Present were Allen, Chairman; Pickett; Frost; Congdon; Haley; Ballam; and Wildey.

February 17, 1962

The annual meeting of the Cheshire County Delegation was held at the County Farm on this date. Following a tour of inspection of the County Farm buildings, and delicious roast beef dinner, the meeting was opened at 1:30 p. m. by Chairman Ballam.

The Cheshire County Commissioners, the Superintendent of the County Farm and reporters from Radio station WKNE and the Keene Evening Sentinel were invited to sit in the meeting.

The first six items of the budget (salaries) were approved as a unit.

The expenses of the Commissioners and County Attorney were accepted as read.

An explanation of the Register of Deeds, including consolidating indexes and re-binding of old books, was broken down and explained by Commissioner Barker. Commissioner Barker stated that the Register of Deeds refused to re-imburse the County, disregarding the resolution to that effect dated August 29, 1960, and made effective January 1, 1961.

Delegate Totman moved that the Executive Committee investigate the matter and take appropriate action to re-cover the amount due the County as specified. This motion was withdrawn and a substitute motion made by Mr. Pickett that the expenses of the Register of Deeds be divided, and seconded by Mr. Allen and passed. Pickett then moved and Totman seconded that the original motion be adopted and that the items be accepted as submitted subject to investigation and approval of the Executive Committee. Voted unanimously by roll call.

Register of Probate: This item accepted as read.

Sheriff's Department: After an explanation of this item it was moved by Allen, seconded by O'Neill and passed that this item be accepted as read.

Court House, including outside painting: Accepted as read.

Item for Superior Court was accepted as read.

County Farm was broken down by Commissioner Barker at the request of Delegate Frost and after motion by Turner, seconded by Miss Faulkner, it was accepted as read.

Item of Board and Care of Prisoners was accepted as read.

Surplus Commodities: After explanation by Commissioner Barker it was moved by Allen, seconded by Desmarais that the item be accepted as read and passed.

Board and Care of Children: This item was accepted as read.

The items "Aid to Dependent Soldiers", "Old Age Assist-

ance", "Aid to Totally Disabled" and Welfare Administration were accepted as read.

New equipment at the County Farm was explained by Commissioner Barker. Turner moved and Congdon seconded that these items be accepted as read. Passed.

County Farm Special Repairs: After explanation by Commissioner Barker, Pickett moved and Frost seconded this

item be accepted as read. Passed.

Court Furnishings: This item accepted as read.

The items "interest on temporary notes" "interest and payment on bond" "State Retirement", Social Security and Blue Cross were all accepted without discussion.

County Extension Service: After explanation by Frost it was moved by Allen and seconded by Frost that this item be accepted as read. Mr. Pickett wished to be recorded as voting against this motion.

Elliot Community Hospital: Delegate Totman raised the question of having the County as well as each Town contribute towards the support of the Hospital. Delegate Haley explained the reason and stressed the need for finances. Mr. Pickett moved that the Delegation accept this item as printed at this time and that the Executive Committee take up this question with the Directors of the Hospital and arrive at a suitable solution. Seconded by Congdon and passed.

Mutual Aid system of \$1,103. was accepted as read.

The Delegation expense and armory insurance were accepted as read.

The item of the TV cable for the County Farm was explained by Commissioner Barker and accepted as read.

Miscellaneous item of \$1,200. was accepted as read.

The item "Mutual Aid Network" of \$11,500. called for considerable discussion. Delegates Wildey and Frost spoke against the feasibility of appropriating any money for this item until a further study had been made. Delegate Eaton spoke in favor of this item and made a motion, seconded by O'Neill that it be accepted as read. Delegates Pickett, Allen, Hackler, Swett, Stearns and Turner all spoke on the motion. A roll call vote was requested resulting in 17 in favor and 7 opposed. Motion was carried.

Resolutions were presented and unanimously adopted in connection with the illness of Frank J. Bennett and Edward E. Brown. Resolution was also presented and unanimously adopted on the death of James B. McCullough.

Further Resolution was presented that a Committee be appointed to investigate the need, type and probable cost of a new House of Correction and jail or improving the existing House of Correction and jail at the County Farm at Westmoreland. Copy of Resolution attached herewith. The Committee shall consist of seven members as follows: Chairman Ballam, Clerk Wildey, Frost, Allen, O'Neill, Congdon, and Pickett. The Resolution was unanimously adopted.

March 17, 1962

The Executive Committee of the Cheshire County Convention met in Keene in the County Commissioners' office at 2 p. m. Present were Allen, Pickett, Haley, Frost, Wildey, Ballam.

