

Town of Freedom Rules of Procedure

According to RSA 40, the Town Moderator determines the procedures to be used in Town Meetings. The Moderator determines the rules without regard to parliamentary or other procedural rules. The voters can overturn the Moderator's rules at any time, however. A motion to overturn the Moderator's rules, or establish new rules, will always take precedence to other business which is already "on the floor".

So that you will know the groundrules by which we are maintaining order, these procedural rules are announced to you ahead of time.

- The Moderator will read each <u>article</u> in its entirety before that article is considered.
- There can be no discussion until there has been a motion under the article. (usually the first motion is to approve the article as it appears on the warrant).
- All motions must be seconded by a different individual.
- Discussion will only take place after a motion has been moved and seconded.
- All discussion must take place only when called upon by the Moderator. You must have permission from the Moderator before you can speak.
- When the Moderator recognizes you, <u>standup</u>, <u>speak out</u> loudly and <u>announce your</u> name before proceeding with your comments.
- If you want to change a portion of a motion, you can do so by making an amendment. We will consider only one move to amend at any given time. When discussion regardin an amendment comes to a conclusion, the amendment will be voted upon. If the amendment passes we will then continue considering the original motion as it has now been amended. If the amendment fails, we will return to considering the motion in its form prior to the motion to amend.
- A secret written ballot will be used on any article when requested by any 5 voters in writing (RSA 40:4-a).
- A vote will be re-tabulated by secret written ballot when requested in writing or orally by only 7 voters (RSA 40:40b). This action must be requested before we have already moved onto the next item of business.

One final word of advice from your Moderator: If you want to get action from the Town Meeting, you have to make a motion. It's okay to get up and ask a question or make a comment (as long as it's relevant to what's on the table), but if you want the Town Meeting to discuss and vote on your idea, you have to get it on the table with a motion. Let's work together to have a successful and efficient meeting.

MARCH 13, 1993: (Saturday)

The Moderator, Donald Johnson, called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, the introduction of the Town Officials and the review of the procedures to be followed for the meeting.

Because of the severe storm prediction, Selectman Bill Cutler addressed the meeting and advised of the Town's plans for assistance during the storm, using the School, which has a power generator and water, if necessary.

ARTICLE 1: (voted by official ballot)

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

The Moderator noted that this had taken place on Tuesday, March 9, 1993, and read the election results. (see above)

ARTICLE 2: (voted by official ballot)

To see if the Town will vote to add to the existing Freedom Building Code by the adoption by reference of the 1990 edition, BOCA National Building Code. This Article will be voted on by Official Ballot, which will contain the following question:

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Town Building Code as proposed by the Planning Board:

(The purpose of the amendment is to add to the existing Town Building Code the adoption by reference of the 1990 edition, BOCA National Building Code.)"

The Moderator noted that this had been voted on by Official Ballot on Tuesday, March 9, 1993. The results were:

YES: 220 NO: 130

ARTICLE 3: (voted by official ballot)

To see if the Town will rescind the prior Town Meeting vote for having two (2) sessions of the Annual Town Meeting. This article will be voted on by Official Ballot, which will contain the following question, as required by RSA 39:2-a:

"Shall the provisions for having two sessions of the Annual Town Meeting be declared no longer in effect in this Town?"

(If the majority of the voters voting on this question vote in the affirmative, all Town Meeting business will be done on the second Tuesday of March each year, including the election of officers and all other business.)

The Moderator noted that this had been voted on by Official Ballot on Tuesday, March 9, 1993. The results were:

ARTICLE 7:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$43,000.00 to purchase a backhoe for the Highway Department and to withdraw the sum of \$30,000.00 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and designate the Selectmen as agents of the Town to expend such sum for this purpose, and the balance of the appropriation to be raised from taxes.

MOTION made by Alice Haslett to accept as written; SECONDED by Richard Goff.

Discussion.

