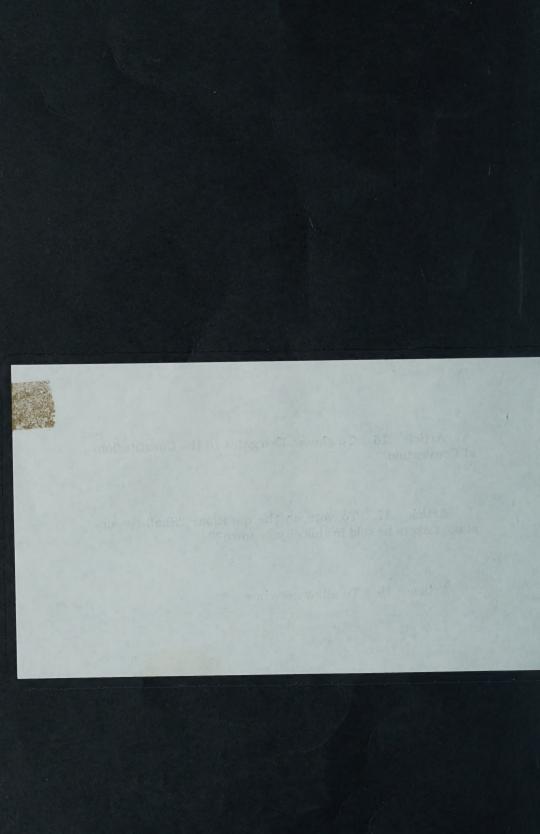

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

With financial assistance from the Community Club, Sydney Batchelder, and George Holmes, the Fire Department was able to purchase and install a 5-horse siren for the Fire Station. This is a very helpful addition to the alarm system which received a severe blow when the operator of the local exchange was eliminated.

Luckily, this year no serious building fires occurred. The Department responded to a chimney fire at Bill Lamb's and a flooded oil burner at Emery Hall's. The latter was out before the arrival of the Department.

The Department moved to Alstead on a fire in the village on July 1, and supplied a length of hose for one that burst.

Drills were held regularly on Thursday nights. The continuity of these meetings accomplish some fire training as well as a spirit of comradeship, although not many attend at any one time. These drills announced by two blasts of the siren, will continue.

A map has been drawn up numbering the houses in ten road sections. A copy of it is in the Keene Fire Station. Placing your house number near the phone may save a delay in reporting a fire, particularly if the ownership has changed. In routing out of town tankers or other apparatus it is the only sure way of explaining where the trouble is.

REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDEN

We have had in 1963 one of the driest and most dangerous forest fire years that I can remember. The Town's people were extremely careful in prevention of fire. Only in this way were we able to avoid extreme expense and damage.

Two fires, one of them caused by lightning, and the other either by a hunter or possibly lightning were put out without major expense. The first one because of heavy rain was contained to a very small spot and was extinguished by laborious toting of back pack pumps up Gerald Mason's cliffs. The other started up in the night and was

reported by Jim Reavis. Eight Charlestown men from the Hemlock District came down immediately and contained the fire. The tanker put out the fire and the Hemlock Sputnik Pond was used to refill the tanker.

Please remember that a fire permit is required except when the ground is covered with snow. However, even when there is snow, a sudden unexplained smoke may force the Fire Department to find out the cause. So a telephone call even in this case is helpful.

On October 23 the tanker was sent to North Charlestown to put out a brush fire. Al Chaloux took the tanker up and some of the boys helped transfer the water to the Charlestown truck at the fire. Fay Austin stood by at the station.

One small grass fire was put out by Earl Cook before the arrival of the fire truck. It was across from his house and if he had not been able to stop it when he did, it might have developed into a serious fire.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience — a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

- 1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
- Carry your rubbish to the public dump its safer.
 A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
- 3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
- 4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

Dear Chief:

Our President, Chief Traxler suggested that perhaps some of the members would like a brief report of some of the activities and progress of our Fire Mutual Aid system during 1963. He suggests that many of the Chiefs would like to include some of the information in their Annual reports to their Towns and for the Town report.

During 1963 we received 73 calls requesting assistance at fires, 437 pieces of apparatus were dispatched to handle these requests. For a comparison, during our first year, 1956, we dispatched 21 pieces of apparatus. A great example of the acceptance of Mutual Aid.

The Dispatchers handled approximately 30,000 telephone calls, over 400 in one 8-hour shift during the dry season in October. Our Radio log sheets show a total of 15,799 fire transmissions and 14,482 police transmissions. Our Fire radio network has 178 units, 23 police cars equipped.

We find an increasingly amount of home monitors being put into service. Many Departments are fully equipped with each member having one. Those living adjacent to the stations have wired house speakers from their Base sets. These home monitors have proven a valuable addition to the Departments both for local fires and quick response for a Mutual Aid call.