Meeting was held in connection with the County Attorney's ruling on the appropriation for the Register of Deeds.

Motion was made by Pickett, seconded by Allen, that the report of the County Attorney be accepted. Passed.

After much discussion, reading of the Resolution concerning reimbursement to the County of the cost of the photostat machine and the reading of the opinion presented by former County Attorney Olson, the motion was passed.

Pickett then moved that the County Commissioners be instructed to inform the Register of Deeds that he must discontinue all private work on the photostat machine. Motion was seconded by Allen and unanimously passed.

Pickett then moved that the appropriation for the Register of Deeds be divided; seconded by Haley and passed.

Frost then moved that the items of \$1,972. and \$500. be adopted. Seconded by Pickett and passed.

Pickett then moved that the figures cited in the budget for the Register of Deeds of \$3,240. be allowed. Motion seconded by Haley and passed unanimously on roll call vote. This concluded the question of the Register of Deeds appropriation.

On request of Wildey regarding the legality of the use of the \$11,500. appropriation for the benefit of the Southwestern New Hampshire Mutual Aid system, it was moved by Pickett and seconded by Allen that the County Attorney be requested to rule on this matter. Motion passed.

Motion then passed that meeting adjourn.

March 31, 1962

A special meeting of the Executive Committee of the Cheshire County Delegation was called by the County Commissioners due to an emergency caused by a rupture in one of the steam boilers at the County Farm.

Present were Haley, Frost, Congdon, Allen, Ballam, Wildey, and Pickett. Also present were Commissioners Barker and Pierce, Superintendent of the County Farm, Royal McGirr, and County Attorney, John Zimmerman.

Commissioner Barker stated that Superintendent McGirr had called in reference to a rupture in the steam boiler at the County Farm and that boiler inspector had stated that if boiler continued in use it would undoubtedly blow up. Superintendent McGirr explained the situation and stated that repairs had been temporarily made but that boiler was unsafe to use. Discussion followed relative to various possibilities in correcting defects, replacing or repairing of equipment, possibilities of collecting insurance, etc. After much discussion Frost moved that an immediate survey be made by competent boiler men as to the condition of all the boilers and that estimates be furnished for both a new system including different types of heating, repairs to present boilers and status of insurance covering ruptured boiler. Seconded by Congdon and unanimously passed.

Motion then made by Pickett and seconded by Congdon that the County Commissioners be authorized to bring in an emergency heating system if found necessary. Passed unanimously.

Further meeting of the Executive Committee to be called immediately on receipt of a report of the survey.

Barker then brought up the question of the Southwestern Mutual Aid System and stated that the County Attorney ruled that the County had the right to appropriate funds for this system if by a two thirds vote of the Delegation. Written ruling by the County Attorney to follow.

County Farm, Westmoreland, N. H. June 18, 1962

Special meeting of the Executive Committee was called to consider the boiler situation at the County Farm.

The following were present: Louis Ballam, George Wildey, Forest Frost, James Allen, Laurence Pickett, Haley. Also present were Robert Galloway, Harold Pierce and Ralph Boynton.

Meeting opened at 1:30 p. m. Motion by Pickett and seconded by Haley, to allow the Superintendent of the County Farm, representative of the press and County Commissioners to be present. Passed unanimously. Letter read from Commissioner Barker regarding his inability to attend and was made part of the records.

Chairman Allen stated he had received communication from W. V. Toomey to the effect that plans submitted for bids were not complete enough to enable his firm to bid. Robert Galloway showed plans of new proposed boiler installation and explained how they were drawn. Plans included two 100 pound high pressure boilers with no changes in present piping or radiation. They did, however, specify a new condensation unit; that an allowance be made for the old unit, plus a new water softener; total cost would run from \$23/25,000. Boilers to be fired by No. 5 oil with 10,000 gallon fuel tank capacity. All equipment to be installed in accordance with the National Board of Fire Underwriters' recommendations. Galloway stated that there was nothing in the specifications to preclude any engineer's from bidding. Boilers are to be fire tube boilers.

Pickett stated there was a rumor of a conflict of interests but it was decided that no conflict did exist.

Galloway further stated price not to exceed \$1,000. included the drawing of plans and supervision of installation.

Pickett then moved that the Commissioners be instructed to receive bids and make final decision regarding the installation of new boilers. Seconded by Haley and unanimously passed.

Meeting adjourned at 2:30 p. m.

County Farm, Westmoreland, N. H. June 18, 1962

Meeting of the Study Committee regarding possible changes in the correctional institution was called to order by Chairman Frost at 2:30 p. m.

