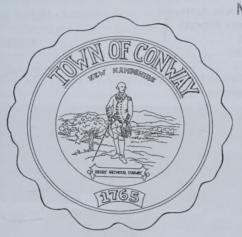

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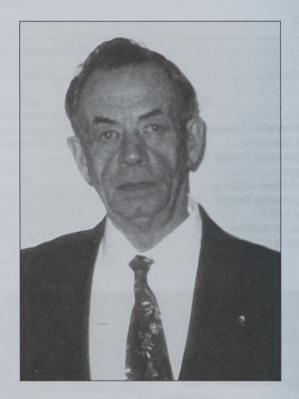

BOARD OF SELECTMEN ANNUAL REPORT 2008

This has been a very busy year for all of the boards, committees and commissions within the Town of Conway. The people who serve on these boards, committees and commissions are to be commended for all the work they do, with the best interest of the town being their main objective. Many times they are only recognized when someone disagrees with a decision that has been made, when in fact they probably have made a lot more that the majority agrees with and never say a word about. My point is, they are trying, so once in a while tell them you appreciate them and thank them for serving the community and for making it what it is.

This past year the Board of Selectmen encompassed a wide variety of ideasand personalities. We, however, strive for unified decisions that continue to generate progress in the Town of Conway. Some of the highlights of 2008 are as follows:

- Taxes will always be a top priority of the Board. The balancing of needs and
 expectations is not an easy endeavor. We work diligently to provide the best
 possible services with the monies available. Through the excellent work of
 town staff, we are able to achieve this goal. Once again, we remind you that
 the Board of Selectmen has no statutory authority allowing it to intercede in
 educational issues. When approached, we have offered suggestions and services to try and reduce expenses for the taxpayers of the Town of Conway.
- 2. The Fourth of July Celebration was a success again this year. The parade was again held in Conway Village and the fireworks and evening festivities were held in Schouler Park in North Conway. The Recreation Department and volunteers did a great job organizing and carrying out the plans for the celebrations
- 3. The record snow fall tested the Highway Department's ability to keep the roads safe, and, as always they did a fine job keeping the roadways open without incident. The crew, from the truck drivers, loader operators, to the mechanics should all be commended for a job well done.
- 4. The floating dock at Conway Lake was removed after many years of service. This was done at the recommendation of our insurance carrier, due to liability exposure.
- 5. A Methadone Clinic tried to locate in Conway and was not received with open arms. The board after having public hearings, could not support the clinic coming to town.
- 6. There was the hot potato issue of the Water Park at Red Jacket Mountain View Inn. There was some question if an air handler at the park had been on the original plans submitted to the Planning Board. The results were a delay in issuing an occupancy permit, which led to much controversy.
- 7. The By-Pass maps that had hung at Town Hall for all those years finally came down. This occurred following an announcement by the State of New Hampshire DOT that the middle and northern sections of the By-Pass were

no longer in the ten year plan, and that more than likely only the southern section would be completed in the foreseeable future.

- 8. The town was approached by a citizen wanting to sell fireworks within the Town of Conway, and after public hearings the Board of Selectmen decided to stay with the ordinance that is in place that prohibits the sale of fireworks.
- 9. Last but not least, the awarding of a certificate of appreciation was given to Gary Webster for his 9 years of service as a Board of Selectmen member.

The past year has been a very busy one for all involved with the day-to-day operations of the Town. The dedicated individuals who make it all come together are to be both thanked and commended for making this community what it is. The Board of Selectmen continues to rely heavily on them for input and direction when dealing with matters that are governed by the ever changing Federal and State Laws. This Board would like to thank the citizens and taxpayers of Conway for their continued input and support.

TOWN MANAGER'S ANNUAL REPORT 2008

This past year was unusual and challenging to say the least. It began with record snowfall which meant great things for skiers, snowmobilers and other outdoor enthusiasts. For our public works staff it meant many long hours plowing snow and keeping the roads clear and safe. Our crew put in a long hard season and I am sure you would all join me in thanking them for their work. For those of us in the administrative section, this past winter meant a lot fretting over the snow removal budget. In fact, it became necessary to ask for increased funding at Town Meeting. The voters supported this request for which we are all appreciative and grateful. The operational costs were also impacted by skyrocketing fuel prices. We spent many hours during the summer months working with community agencies and first responders (see General Assistance Report) planning ways to help those in physical or financial distress due to projected heating costs. As we all know, this all changed in the fall with the emergence of the global financial crisis. Fuel prices plummeted and late year snow fall was not extraordinary so we managed to finish the year in a positive financial condition.

In fact, for these reasons and more importantly to the hard work and cooperation of town staff in controlling costs, we managed to finish the year approximately \$115,000 under our approved expenditures. We are all proud of their efforts and I personally appreciate their dedication on behalf of the community and taxpayers. This savings along with the revenues did not decline to the degree that we had expected meant that we have finished the year with \$414,000 in fund balance. Simply put this means that we put \$414,000 in the bank at year end. As has been the case in the past, I expect that this money will be used in 2009 to offset the tax rate.

As I have been doing over the past few years I want to include a brief discussion of how our local government works. This year I will focus on the authority of the Board of Selectmen and the Town Manager:

The Authority of Towns in New Hampshire

In New Hampshire, local government derives all authority from the state legislature. Whenever a town employee or official acts on anything in his or her official capacity, they are doing so according to the provisions of state law. This means that local ordinances and regulations must be authorized by and consistent with State Law. Town government has only the powers that are expressly given to them by the legislature. It is not enough that there is no law prohibiting a certain action, if no statute grants a power, the town does not have it.

