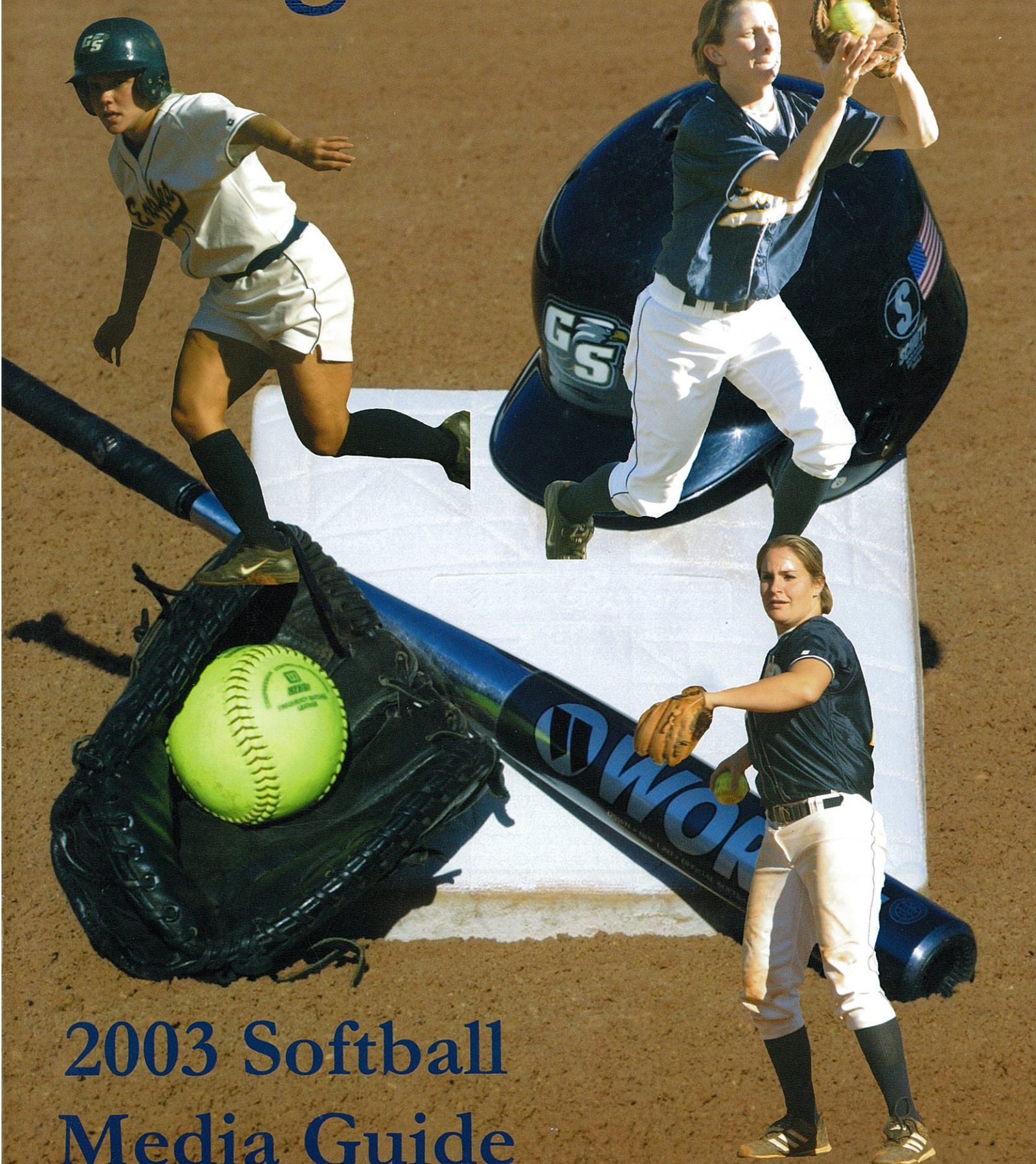

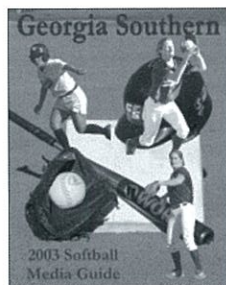

Gorgia Southern University is the largest and leading center of higher education in the southern half of Georgia. As a comprehensive, residential university, Georgia Southern's mission is strongly centered on the successful education of students.

Located in Statesboro, a neighborly Main Street community of approximately 30,000 residents 50 miles northwest of Savannah and 200 miles southeast of Atlanta, the University is highly involved with the vitality of its region and is increasingly renowned for its state, national and international contributions.

A mid-size university on a thriving, personable campus, Georgia Southern is one of the two most popular choices in the state for college-bound students, including HOPE scholars, to send their SAT scores. Georgia Southern is foremost a teaching university that focuses first on students and what they value: a well-rounded college experience, a faculty where professors teach and a total campus environment that encourages learning and growing. As a public university, Georgia Southern also opens an array of enriching cultural and educational opportunities to people of all ages, and reaches out to benefit the region and state through useful research and service.

Georgia Southern serves it mostly rural and coastal region through outreach and research in economic development, education, cultural opportunities, rural health and environmental interests. The University extends educational opportunities throughout the region at graduate centers in Savannah, Augusta, Brunswick, Hinesville, Dublin and at numerous remote sites statewide via distance learning.

Since its founding in 1906, the campus has been on the rise...from its beginnings as a district agricultural school, to a teachers' college, to a senior college, and in 1990 to university status that made it the first state university south of Atlanta. It has a history that has built a tradition of spirit, pride and achievement.

Georgia Southern's student body of more than 14,100 represents students from almost every U.S. state and a range of nations, bringing a broad spectrum of backgrounds, interests and talents to the University community. The campus has more than doubled enrollment since 1985, earning citation as the fastest growing univer-

sity in America from 1987-92.

The University offers approximately 130 degree programs at the baccalaureate, masters and doctoral levels through six colleges: Business Administration, Education, Health and Professional Sciences, Science and Technology, Liberal Arts and Social Sciences, and Graduate Studies.

Georgia Southern is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and has earned special accreditation from professional and academic associations that set standards in their fields.

As a center of learning, the University's community of gifted scholars and talented artists bring alive educational and cultural experiences that enrich life for all people. Highlights include museum and gallery exhibits, concerts, art festivals, visiting performers and speakers, the Center for Wildlife Education and Lamar Q Ball, Jr. Raptor Center, a botanical garden, and non-credit classes for personal enrichment

and professional development.

