TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY IN THE COUNTY OF CARROLL, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town House in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing, and fix compensation of the same.

2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the sum required by law for the benefit of the Town Public Library and how the same shall be divided.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to pay for breaking roads and snowing bridges due May 1st, 1912.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing hghways and bridges in addition to the amount required by law.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to obtain State aid, for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town expenses for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five (\$75) to be paid Custer Post, No 47, G. A. R., for observing Memorial Day, May 30, 1912.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount raised at the last annual meeting, to build and maintain a suitable building for a for a Police Station and a Police Court room at some convenient place in the Village of North Conway.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

a sum of money sufficient to erect a suitable building to house the Road Machines and Snow Rollers, agreeable to a petition signed by John F. Stott and 10 others.

10. To see what action the Town will take by way of disposing of the Echo Lake School House, not in use in said Town.

11. To see what action the Town will take by way of disposing of the Pest House recently purchased by the Board of Health in said Town.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to revarnish the inside of Town Hall and make any other necessary repairs.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept in trust, any sum or sums of money which may be donated for purpose of a Trust Fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the expense of taking care and keeping in good condition the Old Cemetery at Center Conway, N. H., and take any other action relative thereto, that may be deemed necessary.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to construct a bridge to accommodate the public travel, commencing at the northern terminus of the new highway laid out by the Selectmen in 1907 and constructed in 1908, the northern end of said bridge to rest upon land between the Iron bridge and the Sturtevant Peg Manufactory, so called. The estimated cost of said bridge and the filling and grading to approximate about three thousand dollars. Agreeable to a petition signed by J. F. Shackford and 40 others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town, the sum of ten thousand dollars, if needed.

16. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

continues. The Library has been open for exchange of books 308 days. The aggregate circulation has been 9554 of which 5915 were fiction, 3129 juvenile, and the rest divided among biography, history, travel, religions, etc. The daily average was 31.

School Board Report.

At the annual meeting of the School District March 14th, 1911, Mr. L. C. Prescott was elected a member of the School Board for three years.

The Board organized with Mrs. A. M. D. Blouin, chairman; L. C. Prescott, clerk; Supt. E. C. Witham, financial secretary. We are glad that the citizens are fully awake to the fact that Conway is a large town, and has a large number of scholars to be provided for. At the enumeration of scholars in September 1911 there were found five hundred fifty-four pupils. Two hundred sixty-three girls, two hundred ninety-one boys between the ages of five and sixteen years. The liberal appropriations we trust will be continued, and the dollars appropriated, for the education of the youth of our town, be considered a necessity rather than a luxury, and that all will see that much improvement is really made.

The aid Conway receives from the State is considerable, which emphasizes the truth "the Lord helps those who try to help themselves." We have received this year, from the State \$2,795.17 apportioned as follows: Allowance for average attendance of pupils \$997.50, nearly a thousand dollars. It was but a few years ago that this item of money received was but a little more than three hundred dollars.

We are glad that both parents and pupils realize the necessity of regular attendance at school. In striving to make our schools among the best in the State we as far as possible secure teachers especially trained and fitted for the work, and for these teachers we receive seven hundred and four dollars. We have forty-seven pupils attending institutions for higher education, and our expenses for tuition are necessarily large, we however get a rebate from the State of six hundred seventy-six dollars sixty-seven cents. The School Board are usually surprised when the bills for tuition are received, and here we would call attention of parents or

guardians to a State Law which section we quote in part. "Any town not maintaining a high school or school of corresponding grade shall pay for the tuition of any child who with his parent or guardian resides in said town and who attends an approved high school or academy, and the parent or guardian of such child shall notify the School Board of the district in which he resides of the high school or academy which he has decided to attend."

