STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, and for necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote the use of the town hall to the different societies in said town for expenses.

Art. 4. To see what discount, if any, the town will vote to make on all taxes paid on or before July 15, 1913.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to deliver the inventory blanks at the time of taking the inventory.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session 1905.

Art. 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to licensing a junk dealer.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars in trust, the interest to be expended annually for the care of the Almira Putnam lot in Forest Hill cemetery.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preservation and renewing of the shade trees of the village streets.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for building and maintaining the village sidewalks.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to sell the land south of and contiguous to the road leading from East street past the residence of James L. Briggs.

Art. 12. To see what action the town will take to provide suitable quarters for storing the hose and other equipment of the North Charlestown fire department, and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to elect a committee of three to act as a cemetery commission for the ensuing year, salary of said commission not to exceed ten dollars each per annum.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for carrying library books to and from North Charlestown.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of Main street by the use of Tarvia or other material.

Art. 16. To see what salary the town will vote to pay the tax collector or other town officers.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to construct a suitable system of sewers with all the necessary adjuncts of the same in the village of Charlestown.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to issue bonds in the name of the town and sell the same, or borrow money on the notes on the credit of the town for the purpose of constructing a system of sewers in the village of Charlestown.

Art. 19. To see what action the town will take to reimburse Carl N. Bidwell for trees claimed by said Bidwell to have been cut by the town in December 1908 on land owned at that time by said Bidwell and now owned by James L. Briggs.

Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Trustees

Beginning April 1, 1912, the library has been open two days each week. This reduction from the three-day schedule, which had been experimented with the year preceding, reduced the running expenses and permitted a more liberal purchase of books. In the judgment of the trustees, this has best pleased the patrons of the library.

During the year the new catalogue was completed, and went into use Nov. 2. The same day the stack room was opened to the public, and the choice of books by actual inspection of the shelves has since been allowed. The change seems to be well liked by patrons, and certainly leads to more frequent reading of books that are well worth notice, but are apt to be overlooked in favor of more recent publications when choice is by catalogue only. While great care is exercised in the purchase of new books, it is true that some of the old books are better than

any of the new ones, and a library regulation that tends to their more general issue is desirable.

Some necessary repairs to the building have been made, and others are likely to become necessary during the coming year, and will be attended to as funds are available. The trustees recommend that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the use of the library during the coming year.

Report of the Librarian

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE SILSBY FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY:

Gentlemen:—The following report for the year ending February 1, 1913, is submitted:

Books loaned during the year, 6,254, an average of sixty per day for the 103 library days.

Ninety new cards have been issued.

One hundred and two books have been bought.

Seventy four of these were bought by the Book Committee, Mrs. Blanchard gave fourteen, Miss Clapp two, Rev. Mr. Foxcroft one, Miss Jane Labaree four, Miss Eleanor Parker two, Mr. Henry Sheldon one, Mrs. Soper three, N. H. Bible Society one.

The new catalogue and the admission of the public to the stack room have already shown good results, the circulation for the past three months being a decided improvement over the previous ones, and the public find it an advantage as well as pleasure to look over the books on the shelves.

There has been a gain too in the circulation of non-fiction, and it is especially in that department that we want the increase.

So we are very much pleased with the results of all the hard work that was done in re-classifying and making up the new catalogue. The new system may seem complicated at first but is really very simple, and the Library had entirely outgrown the first primitive one used, and needed to be arranged by the method used in other Libraries its size.

Report of Auditors

We the undersigned, Auditors of the town of Charlestown, have examined the foregoing accounts of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseer of the Poor, Treasurer of Silsby Free Public Library, Water Commissioners, Tax Collector and Road Agent, and find them correct, with proper vouchers.

The foregoing report of the various departments of town work is respectfully submitted to the voters and tax payers of Charlestown.

We have endeavored to give as full and lucid a report as possible. You will note the true balance of the town treasurer is less than for several years. This is accounted for as follows:

For the first time in a long period, the railroad tax received from the state did not equal the state tax, thereby obliging the town to pay the state a balance of \$571.63. Three years ago the town received from the state about \$2000 above the state tax. This has gradually diminished until the balance this year is against the town.

The town has paid highway damages amounting to \$531 for accidents occurring in 1911 and 1912. We think the town fortunate in not having larger damages in all three cases. The tuition expense was nearly double the appropriation.