26 Stations have now been equipped with Tone decoders and the initial phone calls are being handled by the Dispatch Center. Additions are expected to be added to this number following Town Meetings.

We are currently working to bring our Inventory records up to date. This also helps to bring our running cards up to date as the addition of new trucks creates many changes in running things. Have we received your inventory sheet that we recently sent to you to be completed?

I would also like to set up a mapping system to enable the dispatchers to more efficiently send you help at the fire scene. I will be happy to get together with you at your convenience to further this idea.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the town of Langdon, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Staff

Langdon was fortunate to have retained its two experienced teachers to start our current school year beginning September 1963. Mrs. Thelma Whitcher returned to teach our primary grades, while Mrs. Barbara Putnam has been in charge of the upper grade room and is Principal of the building. We appreciate very much the fine work they have done this year.

School Organization 1964-1965

We anticipate an opening day registration in the first grade of ten pupils. It is expected that there will be three pupils moving on into the seventh grade next year, and they will continue their education in the Alstead Schools. This should give us a building enrollment of fifty pupils. The room assignments should be as follows:

School Board Meetings

The School Board has met regularly each month during the year, except in July and August when school was closed for the summer vacation. Mr. Ira Huntley has been Chairman this year and Mr. Oren Sheldon Secretary of the Board. Much additional work and responsibility has fallen on the shoulders this year because of their part in the Study Group meetings connected with the Cooperative School Planning Board. The members should be commended for the work and interest in the welfare of the children of the Langdon area. These additional meetings have taken much time and meant much travel the past five months

State Reimbursement

We should mention that the Langdon School District received this year, the following financial aid from the State. Foundation Grant amounting to \$16.145.27. This sum is used to reduce the amount of money which must be raised by local taxation in the support of schools.

School Improvements and Maintenance

During the summer the school building was thoroughly cleaned, the desks varnished and the floors washed, sealed and waxed. Special storage closets and shelves were built in the primary room. A new pump and 30 gallon water tank was installed in the cellar and the pipe in the well replaced. The front stairs leading to the building were resurfaced and a dead tree removed in the front playground area.

Two new chairs were purchased for the primary room and a new portable science laboratory purchased for Mrs. Putnam's room.

We are more than pleased with the care given our building by Mr. Alcide Chaloux. Our building is well kept and always clean.

The Cooperative School

About fifteen years ago the school districts of Alstead, Charlestown and Walpole considered consolidation and rejected the idea. Now, fifteen years later, there is another chance to unite to provide a better education opportunity for your children. Don't allow this second chance to escape. If you do, it can well be another two generations of children who will be denied the better education that can be economically provided by consolidation.

Leading educators advise consolidation to form larger, more effective administrative and education units. The State Legislature has recognized the need for consolidation and is willing to pay more of the cost as a means of encouraging small school districts to form a single larger school district. The N. H. Interim Commission on Education strongly recomends larger more efficient education units; in fact, this commission specifically suggests that the school districts of Acworth, Alstead, Charlestown, Langdon, and Walpole now studying consolidation, unite to form a consolidated unit.

Twenty New Hampshire districts combined to form three cooperative districts in the 1962-63 school year. These communities were facing the same problem that are facing us in Acworth, Alstead, Charlestown, Langdon, and Walpole, and are facing fourteen other school districts also planning to form cooperatives this year.

Specifically the school districts are having difficulty in providing adequate education facilities that would keep them on a par with present-day standards.

Your school district is one of five districts considering the advantages of joining to form a cooperative school district. Several committees worked for nearly a year under the specifications of the old cooperative school law. Then at a school district meeting held on October 19, 1963, it was voted to direct the Moderator to appoint three qualified voters to form a cooperative planning committee in keeping with the requirements of the new law voted by the 1963 legislature. The Moderator appointed Walter Smith Jr., Ira Huntley, Mr. Allen, these citizens have been your representatives on the Cooperative Planning Committee composed of three members from each of the school districts of Acworth, Alstead, Charlestown, Langdon and Walpole and have been meeting once a week since the organization meeting held October 30, 1963. In addition to the weekly meetings of the Planning Committee, planning committee members meet with the Curriculum. Building. Transportation, Publicity and Finance committees. All of these citizens are to be highly commended for the large amount of time and effort they have given to serve their various committees.

Some of the advantages of forming a cooperative school district are:

- 1. Continuity and integration of the education program.
- 2. Larger units allow economical provision for both rapid and slow learners, and provide the means for specialization of services.
 - 3. Provide a balanced and adequate curriculum.
- 4. Provide more effectively for the educational needs of all pupils ranging from those who are planning college and those who are finishing their education when they graduate from high school.
 - 5. Receive more state aid.