At the annual meeting, after listening to the report of the committee chosen a year ago to investigate the inadequate condition of the school building at Conway Village, and the earnest pleas of the people, it was voted to appropriate and raise the sum of ten thousand dollars for the construction of a modern school building with ample play grounds; the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars raised last year but not expended to be used with the above. L. C. Prescott, L. D. Goulding, Geo. B. Reed, A. W. Chandler, F. P. Allard, C. H. Craig and W. R. Burnell were chosen a committee to attend to the duties. After much discussion and many meetings on the part of the committee, architects and citizens, it was decided to extend the present lot, move the old building back and enlarge the same. The plans for arrangement and construction were made by and in charge of Mr. B. C. Whitcher of Manchester, one of the best school building architects in the State. Among the many school houses he has had charge of is the magnificent new building in Colebrook, modern and well equipped in every way.

At the opening of the school year in September this building not being in readiness, the schools were provided for in various halls in the village. This will explain the various items for rent in our financial accounts. It is hoped and expected that with the reopening of the schools, after their enforced vacation, by order of the Board of Health, on the first of March, that the building will be visited and examined by any and all, and their approval given as a slight recompense to all who have had any part in the labors of making an old building into an attractive, convenient,

sanitary and well arranged modern building.

In the north part of the town, the McMillan school was not reopened as the school board were unanimous in the decision that the few children in that neighborhood were much better convenienced at the village schools.

In the winter of 1911 the building at North Conway settled so much that the plastering came down in several places. On investigation it was found that the floor at that place was supported by plank, the bottom end of which rested in the sand. Of course as these planks decayed the building settled. Cement foundations were built, the building jacked back into place and posts put in that will hold it in place permanently.

It has always been impossible to properly heat the new room, which was finished in the North Conway building in 1910. This past winter during the severe weather the temperature of the room could not be raised above fifty degrees in the forenoon. During the enforced vacation another large radiator was added, which nearly doubled the heating capacity. This room is now comfortable at all times.

These two unexpected bills at North Conway amounted to about \$140.00 and explain why the repair money was overdrawn.

The citizens of the Centre last year sent a petition to the School Board for an article to be placed in the warrant asking for an appropriation for heating and water at their school-house.

The sum of five hundred dollars was appropriated. J. H. Garland, A. M. D. Blouin and I. C. Pert were appointed a committee to attend to the expenditure. The membership of the committee was broken by the illness and sad and untimely death of Mr. Pert in August. After conferring with representatives of several firms for heating and considering the question of steam or hot air, it was thought best, taking all conditions into consideration, to use hot air and a large Boynton furnace was installed at a cost of one hundred and twenty dollars. The committee felt justified in making some

much needed repairs with the balance of the money appropriated.

One of the entrances on the north side of the building was moved to the east side with a piazza entrance (this is of material aid in cold and windy weather), a new and broader approach of steps on the north side, cellar enlarged and cemented, a sink and pump placed in the cellar, a pipe connected with the water supply outside.

The building being very needy of paint, two good coats of paint were given to the outside, and the floors oiled, in fact, all was put into good condition except a fresh coat of varnish on the interior, and we hope the unexpended balance of the appropriation will be reserved and used for this purpose the coming vacation.

At Redstone the plastering in the halls was badly broken. This was covered with sheathing, a pipe was driven for water and pump and sink placed in one of the entries. At this place much glass is broken in the school building in a mysterious way. At the opening of the fall term the roof of the Green Hill school house was found to be in bad condition on one side, which was shingled.

At the opening of the fall term it was very gratifying to the officers of the district to have State Superintendent, H. C. Morrison, place his approval upon the two years of high school work at North Conway; and we trust the same approval will be given at Conway when that school gets into working order in the new building. With at least two schools of our town doing approved high school work, we can but feel that with the efforts and labor of our Superintendent our schools will forge ahead; parents and school district will also be saved much expense in transportation and tuition by being able to get two years of high school work in our own schools. Superintendent Morrison at the opening of the fall term visited and carefully examined Fryeburg Academy, at which institution forty-two of our town's pupils are attending school. In a report from him to the school board; he said, "the pupils attending this institution have been and are likely to

be well cared for in the future”.

January 1, 1912, Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Cameron and family of Fryeburg, Me., presented the Centre primary school with a nice organ. This came as a great surprise and everyone concerned was delighted, and if anyone wishes to know just how much it is enjoyed, they must visit the school, which is taught by Miss Vyra Witham of Westbrook, Me. Miss Witham is sister of Supt. Witham and is in charge of the school by request of the parents, and is employed by the school board.