Superintendent McGirr stated that at the moment conditions were fairly satisfactory but that the correctional institution was immediately adjoining the hospital and frequently boisterous conduct of prisoners might have a detrimental effect on hospital patients: that the correctional institution should be in a different location and at the present time has no cells.

The maximum security jail is in an extremely bad location, adjoining the correctional institution, has only five cells, is entirely inadequate and according to accepted practices should be entirely separate from the correctional institution area.

The Committee, after examining conditions, agreed by unanimous vote that the County Commissioners be instructed to meet with the Chairman of the Study Committee and Superintendent of the County Farm, accept recommendations and then report their findings to the full Committee.

Meeting adjourned at 3:30 p. m.

County Court House, Keene, N. H. June 30, 1962

Public hearing relative to boilers at the County Farm was held at 2 p. m. before the Executive Committee of the County Delegation.

Present were Frost, Allen, Gongdon, Wildey, Ballam. Also present were Commissioners Barker and Pierce and Representative Robert Galloway.

The following appeared before the Committee: Gordon Wilson of the Wilson Welding Service Corp., Romeo Blau, George Wilson, Ernest Levesque.

Testimony from the above witnesses was to the effect that they objected to the proposed installation as the plans were not drawn by a licensed engineer.

Commissioner Barker stated that an emergency existed due to the failure of existing boilers at the County Farm and as directed by the Executive Committee he had ordered plans and specifications drawn for the installation of new boilers and that these were advertised for public bidding.

After much discussion as to the qualifications of Robert Galloway, a plumbing and heating contractor who had drawn the plans and specifications, the public hearing was adjourned and the Committee went into executive session at 3 p. m.

On a motion by Frost, seconded by Congdon, it was voted to approve a sum not exceeding \$29,000. plus the \$1,000. allowance for the old boilers, to be spent for installing new boilers at the County Farm.

It was further voted on a motion by Frost, seconded by Congdon, that the Commissioners be authorized if necessary to borrow an amount not exceeding \$29,000.

There have been two new boilers installed at the County Home in Westmoreland replacing the two old boilers. These are highpressure oil burning boilers and are working very satisfactorily.

There have been other improvements made, such as new sills in the main building.

There has been a new building erected to take the place of the old woodshed so-called, which was blown down in a very severe windstorm in the summer. This is now used as a garage for the helps' cars.

The Old Age assistance is increasing a little from previous years, and we also have about the same amount of children on County board and care as the previous year.

We were fortunate to get two trucks from Surplus Commodities which helps the operation of the farm a great deal. They were purchased at a very reasonable price.

We certainly miss Commissioner Ralph Boynton with his pleasant and witty remarks. He is now enjoying the winter in Florida. However, we are very fortunate in having a new Commissioner from the No. 3 district taking his place by the name of Harold E. Savage, who has had a lot of experience in town affairs. He is working out very well in the Commissioners' Office.

We appreciate all the fine work that both Mr. and Mrs. McGirr are doing at the County Home. Mr. McGirr seems to be always looking for various articles which will be of benefit to the County Home, such as articles from Surplus like trucks and various things.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners we hereby submit our annual report for the year ending December 31, 1962, for the Maplewood Hospital and Home.

This is the time for a written report, something we have gone over item by item during the past year. 1962 has been a productive year for us on the farm. Under the "green thumb" of Maurice Miller we had a wonderful vegetable garden. Not only did we freeze an ample supply of vegetables for the coming winter and daily table use, but from the surplus sale of vegetables we were able to more than cover the seed cost. Our potato harvest was just under eight hundred bushels. This is double over the preceding year.

In regard to the dairy herd addition, I wish to thank you, the Commissioners, for having our herd evaluated in such a progressive program. The purchase of such fine registered young stock will certainly have great bearing on our herd's future. Frank Mills has shown a marked improvement in the herd's milk average, also its butter fat.

The hospital unit continues its forward course - with a waiting list for admission.

The truly big job of the year was our heating plant, with the failure of the high pressure boiler and the condemnation by the insurance company. The replacement has been made, and we now have two fine oil fired boilers furnishing the institution with ample heat and power. The boiler room at this writing is not complete but should be in the near future.

We are thankful for the help of Mr. Nelson and Mr. Richards in the Soil Conservation Department and Woods and Forestry.

We are sorry to have Mr. Ralph Boynton leave us, and we take this opportunity to wish him health and happiness in his retirement and thank him for his kindness and thoughtfulness.

At this time we welcome Mr. Harold E. Savage. We know it will be a pleasure to work with him.

In summation we feel that the year has been a progressive one, and we are pleased as we know you are.

