

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Langdon in the county of Sullivan in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, one Selectman for two years and one Selectman for three years.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may seem necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$300.00 for the repair of the Town Hall and Tool House and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges and appropriate the same.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State Aid Construction and make appropriation for same.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State Aid Maintenance and make appropriation for same.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Trunk Line Maintenance and make appropriation for same.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the installation of Metal Pipe Sluices for the Hill Roads.

Art. 9. To elect a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will raise \$70.00 for a Band on Memorial Day and make appropriation for same.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the continued joint Highway Appropriation System for the purpose of continuing the State Aid Construction to the Alstead Line.

Art. 13. To transact any other business that may come before Said meeting.

Art. 14. To allow accounts.

TOWN BUILDING REPAIRS



SCHOOL REPORT

DISTRICT OF

LANGDON, N. H.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

The School expenses for the present year have exceeded the appropriations for three reasons: (1) Increase in number of High School and elementary school pupils for which tuition must be paid, (2) the repairs of the Hill School, (3) unlooked for transportation. Both of these items will figure in the money returned in the State Aid for next year and so only impose a temporary burden upon the School District.

In the case of the Hill School, your Committee carefully considered whether the School House should be repaired or the pupils transported. Because of the difficulty of winter transportation and also the decrease in farm value that would result if the school were abandoned, it was finally decided to repair the school. But as is usual in such cases, the repair of the school exceeded the first estimates. The improvement in the building, however, is satisfactory and the Board invites your inspection.

The first consideration of the School Board should be the courses of study in the Schools. The fault of the present system as regards this town is that an attempt is made to teach too much. The Fundamental principles should be emphasized, especially in Arithmetic, Reading, Spelling, and American History. Such studies as English, Greek, and Roman History, which the State Board insists upon, are entirely out of place in the Langdon Schools. The applied interest of the parents is an essential requirement for the accomplishment of intense work on the basic principles. The children must be made to realize that their fathers have to pay the bills and that they should make the best of their time in the common schools.

The retiring Chairman earnestly recommends that the Town elect on the Board an educated, interested and coura-

geous citizen who can give a large part of his on her time to the school supervision.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools to the Langdon School Board

To the Members of the School Board of Langdon, N. H.

Gentlemen:

The progressive attitude of the school board has brought about a rural school building on Langdon Hill, which, with additions made in the equipment and heating and ventilation in accordance with your plans, will provide splendid accommodations and pleasing and sanitary school facilities for the children in that district for years to come.

During the winter of the present school year, it seemed wise to place highly trained teachers in the village school lower grades. The shortage of teachers of the quality demanded by the board members resulted in an arrangement with Keene normal School by which a series of teachers has been and will be provided for those grades who will therefore receive this year training in the elementary facts of education of a quality that Langdon could not afford. The only drawback is the changing of teachers, but since the method employed by all is identical, the difficulty is not as great as would be where untrained or partially trained teachers succeeded each other. The rating of the work done exceeds that in any previous year during present supervision and is wholly due to expert teaching methods. The superintendent recommends as follows:

1. The placing of a normal school graduate in the lower grade room under contract to serve one year. The extra cost in salary will be more than returned in accomplishment and community service.

2. The painting of one of the school buildings in the town, and the refinishing of the halls in the village school.

3. The placing of a bell on the village school building in order that tardiness may be reduced.

4. The appointment of a courageous truant officer to improve the conditions which are at present robbing the children of certain families of the benefits afforded by the town, educationally. The burden is not one that the chairman of the board should be asked to bear, as is at present the case.

5. Plans for the beautifying of the surroundings of the village school.

6. The installation of a chemical toilet for the lower grades, with plans for adding to the equipment another year.

7. The purchase of a few dollars' worth of playground apparatus, such as volley ball equipment.

The superintendent desires to express strongly his deep appreciation of the constant courtesy and cooperation shown him, and the pleasure derived from the appreciation of the improvement, expressed orally and in writing by various board members.