Mr. Cameron and family were former residents of Center Conway, and their family of six children received their elementary education in the Centre school, three of them graduating therefrom. We again thank them for their kind remembrance.

Last August the school district of Bartlett, and the special district of Bartlett became a part of the Supervisory District, and Mr. E. C. Witham was elected superintendent of the newly formed district. Mr. Witham's ideas for the schools under his charge are high, and he is striving to bring the schools to a much higher plane than they now are. He is a student along this line and is ever alert for helps. Several times during the year he has attended conferences of Superintendents at which lectures have been given by some of the best educators of the country; he has given aid himself in several of the meetings, which has been a credit to him and the towns of his jurisdiction.

We must again urge the parents to visit the schools more frequently. Your presence in the schoolroom not only cheers and encourages the teacher, but is an inspiration to the pupils. During the coming year, with School Board, Superintendent, teachers, parents and pupils working hand in hand, shoulder to shoulder, success must crown the efforts, and 1912 make a better showing than any other year has ever done.

In accordance with Chap. 52 session laws of 1909, the School Board recommend to the Selectmen that the following

sums for the following purposes are necessary for the ensuing year: 1. High school tuitions, \$1200. 2. Text books and supplies, \$550.

Superintendent's Report.

To School Board and Citizens of Conway :

It is my privilege to submit for your approval my third annual report.

School reports are beginning a new era of usefulness. As public education is assuming larger proportions, the busy citizen is more and more unable to learn of the degree of efficiency of schools at first hand. He must of necessity depend to a large extent upon the school report, and for this reason the Department of Superintendents of the National Educational Association, the Bureau of Municipal Research of New York, and many other groups of educators are working upon the problem of efficient reports. Their common aim is to assist superintendents by devising the best possible ways of getting the actual facts before the public in the clearest and most convenient form possible. While these organizations have not completed their work, and their recommendations are but partially made, an attempt has been made to make this report serviceable by presenting the facts for series of years so arranged as to bring to view the movements and developments of the schools. Only in some such way can a correct idea of growth and progress be acquired sufficiently definite for administrative purposes.

“If the administration of the public schools is to be elevated above the plane of personal opinion, if our theories are to be given foundation in fact, if our assumptions with reference to lines of work, methods of instruction, skill in manipulation are to be displaced by positive knowledge, data must be collected with reference to actual social conditions, with reference to the effect upon children of certain lines of instruction, and with reference to the effectiveness of given methods of teaching. In a word, if school administration is to be rescued from the domination of tradition and personal

bias, systematic and scientific study must be made of school methods, and of school results."

ECONOMY.

A careful study of the statistical table will show that while the school district have the use and benefit of a considerably larger amount of money than formerly; the amount raised by the town has not increased very much, except for the new schoolhouse and for high school tuitions. The schoolhouse was an absolute necessity, and the new state tuition law accounts for the enormous growth of tuitions from \$117 in 1907, to \$1423 in 1911.

In spite of the fact that there is always a class who wish to have the schools cost just as little as possible, Conway has been generous in appropriating school money, as may be seen by the rate of assessment. It is not always the business house that costs the least to maintain that pays the largest dividends. Often a system of schools are doubled in efficiency by the expenditure of a few more dollars. It was felt that this was our condition last year. What is most needed now, is not increased appropriations for current expenses, but a wiser expenditure of our school funds as time goes on.

TEACHERS.

The quality of our teachers is such that in December the District received a bonus of \$704 from the state on their account.

David Snedder, the Massachusetts Commissioner of Education, says in his last year's report: "While it must probably remain true for a long time that country schools will be taught for the most part by women of relatively little experience, it is to be hoped that most if not all will be normal graduates."

There is no better authority than Mr. Snedder; and it has been our policy to carry out this idea of securing just as many trained teachers, and teachers who have qualified by obtaining the State certificate, as possible.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

At the December superintendent's conferences, for the

past two years, the State Superintendent has made it possible for the superintendents to compare with each other the prices paid for school supplies by the various towns in their districts. Your superintendent has had the advantage of participating in these helpful comparisons and discussions on the purchase of supplies. As a result of this the citizens can feel that they have not paid more than was necessary for any of the school supplies furnished.

