

# GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION PROCEEDINGS

# CONCORD, N.H. January 8, 1963

Meeting of Grafton County Delegation called to order by Chairman Larty at 2:00 p.m., in Room 306, State House, Concord, on Wednesday, January 8, 1963.

Minutes of previous meeting read by Demers of Lebanon, Clerk, pro tem.

Roll call found following present: Pryor, Chamberlin, Boutin, Stevenson, Plumer, Willey, Goodfellow, Morse, Nettleton, Hayward, Johnson of Hanover, Low, Larty, McMeekin, Hampson, Adams, Beard, Coutermarsh, Demers, Lewis, Whipple, McGee, Brummer, Martin, Park, Cushman, Bell, Smith, Barney, Anderson, Bean, Berringer, DeWolf, Johnson of Franconia, Gage, Kinghorn, Karsten, Aldrich, Bradley, Breck.

First order of business—Election of Chairman—Coutermarsh of Lebanon extended thanks to outgoing chairman, W. J. Larty of Haverhill and nominated Chamberlin of Bath, seconded by Brummer of Lisbon. Johnson of Franconia moved that nominations cease and secretary cast one vote for Chamberlin of Bath. Duly seconded and carried.

W. J. Larty thanked delegates for wonderful support of delegates during past two years.

Election of Vice Chairman—Johnson of Hanover nominated Whipple of Lebanon, seconded by Willey of Campton. Coutermarsh of Lebanon moved nominations close and clerk cast one ballot for Whipple of Lebanon as Vice Chairman; seconded by Morse of Enfield, Motion carried.

Election of Clerk—Stevenson of Bethlehem nominated Demers of Lebanon, seconded by Beard and Whipple of Lebanon. Larty of Haverhill moved that nominations cease, and chairman cast one ballot for Demers of Lebanon as clerk. Seconded by Whipple of Lebanon. Motion carried.

Election of Executive Committee—Larty of Haverhill nominated by Beard of Lebanon, seconded by Hayward of Hanover. Low of Hanover nominated by Bell of Plymouth, seconded by Whipple of Lebanon. McGee of Lincoln nominated by Stevenson of Bethlehem, seconded by Whipple of Lebanon. Plumer of Bristol nominated by Larty of Haverhill, seconded by Bell of Plymouth. Nettleton of Groton nominated by DeWolf of Alexandria, seconded by Pryor of Ashland.

Martin of Littleton moved that nominations cease and clerk cast one ballot for Larty of Haverhill, Low of Hanover, McGee of Lincoln, Plumer of Bristol and Nettleton of Groton as members of Executive for ensuing two years. Seconded by Whipple of Lebanon and unanimously carried.

Election of delegate to Extension Service for two years. It was moved by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by Bell of Plymouth that Chairman be designated to appoint delegate. Unanimously carried. Goodfellow of Dorchester was appointed by Chairman.

DeWolf of Alexandria spoke on tie of delegates from Landaff to County Convention. Brummer of Lisbon suggested that both be at next meeting and chairman get in touch with Secretary of State. McMeekin of Haverhill spoke of investigating the possibility of seating both with only  $\frac{1}{2}$  vote each.

Reports of Committees—Low of Hanover presented excellent report on needs for expansion of County Hospital facilities. After hearing this report and the recommendations of the committee, the following motion was made by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by Hayward of Hanover:

Subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the County Delegation, the County Commissioners are authorized to apply to the Federal Housing and Home Financing Agency (Communities Facilities Division) for funds to finance preliminary plan preparation for constructing an additional wing to the Grafton County Hospital, and enter into negotiation, sign any application, and do all things necessary and proper to receive Federal or State assistance to study the proposed addition to the Hospital, and to engage such architects and other assistants as may be necessary to make such application and to conduct such planning. And the Commissioners are instructed to report to the County Delegation at the next regular or special meeting of the County Delegation as to the progress of such application and plans.

Above motion carried. Meeting closed.

#### PUBLIC HEARING BUDGET

# Woodsville Court House, Woodsville, N.H. February 11, 1963, 10:00 a.m.

Public Hearing on Grafton County Budget was held on Monday, February 11, at 10:00 a.m., at the Court Room, Court House, Woodsville, New Hampshire.

Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin of Bath presided.

Those speaking or questioning items were: DeWolf of Alexandria, Smith of Plymouth, McGee of Lincoln, Pryor of Ashland, Brummer of Lisbon, McMeekin of Haverhill, Coutermarsh of Lebanon, Larty of Haverhill, Demers of Lebanon, Mr. Constance and Mr. Mann, Secretary of Municipal Association.

Mr. Rutherford of the Extension Service was called upon to present the budget for the Extension Service.

Matter of facilities at Plymouth jail discussed.

Fletcher Low of Hanover presented the report of the committee on the need for addition to the County Hospital or Infirmary. Mr. Ingram, architect, presented plan of new wing for County Infirmery.