May we thank the clergy of all faiths for their spiritual care, and Dr. O'Connor, Dr. Buttrick, Dr. Murray Jr., and

Dr. Grimes and our hospital staff for their care of our patients.

To the personnel at the Court House, Sheriff Walker and his department, the County Attorney, and the many organizations who thoughtfully remembered us at Christmas, and you, the Commissioners, the residents of the hospital and home join Mrs. McGirr and myself in thanking you most sincerely.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY

To the Honorable County Commissioners for the County of Cheshire:

I hereby submit my annual report as Commissioner to Perform the Duties of County Attorney for the County of Cheshire for the calendar year 1962.

Attached to this report is a list of all cases disposed of in the Superior Court during 1962 which is broken down between felonies and misdemeanors, the latter consisting of appeals from convictions in the various Municipal Courts of the county.

In addition to the cases listed, I prosecuted numerous misdemeanors in the Municipal Courts and also represented the state on many occasions in these courts at hearings on probable cause. I have also represented the state in many juvenile court proceedings. Additionally, I have given advice and assistance to State Police, local police departments, the State Welfare Department and the Fish and Game Department as requested. The County Commissioners from time to time have asked for and have been given legal advice and assistance.

The usual number of petitions under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act have been prepared and filed in the Superior Court by me and I have represented the state in the Cheshire County Superior Court in all such petitions received from other states during the year.

A somewhat novel problem arose during the year in connection with the Southwestern New Hampshire Fire District Mutual Aid System. In that connection, I have consulted with the County Commissioners on several occasions and recently the Town of Hinsdale and some taxpayers have instituted a proceeding in the Superior Court to determine whether the System is a valid public municipal corporation and to question the authority of the county to appropriate funds for its use. The County was made a party to this proceeding and I have entered my appearance on its behalf and have filed an answer to the petition. This case is now pending on the Court Docket.

As Sheriff of Cheshire County, I herewith submit my report for the year ending December 31, 1962.

In September of 1962 this Department was fortunate in announcing twenty-four hour service to all twenty-two Towns in the County through telephone, and through two-way radio in many of the Towns. This was made possible by the County Dispatch Center which is located on Vernon Street in Keene. Complaints from the public and emergencies are handled promptly through this system which provides quick and efficient service at any time of the day or night. Many of the Towns which are not now connected by radio are making plans for this facility. This will provide close contact between all Police Officers and with the Control Center thus enabling them to coordinate efforts and provide faster and more efficient service for their constituents.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Citizens of Cheshire County and to all law enforcement agencies for their valuable cooperation and assistance throughout the year.

FIRE MUTUAL AID SYSTEM

A new emergency communications center for the benefit of the entire county is located in Keene. Efficiency of Fire Mutual Aid is greatly increased. Police two-way radio communications now available to the towns on a 24-hour basis. One telephone number 352-1100 will answer all emergency needs.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners and the Voters of Cheshire County:

The new Dispatch Center was opened September 1 operating under a County Budget and located in a newly constructed addition to the Keene Fire Headquarters provided by the City of Keene.

This Communication Center, manned around the clock, is equipped with the most modern equipment available to provide the people of our area efficient emergency service simply by calling one telephone number. Four lines handle the receipt of fire calls and Radio Tone facilities, presently installed in twenty-one Departments, make it possible for the Dispatcher to activate these local fire alarms devises from the center by radio. This eliminates the necessity of local "Red Network" Telephone systems and also will greatly speed the dispatching of fire aid to stricken areas.

Police Two-way Radio Communications is now available to the Town forces as the Center, with the aid and cooperation of the Sheriffs Department, has installed Base Station Control equipment utilizing the Sheriff's frequencys which is now available for use by Town forces. Two telephone lines, extensions from the Sheriffs office, are used at the Center for incoming Police calls as well as 352-1100. There are presently fourteen cars equipped with Police radio, three on order and many more radio units expected following Town meetings. Records show at present an average of 725 radio transmissions per month being handled at the Control Center.

All telephone calls and Radio Transmissions are recorded on permanent tapes and can be immediately played back by the Dispatcher if necessary.

Although the Year 1962 produced no large fires of great losses as has been experienced in past Years, requests for assistance at fires seemed to increase. Records for the Year show fifty-five fires at which assistance was requested. A

total of 282 pieces of fire apparatus were dispatched to effect extinguisment or protect exposed areas. An overall total of over 300 Radio transmissions for fires were handled by the Control Center.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Commissioners, their office staff, the County Sheriff and staff, and all other agencies whose fine assistance and cooperation made this a most successful year.