The policy in regard to the purchase of school books is to gradually build up the supply along the line of the State course of study. While books must wear out by constant use, all destruction and mutilation of them has been stopped. It ought to be just as easy and no more expensive for the up-keep of the books on a high level as to always have them in a poor condition.

The town has been credited for over \$25 for old books, completely worn out, returned in exchange for new ones. Another example to show how the book money has been expended to the best advantage. Our old geographies are giving out. Instead of making one grand exchange for new books, which would involve the discarding of some good books, (because they do not all give out at once) new books were placed in part of the grades this year. Next year the exchange can be easily completed.

JANITORS.

The amount paid for janitor service has increased from year to year, but this has been accompanied by a decrease in the cost of fuel. This seems like good business; for the janitor service has improved in many other ways that are beneficial to the schools.

TRANSPORTATION.

While transportation costs Conway a large sum of money the increase for the past eight years has been small. For the State the amount paid for transportation has increased considerably every year.

CONWAY VILLAGE.

"If we go back a few years to the days of close, unven-

tilated schoolrooms, dusty floors, ceilings covered with grime and dirt, and uncivilized and wretched appointments for sanitation, and compare that situation so prevalent forty years ago, with what may be seen today in more progressive communities we find a tremendous advance."

It is just this advance that we have made in Conway village this year. The new schoolhouse, that we have been waiting for so long, will be a great external improvement in our school which no one can fail to realize. I sincerely believe that the internal improvement, the real school itself will be even greater just as soon as we get well underway in the new building.

Such reference books as are necessary for approval by the State Department in the first two years of high school work, have been added to the school. Every effort will be made in order to meet all State requirements, and during the summer to ask the State Superintendent for his approval. It is hoped that Conway people will take renewed interest in this movement, and lend their moral support by encouragement, and by believing that these things will be accomplished.

NORTH CONWAY.

In last year's report it was stated that two years of high school work were being pursued in this village. During the summer the State Superintendent, in accordance with authority vested by law in his office, approved the North Conway High School (two years' course) for the school year ending July 15, 1912.

One of the last year's pupils has received three As, and one B; and another, two As and two Bs in third year work at Fryeburg Academy this year. This is proof enough that we can do the work at home, provided we are given the opportunity. But it is no easy matter to do high school work of approved standing for the first time; and the hearty support and cooperation of all is essential.

REDSTONE.

Formerly the frequent change of teachers has interfered

with the progress of the schools in Redstone; but Mr. Davis and Mrs. Koffman are now on their second year of service. There has been a notable improvement in the percentage of attendance. The grammar school, for the fall term had a percentage of over 99, which is nearly perfect. Both pupils and teachers are to be congratulated on their efforts.

CONWAY CENTER.

Both last year and this year, considerable regrading has had to be done in this village. Also at the end of the year, in the first grade, there are always some who are retarded. Your superintendent has made a study of retardation and the proper time for children to enter school; and he is strongly of the opinion that it is a great mistake to enter children before six years of age. In the other parts of the town, the entering age is six; and the results are desirable.

From one to five years of age, the growth of the brain is very great; but from five to six, during this one year, the physical growth is enormous. At the end of the sixth year, the brain has practically reached its size. Now during these years of rapid physical growth the child is naturally full of twists and wriggles which are a natural sign of physical growth. To compel the child at this time to sit in a schoolhouse for several hours a day is a dangerous thing for the child. Early education, I believe in, not in the schoolhouse, but in the most natural ways possible.

Leonard P. Ayres, of the Russell Sage Foundation, and others, have been studying these questions for several years. As I have read the reports of their findings, there seems to be no authority for sending a child to school before six years of age. There are a few who advocate eight as the right age; but the best authorities discard both five and eight, and say that either six or seven is the proper age for children to enter school. There is an abundance of facts on hand to prove that, other things being equal, those entering at six years soon outstrip those who enter at the age of five.

EAST CONWAY AND GREEN HILL.