The Georgia Southern Eagles compete nationally in intercollegiate sports on the Division I level, with national television appearances in football, basketball, baseball, and golf. The Eagles made history by winning six NCAA I-AA National Football Championships in 1985, 1986, 1989, 1990, 1999, and 2000, a record unequaled in the Division.

The 634-acre campus features gently rolling lawns, scenic



lakes and soaring pines. A master plan is guiding the University in developing the campus, with more \$187.7 million worth of construction undertaken since 1990. Major projects now in design stages or under construction include a \$33 million facility for the new School of Information Technology, a massive addition to the Nessmith-Lane Center for Continuing Education, featuring an 800-seat performing arts auditorium; and a new Science and Nursing building. Recently completed are a new College of Education building, Recreation Activity Center, a ceramics and sculpture studio, and a residence hall quadrangle. Upcoming projects include a \$26 million multi-use academic building, a \$14 million addition to the Henderson Library, and a \$9 million fine arts complex for art and communication arts.



STUDENT LIFE

Georgia Southern is a residential campus where students live and learn on a campus of more than 85 buildings and 600 acres with lakes, lawns, and trees. The shady lawn encircled by three classic buildings anchor "old campus," where classes began in 1906. The pedestrian, a brick walking boulevard, connects every major building on campus.

Twelve residence halls offer a choice of suites, apartments, and traditional rooms. Theme living environments are available for first-year of upper-class students, honor students, multicultural students or those with specific academic majors or interests. The hub of the campus is Henderson Library, a 500,000-volume repository. Open 24 hours most days - with more operating hours than any library in Georgia - Henderson is a quiet retreat for study and an extensive resource for research. The library also offers access to hundreds of online computers as well as online access to articles from thousands of academic journals. The student union and a variety of eateries on campus provide meeting places for students to relax and enjoy a sense of community.

Georgia Southern's midsize campus is just the right size for getting involved. Students participate in more than 150 student organizations, and take advantage of exciting events on campus. Among the options for extracurricular activities are more than 20 fraternities and sororities, clubs for student sin specific majors, religious groups, sports, special interest clubs, volunteer service organizations, and more. The 82,000-square foot Recreation Activity Center, one of the best in the nation, offers weight and fitness machines, indoor courts for volleyball, badminton, indoor floor hockey, and soccer, handball and racquetball courts as well as a four-lane walking/jogging track, an aerobics room, and climbing wall. Exercise classes are a regular part of the semester schedule and intramural sports activities range from bowling to volleyball.

CHARACTER

A comprehensive residential university of more than students, Georgia Southern's hallmark is superior undergraduate experience emphasizing academic distinction, excellent teaching and student success. Georgia Southern is, apart from the four research universities, the most comprehensive center of public higher education in the state. Georgia Southern approaches its Centennial in an era of new leadership with a vision to rank among the best universities of its class in the nation.

STUDENT PROFILE

One of the top two choices in Georgia for new freshmen, including HOPE Scholars, Georgia Southern enrolls an increasingly selective student body representing all of Georgia, 47 states, and 76 nations. Nearly nine out of 10 undergraduates are full-time students. The University is enhancing its academic profile through higher admission standards, an expanded scholarship Honors Program, and targeted recruiting of academically talented students.

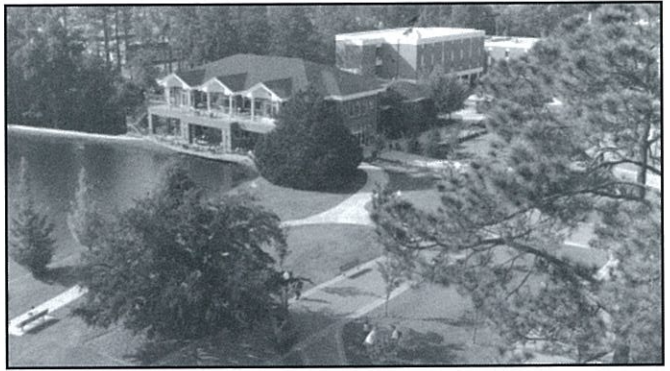
CAMPUS

The 634-acre park-like campus is completing a \$187.7-million building and beautification renaissance begun in 1990. With an eye to the evolving educational needs of the 21st Century, the University is launching an innovative School of Information Technology with a state-of-the-art \$33 million facility. A new \$24 million Science and Nursing Building is also under construction, designed to bring the latest in high-tech learning to SouthEast Georgia.

ATHLETIC SUCCESS

Over the last decade, Georgia Southern has gained recognition for its broad-based athletics program. The University's 15 Division I athletic teams compete in the Southern Conference and student-athletes have enjoyed as much success on the playing field as in the classroom. Across-the-board commitment to excellence has resulted in an unprecedented six football national championships and NCAA Tournament participation in men's and women's basketball, baseball, golf, and women's tennis.

With Georgia Southern alums playing professionally in the Canadian Football League, National Basketball Association, Major League Baseball, European Men's and Women's Basketball Leagues, the University boasts a storied tradition of success.





A foundation to build on ... The core curriculum, completed during students' first two years, provides background in essential skills, humanities and fine arts, science, mathematics and technology. The core curriculum may be customized to suit individual interests as course work connects and complements, providing a composition view of the world and a broad perspective from which to approach a major.

Proven professors ... Classes are taught by professors (most with Ph.D.s), not graduate students. Georgia Southern's professors share a world of scholarly and professional experience, putting teaching first. Professors help students prepare for careers by providing them with real-world insight and students have the opportunity to interact closely with professors, in classes with an average of 19 students. Corresponding lab classes may be offered in conjunction with large core curriculum classes, and faculty are always available to provide one-on-one assistance.

Real research ... Learn by doing. At Georgia Southern, students are encouraged to do more than memorize theories; they test them. They read about a topic in textbooks, learn about it in class, the experience it for real in state-of-the-art labs or through field research. Students may work on research teams with professors, or co-author papers for professional journals. They also present their work at conferences on campus and nationwide.

Experiences you don't expect ... The boundaries of learning extend beyond the campus. Go global with student abroad programs in a variety of fields. Travel groups may study anything from business, language and cultural traditions in Europe to the elections process in a developing country. Georgia Southern University Center at Universidad Veracruzana in Xalapa, Mexico offers students a new study abroad experience with the second largest university in Mexico.