Mr. Billings explained eligibility under Hill-Burton ( $\frac{1}{3}$ ) and Federal Housing and Home Planning Agency (Communities Facilities Division) ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ).

Recessed at 12:00 noon for lunch.

Reconvened at 1:30 in Chapel, Woodsville County Home.

Mr. Ingram further explained plans, and Mr. Bil-

lings answered questions on nursing home facilities in Grafton County and also State of New Hampshire, showing lack of adequate private facilities. Questions were asked by Willey of Campton, McMeekin of Haverhill, Brummer of Lisbon, Clement of Landaff, Lewis of Lebanon, DeWolf of Alexandria.

#### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION

Wednesday, March 13, 1963 State House Wild Life Room

Meeting was called to order at 2:35 p. m. by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin of Bath who recognized Mr. Bell of Plymouth. Mr. Bell went over the County

Budget and recommended two changes. McGee of Lincoln spoke on money needed in budget to get Federal aid on Federal Area Redevelopment program.

Letter read from Mr. Samaha requesting funds to purchase safe for Court papers as required by statute.

It was moved by McMeekin of Haverhill, seconded unanimously, that \$200.00 be added to the County Budget for purpose of purchasing a safe. Motion carried.

It was moved by McGee of Lincoln, seconded by several, that County appropriate \$3,000.00 for F.A.R.A. Motion carried.

It was moved by Coutermarsh of Lebanon the amount of \$346,077.67 be raised for taxes. Seconded by several. Motion carried. (Coutermarsh explained this amount was difference between estimated revenue of \$192,833.44 and the estimated expenditures of \$538,911.11 needed for 1963).

The Commissioners appointed the following: Mr. Clement, Mr. Bell, Mr. Shores, Mr. Chamberlin, Mr. Pryor, and Mr. Lewis to consult with Mr. Rutherford (Extension Service) to investigate the needs of Extension Service, to determine whether abandoned hospital at Haverhill would meet needs. Mr. Lewis of Lebanon spoke on this. Committee not yet ready to submit complete report.

#### GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION

May 22, 1963, Wild Life Room State House, Concord, N.H.

Delegation chairman, Edwin P. Chamberlin of Bath, called to order at 1:15 p. m. the meeting of the Grafton County Delegation held May 22, 1963 in the Wild Life Room, State House, Concord, N. H.

Chairman recognized County Commissioner Bert Shores of Lebanon who spoke of need of increasing hospital facilities at County Home. At present time there are only 34 beds which are inadequate for increasing needs of aged.

Chairman recognized Gordon Ingram, architect, of Hanover, who presented plans for construction of a fire resistant 60-bed addition to present buildings at County Home.

Mr. Fuller, Mechanic Engineer for Mr. Ingram, spoke on heating plant, boilers, etc., that would be needed for this addition—#4 oil distilate recommended.

Rep. Brummer of Bristol questioned securing money from Accelerated Public Works.

Mr. Billings of Public Health Service explained securing of funds.

Rep. McMeekin of Haverhill spoke about nursing homes.

Mrs. Little of Grafton County Home spoke on their needs.

Mr. Billings spoke on Nursing Homes which are inadequate for chronic cases requiring long term care.

It was moved by Rep. Eda Martin of Littleton, seconded by Rep. McMeekin of Haverhill and several others, that Public Hearing be held in three sections of Grafton County. Discussion ensued.

It was moved by Rep. Thomas Pryor of Ashland, seconded by Fletcher DeWolf of Alexandria, that motion be amended so as to have meetings held within 15 days.

Amendment passed. Main motion passed. Above motion adopted in its entirety.

It was noted by Johnson of Hanover that County Commissioners should contact County Attorney and immediately consult with bonding attorney.

It was moved, seconded and carried that meeting adjourn at 2:20 p. m.

Public Hearing—re: Addition to County Home at Woodsville (Infirmary)

The first in a series of Public Hearings regarding the proposed addition to the County Home at Woodsville was held on Friday evening, May 31, 1963, at the Littleton Town Hall, Littleton, New Hampshire.

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 p. m. by Representative Edwin P. Chamberlin of Bath, Chairman of delegation who immediately turned meeting over to County Commissioner George Clement of Landaff.

General discussion followed regarding proposed

addition with many questions being asked by members of the delegation as well as general public.

Mrs. Rita Little, Matron of County Home and Mrs. Evelyn Bigelow, head nurse, assisted Commissioner Clement in attempting to answer all questions.

Gordon Ingram, architect, of Hanover, spoke on need for new addition and also answered many questions.

Among questions asked were: cost of maintenance of new addition; additional hospital staff that would be needed; cost now of caring for patients in County Hospital; fee paid for welfare cases now set at \$6.00 per day; why was it set at that rate; should it not be more than \$6.00 per day; why were patients not sent to private nursing homes; could not County set up nursing home, rather than invest in new addition: type of labor that would be used in building the addition; number now being cared for in hospital section of County Home: % of town, county and welfare cases; how were cost figures arrived at; should not hospital patient care be separate from cost of care of other inmates at County Home; how would patients be fed; same kitchen or separate quarters needed; heating of new addition, etc., etc.

