

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1938

TOWN OF HAMPTON STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the eighth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, health department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town. Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be used by the Tercentenary Committee for the celebration of the 300th Anniversary of the Town of Hampton.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote a discount of 3% on current year's taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1938.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the preparation of a town map.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Hampton Associates, Inc., a deed to and maintain as a highway a certain tract of land 49.5 feet wide running from the southerly end of Towle Avenue to the Winnicummet Road, providing the Hampton Associates, Inc., first build a road over said land.

Article 9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent or taxes, or both.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept from the owners and abutters thereof; lay out and maintain, as a highway, Moulton Road, so called, staked out 50 feet wide; running from Winnicummet Road at Young's Corner, 1800 feet to High Street.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install a hydrant midway of Ann's Lane.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for one thousand feet of new hose for the Fire Department.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate

A. The sum of \$1100 for the dividing of Circuit No. 4 of the fire alarm system and for the installation of a new box on the Landing Road.

B. The sum of \$275 for a new portable fire pump.

C. The sum of \$300 for the maintenance of the fire alarm system.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town, in co-operation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$465.00.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

Resolved: that we, the citizens of the town of Hampton in town meeting assembled do hereby declare that we believe that Eunice (Goody) Cole was unjustly accused of witchcraft and of familiarity with the devil in the seventeenth century, and we do hereby restore to the said Eunice (Goody) Cole her rightful place as a citizen of the town of Hampton. Be it further resolved: that at such time as the Selectmen shall elect during the Tercentenary of the town of Hampton, appropriate and fitting ceremonies shall be

held to carry out the purposes of this resolution by publicly burning certified copies of all official documents relating to the false accusations against Eunice (Goody) Cole, and that the burned documents together with soil from the reputed last resting places and from the site of the home of Eunice (Goody) Cole be gathered in an urn and reverently placed in the ground at such place in the town of Hampton as the Selectmen shall designate.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to sell R. H. Lovely a strip of land near the incinerator plant.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

SEPTEMBER, 1938

TOWN OF HAMPTON

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, County of Rockingham, and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Thursday, the first day of September, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. Upon a petition of George Ashworth and forty-nine other legal voters of the Town of Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute a Quitclaim Deed to the United States of America, granting to the said United States of America, the right of use and occupancy for coast guard purposes of a certain tract or parcel of land located in said Hampton, said use and occupancy to include the right to construct, enect and maintain thereon a life-saving or life-boat station and other structures incidental to and necessary for said use and occupancy, togeher with the said right to remove the same during said occupancy or within a reasonable time thereafter, said tract of land being a certain triangular tract, bounded and described as follows:

"All that tract or parcel of land in Hampton Beach, County of Rockingham, and State of New Hampshire described as follows: beginning at a point in the southwesterly side of Dover Avenue, which point is distant approximately two hundred forty-one (241) feet southeastwardly from the intersection of the southwesterly side of Dover Avenue with the southeasterly side of River Avenue, and is likewise located North fifty-two degrees (520) fifty-four minutes (54') fifty-five seconds (55") East approximately two hundred thirty-eight (238) feet from a concrete bound state marker; thence, from the point of beginning so found, North fifty-two degrees (52%) fiftyfour minutes (54", fifty-five seconds (55") East a distance of approximately one hundred forty-two (142) feet to a concrete bound state marker; thence, at an interior angle of forty-three degrees (430) eleven minutes (11') no secends from the last mentioned course, and running South nine degrees (9°) forty-three minutes (43') fifty-five seconds (55") West a distance of two hundred ninety-five and eighteen one-hundredths (295.18) feet to a point; thence, at an interior angle of eighty-five degrees (85°) fifty-six minutes (56') no seconds from the last mentioned course, and running North sevnty-six degrees (76°) twelve minutes (12') five seconds (05") West a distance of two hundred sixty and thirty-six one-hundredths (260.36) feet to a concrete bound state marker, which last mentioned point likewise bears North seventy-two degrees (720) eighteen minutes (18') fifty-five seconds (55") East a distance of five hundred twelve and thirty-seven one-hundredths (512.37) feet from another concrete bound state marker: thence at an interior angle of fifty degrees (50°) fifty-three minutes (53') no seconds from the third course, and running North fifty-two degrees (520) fifty-four minutes (54') fifty-five seconds (55") East a distance of approximately two hundred thirty-eight (238) feet to the point or place of beginning; as shown by "Survey of Proposed Site for Hampton Beach Station," dated August 6, 1938, made by United States Coast Guard, Office of Division Civil Engineer, Boston, Massachusetts; together with the improvements thereon."