Clubs of all kinds ... On a mid-size campus, just the right size for getting involved, students may choose to participate in any of more than 150 organizations. Among the options are 27 fraternities and sororities, clubs for students in specific majors, religious groups, sports clubs, volunteer service organizations, and more. Match interests and how extracurricular activities can enhance personal, academic and career potential.

Open opportunities... Getting involved and getting experience in a variety of campus activities and organizations, regardless of major or field. Theatre majors and non-theatre majors take the stage in Theatre South productions. Likewise, music majors and non-music majors march in Southern Pride while journalism majors and non-journalism majors write for the award-winning campus newspaper.

Admission Requirements

FRESHMAN

Apply at the end of your junior year of high school, if possible. Acceptance is based on: a high school diploma or the equivalent, a satisfactory grade point average and a satisfactory SAT or ACT score.

If you finished high school in or after spring 1988, you must have completed the following college preparatory curriculum requirements for regular admission to any Georgia public university.

- *English (4 units)*
- *Science (3 units): physical science and at least two lab courses in biology, chemistry, or physics*
- *Math (3 units): two algebra, one geometry*
- *Social Science (3 units)*
- *Foreign Language (2 units): same language*

TRANSFER STUDENTS

You may be admitted if you provide evidence of good standings at previous colleges attended and meet all Georgia Southern admission requirements. After you have been accepted and before you enroll, we'll send you an evaluation of your transfer credit. Please call or e-mail the Office of Admissions to request a transfer packet.

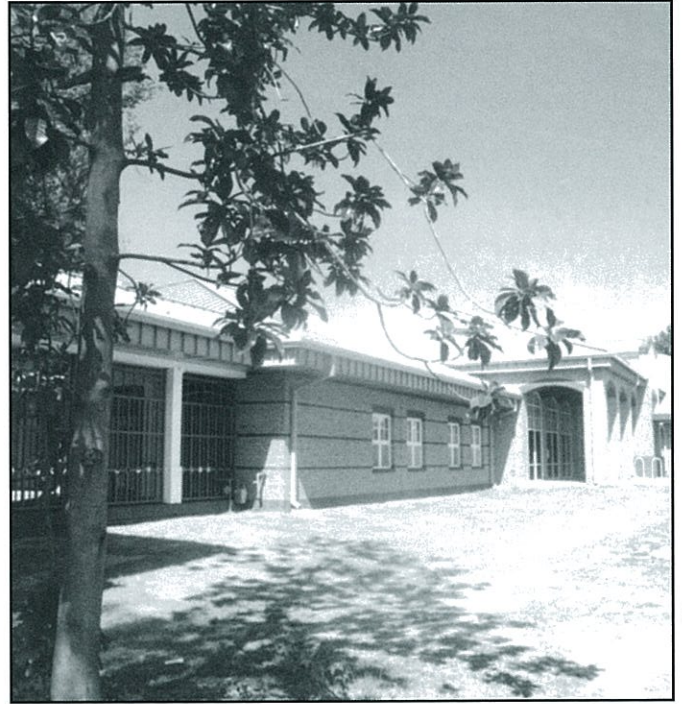

Academic Support


Georgia Southern student-athletes' comprehensive academic support program utilizes the university's vast resources, including the Henderson Library, the Tutorial Center and the Learning Resource Center as well as the newly-constructed Academic Enrichment Center in Southern Courtyard.

The Student-Athlete Services Department is housed in the Joseph P. Kennedy Residential Center and is headed by Keith Roughton, Director of Student-Athlete Services. Roughton oversees a three-person staff that includes Assistant Director of Student-Athlete Services Steven Benton and Mindy Swain, tutor coordinator.

Southern Courtyard itself houses the majority of GS's student-athletes, the academic enhancement center and the student-athlete services offices.



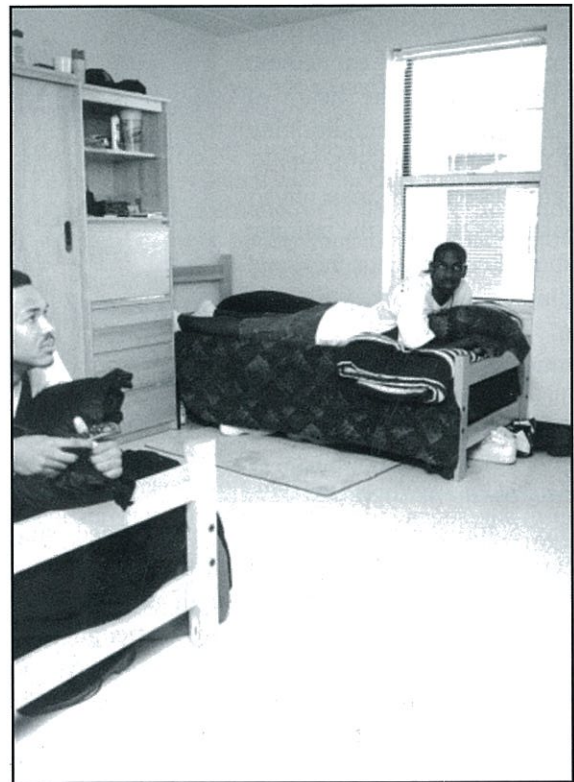

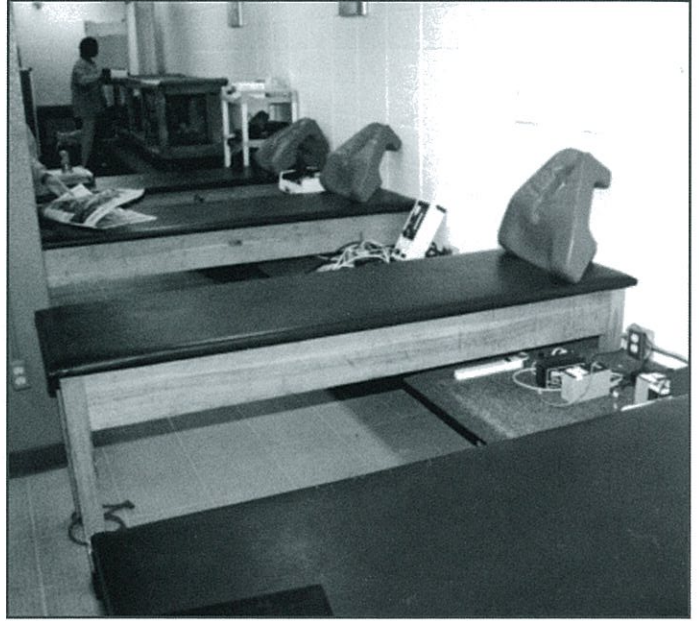

The enhancement center has two fully-equipped computer labs, including 42 computers, five tutor rooms and a seminar room. All athletic study halls and tutoring is handled in the new building which is open Sunday through Friday.

