

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Conway, in the county of Carroll and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote on town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town honse in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year and fix their compensation.
- 2 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the sum required by law for the benefit of the town public library, and how the same shall be divided.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for breaking roads and snowing bridges, due May 1, 1917.
- 4 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and bridges in addition to the amount required by law.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (1,500.00) as recommended by the State for the maintenance of its State Aid Road.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to obtain State aid for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.
- 7 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) to be paid Custer Post G. A. R., for Memorial Day, May 30, 1917.
- 9 To see what action the town will take in relation to Dead River and Lovejoy Brook bridges so-called, and what sum of money they will vote to raise and appropriate, if any.
- 10 To see what action the town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

- 11 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town the sum of \$15,000, if needed.
- 12 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty dollars for the purpose of putting in a drain to cross Grove street from a point near Miss Messer's stable to the main drain across the street, agreeable to a petition of F. L. Mason and others.
- 13 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to be spent to widen the highway on the Green Hill road to a width of a State road, building a culvert thereon beginning at the land of Bert E. Smith on said highway and extending to the town line of Chatham, agreeable to a petition signed by Bert E. Smith and others.
- 14 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) to be spent on the County road so-called, beginning at the point where the road was completed last year and extending towards Conwayand appoint an agent to expend the same, the work to be done as early in the season as conditions will warrant, agreeable to a petition of Andrew Carlton and others.
- 15 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to drain the highway at or near the corner of Chase Avenue and Pleasant street in Conway village, agreeable to a petition signed by A. A. Phelps and others.
- 16 To see if the town will vote to accept from C. W. Hubbard and sister, as a gift, about ten acre timber lot to be used as a public park.
- 17 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to purchase a Motor truck to use on highway work.

(Owing to difference of opinion in regard to the safety of Hanson brook bridge so-called, we insert article 18)

- 18 To see if the town will vote to take any action relative to Hanson brook bridge, and raise and appropriate any money therefor.
- 19 To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The new rule adopted June 19, 1916, by which any card holder has the privilege of drawing two books at a time, that is, one book of fiction and one of nonfiction, has resulted in an increased circulation of nonfiction. A comparison of fiction percentages for the preceding years shows a decided gain in favor of nonfiction during the year, there being an increase over former years of from 3% to 5%.

The rule limiting the loan of books to two weeks, has given much better service to borrowers as the books are more constantly in circulation.

The privilege or reservation of popular books by postal card has been the means of prolonging interest in many cases where otherwise the books would have passed out of notice and been forgotten. Nearly ninety

requests for books to be reserved have been filed within the year.

The same papers and magazines have been received at the Reading-room as last year, and continued interest has been shown in their use. With the cooperation of the Woman's Club additional magazines are hoped for during the coming year.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:-

I have the honor and pleasure to submit for your consideration my fifth annual report of the schools of Conway, it being the eighth in the series of such reports.

The new State Program of Studies which was adopted has been followed as closely as is consistent with a change from the old to the new. The complete transition will require about two years. The work of domestic arts, manual training and agriculture cannot be introduced at present for want of funds. These are important branches and deserve a place in our curriculum.

I recommend the consideration of the introduction of domestic arts, and manual training in our schools above the fifth grade. The cost for the equipment and teacher for the first year will be about \$2000. After the first year, the main expense will be the salary of a teacher. Outside the salary of the teacher, the department could be made self-supporting if once introduced.

The standard tests begun last year have been continued. Some of the findings have been reported in part. Along with the tests has been made a partial survey of school conditions in the district. This report will be filed with the Board at a later date.

A school was opened at South Conway last fall owing to the fact that there were several children at the portable saw mills in that vicinity. Those children did not remain long after the school opened, hence, the school has been very small,—too small to be profitably maintained. The transportation of those small children is quite a serious problem in the winter months.

VISITING DAY

The one visiting day granted the teachers this year has been taken by them. All have reported either orally at teachers' meetings or else in writing to the superintendent. Judging from the reports and the spirit shown in a willingness to try out the new ideas gained, we must say that the gift is a profitable investment to the schools and should be continued.

