To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jaffrey in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:-

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To hear all reports and act thereon.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, the maintenance of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, for the Town Library, fire department, Memorial Day, street lighting and other necessary Town charges.
4. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Liquor Agent, and to see what disposal the Town will make of the goods now on hand, or act in any way relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to assist in supporting the Conant High School, or take any action relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, or act in any way relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to extend the 6-inch water main from the end near the house of John B. Shedd to Cheshire Mill, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto, as petitioned for by Joseph White and others.
8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to laying a pipe and placing a hydrant near the mill of C. L. Stratton, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto, as petitioned for by E. C. Fletcher and others.
9. To see if the Town will vote to accept from District No. 7 the street lamps as they are now located on the several streets at the Center of the town, or act in any way relating thereto.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of street lights at the Center

of the Town after April 1, 1904, as petitioned for by W. W. Livingston and others.

11. To see if the Town will appoint a Committee of three to investigate the matter of erecting a High School Building and report at the next annual town meeting, or take any action relating thereto, as petitioned for by the Trustees of the Conant High School.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Old Home Week, or act in any way relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to procure a suitable piece of land and move the building known as the "old hearse house" upon it, the same to be used for the purpose of storing fire apparatus at Jaffrey Center, and raise or appropriate money for the same, or act in any other way relating thereto, as petitioned for by Percy L. Cutter and others.

14. To see if the Town will vote to sell the old hearse at Jaffrey Center, the same to be sold at public auction at this meeting, or act in any other way relating thereto, as petitioned for by Percy L. Cutter and others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to sell the old road machine, or act in any way relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to lay out and build a new highway beginning on the Rindge road at a point two rods east of James F. Report of the Water Gommissioners

Report of the Water Commissioners.

In accordance with the provisions of an act of legislature establishing Water Works in the town of Jaffrey, approved March 21, 1901, the following report of the Water Commissioners, for the year ending Feb. 15, 1904, is respectfully submitted.

Since the last annual report of the Water Commissioners a good degree of progress has been made in bringing the water of the new system into general use. Very few breaks in the water mains have developed and the expense of maintenance has been very small, indicating that with economical management, after the present extraordinary demand for service pipe extension is over, a large proportion of the income of the system may be relied upon to meet interest charges and the payment of bonds.

Up to the present time one hundred and thirty-four applications for water have been received. One hundred and twenty-three services have been put in from which one hundred and forty-seven houses, tenements and places of business are supplied with water.

Water was turned on at Jaffrey Center April 7, and on the Shattuck extension April 11, and the number of takers found gives good assurance that this part of the system will in the near future yield satisfactory returns on the investment. No fires have occurred during the year to test the adequacy of the hydrant service, but the system has been examined by the Inspector of the New Hampshire

Board of Underwriters, resulting in the very substantial reduction of twenty to twenty-five per cent. in the insurance rates charged upon property upon the water system.

The water supply has stood the test of an unusually dry year with very satisfactory results. A large amount of water has been drawn for flushing out the system, and yet during the greater part of the year there has been a considerable overflow at the outlet of the pond.

Some defects in the system have been found, most of which, it is believed, can be easily remedied. The tendency of sediment to collect in the "dead ends" of the pipe line makes it advisable to add to the system some means of venting the ends of the lines. A defect in the screening of the gate-house vault has been corrected, and it is believed that no further trouble from that source will be experienced. For a time many complaints were received in regard to the excessive vegetable taste and odor of the water. This may be partly accounted for by the fact that the level of the pond has been slightly raised, taking in a fringe of vegetable growth, which decaying and imprisoned by the ice, gave an objectionable taste and odor to the water supply for some weeks. It is believed that this trouble may be largely avoided by drawing the pond below the line of vegetation during the fall months.

Several analyses of the water have been made during the year by the State Chemist, all of which show the water to be free from unhealthful matter, and, except during the season of vegetable decay, to be of the most unexceptionable purity.

The following addition to the Rules and Regulations of the system has been adopted by the Water Commissioners:—

Rule 15. A charge of \$1.00 will be made for turning on the water where a service has been temporarily discontinued.