Eagle players use the Georgia Southern Tutorial Center to receive one-on-one tutoring on a daily basis. Tutors are professionally-trained faculty members and graduate students and tutoring is available for any subject.

Iron Works

Georgia Southern Strength Training

Hidden behind the spotlight of Georgia Southern's athletic success may be the most important component of why there is a spotlight to begin with.

Away from the playing fields, the cameras, and the excitement exists Iron Works, the heart of GSU's strength and conditioning for all 15 intercollegiate teams. There, athletes enhance their physical capabilities through the training leadership of certified coaches, and the ending results show in the win column.

Iron Works was completed as a Southern Boosters project at an estimated cost of \$250,000 and was officially opened for business during the spring of 1989.

The 5,400-square-foot facility has helped student-athletes reach their athletic potential through many hours of hard work. Graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach Michael Bewley provides a direct strength training leadership role to the Eagle softball squad.

Three years ago, Iron Works' eternal features took on a new look with \$30,000 of new equipment installed. Included in that were nine power racks, 14 multiple benches and hammer strength equipment, two iso lateral rows, leg extension/curl machines, and two back machines. The weight room is also equipped with dead-lift platforms and stationary bicycles.

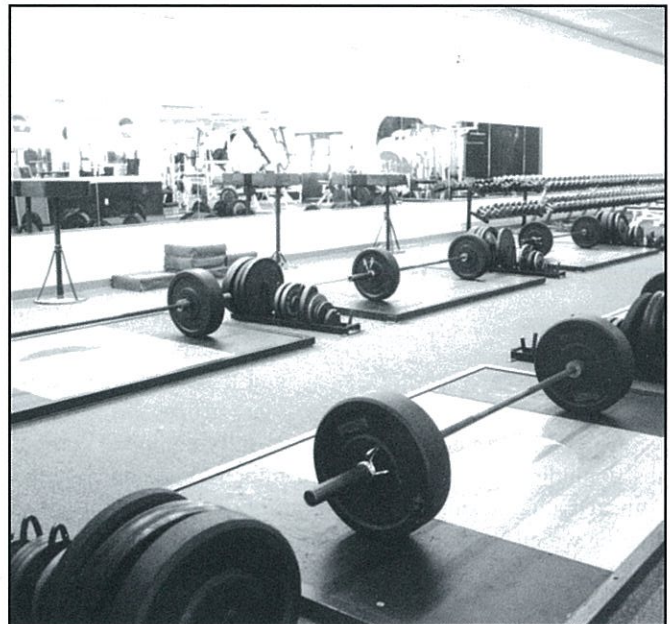

Sports Medicine

Georgia Southern Athletic Training

Administration



Dr. Bruce F. Grube assumed office at Georgia Southern University on July 1, 1999, as the 11th president to serve the institution since its founding in 1906.

President Grube inaugurated his administration with a vision to take Georgia Southern's past decade of extraordinary expansion in size, scope and stature to a standard of excellence that compares

with the best comprehensive universities in the nation.

The President brings to this mission more than two decades of leadership at major universities in California, Colorado and Minnesota and strong credentials in strategic planning, enrollment management, academic administration, technology, advancement and legislative relations.

Dr. Grube accepted the presidency of Georgia Southern after four years as president of St. Cloud State University, the largest university in the Minnesota State Colleges and University System and the second largest campus in the state. From 1992-95 he was provost at the University of Southern Colorado in Pueblo with responsibility for academic programs, operations, fund raising, student affairs and the public broadcasting station.

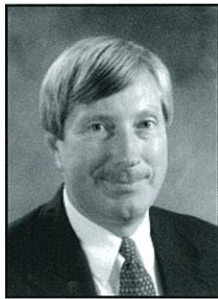
He began his administrative career in 1983 at California State Polytechnic University in Pomona, serving as associate vice president of administration and later associate vice president of planning, then rising to provost and academic vice president in 1987. His oversight of all academic and faculty programs included the Kellogg-West Center.

At Cal-Poly, Dr. Grube was also responsible for the Legislator-in-Residence Program, which brought senators and assembly officials to the campus for academic/political exchanges. He also served on the Advisory Board of the Institute for Teaching and Learning for the California State University System.

He holds a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of California-Berkeley and the Ph.D. from the University of Texas-Austin. His teaching and research interests cover the spectrum of his discipline, from American institutions and processes to the critical application of psychoanalytical theory in the study of politics. He is a frequent speaker at national conferences and has published in journals such as *The American Political Science Review*.

Dr. Grube is a member of the honor societies of Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Alpha Theta, Phi Beta Delta and Golden Key.

President Grube and his wife Kathryn Grube have been active in civic affairs and community life wherever they have served.



Beginning his seventh full year since his appointment as Georgia Southern's director of intercollegiate athletics this fall, Sam Baker has enthusiastically and meticulously guided the department's planning and rebuilding efforts in a positive direction since his arrival in November, 1995.

Under Baker's leadership, the Eagle and Lady Eagle programs have enjoyed much prosperity and success on and off the playing fields. Georgia Southern's football program

has certainly returned to national prominence with five straight NCAA I-AA playoff appearances and a pair of national titles in 1999 and 2000. In addition, Baker's recent coaching hires have resulted in Southern Conference championships and/or NCAA Tournament qualifications for volleyball (Kerry Messersmith), men's basketball (Jeff Price), women's basketball (Rusty Cram), baseball (Rodney Hennon) and golf (Larry Mays). In the classroom, Georgia Southern student-athletes have excelled to new heights as well as Eagle and Lady Eagle players have recorded program-high grade point averages since Baker began overseeing the department's student-athlete services division.

Baker has also spearheaded numerous facility improvements since his arrival, including the renovation of team lockerrooms, sports medicine treatment center and coaches offices at Hanner Fieldhouse. He has also served as the driving force behind a pair of recent construction projects with the completion of the Cowart Building (Southern Boosters/GSU Ticket Office) and the Parrish Building (football office complex).

Baker, a native of Front Royal, Va., joined the GSU management team after five years as director of the College Football Marketing Corporation, a subsidiary of the College Football Association (CFA).