Said Quitclaim deed to contain a clause to the effect

that in giving said deed the said Town of Hampton in no way releases any of the conditions or restrictions set forth in the aforesaid deed from the Town of Hampton to the State of New Hampshire in so far as the remaining tracts of land contained in said deed are concerned or to this particular tract in the event of its abandonment by the United States of America for coast guard purposes and this deed shall be effective only for so long as it does not act as a release of said conditions or restrictions.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, N. H., in the County of Rockingham, in said State Qualified to Vote:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 1938, at Ten O'Clock in the Forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring in your votes for Governor, United States Senator, Representative to Congress, Councilor, Senator, Sheriff, Solicitor, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Register of Probate, Three County Commissioners, Representative to the General Court, Supervisors of the Checklists, Moderator.

Article 2. To vote on the following questions:

(a) "Shall state stores be operated by permission of the State Liquor Commission in this town, under the provisions of 'An Act to regulate the traffic in intoxicating liquor' passed at the 1934 special session of the general court?"

(b) "Shall beverages be sold in this town under permits granted by the State Liquor Commission under the provisions of Chapter 99 of the Laws of 1933, and amendments thereto?"

Article 3. To vote on the following questions:

1. Do you approve of amending the Constitution so as to empower the Legislature to provide for absentee voting, by voters who are unable to vote at their regular polling places, on any question or in the choice of any officers at biennial elections? 2. Do you approve of amending the Constitution so as to require that the net revenues derived by the state from the operation of motor vehicles, including the gasoline road toll, shall be appropriated and used exclusively for highway purposes?

3. Do you approve of amending the Constitution so as to empower the Legislature to define the word "paupers" as used in the Constitutional provision withholding from paupers the right to vote?

4. Do you approve of amending the Constitution so as to empower the Legislature, for the purposes of enccuraging conservation of forest resources and development of industry and business, avoiding an excessive burden of real estate, and equalizing tax burdens, (a) to classify and tax at special rates growing wood and timber, stock in t ade and machinery, (b) to tax sales of particular luxuries and commodities except foods, clothing and medicine, (c) to impose graduated taxes on property passing at death with reasonable classifications and exemptions, and varied according to relationship, and (d) to impose graduated taxes on incomes with reasonable classifications and exemptions, at rates never higher than six per cent?

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday the 14th day of March, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by Australian Ballot one Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and three Auditors.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries and expenses, election and registration, municipal court, care and supplies for Town Hall, police department, fire department, moth department, highways and bridges, street lighting, library, town poor, Memorial Day, parks and playgrounds, cemetery, sewer department, sidewalks, comfort station, breakwater, town notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the town.

Article 4. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and apropriate the sum of \$500.00 to carry on the preparation of the town map.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax deeds.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take action according to the terms of leases against certain or all lease owners leasing land from the town of Hampton who have not paid their ground rent, or taxes, or both.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen to sell gravel pits.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the installation of a sewer on Ross Avenue and Charles Street.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$267.29 for State Aid roads, if the State contributes \$1069.15.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and advantages of the town in co-operation with other towns co-ordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$515.00.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$2500.00 to gravel and oil the Moulton Road from High Street to the Winni-cummet Road.

Article 13. On petition of Ellsworth D. Spinney and sixty other voters to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to complete the Park, now under construction, at the Five Corners in said Hampton.

Article 14. On petition of Ellsworth D. Spinney and twenty other voters to vote on the following article: That the traffic on High Street has increased to such an extent that it has become necessary for the safety of pedestrians, that a sidewalk be built from the Four Corners to the Coast Guard Station, that a sufficient sum of money be raised and appropriated for this purpose.

Article 15. On petition of Ellsworth D. Cushman and eighteen other voters to see if the town will vote to extend the sewerage system around Great Boar's Head and to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient for that purpose.

Article 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for an ambulance.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to buy land of C. S. Toppan to straighten the line of Memorial Park, the same to be a charge on the Park appropriation.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to buy the land in the Depot Yard, so called, if the Boston and Maine Railroad decides to sell the same, the same to be charge to the cash balance.