Scott N. Brooks proposed an Amendment to change this Article for the purchase of a grader instead of a backhoe and the Moderator, Donald Johnson, stopped him, ruling that it would change the substance of the Article, and ruled the Amendment out of order.

Discussion.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Paul Dorian. VOTE TO MOVE: Yes, by majority.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 7: No, by majority.

ARTICLE B:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to be placed in the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 8: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 9:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$32,975.00 for the Town Recycling and Landfill Facility.

MOTION made by William Cutler to accept as written; SECONDED by Paul Dorian.

Discussion.

Motion made by Andrew Drummond to amend the Article by deleting the word "Landfill", seconded by Daniel Brooks; upon further discussion, Mr. Drummond withdrew his amendment, and Mr. Brooks withdrew his "seconding".

Motion made by Alice Haslett to MOVE the question; seconded by Andrew Drummond. VOTE TO MOVE the question: Yes, by majority.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 9: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 10:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$650.00 to purchase removable blades to be attached to the present crawler.

MOTION made by Alice Haslett to accept as written; SECONDED by Ralph Kazanjian.

Discussion.

VOTE DN ARTICLE 10: No, by majority.

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be placed in the Recycling/Landfill Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of closing the landfill portion of the facility in the future.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Alice Haslett.

Discussion.

Motion made by Alice Haslett to MOVE the question; seconded by Richard Goff. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, unanimous.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 11: Yes, by majority.

ARTICLE 12:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$779.00 for the Lakes Region Planning program for Household Hazardous Waste Collection.

MOTION made by William Cutler to accept as written; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 12: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 13: (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to restrict revenues from the Landfill/Recycling Center to be placed in a special revenue fund to be known as the Landfill/Recycling Special Revenue Fund, and to expend such revenue from such fund only for expenses relating to the Landfill/Recycling Center, as provided in RSA 31:95-c. State law requires a Town Meeting to appropriate any surplus accumulated in this special revenue fund.

MOTION made by William Cutler to accept as written; SECONDED by Gail Bickford.

Gail Bickford asked that the typo in the word "expand" in the Article in the Town Report book be corrected to make the word "expend". The Moderator verified with the Selectmen that the correct word in the posted Warrant is "expend", and the change was approved.

Discussion on Article.

MOTION made by Charles Brooks to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Alice Haslett. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, by majority.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 13: No, by majority.

VOTE TO AMEND: Yes, unanimous.

Discussion.

MOTION made by Mark Bittner to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Alice Haslett. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, unanimous.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 14 AS AMENDED: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 15:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,100.00 for two portable radios and four pagers for Fire Department use.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Ralph Kazanjian.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 15: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 16:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund.

MOTION made Mike Eldridge to accept as written; SECONDED by Richard Goff.

It was noted by Selectman Goff that there is presently \$31,000.00 in this Capital Reserve Fund. Mike Eldridge, the Fire Chief, also noted that the Town will probably need to buy a new Fire Truck in 1997.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 16: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 17:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Forest Fire Protection Purchases. This amount is matched with State Funds.

 ${\tt MOTION}$ made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 17: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 18:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Forest Fire Protection wages. One-half of these wages are reimbursed by the State.

MOTION to accept as written made by Alice Haslett; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 18: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 19:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$58,920.00 for the Police Department.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 19: Yes, by majority.

ARTICLE 20:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,510.00 to purchase a radar unit for the Police Department. This amount is matched with funds from the New Hampshire Department of Safety.

MOTION made by Alice Haslett to accept as written; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 20: Yes, by majority.

ARTICLE 21:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$13,700.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser to replace the 1986 police cruiser.

MOTION made by Ralph Kazanjian to accept as written; SECONDED by Edward Hatfield.

Discussion.

Daniel Brooks questioned why the "old" cruiser wasn't sold in 1989 when the "new" cruiser was purchased - when the Town went from a 1 cruiser department to a 2 cruiser department, seemingly on the selectmen's judgment - it didn't come before Town Meeting. Selectman Goff responded that it had been a decision made by the Selectmen, because the "old" cruiser had little trade-in value, and actually had more value to the Town if the Town kept it as a back-up.