MUSIC AND DRAWING

The work in these departments has been hindered considerably owing to the necessity for frequent changes in the supervisors. This year they have been under the efficient supervision of Miss Marion M. Stephen, a graduate of the Thomas Normal Training School, Detroit, Mich. Those who had the pleasure of hearing the musicales by the schools agree that our children are improving in music. The drawing exhibitions made at the close of each school year speak for themselves. The boys in the high schools are taking mechanical drawing while the girls are working in water colors. Miss Stephen's report is appended and made a part of this report.

VACCINATION

All school children, enrolled in town, have presented certificates from physicians that they have been vaccinated, or were not fit subjects for vaccination or had submitted to the process three times or had had the smallpox. The enforcement of the vaccination law caused quite a good many absences at the beginning of the school year.

TRANSPORTATION

There are three transportation routes at North Conway this year,—Mr. Hatch from Echo Lake, Mullavey for the fall term and McGuinty for the winter term from Redstone and L. A. Willey from Intervale; two routes at Conway,—Mr. Sawyer from the North Conway road, and Mr. A. G. Marston from the Stark district; one at Centre Conway,—Mr. William Chick from the East side; and one at East Conway,—Mr. S. W. Hill from Green Hill.

EYE AND EAR TEST

Children in the district have been tested as to sight and hearing with the following results:

Number found with defective hearing 27 or 6.1% 48 cases of defective eyesight and 24 cases of defective hearing (Due in some cases to adenoids) were serious enough for me to call the parents' attention to the fact. It is hoped that these parents will be sufficiently interested to have the children examined by a specialist to see if some remedy can be prescribed. A child with either defective hearing or sight is handicapped in his school work. In one room of 33 pupils 20 were found with defective vision. Eleven were reported.

ADENOIDS

A large number of pupils in our schools are afflicted with adenoids. Many are so serious that they should be removed before a permanent injury is done the child. Adenoids seriously interefere with the health and school work of a child. I am disappointed to find that so few parents were willing to accept the generous offer made by Dr. George Shedd and Mr. A. C. Kennett a few years ago.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Medical inspection of our schools is one of our needs. All children should be thoroughly examined at least once a year and at such other times as circumstances seem to require.

I believe the most efficient work for the schools could be accomplished thru the employment of a competent school nurse who would have the time to follow up cases and have the cause of the difficulty corrected. This follow-up work could not be performed by a physician for want of time.

I believe that it would be a profitable investment for the district in that better attendance would be secured as the result of practical hygienic ttaching and the following-up process to see that the lessons are practiced.

TRUANT OFFICERS

There has been but little work for the truant officers for the past year. The percent of attendance has not been as high as it should be owing to the fact that the children in the first and second grades are not kept in school. It is impossible for a child to do the work of a grade if he is absent from one-fourth to one-half of the time.

It occurs to me that we could get better attendance if, thirty minutes after school opens, the truant officers would look up all absent pupils. This has the desired effect in the larger places. Why not try it here?

SCHOOL ENTERTAINMENTS

The pupils at Conway have given two musical evenings which were a success in every way. With the funds earned, there have been purchased a nice piano for the grammar and high school and a victrola and records for the grades which is also used to supply music for filing purposes.

The pupils of the North Conway high school have given two plays during the year and wit hthe funds earned purchased a piano and the balance is used for the athletic association. The association has wired the open hall in the building for basket ball games.

D. A. R.

Anna Stickney Chapter D. A. R. made the high school a present of a cover for their piano. They gave four cash prizes last year—two in the high school and two in the grammar school—for the two best essays written on topics selected from the Colonial or Revolutionary periods of American history. The first prize in each case was three dollars and the second two. This year they are offering similar prizes for essays written on subjects selected from the history of New Hampshire.

FINANCIAL ACCOUNT

The accounts this year show an overdraft in outstanding note of \$700. This is due to several causes; namely, increase in cost of fuel by nearly \$350 over previous year, all supplies are more expensive, higher wages paid to janitors, slight increase in salaries of some teachers, opening school at South Conway—an extra teacher,— high school tuition much in excess of what was anticipated with no rebate from the state, and an increase in cost of janitors' supplies.

You will notice that the repair, book and supply accounts have not been overdrawn.