Delegation members in attendance—Chamberlin of Bath, Demers of Lebanon, Low of Hanover, Brummer of Lisbon, Bean of Waterville, Allard, Kelley and Martin of Littleton, Willey of Campton.

22 people present—including 9 members of delegation, Commissioner and reporter, two people from County Home.

Hearing adjourned at 9:40 p.m.

In course of discussion it was decided that McGee of Lincoln, Coutermarsh of Lebanon and Demers of Lebanon be asked to contact Senator McIntyre regarding availability of Federal Funds for this project.

It was moved, seconded and carried that meeting adjourn at 11:40 a. m.

# REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County Officials for the year ending December 31, 1963.

Welfare expenditures increased greatly during the year, much of this due to high medical payments. The board for children was increased from \$40.00 to \$45.00 per month as of January 1, 1963. We have nineteen towns taking advantage of the Surplus Foods Program. These commodities have been handled and distributed through the cooperation of the Selectmen of the individual towns.

Court expenses exceeded their appropriation due to the overdraft in the sheriff's department, over which we have no control.

Repairs and improvements at the County Farm have been made as needed and a more detailed coverage will be found in the report of the Superintendent and Matron.

Dr. L. E. McKinlay, for many years an Associate Physician at the County Hospital has completed his services there and we wish him well in his retirement. He has been replaced by Dr. Paul Choate of Monroe, N. H.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials and the State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

Other new equipment purchased for the institution was a washing machine in our laundry, a refrigerator in the employee's kitchen and an oxygen tent for the hospital.

Due to the dry weather this past year the hay crop was below normal so we purchased a small amount of hay which we feel will carry us through the year. We had a good amount of strawberries. Everyone had all they wished to eat and we froze six hundred quarts. The usual amount of freezing and canning of vegetables was done.

Besides the usual inside painting, several of the barns which had not been painted for quite a few years were done. The white trim on the main building and most of the inside of the jail was painted. The necessary repairs were made including a new water line and vacuum line in the barn. A new hot water tank for the milk room was installed.

Douglas Bigelow who had worked with Harry Hatch for several years was made Farm Manager as of June 1st this year.

At the Black and White show held during the North Haverhill Fair we had a bull calf that was Grand Champion for the Northern half of the state and he took second honors in the state at the Hopkinton Fair. Six blue ribbons and five red ribbons were won at North Haverhill fair.

The annual Christmas party was very successful. The generosity of all organizations, clubs and individuals throughout the County made it possible for all residents and patients to be well remembered. Through the kindness of Pink Granite Grange a bus was hired to transport women and men residents to view the Christmas lights and live Nativity scene at North Haverhill. For the gifts, visits, ride and many groups of carolers we say a most sincere thank you.

Church services are held each Sunday in the Chapel. Rev. Ralph Bruce conducts services the first and third Sundays, the Groton Baptist group the second and fourth Sundays. Father Gaulin holds services for all Catholics. Several other ministers in the area make calls on the Residents. All of these services and calls bring comfort to many.

Throughout the year we have received many books and magazines for which we are most grateful.

The Occupational Therapy is still under the able lea-

dership of Mrs. Marjorie Jamback. Again this year many worthwhile projects have been completed and many articles sold to the general public.

A very willing and cooperative staff is working with us and without their every effort and kindness our work would be fruitless. Our hospital is under the able direction of Dr. C. D. Eastman and Evelyn Bigelow, R. N. and their fine staff.

In closing we wish to thank the Commissioners, Mrs. Madeline Kirk, Mrs. Doris Hobbs, Dr. Eastman, the chaplains and staff for their fine cooperation and help during this past year. Especially we want to thank all employees who in so many ways worked so faithfully to carry on the work while Mr. Little was sick this past spring.

#### REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report for 1963.

The Maximum Care Unit has been very busy during 1963 as can be seen from the following census: A total of 11,710 patient days, which gives a daily census of 32.1. We have a total capacity of 33 beds and as one of these is a cell room which we try to keep empty except for psychiatric, alcoholic cases or prisoners, then it is seen that we are at full capacity. Much of the time we have a waiting list.

Among our improvements we purchased an oxygen tent which has been used on several occasions and is in use now as I write this report. This enables us to treat satisfactorily some of our heart and respiratory conditions which otherwise would have to be transferred to other hospitals.

We are still troubled with over-crowding, no storage space for our X-ray or Oxygen equipment, stretchers and many wheelchairs, etc., which a hospital of this type requires. At present they are stored in old operating room and in corridors, which is not a satisfactory permanent arrangement.

We are still sending all obstetrical and major surgical cases to general hospitals, which is the policy laid down by the State Board of Health.
