THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket, in the (L. S.) County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to Other Governmental Divisions; including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1936.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as _____ and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ _____ ; or will (will) accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ _____ .

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Increased enrollment in the schools, due to improved business conditions in Newmarket, has made it feasible again to have one grade per room in the elementary school. The superior efficiency of this arrangement was last enjoyed in 1931-32. During the past year a clear title was obtained to the Stone School property, so that it will no longer be necessary to hold classes in that building merely to retain possession.

Besides the unit courses of the curriculum, classes in the fundamentals are conducted at the High School. All pupils not testing above a certain standard in arithmetic, spelling, handwriting, and place geography must attend these classes until they are up to standard. As a result of this emphasis placed upon the fundamentals, Newmarket High School placed second in spelling and third in geography among the high schools of the state competing in the Scholarship contest at the normal schools last May.

In addition to her examinations and other routine work, the school nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald, arranged for three clinics at which 105 children were treated. Two of these necessitated accompanying Newmarket children out of town to hospitals or specialists. With the cooperation of federal and state authorities, an adult class in physical education for women was conducted for several weeks last winter, ending April 23. This class was under the direction of Miss Marjorie Smith. The Parent-Teacher Association has shown an active interest in the schools, helping to finance the dental clinic, providing other accessories for the schools, and bringing in a variety of speakers on educational topics.

Comparative financial figures are still favorable to Newmarket. Last year, in spite of the fact that the median cost per pupil in the school districts of New Hampshire rose from \$92.52 to \$97.21, the corresponding per pupil cost in Newmarket decreased from \$92.75

to \$79.89 or nearly 14 per cent. less than the previous year. This decrease, moreover, was reflected in a decrease in per pupil costs in every one of the classes of school expenditure, namely Administration, Instruction, Operation and Maintenance, Auxiliary Agencies, Fixed Charges, Buildings and Equipment, and Debt and Interest. In per pupil costs, Newmarket last year was below the state median by $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for high schools and by 36 per cent. for elementary schools.

The Newmarket School District was carrying out the spirit and purposes of the new Municipal Budget Act even before its passage by the legislature and adoption by the town. In February, the School Board prepares an "Estimate" of the expected income and expenditure for the support of public schools and statutory obligations of the District for the year beginning July 1 following. This estimate, presented to the District Meeting becomes the basis of the annual appropriation. Then in October, when the income and expense of the current year are more accurately predictable, a revised "Budget" is drawn up in detail and submitted to the State Board of Education for approval as a basis of state aid to be paid back to the district the following year. Any balance not needed is later credited to the District on the Estimate of the following year and re-appropriated, making the amount to be raised by taxation just that much less. According to the terms of the Act, the Selectmen and the School Board are each entitled to one representative on the Town Budget Committee.

In the removal of the late Dr. George H. Towle by death, the School Board lost a valuable member who had served at different times for extended terms and brought experience and sagacity to the consideration of school affairs. He had also served as Moderator of the District as well as in other town offices. This va-

cancy on the Board was later filled by the appointment of Mr. Thomas J. Filion, a former member.

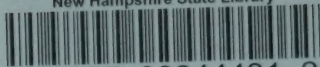
