Washington Grays Year Composed: 1861, Duration: 4:20 Claudio S. Grafulla, ed. Reeves/Fry

Washington Grays (1861) was composed for the Eighth Regiment, New York State Militia. This work has been called a march masterpiece, a band classic, and the prototype of the concert march. Showing the stylistic influence of both German and Italian marches, the march has a marvelous balance of technique and melody in a continuous flow of musical ideas. It dared to break the old formulas, however, because it has no introduction, no break strain, and no stinger. The popularity of *Washington Grays* is due in considerable part to its early arranger, Canadian Louis-Philippe Laurendeau (1861-1916), otherwise known by his pseudonym, G. H. Reeves.

Washington Grays is considered **Grafulla's** most popular piece. The "grays" in the title refers to the color of the regimental uniforms of the Eighth Regiment, New York State Militia.

The band books of the American Civil War (including the Port Royal Band Books arranged by **Grafulla**) included many charts of the prolific composer's music, including this composition. There are elements of the Italian and German marches in this march. The running sixteenth notes and responding bass voices create a wonderful counterpoint. Frederick Fennell wrote of this march, "masterfully simple, effectively contrasting, its incessant flow of musical ideas is overwhelmingly convincing. It is a march of great passion. A real indoor rouser from 1861."

O Magnum Mysterium Year Composed: 1994-2003, Duration: 6:00 Morten Lauridsen, trans. H. Robert Reynolds

Morten Lauridsen's choral setting of *O Magnum Mysterium* (O Great Mystery) has become one of the world's most performed and recorded compositions since its 1994 premiere by the Los Angeles Master Chorale conducted by Paul Salamunovich. The work was commissioned by Marshall Rutter in honor of his wife Terry Knowles.

About his setting, **Morten Lauridsen** writes: "For centuries, composers have been inspired by the beautiful *O Magnum Mysterium* text with its depiction of the birth of the newborn king amongst lowly animals and shepherds. This affirmation of God's grace to the meek and the adoration of the Blessed Virgin are celebrated in my setting through a quiet song of profound inner joy."

Recordings of Lauridsen's music have received numerous GRAMMY nominations, and the composer was a 2007 recipient of the National Medal of Arts. H. Robert Reynolds arranged the symphonic wind version of this popular work with the approval and appreciation of the composer.

Folk Song Suite Year Composed: 1924, Duration: 11:30 Ralph Vaughan Williams

The English Folk Song Suite was written in 1923 and includes three movements. The first is a march entitled Seventeen Come Sunday and begins with the folksong of the movement's name with the melody in the woodwinds. It is followed by the folksong Pretty Caroline which features a solo clarinet and cornet, and the last melody in the first movement is Dives and Lazarus which features the lower instruments with the upper woodwinds playing against them.

The second movement is *Intermezzo: My Bonnie Boy* which opens with an oboe solo to the tune of *My Bonnie Boy* and is interrupted by the tune *Green Bushes* which is more upbeat and dance-like than the slow, emotional opening. The movement ends with a fragment of the original melody. The third movement is a march called *Folk Songs from Somerset* which opens with a light introduction of four measures before the first melody, the folk song *Blow Away the Morning Dew*, played by a solo cornet. The second melody, *High Germany*, is played by the lower instruments and transitions into *The Tree So High* and *John Barleycorn* before repeating back to the beginning of the movement.

Historically, the piece is considered to be a cornerstone work in the literature, and one of the earliest "serious" works for wind band.

Biographies

F. Mack Wood is the Associate Director of Bands at Illinois State University, where he conducts the Symphonic Winds, University Band, and directs the Big Red Marching Machine. Prior to his appointment at Illinois State University, he was a doctoral graduate associate at the University of Miami, Frost School of Music and holds a master's degree in Instrumental Conducting from Louisiana State University and a bachelor's degree in Music and Human Learning from The University of Texas at Austin. After completing his undergraduate studies, Dr. Wood was a high school band director in the Dallas/Fort Worth area of Texas.

F. Mack Wood was the Director of Bands at North Forney High School just east of Dallas, TX. He opened North Forney High School and created the band program in 2009 where he oversaw all operations of the high school bands and middle school feeder program. While at North Forney High School, Mack's ensembles received numerous awards and accolades, but most importantly, many of his students continued on to participate in music beyond high school. Prior to his appointment at North Forney High School, Dr. Wood was the assistant director for three years at Forney High School and one year at Irving Nimitz High School.

An active adjudicator, clinician, music arranger, and drill designer, Mack truly loves all aspects of the wind band world. In his spare time, Mack enjoys cooking and bar-b-que (they are very different according to him), playing golf, and spending time with his wife Rachel and daughter Imogen.

Lauren Bobarsky is a percussionist and second-year graduate student at Illinois State University currently pursuing a Master of Music Degree in Wind Conducting with Dr. Anthony Marinello. She is a Band Graduate Assistant where her duties include assisting the Big Red Marching Machine and undergraduate conducting courses. In addition, she guest conducts the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, Symphonic Band, and University Band.

Prior to attending graduate school at Illinois State University, Lauren was the Director of Bands at Pana CUSD #8 in Pana, Illinois where she taught marching band, concert band, and pep band. Lauren and the Pana bands traveled and performed at competitions and festivals throughout central Illinois. Under her direction, they placed second in the Illinois State Fair Parade and were invited to perform in the Disney World Parade in Orlando, FL. Within her time, she was able to boost the ensemble enrollment and promoted alumni engagement.

Lauren graduated from Illinois State University in 2018 with a Bachelor of Music Education. She holds memberships with the National Band Association, National Association for Music Education, and Percussive Arts Society.