The Role of the Board of Selectmen

While the general policy-making authority for the town rests with the legislative body or "Town Meeting", the Governing Body known as the Board of Selectmen has the duty is to "manage the prudential affairs of the town" between the annual convening of Town Meeting. The Board of Selectmen must by law act as a board and thus no one Selectmen has any independent authority. But what exactly

does the Board of Selectmen do? The board is the executive, managerial and administrative body that carries out decisions of town meeting. IT calls the Town Meeting by drafting and posting the warrant and the selectmen's budgetary advice goes to the budget committee for consideration. The budget committee's proposed budget is then presented to the town meeting in the form of the proposed operating budget and other appropriations articles. The amounts shown in the warrant on the annual budget as "recommended" by the selectmen constitute their advice to the town meeting of the levels of funding required to deliver town services. In town manager towns, the manager advises the selectmen on the budget. The board prepares an annual financial report and is responsible for publishing the reports of all other officers.

Here is a list of the powers and responsibilities of the Board of Selectmen:

Regulation/layout of highways and commons. Control of hazardous

buildings and excavations

Set/enforce health regulations Establish welfare rules

Manage/regulate use of town property Financial accounting

Cemetery trustees Election duties

Set and enforce town codes and ordinances

Litigation

Licensing

In addition, the Board of Selectmen appoints various town officials which may include a Town Manager.

Role of the Town Manager

Many towns including Conway have adopted a Town manager position. The manager's job is serve as the chief executive in carrying out a variety responsibilities on behalf of the community and the board. A manage is hired based on professional qualifications such as "education, training, and experience "without reference to political belief." The manager serves at the will of the selectmen and can be terminated at any time for cause.

Here are the duties of the Conway Town Manager:

Oversees departments and committees

Keeps financial records and reports to Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee

Advises Selectmen on needs of Town and Recommends budget to Selectmen Provides public information and responds to inquiries and complaints

Town of Conway, NH

Oversees the construction and maintenance municipal facilities, (buildings, roads, highways, bridges, parks, recreational areas...)

Improves operational efficiency

Responsible for purchasing and contracts

Conducts research, provides supporting data and advises the Board of Selectmen

Represents governing board with federal, State and Local officials.

Monitors legislation; liaison to congressional staff

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends \$147.15 DEFINITIONS to add the following definition of a "UTILITY POLE" and renumber the ordinance sections accordingly: UTILITY POLE. A structure which is owned by a government agency or utility company and which is used to support lines and other equipment carrying electricity or communications. Proposed by the Planning Board. Recommended by the Planning Board (6-0-0). PASSED 1380-214

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 2 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends \$147.13.8.6.8.1 as follows: "Illumination. Signs shall not be illuminated from within; signs may be illuminated only by external light. Lighting shall be affixed to and, for dimensional purposes, considered part of the sign structure. Lighting shall be located, directed and/or shielded such that it only sheds light downward and is limited to the message display area. The lighting sources shall be of white light and be energy efficient fixtures when possible. Fixtures Lighting sources shall be metal halide or halogen and located, directed and/or shielded such that no direct light emissions are visible at any point along the property boundary, nor shall they in any way be distracting to vehicular traffic." Submitted by Petition. Recommended by the Planning Board (5-1-0). PASSED 1235-362

ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPER-ATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Nine Million Three Hundred Thirty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$9,339,365). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million One Hundred Thirty Four Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$9,134,523) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee by vote of (5-4-0). PASSED 887-720

ARTICLE 5: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4) To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in a TWO-YEAR (2008-2009) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2008 and 2009. This means that the proposed contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal years. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). PASSED 1368-233

ARTICLE 6: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000.00) to be placed in the MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to

the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-1-0). PASSED 1155-443

ARTICLE 7: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000) to contribute to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-1-0). PASSED 1107-482**

ARTICLE 8: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Nine Thousand Five Hundred Eighty One Dollars (\$109,581) from franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). PASSED 1229-360**

ARTICLE 9: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$10,900) to purchase a **COMPUTER SYSTEM SERVER FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-2-0). PASSED 1147-463**

ARTICLE 10: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$15,650) to purchase a MOTORCYCLE WITH SEVEN YEAR EXTENDED WARRANTY PLAN FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-5-0). FAILED 773-806

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) to fund **MAINTENANCE AND IMPROVEMENTS TO TOWN WIDE FIRE PONDS**. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the improvements are completed, or in two years, whichever first occurs. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). PASSED 1294-302**

ARTICLE 12: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise the existing annual **COMPENSATION FOR THE FIVE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN** by five hundred dollars (\$500.00) each from the current Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) each and to appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five

Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to fund this increase. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-7-2). FAILED 526-1080

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 4). To see if the Town will vote to raise the annual COMPENSATION FOR THE THREE MEMBERS OF THE SUPERVISORS OF THE CHECKLIST by Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) each from the current \$1,000.00 each to \$1,400.00 and to appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) to fund this increase for 2008 only, after which the compensation will be reduced to the current \$1,000 per supervisor annually. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). PASSED 880-723

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town of Conway will vote to modify the **ELDERLY EXEMP-TION FROM PROPERTY TAX** pursuant to 72:39b as follows:

To qualify, the person must have been a resident of New Hampshire for at least three years as of April 1 of the tax year in which application is made; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his or her spouse, they must have been married for at least five years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$21,500 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$30,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000, excluding the value of the person's residence.

Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-1-0). PASSED 1371-247

ARTICLE 17: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-1). PASSED 1127-477

ARTICLE 18: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-3-1). PASSED 980-637

ARTICLE 19: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 2007, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial fiscal statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Conway's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Conway as of December 31, 2007, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information are not a required part of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Conway's basic financial statements. ASSESSOR'S REPORT

By far, the most common question we have received as of the end of 2008 has been "When are we going to be lowering assessments?" Upon delving deeper into the reasoning behind the question, we have found that the public's perception of what the real estate market was doing in town was way ahead of what was actually occurring. Actual sales transactions showed that the Conway market had declined about 10% overall as of the end of September and most sale prices had yet to close below the assessed values set in 2004. Another way of looking at this is to say that we had yet to decline to our April 2004 levels.