REPAIRS

The school buildings at Conway Village, North

Conway and Kearsage have been painted, a wood shed built at Kearsage and some other minor repairs before painting. New outside doors were purchased for the building at North Conway. Cabinets for the physical apparatus were made for the high schools at Conway and North Conway. The school building at South Conway was put into shape for school use. All the other repairs were of minor importance.

The school buildings at North Conway should have some inside entries, for the main entrances, in the lower hall of the tower. This would make the building much warmer and prevent much of the slamming of the outside doors. At times, I am fearful for the safety of the little children. If one should happen to get caught in the door when slammed by the wind a leg or arm might be taken off.

The above is corrected to October 1, 1916, and shows the number of pupils in each grade of the different ages; the total number in all grades; the number of children of the same age in school; the number at age or where they belong chronologically; the number of precocious or those in advance of where their age would naturally place them; and the number of retarded or backward children. There are 92 or 19.4 per cent. over age or retarded pupils; 36 or 7.6 per cent. who are under age or precocious; and 345 or 73 per cent. who are at age.

The diagram becomes clear when it is read as follows: In the first grade there are 37 pupils six years old, 28 who are seven years old, (these are at age being between the two broken diagonal lines) two children eight years old or one year retarded, two who are nine years old or two years retarded, and there are a total of 69 pupils in the first grade; in the second grade, we read that there are two pupils who are six years old or one year in advance of where they would be according to their age—precocious children,—in the same second grade, we read that one child is fifteen years old or seven years retarded; and from the totals by years, we read that there are 39 pupils in school who are six years old, 53 who are seven years old, etc.

If this is figured on the total enrollment, we find the average loss per child to be 5.6 days. The cost per child per day, based on the enrollment, is 19.4 cents. This then means that there is a financial loss to the district of \$555.03. It is really greater than this, for the schools must be maintained for a period, for the child to make up the time lost. There is also a loss to the child and to the parents.

It will be observed that the greatest loss comes in the colder months of the year when it is an effort for the people to get out. Would it not be more economical to have the schools open earlier in the fall and keep later in the spring, with the longest vacation in the cold winter months?

HIGH SCHOOL

The fourth year has been approved for the High schools both at Conway and North Conway. The four year courses are conducted by two teachers by a combination and alternation of classes. This is possible with small schools but not the most satisfactory method. It means that the courses offered must be kept to their minimum.

In 1907 a law was passed permitting Conway to make a contract with Fryeburg Academy for the education of its High school pupils. This marks a beginning of growth for higher education in Conway. The figures show that there has been a decrease in the enrollment for the ten years, while there has been a constant increase in the number of pupils attending High school. In the last five years there has been an increase of 7.4 per cent. This is due, I believe, in a large measure to the fact that we have High schools in our own town. This per cent. will increase from year to year and we shall find more attending at home and fewer away.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the hearty cooperation which teachers, pupils, janitors, school board and citizens have given me during the past year in an effort to make the schools more efficient. I hope in the next

five years that we shall see even greater advancement than in the past five.

Dear Sir:-

As requested, I offer my third annual report of the North Conway High School for the past year and for the month of January, 1917.

We feel that steady progress was made, both in deportment and scholarship by practically all pupils from February last, until the close of school last June. Our boys and girls are becoming more gentlemanly and ladylike every day and a better school spirit seems to pervade the atmosphere of the school than ever before. With few exceptions all students of the first half of the year remained for the entire year.

In all activities, musical, athletic or dramatic, which the students have attempted, they have equalled their previous high mark if not surpassed it. They have given two dramas, one last spring, with the proceeds of which they completed the fund for the purchase of an excellent piano, which has proved to be of very great value in their music work. One thing made possible by this, besides the regular music work, has been the organization of a High School Orchestra which surprised the people of our community very much by furnishing excellent music for the drama and dance given last fall for the benefit of our Athletic Association. This drama and dance netted for the Athletic Association the neat little sum of \$61.70. About

\$15.00 of this has been spent in putting electric lights into the High School Haal in order that a game of basketball might be played there about once a week in the evening. The remainder will be used for the purchase of baseball suits and other necessary equipment for whatever sports the students have a desire to enter. Last spring our baseball team won the championship of the high school league of Carroll County, losing only one game out of six, played by each team in the league. This term we have played four games of basketball so far, winning them all. We believe these sports have done much to improve the school spirit of the pupils and has made for more interest in all the school work.

