
Postgame Interviews

Dr. Bruce F. GrubePresident

Dr. Bruce F. Grube became Georgia Southern's 11th president in July of 1999.

Since 1995, he served as president of St. Cloud State University, a highly accredited, comprehensive institution with approximately 14,000 students and 1,300 faculty.

Highlights of Grube's administration include increasing the academic quality, securing funding for a \$34 million library, and moving the university toward its first capital campaign, which will begin publicly in November with 50% raised.

From 1992-1995, Grube served as provost at the University of Southern Colorado, in Pueblo, with responsibilities as the chief academic officer and the chief operations officer. Prior to his position at USC, Grube had moved up through the administrative and academic ranks at California State Polytechnic University in Pomona, serving as provost and academic vice president from 1987-1992. From 1985-1987, he served as associate vice president of planning and as associate vice president of administration from 1983-1985.

Grube received his Ph.D. from the University of Texas in Austin, focusing on American government and politics, public administration, and comparative politics. He earned his A.B. also in political science from the University of California in Berkeley. He has served as a faculty member at all of the institutions where he has been employed.



Sam Baker Athletics Director

In his fourth full year since his appointment as Georgia Southern's director of intercollegiate athletics, Sam Baker has guided the department's planning and rebuilding efforts in a positive direction since his arrival in November, 1995.

Baker, a native of Front Royal, Va., joined the GSU management team after five years as director of the College Football Marketing Corporation, a subsidiary of the College Football Association (CFA). Baker's responsibilities with the CFA included securing title sponsorship for its "Promise of Tomorrow" scholarship program. A four-year agreement with Hitachi provided the awarding of \$1.3 million in scholarships to aid individuals involved in college football with the means to pursue careers in education.

From 1986-90, he was associate athletic director for financial development at Vanderbilt. In the two years before moving to Nashville, Baker was associate athletic director for external affairs at Oregon, the institution where he served as director of athletic marketing from January 1983 to May 1984. He entered the field of intercollegiate athletics at the College of William & Mary, where he spent seven years (1976-82) as the Tribe's director of athletic promotions.

Baker, 48, holds a 1976 master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University and a 1974 B.A. in communication arts from James Madison. He and wife Ann are the parents of three children: Zeb (20 and a junior at GSU), Elizabeth (18 and a freshman at South Carolina) and Josie (11).



After a season of unlucky circumstances, the Eagles hope to find a winning combination in 1999 with the aid of proven returners, talented newcomers and the unforgiving thought of a season-ending play.

If only one play could sufficiently depict Georgia Southern's 1998 season, it was unfortunately the one that ended it.

It was the epitome of unlucky circumstances, something fourthyear head coach **Kevin Chambers** saw too much of throughout the three-month season.

It was a hard shot that was superbly saved but yet deflected; so cruelly deflected that it set up the game-winning goal for the team that Georgia Southern had beaten three days earlier.

But that was in the regular season, and this backbreaking, season-ending goal came in double overtime of the Southern Conference Tournament, ending the Eagles' season with a 6-11-1 overall record.

That was 1998 in a nutshell — a game in which GSU actually outshot its opponent by 12 shots but lost by one goal, the sixth single-goal loss of the season.

Chambers has had a whole off-season to ponder the season-ending play, as has the '99 version of the Georgia Southern men's soccer team. Furthermore, statistics prove that when the Eagles were off, they weren't off by much. GSU's opponents only scored three more goals and tallied only two more assists, and when it came to shots on goal, the Eagles held a substantial 288-214 advantage in the 18 matches played.

What does all this mean for 1999? Possibly everything.

Chambers knows the '98 campaign was uncharacteristic of a GSU team that had too much potential to not feel optimistic. Now with proven returners coupled with a wealthy crop of incoming talent, the '99 squad presents a scenario that is all-too-similar to that same optimism.

But to sculpt a different outcome, the Eagles will have to show what Chambers feels could make all the difference: team chemistry with a touch of heart and leadership.


To help the matter, Chambers went back to Georgia Southern's successful past and grabbed former standout goalkeeper **Mike Burrell** as a new assistant coach. Burrell was a catalyst in helping the Eagles to their first-ever national ranking in 1997.

The Eagles return 11 letterwinners, including four proven seniors, from last year. One of those seniors is vocal goalkeeper **John Miglarese**, who started 16 matches last season and recorded a goals against average (GAA) of 1.73.

"We will have two goalkeepers, both who have experience," Chambers said. "Miglarese has three year's experience playing at the Division I level, and Garret Lazenby brings much experience with him from his high school and club teams."