The public, however, overwhelmingly had the impression that values had declined significantly more than the 10% we were measuring. Most people I talk to would indicate that we have experienced a decline along the lines of 25% or more. There is no doubt that there was a difference between perception and reality.

I attribute the difference to three main reasons. First, housing market declines have been much greater elsewhere in say, Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire and Florida than locally so people who own property there or visit those areas often have developed opinions about up here by what they were seeing down there.

Second, banks have been disposing of their foreclosed homes quickly by discounting them below the general market level. This creates buzz and gossip along the lines of "did you hear what so-and-so's house sold for". These low prices are not (yet) the norm but, if they continue, will have the effect of pulling non-distressed sale prices down.

Third, negative financial news like the stock market decline and Washington bailouts undermine confidence and increase pessimism. Everyone feels that the glass is half empty now and they are projecting what is likely a further decline into their present day perceptions.

Thus the public's perceptions may become self-fulfilling prophecy. As it happens, Conway must be at 100% market value again in tax year 2009. This winter may show further declines in sale prices. It is possible that our 2004 assessments are rapidly becoming au current. We may find it necessary to reduce assessments this fall.

Which leads to the second most common question we've been hearing lately: "If we reduce assessments, will that lower my taxes?" The answer, I regret to report, is... not likely. Your tax bill is the product of your assessed value times the tax rate. Everyone's tax bill together is the money raised to meet the budget number passed by the voters. If assessed values are lowered, we still have to raise the budgeted amount and that means the tax rate must go up to compensate for the lower assessments.

I wish I could be the bearer of better news but Conway is not immune to the financial storms that are pummeling the nation. I suppose the best thing we can do is to try and ride them out by helping each other as best we can.

BUILDING INSPECTOR/CODE ENFORCEMENT

The year 2008 shows still another decrease in new residential and commercial construction; in 2007 the total number of single family homes constructed within the town was fifty six (56) & 1 new duplex. This year or 2008, the total number of single-family homes constructed was thirty four (34) and one (1) new duplex equaling (2) residential units, for a total of thirty six (36) new residences.

Commercial construction showed a decrease in the size and value of new construction and renovations; however the total number of permits for commercial activity is slightly above last years. (2007 - 117 permits 2008 - 123 permits)

In the building inspection department, there were 430 building permits issued in 2008, this is higher than the 389 issued last year in 2007. This number reflects the total of both residential and commercial permits.

All of the permits total to an estimated assessment value for the completed work at over \$28.012 million dollars which is down from last year's total of \$35.239 million. The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits were \$98,922.94 down considerately from the fees paid for last year of \$164,646.72.

This decrease in the permit fees paid to the town is due mostly to reduction in larger commercial permit activity.

Heading into my eleventh year as Building Inspector for the Town of Conway I continue to enjoy the work and look forward each day on the job. This next year is going to be very hard to predict, but is starting slower than last year within the early planning stages. This will most likely show maintenance and smaller activity permit numbers increase while the size of each project remains smaller.

I thank you for the opportunity to serve you and look forward to each up coming year.

CODE COMPLIANCE ANNUAL REPORT 2008

Code Compliance in the Town of Conway involves oversight of the town's zoning ordinances and Planning Board regulations. The Zoning ordinances that I deal with are mostly related to signage and its placement on commercial properties. The town has regulations that restrict the time, place and manner in which signs may be displayed and each zoning district has its own set of ordinances. When someone wants to erect a new sign or replace an old one, my job is to make sure that it complies with the regulations or in the case of a pre-existing business, determine whether or not it is *grandfathered*. Other zoning regulations deal with limiting commercial activities on residentially zoned property (home occupations) and other change of use issues related to commercially zoned property. The Planning Board's Site Plan regulations deal with compliance to the town's requirements for and maintainance of commercial property.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2008

The Emergency Management Director (EMD) reports to the Town Manager. The EMD has no reporting staff and works closely with police, fire, emergency medical support, public works, planning, The Memorial Hospital, American Red Cross, NH Bureau of Emergency Management, New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services and other groups that provide assistance to the community in time of disaster.

Following is a list and brief explanation of each of emergency preparedness plans developed for the Town of Conway and activities undertaken during 2008 to improve our readiness status. These plans are designed to protect people who live and work in the town, along with part time residents and visitors.

• Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)

- A plan for Conway, designed to save lives and protect property in the event of a man-made or natural disaster.
- o On April 29, 2008 our planning was tested and was successful.
 - We activated our plan to open a shelter in the event we were required to evacuate people in Conway during the flood watch.
 - The situation began with a call from Chief Wagner that we might have to evacuate some residents.
 - Within one hour we were prepared to open a shelter for people and pets at the Conway Middle School. The efforts of Dr Nelson, Chiefs Wagner and Solomon, and Ms Scrimger of the Red Cross put into place a plan that would have cared very well for the citizens of our community and their pets in the event we had to evacuate residents.
 - Our planning, coordination, cooperation and communication paid off greatly.
 All handled a situation that could have stressed the resources of our teams professionally.
 - Community Emergency Response Training (CERT) was conducted during
 - May, 2008 with 16 people in attendance.

• Pandemic Influenza Plan

- The plan was developed to care for public health emergencies that could be caused by natural disasters, biological terrorism, chemical terrorism, or naturally occurring communicable disease outbreaks.
- We finalized development of the final four plans during the spring of 2008.
 Those plans are Isolation and Quarantine, Medical Surge Capacity, Acute Care Center, and Mass Fatality.
- The Memorial Hospital, Saco River Medical Group, and Stonehearth Open Learning Opportunities (SOLO) assisted Town of Conway in the development of these plans along with the establishment of a Medical Reserve Corps. The assistance of the medical community is crucial to our readiness and success.

