices for support staff.

During the 2015-2016 academic year, Georgia Southern's student-athletes posted the highest combined grade point average in history of the department with a 3.01 for the year.

Two hundred and twenty-seven student-athletes made the Honor Roll in the spring, which accounts for 64 percent of the department. Thirty-eight of those student-athletes posted a 4.0 GPA to earn a spot on the President's List, while 82 students made the Dean's List with a GPA of 3.5-3.99. Two hundred and twenty-two student-athletes made the Honor Roll in the fall. Thirty of those student-athletes posted a 4.0 GPA to earn a spot on the President's List, while 92 students made the Dean's List with a GPA of 3.5-3.99.

The Student-Athlete Services staff is committed to providing all student athletes with the support needed to be successful in the classroom while also preparing them for the life after graduation. Cone Hall also houses the NCAA compliance office which oversees student-athlete eligibility and adherence with NCAA rules and regulations.



Matt Dobson was an all-conference football player for the Eagles, but was also named a first-team Academic All-American and won the Freddie Solomon Community Spirit Award at the Premier Players of College Football charitable awards dinner in Tampa, Florida.

Spanning the majority of the field level, the athletic performance area at the Ted Smith Family Football Center factors in heavily to the success of the Eagles. Complete with natural sunlight, the floor-to-ceiling windows across offer an incredible view of Paulson Stadium and Glenn Bryant Field and provides additional motivation.

The strength and conditioning area is nearly four times the size of Iron Works, where all Eagle student-athletes previously conducted their workouts, with ample floor space for equipment and activities with separate coaches' offices, supplement room and storage space. The centerpiece of the

field-level space, the strength and conditioning area is flanked by the Eagles' locker room and athletic training area with the equipment issue area located across the hall.

Access to both sides of the building and to the field is just a few steps away. A turf field is located just outside the doorways for other exercises and functional rehabilitation with athletic trainers.

While the space is immense in comparison to Iron Works, equally impressive is the list of new equipment that fill the space. Twelve Power-Lift Multi-Racks and four Power-Lift Half-Racks line the walls with the 16 platforms each stocked

with a Eleiko weightlifting 177.5 kilogram set. The space allows for multiple configurations. Customized in similar fashion as the racks, eight Power-Lift glute-ham machines, six Hammer Strength neck machines, four Louis Simmons reverse hyperextension machines, as well as 10 various Hammer Strength machines complete the current order.

New free weights, made by IronGrip, including 60 pairs of Georgia Southern branded dumbbells, medicine balls and other types of resistance equipment are also available for use. Two Lifefitness treadmills have been installed to assist with conditioning and rehabilitation.

With the opening of the Ted Smith Family Football Center in 2014, the Georgia Southern Football Program gained a very important piece of the puzzle that rarely gets seen by the general public. The equipment room, which factors in heavily to the success of the Eagles, is the hub of the facility where gear is stored, uniforms are cleaned and lockers are stocked for daily use.

Under the direction of head equipment manager Adam Brooks, the GS program has one of the finest equipment rooms in the region. The new facility is stocked with several high-intensity washers and dryers, space-saving storage areas and an open area that can be used for various tasks such as folding shirts, applying decals on helmets or getting the game-day equipment ready for the team.

The staff, which consists of two full-time employees and a small army of students, attends every practice in case any damage is done or someone needs a quick switch, and also helps out with practice in terms of making sure the equipment is in the right place for each drill.

The outfitting process for the team begins about a season in advance. Brooks meets with an adidas representative every spring the year before to go over the new styles and designs for the future season. He has to send out his lengthy order by the fall that includes thousands of items, not including shoes, and the new items for the fall will begin to arrive in mid-June all the way through mid-August with the bulk of it coming in July. While orders for other sports are also rolling in around the same time, the equipment room could have upwards of 1,000 boxes of equipment and gear to unpack, count and organize.

In 2013, the Eagles signed the department's first all-sports apparel contract with adidas, which provides approximately \$800,000 in product. That contract was renewed in 2016.

On game day, Brooks arrives over five hours before kickoff and his staff will come in about four hours prior to help set up each player's locker with their equipment, a hanging jersey with the name showing from every angle and a shiny helmet on the floor in front.

When the Eagles are on the road, Brooks and his staff pack trunks of extra equipment and uniforms, as well as a travel bag for each player that is expected to be returned after the game, on the 18-wheeler that hits the road at least a day before the team takes off for its destination.

SPORTS MEDICINE

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Partnering with one of the top athletic training programs in the nation at Georgia Southern University, student-athletes in all 17 sports receive excellent care and attention both on the field and off. Under the direction of Brandy Clouse, Georgia Southern Sports Medicine provides optimal care for student-athletes as they prepare for practice and competition. Full-time and graduate assistant athletic trainers work with all Eagle teams during their competition seasons and off-season workouts to prevent and rehabilitate injuries. A team of physicians and specialists, including a primary care physician and orthopedic surgeons, are present at all Eagles' games.

Opened in summer 2014, the new Ted Smith Family Football Operations Facility features nearly 2,500-square foot athletic training room for the treatment and rehabilitation of injuries. The new facility incorporates the very latest advances and resources in sports medicine, including a new underwater treadmill with video monitoring system, as staff members constantly research and incorporate new technology to benefit the student-athlete.

The underwater treadmill, which allows for variable water depths and has an adjustable floor, is housed in the expansive hydrotherapy room with hot and cold tubs custom-installed at floor level. The area also contains an industrial ice machine and hydration station for preparing and storing PowerAde, water and ice coolers for practices and game day.

A designated area for rehabilitation, as well as the turf field adjoining the facility, allows for specialized care for sessions specific to the treatment of injuries and for post-surgery recovery. More than a dozen treatment stations and eight taping stations fill the floor space of main football athletic training facility with the ability to handle double the student-athlete capacity of the Hanner Fieldhouse athletic training room.

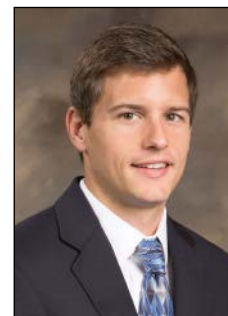

EAGLES' HELMET TECHNOLOGY FEATURED ON NBC NIGHTLY NEWS

When Georgia Southern started preseason camp in 2013, it joined an elite group of collegiate football teams employing the Helmet Impact Telemetry System (HITS), which measures and records every hit to the head during practices and games.

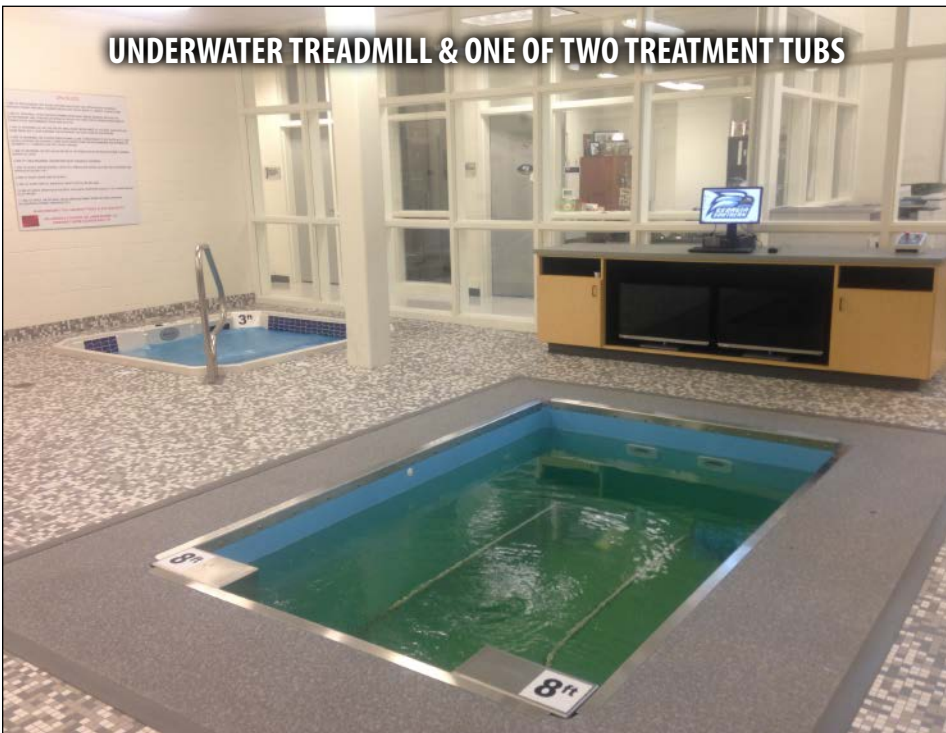
With funding from the Office of the Vice President for Research and Economic Development, Georgia Southern has equipped 40 helmets with the Riddell HITS system. There are six sensors inside each helmet that measures the severity of a hit to the head.

A typical impact in football lasts about 15 milliseconds, and in that instant, measurements from the sensors will be transmitted in nearly real-time to a laptop computer being monitored on the sidelines of all practices and games.

If a hit reaches a certain threshold, a pager worn by a graduate research student and the head athletics trainer will receive a notification and will follow with appropriate action with attention and, if they display any unusual behavior, a clinical evaluation to see if it is safe for him to continue playing or not.

Each impact is time stamped and can be synchronized with game video so coaches, athletics trainers and researchers can better evaluate the hits.

Less than two dozen schools are using the system around the country. Other schools to use the HITS system in their football programs include Virginia Tech, North Carolina and Oklahoma, putting GS at the forefront of concussion prevention in college football.

Functional athletic training rooms are also located at the Beautiful Eagle Creek practice facility for football, at the Wiggins Building for baseball, at the softball stadium and at the track/soccer complex to help in providing care to the student-athletes anywhere around the athletic campus.

In summer 2013, Georgia Southern stepped to

the front of both safety and technology as the Eagles employed the Sideline Response System (SRS) in conjunction with the Head Impact Telemetry System (HITS). This patented technology by Riddell records the frequency and severity of impacts received by a player during games and practices allowing for easy and accurate sideline monitoring of on-field impacts.

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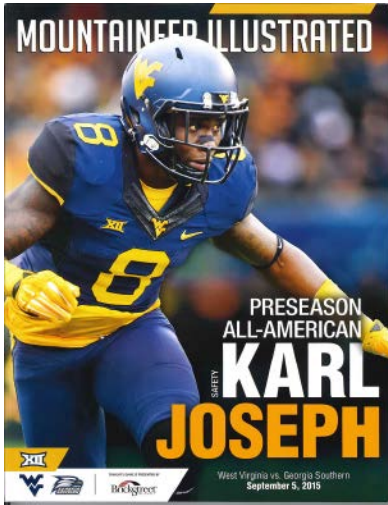

EAGLES SHUT OUT ON THE ROAD BY WEST VIRGINIA

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — Karl Joseph picked off three passes, and Skyler Howard threw for 359 yards and a pair of touchdowns to lead West Virginia to a 44-0 victory over Georgia Southern before 55,182 fans at Milan Puskar Stadium in both team's season opener.

It was Georgia Southern's first meeting against West Virginia on the gridiron and first game against a Big 12 opponent.

Matt Breida led Georgia Southern with 70 rushing yards on 17 carries, and quarterback Favian Upshaw gained 64 yards on 16 carries.

Howard completed 16-of-25 passes, and two Mountaineers had over 100 receiving yards. Shelton Gibson

caught three passes for 130 yards and a touchdown, and Javon Durante had three receptions for 121 yards and a score. Wendell Smallwood finished with 11 carries for 96 yards and a touchdown, and Joseph tallied with eight tackles.

Five turnovers and chunk plays over the top doomed the Eagles. The Mountaineers had four pass plays over 40 yards, including a 57-yard completion to Durante and a 57-yard reception by Gibson. Four interceptions and a fumble put the Eagle defense on its heels most of the night — Georgia Southern's average field position was its own 20-yard line while West Virginia's was its 37.

Despite giving up some big pass plays, the Eagle defense held strong for the first 32 minutes of the contest before wearing down. West Virginia moved the ball inside the Eagle 20-yard line four times in the first half and came away with just nine points. In addition, the Mountaineers took over inside the Eagle 45-yard line twice and were forced to punt. Matt Dobson, Antwione Williams and Ironhead Gallon all posted eight tackles on the night, and Bernard Dawson collected 1.5 sacks.

Trailing 16-0 at halftime, the Eagles turned it over on their first two possessions of the second half, and West Virginia made Georgia Southern pay on the second. After Joseph picked off an Upshaw pass at the West Virginia 28-yard line, Howard hit Daikiel Shorts for a 19-yard completing to set up a 6-yard TD run by Rushel Shell and a 23-0 lead.

After the Eagles turned it over on downs at the Mountaineer 30-yard-line, West Virginia went the distance in four plays to open an insurmountable 30-0 cushion with 4:19 to go in the third quarter. Howard hit Durante with a 23-yard pass to start the drive and capped it with a 26-yard strike to Gibson in the corner of the end zone. A 19-yard run by Smallwood 1:37 into the fourth quarter put the game away.

It was the first time the Eagles were kept off the scoreboard since a 45-0 loss at Montana in the 1995 I-AA playoffs, a streak of 242 games. The Eagles did not move the ball into West Virginia territory until their third possession of the second half.

BREIDA, GLOVER STAR IN HOME OPENER AS EAGLES ROLL PAST BRONCOS

STATESBORO, Ga. — A week after getting shut out for the first time in nearly two decades, Georgia Southern rolled past Western Michigan with a 43-17 win in the Eagles' home opener at Paulson Stadium.

Matt Breida rushed for 176 yards and four touchdowns, averaging 16 yards a clip, and the offensive line helped the Eagles roll up 413 yards and five touchdowns on the ground, including 103 yards from quarterback Favian Upshaw, 82 from Wesley Fields and 43 yards and a score from L.A. Ramsby.

The defense and special teams turned in an excellent performances as well, and two interceptions by Antonio Glover in Bronco territory turned into 10 points for Georgia Southern. The senior safety added a third for good measure,

tying the Paulson Stadium record for interceptions by an Eagle, and made seven tackles. Matt Dobson led the Eagles with nine stops and a breakup, and Georgia Southern gave up just 25 rushing yards.

Zach Terrell threw for 227 yards and two touchdowns and connected with Daniel Braverman 13 times for 122 yards and a score to lead Western Michigan.

After Western Michigan scored late in the first half, Breida put a damper on any thoughts of a comeback on the second play of the third quarter when he took a handoff, veered right and raced down the sideline for a 70-yard touchdown. It was the eighth time in the junior's career that he has rushed for a touchdown of 50 yards or more and put the Eagles on top 30-9.