Georgia Southern will also rely on two-time All-Southern Conference choice **Jeremy McClure**, a senior forward who has led the team in goals and points the past two seasons. Last year, he recorded nine goals and two assists for 20 points, putting him seventh on the SoCon's scoring chart and fourth on the top goal averages list with 0.50 goals per game. His 27 career goals leave him five short of the GSU record for goals scored in a career.

The rest of the midfield could sport a new look with senior



Terry McDaniel and junior **Tony Brown**. Brown finished fifth on the team in total points last season with nine, collecting three goals and three assists. Junior **Alan Pate** could also be essential in the midfield, as he exits a '98 season in which he recorded three goals and two assists.

"We moved Tony back to the center midfield during the spring and he seems to be more comfortable there," Chambers said. "We will take a look at McDaniel and newcomers Alex Branch in the midfield. Pate gained valuable experience as his playing time increased last year. Martin Cunningham and newcomers Blake Bironas and Craig Valentine could find themselves on the outside."

Senior and two-year letterwinner **Matt Colaluca** will help shoulder a bulk of the responsibility at the forward position, which saw positive play from sophomores **Eric Rhodes** and **Dustin Danner** last year. Newcomer **Omar Morales** could also contend for playing time early in the season.

"McClure will be playing up top as he gives us much experience on the field," said Chambers. "We will be looking for contributions from Colaluca, Rhodes, Danner, **Florian Scheidat** and Morales to add a more balanced attack."

Of all the positions, the Eagles will face their biggest test in the defensive backfield, where they took a heavy hit with the loss of three starting defenders. But returning are juniors **Josh Epps** and **David Fisk**, both who were starters last season and both who will be eyed as potential leaders.

"We will rely on the experience of Epps and Fisk," Chambers said. "We moved **Alan Woodrum** to marking back in the off-season and he seems to be finding his way back there. **Jeff Russell** and **Trenton LeBlanc** will be others we'll look at in searching for another defender with both attacking and defending prowess. Newcomers **Elliott Ulmer, Stephen Brantley** and **Andy Grossman** could play a part in that as well."



Before the start of the 1999 season, men's soccer SID Mike Davis sat down with GSU's fourth-year head coach to discuss different aspects of the Eagles' team, season and program.

What will be the most essential thing the 1999 team will need to focus on to post a winning season?


"Team chemistry and organization. We will have to put the most productive unit on the field to score goals, which means from the back to the front. We will need to put the players that can excel defensively as well as on the attack in the back. And we will have to put our best attackers on the field that have the determination to defend as well."


Last year your team went 6-11-1 overall, but many of those losses were by one goal. What has to be done to get over the hump at the end of a match to score that extra goal or two?

"Experience is a big factor. We were very young in 1998 and with a year of experience for the returning players, we feel like we will be a little more mentally prepared and take what we learned from being in tight games last year."

From what you know in preseason, what characteristics will the 1999 team have that may or may not have been shown by the 1998 team?

"Consistency. A better prepared team will benefit from what we learned in 1998."





How important was the addition of Mike Burrell to the coaching staff and how will he affect the team?

"Mike is an experienced player who knows what it takes to play for Georgia Southern University. It is a must for this team to have the pride, the heart and the intensity that you must bring with you every day. Now, they will not only hear it from me, but they will also hear it from another source who knows what it takes to play at the Division I level and in the Southern Conference."

What are your team goals and have they changed any from the years past?

"Our main goals are simple: to win the Southern Conference and to play at a high level every day, not only in games but also in practice."

Talk about the Southern Conference and what you expect to see in league play this year.

"Every year the Southern Conference gets stronger. We must be ready to face the challenges of eight league games and give ourselves the best opportunity to win each one."

How would you rank your incoming class and how much will the 1999 team's success depend upon play by the newcomers?

"This incoming class is an extremely balanced group. We were able to add help to each position for this year. If the freshmen are ready to step into leadership roles, then they will be given every opportunity to do so. They have all proven themselves on the field at their level and will need to excel and bring their game, physically and mentally, to the Division I level."

What do you look for when recruiting?

"First, I look at their character. Second, I look at willingness to excel in the classroom. Then I look at their athletic ability. That's how I make my decisions. While their ability on the field is important, it doesn't top the way they handle themselves on and off the field. I want players with a blue collar work ethic."

What are your thoughts concerning the schedule you will play this year?

"It will be a challenge for us, as we will compete in the toughest region (south) in the nation."



Some people talk about loyalty. Kevin Chambers lives it.

Now for over onethird of his life, the 29-year old Chambers has been a part of the Georgia Southern men's soccer program as a standout player, assistant coach and head coach. A record-setting goalkeeper in his collegiate playing days, the Marietta-native now enters his 10th season as an instrumental part of the GSU soccer program.