A grant was secured for the purpose of purchasing a trailer and supplies identified that would be required to open the Acute Care Center in the event it is needed.

• Emergency Operations Center

- Establishment of a command center along with procedures that would be activated in the time of a major emergency where department heads, police and fire personnel would work together to make unified decisions to care for the emergency situation at hand.
 - A Public Information Officer training session was conducted on 4/17/2008.
 - People trained at this session could be called upon to provide information to the public during an emergency.
 - A Table Top exercise was conducted during May, 2008 to exercise our Emergency Operations Center / Multi Agency Communications Center.
 - A grant was secured for this purpose as well as the purchase of supplies identified for the EOC/MACE

Due to a medical condition I unfortunately had to resign from my positions as Emergency Management Director for the Town of Conway during the fall of 2008.

I would like to thank the residents of Conway and all the Town of Conway employees, members of the Board of Selectmen, Police Department personnel, and members of the Conway Fire Departments I worked with during my employment. They were all very helpful and made my tasks enjoyable. A special thanks to Earl Sires, Karen Hallowell and Billie Joe Parker.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 2008

In past years I've taken great strides to provide statistical information about this program. This year I was faced with a choice between working the numbers and providing direct service to people in need. Based on the law and the humanitarian purpose of this program, I opted to focus on direct service, however, I can confidently report on General Assistance trends.

Suffice it is to say that the General Assistance Department statistics are in line with the rest of the economy. By that I mean that the pendulum has swung back and we are seeing more people with greater needs. As a result, we overspent our budget by about 35% and the workload is incredibly high. Housing is still our highest expense, followed by heat and utilities.

As I ponder my accomplishments for 2008, I would say that our work toward Heating Oil and Propane Planning is worth mentioning. In June we began meeting with various organizations and business owners to discuss and plan ahead for winter heating. In August, we held a public forum that was aired several times on Valley Vision. As a result of this work, a new program was created. "Project Warm Hearts" is a fuel assistance program that is funded by donations and re-distributed by Gifts from the Heart to residents of Conway and surrounding towns. This program was designed in a way that would allow all fuel companies and their customers to participate. It is hoped that this program will be self sustaining and continue as the years pass so that people who don't qualify for fuel assistance may still be able to get a little bit of help if they find themselves faced with extenuating circumstances. Special thanks to Todd Miller of White Mountain Oil and Propane for designing the program.

As I work toward completing my 10th year of service to Conway, I'd like to express my gratitude to Earl and to my co-workers for making it a rewarding and enjoyable experience. I'd also like to thank our Board of Selectman for their continued support.

To the residents of Conway, it is with pleasure that I file my first annual report as the Health Officer. New Hamphire RSA's require each town have a person appointed to serve in this office. The duties are many and varied. For the most part, we serve as a contact point for folks who may have a health complaint of some type.

I receive complaints of food service operations which are turned over to the State Inspector and happily we have less than five a year. Most of these turn out to be a misunderstanding. Also, there have been a few complaints that involve hotel and bed and breakfast establishments of which only one complaint required more than a visit by the State inspector to resolve.

Most of the duties of this office are to inspect homes for foster kids and day care centers of which we have a number in this town. We also work with members of the fire and police departments on concerns for the safety of elderly members of our community and in situations where children may be living in conditions that could be harmful to their growth and development.

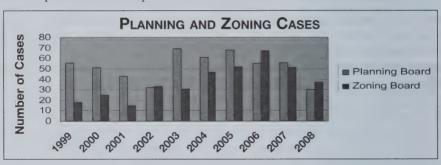

PLANNING DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2008

2008 has been an economically challenging year for everyone. Stock market collapse, recession and energy issues have had a significant effect on development activity. There was a marked reduction in the number of applications that were processed by the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Most of those applications were received during the first half of the year. It was during the latter half of the year that the application activity slowed. Still the department was kept busy during the construction phases for those large projects which were approved in 2007 and 2008. Another symptom of the weak economy was the hesitation on the part of the developers to exercise the conditional approvals that they had been granted. The reduced volume of applications and appeals provided time for the Department and the Planning Board to update the implementation chapter of the Master Plan and the Planning Board determined that with the updated implementation chapter the Master Plan is still current and relevant.



The jump in energy costs in 2007 and the first half of 2008 along with emergence of enhanced energy technology stimulated an increased interest in wind turbine energy. On the heals of new State legislation, a NH Office of Energy and Planning Technical Bulletin and a model ordinance addressing Small wind energy systems, the Department assisted the Planning Board with a proposed small wind energy system ordinance that will be considered for the April Town Meeting in 2009. This provides the Building Inspector tools for regulating the development of such energy sources. The department also participated in the LUCA (Local Update of Census Addresses) program in preparation for the 2010 Census. This took a significant amount of effort and time. This department will be involved in the 2010 Census preparations again in 2009. There were also several time consuming court cases in which the Town prevailed. That's the nature of local governance...just when you think you have some room to breath someone hands you another crisis.

In 2009 we hope to rewrite the Subdivision Regulations, address site lighting in the Site Plan Review Regulations and address the signage provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. This Department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR/TOWN ENGINEER ANNUAL REPORT 2008

2008 was a busy year for Public Works. The highway crew's projects consisted of several road reconstructions including, Thorne Hill Road, Allens Siding and Passaconaway Road as well as the West Side Road railroad crossing.

Other construction projects included the North Conway Water Precinct new water and sewer pipelines along Depot Road, Neighbors Row and Intervale Crossroads. The Town coordinated with the Precinct and rebuilt the roadways and driveway systems. The Kearsarge Road portion of that project is scheduled for the spring of 2009. Birch Hill Water System construction was completed this past summer. This project connected Birch Hill to the North Conway Water Precinct.