Article 19. To see if the voters of the Town of Hampton will adopt the following resolution with reference to the duties of police officers. Be it resolved, that the voters of the Town of Hampton in annual Town meeting assembled on March 14, 1939, instruct and order the present Board of Selectmen, and all future Boards of Selectmen to forbid, under pain or dismissal, all police officers regular or special whose names appear on the pay roll of the Town of Hampton, to spend any portion of their time or use their automobiles, or automobiles belonging to the Town of Hampton for the purpose of bringing voters other than members of their immediate family to the polls to vote for any candidate, for any office either local, county, state, or national, or to vote for any other purpose.

And be it further resolved, that no selectman shall be appointed a police officer while serving as selectman and that the Hampton Police uniform be respected and restricted from any use other than official duty.

Article 20. Be it resolved that from this date henceforth no selectman of the Town of Hampton shall collect any sum from the Special Activities appropriation, unless same is itemized and printed in Town report.

Article 21. To see if the Town of Hampton will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 for printing with corrections Town Valuation Books.

Inasmuch as the present supply of books on the valuation of Resident and Non-resident property taxpayers is exhausted the last issue of which was printed ten years. ago.

Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hampton, N. H.:

I have the honor of presenting to you nerewith, my annual report as Superintendent of your schools. This report covers the statistics for the school year from July 1, 1937 to June 30, 1938—the last completed school year. Some mention will also be made of the first half of the current year.

The school year began on September 7, 1938 with an enrollment of 378 pupils. This is a gain of eight pupils over the enrollment of September 1937 and reflects the customary gradual increase of recent years. Of this total of 378 pupils 86 are in Hampton Academy and 292 in the Centre School. The September registration in the first six grades is 198. The fact that we now have a teacher for each grade has helped greatly in keeping to a high standard the level of work done. The teacher load now averages 33 instead of the former 36. The percent of attendance maintains its level at 95%. This is Hampton's usual figure. Since we have each year a period when many pupils are compelled to be absent because of illness, this percentage is very satisfactory. This number of pupils on the attendance honor roll increased from 26 of last year to 39 this year. These two facts indicate a healthy attitude on the part of our children.

The Teaching Staff

Hampton Academy now employs five teachers and the Hampton School District thirteen. These figures include a teacher of music and a teacher of art. This staff is composed of teachers of successful experience. Each holds a certificate of highest rating from the State Board of Education and, where previously employed in other districts, a recommendation for successful work in those towns. Hampton is a good town educationally. For this reason we are enabled to secure good teachers. That we have done so is shown by the following chart:

The chief task of the first three grades, is the teaching of the young child the mechanics of reading-reading for thought, reading for enjoyment and reading to obtain information. The success of your schools in this work is commented upon highly by school people beyond our own town. It seems to be a strong point of our schools. The three teachers responsible for this are Miss Marston, Miss Philbrick and Miss Norton. Occasionally, pupils may gain knowledge of the mechanics of reading in the early grades but do not gain in their later years because of failure to use the acquired skill. This, the three middle grade teachers are guarding against. Through parallel readings, through dramatizations, through time allotted to silent and informal readings. Miss Perkins, Miss Whitney and Miss Bartlett continue to increase the skill of our pupils.

Our fifth grade, under the leadership of Miss Whitney, is devoting some time to choral reading. This can be done after reading as a skill has been developed to a certain degree. Choral reading is done in unison and thus helps the poor and slow reader. It is a method of giving additional meaning to the lines read and thereby imparting greater pleasure to the pupils. It is a comparatively new branch of reading, although its foundation principles have long been recognized. The parents will be interested in visiting these classes.

The fundamentals of our work are being rated by two standardized tests. The Metropolitan Achievement tests, compiled by a committee of five of the leading educators from the major systems of the East, form a mechanical basis for grading the work of our pupils and our school. The Otis Classification test helps us determine the actual ability of the pupil in school subjects. These two, the one supplementing the other, assist in guiding our children's progress through the different grades.

The Junior High School

Hampton Junior High School now includes grades seven, eight and nine, with an enrollment of 94. This year you decided to employ Stuart Carter formerly of the Hopkinton High School staff as a third man teacher. It seems a wise decision. The organization, morale and control of the school is by so much the better.