The Selectmen were further questioned if, by approving this Article, the Town would go from a 2 cruiser Town to a 3 cruiser town, and Selectman Goff said "No, we've agreed to sell [the old cruiser] by sealed bids".

MOTION made by Mark Bittner to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Richard Goff. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, by majority.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 21: Yes, unanimous.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$20,359.00 for the following purposes:

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 23: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 24:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,535.00 for Freedom's share of the expenses of the Lake Ossipee Dam Authority for the 1993 year.

MOTION made by Robert Daly to accept as written; SECONDED by Alice Haslett.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 24: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 25:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 as requested by the Library Trustees to provide and maintain adequate library service for the Freedom Public Library.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 25: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 26:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 as requested by the Library Trustees to remove and replace the roofing on the Freedom Public Library building.

MOTION made by Robert Daly to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 26: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 27:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, as provided in RSA 202-A:4-c.

MOTION made by Robert Daly to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 27: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 28:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the receipt of taxes to pay current maintenance and operation expenses as provided in RSA 33:7 of the Municipal Finance Act.

MOTION made by Robert Daly to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 28: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 29:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town by tax collector's deed either by a public auction or by advertised sealed bids, or as justice may require, as provided in RSA 80:80, II.

MOTION made by Robert Daly to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Question by Betty Godfrey: if the Town comes across property that would be suitable for keeping, just a lot, say to be used for a playground, or something like that, is this considered? Selectman Goff answered that there hadn't been much history with handling any land since he's been a Selectman, but he thought it would be handled by a special meeting or hearing, to ask the people what they'd like to do with it, and to tell the people what the value is, to determine what direction to go in.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 29: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 30:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year as provided in RSA 31:95-b which limits the expenditures to legal purposes for which a town may appropriate money and requires a public hearing prior to the Selectmen taking action.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 30: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 31:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for a Base Communication Station to connect with the Town Mobile Communication System, to be located in the Selectmen's office.

MOTION made by Alice Haslett to pass over this Article; SECONDED by Lillian Gattermann.

Question: What does "pass over" mean? "No action". Selectman Cutler agreed to pass over this Article, as the equipment in question already is owned by the Town.

Malcolm Read made a point of order by questioning the phrase "Pass over". The Moderator agreed that the term should have been to "table" the Article. Alice Haslett agreed to re-state the Motion, asking that the Article be TABLED; Lillian Gattermann seconded the TABLE motion.

VOTE TO TABLE ARTICLE 31: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 32:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,740.00 for a computer payroll program at the Town office.

MOTION made by William Cutler to accept as written; SECONDED by Robert Daly.

Discussion.

Initial VOTE on Article 32: Yes, by majority. However, Tom Kondrat challenged the Vote and called for a division of the house.

Upon a division of the house:

VOTE ON ARTICLE 32: No. by majority.

ARTICLE 33:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,780.00 to establish an information base in preparation for the coordinated State-wide enhanced 911 system utilizing 911 as the primary emergency telephone number, as set forth in RSA Chapter 106-H "Enhanced 911 System." (The information to be obtained will also facilitate postal delivery and existing emergency services of police, fire and ambulance.)

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Discussion.

MOTION made by Edward Hatfield to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Eve Klotz. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, unanimous.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 33: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 34:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to hire assessing services to pick up new property and improved properties for the year 1993.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Alice Haslett.

Discussion.

MOTION made by Mark Bittner to MOVE the question; SECONDED by Lillian Gattermann. VOTE ON MOTION to MOVE the question: Yes, unanimous.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 34: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 35:

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for two (2) grants as follows: (1) through the Division of Historical Resources, Department of Cultural Affairs; and (2) through Community Development for meeting the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act at both the Town Hall and the Town Office.

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Discussion.