Owing to the Tap Co., fire and the purchase of a much needed hose wagon the fire department expenses exceeded the appropriation by \$218.36. The Hose Co., is now very well equipped with the exception of hand fire extinguishers. The painting of the fence enclosing Forest Hill Cemetery increased quite largely the cemetery expense over the appropriation. An article was handed the Selectmen for insertion in the town warrant to see if the town would vote to appropriate money for the carrying of water to the top of the hill in Forest Hill Cemetery. Through error this was left out. We recommend that the cemetery appropriation be increased to cover this expense.

The state highway is constructed under the supervision of the state highway department. They mapped out too large a strip of work this year, not realizing the

difficulties of this particular stretch of road. Before we could make even passable the road on which the work had been started we had spent \$843.37 above the year's appropriation. Arrangement has been made with the state highway department to have this applied on next year's appropriation, so the town will be even at the close of next season. If the in-coming board of selectmen will set aside \$200 from the highway fund this coming season the state will add \$250 for the maintenance of constructed state highway. We recommend this course. The close of another season should see our highways second to none of any town in this section. The past season has been a particularly trying and disastrous one, but the situation has been ably handled by our road agent.

The valuation will undoubtedly decrease some this year and the tax rate consequently increase. Look over the assets and liabilities of the town and note that the financial condition of the town is strong. Be judicious and economical in your appropriations March 11th, but do not be niggardly. Take such action on the various propositions presented as shall be for the best good of the town eventually. Look beyond this year.

Report of the Board of Health

WESLEY A. HUNT, HORACE M. STEARNS,

Appointed by the Selectmen in rotation for three years each.

During the past year this town has been visited by an epidemic of measles of such a protracted nature that there has been from one to several houses under quarantine almost every week since March, 1912.

No such an epidemic has been known for at least eighteen years.

The cases have been of only average severity, with one exception, which developed pneumonia and terminated fatally at the end of one week.

Whooping cough has also been epidemic here, and of only moderate severity. No fatal cases. This disease was formerly regarded rather too lightly, but it is no joke to have from one to four children in a family ill of whooping cough, It is an exhausting disease, often times, and children having it should be advised to comply with the law, viz. to stay away from school and all public places.

No cases of infantile paralysis have occurred here during the year. Scientists in their study of this disease now claim positive proof that the common house fly is the carrier of the germ, or disease producing medium, of this illness.

Another dreadful thing for which the house fly is responsible. He comes from the stable with his feet loaded with dust or worse than dust and demands an entrance to our homes, to our pantries and to our tables. If he gains

an entrance and caught the chance, in a twinkling he jumps down onto the most savory and sticky article of food shakes out his wings, wipes his feet and begins his eating. He may come from worse places than the stable. There are plenty of them exposed in every village community. A sewerage system would give an opportunity to do away with sink drains and closets, and thus deprive the fly of some of his favorite haunts. Death to the fly!

The present winter, thus far, although an unseasonable one, has not brought with it sickness out of the ordinary; probably not as much as often occurs of the of the more severe forms, especially of lung ailments, pneumonia being essentially a cold weather disease, although it may occur at any season.

Twice or three times a year your public water supply is analyzed by the state chemist at Concord, and the reports are always that the water is of excellent drinking quality. This applies to the North Charlestown reservoir as well as to the "Charlestown street" supply.

The old "Ellinwood" place in the North Hemlock section was purchased jointly by the selectmen, the school board and the water commissioners in the interests of sanitation to the reservoir and to prevent the occupancy of the premises by undesirable citizens. Each of the aforesaid boards paying \$25 each.

Report of School Board

The year has been marked by quite, steady work in all the schools of the district, and satisfactory progress has been made. A highly efficient corps of teachers has been employed, and their work has been most commendable.

Interest in the schools has shown an increase during the year, and the schools registers bear the names of long lists of visitors. It is pleasant to record that the comments of visitors have been commendatory, in some cases highly so. Disaffected criticism, as usual, has been confined principally to those whose judgment are formed without due knowledge of the facts. Frequent visits and honest criticism will always do the schools good, and these are earnestly invited.

During the year some twenty-five of our advanced pupils have attended high schools and academies in other towns, the district being at the entire expense of tuition and transportation, so that no extra expense on this account has come upon the parents. Of the tuition charge, one-half is refunded to the district by the state.

This has brought the cost of school privileges for these advanced pupils to a very low figure for the district to pay, much lower than would have been possible if an advanced school suitable to the needs had been maintained here;

while the advantage to the pupils of the superior equipment and the thoroughly organized teaching forces that have been bought within their reach, is evident.