Upshaw closed the door for good in the fourth quarter after Western Michigan scored a touchdown and added a two-point conversion to cut the margin to 33-17. The junior's 40-yard scamper set up a 1-yard touchdown run for Ramsby, extending the cushion to 40-17 with 6:32 left in the game.

After Western Michigan capped its first drive of the game with an Andrew Haldeman 34-yard field goal, Georgia Southern got on the scoreboard when Breida ran up the middle for a 9-yard touchdown with 3:21 left in the first quarter.

The Terrell to Braverman show took over right before the end of the half as the two connected on pass plays six times for 68 yards. The last completion was a 7-yard touchdown with 28 seconds left, but the Broncos missed the extra point, making the margin 23-9 at halftime.

It was the Eagles' first home game against a non-conference FBS opponent and their first contest against any team from the state of Michigan.

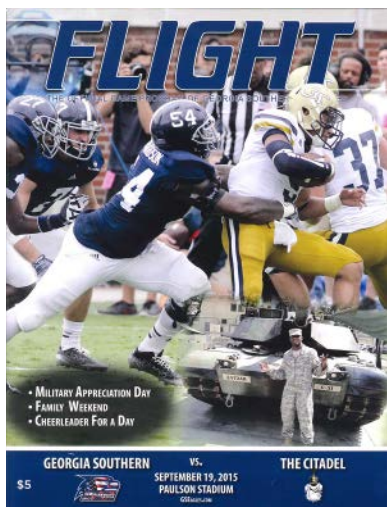

GEORGIA SOUTHERN HANDLES THE CITADEL AT HOME

STATESBORO, Ga. — Matt Breida rushed for 164 yards, including an 87-yard touchdown in the second quarter, and Georgia Southern forced five Citadel turnovers as the Eagles topped the Bulldogs 48-13 before a record crowd on Military Appreciation Day at Paulson Stadium.

Breida took the handoff on the first play after a Bulldog punt in the second quarter and was untouched as he went straight up the middle. The Eagle receivers locked their men up on the outside for the junior to breeze up the field all alone to tie to fourth-longest touchdown run in school history.

Kevin Ellison also made a little history, becoming the 14th Eagle to rush for over 2,000 career yards with a 9-yard

touchdown scamper in the second quarter. Breida and Ellison each rushed for two scores, while L.A. Ramsby and true freshman Wesley Fields added touchdown runs.

Fields finished with 62 yards on 10 carries, and Ramsby added 60 yards on 10 carries. Chaz Thornton also ripped off a 66-yard run. The Eagle offense unleashed a bit of an aerial attack with 12 completions for 101 yards between Ellison and Favian Upshaw. Ryan Longoria had five receptions for 43 yards.

Ross Alexander and Darrius White each picked off passes, and Antwone Williams led the Eagles with nine tackles. Thomas Banks had a forced fumble on special teams, and Logan Hunt added a forced fumble and five tackles.

Evan McField led The Citadel with 163 yards and a touchdown on 18 carries. The attendance of 24,872 was the largest regular-season crowd in Paulson Stadium history.

The Eagles scored on their first five possessions of the night and tallied 13 points off of turnovers in the game. Alexander set the Eagles up deep in Bulldog territory with his first career interception on the third play of the contest, and Alex Hanks nailed a 22-yard field goal to give the Eagles an early 3-0 cushion.

Georgia Southern took seven minutes off the clock with a 16-play drive on its next possession, and Ellison plunged into the end zone from a yard out for a 10-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Fields ripped off a 25-yard run and three plays later, Breida found daylight for a 35-yard touchdown run and a 17-0 lead early in the second.

Breida's long run put the Eagles on top 24-0 midway through the second, and Darrius White's interception and return set the Eagles up at the Bulldog 35-yard line. EAGLES OPEN SUN BELT PLAY WITH TOUGH ROAD WIN AT IDAHO

MOSCOW, Idaho — Matt Breida rushed 12 times for 179 yards and two scores, and Georgia Southern pounded out 441 yards and five touchdowns on the ground in a 44-20 Sun Belt Conference football victory over Idaho in the Kibbie Dome.

It was the Sun Belt opener for both teams, and the Eagles won their ninth straight SBC contest.

Kevin Ellison ran for 134 yards and two scores on 13 carries and threw for 105 yards for the Eagles, and L.A. Ramsby rushed for 64 yards on 11 attempts. BJ Johnson caught four passes for 93 yards, and Alex Hanks matched his career-high with three field goals.

The Eagles held Idaho to 1-of-11 on 3rd down through the first 54 minutes of the contest, forced two turnovers and

blocked a punt. Ironhead Gallon blocked the third kick of his career, while Jay Ellison and Caleb Williams each had interceptions. Chris DeLaRosa and Antwione Williams each had nine tackles.

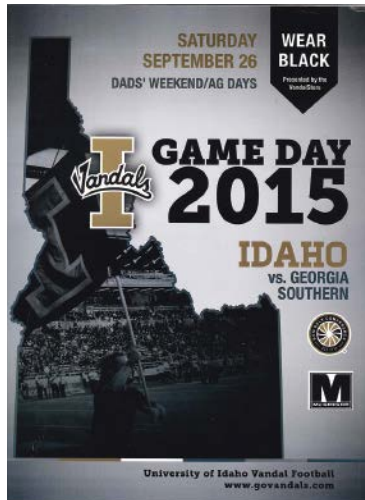
Matt Linehan completed 20-of-35 passes for 284 yards and two scores for Idaho, and Dezmon Epps caught eight passes for 165 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

After clinging to a three-point lead at halftime, Georgia Southern scored touchdowns on its first two possessions of the second half to open a 30-13 cushion. Breida sparked the Eagles with a 66-yard touchdown run on the third play from scrimmage of the third quarter.

The junior took a pitch from Ellison and ran down the right sideline, got a block from Ryan Longoria, cut back to the left, avoided two Vandals and turned on the jets, running all the way to the left sideline and diving into the end zone, where he laid on the carpet for a breather. It was the 11th touchdown run of 50-plus yards in his career.

Ellison keyed the next scoring drive with a 53-yard run as the junior faked a pitch to the right and scampered through a big hole and down the right sideline. Ramsby kept the drive alive with a 10-yard run on 4th-and-3 from the Idaho 12-yard line, and Wesley Fields finished it off with a 2-yard touchdown run two plays later.

Alex Hanks connected on all three field goal attempts and the Eagles churned out 568 yards of total offense in the game.

LATE GEORGIA SOUTHERN PUSH LIFTS EAGLES PAST WARHAWKS

MONROE, La. — L.A. Ramsby's 41-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter thwarted UL Monroe's comeback bid, and Georgia Southern earned its 10th consecutive Sun Belt Conference victory with a 51-31 decision over the Warhawks at Malone Stadium.

After UL Monroe trimmed a 31-3 deficit to seven points early in the fourth quarter, the Eagles faced 4th-and-inches from the UL Monroe 41-yard line with all the momentum headed toward the Warhawks. Kevin Ellison turned and handed it off to Ramsby, who scooted through a hole on the left side and took it the distance to make the lead 38-24 and put the momentum back on the side of Georgia Southern.

The Eagle defense forced a 3-and-out with the aid of an errant snap on third down that rolled down to the UL Monroe 5-yard line before it was recovered. A 32-yard punt into the

wind gave Georgia Southern the ball at the Warhawk 37-yard line, and the Eagles drove down to the UL Monroe 6-yard line, where Breida ran around right end for his second touchdown of the game to open a 45-24 advantage.

UL Monroe wasn't quite finished, and Garrett Smith connected with Ajalen Holley for a 28-yard pass to key a 75-yard drive that took just two minutes off the clock. Smith connected with D'Marius Gillespie on a 10-yard touchdown pass with four minutes left to make the score 45-31.

The Warhawks tried the on-side kick, but Matt Dobson attacked the football and recovered it for the Eagles. Wesley Fields took over from there, rushing eight times for 44 yards and running it in from four yards out to make the score 51-31 with 31 seconds left and put the game away.

Ramsby finished with 98 yards on 13 carries and two touchdowns, while Breida toted the rock 19 times for 149 yards and a pair of scores. Fields logged 92 yards and two touchdowns on 17 carries, and Ellison rushed for 74 yards and completed three passes for 48 yards. Georgia Southern rushed 67 times in the game, the most in a game under head coach Willie Fritz at GS.

Ironhead Gallon had a career-high 11 tackles and blocked a punt, while Dobson, Darius Jones and Antonio Glover each intercepted Smith.

Smith completed 21-of-36 passes for 232 yards and three touchdowns for UL Monroe, and Holley finished with eight receptions for 166 yards.

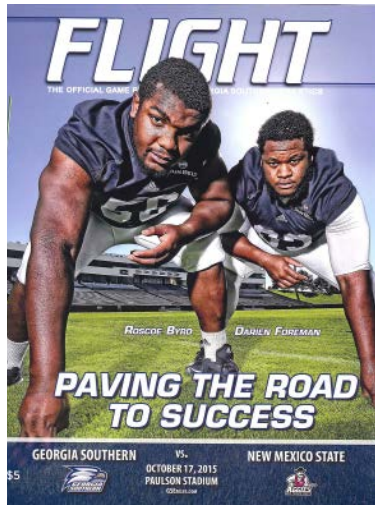

EAGLES MOVE TO 3-0 IN SUN BELT WITH WIN OVER NEW MEXICO STATE

STATESBORO, Ga. — Kevin Ellison rushed for 104 yards and a touchdown and threw for 64 yards and a score to lead Georgia Southern to its 11th straight Sun Belt Conference victory, a 56-26 decision over New Mexico State before a crowd of 23,551 at Paulson Stadium.

Matt Breida carried 13 times for 137 yards and a touchdown for the Eagles, and L.A. Ramsby rushed 11 times for 85 yards and two touchdowns. Favian Upshaw and Wesley Fields each scored two touchdowns in the contest. Georgia Southern rolled up 507 yards on the ground.

Andrew Allen completed 20-of-37 passes for 253 yards and three touchdowns to lead New Mexico State, and Larry Rose III rushed for 83 yards and caught five passes for 31

yards in the losing effort.

Georgia Southern built a 28-0 lead midway through the second quarter and led 35-7 at halftime. Ellison provided a bulk of the offense with both his legs and arm in the half. With the Eagles leading 14-0, the junior signal caller ran the keeper around the right side and down the sideline for a 67-yard touchdown run, the longest of his career.

After New Mexico State trimmed the deficit to 28-7 late in the second quarter, Ellison connected with Fields for a 60-yard touchdown pass. It was Georgia Southern's first touchdown pass in over a year and helped Ellison become the sixth Eagle to throw for over 2,000 career yards.

The Eagles blocked a punt for the third straight contest to set up the opening score of the game, a 19-yard touchdown run by Fields. Breida notched his 11th rushing touchdown of the season, a 20-yard run, to give the Eagles a 14-0 lead late in the first quarter.

After Ellison's long scoring run, Matt Dobson broke up a pass on 4th-and-3 to give Georgia Southern the ball at the New Mexico State 47-yard line. Upshaw threw to Myles Campbell for a 12-yard pickup, and Ramsby ran 23 yards for a touchdown and a 28-0 lead midway through the second. After Allen found Rose III for a 3-yard touchdown pass, Breida scampered 55 yards to set up a 5-yard touchdown run by Ramsby. Antonio Glover's fifth pick of the season set up a 5-yard touchdown run for Upshaw with 5:20 left in the third quarter, and the junior quarterback capped a 14-play, 56-yard drive with a 29-yard run early in the fourth that made the score 56-14.

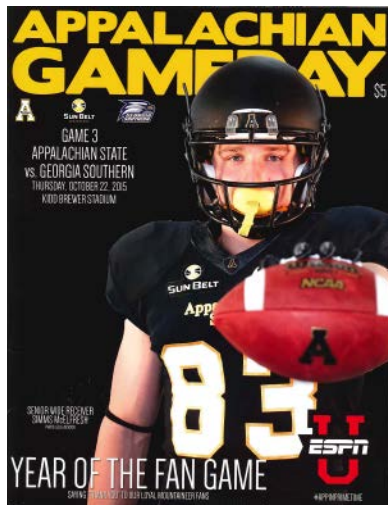

MOUNTAINEERS STUFF EAGLES IN PRIMETIME ACTION

BOONE, N.C. – Taylor Lamb completed 14-of-20 passes for 202 yards and two touchdowns to lead Appalachian State to a 31-13 Sun Belt Conference football victory over Georgia Southern in Thursday night action at Kidd Brewer Stadium.

The Mountaineers picked off two passes, recorded 10 tackles for loss and held the Eagles to 2-for-10 on third down through the first three and a half quarters. The Eagles came into the game leading the country in rushing with 399 yards a game, but the ASU defense held Georgia Southern to 252 total yards, including 188 on the ground.

Matt Breida ran for 78 yards on 14 carries for Georgia Southern and L.A. Ramsby ran nine times for 58 yards and a touchdown. Kevin Ellison rushed for 46 yards and a

highlight-reel touchdown and threw for 64 yards.

Marcus Cox ran for 90 yards and two scores and caught two passes for 36 yards for Appalachian State. Sims McElfresh caught six balls for 66 yards and a touchdown.

Georgia Southern saw its 11-game Sun Belt Conference win streak come to an end and suffered its first league loss since joining the conference last season. It was the Mountaineers' eighth consecutive Sun Belt victory.

With Appalachian State leading 17-7 in the third quarter, Mando Williams picked off an Ellison pass and returned it 11 yards to the Mountaineer 48-yard line. Lamb fired a 33-yard touchdown pass to Barrett Burns three plays later, and App took control of the contest by extending the margin to 24-7 with four minutes left in the frame.

Alex Gray picked off a Favian Upshaw pass on the Eagles' first possession of the fourth quarter, and the Mountaineers took 7:16 off the clock with a 13-play drive. Cox made the score 31-7 with a 6-yard touchdown run with 6:33 remaining.

Georgia Southern took the game's opening kickoff and promptly went 86 yards in eight plays to open an early lead. Ellison faked the pitch, went around the right side and leaped over Williams, somersaulting into the end zone for the 12-yard touchdown run and a 7-0 cushion 3:49 into the game. Breida had carries of 23 and 21 yards to key the drive.

It was all Appalachian State from there as the Mountaineers scored the next 31 points of the game. Zach Matics put Appalachian State on the scoreboard with a 44-yard field goal on the Mountaineers' ensuing possession. Cox rattled off a 22-yard run to open the drive, and Lamb hit Ike Lewis with a 19-yard pass to move the ball into Georgia Southern territory.