Barbara Reed asked to have the Minutes reflect a special thank you to Emery Stokes and his group for all of their work on the Handicapped Access Committee.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 35: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 36:

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to hire architectural services with regard to the renovations to the Town Hall and the Town Office, and to provide the necessary drawings and specifications for bidding purposes. (These renovations will upgrade the Town Hall and Town Office for Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and also to bring the Town Hall up to current safety and fire standards.)

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by Alice Haslett.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 36: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 37:

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of "Old" Ossipee Lake Road that runs through Tax Map 42, Lot 8 (Thomas Gardner), Tax Map 2, Lot 3 (Samuel Kaplan) and Tax Map 3, Lot 11 (Alice Haslett). (Written notice has been given to all owners of property abutting that portion of the highway proposed to be discontinued, fourteen days prior to March 9, 1993, as required by RSA 231:43.)

MOTION made by Richard Goff to accept as written; SECONDED by William Cutler.

Discussion.

Tom Kondrat asked the Selectmen if it was their intention that the "discontinued" portion of the roadway revert to the abutting property owners, and the Selectmen agreed. Tom Kondrat asked that this clarification go in to the minutes of the meeting.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 37: Yes, unanimous.

ARTICLE 38:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Lillian Gattermann made a MOTION to have the Selectmen's positions eliminated from the Town Report and also to have copies of the Town Reports made available to the taxpayers as soon as possible after printing, including printing a notice in the newspaper advising the people that the Town Reports are ready and where they can be picked up.

Alice Haslett SECONDED her motion.

Malcolm Reed made a MOTION to separate the two articles, as he felt there were two separate issues involved.

Marge Conrey SECONDED his motion.

VOTE: to separate the two articles.

First Article: to eliminate the Selectmen's preference on the Articles in the Warrant.

Discussion.

VOTE TO ELIMINATE the Selectmen's preference on the Warrant Articles: YES, by majority.

Second Article: to instruct the Selectmen to deliver the Town Reports or to put a notice in the newspaper to let people know where to pick up the Town Reports.

Discussion. Mr. Goff pointed out that the time between the printing and the Town Meeting is very short — usually the Selectmen try to have the Town Reports two (2) weeks prior to Town Meeting — and there may not be enough time to publish a notice. Mailing of the Town Reports was discussed, but Libby Priebe, the Town Clerk, noted that it cost \$1.44 each this year to mail them out, and that was prohibitively expensive.

VOTE on second Article: YES, by majority.

Jim Eshelman presented a written MOTION as follows:

"To recommend that the Selectmen,

when determining the beginning time of the deliberative session of Town Meeting, where articles are presented, discussed, and acted upon,

or determining the beginning time of any continuations of the deliberative session,

observe the following:

when the session or continuation falls on a Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, or Friday

the session or continuation shall start on or after 5:00 PM (Five o'clock of the afternoon);

when the session or continuation falls on a Saturday:

the session or continuation shall start on or after 9:00 AM (Nine o'clock of the fore noon);

when the session or continuation falls on a Sunday:

the session or continuation shall start on or after 1:00 PM (One o'clock of the after noon).

SECONDED by Mark Bittner.

Discussion.

VOTE: 45 yes, 39 no. (Recommendation only.)

Hugh Priebe made a MOTION to reconsider ARTICLE 5; SECONDED by Scott Brooks.

Discussion.

VOTE ON MOTION TO RE-CONSIDER: No, by majority.

Reverend Cedar noted: They may be waiting for an answer from God in Waco, Texas, (referring to a confrontation currently in the news headlines with a religious group holding off law enforcement officials in a compound in Texas) but I'm announcing now that Church is cancelled tomorrow morning! (due to the snow storm)

Daniel Brooks referred everybody to Pages 50-51 of the Town Report, which contains a list of vendors, and asked that next year, for accountability purposes, each of these vendors be listed so as to show under which department the expenditures were made.

Elizabeth Godfrey SECONDED the motion.

Discussion.

VOTE: Yes, by majority. (Recommendation only.)

John Thurston asked for the total dollar bottom line of the Articles passed at today's meeting. Donald Johnson, the Moderator, informed him that the total is \$849,248.00.

