

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 3—To see what sum of money the town will raise for State Aid Construction and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 4—To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Higl,ways and Bridges and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 5—To see what sum of money the Town will raise to repair the MacDermott Bridge and the Tool House.

Art. 6—To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Trunk Line Maintenance and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 7—To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State Aid Maintenance and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 8-To elect a Trustee for Trust Funds.

Art. 9—To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 10—To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on Taxes paid before a specified date. If so, how much?

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Fire Protection and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 12—To see if the Town will vote to borrow money to complete the State Aid Construction Road to the Prentiss Covered Bridge or any part of said road.

Art. 13—To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Street Lights.

Art. 14—To see if the Town will vote to give the Economics Club and Community Club the use of the Town Hall and accept any repairs they care to make to the interior of same.

Art. 15—To see if the Town will accept the sum of \$50.00 from Mrs. Nella R. Bates, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Sidney Wiley lot and stones in the Upper Cemetery.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to repair the Hearse House and make appropriation for the same.

Art. 17—To see if the Town will vote to borrow on long time note, not to exceed \$2500.00 for the purpose of publishing the Town History, this sum to be liquidated by the sale of the volumes, and to see if the Town will authorize the History Committee to make the necessary contracts for such publication.

Art. 18—To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 19—To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

Art. 20-To allow accounts.

SCHOOL REPORT DISTRICT OF LANGDON LANGDON, N. H.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE LANGDON SCHOOL BOARD:

I became your superintendent August first and had only a few days to look over the field before schools opened. I found that Superintendent Gilmore and the Board had everything ready except a few repairs at the Hill School for which plans were being made.

The most important parts of a school system are the pupils, next are the teachers, then those necessities, housing, heat, books, and scholars' supplies, and after these several important helps of which we should have as many as we can afford. We must, however, be careful not to neglect the foundation to build a too artistic exterior.

We are beginning a testing program that should help us determine the needs of our pupils. Many of the large systems make a study of the individual pupils through their history, family background, and a number of special tests. While I value tests, it is my opinion, that far more value than any elaborate card system are good common sense teachers who will visit the homes, stand ready to help with kindness the individual pupil, supervise the buildings and grounds, and encourage clean play among their children.

There was no change in teachers at the opening of school, but during the fall term, Miss Elinor Cameau was released to accept a better position, and Miss Minnie Bonnette, a graduate from Keene Normal School was hired to teach the Hill School. Your teachers are well prepared, and are using good teaching methods in the schoolroom; the children, for the most part, seem interested in their work and are making real progress. The attitude of a pupil shows a combination of the interest aroused by the work of the teacher, habits from past school work, home conditions, and the desires of the pupil. The teacher may be doing good work, the home helping all that it can, the habits, some good, some bad, but the desires of the pupil will still play an important part. If we could help the older pupils to decide what they want to do when they complete the eighth grade, I believe, it would help create in them a desire to succeed.

If the rooms were larger at the Center School it would be possible to transport the pupils from the Hill School next year. I estimate that there will be forty-nine pupils next year of whom

twenty-seven will be in the upper four grades.

I wish to thank the Langdon School Board for their help and kindness and the teachers for their co-operation.