Mr. Eastman has accomplished his usual outstanding results with his athletic teams. The training our boys receive has helped them materially in their later endeavors. With the building of the new high school and the anticipated removal of the ninth grade, a problem will arise. For this difficulty, Principal Hazen makes the following report.

"Looking toward the future, I would recommend that our junior high school athletic system be closely scrutinized, with the idea in mind of providing a program in which every pupil would participate rather than the small percentage which we now have participating. Leaders in the field of physical education generally agree that contact football has no place in the junior high school athletic program. Intra-mural participation is largely recommended in other sports rather than entirely inter-school competition."

A system of credits for outdoor activities similar to that now established at Hampton Academy might be seriously considered by the board. By this plan credits are obtained for individual activity such as swimming, walking, bicycling as well as for inter-group games. Such exercise should be adopted to the needs of the individual pupil and should be based upon the examination by the school nurse. In an elementary way, the activity might be made of a corrective nature.

The teachers of the school appreciate the small motion picture machine which now replaces the outmoded machine of former years. It is being used as a teaching device in the classes rather than a means of entertainmnt. Mr. Hazen has said in a report: "The number of worthwhile films available for payment of transportation and a small service charge is large. It has been shown in tests made at this school, and at others, that many pupils, particularly poor readers, learn more readily by seeing something pictured than by reading."

The Junior High School is raising the standard of scholarship from, at least, two points of attack. As the pupil comes into contact with the Concrete Geometry and the Concrete Algebra of the seventh and eighth grades opportunity for drill in Arithmetic fundamentals lessens. We believe that this should be balanced by intensive drill in the simple processes on Arithmetic. For this reason Mis Whytock is now devoting a period each week, as long as can be profitably done, to such drill. Through this work we plan to keep alive the Arithmetic of the lower grades and strengthen the ability of application to the Mathematics of the Junior High School.

The second line of improvement is the strengthening of the work in English by increasing the motivating force. The best of the pupils' work is now published in the newly established school paper. It is an honor to have a composition, a report or a story printed in the magazine. This paper is edited and published by the pupils themselves. The editorial and business staff is complete. In addition to its value as an English project it furnishes to the children training in real life situations. The enterprise is under the sponsorship of Mr. Carter. It is a valuable addition to our school activities.

The Music Department

The standard of achievement in the music department of the Hampton Schools is favorably known throughout the state. For its excellence Mrs. Esther Coombs is responsible. She understands Music and she understands children. Nothing but success can be the result of these two.

There follow excerpts from her report to the school board:

"In the primary grades the pupils are learning the principles of tune and time in a number of ways. Besides the regular rote singing we are including action songs of a new type—combining rhythmic motion with melody. Grade two contributed a performance of their rhythm band to an assembly program during the Fall. They were in uniform and were truly thrilled both in anticipation and performance. We are fortunate in having teachers in our primary grades devoted to the motto 'Every child for music and music for every child'. Monotones, both complete and partial are being taught to sing in tune.

Music Appreciation in the grades was started last year about the first of January, and continued during the rest of the year. I am starting it again this year. All pupils enjoy it very much. The classes in Appreciation in the High School are larger than for several years. We are forming habits of lasting value in these classes. During the Fall twenty-three pupils attended the opera in Boston accompanied by kind and interested parents and teachers, to whom much thanks is due.

The Academy chorus is doing good work of the same type as in former years. The music at graduation brought many gratifying comments.

The orchestra is very good. It needs more opportunity to advertise itself. The public performances of the past year are as follows: at Nashua at the All-State Festival, at the P. T. A., at graduation, and at the Legion Armistice program. The band is small but has been doing good work. During the Fall it made two public appearances—at the Republican Rally and the football game with Kennebunk. Elizabeth Tobey, Edward Tobey, Mildred Perkins and Robert Parr were members of the All New England Band this year. Gertrude Woodburn was a member of the All New England Orchestra and Arthur Waldron of the Chorus. This conclave was held in New London, Connecticut".

The Health Department

The health of our school children is guarded continually by our school nurse, Miss Frances Smith. During the few months she has been with us she has won the complete confidence of the school officials. She has carefully examined or assisted at the physical examination of every school child. She has faithfully visited all homes where her assistance might be needed. That she also has the confidence of the different organizations of the town is evidenced by their splendid cooperation with her in her school work. Her report to the schools follows:

NURSE'S REPORT

The following is the report of the health work done in the Centre School from September 7, 1938 to January 27, 1939, and is hereby respectfully submitted.