Baker's responsibilities with the CFA included securing title sponsorship for and administration of its "Promise of Tomorrow" scholarship program. A four-year agreement with Hitachi provided the awarding of \$1.3 million in scholarships to aid individuals involved in intercollegiate football with the means to pursue careers in the field of education.

From 1986-90, he was associate athletic director for financial development at Vanderbilt. During this period, the National Commodore Club annually raised \$2.3 million in cash and gift-in-kind contributions from 5,200 members.

In the two years before moving to Nashville, Baker was associate athletic director for external affairs at Oregon, the institution he served as director of athletic marketing from January, 1983 to May, 1984.

Baker, 50, entered the field of intercollegiate athletics at the College of William & Mary, where he spent seven years (1976-82), as the Tribe's director of athletic promotions.

Baker, who's active involvement in the Southern Conference includes current tenure as chair of the league's football committee and athletic director's association, holds a 1976 master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University and a 1974 B.A. in communication arts from James Madison University.

He and wife Ann are the parents of three children: Zeb (23 years and a graduate student at Alabama), Elizabeth Ann (21 and a senior at South Carolina) and Josie (14).



The Southern Conference



Few conferences in America can claim the tradition and heritage of the Southern Conference. With the dawn of the new millennium, the Southern Conference continues to thrive as one of the most historic and progressive Division I intercollegiate athletics conferences in the country. Now entering its 80th year of operation, the Southern Conference continues to emphasize the importance of the student-athlete and the league's role in helping to build lifelong leaders.

The Southern Conference has excelled as the premiere Division I-AA football conference since earning that classification in 1981. It currently consists of 12 members in five states throughout the Southeast and sponsors 19 varsity sports and championships that produce participants for NCAA Championships.

The Southern Conference is the nation's fourth oldest collegiate athletic association. Only the Big Ten (1896), the Missouri Valley (1907), and the Pac-10 (1915) conferences are older in terms of origination.

Throughout its history, the Southern Conference has been an innovator in college athletics. The Southern Conference was the first "super conference" with its charter membership including the likes of Alabama, Auburn, and North Carolina. The SoCon, as it has come to be known by headline writers throughout the country, is the league that gave birth to the three-point shot in college basketball and was the college home of such sporting greats as Arnold Palmer, Jerry West and Charlie Choo Choo Justice.

Academic excellence has been a major part of the Southern Conference's tradition. League athletes have been recognized countless times on GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America and district teams. Eighteen Rhodes-Scholar winners have come out of the conference. Each year, the league distributes at least five graduate scholarships. Last season, more than 20 percent of all athletes participating in the Southern Conference carried grade point averages of 3.0 or better.

The Southern Conference office is located in Asheville, N.C., honored as an All-America City in 1997. Five league institutions are within an hour and one half drive with two others within two and a half hours, putting seven of the 12 Southern Conference schools in close proximity of each other.

MEMBERSHIP HISTORY

The Southern Conference was formed on Feb.

25, 1921 at a meeting in Atlanta, Ga. Fourteen institutions from the 30-member Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association (SIAA) reorganized as the Southern Conference. Those charter members included Alabama, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi State, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee.

In 1922, six more schools Florida, Louisiana State, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tulane and Vanderbilt joined the fold. A year later, the University of the South joined the ranks. Virginia Military Institute joined a member in 1925 and Duke University came into the fold in 1929.

Since then, conference membership has experienced a series of membership changes with 41 institutions being affiliated with the league. The league has undergone two major transitions during its history.

The first occurred in December 1932 when the Southeastern Conference was formed out of the 23-school Southern Conference. The league's 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized to help reduce the extensive travel demands that were present in the league at the time. In 1936, the Southern Conference invited The Citadel, William & Mary, Davidson, Furman, Richmond and Wake Forest to join the membership.

The second major shift happened in 1953 when Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest officially withdrew from the league to form the Atlantic Coast Conference. This change was brought about due to the desire of many of those schools to schedule a greater number of regular season basketball games against their local rivals.

Today, the league continues to thrive with a membership that spans five Southeastern states. Current league members are Appalachian State, College of Charleston, The Citadel, Davidson, East Tennessee State, Furman, Georgia Southern, UNC Greensboro, Chattanooga, Virginia Military Institute, Western Carolina and Wofford. In December 1995, three additions were approved: College of Charleston, UNC Greensboro and Wofford. UNC Greensboro and Wofford began competing in the league in 1997-98 and College of Charleston entered the league during the 1998-99 season. UNC Wilmington is an associate member in the sport of softball.

2003 Outlook

The Georgia Southern softball team enjoys having seven returners to the 2003 squad, five of which were starters in 2002. Head coach Natalie Poole enters her second season at GSU after a successful first year. Poole led the 2002 squad to several record setting accomplishments including posting 15 Southern Conference wins and the most wins of any first year coach in the program's history.

PITCHERS

Three Eagles will anchor the pitching for GSU. Returning to the 2003 squad is sophomore Tiffany Urena. In 2002 Urena struck out a career-high eight in the second game of the series against Furman (4/20-21) as she picked up two wins. The right-hander finished with a 5-6 record in 63 innings as a freshman. "Tiffany has good arm speed and her pitches are looking better," said Poole. "Her mental strength and confidence is going to help her on the mound this year."

After an ACL injury, sophomore Janice Savage brings Southern Conference experience to the mound. Savage was named to the All-Southern Conference second team in 2001 for her efforts as she marked a 1.83 ERA and an 8-11 record. The Dover, Del. native pitched well in the fall and is developing to where she needs to be for the spring season. "I have not had the opportunity to see Janice pitch much in a game situation," stated Poole, "however, she spent quite a bit of time last year listening to the way I call pitches and helping with charts so she understands what is expected of her."

Newcomer A.J. Street joins Urena and Savage on the pitching staff. Street led Parkview High School to the Region 8-5A champions as well as 74 wins during her high school career. "A.J. is maturing well as a freshman and is very strong at the plate," said Poole. The right-hander will see some playing time in the circle and at third base.

CATCHERS

Another young position for GSU is at catcher. Behind the plate for the Eagles will be freshmen Sam Steiner and Katie Roberts. Steiner, a native of Loxley, Ala. hit .402 with 33 RBI during her final season at Robertsdale High School. "Sam is a strong athlete with a good arm and is smart behind the plate," said Poole,

"she works well with the pitchers and has a lot of power hitting the ball."