The Mountaineers made use of a short field to take their first lead of the contest. App gobbled up 41 yards in five plays, and Cox broke three tackles and went down the sideline for an 18-yard touchdown run to give the Mountaineers a 10-7 lead with 4:12 gone in the second quarter.

L.A. Ramsby scored on an 19-yard run late in the game to complete the Eagles' scoring.

GEORGIA SOUTHERN RUMBLES PAST TEXAS STATE FOR BOWL ELIGIBILITY

STATESBORO, Ga. — Matt Breida and Wesley Fields combined to run for 363 yards and three touchdowns, and Younghoe Koo kicked three field goals to lead Georgia Southern to a 37-13 Sun Belt Conference football victory over Texas State in Thursday night action at Paulson Stadium. With the win, the Eagles became bowl eligible in their first full-fledged season in FBS.

Breida finished with 205 yards on 23 carries and two touchdowns. It was the third time in the junior's career that he has rushed for over 200 yards, and he went over 1,000 yards for the season. Fields ran nine times for 158 yards and a score. L.A. Ramsby ran for 69 yards and a touchdown, and Kevin Ellison rushed for 62 yards. Derek Keaton logged 144

return yards.

The Eagle defense had seven tackles for loss and picked off two passes. Antonio Glover and Caleb Williams had the interceptions, and Antwione Williams tallied three tackles for loss. Georgia Southern held Texas State to 213 total yards.

After Texas State trimmed the Georgia Southern lead to 21-13 with a 23-yard touchdown pass from Jones to Jafus Gaines in the third quarter, the Eagles scored 16 straight points to take control of the game. On its next drive, Georgia Southern drove down to the Texas State 12-yard line but stalled after a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty. Koo nailed a 44-yard field goal, his first of the season and the longest of the year for Georgia Southern, to increase the lead to 24-13. The Eagle defense forced a 3-and-out, and Keaton took the punt back 60 yards to the Texas State 11-yard line. That set up another field goal by Koo, this time a 21-yard kick that made the score 27-13 early in the fourth quarter.

The Eagles forced another 3-and-out, and Fields ripped off a 64-yard run down the left sideline to move the ball to the Bobcat 7-yard line. Ramsby started right, cut back left, picked up a block from Ellison and ran into the end zone two plays later to extend the lead to 34-13 with 12:15 remaining. Texas State moved the ball into Georgia Southern territory on its next drive, but Glover picked off a Jones pass at the Eagle 4-yard line. It was the senior's sixth interception of the season, which tied the school record. Fields picked up 29 yards down the left sideline, and Breida shook off three tackles near the line of scrimmage to race for a 44-yard pickup. That set up a 25-yard field goal by Koo that made the score 37-13 with 3:49 left.

The Eagles rolled the dice on their first possession of the game by going for it on 4th-and-1 from their own 37-yard line, and it paid off. Ellison faked the handoff up the middle and went around the left side for a 26-yard gain, and Breida took it to the house for a 37-yard touchdown run a play later.

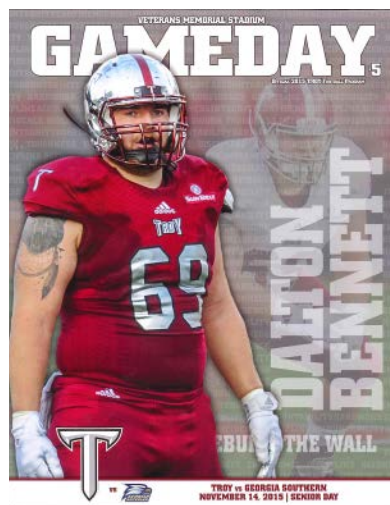

GEORGIA SOUTHERN PLAYS KEEP-AWAY FROM TROJANS IN SUN BELT WIN

TROY, Ala. — Georgia Southern rushed for 305 yards and held possession of the ball for over 25 minutes in the second half to post a 45-10 Sun Belt Conference football victory over Troy at Veterans Memorial Stadium.

The Eagles, who had 16 days between games, shook off a little rust and a 10-0 deficit early and scored 45 unanswered points in the win. The Eagle defense had three takeaways with an interception and two fumble recoveries and gave up just three points and 238 total yards. Caleb Williams tallied an interception, while Jamal Johnson recovered a Trojan fumble, forced by Antwione Williams and Riyahd Jones forced, recovered and returned a fumble for a touchdown late in the game.

Matt Breida ran for 84 yards and a touchdown, and L.A. Ramsby rushed for 82 yards and a score for Georgia Southern (7-2, 5-1). Kevin Ellison ran for 77 yards and threw for 58 yards and a touchdown. For the game, the Eagles had the ball for 42 minutes, and Troy had it for 18 and ran just 18 offensive plays in the second half.

Brandon Silvers threw for 134 yards for Troy, and Brandon Burks ran for 50 yards.

The Eagles dug themselves a 10-0 hole just 3:32 into the contest. The Trojans marched down to the Eagle 3-yard line on the opening possession of the game and after an incomplete pass on 3rd-and-goal, put three points on the board with a Jed Solomon field goal.

Ellison misfired on a pitch to the right on Georgia Southern's first play from scrimmage, and Demetrius Cain scooped the ball up at the Eagle 19-yard line and ran it in for a touchdown and a 10-0 Troy lead.

It was all Georgia Southern from there, and the Eagles built a 24-10 cushion at halftime. Georgia Southern got the ball to start the second half and bled 8:20 off the clock with a 15-play, 83-yard touchdown drive. The Blue and White converted three third downs and two fourth downs, and capped the drive with a 2-yard touchdown run by Ramsby to open a 31-10 advantage.

The Eagles put the game away with another long drive in the fourth quarter. This time, Georgia Southern melted 12:01 off the clock with a 17-play, 75-yard drive, capped by a Chaz Thornton 2-yard touchdown run. Georgia Southern converted two fourth downs during the possession, including one on its own 46-yard line.

Riyahd Jones added the final margin with a 61-yard fumble return for touchdown inside the final minute. The senior took it away from the Troy receiver and scampered down the left sideline for the score.

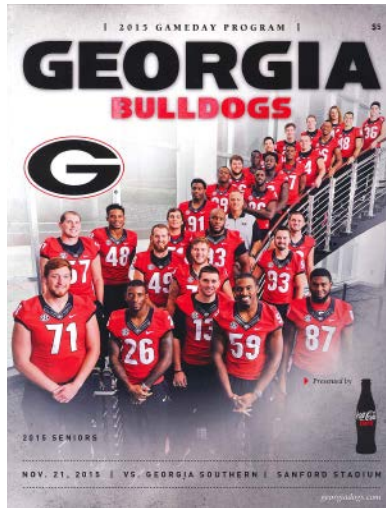

EAGLES FALL SHORT IN HEARTBREAKING OVERTIME LOSS AT GEORGIA

ATHENS, Ga. — Sony Michel scored from 25 yards out to lift the Georgia Bulldogs to a 23-17 come-from-behind victory in overtime over Georgia Southern at Sanford Stadium in front of 92,746 fans.

The Bulldogs took a quick lead, scoring a touchdown within the first four minutes of the game off of a 23-yard sweep by receiver Isaiah McKenzie to bring the Sanford Stadium faithful to their feet. But after a rocky first drive, the Eagle defense buckled down in holding Georgia scoreless for the rest of the half.

Darrius White's forced fumble in the red zone prevented another UGA scoring opportunity and fueled an Eagle offensive drive. After the teams traded missed field goals,

Georgia Southern got its offense on the move.

After being held in check for the first quarter, junior Matt Breida finally broke loose with a 23-yard run in which he started to the right, reversed course, picked up some blocks and took it to the 1-yard line where Wesley Fields finished it off with a leaping effort to tie the game at 7-7.

On the second play of the second half, linebacker Antwione Williams nearly decapitated Michel, delivering a thunderous blow that forced a fumble and was picked up by Caleb Williams and returned for a 65-yard touchdown score.

Georgia fired back with points of its own off of a turnover, picking up a fumble of a muffed punt and tied the game at 14-all when Greyson Lambert connected with Terry Godwin for a 12-yard touchdown pass.

The Eagles took the lead back in the fourth quarter when Younghoe Koo launched a 48-yard field goal, but Marshall Morgan tied it back up with 6:06 left on a 43-yard field goal of his own. Neither team could mount a scoring effort late and the game went to overtime. It marked the 13th overtime in GS history, but the first as an FBS program.

Michel's heroics came on the Bulldogs' first play of overtime after the UGA defense snuffed out a 4th and 1 from the 16-yard line as Georgia Southern head coach Willie Fritz elected to go for it instead of trying the field goal.

The Eagles were limited on the ground except for a few big runs as Georgia (8-3) held them to 233 yards. Quarterback Favian Upshaw led the way with 67 yards on seven carries while Breida ran for 66 yards on 20 carries.

Ironhead Gallon led a fierce defensive effort with 10 tackles.

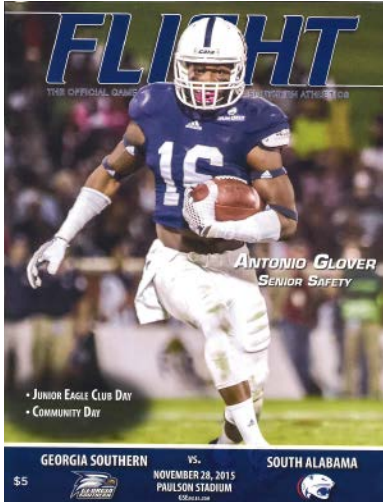

BIG PLAYS POWER GEORGIA SOUTHERN PAST JAGUARS, 55-17

STATESBORO, Ga. — Matt Breida rushed for 187 yards and two touchdowns, and the Georgia Southern defense gave up just 136 yards of offense in a 55-17 Sun Belt Conference football victory over South Alabama at Paulson Stadium.

The Eagles capitalized on five big plays over 40 yards in winning their 11th consecutive home game. Breida had a 75-yard touchdown run along with a 40-yard jaunt, and L.A. Ramsby scored on a 46-yard scamper. Kevin Ellison broke off a 56-yard run that set up a touchdown, and Derek Keaton returned a punt 72 yards to set up another score.

Meanwhile, the Eagle defense was stout, recording two interceptions, four sacks, seven tackles for loss and five pass breakups. After giving up a 75-yard scoring drive on South

Alabama's first series of the contest, the Eagles allowed just 61 yards for the rest of the game and held the Jaguars to 0 for 11 on 3rd-down conversions.

Ramsby finished with 85 yards on 13 carries, and Ellison rushed nine times for 78 yards and two touchdowns and threw for another score. Keaton finished with 111 yards on four punt returns and caught a 23-yard touchdown pass. Williams led the Eagles with seven tackles and 1.5 sacks, while Darius White and Darius Jones each picked off a pass.

Xavier Johnson was held to 29 yards on 10 carries for South Alabama, and Cody Clements threw for 64 yards after completing 5 of 12 passes.

Trailing 14-7, Georgia Southern scored 21 points in the final 6:28 of the first half to take control of the game. Ellison set up a short touchdown run for Breida by keeping the ball on an option play to the right and running 56 yards down to the South Alabama 1-yard line.

The Eagle defense forced a 3-and-out on the Jaguars' ensuing possession, and Ellison hit Ryan Longoria for a 17-yard pickup to start the Georgia Southern march down the field. Wesley Fields logged two carries for 21 yards before Ellison hit Keaton with a 23-yard touchdown pass in the corner of the end zone with 1:36 left on the clock.

The Eagles extended their lead on the next play from scrimmage as Breida took the handoff, cut right and then back left and raced 75 yards for a touchdown and a 35-17 Georgia Southern cushion. The Eagle defense gave up just 17 yards from scrimmage on South Alabama's next two possessions, and Georgia Southern tacked on a 21-yard field goal by Younghoe Koo and a nifty, 46-yard touchdown run by Ramsby to run the score to 45-17 at the end of the third quarter.

GS would add 10 more points in the final stanza to account for the final score.

PANTHERS BECOME BOWL ELIGIBLE WITH WIN OVER GEORGIA SOUTHERN

STATESBORO, Ga. — Nick Arbuckle completed 20-of-32 passes for 346 yards and three touchdowns, and Georgia State became bowl eligible for the first time in school history with a 34-7 Sun Belt Conference football victory over Georgia Southern at Paulson Stadium.

The win also earned the Panthers two points in the Southern vs. State Rivalry Series, and Georgia State took a 5-2 lead.

L.A. Ramsby ran 15 times for 65 yards and a touchdown to lead Georgia Southern, which saw its 11-game winning streak in Paulson Stadium come to an end. BJ Johnson caught four passes for 57 yards.

Penny Hart caught seven passes for 129 yards and a touchdown, and Donovan Harden had three receptions for 60 yards for Georgia State. Glenn Smith logged 13 carries for 83 yards, and Kyler Neal ran for two scores.

Georgia State held the Eagles to a season low in total yards (203) and rushing yards (135), and Tarris Batiste led the way with eight tackles, two interceptions and two tackles for loss.

Georgia State broke a 7-7 tie early in the third quarter when Arbuckle found an open Robert Davis over the middle for an 18-yard touchdown. Smith started the drive with a 22-yard run, and Arbuckle also completed a 21-yard pass to Davis.

After the Panther defense forced a 3-and-out, Arbuckle completed passes of 27 and 29 yards to move Georgia State to the Eagle 4-yard line. The senior hit Keith Rucker for a 4-yard touchdown pass, and the Panthers opened a 20-7 lead with 5:10 left in the third.

The Eagles moved into Georgia State territory on their next series, but on 4th-and-4, Favian Upshaw's pass to Johnson, which would have been good for a first down, was ruled incomplete after a replay review.

Arbuckle hit Hart with a 28-yard pass to start the Panthers down the field, and on 3rd-and-goal from the 1-yard line, Neal dove in for the score and an insurmountable 27-7 cushion 46 seconds into the fourth quarter.

After the Panthers converted a first down with consecutive offside penalties on Georgia Southern, Arbuckle hit Hart over the top for a 63-yard touchdown and a 7-0 Georgia State lead early in the second quarter.

The Eagles were driving late in the half, but Batiste intercepted Kevin Ellison at the 5-yard line to end the threat, and the score remained tied 7-7 at the break.

It was Senior Day and the final game in Paulson Stadium for 23 seniors.

