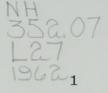

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, in the County of Sullivan, and the State of New Hampshire:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the twelfth day of March, next at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income estimated to be \$3,812.00 from:

Article 3. To see what sum of money, in addition to the amount already appropriated under Article 2 of this warrant, the Town will raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to be used together with and in addition to the Class V Allotment, \$1,874.63, (Duncan Money, so-called), for the Summer maintenance of Highways and Bridges.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Winter maintenance of Highways and Bridges.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to put a seal coat on the Ball Hill Road.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$421.05 and apply for Class V Assistance, TRA so-called. State to furnish \$2,807.02.

Article 8. (Accelerated TRA Program) To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not exceeding \$3,200.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the town: Sheldon-Griggs Road, so-called, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with provisions of Chapter 241, N. H. Revised Statutes Anotated, 1955, as amended by laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rates of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Langdon. Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for Town Bridge Aid for the construction of a new bridge over Cold River to replace the present McDermott Bridge, so-called, and, if granted, to make all contracts necessary and bind the Town to the payment of its share of the expense of such construction.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on long term notes of the Town, if necessary, to pay for the Town's share of the cost of constructing the new bridge referred to in Article 9 of this warrant.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund to replace the McDermott Bridge.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the Town Library.

Article 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the use of the Alstead Public Dump for one year.

Article 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00, to be matched by the State, to be used for opening back roads and trails. Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to place monies received from the sale of property acquired by tax collector's deed in the Capital Reserve Fund to replace the McDermott Bridge.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept all trust funds received for the perpetual care of cemetery lots.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept equipment donated to the Fire Department.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to ratify, approve and confirm the action of the Fire Department in joining the Town to the Southwestern New Hampshire District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958, and agreeing that the Fire Department may give and receive outside aid as provided in RSA 154 as amended.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 24. To allow accounts.

Also do not forget that woods fires can cost you tax dollars.

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his rsponsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.

2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.

3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.

4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.

5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.

6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire. In 1962 we had 0 fires. We burned 0 acres.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Langdon, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

Staff

We had one change in our teaching staff this year due to the resignation of Miss Duncan. She accepted a more lucrative position in the Charlestown Schools, as Principal and Primary teacher at the Farwell School.

Mrs. Thelma Whitcher was appointed instructor to succeed Miss Duncan and teach the Primary room. Mrs. Whitcher was graduated from London Teachers College with a B.S. Degree and has had twenty years of teaching experience.

Mrs. Barbara Putnam returned as instructor in the Upper Grade room and has been promoted to the Principalship of the building.

1963-1964 Enrollment

We may expect a first grade entering class of five pupils next September, 1963. This will make a probable school enrollment of thirty-seven pupils in the Sarah Porter School. The room groupings would be as follows: Primary Room (Grades 1-2-3), 20 pupils; Upper Grade Room (Grades 4-5-6), 17 pupils.

School Board Meetings

The School Board has met regularly each month during the year, except in July and August when the school is closed for summer vacation. Mrs. Veronica Pelton has been Chairman this year and Mr. Ira Huntley has been Secretary of the Board.

State Reimbursement

We are pleased to announce that the School District of Langdon has received this year the following aid from the State: Foundation Aid amounting to \$9,912.11. This sum is used to reduce the amount of monies necessary to be raised by local assessment for support of schools.

School Improvements and Maintenance

During the summer considerable work was done in our building. The entire school was thoroughly cleaned, windows washed inside and out and the floors were sealed and waxed. The desks were sanded and varnished and the usual general repairs completed for opening of school in the fall.

Mr. Alcide Chaloux has been our school custodian again this year. We are more than pleased with his work and the interest he has shown in keeping our building comfortable and a pleasant place in which children may work and study.

School Survey

A Union #5 school survey was made in October this year to determine the growth or change in school enrollments in the next few years. The schedule listed below shows the projected pupil figures for the years 1963-1967. It would appear that we may expect little change in our classes for some time to come.

Superintendent's Recommendations

1. That Primary Dictionaries be purchased for Mrs. Whitcher's room.

2. That additional Reference and Library Books be purchased for the use of the children.

3. That the windows and doors be weatherstripped to make our rooms more comfortable on windy days and conserve heat.

4. That Special Storage areas be built for use in the primary room.

5. That a Portable Science Laboratory be purchased for the Upper Grade Room, one half of the cost to be reimbursed by the State, under the National Defense Act.