The addition of the fourth year has made the work of the school much more efficient and surely a community of this size ought to support a first-class four year high school.

Last fall term, the enrollment of the school was forty-one. Three boys and one girl have since left, leaving thirty-seven. The membership by classes is:

The average daily attendance for the fall term was 35, average daily absence 1, average membership 36 and the per cent. of attendance 97. The number of cases of tardiness was 52 and the number of dismissols 3. This is a much better record than we made for the fall term of a year ago, yet there is need of greater improvement still, especially in the matter of tardinesses.

Again, let us say that all teachers of the building would be glad to receive more visitors. We would be much pleased to show parents and others the work we are trying to do and their interest would surely be reflected in the work of the pupils.

May we again thank our janitor, Mr. McIntyre, the special teacher in drawing and music, Miss Stephen, and all the teachers of the building for their loyalty and faithful co-operation; and the superintendent and Board of Education for their advice and support.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC AND DRAWING

Mr. A. J. Knowlton, Superintendent of Schools.

My Dear Sir:—

Music has come to be recognized as a vital part of the program in the Conway Schools. Altho it is a subject which calls for the development of a specific kind of skill its purpose in the public schools, is to make intelligent lovers of good music and not technical musicians.

Great care has been taken in selecting the Rote songs for the first four grades, since rote singing is the basis of all music work, giving the child the best musical experience and laying the foundation of all future work. During this period also, oral ear-training has been developed by using phrases and motives from familiar songs, the teacher singing with the neutral sylable "loo" and the children responding with syllable names.

Theory work has been taught in the third and

fourth grades to the extent that that children not only know the general characters used in music, but are able to determine the key and meter signatures in all exercises.

Individual work in the Sight Reading is gradually becoming more general thru-out the grades and great interest is shown in the lower grades when competition is allowed in the Sight Reading.

In the fifth and sixth grades we find a period of drill, in the first place reviewing the work of the former grades. Rote singing is still continued, in these grades, but to a less degree. An advancement in the theory and sight-reading is shown and one and two part note songs are taken up.

In the seventh and eighth grades is the more difficult and advanced sight-reading in the Bass as well as the Treble cleff, the songs being of an inspirational character. Here also we find the development of minors.

The three and four part singing of the Songs and Codas in the high schools has gradually advanced until great interest in the success of each chorus is manifested by every pupil.

We are greatly benefited in the District by our having pianos in three and victrolas in two of the schools.

At present we are in hopes of working up a course in "Music Appreciation" by the aid of the talented in the villages as well as the schools and also by the use of the victrolas.

DRAWING

Of what was said in regard to the purpose of the music in the public schools may also be repeated in the drawing. That the object is not to make artists but rather, to train the minds of the pupils to an appreciation of the beautiful in their surroundings. It is easily correlated with other subjects in the school program such as fiterature history geography, etc.

In the first and second grades we aim through paper cutting and the use of colored crayons to express form and color as observed in nature. Also to develop the imagination and the formation of mental pictures to sach an extent that the children may be able to illustrate stories.

In the third and fourth grades the appropriate size of the object according to the size of the paper is emphasized and by the use of the mediums pencil and paint, illustrative stories are developed in which figures in action are emphasized. By small free-hand pencil sketches we reproduce forms as observed in nature. Color values are also worked out in these grades.

In the fifth and sixth grades perspective and foreshortening as observed in familiar objects and surroundings predominate. Brush-handling and the study of color is also emphasized.

In the seventh and eighth grades we aim to develop foreshortening, perspective and design, in every case applied by the use of natural forms and colors.

In the High School we are steadily aiming toward the more practical use of drawing in both the Mechanical Drawing and the Water Color.

A study of pictures thruout the grades in order to gain an appreciation of the work of great artists is to be arranged for immediately.

Parents and friends are cordially invited to attend any of the Masic and Drawing classes that may be of interest to them.