Roberts hit .409 during her final season behind the plate for the Warhawks, throwing out 17 of 20 would-be thieves. "Katie has good potential behind the plate and a good arm," stated Poole. "She understands the game and that will help us on the field."

INFIELD

Junior Kim Griffin will anchor the infield. Griffin finished the season third on the team with a .305 hitting percentage. "Kim is capable of playing every infield position," said Poole. "I feel that she will settle into the shortstop position, she has great range and is very athletic." The Tifton, Ga. native, led GSU with 24 runs scored, 30 RBI and a .391 on base percentage.

Getting work in at third base and at short will be freshmanCarolynn Chin. A graduate of Dixie Hollins High School, Chin was a two-time all-conference player and help lead the Rebels to the Cebolla and McClintock Tournament Champions.

At first base will be returner Christi Aitken. A junior from Summerville, S.C., Aitken was named to the 2002 Southern Conference All-Tournament Team hitting 2-for-2 with a double against Chattanooga. Additionally, Aitken hit .300 over the last ten games of the season. "Christie was hitting the ball well at the end of the last year and started off the fall hitting really well," stated Poole. "Offensively she has come a long way and has gained a lot of confi-

dence at the plate.” Also seeing some time at first is Street.

Freshmen Lindsey Jones and Shanita Black will vie for playing time at second. Jones, a graduate of Tate High School hit .411 during her final season. As a junior, Jones hit .329 while leading the Aggies to a 31-2 record and the district and regional championships. “Lindsey plays the position maturely and works well with Kim at short,” said Poole. “She did some great things at the plate in the fall.”

Black was named to the all-region and all-conference team for her efforts at Seventy-First High School. “She has great speed and good range,” said Poole. “Shanita is a huge threat at the plate because she can slap, drag and hit.”

Freshmen Chin, Street and Katie Roberts will rotate at third base for the Eagles. “Third base will be a young position for us,” stated Pool. “With three freshman fighting for the position everyone will see playing time and we will just have to see who steps up.”

OUTFIELD

Senior Julie Peel will step in and lead the outfield as she has started in every game in center for the Eagles. In 2001 she was named to the All-Southern Conference team while leading the team with 13 multiple-hit games. “I expect her to lead in the outfield and cover a lot of ground,” said Poole. “Last year was a growing time with her switching back to the right side of the plate and this fall her swing has come out more aggressive. The ball is jumping off the bat and with her speed she really does some damage.”

Junior Meghan Correia returns to the lineup in left. “Meghan did a great job in the fall and her arm strength has definitely improved,” said Poole. “Meghan played in left for us last season and has worked in all outfield positions but will be predominately in left.

Sophomore Karen Smillie returns after walking on last season and earning a spot in right. “Karen has worked all outfield positions but will concentrate on left and right,” said Poole.

Newcomers Erica Weaver and Black will be filling the outfield roles. Weaver hit .360 her senior season at East Lake High School and was named the team’s Most Valuable Player. “Erica is getting stronger at the plate and has worked all outfield positions but will concentrate on left and right,” stated Poole.

As well as seeing some time at second, Black

will spend some time in right. “With Shanita’s speed she is able to cover a lot of ground in the outfield,” said Poole.

“This is my first recruiting class and I am excited about the speed and strength of the kids,” said Poole. “The team is meshing well and as the freshman mature and grow in this program they will see that they are going to make a difference on our team.”

SCHEDULE

Georgia Southern opens the 2003 season with fourth ranked Florida State, February 1. The Seminoles fell to Arizona (2-6) in the semi-finals of the NCAA Tournament last season and finished with a 55-20 overall record.

The Eagles will host the GSU Invitational before traveling to Utah for the University of Utah Tournament which features Brigham-Young, Utah State, Southern Utah and Utah. The team will then return home to host the Eagle Classic.

“Our non-conference schedule is competitive as always,” said Poole. “We don’t want to back down. FSU will be a good game for us as well as Georgia, who we haven’t played in a while. I feel like we will be playing some competitive softball against some very competitive teams. The Southern Conference continues to get better every year. Chattanooga and Furman always bring a strong team to the league. The league is continuing to hire better coaches that are going to bring better athletes.”