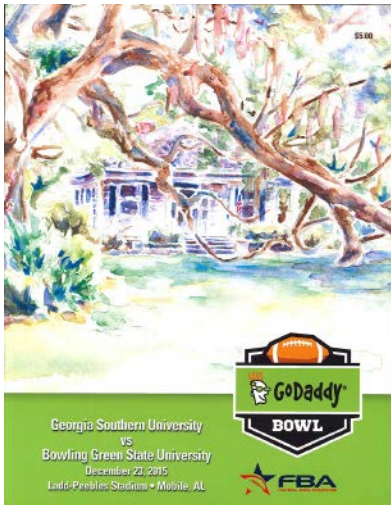

GEORGIA SOUTHERN RUNS PAST BOWLING GREEN 58-27 IN GODADDY BOWL

MOBILE, Ala. — Quarterback Favian Upshaw ran for a career-high 199 yards and four touchdowns, and Georgia Southern scored 35 unanswered points and rushed for 452 yards to power past Bowling Green, 58-27, in the GoDaddy Bowl at Ladd-Peebles Stadium for its first bowl win in program history.

Upshaw averaged 16.5 yards on 11 carries and completed a pass for 17 yards to earn the game's overall MVP honors. Wesley Fields rushed nine times for 75 yards and a score, and Kevin Ellison ran for 70 yards and threw for 65 yards and a touchdown. Matt Breida ran for 68 yards and a touchdown, and L.A. Ramsby gained 44 yards and scored a touchdown.

Much was made prior to the contest that the Georgia Southern defense would be overmatched against Bowling Green, and that turned out not to be the case. The Eagles pitched a

shutout in the second half, had two takeaways and forced the Falcons to turn the ball over on downs twice. Nardo Govan had two fumble recoveries and a quarterback hurry, and Caleb Williams broke up five passes.

Fields was named the Offensive MVP, Dobson was named Special Teams MVP and Govan was named Defensive MVP.

Matt Johnson threw for 246 yards and three touchdowns for Bowling Green (10-4), and Travis Greene finished with 79 yards and a touchdown on 10 carries. Ronnie Moore caught five passes for 83 yards and a touchdown.

Trailing 27-23 at halftime, the Eagles began their 35-point barrage with a methodical 75-yard, 14-play scoring drive that chewed up 7:30 to open the second half, and Upshaw capped it with a 3-yard touchdown run to give Georgia Southern the lead back. Upshaw keyed the drive with an 18-yard run and a 17-yard pass to Keigan Williams, and Fields put the Eagles in scoring position with an 18-yard run in which the freshman broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage.

Bowling Green drove deep inside Georgia Southern territory on its ensuing possession and elected to go for it on 4th-and-9 from the Eagle 21-yard line. Govan and Antwone Williams shot through the line and stopped Greene for a 1-yard gain to turn the ball back over to the Eagles. Upshaw then faked a handoff to Matt Breida, pulled it back, went up the middle and split the safeties with breakneck speed for an 80-yard quick-strike touchdown on the next play of the game, giving the Eagles a 37-27 lead with 2:55 left in the third quarter.

The Eagles got the first turnover of the game when Govan fell on a Johnson fumble at the Falcon 14-yard line. Upshaw took it to the 1-yard line with an option keeper on the next play, and followed that with a pitch to Breida who easily found pay dirt with the help of a tremendous block by senior James Dean. Younghoe Koo's extra point made the score 44-27 with 1:51 left in the third quarter.

Govan recovered another Johnson fumble on Bowling Green's next series, this time at the Falcon 10-yard line. Breida took it two yards to the 8-yard line, and Upshaw finished the job with another keeper and the aid of a big block by senior Darien Foreman to make the score 51-27. Upshaw broke another one for 42 yards down the left sideline to seal the victory with 5:25 remaining in the contest.

To start off the game, Ramsby scored his 13th rushing touchdown of the season with a 1-yard run on the Eagles' first drive of the game - the first touchdown in Georgia Southern bowl history. Johnson hit Roger Lewis with a 45-yard touchdown pass just over a minute later, making the score 7-6, but Darrius White blocked the extra point attempt.

Dobson scooped the ball up at the 5-yard line, tore down the right sideline, got a couple blocks and went the distance for two points and a 9-6 GS lead. Bowling Green scored on its next two possessions to take a 20-9 lead, but the Eagles scored twice on a Fields 26-yard run and a 31-yard pass from Ellison to Montay Crockett to regain the lead 23-20.

The Falcons scored a touchdown less than a minute later with the help of a 52-yard run by Greene, and Greene finished it off with a 1-yard run, giving Bowling Green a 27-23 lead at halftime.

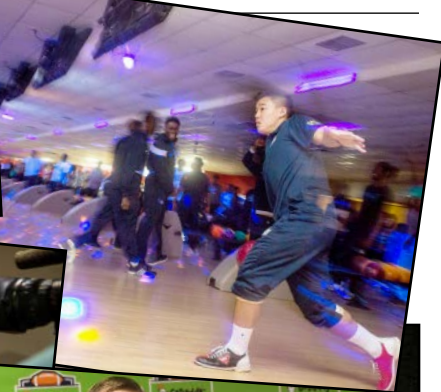

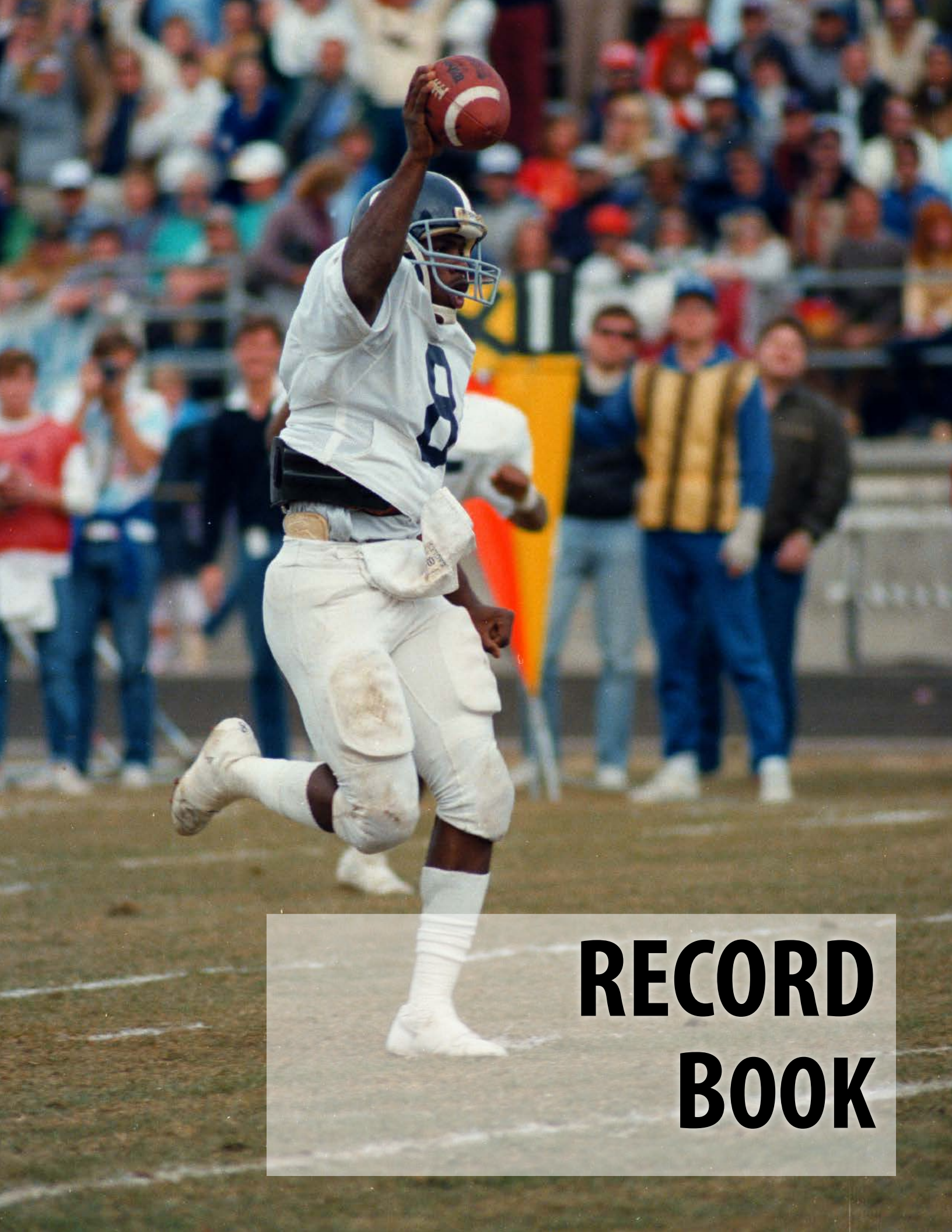

PROGRAM HISTORY

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1908

First District Agricultural & Mechanical School founded with four faculty members and 15 students.

1924

The school's name is changed to Georgia Normal School as a training ground for educators.

1924

First football team at Georgia Normal School under the direction of E.G. Cromartie.

1929

The school's name is changed to South Georgia Teacher's College.

1939

The school's name is changed to Georgia Teacher's College.

1941

Shortly after the final game of the 1941 season, the United States becomes involved in World War II and all sports are discontinued.

1959

The school's name is changed to Georgia Southern College.

February, 1980

Georgia Southern College President Dale Lick establishes a community-wide committee to report on "Football at Georgia Southern, A Feasibility Study."

January 21, 1981

Committee makes final report that football is feasible at Georgia Southern, and recommends it be started.

April 9, 1981

Dr. Dale Lick announces that Georgia Southern will begin an intercollegiate football program in the fall of 1981 with the first game scheduled for the fall of 1982.

May 23, 1981

Georgia Southern announces the hiring of Erskine (Erk) Russell as head coach.

July 1, 1981

Russell assumes his duties as head coach.

September 28, 1981

Football practice begins at Georgia Southern for the first time in 40 years with 126 players, all walk-ons.

October 31, 1981

Football intrasquad scrimmage is played in Dublin, Georgia, at the Shamrock Bowl.

January 30, 1982

Stadium site on the southwest quarter of campus is announced.

September 11, 1982

FOOTBALL RETURNS TO GEORGIA SOUTHERN

Eagles play Central Florida in Jacksonville's Gator Bowl, taking a 16-9 win over the Knights in front of 7,350 fans.

September 25, 1982

First collegiate football game in Statesboro in 41 years as the Eagles face Valdosta State at Statesboro High School. The teams played to a 27-27 tie, the only tie in program history.

September 1, 1984

Georgia Southern plays its first game as a member of the NCAA Division I-AA, beating Florida A&M 14-0 in Savannah.

September 19, 1984

Georgia Southern opens Allen E. Paulson Stadium with a 48-11 win over Liberty.

October 5, 1985

Georgia Southern rebounds from a Paulson Stadium loss to Middle Tennessee St. three weeks earlier with a 34-0 drubbing of Tennessee Tech. The win initiates a streak of 38-straight home wins to set an FCS Record.

December 21, 1985

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern defeats Furman 44-42 in Tacoma, Washington, behind 419 yards passing from Tracy Ham. A 13-yard pass from Ham to Frank Johnson with 10 seconds remaining gives the Eagles' the win.

December 19, 1986

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern defeats Arkansas State 48-21 to win the program's second-straight national championship. Ham threw for 306 yards and ran for 180 and three touchdowns as the Eagles became the first team in I-AA history to repeat as champions.

December 17, 1988

Georgia Southern makes its third NCAA Division I-AA National Championship Game appearance, falling to Furman 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.

February 23, 1989

The NCAA awards Georgia Southern, Statesboro and Savannah the rights to host the NCAA Division I-AA National Championship Game for a three-year period (1989, 1990, 1991) at Paulson Stadium.

September 13, 1989

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia votes to change the name of Georgia Southern College to Georgia Southern University.

September 21, 1989

Georgia Southern defeats arch rival Middle Tennessee St. 26-0 in a nationally televised game on ESPN. The game, played only 180 miles from the eye of Category 4 Hurricane Hugo, was also the first night game at Paulson Stadium. For safety, an open phone-line existed from the Paulson Stadium press box to the National Hurricane Center in Coral Gables, Florida, where updated reports were continuously fed to game officials.

December 16, 1989

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern captures its third NCAA Division I-AA National Championship in five years with a 37-34 win over Stephen F. Austin. A record crowd of 25,725 saw the Eagles score the game's final 10 points in the win to cap a 15-0 season.

December 20, 1989

Head coach Erk Russell announces his retirement from coaching. He follows by accepting a promotion to Assistant Athletic Director for Football Operations. Tim Stowers is named the next head coach of the Georgia Southern Eagles.

July 1, 1990

Georgia Southern officially receives University status and the name is changed for a fifth time.

September 22, 1990

Georgia Southern's record 38-game home winning streak comes to an end as Eastern Kentucky drops the Eagles 42-34 in Paulson Stadium. The loss is just the second for the Eagles inside "the friendly confines."

December 15, 1990

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern wins its fourth National Championship with a 36-13 victory over Nevada at Paulson Stadium. Raymond Gross rushed for 145 yards while the defense made a crucial goalline stand early in the third quarter en route to the win.

September 11, 1993

No. 8 Georgia Southern posts a 16-6 victory over No. 24 The Citadel in its inaugural Southern Conference game. A crowd of 12,921 witnessed the excitement of a new era in Eagle Football.

November 21, 1993

Georgia Southern becomes the 11th school in Division I history to win a conference championship in its first season of membership when it defeated East Tennessee St., 31-24, in Johnson City. With the title comes an automatic bid to the NCAA I-AA playoffs (the first automatic bid for Georgia Southern), where the top-seeded advance to the quarterfinals, losing to eventual champion Youngstown St.

April 1, 1996

Assistant Athletics Director Frank Ellwood named Interim Head Coach of the Georgia Southern Eagles following the dismissal of Tim Stowers by athletics director Sam Baker. Stowers had a 53-23 overall record in six seasons including the 1990 I-AA National Championship. Ellwood previously served as head coach at Marshall University from 1975-78 and was an assistant at Ohio State, Ohio University and the Air Force Academy.

November 14, 1996

Georgia Southern hires former assistant coach and then-Navy offensive coordinator Paul Johnson as the program's fourth head coach in the modern era. He proceeds to post a 62-10 record and wins two national championships.

September 27, 1997

Georgia Southern bounces back from a Paulson Stadium loss to No. 2 William & Mary three weeks earlier with a 37-10 win over Chattanooga. The win starts a run of 39 consecutive home wins.

November 8, 1997

The Eagles return to national prominence and the I-AA playoffs under the direction of first-year head coach Paul Johnson. Georgia Southern captures its second Southern Conference title by defeating Furman 30-13 in front of 18,269 fans at Paulson Stadium - the largest crowd to watch Eagle Football in Statesboro since Nov. 16, 1991 (a span of 39 home games). Johnson became only the second SoCon Coach to that point to win a league title in his first season.