The work in these schools is excellent, especially in the

former, where a remarkable teacher has been working for, I think, fourteen years. Both of these schools feel the uplifting effect of Fryeburg Academy which is very apparent to one who visits the schools as I do.

KEARSARGE.

During the spring term the teachers and pupils planed off the tops of the old desks which were very rough; due to the fact that in former years they had been cut and otherwise mutilated by the pupils. The old stove was sold for \$1.40, and the teacher used the money to varnish the desks and seats. This was surely practical manual training; and the pupils undoubtedly learned many good lessons by doing this work.

WEST SIDE AND FOUR CORNERS.

Both these schools are now doing good solid work. Mrs. Hale at the Four Corners, apparently has the hearty support of all, and it is hoped that Miss Halway at the West Side will be equally fortunate, because she merits it.

DISPOSAL OF SUPERINTENDENT'S TIME AND PLAN OF WORK.

My time is divided among the school districts in the union as follows: Conway, 19-33; Madison, 5-33; Barlett Town, 5-33; Bartlett Special: 4-33.

During the summer every effort was made to recruit the best possible teaching staff. Preparations were carefully made for the opening of schools in the fall. With many new teachers the first part of the fall term was consumed in observation of their work and making the necessary suggestions. As soon as the schools were well started it has been my policy to systematically test-out the schools in the various subjects. The idea has been as far as possible, to go the rounds with one subject at a time. In this way my visits have been with some definite purpose in view. Some of the means of testing have been as follows:

Writing—By means of Prof. Thorndike's scale for measuring writing.

Arithmetic—Multiplication tables, written work, large

number of oral problems.

Language—A written test of the application of good English.

Reading—Hearing everybody read.

Geography—I have usually outlined a map on the black-board, and then had the pupils fill in the mountains, rivers, cities, and tell the business and products of the various sections.

Spelling—Examining the spelling blanks.

History and Civics—To start a discussion of some topic to see how much interest the pupils take in the subjects.

Physiology—Board diagrams and questions, especially pointed questions in regard to the personal hygiene of the pupils themselves.

One large teachers' meeting, the Saco Valley Association's annual meeting, has been held in the district and several local meetings. I have attended several educational meetings away from home during the year, and have been a speaker in two of them. Although my time has been largely occupied with actual school work, I have done considerable solid study and reading on the subjects of education. This is absolutely necessary for both teachers and superintendent, and it is an important fact for the public to realize, for a teacher is either growing better or worse every year. There is no standing still.

At the last annual school meeting, a communication received from Mrs. Marshall Rounds was referred to me with instructions that I investigate the matter and if I considered there was anything due her, make a settlement with her and report at the next annual meeting of the district. During the summer I visited Mrs. Rounds at her home, and on Oct. 7, she was given a hearing by the School Board and Superintendent. She has many grievances, real or fanciful, of long standing; but in my opinion she has no legal bill against the district.

Again I wish to thank the citizens for their hearty support and good will which has made my work in your schools a pleasure.

Suggestions to Selectmen and
Assessors

PREPARED BY
STATE TAX COMMISSION

EXTRACT.

ACT CREATING THE STATE TAX COMMISSION.

NEW HAMPSHIRE LAWS, 1911, CHAPTER 169.

AN ACT TO CREATE A PERMANENT TAX COMMISSION AND TO
PROVIDE FOR THE TAXATION OF CERTAIN PUBLIC SERVICE
CORPORATIONS AND COMPANIES.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court Convened:*

SECTION 1. There is hereby created a commission, to be designated and known as the state tax commission, consisting of three persons known to possess knowledge of the subject of taxation.

SEC. 8 It shall be the duty of the commission, and it shall have power and authority

(6) To have and exercise general supervision over the administration of the assessment and taxation laws of the state and over all assessing officers in the performance of their duties, to the end that all assessments of property be made in compliance with the laws of the state.

(7) To confer with and advise and give the necessary instructions and directions to local assessing officers throughout the state as to their duties, and to that end call meetings of such assessing officers, to be held at convenient places, for the purpose of receiving instructions from the commission as to the laws governing the assessment and taxation of all classes of property.

