Coos County Delegation

Coos County Delegation Meeting

Held January 14, 1971, in Room 118, State House, after adjournment.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Guy Fortier.

Motion was made by Rep. Hilda Brungot and seconded by Rep. Victor Kidder to elect Rep. Harry Huggins, Clerk (pro tem) due to the absence of the Clerk Rep. Chester Noyes and was voted in the affirmative.

Roll Call was taken and found all members present except Rep. Drake, Rep. Mayhew, Rep. Lee, Rep. Burns and Rep. Noyes. Rep. Lee came in shortly after roll call.

Motion was made by Rep. Gagnon and seconded by Rep. Brungot to re—elect Rep. Guy Fortier as Chairman and was voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Bouchard made a motion for Rep. Leon Dubey for Vice—Chairman and it was seconded by Rep. Hilda Brungot and was elected by majority vote.

Rep. Mabel Richardson made a motion for Chester Noyes as Clerk and was seconded by Rep. Huggins and he was declared elected by a majority vote.

Communication was read by the clerk for authorization to borrow the sum of \$450,000.00 for the next biennium.

Motion was made by Rep. Bouchard and seconded by Rep. Brungot to borrow \$450,000.00 and not to exceed this amount. It was passed by a unanimous roll call vote.

Chairman Fortier asked what action the delegation wished to take in regard to an increase in salary for the County Commissioners. It was suggested to raise their salary from \$2,000.00 to \$3,000.00 and was followed by discussion. Rep. Lee and Rep. Brungot spoke in favor and Rep. O'Hara, Rep. Richardson and Rep. Bouchard spoke in opposition.

Rep. York moved that the salaries remain at \$2,000.00 and was seconded by Rep. Bouchard. Vote was taken and eight voted "Yes" and thirteen voted "No" and the chairman declared the vote lost.

Rep. Kidder moved to raise the salary from \$2,000.00 to \$2,500.00 and it was seconded by Rep McCuin and Rep. Brungot and to have it retroactive to January 1, 1971. This was voted and passed by a voice vote. A roll call was requested and it was passed with fifteen (15) members voting "Yes" and six (6) members voting "No". The "Yes" votes were Rep. Cook, Huggins, Bushey, Hunt, Lee, Fortier, Roy, Studd, Brungot, McCuin, Oswell, Bouchard, Gagnon, Theriault, and Kidder. Voting "No" was O'Hara, Oleson, Disilets, York and Richardson.

Chairman Fortier asked what action they wished to take in regard to the salary of the County Attorney. Motion was made by Rep. Mable Richardson and seconded by Rep. Bouchard for a \$200.00 increase. Discussion followed and Rep. Richardson withdrew her motion and moved to increase the salary for County Attorney from \$3,000.00 to \$3,500.00 and it was seconded by Rep. Lee. Vote was taken and passed by a majority vote.

The County Commissioners asked to have the name of the Coos County Hospital changed to a more suitable name. The delegation voted to let the County Commissioners select an appropriate name.

Motion was made by Rep. Hilda Brungot and was seconded by Rep. Gagnon to have bills drawn up to cover salary changes and name for the hospital for legislation. Vote was taken in the affirmative and so declared by the chairman.

The Chairman read a list of members recommended for the finance committee as follows: Rep. Leon Dubey, Rep. Chester Noyes, Rep. Otto Oleson, Rep. Fortier, Brungot, Gagnon, Richardson, Lee, Roy, Huggins, and Hunt. Motion was made by Rep. Hunt for the above names listed and was seconded by Rep. Mabel Richardson and was passed by a unanimous vote.

Rep. York asked if any report had been received from the audit by the Tax Commission and the chairman replied there had been none to his knowledge.

Motion was made to adjourn by Rep. Gagnon and seconded by Rep. Oleson and was so voted.

The 1971 budget was discussed which will be acted upon March 6, 1971 by the delegation.

Coos County Delegation Meeting

The annual meeting of the Coos County Delegation met at the Coos County Farm March 6, 1971 at 11:00 A. M.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Guy Fortier and by roll call found the following members present: Chairman Guy Fortier, Roland Cook, Harry F. Huggins, Chester Noyes, Walter Bushey, Roger Hunt, Robert Mayhew, Arthur Drake, Dana Lee, Harold Burns, Richard O'Hara, Leon Dubey, Edgar Roy, George Studd, Elmer York, Hilda Brungot, Percy McCuin, George Oswell, Arthur Bouchard, Rebecca Gagnon, Romeo Theriault, Victor Kidder, and Mabel Richardson. Members absent were Otto Oleson and Romeo Desilets.