October 17, 1998

In front of a Paulson Stadium crowd of 20,353, Georgia Southern's largest since the 1990 I-AA National Championship Game win over Nevada, the Eagles defeat Appalachian St. 37-24 and subsequently move to first place both The Sports Network and ESPN/USA Today polls.

November 7, 1998

The Eagles' 45-17 rout of Furman in Greenville earns Georgia Southern its second-consecutive Southern Conference Championship. Georgia Southern was just the third team in the 1990s to post a perfect 8-0 league record.

December 19, 1998

Georgia Southern makes its sixth NCAA Division I-AA National Championship Game appearance, falling to Massachusetts 55-43 in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

November 6, 1999

Georgia Southern records its 100th win in Paulson Stadium in just its 111th game at the 15-year old facility with a thrilling 41-38 win over Southern Conference rival Furman.

December 6, 1999

Sophomore fullback Adrian Peterson becomes the first Georgia Southern player to earn the Walter Payton Award, the honor recognizing him as the most outstanding I-AA player in the nation.

December 18, 1999

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern captures its unprecedented fifth NCAA I-AA National Championship with a runaway win over Youngstown State, 59-24. Adrian Peterson scored three touchdowns with 247 yards rushing in the game that was over at halftime.

December 16, 2000

NCAA I-AA NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Georgia Southern wins its sixth NCAA I-AA National Championship with a 27-25 victory over Montana in Chattanooga. The Eagles withstood a late Grizzly run with Montana scoring 21 second-half points. A 57-yard touchdown run by Adrian Peterson with 11:29 remaining in the game put the Eagles ahead for good.

December 15, 2001

The Eagles' NCAA I-AA record 39-game home winning streak comes to a halt as Furman stuns Georgia Southern 24-17 during the semifinal round of the I-AA playoffs at Paulson Stadium. The loss also served as Georgia Southern's first home playoff setback after 27-straight postseason wins at home.

December 16, 2001

Less than 24 hours after suffering a devastating home playoff loss to rival Furman, Georgia Southern moves forward and prepares for the future by promoting offensive coordinator Mike Sewak to head coach after Paul Johnson accepted the position at Navy just one week earlier. The announcement is made by Georgia Southern Director of Athletics Sam Baker and welcomed by a full-capacity crowd at the Lupton Building.

November 9, 2002

Despite starting the season with an 1-3 record, first-year head coach Mike Sewak guides Georgia Southern to its sixth-straight Southern Conference Championship with a 42-21 win over Furman in Greenville.

November 5, 2005

The Eagles rallied late in the fourth quarter to defeat top-ranked Furman 27-24. That marked the first time Georgia Southern had defeated the nation's No. 1 team in a regular season game. The game was played in front of a crowd of 19,808 fans who rushed the field after the win.

December 9, 2005

In front of a large crowd at the Nessmith-Lane Continuing Education Building, Director of Athletics Sam Baker introduced Jacksonville Jaguars' linebacker coach Brian VanGorder as head coach. Prior to his year in Jacksonville, VanGorder spent four years as defensive coordinator at the University of Georgia.

January 19, 2007

Chris Hatcher is named the program's sixth full-time head coach in the modern era. Hatcher had spent the previous seven seasons as the head coach at Valdosta State.

September 7, 2007

Georgia Southern unveiled the late Coach Erk Russell's name and championship years to the two retired jerseys at Paulson Stadium.

October 12, 2007

The University System of Georgia approved the naming of "Erk Russell Athletic Park" in honor of Coach Russell.

December 13, 2007

Senior quarterback Jayson Foster wins the Walter Payton Award, an honor recognizing him as the most outstanding I-AA player in the nation.

November 21, 2009

Just an hour after taking a 13-6 win over The Citadel to close the 2009 season, the local media was summoned back to Bishop Field House by Athletics Director Sam Baker. Hatcher was dismissed as head coach following just the third losing season in program history.

November 29, 2009

Former Georgia Southern assistant and then-Georgia Tech offensive coordinator Jeff Monken named the seventh head coach in the modern era of Georgia Southern football.

November 6, 2010

Eagles upset No. 1-ranked Appalachian State 21-14 at Paulson Stadium to close the regular season with three-straight win and earn the program's first playoff appearance since 2005.

September 12, 2011

Georgia Southern returns to the top spot in the FCS polls following a 62-21 win over Tusculum. The Eagles earned the No. 1 ranking for the first time since October 2001.

November 23, 2013

In the Eagles' final game as a member of the FCS, Georgia Southern takes a 26-20 win over Florida in front of 82,459 fans at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium. It was the Eagles' first win over an FBS opponent.

December 24, 2014

Head coach Jeff Monken leaves Georgia Southern to take the head coach position at Army.

January 10, 2014

Willie Fritz is named the eighth head coach in the modern era of Georgia Southern Football after a four-year stay at Stephen F. Austin.

May 10, 2014

An expanded Paulson Stadium is christened as Spring 2014 Commencement is held. The new mid-deck expanded the stadium's capacity to 25,000 following the addition of new seating areas on the north side of the stadium.

July 1, 2014

Georgia Southern becomes an official member of the Sun Belt Conference.

September 25, 2014

The Ted Smith Family Football Center is dedicated before the Eagles take a 34-14 win over Appalachian State in front of a national television audience. The new 50,000-square-foot building, located between the east end zone and Lanier Drive, contains locker rooms, meeting spaces, coaches' offices, a strength and conditioning center, athletic training facility and equipment room.

November 29, 2014

With a 22-16 victory over UL Monroe at home, Georgia Southern captures the program's first Sun Belt Championship with a perfect 8-0 league mark.

October 29, 2015

With a 37-13 victory over Texas State at home, Georgia Southern becomes bowl eligible for the first time in program history.

December 11, 2015

Head coach Willie Fritz leaves Georgia Southern to take the head coach position at Tulane after just two years in Statesboro.

December 20, 2015

Tyson Summers is named the ninth full-time head coach in the modern era of Georgia Southern Football, coming from Colorado State where he was the defensive coordinator for a year.

December 23, 2015

Behind the leadership of interim head coach Dell McGee, Georgia Southern rolls past Bowling Green, 58-27, in the GoDaddy Bowl, the program's first bowl game.

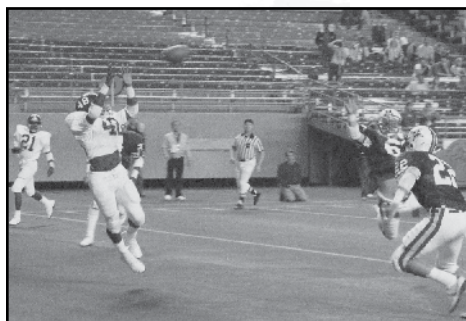

Georgia Southern defeats Furman 44-42 for national title
(December 21, 1985)

TACOMA, Wash. - In the greatest comeback in Football Championship Subdivision title game history, Georgia Southern rallied from a 22-point third-quarter deficit to defeat Furman 44-42 and win its first I-AA national championship. Tracy Ham hit Frank Johnson on a 13-yard scoring strike with 10 seconds left in the game to give the Eagles the victory. Ham finished the game with 419 yards passing and another 90 yards rushing. Johnson caught seven passes for 148 yards, all in the second half. Georgia Southern scored 38 points in the final 21:51 of the game to overcome a 28-6 Furman lead.

Tracy Ham and Tony Belser connected on two long touchdown passes to lead Georgia Southern to a 27-0 win over Jackson State. Ham hit Belser on a 48-yard pass early in the first quarter and a 45-yarder early in the fourth quarter to seal the victory. The defense recorded its second shutout of 1985.

The Eagles held Jackson State to just 105 yards on the ground and forced five turnovers on the afternoon, including four interceptions of Tiger quarterback Shannon Boyd. Sophomore cornerback Nay Young recorded two of those pickoffs and three pass breakups. His 43-yard return to the JSU 26-yard line on the first theft set up fullback Gerald Harris' one-yard plunge to make the score 17-0.

Georgia Southern scored 21 unanswered points and then held off a Middle Tennessee rally to upset the nation's No. 1-ranked team. Gerald Harris rushed for 148 yards and Tracy Ham passed for 125 yards to lead the Eagles. Defensively, Nay Young had two key interceptions to stop the Blue Raiders. The win avenged a 35-10 loss to MTSU earlier in the season.

Young's second interception of the game and fourth of the playoffs stopped the Blue Raiders deep in Georgia Southern territory late in the contest. Earlier, Young stopped an MTSU drive at the Eagle 14-yard line with 10 seconds remaining in the first half to preserve a 21-0 GSU lead at intermission.

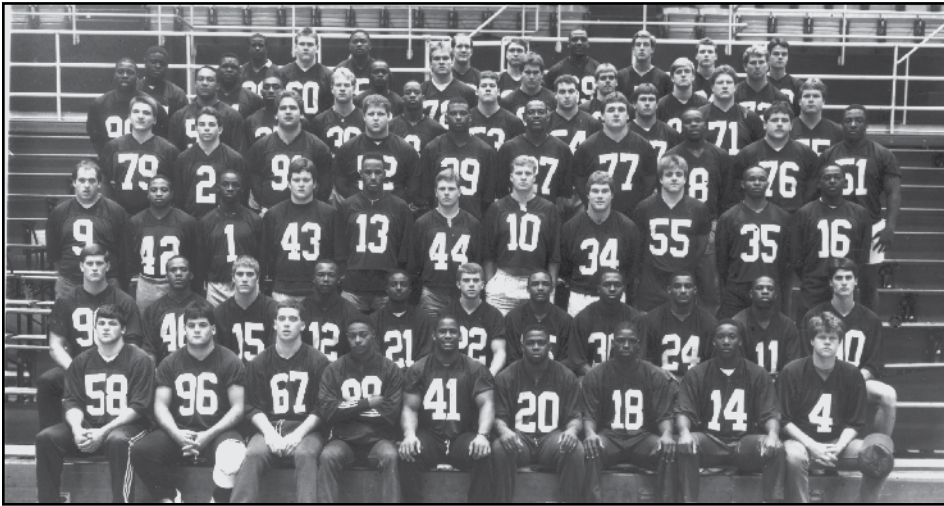

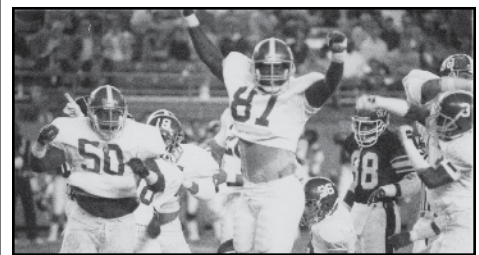

(December 20, 1986)

TACOMA, Wash. - Tracy Ham rushed for 180 yards and three touchdowns and completed 12-of-21 passes for 306 yards and another score to lead Georgia Southern to its second consecutive I-AA national championship. Against the nation's top-rated I-AA defense, Georgia Southern gained 603 yards in total offense, 297 rushing and 306 passing (7.5 yards per play). Tim Foley set a championship game record with four field goals, all in the first half. With the win, Georgia Southern became the first school to ever win back-to-back national championships in Division I-AA.

Harris scored on runs of 17, 7 and 9 yards in the first half. A 29-yard scamper and a one-yard plunge, both in the third quarter, capped the record-setting afternoon. The Eagles built a 31-0 halftime lead and expanded that to 38-0 before the Aggies scored midway through the third quarter.

The Eagle defense, led by Everette Sharpe's 11 tackles, limited the Aggies to 297 yards in total offense. It also forced three turnovers, including a pair of first half fumbles that resulted in 14 Eagle points.

Defensively, the Eagles picked off five Nicholls State passes and held the Colonels to just 109 yards rushing. Southern accumulated 484 total yards.

Gerald Harris broke two I-AA playoff records during the contest - most touchdowns (eight) and most points (48). Ironically, he set both in 1985.

While the 'Hambone' offense rolled up 29 first downs and ate up 476 yards on the ground, it also converted 9-of-17 third down opportunities and totalled 36 minutes of possession time.

Gerald Harris gained 162 yards and scored two touchdowns while Ricky Harris rushed for 106 yards on just seven carries.

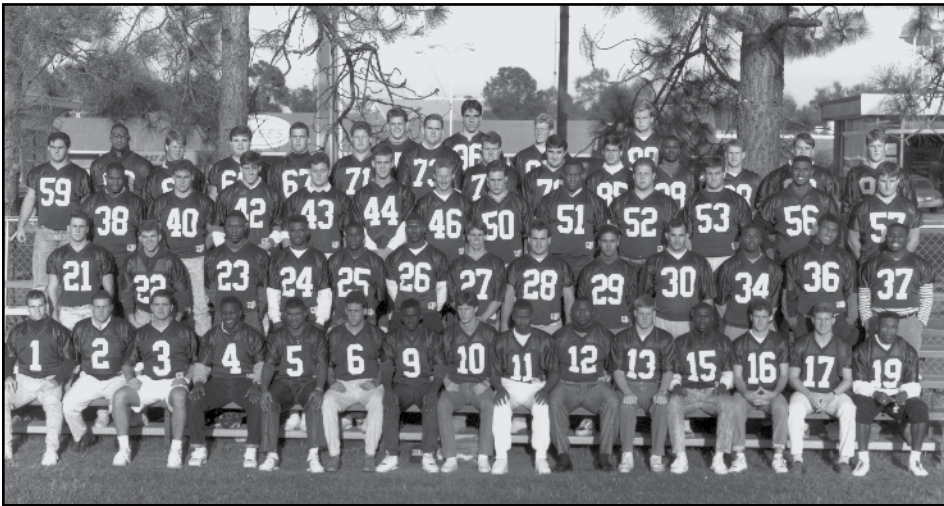

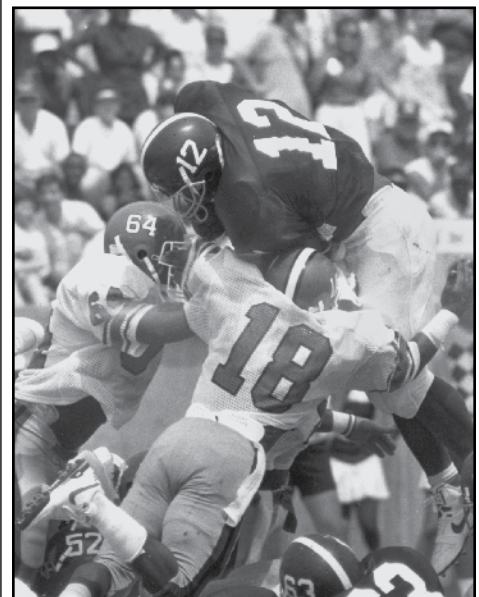

Dowis' 20 yard field goal nips SFA
(December 16, 1989)

STATESBORO, Ga. - Junior Mike Dowis booted a 20-yard field goal with 1:41 remaining to cap Georgia Southern's 15-0 season, the first by a college team in modern football history. The Eagles, before a record crowd of 25,725 at Paulson Stadium, rallied to capture their third Division I-AA championship in five years. Junior quarterback Raymond Gross brought Southern back from two seven-point deficits in the final 15 minutes. Junior fullback Joe Ross of Augusta carried 31 times for 152 yards and scored once. Gross rushed for 103 yards and passed for 113. Lumberjack quarterback Todd Hammel threw five interceptions, the fourth to free safety Taz Dixon at the SFA 30. Nine plays later, Dowis provided the margin of victory. Sophomore Kevin Whitley made 10 tackles for the Eagles, while junior Giff Smith and senior Darrell Hendrix contributed eight each.