(8) To direct proceedings, actions and prosecutions to be instituted to enforce the laws relating to the liability and punishment of individuals, public officers and officers and agents of corporations for failure or neglect to comply with the provisions of the law of this state governing returns for the assessment and taxation of property.

(3)

(9) To require city, town and other public officers to report information as to the assessment of property, collection of taxes, and such other information as may be needful in the work of the commission, in such form and upon such blanks as the commission may prescribe; and it is hereby made the duty of such officers to furnish said commission with the information required.

(12) To receive complaints and to carefully examine into all cases where it is alleged that property subject to taxation has not been assessed, or has been fraudulently or for any reason improperly or unequally assessed, or the law in any manner evaded or violated, and to order reassessments of any or all real and personal property, or either, in any assessment district, when in the judgement of said commission such reassessment is advisable or necessary, to the end that all classes of property in such assessment district shall be assessed in compliance with the law. Neglect or failure to comply with such orders on the part of any selectman or assessor shall be deemed willful neglect of duty, and shall be subject to the penalties provided by law in such cases. Any person aggrieved because of such reassessment shall have the same right of petition and appeal as from the original assessment.

CONSTITUTION OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

PART FIRST.

Art. 12. Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property. He is, therefore, bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection," and to yield his personal service, when necessary, or an equivalent. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him or applied to public uses without his own consent or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they or their representative body have given their consent.

PART SECOND.

ART. 5. And, further, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court * * * * * to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state, and upon all estates within the same.
* * * *

ART. 6 The public charges of government or any part thereof may be raised by taxation upon polls, estates and other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance; and there shall be a valuation of the estates within the state taken anew once in every five years at least, and as much oftener as the general court shall order.

PERSONS AND PROPERTY LIABLE TO TAXATION.

PUBLIC STATUTES, CHAPTER 55,

SECTION 1 All male polls from twenty-one to seventy years of age are liable to be taxed, except paupers, insane persons, and others exempt by special provisions of law.

SECT. 2. Real estate, whether improved or unimproved,

and whether owned by residents or others, is liable to be taxed, except houses of public worship, twenty-five hundred dollars of the value of parsonages owned by religious societies and occupied by their pastors, school houses, seminaries of learning, real estate of the United States, state, or town used for public purposes, and almshouses on county farms.

SECT. 3. Buildings, mills, carding machines, factory buildings and machinery, wharves, ferries, toll-bridges, locks and canals, and aqueducts, any portion of the water of which is sold or rented for pay, are taxable as real estate.

CHAPTER 42, LAWS 1905.

SECTION. 1. Lands, dams, canals, water-power, buildings, structures, machinery, dynamos, apparatus, poles, wires, fixtures of all kinds and descriptions owned, operated and employed by any private corporation or person not municipal corporation in generating, producing, supplying and distributing electric power or light, shall be taxed as real estate in the town or towns in which said property or any part of it is situated.

CHAPTER 74, LAWS 1911.

SECTION 1. Real estate shall be taxed independently of any mines or ores contained therein until such mines or ores shall become a source of profit; except when such mines or ores, or rights therein, are owned by some person other than the one to whom such real estate is taxed, in which case they shall be taxed as real estate to such other person.

SECT. 7. Personal estate liable to be taxed is:

(1) Stock in public funds, including all United States, state, county, city, or town stocks or bonds and all other interest-bearing bonds not exempt from taxation by the laws of the United States.

(2) Stock in corporations in the state, except where the property represented by the stock is taxable directly to the corporation.

(3) Stock in corporations located out of the state, owned by persons living in the state, except where either the stock

(6)

or the property represented by it is taxed in the towns or states where the corporations are located.

AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 83, LAWS 1911.

(5) Money on hand or at interest more than the owner pays interest for, including money deposited in any bank other than a savings bank within this state, or loaned on any mortgage, pledge, obligation, note or other security, whether on interest or interest be paid or received in advance, but excepting money loaned at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent. per annum secured by a note and mortgage on real estate situate in this state.