The School Physician, Dr. Bryer, conducted as usual, the physical examinations of the first and fourth grades, and the members of the football team. The yearly examinations of the pupils of all grades have been completed, and parents have been notified of defects found. Homes have been visited in order to cooperate with parents in correcting defects. The school was unfortunate in having an epidemic of whooping cough during the fall and early winter months. There were 47 cases in all. With this exception, the health of the school children has been excellent.

Hampton Academy and High School

With a Fall enrollment of 86, in an inadequate building, the teaching staff is faithfully preparing our children for the work of advanced schools. The lack of modern facilities makes this a particularly arduous task for the teachers and pupils alike. Because equipment for the domestic arts work is almost entirely lacking, the school board has offered the use of the Centre School equipment for the Academy girls. This has helped.

In line with modern educational thought, a course in Sociology is now offered in the Academy. This work is in charge of Mr. Sulloway and will, we believe, prove a valuable and popular course. With the anticipated new high school building we hope to introduce a course in Biology. This subject has been considered for some time. It is of especial value to girls planning to enter the profession of nursing and to boys planning a scientific or medical career. It requires a good laboratory if pupils are to secure a real usable knowledge of the subject. Such a laboratory can be installed in a new plant.

The music work in the school is outstanding. This is reported herein under the music department heading.

The morale of the student body is at a high level. The school is regarded as a student community for the welfare of which each one is responsible. There are no difficulties of organization or citizenship in the school.

In athletics the school has attained a high degree of success. The football team of last Fall was tendered a banquet by the Community Club in recognition of its work. At this meeting letters and sweaters were awarded the players. The sweaters were a much appreciated gift of the local post of the American Legion. Such interest in our young people and their activities by the men of the town can only be for the good of the boys and girls, the future citizens of Hampton.

This year a physical examination was given each student at the Academy. This was conducted by the local *doctors* and the school nurse. We believe this is a valuable service to our young people and should be continued.

The Parent-Teacher Association

Hampton has an active and cooperative Parent-Teacher Association. Its officers and members form a group which, through direct contact of parent and teacher reach a common ground of mutual helpfulness. Where a school has such a backing of influential citizens that school will give valuable service to its pupils. Because of the interest, the help and support of this organization, the schools of Hampton are better schools.

It is common to hear complaints against the type of moving picture shown the children today. In talking with the managers of the various picture theatres in neighboring towns, it seemed that they also were troubled by the fact that children seem to prefer the more exciting and less elevating type of showing. Since moving pictures are a real force in American life, it seems that the schools can render a real service by guiding pupils to the good pictures and helping them to understand and enjoy them. Arrangements were made with the managers of the theatres whereby they notify the superintendent when pictures of real worth are to be presented. With the notification usually comes a pamphlet giving the story in brief, the life of the author or allied historical data. This notice, together with the little booklet, is given to the teachers of the pupils of suitable age. The book from which the picture is made is on occasion the subject of study. Such a service was rendered by the manager of the theatre in Exeter when "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" was presented there. This is a move toward worthwhile cooperation in solving a difficult problem.

The service heretofore given our children in a dental clinic was not available to them this year. Parents have expressed a desire that this activity be returned to the school program. Since no child is required or even urged to visit any particular dentist, a clinic seems a worthwhile undertaking. It results in a saving of time and expense and guards against a mere "wait until tomorrow" attitude.

There never was a time when children, smaller or

larger, faced greater safety hazards than they do today. The age of machinery forces even the young child to meet the problem of safety before he has time to comprehend it. At the earliest ages it is important that the child be taught how to avoid dangers—dangers in the home, at play and especially on the highway. The time has come when we especially who live along the Lafayette Highway must make safety teaching a regularly scheduled subject of our curriculum. Little work books and primers are now being developed. We believe it possible to develop in even the primary child habits of safety consciousness throughout his life. I recommend that, as soon as available, texts in safety be adopted as regular readers in our schools. Work of this kind has been done informally by the teachers of the nation during the past years and this in great part responsible for the fact that deaths among children are decreasing in number. A regularly organized course would produce greater results.

I wish again to express my thanks to the school board of Hampton for their kindly help in the work of the office. The principals and teachers have without exception been faithful and cooperative in their work. Because of their service to the pupils under their care the schools of Hampton are known as successful schools.