A school year of 36 weeks has been maintained in all schools of the district.

Rev. S. L. Elberfeld, who was elected a member of the school board at the last school meeting for the term of three years, resigned after two months of service. The board appointed to his vacancy, Mr. Walter H. Perry. Under the law governing such appointments, he was appointed for the balance of the year only.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

The Superintendent of Schools herewith presents the ninth annual report of your school work, as your rules require.

It is the duty of the Superintendent not so much to dwell on what has been accomplished or call attention only to what would be pleasant to contemplate but rather, having the whole field in view and looking on the entire school work of the town, it is his duty to point out the need that exist, to show where the work is slack and any improvement may be made and mistakes of former experiences avoided.

So it falls to my lot to criticize more than commend, though there is abundant occasion for the latter and it would be far more pleasant.

I speak first of the loss that is incurred through the frequent change of teachers. I don't mean to say that such changes are not sometimes inevitable and desirable, but in general changes are harmful. When once an efficient teacher has been secured and her qualities tested in the school room every effort should be made to retain her services as long as possible. The services of good teachers are worth much more the second year than they were the first and continue to improve each year. Charlestown—a progressive community—should have the benefit of the best teachers as it may have now under the late system adopted by the state of aiding smaller towns in the matter of enabling them to retain efficient teachers.

Another suggestion is that the schools suffer somewhat from the fact that some of the children are admitted too young. Most children of five years of age are too undeveloped, physically and mentally, to do the work of

the first primary year. This is unfavorable for the scholars, it wastes the time of the teacher, and worst of all, it is really harmful to the children themselves. As a rule, children that enter school at five years of age must repeat their first year, and to repeat is a positive harm to the child. It is far better to have the child begin at six and complete the grades in eight years, without the necessity of repeating a year.

More care should be taken that at every school house the flag, the flag pole and all their simple mechanism should be kept in workable repair so that on every fair day, at every school house, the flag may be displayed. The law requires it and the children should have the benefit of it.

The Superintendent would fail in his duty if, in this report, he did not express his appreciation of the excellent work done by the full corps of teachers and the support received by him from the School Board.

Report of the Supervisor of Music

To the Supreintendent of Schools:

This year there has been little that is new to report of our method or the condition under which we work.

A special effort has been made to get more individual work particularly written syllables; in fact all exercises and songs are written before any attempt has been made to sing them.

We are offering a prize in North and South Charlestown for the greatest progress in music including sight reading, writing, and actual singing.

There will be a prize for the girl who makes the most progress in these two schools, also a prize for the boy who makes the most progress in these two schools.

At Charlestown the glee club is prehaps the greatest incentive, about thirty or forty of those who take the most interest and do good work in music from the three upper rooms are invited to stop after school and sing from ten to twenty minutes in a large chorus with Violin, etc. At these rehearsals no technical work is mentioned. Simply to sing.

We feel this organization is becoming very popular and that we may attempt to sing in public in the near future.

We try to make the child see and feel what his music study and work is all about and that he will enjoy right here in school the fruits of his study, and more, that his pleasure will be measured by approximatly the amount of effort he puts into it.

Much credit is due to our fellow teachers for their efforts to carry on our work.

Report of the Supervisor of Drawing

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my first annual report as supervisor of drawing.

The work in drawing in the Charlestown schools has been well carried on by the grade teachers with the assistance of one visit every other week from the supervisor.

In the fall we did a great deal of nature drawing in naturalistic and decorative representation with various media, in an effort to make the child see the beauties in nature, feel the lure of the common growths about us, and know something of the many ways in which to express an impression of one specimen.

During the winter term the lower grade children make use of illustrative drawing while the higher grades begin the study of object drawing, which is the hardest phase of the whole subject for the child mind to grasp. We begin the work simply in the intermediate grades, working in color, outline and silhouette, for shape and

proportion. In the upper grades the work is necessarily harder, though we try to present the subject simply and clearly, that it may be within the scope of all.

During the spring we shall devote ourselves to nature work and design, which we shall try to make interesting and practical.

Special seasons and holidays have been observed, especially in the work of the lower grades.

It has been our aim to keep the work within the scope of the child's ability, since "Nothing succeeds like success."

I thank the teachers and superintendent for their helpful and enthusiastic support. It is sympathy of this kind that gives the work an impetus.