Elizabeth Godfrey made a MOTION to go back to Article 32; John Thurston SECONDED her motion.

Discussion.

VOTE ON MOTION TO RE-CONSIDER ARTICLE 32: No, unanimous.

Andrew Drummond asked questions of the Selectmen regarding the Town's use of herbicides on the town roads. It was noted that it is used in areas where the Town had done cutting, and Selectman Goff noted that the herbicide used meets Federal Standards and has an approval number on the container. Mr. Drummond requested that the Town advise the abutting property owners that the spraying is being done.

Richard Surrette noted that there were many questions raised in Article 11, and made a MOTION that a special town meeting be called on any decisions regarding the closing of the dump. SECONDED by Robert Cedar.

Discussion as to whether a "special town meeting" or a "public hearing" were intended. Mr. Surrette noted that in order to raise any money, it had to be a Special Town Meeting.

VOTE: Yes, unanimous.

Emery Stokes noted that when discussing Article 4 and the Town's Legal Fees, the Selectmen had requested direction from the townspeople as to where to proceed with the Gillespie case in court or not. Emery Stokes made a MOTION to direct the Selectmen to carry the Gillespie case forward to the Supreme Court, if necessary. SECONDED by Richard Goff.

Discussion.

VOTE: Yes, by majority.

MOTION made by Tom Kondrat to adjourn;

SECONDED by Hugh Priebe.

VOTE TO ADJOURN: Yes, unanimous.

Meeting adjourned at 1:33 p.m.

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Freedom Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

"Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Freedom Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

Amend Section 1702 by inserting a new definition #35 for Lot of Record. The purpose of this amendment is to clarify that a Lot of Record means only those lots in existence when Zoning was first enacted that are smaller than the minimum lot size required by Zoning."

"Shall the Town accept the provision of RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:80 providing that the Town Meeting may authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to sell property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed either by a public auction or by advertised sealed bids, or as justice may require?"

<u>Comment:</u> An affirmative vote under this Article will grant the Selectmen this authority indefinitely, without the necessity of an article and vote at every Annual Town Meeting.

Article 39:

Under a new law enacted in 1993, the Town Meeting can authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property (other than money) which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose. The Selectmen must first hold a public hearing before accepting the gift and the acceptance must not bind the Town to raise or spend any money to operate, maintain or repair the gift. Once adopted, this authorization automatically stays in effect until rescinded, as follows:

"To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, on the condition that the Selectmen must hold a public hearing on the action to be taken and on the condition that the Town shall not be required to expend other Town funds, except such funds as may be lawfully appropriated for the same purpose, as provided in RSA 31:95-e, and such authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of another Town Meeting."

<u>Comment:</u> An affirmative vote under this Article will grant the Selectmen this authority indefinitely, without the necessity of an article and vote at every Annual Town Meeting.

Article 40:

To see if the Town will vote to allow the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting unanticipated money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, which authority shall continue indefinitely until the Town Meeting acts otherwise, by approving the following:

"Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a State, Federal or other governmental unit, or a private source, which becomes available during the fiscal year?"

<u>Comment:</u> An affirmative vote under this Article will grant the Selectmen this authority indefinitely, without the necessity of an article and vote at every Annual Town Meeting.

Article 41:

To see if the Town will vote to give to the Library Trustees the same authority as the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend unanticipated money from a governmental or private source. All the same provisions and limitations as apply to Selectmen apply to the library trustees. This includes the provision (new for libraries) that the grant may require the expenditure of matching Town funds to the extent lawfully appropriated:

"Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing, indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?"

<u>Comment:</u> An affirmative vote under this Article will grant the Library Trustees this authority indefinitely, without the necessity of an article and vote at every Annual Town Meeting.

