Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Coos County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire your commissioners present for your consideration, their report for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1909, together with a statement of the financial condition of the County at the end of the year, which is accompanied by the other reports required by law, being those of the superintendent of the county farm, jailer, clerk of the superior court, solicitor, sheriff, treasurer, auditors. Also the report of the county farm physician and chaplain, to which is added a copy of the proceedings of the County convention.

The County farm and alms house have been under the continued management of Mr. and Mrs. Fuller as superintendent and matron. They are well known to the citizens of the County and the ability and fidelity which they have displayed in the discharge of their duties, have received favorable comment from different boards of commissioners during all the years of their service, to which no word of ours need be added.

The County farm is in an excellent state of cultivation and the buildings are in good repair.

During the year we retired a County bond of \$5,000.00 leaving a bonded debt of \$35,000.00.

In conclusion we wish to publicly thank the citizens of the County, overseers of the poor and selectmen of towns who have aided us in many ways in bringing about what we consider a successful year in County affairs.

During the year informations have been filed by the solicitor under the nuisance act, and injunctions granted, in 22 cases.

In five instances where respondents were at large under suspended sentences, and the circumstances warranted such action, the solicitor has called for mittimus to commit them to jail. In three of these cases, the respondents raised the question as to the validity of a suspended sentence, and carried the question to the supreme court, but this court upheld this practice in two of these cases, and the other is now pending.

A considerable number of cases have been disposed of before the Police and Justice Courts in the different towns, and these do not appear in the above tabulation.

In the case of Coos County vs. Aubey, on the civil docket, judgment was rendered for the County at the December term.

County Convention.

CONCORD, N. H., February 23, 1909.

Agreeably to notice given the County Convention was held in Room 7 at the State House at 7.30 o'clock, P. M., Chairman O. H. Toothaker of Berlin presiding.

On roll call 24 members of the County Delegation were shown to be present.

County Commissioners Charles A. Chandler of Gorham, Miles W. Gray of Columbia, and Irving E. Bedell of Jefferson were present. Mr. Gray, of the commissioners, explained to the convention the amount which would be needed for the use of the county in the administration of its various departments for the ensuing two years, as nearly as could be estimated from past and prospective expenditures.

After some discussion W. W. Burlingame of Berlin introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption: Resolved: That the County raise the sum of \$50,000 for each of the years 1909 and 1910, to be expended in defraying the necessary county charges for each of said years.

Fred B. Spaulding of Lancaster moved to amend said resolution by adding the words: "And the County Commissioners are hereby authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$300 out of the amount raised, to complete the re-indexing of the county records." The amendment was adopted and the resolution, as amended, was then adopted.