Rep. Chester Noyes asked the delegation to accept his resignation as clerk. Rep. Drake made a motion to accept his resignation and was seconded by Rep. Bushey and voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Chester Noyes made a motion to elect Harry Huggins as Clerk and it was seconded by Rep. Brungot and voted in the affirmative.

The budget as submitted by the commissioners was read by the Chairman, Guy Fortier and discussed by the delegation.

Several members asked questions about the budget and ex-

planations given by either the County Commissioners or the Superintendent of the Coos County Farm. Sheriff Martineau gave a report on the sheriff's department.

Mr. Daniel Webster and Mr. Benjamin Thompson spoke in regard to the Governor's Crime Commission.

Attorney Fred Harrigan spoke on legal fees and expenses being covered by law and urged the need of repair to the Lancaster Court House,

Register of Deeds, Warren Bartlett, spoke on deed index and reason for same. Supt. Bouchard gave a breakdown on expense of nursing home and operation of same and needs as shown in the budget.

Mr. Willard Bean, member of Council on Extension Services, spoke on the item of extension service.

Mr. Peter Pond spoke on the Jefferson Plan which concerned crime and asked that a minimum of \$1,380.00 be considered for same.

Chairman Fortier declared a recess for one hour for lunch.

Meeting was called to order and business resumed. After some discussion the Chairman asked that the delegation go into executive session and the non-members retired.

After some discussion Rep. Burns suggested that another meeting of the delegation be held at a later date in Concord, N. H. to enable some further study to be made concerning the budget. The Chairman was asked to set up a sub-committee for such a meeting. Rep. Burns put this in a motion and it was seconded by Rep. York and was passed by a roll call vote of twenty in favor and two opposed. Rep. Noyes, Bushey, Hunt, Mayhew, Drake, Lee, Burns, O'Hara, Dubey, Roy, Studd, York, Brungot, McCuin, Oswell, Bouchard, Gagnon, Theriault, Kidder and Richardson, voting "Yes" and Rep. Cook and Fortier voting "No".

Rep. Brungot made a motion to accept the item of \$30,000.00 for a home for the superintendent and was seconded by Rep. Theriault. After some discussion it was voted in the affirmative with Rep. Dubey asking to be recorded as voting "no".

The proposed budget for Coos County Extension Service was

discussed and Rep. Drake made a motion that the money for CRD Area Agent of \$2,000.00 be earmarked as matching funds and if it was not matched it could not be used and was seconded by Rep. Oswell and voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Drake addressed the delegation concerning the budget and asked that reductions be made as follows:

Institutions be reduced from Nursing Home be reduced	\$283,131. to	275,131. or	8,000.
from	200,170. to	195,170. or	5,000.
Crime Abatement reduced from	10.000. to	6,000. or	4.000.
Nursing Home beds, hand-	,	.,	.,
rails, and equipment be reduced from	14,976. to	10,976. or	4,000.

Rep. Drake moved that these reductions be made in the budget and was seconded by Rep. York. These items were voted on separately and the first three items mentioned were voted in the affirmative, but the vote on Nursing Home beds etc. was voted in the negative by a roll call vote nine members voting in favor and eleven opposed.

Rep. Drake made a motion to reconsider the vote on the Superintendent Home for \$30,000.00 and was seconded by Rep. Dubey and Rep. York and was voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Drake moved that we raise \$15,000.00 this year and the remaining \$15,000.00 by bonds or notes and included as estimated revenue and was seconded by Rep. York and voted in the affirmative.

Chairman Fortier declared the Delegation Meeting at recess until a meeting was called in Concord at some future date.

April 6, 1971

Coos County Delegation Meeting

Meeting was called to order at the State House, Room 108 at 1:00 P. M. by Chairman, Guy Fortier.

Roll Call found all members present except Rep. Drake, Rep. Noyes, and Rep. Desilets.

Rep. Burns, sub-committee chairman gave a report as the result of a meeting with the Crime Commission and found that any change in salary for the Sheriff or Deputy Sheriffs could not be made without an act of legislature. He recommended that the fees be returned to the County and the Sheriff's salary be \$9500.00 and his deputies would get a salary, but no fees and if it was accepted it would include three cruisers for the Sheriff's Department.

Rep. Dubey suggested leaving it the same as last year and not make any change in the budget.

Rep. York recommended accepting the proposal for the Sheriff's Department if the funds were available, but not until such time. He stated this would save the County about \$2000. but a bill would have to be put through legislature to make any change in their salaries. He stated that \$22,827.75 was requested for the proposal but a large percentage would be paid by the federal funds through the Crime Commission.

Rep. Burns suggested accepting the budget as is and apply for the funds and introduce the necessary legislation and this could be taken up at the next annual delegation meeting.