(6) Stock in trade, whether of merchants, shopkeepers, mechanics, or tradesmen employed in their trade or business, reckoning the same at the average value thereof for the year; and for purposes of taxation, raw materials and manufactures of any manufactory, wood, timber, logs, and lumber, manufactured or otherwise, if exceeding fifty dollars in value, and fishing-vessels, steamboats, horse-boats, or other vessels owned by individuals and navigating the waters of the state, for the transportation of passengers or freight, and sea-going vessels, shall be deemed stock in trade.

(7) Vehicles, the aggregate value of which exceeds one hundred dollars.

(8) Horses, asses and mules over eighteen months old.

(9) Oxen, cows, and other neat stock over eighteen months old.

AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 4, LAWS 1907.

(10) Sheep over one year old and hogs over six months old; but two such hogs to each family shall be exempt from taxation.

(11) Fowls of every description exceeding fifty dollars in value.

CHAPTER 15, LAWS 1905.

SECTION 1. Every portable mill shall be taxed as personal property at its full value in the town where it is on the

first day of April, to the owner, if he then resides in such town, otherwise to the owner or person having it in his care or custody on that day; and any person or corporation permitting such property to be deposited on their premises shall be deemed to have the care or custody, and shall have a lien on the same for the payment of said tax; and when any portable mill shall be owned by a person residing out of the town where the same is situated on the first day of April, and is not in the custody of any person residing in such town, the same shall be taxed to the owner thereof; and said town shall have a lien thereon for the payment of the taxes.

CHAPTER 25, LAWS 1905, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 49
LAWS 1911

SECTION 1. All boats and launches of every description, whatever the motive power may be, the aggregate value of which exceeds one hundred dollars, shall be taxed to the owner where the property is located on the first day of April.

CHAPTER 55, PUBLIC STATUTES

SECT. 9. Stock in corporations shall not be taxed, if the nature and purposes of the corporation are such that no dividend of its profits is to be made.

SECT. 10. No statute provisions shall be so construed as to subject any stock to double taxation.

AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 166, LAWS 1909

SECT. 11. Towns may by vote exempt from taxation for a term not exceeding ten years any manufacturing establishment proposed to be erected or put in operation therein and the capital to be used in operating the same, unless such establishment has been previously exempted by some town. Provided, however, that the assessors shall annually appraise such property and the valuation determined upon for the same shall be added to the valuation of all other property in the town to determine the total valuation for the purposes of state and county tax.

SECT. 12. Any town in this state may by vote authorize

its proper officers to make contracts with individuals to exempt from taxation for a term not exceeding ten years all materials of wood, copper, iron, and steel used in the construction and building of ships and vessels in such town, and and the ships and vessels constructed therefrom while in the process of construction.

SEC. 14. Any town in this state, at any legal meeting holden therein, may, by a majority of the legal voters present and voting at the meeting, authorize its selectmen to hire money of individuals living in the town at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent. per annum, and provide that all moneys thus loaned shall be exempt from taxation.

CHAPTER 55, LAWS 1907

SECTION 1. Any city, town, precinct or village district may exempt from taxation any future issue of its bonds, provided such exemption shall apply only to bonds owned and held by citizens of said city, town, precinct or village district.

CHAPTER 56, PUBLIC STATUTES

SECT. 2. Any soldier or sailor of the War of the Rebellion who shall present to the selectmen or assessors of the town in which he lives, for inspection and record, his pension certificate awarding to such soldier or sailor an invalid pension of any amount, or an honorable discharge of such soldier or sailor from the service of the United States in said Rebellion, shall thereafter be exempt from levy of poll tax.

AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 95, LAWS 1907

SECT. 4. The selectmen in their discretion may exempt any other soldier or sailor who served in the late Rebellion, and is disabled in consequence of such service, from paying a poll tax. And every soldier or sailor residing in New Hampshire who served for sixty days or more in the army of the United States during the War of the Rebellion and received an honorable discharge from that service, and the wife or widow of any such soldier or sailor, in consideration and re-

cognition of such service, shall be exempt each year from taxation upon his taxable property to the value of one thousand dollars; provided, such soldier or sailor and his wife, if any, shall not own property of the value of three thousand dollars or more.

