Dear Members of the Class of 1970 and 1971,

Your class has certainly achieved some wonderful personal and professional milestones over these past 50 years, and both you and UNH have seen a good deal of change since you graduated. You have also witnessed dramatic changes in society and culture—along with a pandemic that may have made this past year feel like 50.

If there is a silver lining to the pandemic, it is that it shows us how much we cherish and rely on our personal, face-to-face connections with friends and family, as well as the opportunities we have to revisit the special places that shaped our lives. I am so grateful to you for remaining engaged with your class and with UNH, and I am proud to welcome you back home to reunite with your Wildcat family.

Your class attended UNH through an era marked by historic events: The assassinations of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Robert F. Kennedy, and the escalation of The Vietnam War, when young men at UNH watched as birthdays were pulled in the nationally televised draft lottery. Three of the Chicago Seven anti-war activists spoke to thousands of students who packed the UNH Field House, one day after a student protest at Kent State turned deadly when National Guard troops opened fire.

It was also pivotal era of innovation in science and culture. Shortly before your senior year began, Apollo 11 landed a man on the Moon, and some 400,000 people attended a music festival near Woodstock, New York. Vinyl LPs featuring Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, The Who, The Beatles and so many other greats blared from our dorms.

I hope that this Golden Granite yearbook brings back great memories of the friends you made, the faculty mentors who inspired you and the experiences that helped define who you are today.

I encourage you to explore the Durham campus as well, and to see the remarkable transformation it has undergone. The university now includes UNH Manchester, our innovative urban campus, and the UNH Franklin Pierce School of Law in Concord, among the top 10 for intellectual property law. Joining these are new, interdisciplinary schools dedicated to business, marine science and ocean engineering and public policy.

Thank you for the warmth and compassion you share with one another, and for your commitment to helping the next generation of Wildcats. I wish you the very best for a safe, healthy, and rewarding 50th reunion.

Dear 1970 Classmates,

We have arrived at an age when all of us have been touched, in one way or another, by life; we each have a unique perspective of our “journey” and for those people we have met along the way. As such, thank you to those who have contributed your “stories” to the Granite. We hope that everyone has an opportunity to read them. Who knows? Perhaps it can begin or rekindle a friendship or two – or once again, strengthen the connection that all of us share.

OF DARK CLOUDS AND SILVER LININGS: FIFTY YEARS APART

The UNH Class of 1970 ended its four college years with a disruptive strike in protest of what many viewed as an unjust war, upending regular schedules, and cancelling classes, exams, and events. Fifty years later, we had to postpone our reunion due to an historic pandemic which changed the lives and routines of everyone. Both events were dark clouds in what should have been sunny skies, and I submit, both had “silver linings.”

Without minimizing at all the pain experienced by those who lost loved ones in the Viet Nam War or to the Covid-19 pandemic, or those whose lives and careers were permanently disrupted, looking for the positives in both experiences, and how our perspective on them has changed in a half century, may be instructive.

I recall a conversation with UNH President John W. McConnell, that wise and calm presence presiding over us as students. I told him I worried that the 1970 protests and events would lead to the end of our world as we knew it. He replied, “Brad, I have seen people predict the end of the world three times already in my life. We shall get through this fine.” John McConnell was 61 years old in 1970.

This year it has been our chance, as the adults ten or so years older than 61, to assure the young, who missed their high school senior weeks, had a different senior year in college or are experiencing a different freshman year, or have had other disruptions they consider catastrophic, that they will get through this, too, just like we got through 1970, Watergate, Viet Nam, 9-11, recessions, impeachments, and wars and scandals. Perspective is a silver lining, if you think about it.

People have had the chance to stop, stay home, think, and appreciate the routine parts of life we had to miss: seeing family, group dinners, sporting events, exercise, in-person worship...almost everything. We will appreciate them more when they resume, and hopefully be more selective in which to partake.

Comparing the average young family’s activities before the pandemic with those of fifty years ago, my observation at least is that they have tried to pack too much into lives, for fear they will miss something important. The pandemic has required a “time out, stay home, and get to know each other” experience which has to be positive for many, as they and we consider what is really important.

1970’s events and the current ones have given many the chance to examine many of the assumptions we have about the role of government, of institutions, of personal rights, and the value of our normal freedom of action. It would be a silver lining this time if we



learn from this what all our institutions should look like when we come out of this, how they should function, and what policies should be in place.

For the Class of 1970, there are several unique silver linings to the dark cloud of having the reunion postponed:

- We get to think about and plan for it for another year, allowing many of us to communicate more with each other than we otherwise would have.
- We get to celebrate next June, hopefully, with our friends (and in many cases, like mine, with our spouses) from the Class of 1971.
- We in New Hampshire, and wherever else we live, had the chance to see and appreciate our Class President Bill Gardner in his role as the senior Secretary of State in the county and its most experienced election official, help us and other states plan for and preside over a most significant election under trying circumstances.
- We have an extra year to get people to come to the reunion!

So, while no one would have wished for the 1970 national events which divided us, and no one would ever wish a pandemic on our nation or the world again, reflecting on the positive aspects, what is really important, and what we learned and can learn from each is the ultimate silver lining—just as learning from all the other events of the last half century have been for the Class of 1970.

Stay safe—see you in June.

Catching Up On Life: In my sophomore year, my writing teacher, Don Murray, suggested I try to get an assignment from the editors at The New Hampshire. They gave me the one no one else wanted: covering the annual livestock fair at the Agricultural school. I got myself out of bed early one day, walked the mile or two to the school and wrote a story about cows, sheep and pigs. It was good enough to publish, get me my first byline and hook me on what has been my life's work since that day until now. I have been a reporter, editor and publisher at news outlets in Massachusetts, Florida and Maine, at newspapers owned by Dow Jones-Ottaway, Tribune and the Seattle Times Co. As a reporter, I specialized in political and investigative reporting, including five years in the Massachusetts State House. About one quarter of my career was on the business side, as VP for strategic planning at the South Florida Sun Sentinel (Tribune) and publisher of two daily papers in Maine owned by the Seattle Times. When I retired from those papers (Kennebec Journal and Morning Sentinel), I founded, with my wife, the Maine Center for Public Interest Reporting, a non-profit investigative news service. In 2017, we moved from Maine to Gloucester, Mass., where I began my career after graduation. While I still consult with the Center, I spent most of the past few years completing a memoir, *Prince of Wentworth Street: An American boyhood in the shadow of a genocide*, which was published in April. Most of the book takes place in Dover and includes chapters on my years at UNH. I was married for 36 years to UNH graduate, Janet Ginny Pinsince. We were divorced in 2008. She passed away in 2015. We had one child, Nicholas, who lives not far from me, in Beverly, MA. I was remarried in 2010 to fellow journalist Naomi Schalit. I was born in Dover, graduated from St. Thomas Aquinas High School, class of 1965. I have lived in Beverly and Gloucester, Mass., Boca Raton, Florida, Winthrop and Hallowell, Maine. Now I am back in Gloucester, which I consider my adopted hometown.

Favorite UNH Memory: Late nights putting out the next edition of The New Hampshire; toga party at Lambda Chi.

Most Useful Things I Learned at UNH: How to write a news story, how to put out a newspaper, and critical thinking.

You May Be Surprised to Know: To get the story I have jumped out a plane, gone undercover at a state mental hospital and walked the greasy pole at the annual fisherman's festival in Gloucester, MA.