Summary

As a part of the Annual School Report, you will find on separate pages the reports of the School Nurse and School Principal. These messages will give you a more detailed account of the School Activities of the children. I hope you will read these reports with interest and satisfaction.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers, School Board and Citizens for their support and loyalty. Parents may be justly proud of the Langdon School. Children going into High School enjoy their share of success and each year brings a new challenge to us.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Sarah Porter School had an enrollment of forty-five when school opened in September. Our enrollment as of January is: twenty pupils in grades 1-3 and twenty-two pupils in grades 4-6. Your teachers are enjoying the opportunity to give more help to individual problems and small groups. The rural population changes rapidly, with a resulting fluctuation in enrollment. There have, in past years, been as many as 35 in one room.

As a result of long term planning, we now have excellent up-to-date textbooks in most study areas. A subscription to The Weekly Reader for each child makes it possible to keep informed of current news and new discoveries in many phases of science.

Additional reading and reference materials are obtained from the Bookmobile on its regular visits.

Monday and Friday afternoon, during recess, the children have permission to go to the Langdon Library. Thank you Mrs. Kemp.

Before the year is over we anticipate making our usual visit to Shedd Porter Library in Alstead. Mrs. Mc-Lane generously shares her time with the children and loans books for use at school.

Langdon School was represented at Vilas Fair with a school exhibit.

The children participated in the Annual Community Christmas Party, providing entertainment with Christmas songs and pieces.

More than 85% of our children stay during the noon hour and, with but few exceptions, supplement their lunches with hot soup during the winter months.

Mr. George Porter, State Fire Warden, spoke to the children during Fire Prevention Week. The children received fire stickers, pamphlets, comics, blotters and other valuable information showing the proper use of, and respect for, fire. They also participated in the Fire Prevention Poster Contest.

Mr. Ira Huntley visited school bringing word of the 5th annual Junior Carnival. Though this is not a school affair it is one of the highlights of the year for this age group. The teachers wish to thank the parents and friends who in so many ways, large and small, have contributed to making this a successful year. A special thank you to those who keep a parking space plowed for us.

We can be proud of the physical appearance of our school. Mr. Chaloux, our custodian, with the use of an electric scrubber and frequent waxing has kept our floors in excellent condition in spite of mud, salt and snow.

Miss MacIver has made several visits and is on call through the office at any time. The children have been tested for weakness or defects in vision. Most children availed themselves of the opportunity to participate in the Oral Sabin Vaccine Program. This was given in three stages for the three different types.

The willing cooperation of the school board: Mrs. Pelton, M. Sheldon and Mr. Huntley has been much appreciated.

Mr. Stickney, Superintendent, has aided us by his suggestions and guidance, making our teaching more efficient and pleasurable. On several occasions sharing with us his travel experiences has made the places which we study seem more real.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

In submitting my tenth annual report to the citizens of Langdon I would like to summarize a portion of the work carried out in the school health program during the 1961-62 school year.

Fifty-one children were given vision tests. From this number two defects were found, reported and corrected.

Fifty-two hearing tests were given, followed by three audiograms. There were no hearing defects found.

Forty-seven children were weighed, measured and checked for noticeable defects. Dental Health continues to be the problem in all areas. Clinic-wise there is very little to be offered.

A Tuberculin Patch-Testing Program was carried out in the first, third and fifth grades. None of the children reacted to the test. This program is carried out with the assistance of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association and the State Department of Health.

Immunization Clinics were held during the year. Salk Vaccine booster inoculations were given 36 school children, seven pre-school children and five adults. Diphtheria-Tetanus Toxoid was given five school children. Triple Toxoid was given six pre-school children and two pre-school children were vacinated against Small-Pox.

During the summer of 1962 Sabin (oral) Polio Vaccine was made available to pre-school children. Langdon preschool children attended the Clinics held in Charlestown. In September, 1962, the Sabin Vaccine was made available to school children, adults and again for pre-school children through the Sullivan County Medical Association. Twentynine school children completed the series of the three types of vaccine. Type one was given in September, Type three was given in October and Type two was given in November. A small donation was requested for this vaccine but lack of a donation did not prevent a child from receiving the vaccine.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation for the interest shown in the school health program.