Conway Village Fire District, Phase I water and sewer lines design was completed and that project will be getting underway in the spring of 2009.

A new culvert was installed under Brownfield Road above the dam and town beach section this past season.

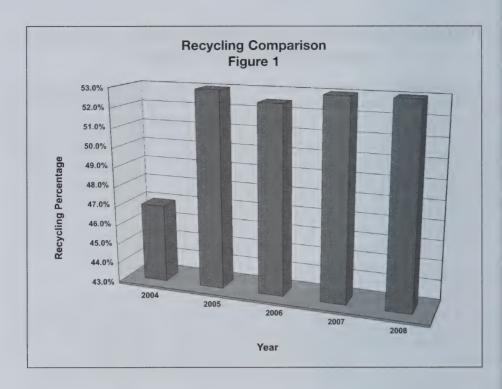

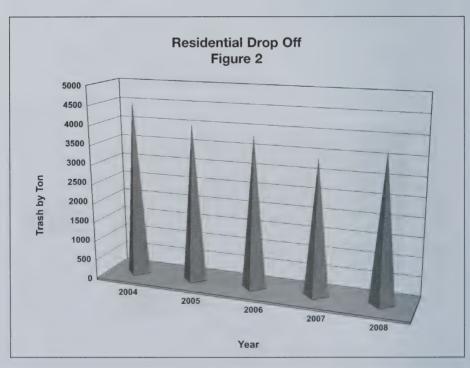
A new fire alarm and smoke detection system was installed at the Recreation Center to bring the building into code compliance.

RECREATION DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2008

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building, 1808 East Main Street in Center Conway. Our facility includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, art room, audio visual room & television lounge. The outdoor facility features a playground, outdoor basketball court and a multi-purpose athletic field equipped with lights.

The Conway Recreation Department is responsible for the maintenance and scheduling of outdoor parks and recreation areas for various community uses. Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Schouler Park, Washington Street Park, Whitaker Homesite Field, Connie Watson Davis Park and Shedd Woods. Included with these parks are various cemeteries which are maintained also by the Conway Parks and Recreation Department. These sites listed above provide recreational activities such as Nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, volleyball, picnicking and various other activities conducted on our multi-purpose fields.

Our children's programming for 2008 included t-ball, girl's softball, Red Cross Swim program, summer program, soccer, flag football, field hockey, basketball, biddy basketball, pond hockey and children's playgroup. Other special events sponsored by the recreation department included our annual Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween Party and Turkey Trot Race.

Adult programs in 2008 were strong and very active. We offered men's softball, over 40 men's softball, open gym on Tuesdays and Thursdays, ballroom dancing and adult basketball league. Along with these adult programs we continued to offer special programming to our senior citizen population. Bingo and Scrabble were a popular activity and will continue to be part of our programming in 2009.

The Teen Center offers a drop-in atmosphere which caters to boys and girls in grades 6-8. The Teen Center is open four nights per week including weekends. This gives teens the opportunity to hang out and enjoy their friends in an environment that is safe and healthy. The teen center also takes weekly trips to the Ham Arena for Friday night skating.

This past summer we were responsible for the 4th of July Celebration in Conway & North Conway Village. It is a unique day with festivities beginning in Conway Village for a large parade followed by entertainment and fireworks in Schouler Park. This year's event was one our largest attended with a great atmosphere of patriotism and family fun. I would like to especially thank all of the local businesses who unselfishly sponsor this event in conjunction with the Town of Conway.

In closing I would like to thank all of the parents, volunteers and coaches who have made our 2008 programs such a success. Your commitment to the children

and your community is second to none. Special thanks go to the businesses and civic organizations that support our programs with financial and in kind donations. I do not believe there is any other town in New Hampshire which supports its recreation programs more than you.

It is always a pleasure to serve the citizens of Conway as your Recreation Director and hope that you may volunteer, participate or be involved in some capacity in 2009.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 2008

The past year was a year of review, appraisal and management planning for the Town's Conservation Lands.

A major activity was the visiting or reconnaissance of the Town Forests by our Consulting Forester. The result of this work is published in the Status/Update Report of December 2008. Whitaker Woods, Whitaker Homesite, Pudding Pond and the Common Lands in East Conway and Hurricane Mountain are components of the report. Recent activity there is recounted, the results evaluated and future work identified.

Early in the year and consistent with the Town's 2003 Master Plan, The Commission entered into an agreement with the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust (USVLT) to work cooperatively in the acquisition of land conservation easements and land in fee for the purpose of retaining and protecting agricultural and open space lands in the Town.

Similarly, the Commission has agreed to join with the USVLT in a Strategic Conservation Planning Project. This initiative is specifically intended to develop a Strategic Conservation Plan to proactively identify and target conservation priorities for permanent protection from fragmentation and development in the Town.

In Phase I, a Resource Inventory will be conducted that will quantify and analyze highly valued resources. Those resources to be evaluated include both natural (water, forestry, agriculture, wild life habitat and natural communities) and cultural (recreation, scenic, and historic). The result should be that we will be better able to identify and preserve the highest valued lands in our community.

A Forest Stewardship Plan for Whitaker Woods and Homesite was published. It replaces the original plan developed about 20 years ago. The goals and objectives for managing this highly regarded property are:

- Make these properties open and available to the public for all types of recreational activities (no hunting, fires, camping, or motorized vehicles) that will not damage the land or impair other people's enjoyment.
- Improve the forest conditions utilizing sound, sustainable silvicultural practices while observing and maintaining the aesthetics so as not to detract from the recreational opportunities.
- Conserve and protect soil and water resources.
- Maintain and improve the existing wildlife habitat.
- Enhance and encourage educational opportunities with the community and schools.

