You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

Article 3. To see what action the town will take in regard to discontinuing taxes.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State aid for the permanent improvement of its highways, as provided by law.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to tarvia the roads from Harry S. Patten's to Smith guide board and from Charles Loud's to Conway Village, if they deem advisable, agreeable to the suggestion of the Budget Committee.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars

(§150) for the observance of Old Home Day in the town of Conway, and a committee to be appointed from different sections of the town to arrange for the same.

Article 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to a piece of land in Conway Village deeded to the town by James Willey and now claimed to be owned by Mark Head.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to ratify the action of the Selectmen in the sale of the Thomas Ryan property.

Article 11. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Board of Trustees:

I herewith present my tenth annual report as librarian of the Conway Public Library.

The appended table of statistics gives in concise form the activities of the past year. In the matter of circulation, and reading room attendance we have hardly maintained the level of last year, although the magazine circulation is somewhat increased. This slight decline is doubtless due to the fact that fewer books have been purchased.

In response to the plea in the report of last year, the Woman's Club very generously donated a sum of money sufficient to procure fifty books for the children's department, which were purchased early in the year and have been in constant demand.

A later donation, secured through the efforts of Mrs. Allard, chairman of the library extension committee, has just been received. The Duplicate Pay System, introduced as an experiment, the first of September, has proved a popular success. Twenty-one new books have been added to the initial twenty-five, the greater number of which have passed into general circulation. About twenty adult and five juvenile magazines are received monthly, these are placed on the reading tables for one month after which they are available for circulation. For quite a number of these we are indebted to friends who kindly bring them to the library, to whom we wish to express our appreciation.

At the invitation of the Wolfeboro Public Library the librarian, together with others from this town,

attended a neighborhood meeting at the library. Although other towns in the county were sparsely represented, the meeting proved both interesting and helpful. The roof of the library building has received some much needed mending, floors, casings and furniture have been cleaned and redressed, and many other repairs of a minor nature been made.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE CONWAY SCHOOL DISTRICT :

We submit our report which includes the report of the Superintendent of Schools, and the financial statement for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Conway :

It is a pleasure to submit this, my sixth annual report, of the work and condition of your schools. The past year will go into history as the most successful

year in all of the educational work of your schools. The teachers are of a high grade, and most of them have had excellent preparation for the work, and also successful experience. The following is a list of the teachers with the number of pupils in each school:

There are 33 pupils taking Chemistry, 18 taking Physics, 52 taking Typewriting, 56 taking Bookkeeping, and 36 taking Latin. All of the pupils have Mathematics and English; and there are large classes in Economics, Commercial Geography, History and Domestic Science.

The work of the Elementary schools, as shown by tests, and by the work of the pupils in the high school is good.

ATTENDANCE

There has been an unusual amount of sickness during the fall and winter. Mumps, measles, whooping cough, scabies and impetigo have been prevalent, and in most of the schools the attendance has been very low. Many of the pupils must be retarded in their work unless the parents, as well as the teachers, make unusual effort to have the pupils constant in attendance during the remainder of the year. In some cases it does not seem possible to cover the amount of work required. I urge all of the parents to co-operate so far as possible in bringing the work up to the standard.

The teachers from the North Conway schools have just reported to me that there have been 1822 days lost in the grade schools so far this year. The teachers from the graded schools in Conway reported that 2678

days have been lost in these schools. This makes 4500 days lost in these schools alone, or more than 25 years of school work has been lost to the pupils and future citizens of this town. This should give us pause, and we should ask ourselves if this is all necessary?

TRUANCY

As was indicated above, a great amount of absences has been noted. Some of this is due to indifference of parents, or to a deliberate intention to keep children out of school. It has been necessary in some cases to appeal to the court. If a truant officer for the whole town can be selected, one who is known, and who can have time to look after cases of non-attendance, I think there would be much less truancy. This is not a work that should be shifted off upon the superintendent, as he has enough to attend to without this unnecessary burden. I recommend that a proper person be appointed, and that he be paid a proper salary to enable him to attend to this important duty.

KENNETT HIGH SCHOOL

It is very fitting to record an event of great importance to Conway and the surrounding towns. The dedication of this magnificent school building took place September 15th, and was an event long to be remembered. The exercises were in keeping with the princely gift, and a crowd too large to be accommodated in the spacious hall attested the great interest in this event. All of the exercises were listened to with the greatest attention. The dedicatory speech was given by Judge James Remick, of Concord, who had been a close friend

of A. Crosby Kennett, in whose memory the building was erected. It was a great occasion, and the speech was worthy of the occasion. I suggest that the speech, as well as the other events of the day be printed and kept for future reference.

On September 17th the high school opened with 135 pupils. Since that time 11 more pupils have been enrolled, and nine pupils have moved away, or dropped out fore one reason or another. Mr. Ernest Weeks was elected principal, and he at once, with the able body of assistants, gave the school a standing and an ambition to excell. We are all very sorry to lose Mr. Weeks, who was forced to resign because of ill health. He will long be remembered and loved by the students. We were fortunate in having Mr. Ellis McKeen, who was elected to succeed Mr. Weeks, and the school is going forward in every department strongly under Principal McKeen's able management. The register shows that there are 32 Seniors, 23 Juniors, 28 Sophomores, 50 Freshmen, and 4 Post Graduates.

A request that the school be placed on the approved list of the New England Certificate Board has been made, and will no doubt be granted. A proper spirit of ambition is manifest, and a large number of the boys have indicated their intention of entering leading colleges, and fitting themselves for one of the professions. Only a very high standard of work will be accepted. Many of the girls plan on extended educational work, after graduating from the school.

REPAIRS

My last report called attention to the need for

shingling the Grammar school house at Conway. It was found that the roof could be patched and this has been done. But it will have to be shingled soon. Some of the houses are sadly in need of paint, and this painting should be done during the next school year. No other heavy repairs need be made.

ADVANCEMENT

It must always be a principle, in true growth that there must be improvement. But there are times when it is best to call a halt on new adventures, and make sure of the advance that has been made. In my opinion, such a time has arrived in the history of our schools. What we have done seems to be good, and will no doubt meet the approval of all forward looking citizens. We must make the Commercial Department and the Domestic Science in the high school, an assured success, and until this is assured, the other things must wait. But we must not lose sight of other improvements that in time may properly be undertaken. Manual training, an extension of Domestic Arts to the elementary schools, the introduction of Junior High schools in Conway, and North Conway, are some of the improvements that may well be investigated.

In conclusion I wish to heartily thank the School Board, the citizens and the teachers for your aid and co-operation, in making this a most successful year. To the citizen who said that it is costing too much to run our schools, I would say, "You have a board of hard headed men to run your schools. They have looked over every item of expenditure for the past year, and they have approved. These men are busi-

ness men and tax payers. They know, and you know that we have a good thing. And you cannot have schools that are worth having without cost." It will be our earnest endeavor to give the town good value for the money invested in its schools.