The present budget as reduced called for \$1,076,900.00 with an anticipated revenue of \$514,501.46, leaving a balance of \$562,398.54 to be raised by taxation.

Rep. Cook made a motion to accept the budget and it was seconded by Rep. Brungot. After some discussion it was voted in the affirmative by a unanimous vote.

Rep. Mayhew moved that the delegation instruct the committee to submit a bill to enable the delegation to set the salary of the Sheriff and the Deputy Sheriffs and apply for the Crime Commission Funds to establish a full time Sheriff's Department and it was seconded by Rep. York.

Rep. O'Hara asked to amend Rep. Mayhew's amendment to include all county officers salaries.

The delegation then voted on the Mayhew amendment and it was passed by a unanimous vote.

The meeting was adjourned and so declared by the Chairman.

Finance Committee Meeting

The Finance Committee of the Coos County Delegation met at the Coos County Farm at West Stewartstown, New Hampshire, at 11:00 A. M., to act upon the expenditures for the first quarter of 1971.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman, Guy Fortier. Roll call found all members present except Rep. Oleson and Rep. Richardson.

Chairman Fortier went over the expenditures of the first quarter as presented by the County Commissioners.

Commissioner, Norman Brungot, read a letter in regard to the increase in fees for the Medical Referee and stated that this was passed by the special session of legislature in 1970 and became effective July 3rd, 1970.

A communication was read from Mr. Robert Rich, Clerk of the Superior Court, requesting a check of \$380.00, the balance due on a bill for equipment, which was in excess of the amount allocated in the budget. Discussion followed and a motion was made by Rep. Dubey and seconded by Rep. Gagnon that the

clerk send a letter to Mr. Rich and to the Sheriff instructing them to contact the Finance Committee and the County Commissioners before spending any money in excess of what is in the budget. The vote was unanimously in favor.

Rep. Dubey moved that the bill be tabled until the commissioners inquired into the matter and got an explanation and it was seconded by Rep. Hunt and voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Brungot moved to accept the report and it was seconded by Rep. Gagnon and voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Hunt moved to adjourn and it was seconded by Rep. Dubey, and meeting adjourned at 12:05 P. M.

Finance Committee Meeting

The Coos County Finance Committee held its second quarterly meeting, August 7, 1971, at the County Farm, West Stewartstown, New Hampshire.

Meeting was called to order at 11:00 A. M. by Chairman, Guy Fortier. Roll Call found all members present.

The second quarterly report was read and discussed as follows: Berlin Court House expense was discussed and an explanation was given by Commissioner Bergeron that the furnace and extra heating for the Extension Service School was the main reason for the extra cost at this time.

Rep. Dubey asked that Commissioner Bergeron give a detailed report for the next meeting.

Rep. Richardson moved that when an overdraft occurs the County Commissioners bring in an itemized account to be turned over to the Finance Committee on any specials such as repair work and was seconded by Rep. Dubey. Vote was taken and passed by a voice vote.

Commissioner Brungot explained expenses concerning Institutions Farm Jail, Nurses etc., and mentioned that some of this had been turned over to the State.

A letter was read from the Director of The Crime Commission where there was a balance due of \$380.00. Commissioner Brungot said the Crime Abatement Office in Plymouth, New Hampshire, had billed the County \$375.00 for their part in office expense. A motion was made by Rep. Brungot and seconded by Rep. Richardson that the Commissioners be instructed to pay the \$380.00 due the Crime Commission and the \$375.00 due the Crime Abatement Office Space and was voted in the affirmative.

Mr. Thompson from the Crime Commission Office explained about some changes which had been made. One regional Council would take the place of a thirty man board and the County would have to pay 25% of the rent and 25% of the office expense.

Rep. Brungot made a motion to accept the Commissioners Report and it was seconded by Rep. Hunt and voted in the affirmative.

Rep. Brungot moved that the meeting be adjourned and was duly seconded by Rep. Gagnon. Meeting adjourned at 12:45 P. M.

Finance Committee Meeting

The Coos County Finance Committee held the third Quarterly Meeting, October 30, 1971, at the Coos County Farm, West Stewartstown, New Hampshire.

Meeting was called to order at 11:00 A. M. by Chairman Fortier.

Roll Call found Chairman Guy Fortier, Vice—Chairman Leon Dubey, Clerk Harry Huggins and Representatives Hunt, Lee, Oleson, Brungot, Gagnon, and Roy present. Also Commissioners Brungot and Bergeron.

Card of thanks was read from the Richardson family for flowers sent by the delegation.

Letter was read from Monroe Brooks, 4H Agent, asking if they might meet with the delegation to show slides from the Extension Service to give the members an idea concerning their work.