Junior fullback Joe Ross of Augusta rushed for 190 yards as the Eagles defeated Villanova 52-36 in first round action at Paulson Stadium.

Ross scored on runs of 11 and 39 yards in the second half as Southern pulled away from the Yankee Conference co-champions - after typically trailing at intermission. Wildcat quarterback Kirk Schulz passed for 232 yards and two TDs the first 30 minutes as his team built a 21-13 lead.

Then came quarter No. 3 and the Eagles ripped off 25 unanswered points. Georgia Southern scored on its first four possessions to grab a 38-21 advantage with 5:00 remaining. The barrage was capped by Raymond Gross' nifty swing pass to Darryl Hopkins, who went 64 yards. Southern added 14 points in the fourth quarter. Its final score came on Rodney Oglesby's 32-yard interception return, marking the third time in three weeks that an Eagle defensive back had returned a pass theft to paydirt.

Chuck McClurg's block of a Chuck Daniel punt and Hughes' subsequent ramble to the end zone put Southern ahead to stay with 7:56 left in the first quarter.

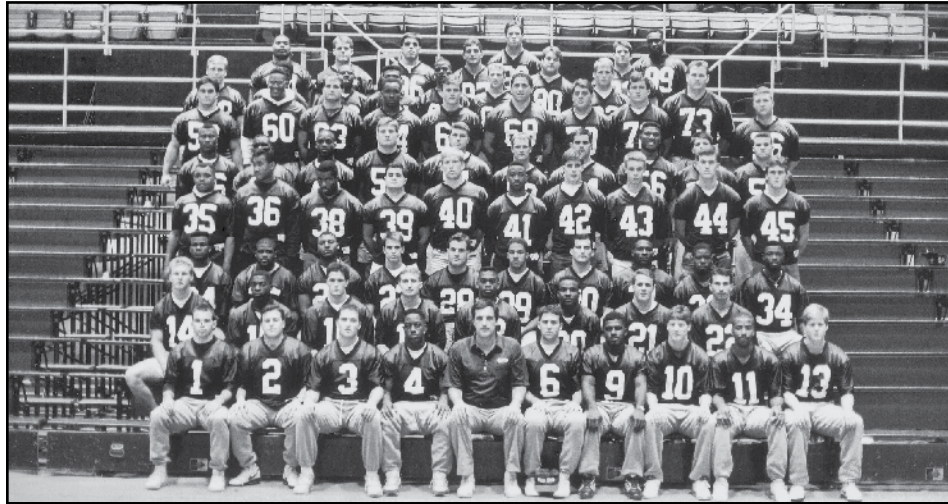

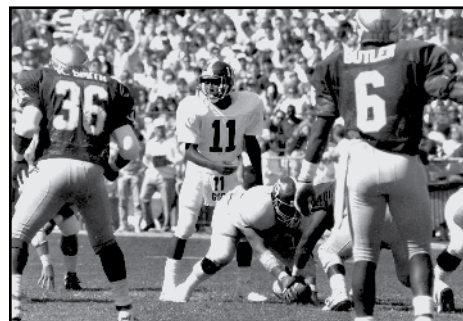

GSU: CHAMPIONS AGAIN

Eagles Claim Fourth I-AA Title
(December 15, 1990)

STATESBORO, Ga. - Quarterback Raymond Gross rushed for a game-high 145 yards and the Georgia Southern defense rose to the occasion with a crucial goal line stand early in the third quarter as the Eagles captured their fourth national championship in six years. Trailing 14-6 to open the second half, Nevada drove 74 yards in 14 plays to the Eagle 1-yard line. The Wolfpack was stuffed on four consecutive plays before Kevin McKelvie missed a 24-yard field goal. GSU answered with a pair of Darryl Hopkins touchdown runs to take a comfortable 27-6 lead midway through the final period. After Hopkins' contributions, the Eagles added a 41-yard Mike Dowis field goal and closed the contest when true freshman defensive end Alex Mash returned a Chris Vargas pass 15 yards for a touchdown.

Georgia Southern 31, The Citadel 0 Nov. 24, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -First Round-

The Eagles limited The Citadel to 8 second-half yards in a 31-0 first round rout of the Bulldogs. As The Citadel's potent wishbone attack came to a screeching halt, GSU broke open a 10-0 halftime advantage with a 35 yard scoring pass from Raymond Gross to Terence Sorrell and TD runs by Karl Miller and Lester Efford. Gross completed 10-of-13 passes for 173 yards. Joe Ross led all rushers with 84 yards on 23 carries and scored Southern's first TD.

After the Gross to Sorrel pass capped Southern's initial series of the second half, Kevin Whitley intercepted a Jack Douglas pass at the GSU 48. Miller highlighted a 52-yard, 8-play drive with a 20-yard scoring run. Efford's 7-yard effort topped an eight-play, 72-yard scoring drive.

Georgia Southern 28, Idaho 27 Dec. 1, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -Quarterfinals-

Middle linebacker Eugene Hayes' recovery of a fumble at the Eagle 23-yard line with 2:27 remaining halted a possible game-winning Idaho drive and Georgia Southern escaped with a 28-27 quarterfinal win over the Vandals.

After the Eagles took a seemingly commanding 21-7 lead with 53 seconds left in the first half on a 3-yard TD run by Raymond Gross, Idaho countered with 17 unanswered points for a 24-21 advantage. Gross connected with Karl Miller from 9-yards out late in the third quarter for what proved to be the deciding points.

GSU surrendered a season-high 528 yards total offense. Vandal quarterback Steve Nolan riddled the Eagle defense with 372 yards on a then-stadium record 32 completions (43 attempts), while Roman Carter led all rushers with 124 yards on 23 carries. Idaho passed the Eagle 30-yard line on three of its first four possessions, but came away empty.

Georgia Southern 44, Central Florida 7 Dec. 8, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -Semifinals-

A swarming defense slammed the door on Central Florida in the second half while the offense ripped off 35 unanswered points as GSU coasted in the semifinals.

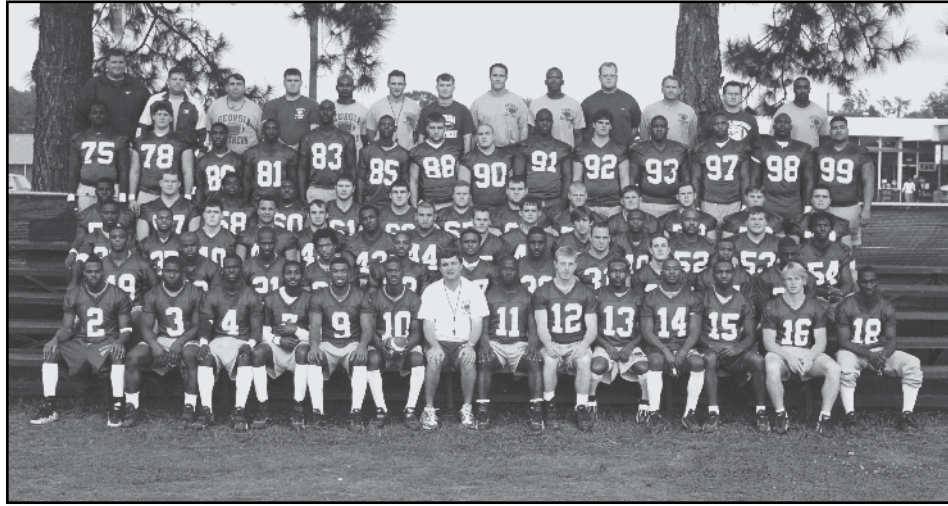
The Knights took an overdose of Southern's defensive front, whose pressure forced 10 sacks. UCF also saw enough of quarterback Raymond Gross, who threw for two touchdowns in the decisive second half.

Georgia Southern limited Central Florida to 81 yards total offense in the second half. The Knights generated just 6 rushing yards and 75 passing yards in the game's final 30 minutes. Joe Ross led all rushers with 72 yards while Karl Miller covered a career-high 111 yards on five catches.

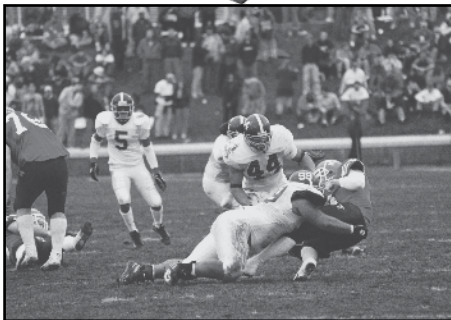
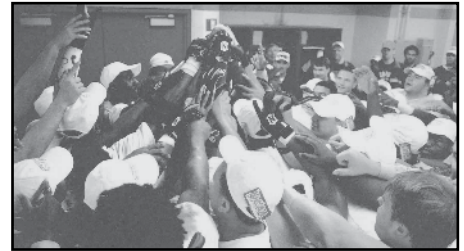

Eagles Capture Unprecedented Fifth National Title
(December 18, 1999)

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. - Georgia Southern waited a year to redeem itself in the Division I-AA championship. Once the game started, the Eagles ended the suspense by halftime.

Adrian Peterson rushed for a championship game-record 247 yards on 25 carries and scored three touchdowns as Georgia Southern scored 28 unanswered points in the second quarter and routed Youngstown State 59-24 becoming the first team to win five I-AA titles. The Walter Payton Award winner scored on runs of 3, 22 and 1 yards. Youngstown State, which came in with a defense that had been giving up just 166 yards rushing per game, couldn't contain I-AA's best rushing offense. The Eagles got 210 of their record-638 yards rushing in the second quarter and finished with 655 yards of offense compared to 338 for Youngstown State.

The Penguins kept pace with Georgia Southern by scoring on their first two drives. Then Peterson got Georgia Southern going - putting the Eagles ahead to stay at 14-10 with 10:25 left in the second quarter on his first TD of the game.

It was a showdown between I-AA's two best teams. Youngstown State had won more games (100) than any other I-AA program this decade and Georgia Southern came in with more playoff victories than any other I-AA program. The two programs also came in with four I-AA championships each.

Georgia Southern 72, Northern Arizona 29 Nov. 27, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -First Round-

Greg Hill ran for four touchdowns and threw for two more as second-seeded Georgia Southern routed 15th-seeded Northern Arizona 72-29 in the opening round of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. The senior quarterback had 206 yards rushing and scored on runs of 5, 10, 32 and 73 yards. He was 4-of-6 passing for 100 yards and connected with Dedric Parham on a 13-yard score and Andre Weathers on a 73-yard bomb.

After a 7-7 deadlock at the end of the opening quarter, the Eagles exploded for 23 unanswered points to take a 30-14 halftime lead. Southern outscored the Lumberjacks 42-15 in the final half, including a 21-0 run in the third quarter, for the win.

GSU fullback Adrian Peterson rushed for 134 yards and scored on a 1-yard plunge. Georgia Southern set a then-new I-AA playoff record with 568 rushing yards and a school record with the most points in a post season game ever.

Georgia Southern 38, Massachusetts 21 Dec. 4, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -Quarterfinals-

Adrian Peterson rushed for 333 yards on 32 carries and scored five touchdowns as second-seeded Georgia Southern downed Massachusetts 38-21 in the NCAA Division I-AA quarterfinals.

The sophomore fullback's performance set a new NCAA Division I-AA playoff rushing record, shattering the previous mark of 250 yards by Northeast Louisiana's Greg Robinson in 1992. Peterson, who battled a severe chest cold all afternoon, had three 25-yard touchdown runs as well as a 3-yarder and a 9-yarder.

Georgia Southern (10-2) took a slim 10-7 lead at halftime but outscored the Minutemen (9-4) 21-14 in the second half to secure the victory and successfully avenge a 55-43 loss to UMass in the 1998 National Championship game. The Eagles, who surrendered 303 rushing yards to the Minutemen in '98, allowed just 81 ground yards on 37 attempts - an average of just 2.2 yards per rush.

Georgia Southern 28, Illinois State 17 Dec. 11, Allen E. Paulson Stadium, Statesboro -Semifinals-

Adrian Peterson rushed for 183 yards and scored three touchdowns to lead Georgia Southern to a 28-17 victory over Illinois State in the Division I-AA semifinals. The win enabled the Eagles to advance to the I-AA National Championship game for the seventh time in 15 years.

Peterson scored on runs of 1 and 2 yards late in the second quarter to break a 7-7 tie and added a 10-yarder in the fourth to clinch the victory. The 1999 Walter Payton Award winner also surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark for the 29th consecutive time.

Georgia Southern held the Redbirds to 69 yards rushing while rolling up 363. Eagle quarterback Greg Hill rushed for 80 yards and one touchdown. He also was 3-of-7 passing for 76 yards and one interception.