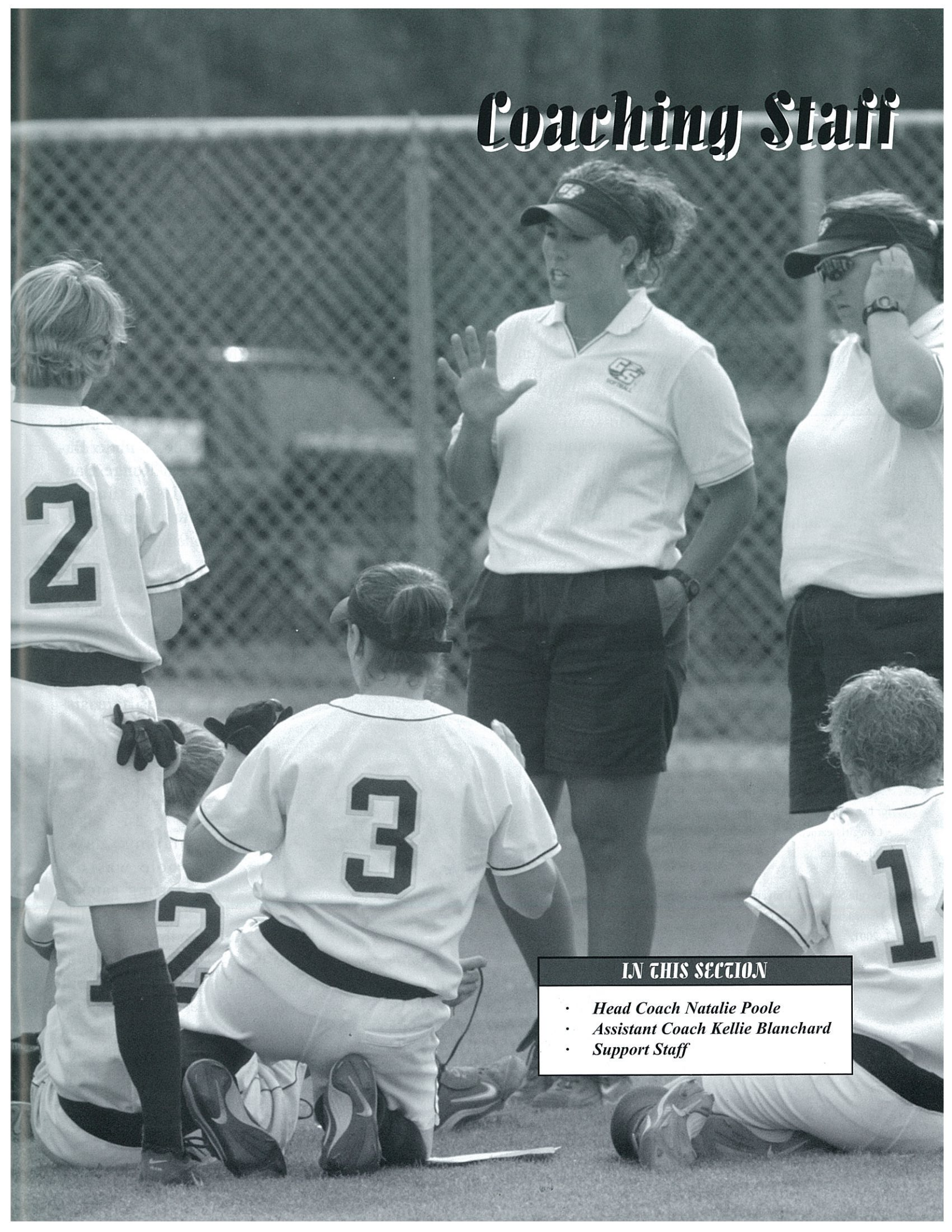

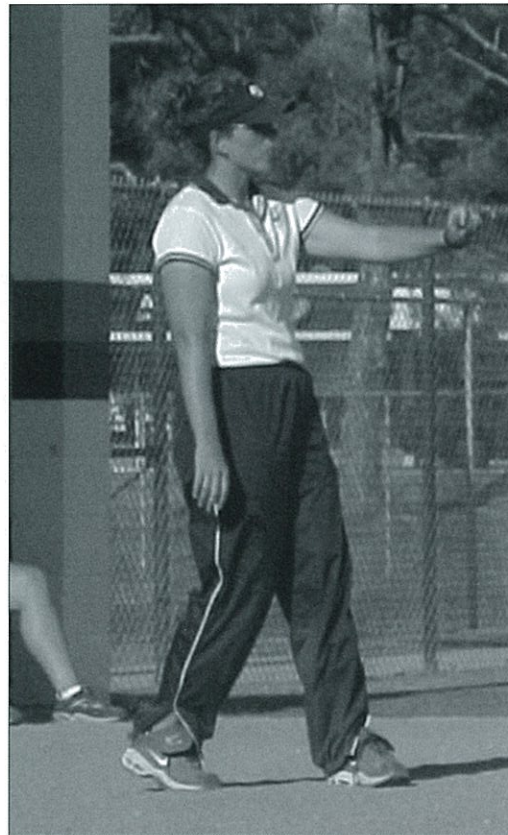

First-year head coach Natalie Poole has led her first Georgia Southern team to several record setting accomplishments. The Eagles posted 15 Southern Conference wins this season, surpassing the previous mark of 12. Poole, who hit seven home runs and slugged almost .400 in her playing career at McNeese State, saw her Eagles hit 26 home runs as a team, breaking the school record. Poole has also registered the most wins of any first-year coach in the program's history. Along with posting a .474 winning



percentage in 2002, the Eagles set the GSU single-season record for home runs as well as 10 career records.

Poole became the third head coach in Georgia Southern fastpitch history when she was named to the position on June 7, 2001, ending a three-year stint as an assistant coach at McNeese State (La.) University. Poole

also starred for the Cowgirls softball team from 1994-97.

Poole joined the McNeese softball staff as a graduate assistant in 1998 and moved into the assistant coach's role the very next year. Prior to her time at

McNeese State, Poole assisted the 18-under Baton Rouge Bandits summer team from 1995-96. She then spent a year as the head coach for the 18-under Lake Charles Gamblers and, in 1998, assumed duties as assistant softball coach at Barbe (La.) High School.

In her playing days, Poole was the starting catcher for the Cowgirls

all four years. She was a three-time All-Southland Conference member (1995-97), a two-time All-South Region honoree (1996-97) and earned All-Louisiana honors in 1996. As a freshman, she helped the Cowgirls to a Southland Conference title as well as the school's first-ever South Region appearance. In 1997 she recorded the team's highest batting



average of .331 while registering five home runs and 10 doubles. Her successful senior campaign led to her naming as McNeese State's Most Valuable Player. Poole closed out her career with a .298 batting average.

Accomplishing as much in the classroom as on the field, Poole was a three-time District VI GTE CoSIDA Academic All-America selection (1995-97) and was a 1997 National Academic All-America choice. She was named a Southland Conference Scholar Athlete all four years at MSU, and in 1997, was recognized as the Southland Conference's Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Poole earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from McNeese State in 1998, graduating with a 3.5 grade point average. In July of 2000, she earned her Masters of Education in Instructional Technology from McNeese with a 4.0 GPA.

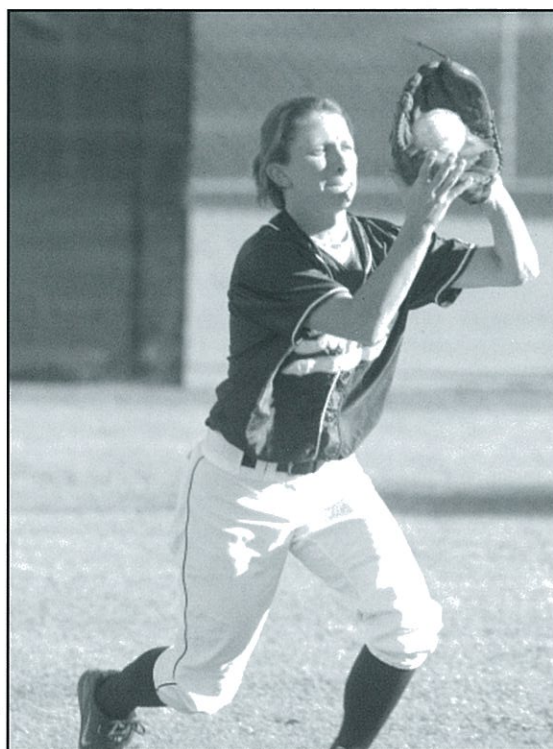
2002 In Review

Georgia Southern got off to a slow start early in the 2002 campaign, but turned its season around during Southern Conference play to finish second in the league after having a chance to play for the regular-season title on the last weekend.