The 1999 season will mark Chambers' fourth as head coach. With six

wins in 1998, he has compiled more wins than any other GSU coach after three seasons with 30. He will also enter the new campaign with the third-most wins by any GSU men's soccer coach, falling just 21 shy of the all-time high total set by Tom Norton (1990-95).

Chambers' 1998 team finished 6-11-1 overall and 4-3-1 in Southern Conference games, landing the Eagles in fourth place out of nine teams in the league standings. GSU finished fourth in team scoring (1.83 gpg) and fourth in team goalkeeping (1.91 gaa) and was also represented with top-10 postings in five individual statistical charts.

Chambers' 1997 season was one of the most productive campaigns ever produced by a Georgia Southern men's soccer team. His squad compiled an overall record of 14-4-2 and managed to not only obtain the first-ever national ranking in school history but held onto it throughout much of the season. The 1997 success led to Chambers being named Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year, voted on by all SoCon coaches.

The '97 Eagles were ranked as high as No. 14 after sculpting an 11-game unbeaten streak that stretched from Sept. 16 to Oct. 18. In that month-long stretch, Chambers' team posted four shutouts while, in six other matches, only allowed opponents a single goal. The Eagles first appeared in the rankings on Sept. 22 following their 2-1 win over Central Florida in Statesboro.

In his first season at the helm, Chambers led the Eagles to a 10-11-2 record, equalling the 1994 team with the most wins since 1990. The 1996 squad finished third in the Southern Conference and advanced to the SoCon Tournament championship game after booking a pair of 2-0 shutouts against Virginia Military Institute and Marshall in the opening rounds.

Before taking over the men's program, Chambers served as an assistant under Tom Norton in 1992 and, from 1994-95, dealt extensively with both the men's and the women's teams. The Georgia Southern graduate returned to Statesboro in 1992 primarily as the goalkeeper coach for the men's squad and took on added responsibilities with both teams in 1994 and 1995.

Prior to joining the GSU coaching staff, Chambers starred on the Eagle playing field from 1988-91. As Georgia Southern's starting goalkeeper for four years, his name is etched in the school record book with 312 saves and 11 shutouts. With a career goalsagainst-average of 1.80, Chambers recorded three 1,000-plus minute seasons and was named to the All-Trans America Athletic

Conference second team as a senior.

Chambers led the Eagles to a 37-34-6 record over four years and served as captain in 1991. He sparked GSU to a 15-5 season and the Trans America Athletic Conference Eastern Division Championship with a 0.98 goals-against-average in 1990.

In his short head coaching tenure, Chambers has coached three eventual professional soccer league players: midfielder Jason Russell (1995-98), midfielder Bobby McDaniel (1996-97) and goalkeeper Mike Burrell (1994-97). Under his watch, Georgia Southern has also had two NSCAA All-South Region selections, nine All-Southern Conference selections and five All-SoCon tournament choices.

Chambers earned a Bachelor of Science in communications from Georgia Southern in 1992. He is a 1988 graduate of Marietta's Sprayberry High School and was an All-Cobb County selection his final two seasons. Chambers married the former Wendy Custer on May 9, 1998.



Mike Burrell will enter his first season in the collegiate coaching ranks as Georgia Southern's top assistant coach.

A former walk-on turned standout goalkeeper for the Eagles, Burrell will not only direct his focus to the keeper position but also to all aspects of the program, including academic progress and recruiting.

Despite being only two years out of college, Burrell has already gained coaching experience by spending one year as head coach at Bulloch Academy (Ga.). But

it was his banner playing career in which Eagle soccer fans know him best.

In 1997, his senior season, Burrell played an instrumental role in helping GSU to a 14-4-2 record as well as its first-ever national ranking. A 20-game starter at goalkeeper, Burrell finished with a 1.52 goals-against-average (GAA) in '97, ranking him third among Southern Conference goalkeepers. He also recorded 3.5 shutouts during GSU's storied season and landed on the All-South Region Third Team and the All-Southern Conference First Team.

Burrell's 1996 season saw much of the same success. He started in 22 of 23 games and recorded a 1.98 GAA, helping GSU to a 10-11-2 record and a trip to the Southern Conference Tournament Championship Game. He also led the league with 101 saves

In all, Burrell started 51 of 59 matches played in four years, and when it was all said and done, he was Georgia Southern's all-time leader in goals-against-average with a career GAA mark of 1.70, beating the record set by his former head coach and now coaching peer Kevin Chambers.

He also finished with two other GSU records, both of which still stand: most shots in a season (317, in 1996) and most saves

in a season (123, in 1997). He also ranks second on the career shots chart (754), second on the career shutouts chart (9) and fourth on the career saves chart (280).

