You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the Tenth day of March next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$2,640.00 from

Art. 3. To see what sum of money in addition to the sum appropriated under Article 2 of this Warrant, the Town will raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate, to be used together with and in addition to the Class V Maintenance Allotment, Duncan Money (\$980.91) so-called, for the Summer maintenance of highways and bridges.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Winter maintenance of highways and bridges.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to put a seal coat on the Hemlock and Crane Brook black-top roads.

Art. 7. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding a Fire House, and to make any appropriation necessary.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State to be used for opening back roads and trails.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$429.01 and apply for Class V Assistance, T.R.A. so-called. State to furnish \$2,860.06.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the Town Library.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the privilege of the use for one year of the Alstead Public Dump.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund now in the hands of the Trustees of the Trust Funds to replace the South Cemetery Fence.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of chairs for the Town Hall.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a Road Grader at a cost of not to exceed \$1,000.00.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to replace the McDermott Bridge.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds received for the perpetual care of cemetery lots.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

Art. 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF—1958

Fortunately the Fire Department has not had a very active year. Except for a few small chimney fires with little or no damage, no fires have occurred. On two occasions members of the department have covered in for Alstead.

The Articles 10 and 11 of last year's Town Warrant having to do with the construction of a Fire Station were voted down. This decision was rescinded. Then it was voted to raise \$500.00 and put it with the \$500.00 raised in 1957. The Chief was authorized to use this \$1,000.00 for the remodeling of the Highway Tool Shed for use as a Fire Station. Since this vote seemed to be highly controversial and vague in its intent, the Chief and the Selectmen advised against spending this money in 1958. It seemed wiser to wait until another Town Meeting could review the situation.

The Fire Chief has been active in promoting the interests of the Mutual Aid System working out of Keene. This has a direct bearing on Langdon's fire protection, since other departments are on call to assist us in case of trouble. There is no charge for this, but Langdon must be ready to cover in and assist at fires in other member towns. The men involved rightfully draw pay from Langdon for work out of town, but there is no charge to the town so assisted. The Keene Mutual Aid System is 100% equipped with two way radio on a 24 hour basis. This in itself is invaluable protection.

Another activity that has a powerful bearing on fire protection in the State is the newly formed Federation of Mutual Aid Systems. This, reinforced by the Fire Chief's Club and the State Fire Wardens Federation is able to bring powerful assistance to the Fire Marshal. The Chief is active on their legislative committees.

REPORT OF FIRE WARDEN—1958

Owing to the extreme care taken by Langdon people, there were no forest fire troubles in 1958. As has been so often mentioned before, the potential danger to the taxpayer's pocketbook is so great in this department that a continuation of this excessive care is of the utmost importance. A forest fire out of control for even a short period of time can build up an expense equal to the amount expended on needed things like roads and other improvements. We cannot afford to let this happen, since we have nothing to show for fires, but damage and destruction. Most forest fires can be prevented.

Be sure to consult the Warden in regard to permits. This is more for the information of the Warden, as to what a column of smoke may be, than to limit the person who needs to burn brush. Permits will be granted under safe conditions.

Two training sessions were held in 1958. One was for Wardens and Deputies at Gilsum in May, the cost of which was shared by State and Town. The other was a two day school at Cardigan Mt. for Special Deputies in June, which was paid from State funds.

In November another section of trail was opened on Fall Mountain. In 1956 a jeep road was made passable from the gravel pit near Joe Johnson's to the Middle Pond on

Fall Mountain. In 1957 this road was improved by the use of machinery. Two tractors, a trailer, a jeep, and a chain saw were used by the owners free of charge. In 1958 the trail was extended in two directions. One trail was cut from the Middle Pond to the top of the mountain on the trail to North Walpole. The other was cut from the Middle Pond to the 3rd Pond on the road toward the Ox Bow on the Cold River Road. Neither of these trails are passable for a jeep, and it is doubtful if it would pay to attempt to make them passable. If the \$25.00 is raised this year it may be possible to build a jeep road from the south to meet these trails. Any suggestions as to where the money might be used to the best advantage will be helpful.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as \$200.00.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores. Eliminate the hazard of burning it yourself. It will be easier for you personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning—don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

SCHOOL WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Langdon qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the tenth day of March, 1959, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9.75 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
8. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
9. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

10. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the Chairman of the School Board as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

11. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

12. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

13. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Langdon, I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Miss Cleo Duncan and Mrs. Harvey Putnam returned this year as teachers in the Langdon Elementary School. Miss Duncan is Principal of the building and teaches the children in grades one to three. Mrs. Putnam has the upper grade room, grades four to six. The Town of Langdon may feel fortunate in having two experienced and well qualified teachers on the staff. Stability of instruction is most desirable and such a situation lends itself to long term planning of school activities.

The townspeople through their School Board provide annually for the desired materials and books for instructional purposes. With capable teachers, adequate supplies, and a comfortable building in which to work, we are able to give to our children a basic training which compares favorably with schools in other communities.

There was one change on the School Board this year. Mr. Walter Smith, Jr., terminated his services on the Board this past year. Mr. Stanley Bicknell succeeded Mr. Smith and has proven a very valuable member on the Board. I am sure the people of this community appreciate very much the fine service of Mr. Smith as a Board member over the past years.

Our present school enrollment is forty-three pupils. Twelve sixth grade students are expected to attend school in Alstead next year. The first grade group in the fall is estimated to be seven in number. This will give us a total school enrollment in September 1959 of thirty-eight pupils. This number represents a decrease of thirteen pupils from last year's opening registration.