Rep. Brungot made a motion and was seconded by Rep. Roy that the clerk write Mr. Brooks and inform him that he could meet with us at our next finance meeting and he would be given thirty minutes to show his slides. It was voted favorable by the committee.

The expenditures for the third quarter was taken up at this time.

Discussion followed:

A letter was read from Mr. Thompson of Hanover, New Hampshire, in regard to the \$385.00 paid for Sheriff's radios and requesting \$250.00 for travel.

Commissioner Brungot asked for approval to use \$800.00 to \$900.00 to finish the slaughter house, which was required to meet the state requirements.

After some discussion it was decided the \$250.00 for travel was an obligation which would have to be met. And the money for the slaughter house was approved by the committee.

Commissioner Bergeron mentioned he had received \$875.00 insurance for damage to the Berlln Court House and asked what should be done with it. Rep. Brungot made a motion and it was seconded by Rep. Dubey that the money be held by the Coos County Government and a committee be appointed to investigate the need and cost of these repairs and report to the first Coos County Committee Meeting in 1972 and was voted in the affirmative.

Recess was declared for lunch at 1:45 P. M.

Meeting called to order at 2:15 P. M. and business resumed.

The following committee was appointed. Chairman Fortier, Vice—Chairman Dubey and Clerk Harry Huggins.

Superintendent Bouchard explained need for a communications system between the jail and the house and that the Crime Abatement Commission would pay at least fifty percent of the cost and it need not exceed \$100.00 for the County. Rep. Hunt moved that \$100.00 be expended for same and was seconded by Rep. Dubey and the vote was unanimous.

Commissioners were asked to inquire of the County Attorney as to the per diem pay raise for the delegation.

Berlin Court House was discussed and an explanation given by Commissioner Bergeron concerning damages to the court house. Rep. Dubey made a motion and seconded by Rep. Gagnon that the same committee be appointed to investigate the damage done by steam and it was voted favorably.

Rep. Brungot moved that the quarterly report and reimbursements be accepted and it was voted favorable.

Chairman Fortier brought up the lease on the house used by the Hand family and it was discussed. Lease expires August 10, 1972 and the subject was left to a later date.

Motion to adjourn by Rep. Roy and seconded by Rep. Dubey and the meeting adjourned at 3:00 P. M.

Finance Committee Meeting

The Coos County Finance Committee held a meeting at the Berlin Court House, in Berlin, New Hampshire, December 4, 1971.

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Fortier to see what action the committee would take in regard to the request by Sheriff Martineau to expend a special appropriation for radios and equipment for his department.

Members present were Fortier, Dubey, Huggins, Hunt, Oleson, Brungot, Roy and Richardson.

At this time Sheriff Martineau made his request for a radio for his office with remote control, four portable radios, battery charger, crystals for four channels and antenna hookup on Cates Hill and equipment necessary for installation through the Crime Commission. The total cost would be \$5,785.00 of which \$1,445.00 would be paid by the County.

Sheriff Martineau was questioned as to the need of all of this equipment and was discussed by the committee.

Rep. Brungot made a motion to have the Sheriff find out if the order could be cut down and eliminate the four portable radios, charger etc. which would bring the cost down to \$951.00. or approximately \$240.00 for the County share and if so to allow the Sheriff and Commissioners to order same. Seconded by Rep. Richardson. Voted in favor with Rep. Dubey voting "no".

Rep. Brungot moved for adjournment and was seconded by Rep. Hunt. Meeting adjourned at 3:10 P. M.

Report of County Commissioners

To the Citizens of Coos County:

Coos County Government continues to be very active. The nursing home has expanded from the thirty-five bed hospital to the present eighty-two nursing beds with plans to continue the expansion to one hundred beds.

The new residence for use of the superintendent has been completed and will be ready for occupancy in the near future. This will make available space for seven more beds in the nursing home

A survey of sewerage facilities is underway in cooperation with the town of Stewartstown. It is hoped that from this survey, one facility can be constructed to meet the needs of both the County Nursing Home and the Town of Stewartstown.

A new slaughterhouse has been completed at the County Farm and is now in use, all in compliance with State and Federal regulations.

The new highway by-passing the nursing home has been completed, but no settlement on land damage with the State has been made. The claim has been turned over to the County Attorney for Superior Court action.

Repairs to the Court House in Lancaster have been partially completed up to the amount of money appropriated. It is hoped that the repair work will continue as planned next year.

New oil burners were installed in the Berlin Court House following an explosion that did considerable smoke damage to the basement area of the building.

We wish to express our deep appreciation to the County delegation and all County personnel for their splendid cooperation during the past year.