- 6. Better teachers and improved teacher retention.
- 7. Provide expanded educational opportunity, adult education and summer school programs.
 - 8. Tend to reduce drop-outs.
- 9. Better provision for individual differences and interests.
- 10. Improved ability to keep abreast of educational trends.

In 1961-62, the average expenditure per pupil for current expenses purposes in the public high schools having an enrollment of less than 100 was \$165.18 higher than the corresponding average for high schools which had an enrollment of more than 300 pupils.

The idea of consolidation is nearly the same problem that faced communities about twenty years ago when they decided to close their small one- and two-room schools and bring their children in to a centralized community school. The same arguments prevail today against consolidation as existed as arguments against closing the one- and two-room schools of yesteryear would be against going back to that kind of education. Business needs to grow and to keep abreast of its competition. Education faces the same challenge. It must keep abreast of the trends and improvements in education or fail to prepare the youth of today for the challenges of life in a society that is becoming more and more complex.

Superintendent's Recommendations

- 1. That we continue our interest in the Cooperative School Project, to provide better High School facilities and offerings for the children of Langdon.
- 2. That the School Board provide in the new budget, monies for the purchase of a new adoption in the field of Mathematics Books for grades one and two.
- 3. That the windows and doors be weatherstripped to add to the comfort of rooms on windy days in the cold weather. This would also help to conserve on heat and reduce our annual fuel bill.

Summary

As a part of the annual School Report you will find on separate pages, the reports of the School Nurse and

Principal. These messages will give you a more detailed account of the activities of the children throughout the year. I hope you will read these reports with interest and satisfaction.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers, School Board and Citizens of Langdon for their support and interest in our school. Parents may justly be proud of the Langdon school. Children attending high school seem to enjoy their share of success and each year brings a new challenge to us.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Sarah Porter School opened in September with an enrollment of 41 pupils. Mrs. Whitcher of South Ryegate, Vermont is with us for her second year, and doing an excellent job of teaching 27 pupils in grades 1, 2 and 3. This is as many children as the room can accommodate comfortably. In addition to teaching the three grades, Mrs. Whitcher has given much individual instruction in reading and arithmetic, to permit each child to advance at his best rate of learning.

Mrs. Barbara Putnam returned as teacher-principal in grades 4, 5 and 6. We have a very small group of only 16 pupils this year. This will be very temporary as there are eleven 3rd graders expected next year with only 3 in the sixth grade going to Alstead.

Once a week our third grade joins the children in the upper grades for a series of science lessons and experiments. This is not only an opportunity for a new and pleasurable learning experience, with the use of our science equipment, but also an experience which helps the transition from the primary room to the intermediate group.

Our textbooks and reference materials are all up-to-date with the exception of arithmetic. In cooperation with Keene State Teachers' College, Mr. Stickney made available a course in THE NEW MATH, with classes held at Charlestown High School. In preparation for the change in our math program, Mrs. Putnam attended these classes and has aso met with other teachers of the Union on several occasions to select the mathematics textbook best suited to our needs.

Through a generous donation by the Langdon Parents' Club we have been able to purchase a small electric organ which is easily moved from room to room, making the teaching of music much more effective. Additional funds were received for the purchase of library periodicals and books. We appreciate the efforts of the parents in our behalf.

Last fall, Miss MacIver, school nurse, and Miss Sullivan, County nurse, were at school to give the T. B. Patch Test. On another visit the children received Salk Oral Vaccine.

We want to thank Mr. Stickney and members of the school board for their assistance and cooperation throughout the year.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report to the School Board and the Citizens of Langdon.

During the past school year forty-four vision tests were done. Two vision defects were noted and reported. Both children were seen by an eye specialist and the condition corrected.

Forty-four hearing tests were done followed by eight audiograms. One defect was found and treated surgically.

Forty-four children were measured, weighed and checked for any noticeable abnormalities. Dental health continues to be a problem. Corrective dentistry is needed in several cases. Our various state sponsored clinics seem to provide us with almost everything except dental care.

Because of the Polio epidemic in bording Canada Sabin Type III was again offered to those who had not previously had it. Twenty school children, three adults and seven pre-school children received the vaccine.

Forty-two children received the Tuberculin Patch Test, also two adults. Tests results were negative. This program is sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

One of the school children attended a Child Guidance Clinic this last year. A Psychologist and a Psychistric Social Worker from the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover conduct a clinic in Claremont monthly. We also have available the New Hampshire Child Clinics in Concord. We have found the help given at these clinics invaluable; to the child, to the parents, as well as to the school. We have a much greater understanding of the needs of the child after diagnostic tests have been made and evaluated.

I would like to express my thanks and appreciation to all of you for your fine support and interest in the School Health Program.