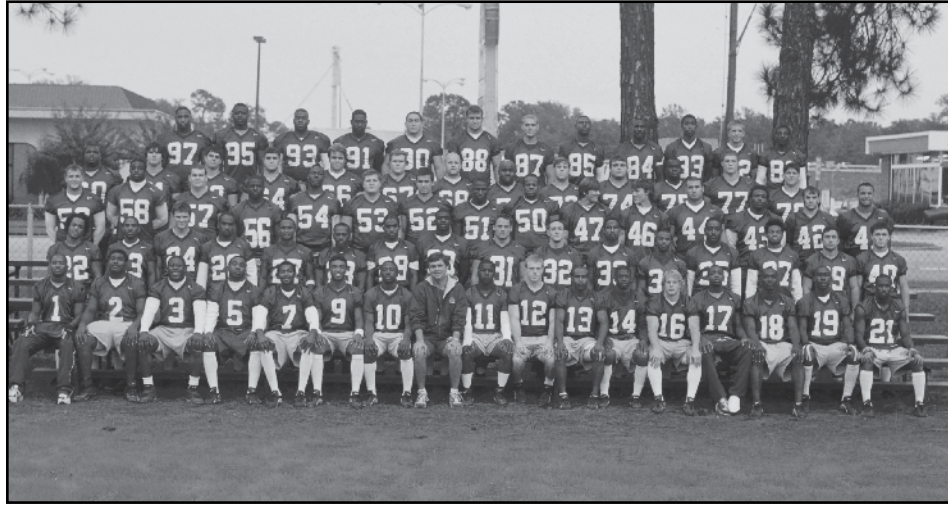

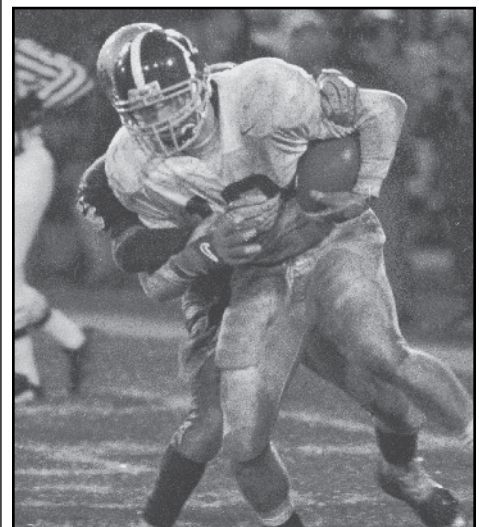

Peterson's Run Halts Grizzly Comeback Hopes
(December 16, 2000)

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. - Adrian Peterson rushed for 148 yards and Georgia Southern withstood a fourth quarter rally by Montana to win the 2000 NCAA I-AA National Championship 27-25 at Finley Stadium. The national championship is the second straight for Georgia Southern and its sixth in school history. With a 20-3 lead midway through the third quarter, Georgia Southern's national championship hopes appeared solid. But Montana scored on three consecutive possessions to take a 23-20 lead. The Eagles answered on their first play from scrimmage when Peterson broke-off tackle for 57 yards and a touchdown to put GSU back in front, 27-23. Ryan Hadden ended one Montana drive in the fourth quarter with an interception while two other drives ended in loss of downs. In addition to Peterson's rushing efforts, quarterback J.R. Revere completed 5 of 8 passes for 113 yards. Georgia Southern built its 20-3 lead on a fumble recovery in the end zone by James McCoy that gave the Eagles a 7-0 lead just 1:41 into the game. Revere then hit Chris Johnson with a 49-yard scoring pass late in the first quarter for a 13-0 advantage. After a Montana field goal cut the lead to 13-3, Peterson scored the first of his two touchdowns on a 1-yard run just 33 seconds before halftime.

Georgia Southern scored 21 unanswered points in the third quarter to break away from McNeese State and roll to a 42-17 win in the opening round of the I-AA playoffs.

Adrian Peterson rushed for a season-high 203 yards and one touchdown after a near-month layoff. Andre Weathers added touchdown runs of 23 and 19 yards while J.R. Revere rushed for 157 yards and two scores and was 6-of-13 through the air for 110 yards with one TD. In all, GSU amassed 589 yards of total offense including 479 on the ground.

After trailing 17-14 at the half, Revere engineered a 12-play, 75-yard drive which gave the Eagles a 21-17 lead at the 9:57 mark. Weathers took an option pitch for a 23-yard score five plays after he had converted a crucial 4th-and-4 situation at the Eagle 43-yard line to keep the drive alive.

Georgia Southern 48, Hofstra 20

Georgia Southern scored on six of its first nine possessions to build a 38-3 lead midway through the third quarter and turned in one of its top defensive performances of the season to blow past Hofstra 48-20 in the I-AA quarterfinals.

Adrian Peterson rushed for a game-high 146 yards while Mark Myers added 116 yards on just seven carries (16.6 ypr). In addition, J.R. Revere opened the scoring with three straight TD runs and finished with 186 total yards.

The Eagle defense held the vaunted Pride run-n-shoot offense to 65 first-half passing yards and three points.

GSU ran for 430 yards, the most allowed by Hofstra since 1998, and recorded the highest point total (48) against The Pride in eight years.

Georgia Southern 27, Delaware 18

Adrian Peterson rushed for 198 yards and a touchdown on a career-high 34 carries while Delaware failed to capitalize on four turnovers as the Eagles posted a 27-18 road victory in the NCAA I-AA semifinals. The win allowed the Eagles to advance to the I-AA National Championship game for the third consecutive year and for the eighth time in 16 years.

Andre Weathers added 122 rushing yards on just four carries yards and set up a late insurance field goal with a 58-yard scamper on a 3rd-and-9 call from the GSU 22-yard line. The Eagles piled up 381 yards on the ground against a normally-stingy Blue Hen defense that was allowing just 109.8 ypg coming into the game.

Delaware was also hurt by three missed field goals by Scott Collins, including a 32-yarder and a 22-yarder that were blocked in the second quarter by Jason Neese and Carlton Oglesby, respectively.

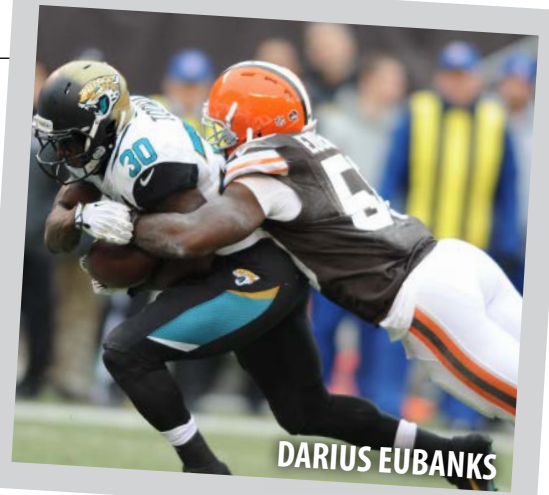

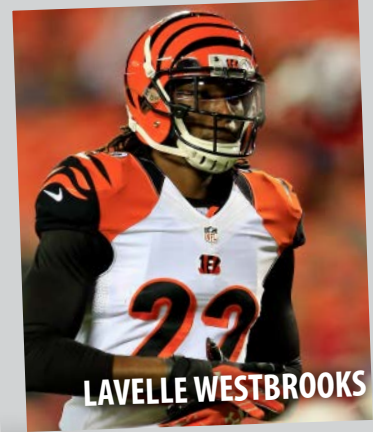

FATHER OF GEORGIA SOUTHERN FOOTBALL

Early in 1981, the decision to begin a football program at Georgia Southern had been finalized with an exciting, but unsure future ahead.

A mid-spring day in 1981 changed all that, when Erskine "Erk" Russell called college President Dale Lick from a payphone to let him know that he would come to Statesboro. Conversations had taken place on numerous occasions, but Russell had a lot to think about. He was comfortable in Athens, about to begin his 18th season as the defensive coordinator at Georgia, but he was looking for a new challenge.

On May 23, 1981, with more than 500 fans and members of the media gathered in Hanner Fieldhouse, Georgia Southern Football announced its new head coach and Russell put the Eagles on course to become one of the elite teams in its division.

On Sept. 8, 2006, legendary coach Erk Russell passed away. His death touched not only Georgia Southern University and the Coastal Empire, but reverberated throughout the state and entire college football nation. Arguably one of the best-known people - even long past his retirement from coaching - in the state of Georgia, coach Russell was loved and respected by all.

The day before he passed away, Coach Russell spoke for nearly an hour to the Eagles, passing along stories and advice on not only football but life. That was typical of the "Father of Georgia Southern Football." He touched the lives of many, not only his players but fellow coaches and members of the community who were on hand during the ceremony celebrating his life at, where else, but Paulson Stadium.

Erk Russell's spirit lives on across the Georgia Southern campus. His vision of what could be continues to inspire the university today, as do the morals and ethics he instilled in his players and his positive impact on the community. His motto of "Do Right" are words that will be ever linked to his legacy. In the fall of 2012, it was announced that two Georgia Southern graduates would produce a feature film about Coach Russell.

Since leading the Eagle football team to its third NCAA Division I-AA national championship and retiring from coaching in December 1989, Russell gave all he could to Georgia Southern. Whether assuming chairmanship of the university's capital campaign or dousing the baseball team bus with Eagle Creek Water before its departure for the College World Series, Russell was an active and visible booster of GSU and its programs.

As a coach, Russell saved the best for last. He entered the 1989 season as America's winningest coach, orchestrator of two national championships, 68 wins and 14 All-America selections - during a seven-year period.

In the ensuing 105 days, Southern ascended to the top spot in the NCAA I-AA football poll and Russell smoked 15 victory cigars. Erk's Eagles extended Division I's longest home win streak from 26 to 37 games. Strong safety Randell Boone, free safety Taz Dixon and offensive guard Sean Gainey raised Russell's All-America count to 17. Georgia Southern gained distinction as the first 15-0 college team of that century.

Russell's final record at Georgia Southern is a remarkable 83-22-1 (.788). After the Eagles moved to Division I-AA in 1984, he fashioned a 70-14 (.825) mark. Russell averaged 10.4 wins per season.

When Georgia Southern brought football back in 1981 it looked to Russell, long-time defensive coordinator at Georgia. Russell's first Eagle team, comprised entirely of walk-on players, fashioned a 7-3-1 record in 1982. The next year, Southern went 6-5 with four of the losses by five points or less. In 1984, the Eagles entered Division I-AA and went 8-3, narrowly missing a national playoff berth. Then came consecutive 13-2 seasons and back-to-back national championships, a I-AA first. With true freshman Raymond Gross at quarterback, the Eagles advanced to the national quarterfinals in 1987 before finishing 9-4. In 1988, Southern made its third championship game appearance in four seasons, falling to Furman 17-12 in Pocatello, Idaho.

Russell, who developed a reputation as one of college football's great defensive coordinators at Georgia, put together an extraordinary offense for the Eagles. His 1986 squad led the nation in scoring (41.3 points per game), total offense (501.8 yards per game) and rushing offense (327.1). Georgia Southern was unstoppable in the playoffs during the 1986 season, averaging 50.7 points. His last Eagle team won the national rushing championship (329.2 yards per game). Southern was among the top-five teams nationally in both scoring (12.1 points) and total defense (255.9 yards) while allowing only 133 points, a school-record, and holding two opponents scoreless.

During his 17 years at Georgia, Russell molded some of the country's finest defensive teams and his Junkyard Dogs became synonymous with Bulldog football. In 1967 Georgia led the Southeastern Conference in total defense and scoring defense. The next year, Georgia topped the SEC in total defense and led the nation in scoring defense, yielding just 9.8 points per contest. In 1971, Russell's group paced the country in shutouts and finished among the nation's Top 10 in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense. The '78 Bulldogs finished a point behind national champion Alabama in scoring defense. UGA's '79 defense forced 49 takeaways, the national high.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Russell held a bachelor's and master's degrees from Auburn. He played football, basketball, baseball and tennis for the Tigers, earning 10 varsity letters. Russell was the last four-sport letterman in Auburn history.

Married to Erk for 57 years, Jean Russell passed away in September 2008. The couple is survived by their two sons, Rusty and Jay.

JAIMIE L. HEBERT, Ph.D.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

FIRST YEAR

(UL LAFAYETTE, 1990)

Jaimie L. Hebert, Ph.D. became the 13th president of Georgia Southern University on July 1, 2016.

Prior to this role, he served as the provost and vice president for academic affairs at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas, where he spent the majority of his academic career. After joining the faculty there in 1999, Dr. Hebert was promoted to associate and full professor, served as chair of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics and appointed dean of the College of Arts and Sciences before moving into the provost position in 2011.

During his tenure as provost, Dr. Hebert initiated academic organizational changes to increase effectiveness and efficiency. He led the establishment of the College of Fine Arts and Mass Communication, the School of Nursing, three new departments in the College of Criminal Justice and a new College of Health Sciences. Under his direction, Sam Houston State added several doctoral, master's and undergraduate degrees, and he played an integral role in securing gifts of more than \$35 million for academic programs.

Dr. Hebert served in a variety of leadership roles at Sam Houston State, including co-chair of the Strategic Enrollment Planning Committee and chair of the Faculty Evaluation Committee, Faculty Grievance Committee and Athletic Advisory Committee. He also served on a SACSCOC

Compliance Committee, Faculty Senate, the Standing Faculty Tenure Committee and the Texas Success Initiative Committee.

Prior to joining Sam Houston State, he was an assistant professor of mathematical sciences at Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina. For three consecutive years, he was nominated as a Student Government Association Outstanding Teacher.

A native of Louisiana, Dr. Hebert earned his bachelor, master's and Ph.D. degrees in statistics from the University of Louisiana-Lafayette and has worked extensively in statistical research. He has published in such journals as *Communications in Statistics*, *Quality Engineering*, *Journal of Applied Probability*, *The American Statistician* and *Psychological Reports*. He has received more than \$2.5 million in external funding as principal investigator or co-principal investigator.

The new Georgia Southern president was an active member of his community in Huntsville where he served as president of the Huntsville Rotary Club, on the board of directors for Huntsville Girls Softball and on the Huntsville/Walker Economic Development Committee. In addition, he regularly conducted workshops for new provosts sponsored by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.





TOM KLEINLEIN

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
FIFTH YEAR
(WAKE FOREST, 1992)

Tom Kleinlein was officially announced as Georgia Southern's Director of Athletics on Nov. 12, 2012. A former college football player at Wake Forest University, Kleinlein joined the Eagles following two years at Kent State University, where he served as the deputy athletics director, and five years at Arizona State University, where he served as the associate athlete director for football.

Now in his fifth year at GS, Kleinlein continues making his mark in all facets of the department. His approach and vision is to ensure that the Georgia Southern programs continue their recent string of successes, while he also remains sharply focused on the areas of student-athlete experience, facilities, fan engagement and fundraising.

The entire athletics department has enjoyed success during Kleinlein's brief tenure. In just four years, the Eagles have distinguished themselves with nine conference championships. The football program won the first Sun Belt title in 2014, its first year as an FBS program, and the baseball team won the 2013 Southern Conference crown, moving on to beat fifth-ranked Florida State in the NCAA Regional in Tallahassee. The Eagle football team capped off a stellar 2015 season - its first as a bowl eligible program - by claiming the first bowl win in program history with a win over Bowling Green in the GoDaddy Bowl.

Kleinlein has overseen the success of all 17 GS programs. The men's basketball team continued its rise with a second-place finish in the Sun Belt regular season in 2014-15 and narrowly missed a trip to the NCAA Tournament after falling in the conference title game. The success also continued for men's golf, winning the Sun Belt Championship in 2015 and advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the sixth time in the past seven seasons. The cross country team advanced to the NCAA Regionals for the first time in program history in 2015 and the rifle team - one of two women's sports created under his watch along with women's golf - earned the first national rankings in that program's short history.