The Commission continues to work with the White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA). The Association continues to meet its trail maintenance commitment and more recently received permission to build a mountain bike skills development "Pump Track" at Pudding Pond. The track will be located near the NEMBA built Sticks and Stones Trail.

Members of the Conservation Commission are: Paul Pinkham, Chair; Rob Adair, Vice-chair; Carol Lyman, Treasurer; David Weathers; Selectman's Representative, Phil Haynes, Dan Lucy, Chuck Broomhall, Connie Briggs and Alternate; Linda Kearney. Jean Simon provides administrative support to the Commission and Gail Currier records meeting minutes.

The Commission's Consulting Forester is Don Johnson of Forest Land Improvement.

2008 REPORT OF THE CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

In 2008, the Conway Police Department faced many challenges both natural and manmade. Record snowfalls and power outages presented challenges for the residents and visitors alike. Keeping traffic moving and responding to calls for help, which increase significantly during these times, are always dynamic problems for the department to solve. As taxing as these environmental dilemmas are, the real work of the Conway Police Department revolves around responding to the manmade problem of crime.

As you can see by the Town Report, crime and criminal activity has increased in all significant areas. Most troubling are the areas like robbery, burglary and drug sales, which jeopardize our safety and quality of life here in the Valley. Through the leadership of Chief Ed Wagner and his staff, the Department has risen to these challenges repeatedly. With the addition of a new patrol officer and a total commitment to proactive community policing, this agency has made a positive impact on crime in 2008. Increased patrols, at no cost to the taxpayer thanks to New Hampshire Highway safety grants, have made all our streets safer. A 41% increase in DWI arrests for 2008 helped us all get home safe. The efforts of this Department have put over \$44,000.00 of revenue back into the general fund through: alarms, fingerprints, pistol permits, report copy fees, liquor law enforcement, and fees associated with cruiser billing on details. These types of facts become even more important with uncertain economic times ahead.

As your representatives, we the Board of Commissioners are sensitive to the tax burden we all bear. However, when making tough financial decisions about lifesaving services we need to think clearly and act wisely. "Across the board" cuts only make sense if demands for those services are equal "across the board". To police this Town effectively, we need to ensure that the resources and funding of the Department reasonably match the demand. Now more than ever, with demand at its peak, we need to recognize that the value of quality police work far outweighs the costs.

It is our sincere pleasure to serve this Community as your Police Commission. Standing side by side with the fine men and women that make up the Conway Police Department, we look forward to keeping Conway safe now and in the future.

2008 REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

The Conway Police Department was challenged once again by the increased level of criminal activity. As you may know, this year the Town of Conway was marred with several serious criminal acts. Some of the most serious were the eleven robberies, three of which were committed by armed offenders. Along with these robberies, were several other serious crimes, which included; burglary, assault and the continued prevalence of drugs and drug related crimes.

To help fight the increase in crime, the Conway Police Department hired Ryan Wallace, a graduate of Fryeburg Academy and a New Hampshire National Guard Military Policeman, on January 18th to fill the position of an officer that resigned in 2007. The Town also voted this year for the addition of a new police officer position. That position was filled on July 31st with the hiring of Jaymes Lapoint. Officer Lapoint grew up in Somersworth, NH and is a recent graduate of the University of New Hampshire. With these two new additions and a renewed effort in enforcement, the police department had a noticeable increase in motor vehicle stops and arrests associated with criminal activity.

The department was again the recipient of several grants during 2008. New Hampshire Highway Safety was gracious enough to award the department with grants for DWI, Seatbelt, Bicycle, Speed and Sobriety Checkpoint patrols. These grants totaled approximately \$13,000.00 in reimbursement funds allowing us to increase safety efforts with no cost to the taxpayer.

I am proud to say that a member of this department was the recipient of several local, state and national awards for his lifesaving efforts. In the early morning hours of September 2nd, Officer Michael Boucher risked life and limb to rescue Emily McManus from her burning home. Without hesitation Officer Boucher entered the burning home, went upstairs, found Emily huddled behind her bed in her smoke filled room and brought her to safety and into the waiting arms of her parents. For these efforts Boucher received the following awards; a Letter of Commendation from the Conway Police Commission, a Declaration of Meritorious Service from the New Hampshire House of Representatives given to him by Carolyn Brown, a National Police Hall of Fame Lifesaving Award and a Congressional Award for Outstanding Actions in the Line of Duty from the United States Congress. This kind of conduct not only reflects well of Officer Boucher but also is emblematic of the type of commitment that each officer possesses for the community.

I will again say that I am very proud of the men and women of the Conway Police Department as they have throughout the year served the community well and will continue to do so in years to come.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2008

The Conway Public Library is one of the most valuable resources which our town provides. Thomas Jefferson stated that a democracy must provide its citizens continuous access to current information in order to remain viable as a form of government. In 2008 our library had 79,458 individual visits (an increase of 19% over 2007); library patrons borrowed 77,832 books, videos and DVDs from the library collection. While using the library, individuals visited 126,621 web sites and attended 295 community programs. It is very encouraging to report these numbers as it reflects well on the ongoing pursuit of information by library users.

This level of activity requires substantial support from both the library staff and our wonderful volunteers. The library, and therefore its patrons, benefit from a creative and very active Friends of the Conway Public Library. The Friends schedule events and provide many volunteer hours of support. They organized book sales in April and August; the library receives donations of books and other articles year round. And this year Brian Wiggin, a Friend and a former trustee, has selected donated books to sell on eBay and has raised over \$3,000 for the library. All the proceeds are then used to purchase needed items such as the new audio/video shelving in the Children's Room, a subscription to Book Page, the no-smoking signs, color cartridges for the color printer, outside plantings for the library's gardens as well as programs presented for the summer reading program.