Article 42:

To see if the Town will delegate to the Board of Selectmen the authority to accept the offer to dedicate new public highways or streets as provided in and subject to the terms and conditions of RSA 674:40-a. (Before accepting a deed to a new Town highway, the Board of Selectmen are required to hold a public hearing. The Selectmen can vote to accept the deed for a new Town highway only if the new Town highway corresponds in its location and lines with a highway shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board. Any other proposed Town highway can be accepted only by the Town Meeting.) (RSA 674:40-a, effective June 22, 1993.)

Article 43:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 44:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payments in prepayment of taxes as provided in RSA 80:52-a.

Article 45:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORTS

1993 was an eventful year in Freedom, the most visible development has been the final phase of paving and completion of the Ossipee Lake Road. It was the ability of this little Town to co-ordinate state engineers, Mert and our highway crew, plus the winning contractor, Pike Industries to work together and actually accomplish something truly significant.

Now we must direct these same organizational skills and energies toward the closing of the dump. We could quite simply sit back and let the selected engineering firm (Kimball Chase) lead us by the nose through the necessary steps to final closure and quite literally our tax rate on this project alone could easily jump \$2.00 and remain unchanged for 10 years.

However if we apply the same skills to the dump project, use all in house equipment possible, strike a deal now for necessary materials from a nearby pit and proceed from that point with the history of dump closures from Towns of similar size and guidance from our retained engineering firm.

We should be able to accurately anticipate what the state will require and this is what we attack early and often. This project should be handled like a business and the very success of any business depends on continually making a profit. This profit can be equated to less taxes for all.

Another project of concern and cost is bringing the Town Hall and Office into "American Disability Act" compliance. (Please note \$102,350 also includes satisfying the Fire Marshall's Office as well as embracing unmandated advantages for the Towns people while still maintaining historical integrity.) We in the Selectmen's office ask you to support the recommendation presented by Emory Stokes and his committee as requested in Article 34.

I would like to say a word of special thanks to all committee members who served the Town in 1993 and for all the board members who continue to serve.

Once again I would like to thank all the volunteer firemen for their time and efforts. The Department has 17 senior members and 3 junior members. We are always looking for more volunteers, anyone interested can come to our business meetings which are held on the last Tuesday of the month.



REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Rear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message - "Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

Building Code, National Electric Code, and the state amended B.O.C.A. Plumbing Code. Also there has been a change in the requirement when building in the flood plain area.

CHIEF OF POLICE REPORT

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Freedom

The following is a report of the Freedom Police Department for the year 1993. As expected we are faced with a variety of new challenges and demands.

Our calls for service were once again higher than that of the previous year. We responded to a total of 388 calls for service, an increase of 12% over 1992. The following is a list of some of the most frequently answered calls.

Domestic Violence, Disturbance
Motor Vehicle Accidents
Burglary & Thefts
Alarms
Malicious Damage

Our motor vehicle activity was also up from last year due largely to the fact that we now have a day car on patrol.

A large part of a police officers time is spent on keeping up to date on changes in laws, policies and new issues that come before us everyday. Each officer on the department has received well over the number of hours of training required by the Police Standards and Training Council.

In 1993 the department added two part time officers to the roster. Officer Charles Pearson who took the place of Officer Jim Brown to cover daytime patrol and Officer Montgomery Warman who was given the title of Training Officer. Officer Warman is an expolice chief for the Town of Brookfield with over 20 years experience in law enforcement. He is a certified firearms instructor and an expert on liability issues. We are proud to have them on the roster and expect that their presence will be of great service to the Town of Freedom.

I would like to remind the Citizens of Freedom that for the quickest response when in need of a police officer you should call Carroll County Dispatch at 539-2284 or State Police Troop E at 323-8112 and someone will either respond or get back to you as soon as possible.

I take this opportunity to thank the Town Officials, the Department Heads and the Citizens of Freedom and all members of the Freedom Police Department for their dedication and a job well done.

The Commission meets monthly and all interested citizens are invited to attend the meetings.

It is anticipated that the Commission will be looking for a replacement member in 1994. Anyone who has an interest should contact the Selectmen or any Conservation Commission Member.
