The delegation took up House Bill No. 314. An act relating to County appropriation in aid of the Elliot Hospital in Keene. Mr. Burnham and Mr. Killeen spoke against the bill. Mr. Killeen made a motion that House Bill No. 314 be reported Inexpedient to Legislate. Mr. Waling and Mr. Barton spoke in favor of the bill. Mr. Billings spoke against the bill. Mr. Bennett asked for information regarding the

bill, which was answered by Chairman Kershaw. Mr. Rhodes spoke against the bill. Mr. Burnham spoke to support the motion pending. Mr. Blake opposed the motion pending. Mr. Heald and Mr. Codding spoke on the bill. Mr. Killeen moved the previous question. A roll call was ordered. Members voting against the bill are Burnham, Maynard, Maloney, Clark, Belletete, Spofford, Bennett, Heald, Codding, Faulkner, Sherwin, Lang, Killeen, Rhodes, Billings. Absentee members voting against the bill are Landers,, Thompson. Voting for the bill are Kirk, Sweeney, Barton, Waling, Blake. Absentee members voting for the bill, Haley. Passed Kershaw.

The bill was defeated 17-6.

Mr. Faulkner on committee, made a report regarding the County purchase of a photostating machine, to photostate the records of the Registry of Deeds, and Registry of Probate. A very interesting report was made by Mr. Faulkner. A motion by Mr. Bennett that a vote of thanks be given the Committee for their splendid work, and that the matter be laid on the table until a future date.

subject to the commissioners submitting for the committee's approval a plan indicating the lines for parking spaces and the locations of entrance, and exit points. Carried.

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## REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

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To the citizens of Cheshire County:

In keeping with the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, your Commissioners are presenting herewith their annual report of the year ending December 31, 1953. Included are the reports of the County Treasurer, Solicitor, Sheriff, Clerk of Courts, Superintendent of County Farm, Master of the House of Correction, and County Auditors.

During the year ending December 31, 1953, redecorating the Court House, painting the inside, laying linoleum on Court Room floor, installing new shades, converting store room off Jury Chamber, into an office room now occupied by the Probation Department, installing signs for direction to different offices, were the major improvements made in the Court House.

7000 spruce saplings have been set out at the Farm to begin the reforestation program. Repairs at the County Farm are included in the Superintendent's report.

Costs in the Welfare Department have exceeded the appropriation, because of an increase in the number of cases and cost of board and clothing. The cost of Old Age Assistance was more than anticipated because of a larger number of cases being in convalescent homes and the increase from \$8 to \$11 per person for the State Medical Pool under OAA.

It has been necessary to add ten small children to our board and care list this year for the following reasons. In one family of four children the father was committed to the State Hospital, and in another, where there were two boys, the father deserted his family and his whereabouts are unknown. The mother in each case was judged unfit to bring up her children, by the Court. In another family of six children, the mother was committed to the State Hospital. Two of these children were committed to the Laconia State School upon recommendation of the Mental Hygiene Clinic and the other four are being boarded in foster homes by the County.

In all of these cases the parents paying in something toward the support of their children.

Clothing for the children boarded has been a big item this year and of course expense of medical care, dentistry and glasses has to be taken care of. We are still boarding two girls who are seniors in High School who wished to finish and who have worked some during vacations. It is expected they will be self-supporting as soon as they graduate.

Our Welfare Visitor has spent a great deal of time transporting children to homes, to clinics, doctors, and in securing suitable clothing for them. Many persons have been assisted by her in applying for their benefits either thru Social Security, unemployment compensation, Blue Cross, aid in Cancer cases thru the Cancer Commission, and other forms of insurance. Others have been assisted to receive aid from towns, cities or other counties where they had a settlement. Many children in Welfare families have been recommended for free hot lunches at school.

Plans were made for all County Welfare children to receive Christmas gifts and dinners which were supplied by local organizations and charities. Also on request, a suggested list was made out of needy families for Thanksgiving dinners. Confidential information following investigation, has been furnished on many clients to the State Hospital, Laconia State School, County and State offices, as well as local overseers and selectmen.

The County has taken on two cases this year for a new form of Aid, namely Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled persons (APTD) and recently two more applications have been made. The County has to pay 35% of the total grant allowed.

The Commissioners wish to express their appreciation to Superintendent, Mr. Baker, and Matron, Mrs. Sawyer, County and Town officials in helping with County affairs. We extend an invitation to the citizens of Cheshire County to visit and inspect the institution at Westmoreland.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners of Cheshire County:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report.

The past year has gone rather quickly at the County Farm. Our population has been fairly even and we had fewer deaths than usual. Also no serious outbreaks of sickness. We feel that we were fortunate in having the services of Doctors from the Keene Clinic following the death of Dr. Stevens. At this time we would like to express our appreciation of their willingness to come up here until such time as we were able to secure a regular physician. We would extend a welcome to Doctor O'Connor and our thanks for his services.

The appearance of the hospital building is much improved by our new floor coverings. They are much easier to keep clean. The old linoleums were so worn that it was impossible to keep them looking well. The new linen closet was much needed. The filing cabinet will be a big help in the office.

The slate roofs were repaired on the hospital building, the main building, the women's building and the small men's building. This was beginning to be a serious situation and was a real necessity, as was the new roof on the boiler house. There was considerable wind damage on the barn roof and also on the farm cottage that had to be fixed.

I am glad to report my satisfaction with the paint job on the house and barn at the Willard Bill place. I hope that during the coming year we can get the rest of the buildings here at the institution painted.

Both driveways have been black-topped, the north driveway coming around the cottage and meeting the black top in the back yard, also going to the north door of the women's building. The interior of the farm cottage was repainted and papered and a new linoleum put on the kitchen floor; also rubber tile installed in the bath room in the women's building.

I am also glad to report that the septic tank which was found necessary for the hospital building so late in the season, was finished and seems to be functioning properly.

The dry summer hurt our hay crop, especially the second cutting. Due to the shortage of help last spring we did not try to grow any husking corn. We did have a good crop of ensilage corn. The garden as a whole did well in spite of the dry weather and we had a very good supply of vegetables to put in the cellar for winter use.

Mr. Nowlan continues as our Chaplain with a service every month as does Mr. and Mrs. Cousins and their group from the Branch Road in Roxbury. Mr. Saarion from Harrisville has made several calls especially on our Finnish population. We certainly appreciate the efforts of all who have helped in the Spiritual life of the institution.

Our thanks to the Catholic Daughters, the Emblem Club, Saint Joseph's School, the Roger Rangers and the Community League for their help at Christmas, and to the Ladies Aid of Westmoreland and to our neighbors and friends who have thought of us and given of their efforts during the year.

We wish to convey to you our thanks for your cooperation and consideration.