The Friends also organized a number of delightful events. In May they scheduled a concert by the Mountain Air String Quartet, and in December they arranged for a concert of Christmas music performed by the Mountain Top Music orchestra. Both concerts were well attended and those present enjoyed wonderful refreshments provided by the Friends. In September the Friends held their annual meeting, which featured a very informative pictorial description by Larry Garland on the places he has hiked and climbed throughout the world.

In 2007 town employees discovered a number of files of historical town papers. The library applied for and received a special grant from the Henney Trust to fund additional hours for David Emerson, our historian in residence. He sorted Conway records dating from 1790-1920 to complete a history of Conway's 22 school districts as well as a history of highway construction. David also organized the papers of Dr. Bemis, which describe the development of the 10th Mountain Highway as well as other topics of interest. Anyone with an interest in Conway's history knows that David is an invaluable resource in the Henney History Room. The trustees appreciate and commend him for his hard work.

The library continues to offer adult reading groups, which are well attended and are expertly led by Kate Darlington. The summer reading program, which was ably led by Olga Morrell and Janis Minshull, was a particular success this summer. The theme was "G'day for Reading," and participating in the program were 221 children, who read for 3,721 hours.

One Book One Valley is an annual event organized by 10 libraries in and around Mount Washington Valley with additional support provided by White Birch Book Store. In its third year the event had more participants engaged in reading Here If You Need Me by Kate Braestrup. Over 150 people attended the author presentation which addressed issues focusing on the death of a loved one. The author answered questions from participants for more than 90 minutes. Olga Morrell helped to organize and to fund the event through grant writing.

In May the library staff scheduled a supper at the Kennett High School Mineral Springs Café to recognize all the library volunteers, the Friends board and the library trustees. It was a festive event which everyone enjoyed – especially the delicious food prepared by the Kennett students.

In the fall of 2007 the Robert and Karin Finlay Foundation issued a challenge to all the public libraries in New Hampshire to compete for a \$25,000 grant by participating in a campaign to increase the number of library patrons possessing library cards who utilize their library's resources. The Conway Trustees delighted in responding to the challenge and received broad community support during the drive period of November 2007 through October 2008. WMWV and Valley Vision provided numerous public service announcements, and the Conway Daily Sun provided generous amounts of print space for related articles. White Birch Books, The Met, and Flat Bread Company offered a discount to customers who showed their library cards when shopping or dining. When the New Hampshire Department of Employment Security Office relocated to the library for several weeks during a period when construction work was being done on their building, the counselors of NHDES promoted the advantage of possessing a library card to their clients. The Youth Services Librarian partnered with the faculty coordinator of the Kennett High Key Club and the director of the Mountain Washington School to Career Partnership to promote Library Sign-Up Month when school resumed in September. The library staff and Friends distributed signs, posters and handouts throughout the valley. As a result of these efforts 1,147 persons obtained library cards during this period of time, which is more than double the typical number of new patrons enrolled in a 12 month period. Although the library did not win the challenge, the Trustees felt that the increased awareness of our town library's resources was a fine outcome.

Another new project developed by the Youth Services Librarian, Janis Minshull, is a mobile outreach program to Conway's preschool and day care centers. Many of these youngsters are not able to come to the library regularly, so the outreach program allows them to borrow and read books. This project is one of the reasons that there has been a 23% increase in the circulation of juvenile books and

videos. A second factor has been the development of a young adult advisory group, which meets regularly to decide on resources and programs which will make the library more appealing and relevant to young readers.

2008 was a year which witnessed significant changes in the membership of the trustees' board. Sally Hartshorne and Gene Drolet completed their terms on the board after many generous years of service. Laurie Mack also resigned mid term when her work schedule conflicted with meetings; she was replaced by Barbara Douglass.

The trustees are very appreciative of the work of their treasurer, Linda Hutchinson, who has revised and updated the financial reports which she produces on a monthly basis. And working closely with our Head Librarian, Penny Deans has written a purchasing policy which was adopted by the board. The trustees are always cognizant of their responsibility to oversee the library's budget carefully; in this period of economic downturn, they feel this responsibility even more keenly.

One measure of the degree to which our library is appreciated was demonstrated when a vacancy occurred on the board of trustees mid term. The trustees contacted several persons whom they felt might be interested in serving on the board. In response, we had three excellent candidates all willing to serve on the board. We referred the candidates to the Board of Selectmen, which made the difficult choice. We see this as evidence of the degree to which the library is valued. As always, the trustees wish to thank all the staff members as well as all the volunteers for continuing to keep our library the "crown jewel" of the state public libraries.

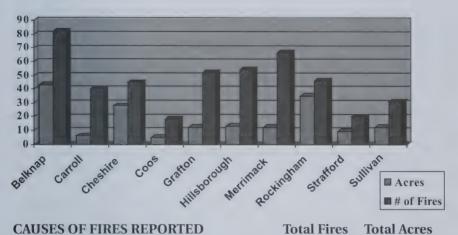
Spring fire season lasted unusually long this past year, with very high fire danger stretching into the first week of June. Once again, the rains started to fall during the summer and the fire activity was fairly light for the remainder of the year. The acreage burned was less than that of 2007. The largest forest fire during the 2008 season burned approximately 54 acres on Rattlesnake Mountain in Rumney on White Mountain National Forest property. Another 39 acre fire occurred on Mount Major in Alton during the month of April. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2008 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. AMERICAN RED CROSS MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER

The Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross (MWV-ARC) is proud of its 80+ years of service to the residents of the Mount Washington Valley.

The Mission of the Chapter is "...to improve the quality of human life; to enhance self-reliance and concern for others; and to help people avoid, prepare for, and cope with emergencies." Each year, the MWV-ARC strives to find new funding to improve upon the many programs and services available to the community. However, the chapter still depends on the generosity of the community to succeed in its commitment in fulfilling its mission.