The Eagles began the season 5-18, including losses to national semi-finalist Florida State and Stanford, ranked number two at the time.

GSU's fortunes began to change as the Eagles began SoCon play with a three-game sweep of UNC Wilmington. The Eagles took two of three from College of Charleston and UNC Greensboro before two straight sweeps of East Tennessee State and Appalachian State. GSU won two at Furman, setting up a final weekend showdown with Chattanooga.

GSU collected several post-season awards and new school records throughout the season. Senior Stacie Cooper and Aimee Littlejohn completed their careers by establishing several new career marks. Cooper left GSU as the leader in career games played, at-bats, hits and runs scored. Cooper became the first Eagle to break the 200-

and the 100-run plateau, as well as becoming only the fifth person in school history with a career average of .300 or better. Littlejohn set every major pitching career mark, including innings pitched, victories and strikeouts. Littlejohn also shattered her record for strikeouts in a game, fanning 17 against Campbell in February.

Freshman Crystal Crews enjoyed a great first season, earning Louisville Slugger All-Southeast Region honors, as well as being named Southern Conference Freshman-of-the-Year and earning first (designated player) and second team (pitcher) all-conference honors. Cooper, Littlejohn and Kelly Blazi also were tabbed second team All-SoCon.

First-year head coach Natalie Poole also took away some hardware after being named Co-Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year. Poole established new marks for Southern Conference wins in a season (15) and fashioned the most wins by any rookie coach in program history.

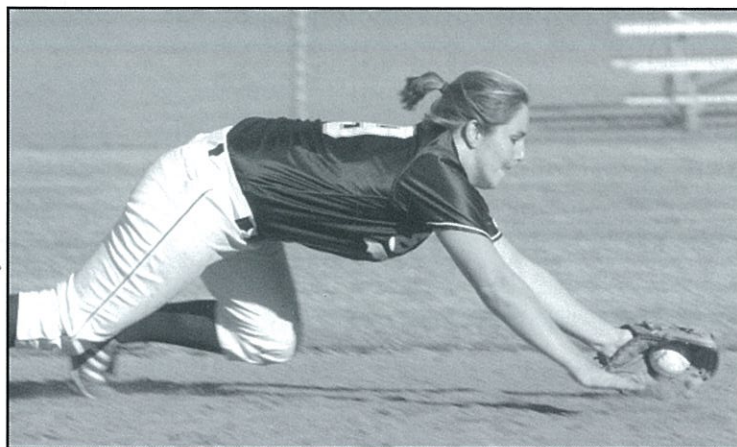

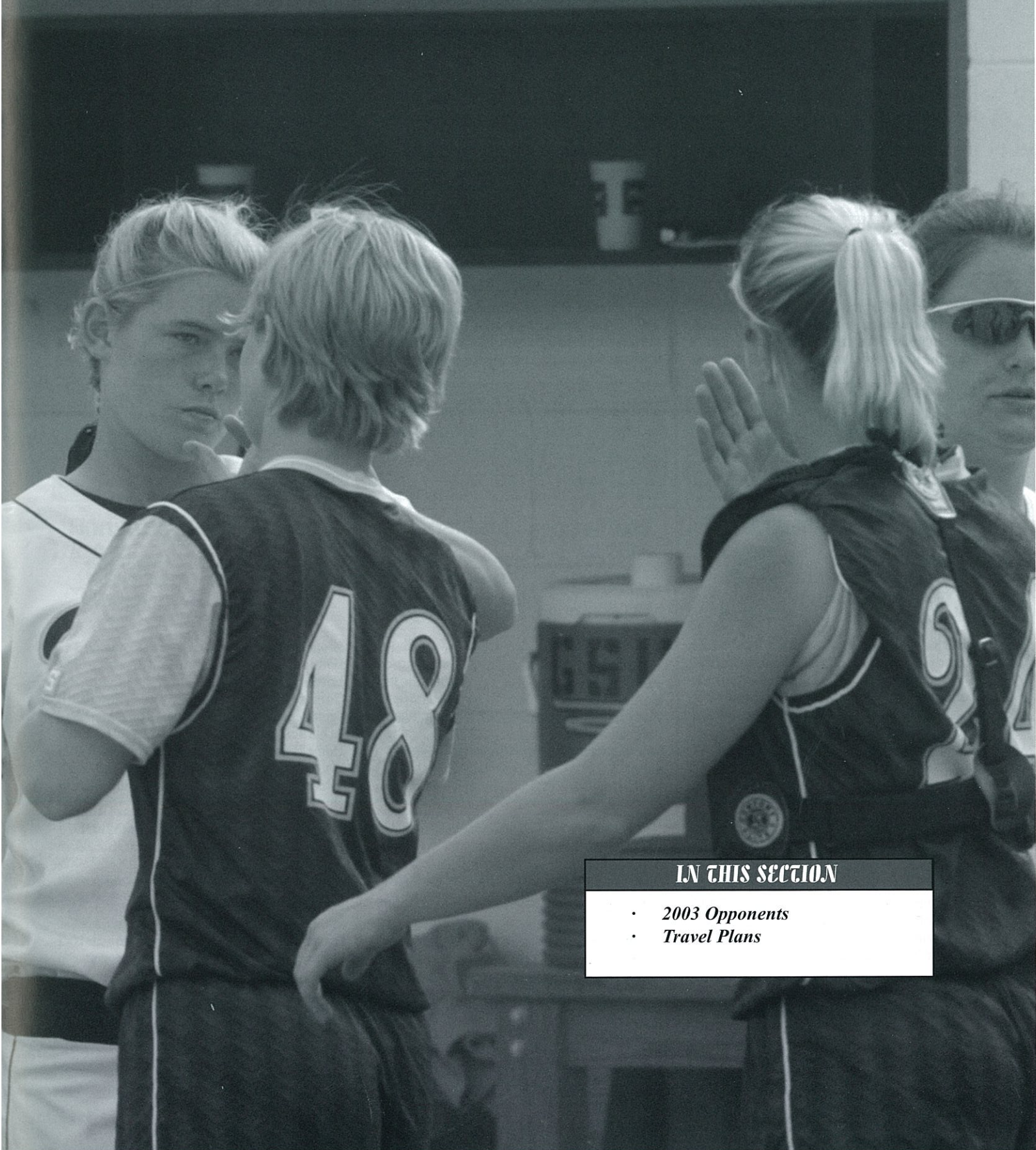