Immediately following his stellar collegiate playing career, Burrell was the fifth overall pick by the Atlanta Ruckus professional soccer organization in the 1998 A-League draft.

Burrell, 23, earned a bachelor of science in biology from Georgia Southern in 1997. He is a 1993 graduate of Evans High School, where he captained the Knights to a regional championship his senior year.

Burrell was born on November 30, 1975 in Honolulu, Hawaii. He is currently working on a master's degree at Georgia Southern.


Once conceived as a South Georgia regional development program, the camp has now grown to include campers from surrounding states including Florida, South Carolina and Tennessee.

THE CAMPUS

From century-old live oaks shading Sweetheart Circle to skylights pouring sunshine into the atrium of the Fielding D. Russell Union, Georgia Southern blends the traditional southern style of the original campus with the sleek silhouette of rising construction.

The Russell Union is the hub of student life. Its sunny indoor plaza, a gathering place for relaxed free time, is centered in a mall of canopied cafes, open-front specialty shops, and rooms for games, music, television and study. A surround-sound movie theater features classic and current films.

The Lakeside Cafe, with open-air dining on its double-deck waterfront verandas, offers a convenient retreat along the brick-laid Pedestrian, a walking boulevard linking the main areas of the campus.

Even as the campus horizon grows and changes, some things will never change — the towering pines and lush magnolias, the springtime show of blooming dogwoods and azaleas, ducks gliding on glassy lakes and sunny afternoons on Sweetheart Circle. These are the images that shape Southern memories.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Courses taught at Georgia Southern are instructed by university faculty, not graduate students. And unlike researchers at many other institutions, GSU's top research professors also teach. Classes are small, with undergraduate courses averaging 25 students per class and graduate courses only nine.

Approximately 150 degree programs ranging from two-year to doctoral levels are offered through the colleges of Business Administration, Education, Health and Professional Studies, Liberal Arts and Social Sciences, and Science and Technology. The College of Graduate Studies administers and coordinates all university graduate degree programs.

Georgia Southern is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and most of its programs have earned accreditations from the professional and academic associations which set the educational standards in their fields.

STUDENT LIFE

Georgia Southern is a "live-in" campus where students choose from a wide range of well-rounded variety of activities to get involved in a busy-but-balanced college life.

More than 150 campus organizations bring students together



around their special interests. The organizations include academic associations, performing arts groups, honor societies, team sports, fraternities and sororities, service clubs, religious groups and others. Most organizations also participate at the regional or national level, with opportunities for students to expand their horizons.

Georgia Southern's reputation as a "warm and caring, friendly campus" begins with the university's commitment to serving students — offering the support needed to meet the challenges of college life and beyond. CORE CURRICULUM




Cited five times as the Trans America Athletic Conference's top overall program, Georgia Southern moved to the Southern Conference in 1992. Like a dynasty quietly in the making, the Eagle and Lady Eagle programs have claimed 13 championship titles.

LOCATION

Statesboro, located in the northern section of Southeast Georgia, is the county seat of Bulloch County, the state's seventh-largest county occupying 684 square miles. It is located 50 miles northwest of Savannah and 76 miles southwest of Augusta.

Statesboro is serviced by several major roadways which make it easily accessible to other cities. Interstate 16, just 13 miles out of the city limits, links Statesboro to Savannah and Macon. Other major roadways which run through Statesboro include: US Highway 80, which runs from Tybee Island, Georgia to San Diego, California; US Highway 301, which runs from Bradenton, Florida to Wilmington, Delaware; and US Highway 25, which runs from Brunswick, Georgia to Cincinnati, Ohio.





COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Georgia Southern's student-athletes continue to become more involved in the Statesboro-Bulloch County area, and that commitment has helped strengthen ties between the university and the surrounding community. Donating their time and efforts into many community-related projects, the Eagles and Lady Eagles have become an important part of the Statesboro area.

Much of the student-athletes' involvement is powered by Alpha Beta Chi, the union through which GSU athletes work to make a positive difference. Officially termed Athletes for the Betterment of the Community, the Georgia Southern chapter of ABX was founded in 1992 to give student-athletes an organized means of helping the community. The group has blossomed into one of the most active organizations on campus.

The club's many projects are as varied as the student-athletes who coordinate them. Some of Alpha Beta Chi's annual projects include Walk America, clothing and food drives, and assisting with the Reading is Fundamental (RIF) program. The group has also "adopted" needy families and visited elementary school classrooms and hospitals.

ABX has also teamed with Georgia Southern's Student Athletic Advisory Board, bringing Eagles and Lady Eagles closer together while ensuring team members a voice in administrative decisions.