Kleinlein has conducted two national searches for a new head football coach that resulted in the hiring of Willie Fritz at the end of 2013 and Tyson Summers two years later, both which earned national applause. He also hired a new head men's basketball coach in Mark Byington in 2013 and a new head women's basketball coach in Kip Drown in 2014.

Kleinlein has spearheaded an overhaul of the Georgia Southern Athletic Foundation, creating a regionally based organization. These changes have resulted in an increase in annual fund donations from \$800,000 to well over a record-setting \$1.4 million on an annual basis. In addition, new donor programs have been created that have generated additional revenue of \$2.5 million to help cover the cost of the Eagles' move to the Sun Belt Conference.

In providing a quality experience for Eagle student-athletes, Kleinlein has overseen renovation projects totaling more than \$27 million during his time in Statesboro. The projects include a new locker room and coaches' offices for men's basketball, new locker rooms for women's basketball and volleyball, and new locker room and players' area for baseball, and a new tennis scoreboard.



In the fall of 2015, the Dan J. Parrish, Sr., Building was dedicated after a \$500,000 renovation to make it the new home of all Eagle women's coaching staffs and the administration.

During 2014, the expansion of Allen E. Paulson Stadium and christening the new Ted Smith Family Football Center took place. The addition of the Ted Smith Family Football Center provided a new 50,000 square foot home for Eagle football's day-to-day operations, including weight room, locker room, athletic training room, coaches offices and team meeting space.

With the move to the Sun Belt Conference, Kleinlein has worked to increase the department's annual operating budget from \$11 million to \$20 million annually. He also negotiated and signed a 15-year multimedia rights deal with Learfield Sports for the first time in school history, which is valued at \$11.825 million.

Over his tenure at GS, Kleinlein has negotiated a few of the largest contracts in school history, including deals with Coca-Cola and adidas. The deal with Coke, valued at \$13 million, included scholarships and contributions to both the academic and athletic foundations and is the largest corporate sponsorship in the university's history. In 2013, the Eagles signed the department's first all-sports apparel contract with adidas, which provides approximately \$800,000 in product. That contract was renewed in 2016.

Kleinlein reinforces the department's commitment to "rings and diplomas," giving each student-athlete the opportunity to earn a college degree and win a championship ring. During the 2015-16 academic year, student-athletes posted the highest combined grade point averages in history with a 3.01 for the year, the first time ever the department has reached the 3.0 plateau. Two hundred and twenty-seven student-athletes made the Honor Roll that spring, which accounted for 64 percent of the department. Football posted its highest semester GPAs on record in the spring of 2015 while women's soccer and men's basketball each set program records in the spring of 2016.

Grade point average is but one indicator of academic success for Georgia Southern Athletics and the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate, or APR, a team-based benchmark calculation that accounts for retention and eligibility of student-athletes, is another. In the latest report, four of the department's programs recorded a perfect single-year APR score, while the GS volleyball and men's soccer programs recorded APRs that ranked first in the Sun Belt in their respective sports. Volleyball and rifle were recipients of the NCAA's Public Recognition Award, which goes to programs with a multi-year APR in the top 10 percent nationally of all squads in each sport.

Total development of the student-athlete is a top priority and Kleinlein has implemented the "Eagles in Transition" program, which strives to help student-athletes build skills necessary to compete in the job market upon graduation. The first-of-these-kind seminars include topics such as resume writing, interviewing, career exploration, life after graduation and networking skills.

Kleinlein's vision and planning was critical as Georgia Southern navigated the changing landscape of college athletics by accepting an invitation to join the Sun Belt Conference in March of 2013, moving the FCS powerhouse to the highest level of competition in football and securing a new league for the Eagles' athletics teams. This announcement placed GS among new peers, both as a department and as a university. In two seasons, the football program has gone from an FCS transition program to a program receiving votes in the FBS Top 25 poll after winning its first bowl game.

Kleinlein's emphasis on organization and leadership is evident in the assembly of the athletics department, coaches and support staff. In addition to coaching positions and sports, Kleinlein has created his leadership team which is part of the infrastructure needed in order to operate successfully at the Division I FBS level.

Kleinlein accepted his current assignment at Georgia Southern after serving in executive roles with the Kent State, Arizona State and Rutgers Athletic Departments. Prior to his career in college athletics, he served as a high school history teacher and coach in Guilford County, North Carolina.

A student-athlete at Wake Forest, Kleinlein earned four letters as a member of the Demon Deacons' offensive line (1989-92). He earned his bachelor's degree in history from Wake Forest (1992), Master's of Education in curriculum and instruction from Arizona State (2008) and started his career in athletics administration as an academic counselor at his alma mater.

Originally from Inwood, New York, Kleinlein and his wife, Tara, have two sons - Austin and Mason.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

TO THE MEDIA

Media interested in Georgia Southern athletics, be it an interview or press credential request, are encouraged to contact the Athletics Communications Office.

Eagle coaches and student-athletes work closely with the Communications staff in servicing media requests. Please, don't hesitate to give us a call.

All interview requests for Georgia Southern coaches, student-athletes and administrators should be directed to an appropriate member of the Athletics Communications staff.

The Athletics Communications Office is located in the Dan J. Parrish, Sr. Building off of Fair Road.

All media members coming to campus during business hours of the work week need to stop by the the Parking & Transportation office or the Welcome Center in Lewis Hall to obtain a parking pass. There is no charge for visitor parking permits. Media will be responsible for paying any fines they incur while on campus.

PRESS BOX

ENTRANCE – The entrance to the Georgia Southern press box is located at the back of the box midway across the south stands. There is no elevator to the press box. Steps are located on either end of the press box.

LEVELS – The press box is a two-tier facility. To reach the second level, you must enter the first level and use the stairs located in the middle of the writers' area.

LEVEL 1 – This area is reserved for print media and statistics personnel. The athletics communications office provides wireless internet access and Ethernet lines on a first-come, first-served basis.

RADIO NETWORK – The originating station for each team's network is provided a booth from which to broadcast. Two phone lines are provided in the visitor's radio booth on a reciprocal basis. Otherwise, a fee of \$100 will be charged.

TELEVISION – A broadcast booth will be provided to the originating television network. Contact the athletics communications office for details. All telecasts must have the approval of GS Athletics Director Tom Kleinlein.

COACHES BOOTH – Each of the coaching staffs have one booth designated for their use. For information on headsets, contact Nick Scull at (814) 591-8459.

LEVEL 2 – The photo deck level serves as the filming area for all television and team video crews. Priority is given to team video operations. This area also serves as an overflow area and home to the Georgia Southern Student Radio Station broadcast crew.

SIDELINE – Georgia Southern strictly follows NCAA rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot within the designated team areas and must display their credentials at all times.

CREDENTIALS

PRESS BOX – Seating is extremely limited in the press box and credentials are at a premium. All members of the media covering the game must request credentials from the Athletics Communications Office at least seven (7) days in advance.

All single-game requests must be made via e-mail to bjohnston@gorgiasouthern.edu. Individuals not assigned to the game will not be granted press credentials. No one under the age of 18 will be permitted in the working area of the press box (or on the sideline) at any time, regardless of affiliation.

SIDELINES – Follow the same procedure as used in requesting press box credentials.

PRESS WILL CALL

Game credentials and parking passes not mailed can be picked up at the press will-call window. Will call is located between Gates 7 and 8 and opens two (2) hours prior to kickoff. This is the only location that passes will be left.

PARKING

Press parking is at a premium at Paulson Stadium and as a result, spaces are allotted first to media who cover the Eagles on a full-time basis. Press parking is located in the parking lot southwest of the press box. Parking spaces are numbered in this lot and vehicles in the wrong spaces will be towed at the owner's expense. The overflow and single-game parking lot is in nearby Freedom's Landing.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Statistics, flip cards and game programs will be distributed in the press box prior to game time. Play-by-play, complete quarter, halftime and final game statistics, defensive statistics, drive charts, notes and quotes will be available shortly after the conclusion of the game.

A catered meal will be available before the game on Level 1 on a first-come, first-served basis, and can be picked up with the proper credentials. Beverages (soft drinks, water) will be available throughout the contest.

Separate meals for broadcast crews may be arranged in advance to meet specific schedules.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

At the conclusion of each home contest, all GS interviews are conducted inside the Smith Family Football Center on the second floor in the team room. Student-athletes will only be available in the press conference, no one-on-one interviews will be permitted. Head coach Tyson Summers will address the media following the players' departure.

Visiting players and coaches will be available by contacting the visiting SID. The visitor's locker room is located on the north side of the Bishop Field House.

COACH SUMMERS INTERVIEWS

Media members wishing to interview Coach Tyson Summers are asked to please contact Bryan Johnston in the Athletics Communications Office.

Coach Summers is available on Tuesday mornings to the media in the Ted Smith Family Football Center, as well as after practice on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday of game week.

STUDENT-ATHLETE INTERVIEWS

All student-athlete interviews must be coordinated through the Athletics Communications Office. Student-athlete interviews will take place after practice Monday and Wednesday during a regular game week. No interviews are allowed on Thursdays or Fridays.

PRACTICE INTERVIEWS

Georgia Southern practices are open to the press unless specifically noted. Coach Summers and members of his staff will meet with media following practice on the Field of Dreams at Paulson Stadium. Requests for student-athletes interviews will need to be submitted before practice.

Photographers and videographers from accredited media outlets will be the only individuals allowed with cameras

PRESS CREDENTIAL POLICY

• Spouses, dates, children, equipment carriers and non-workers are restricted from the press box, sidelines and locker rooms. Any abuse of a working credential will result in the media agency losing credential privileges. Credentials will not be issued to any person under the age of 18.

• In some instances, due to space limitations, meeting the identified criteria does not guarantee credentials.

• Space for the working press, radio and television is allocated by the Georgia Southern Athletics Communications Office, which reserves the right to deny credentials to any outlet.

• Due to space restrictions, Georgia Southern does not allow radio stations to broadcast live shows or segments from the press area of the press box – before, during or after a game.

Guidelines

1. Season media credentials are issued to those organizations that report on Georgia Southern intercollegiate athletics on a regular and substantial basis, as outlined above.

2. With the exception of Eagle beat reporters reporting on the team on a daily basis and producing daily reports, all passes are approved and issued on a game-by-game basis.

3. All passes and credentials are non-transferable without prior approval from the Georgia Southern Athletics Communications Office. Passes used by any member of a credentialed outlet without specific editorial assignment or by non-working members of the organization are subject to revocation upon University request.

4. Due to limited space and to ensure compliance with NCAA guidelines, credentials for "free-lance" writers or photographers will not be considered without a specific assignment received in writing by the assigning organization.

5. Georgia Southern and the NCAA prohibit the issuance of credentials to representatives of an organization that regularly publishes gambling information, such as "tout sheets" or "tip sheets." Georgia Southern will not issue credentials to organizations whose primary function is to deliver news related to the recruitment of student-athletes, unless owned and operated under a national parent company.

MEDIA GUIDELINES

6. No credentials will be issued to individuals under the age of 18. Admission to media facilities are for working media only. The locker room is off-limits to members of the media at all times.

7. Credentials may be requested, but are not guaranteed for approval, for online entities that host a website that regularly and substantially reports on GS intercollegiate athletics. These online entities must employ for that Georgia Southern-dedicated website at least one full-time, salaried employee who provides editorial oversight before an article can be posted. Neither independent bloggers, nor fan sites where anyone can submit articles for publication, will receive credentials.

Online entities must register at least 20,000 legitimate unique users per month in each of the past 12 months, and must have been in existence for a minimum of three years, to be given consideration. The outlet must designate one main contact to serve as the beat writer for designated sports, and all content written in story or blog form must have the writer's name and contact information.

New outlets meeting these criteria are eligible for, but are not guaranteed, one (1) press pass and one (1) photography pass for home games and media events.

8. University personnel may deny or revoke credentials without notice and an individual shall surrender his/her credential upon request for: noncompliance with the priorities or guidelines set out in this policy; noncompliance with health, safety, or security directives issued regarding University athletic events; violations of University, Department of Intercollegiate Athletics, NCAA, or Sun Belt policies; and for conduct for which there are reasonable grounds to believe violate state or federal law, or constitute a breach of professional ethics, including inappropriate dress and/or intoxication.

9. The Georgia Southern Athletics Communications Office reserves the right to change this policy at any time.

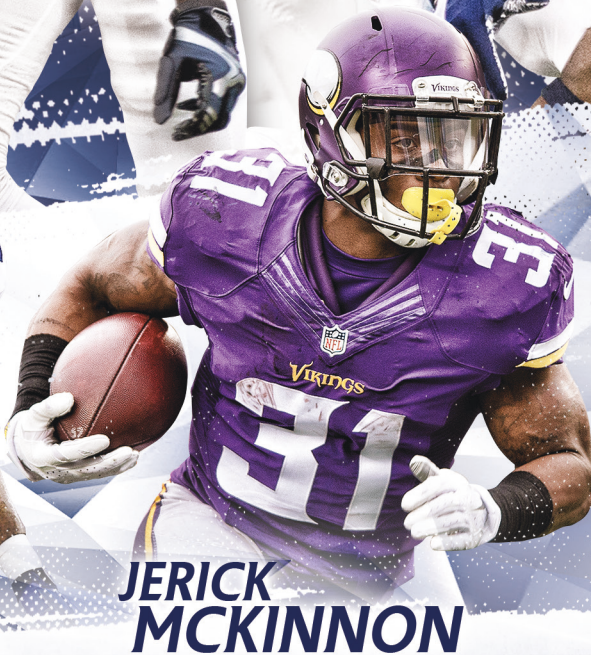

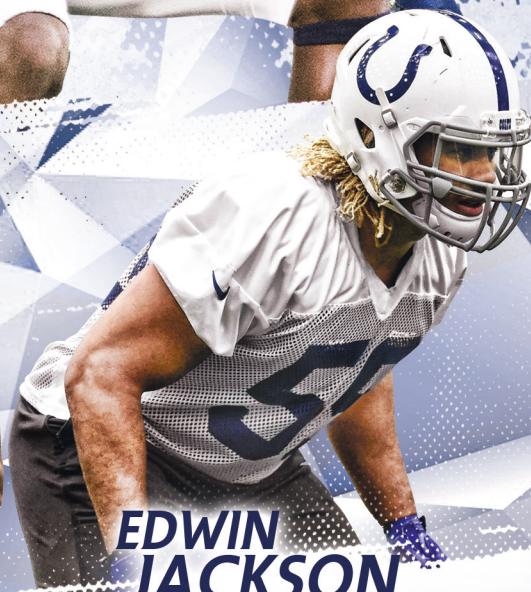