An extension course was offered this fall at the Charlestown High School. This was a professional course for the benefit of all teachers in Union No. 5. The subject of the course was "Teaching the Gifted." Both Miss Duncan and Mrs. Putnam enrolled in this course last September, taking advantage of this opportunity for professional improvement.

Intelligence Tests, Reading Tests, and General Achievement Tests are given each year in the Langdon School. This is part of a uniform testing program given in all towns within the Union. The results of the Achievement Tests given last March show that Langdon pupils compare favorably with national and area averages.

The increase in operating costs, as reflected in our proposed budget for next year, is a result of factors not controllable by your School Board. Teachers' salaries are increasing in New Hampshire as well as other states throughout the country. Book prices have increased about eight percent, supplies have advanced about fifteen percent, and fuel prices have increased approximately ten percent. It is not possible to maintain a good educational program at the same cost, when the cost of materials, repairs, and salaries are continually on the rise.

I have enjoyed very much my second year as Superintendent in the Langdon School system. The members of the School Board have been most cooperative and have had the best interest of the children in mind in shaping their policies for the year. I appreciate the help and cooperation given me by the teachers and citizens of your community. You may rest assured that Langdon has good reason to boast of its program at the Elementary School. Each year brings a new challenge not only to the teachers, but also to those who maintain and support our school.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Our emphasis during this school year has been on the Language Arts, which includes the teaching of Reading, Spelling, and Language. We are trying to provide an enrichment program that will challenge those students who are outstanding in the fundamental subjects, as well as furnish drill for the pupils who need it. A science kit was purchased for grades 4, 5, and 6 which has been a great asset to the teaching of science. Mrs. Barbara Putnam and I have coached a special group of four students who have just completed a scientific project; we are grateful to Mr. George B. Porter for supervising the construction work. We also wish to thank the Parents Club for financing the rental of films and filmstrips which are used to supplement Social Studies text books, and Dr. Dorothy T. Spoerl for the loan of a Cave Painting for the hall library.

The children in the primary grades visited the Shedd Porter Memorial Library in Alstead during Book Week. We are indebted to that library and Mrs. Laura McLane, Librarian, for the loan of a hundred books during the school year. We are also indebted to our Langdon Library and Mrs. Lydia Hatch, Librarian; and the Bookmobile, for many additional books which are a major contribution to the reading program. The primary group made two additional trips in conjunction with Social Studies' Units: a trip to George B. Porter's sugar house and a trip to George L. Porter's lumber mill.

The entire school participated in the Memorial Day Exercises at the lower and upper cemeteries. In September, we attended the Vilas Fair at Alstead. We set up an exhibit and entered two floats in the parade depicting Autumn Ablaze. The boys and girls were happy to receive not only a prize for the best float in the out-of-town competition, but an additional prize for the best float in the parade. We are grateful to Mr. Oren Sheldon and Mr. Roger Pelton for providing trailers and driving the tractors. Your teachers also directed the Community Hallowe'en Party which was held at the Sarah Porter School in October. The Parents Club provided prizes and refreshments. In December, the school decorated the Town Hall and produced an operetta, Christmas in the Country, for the Community Christmas Party. The Community Club provided gifts and a tree; the Parents Club gave candy canes.

Mrs. Putnam and I received three graduate credits from Keene Teachers College for an extension course, The Gifted Child, which was given in Charlestown the first semester.

We wish to thank our local School Board members and the citizens of Langdon for the wonderful spirit of cooperation which prevails in this community. We are also grateful to our Superintendent, Mr. Noyes Stickney, and our School Nurse, Miss Florence MacIver, for their services and supervision. We wish to express our gratitude to Dr. Dorothy T. Spoerl for her professional services in testing five exceptional students.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

During the past year Immunization Clinics were made available to all school children as well as the pre-school children. Salk Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (a combination of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough) and Small Pox Vaccinations were given. Attendance at these clinics could be better. We still have a number of children who have not had Salk Vaccine despite the large number of Salk Vaccine Clinics we have had. I do hope that our spring clinics will take care of this.

The Tuberculin Patch Testing program was carried out with the children in the odd numbered grades and newcomers who had not previously had the test. This test is given to determine whether or not a child has ever had a contact with Tuberculosis. If the test reaction is positive, then the child has a chest x-ray through the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association Chest Clinics.

Hearing and vision testing was done in all grades. The hearing defects were very few and all of those children with a hearing problem were seen by their family physician. The number of corrections of vision problems was excellent. Where a family was unable to assume the expense of eye care and glasses the local service clubs and the State Welfare Department assisted.

Examination with the Wood's Light for the detection of Scalp Ringworm was done in the elementary grades. There were no suspicious cases found. Scalp Ringworm still seems to be a public health menace in this state, as well as in the neighboring states.

The children were weighed and measured and a general inspection was carried out by the school nurse. By far the outstanding problem was the need for dental care. Outside of the State Matching Fund there is very little assistance available for dental care.

All of the above mentioned programs are carried out yearly. These programs serve a dual purpose. First and very important is the finding of defects and the correction of them. Second and equally as important, it is a teaching program from the standpoint of the child. We strive to help the child realize the importance of good health, as well as teach him to assume the responsibility of maintaining good health and well-being.

Success in carrying out the school health program is dependent on many people. I would like to express my appreciation to you who have helped so much—the parents, the medical advisors, the School Board, the Superintendent, the Principals, the teachers and the custodians. Thank you.