CHAPTER 58, PUBLIC STATUTES.

SECT. 5 The selectmen shall make such deductions from the appraised value of the property of insane persons as they shall think just and reasonable, whenever it shall appear that the income of their estates is not sufficient to support them.

APPRAISAL OF TAXABLE PROPERTY

PUBLIC STATUTES, CHAPTER 58

SECTION 1. The selectmen shall appraise all taxable property at its full and true value in money as they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor and shall receive and consider all evidence that may be submitted to them relative to the value of shares in corporations and other property, the value of which cannot be determined by personal examination.

ANNUAL DUTIES OF SELECTMEN AND ASSESSORS.

ANNUAL DUTIES OF SELECTMEN AND ASSESSORS.

I.

To take a correct invoice of all polls and estate liable to be taxed on the first day of April. Public Statutes, ch. 57, s. 1.

II.

To make a personal examination of all real estate. Public Statutes, ch. 58, s. 7. Laws 1903, ch. 24.

III.

To distribute inventory blanks to all persons and corporations within the respective towns who are taxable therein for any real and personal estate, as much earlier than April 15 as practicable. Public Statutes, ch. 57, s. 6.

The truth of the statements contained in the inventories must be verified by independent investigation.

IV.

To give public notice on or before the second Monday of April of times when and places where they will receive inventories and hear all parties regarding their liability to be taxed. Public Statutes, ch. 57, s. 13.

“The selectmen not only have no power to waive the filing of inventories, but they are liable to a penalty if they willfully fail to enforce the law.” *Parsons v Durham* 70 N. H. 44.

“If an inventory is returned, the selectmen or assessors shall assess a tax in accordance with their appraisal of their property therein mentioned, if they are of the opinion that it contains a full and true statement of the property * * * * taxable.” *Peaslee, Jaffrey v. Smith*, 76 N. H. 168, 176. Decided June Term, 1911.

V.

To impose fourfold "doomage" against all persons or corporations who willfully omit to return correct inventories verified by oath. Public Statutes, ch. 57, s. 15. *Jaffrey v. Smith*, 76 N. H. 168, 176.

VI.

To appraise all taxable property at its full and true value in money as they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor. Public Statutes, ch. 58, s. 1.

"It should be regarded as a very reprehensible practice to appraise property for the purpose of taxation otherwise than according to its real value; and I think, myself, that the attention of the attorney-general should be called to the practice, with view to the institution of prosecutions for perjury." *Rand, J. Manchester Mills v. Manchester*, 57 N. H. 309, 315.

VII.

"It is not for courts, or juries, or other officers of the government to be governed in the performance of their duty by their own individual notions, or convictions, with respect to the policy, or impolicy of the law. It is for the legislative branch of the government to determine the policy of the law, not for those charged with its administration. And, until it is changed by that branch of the government, the law must be enforced as it stands." *Mitchell, J. Charge to Hillsborough County Grand Jury*, January 2, 1912.

VIII.

The number of acres, rods or feet of each parcel of land should be made to appear on the selectmen's invoice books.

Demand of property owners their own estimate of the value of their property, and such other information as may be requisite for an intelligent assessment. Public Statutes, ch. 57, s. 5.

IX.

Exercise the utmost care in the preparation of the certificates of the number of poles and the valuation of ratable estates to be returned to the tax commission. Deduct soldiers' exemptions from each item of property where such exemptions occur. Add the items on the certificates and be certain that the total corresponds with the total assessed valuation of the town. Before sending in the certificates compare them carefully with the figures on the town books, and with the figures for total valuation, taxes and rate on the financial statements sent to the state treasurer. Public Statutes, ch. 16, s. 10.

X.

It is the duty of the tax commission to order reassessments of any or all parcels of property in town when in the judgment of the commission it appears that such property is improperly or unequally assessed, or the tax laws in any manner evaded or violated.

It is the duty of selectmen and assessors to comply with such orders of the commission. Laws 1911, ch. 169, s. 8, (12).

The tax commission will not hesitate to perform its full duty in the above respect, and hold selectmen and assessors responsible for the performance of their duties.
