TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law for the support of Tucker Free Library.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the fire department.

7. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees and Committees.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of highways.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of sidewalks.

10. To see what action the town will take relative to renewing its contract with the Hillsboro Electric Light and Power Co., which expires April 10, 1913, for the purpose of lighting its streets with electricity, or to contract with any other company for the same purpose, and to make all necessary appropriations therefor or raise money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new engine, raise money for the same or pass any vote relative thereto.

In submitting its annual report the Board of Health desires to announce to the public of Henniker that, although many improvements have been made during the past twelve months, much yet remains to be accomplished, and the assistance of all who desire health and cleanliness is invoked towards that end.

We would respectfully recommend that a public sewerage system be established throughout the village, in order that we may do away with the obnoxious and dangerous surface drainage.

We have recommended this many times before, but the good people of Henniker do not seem to care, they are in a rut and seem to think that the old is as good as the new.

There have been five cases of measles reported to the board, all of which were confined to one family.

Two houses have been disinfected in accordance with law, where one of the occupants have died from consumption.

The water of the Henniker Spring Water Company passed a very satisfactory analysis.

There has not been any complaint of nuisance presented to the board during the year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

By carefulness and economy we are able to report a slightly better financial standing than a year ago.

A recent notification from the State Department informs us that in order to receive state aid for schools our tax must amount to \$4.50 on a thousand of equalized valuation. To bring our rate to this sum we must raise by taxation \$6021. As this is a sum so much larger than has ever been raised for school purposes we can see no chance for any outside help.

We have always tried to give equal opportunities, so far as practicable, in school privilege, to all the children in town, but there has been a marked difference in the improvement of such opportunity.

During recent years we have found the highest percentage of attendance in the graded school and this holds true of the year ending June 1912, here reported and of the completed terms of the present year. The lowest showing for last year was in the Friends' District and Hemlock Corner and was only 86% as compared with 93% as an average at the Central School.

The showing in these divisions for the two terms just completed is even worse, for more than one-fourth of the time has been lost and tardy marks abound. No business could long endure such a ruinous loss, and it does seem that there is no more important business for the children attending our schools than the formation of habits of punctuality and responsibility.

The excellent biennial report of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction just issued treats at considerable length the question of child labor and recent legislation on that subject, the argument is too elaborate for the scope of this report, but we quote the question and answer. "Is a parent employing his own child violating the child labor act? Obviously no parent has a right to employ his own child in any capacity in such a way as to keep the child out of school."

Now one of the most common excuses given for the absence of pupils in the past year, where teachers have required a written excuse, has been, "Johnny had to stay out yesterday to help his father," or "Mary was needed to help her mother." According to our highest educational authority such excuses are not legitimate and should not be accepted.

A bill is under consideration in our present legislature making expert supervision compulsory and providing for a redistricting of the state for that purpose. If it passes, the election of teachers will still remain in the hands of the local school boards and we would earnestly recommend that if serious complaints are to be made against teachers that they be made to the Board rather than the teachers and before rather than after their reelection.

We have been of the opinion for several years that something ought to be done toward providing better accommodations at the Central School Building, but have refrained from urging the matter because of the existing high rate of taxation; but the marked increase in the number of pupils in the Primary School gives that room too many pupils to be properly cared for by one teacher and together with the over-crowded condition of the Grammar school we believe to be sufficient reason for urging immediate action. If the wings of the building could have an additional story built upon them we could devote the rooms now in use to a first and second primary and the upper rooms thus secured would furnish ample accommodation to the Intermediate and Grammar schools for many future years.

Under this plan a place might be utilized for the Sloyd work so auspiciously started in the seventh and eighth grades.

It would call for a considerable appropriation for building and would necessitate the employment of an additional teacher.

We invite your attention to an article in the warrant for our annual meeting for this purpose and hope for its careful consideration by a full attendance of our citizens.

REPORT OF TUCKER FREE LIBRARY.

During the past year 209 books have been purchased, of which 20 were to replace books that were worn out. Of the remainder, 16 were solid reading, 18 were juveniles, and 155 were fiction. The friends of the library have been as liberal as usual, and 90 books have been given, of which 54 were solid, and 36 were juvenile and fiction. Of these books, the "Messages and Letters of the Presidents", 11 in number, were given by Henry E. Merrick, a very valuable set of books. Joseph E.