Service to the Armed Forces provides immediate messaging between families and loved ones serving in our military around the world. Blood Services provides the basis for being able to donate blood to help save someone's life. Disaster Services provides temporary shelter, clothing and food, when a disaster occurs within its service area; and prevention and preparation education. Health & Safety Services provides individuals with swim lessons, water safety, and life saving skills, such as Adult, Infant & Child CPR, Automated External Defibrillation (AED) training, First Aid and Babysitter's Training. International Tracing Services provides information about International Disasters and Family Tracing.

By the end of our 2008 fiscal year (06/30/08), the MWV-ARC trained over 500 hundred Conway area citizens in First Aid and CPR/AED skills, Lifeguard training, Water Safety Instruction, and Babysitter Training; and provided emergency disaster relief, such as temporary housing, food, clothing, and bedding/linen to another 8 Conway citizens. Incidentally, the most common disaster our chapter responds to is a single-family house fire.

The American Red Cross is not a government agency, which means, individual chapters rely solely upon the financial support of the American people in order to continue on in its mission; and provide the following services:

CHILDREN UNLIMITED

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality, comprehensive developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their children. Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the children with special needs is a priority.

Professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers, staff the program. Program services include: developmental screenings, evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments/consultations and interagency networking. Fifty-three (53) Conway children and families received services in 2008.

GIBSON CENTER

The Gibson Center is a busy and expanding place, but everything we do is an extension of our Mission Statement:

Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

There is no way we could do what we do without the support of our community. This past year, we served 59,179 congregate and home delivered meals; a new record. Over 77% of our meals go to Conway residents. Over 90% of our van riders came from Conway.

We are fantastically lucky to have our dedicated volunteers. These are the people who really make our funding work responsibly. It may be hard to believe, but again last year over 12,000 volunteer hours were given to the Gibson Center; that in spite of the high gas prices we faced in 2008. We ALWAYS have room for more volunteers.

This past year we were deeply involved with Conway town officials, oil companies and other non-profits to offset the then-impending emergency with heating fuel costs. It was an almost unheard of collaboration. With the economy so uncertain, we are trying to stay on top of what may come. Several businesses and individuals have given us badly needed donations to our senior food pantry.

And though the numbers of meals we serve have risen substantially, we have flat lined our budget request to Conway for this year.

The Center oversees the management of Silver Lake Landing in Madison; 20 low cost, independent senior apartments. It is important that the taxpayers of Conway know that Silver Lake Landing is owned and operated by the Silver Lake Senior Housing Corporation, a separate 501(c) (3) corporation. No Town funds are used for the operation and management. Silver Lake Landing is completely separate from the day-to-day activities of The Gibson Center.

NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER

The North Conway Community Center has been serving our community since 1948. The Community Center has gone through many changes in the 60 years it has been in the Valley. The Center has expanded from the land which the building occupies by acquiring land that includes the playground area and Mud Bowl property. The Harvey Dow Gibson Playground has been upgraded and improved at least 3 times in our history to meet the needs of the families in our Valley. The Center is looking to the future by writing grants and fundraising to continue to improve. The Community Center is in the process of evaluating our needs and space to continue to expand our programs and services to the residents of Conway. Other improvements include; the tot pool has been upgraded to a Spray ground and the summerhouse has changed into the snack shack. Obviously the Center could not be in existence without the dedicated support of many organizations and volunteers who have provided financial and physical support.

A twelve-person volunteer Board of Directors runs the Center. These Directors are the main fundraisers; they are the people you see flipping burgers, running games at the Fourth of July, and standing up to support the Center at Town Meetings. These hardworking volunteers have risen over \$125,000 a year, which is used to pay the bills at the Center. The Board is proud of their accomplishment of providing a safe recreational facility, which was built with donations and grants, and is dedicated to continuing to serve the recreational needs of our community.

In the second year of the State Line Youth Football League the North Conway Community Center had 4 teams with 62 participants. The Community Center and Fryeburg Recreation combined to have 5 teams and over 90 kids play tackle football. The second year of tackle football has been truly a success with more participants every year. This year's summer camp team up with John Fuller School which housed our kids who were entering 1st through 4th grade was better than we hope for. For our summer camp we had over 150 participants register and with two sites including the North Conway Community Center we saw 90 plus kids a day. Our seasonal staff continues to grow due to the number of participants every year.

The Center's main focus is youth programming. Our programs participants have grown over 35% in the past three years. We offer soccer, tackle football, flag football, basketball, field hockey, cheering, t-ball, and softball, as well as a summer day camp for children. Our building is used every night throughout the week with dog training, fencing, tango classes, meetings, pick up basketball, and rentals for birthday parties and special events. We are open after school everyday for kids to drop in and play basketball or play in the game room. The Center is a busy place year round. The Center has been a huge supporter of the Eight Grade Washington DC trip, Key Club, and Deca Club.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Conway, Mark Miller, President of the board, the Board of Directors and Roger Grucel and the army of volunteers who continue to help coach and fundraise throughout the year. Without your help the community center would not be as successful and popular as it is today.

NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER

This is a NH licensed daycare program that provides care for children ages 13 months to 12 years of age. The program employs well qualified staff specifically trained to work with children in this setting. At present 48% of our children enrolled are from single family homes. Our affordable child care center enables these parents to stay in the work force and not go on state assistance.

Services include a toddler room, daycare (with a pre-school component for age 4), 1/2 day for Kindergarten students, before and after school and summer day camp. Transportation is available to and from John Fuller School on the AM and PM school bus as well as, for a small fee, at mid-day for the kindergarten program.

There is a meal program included in the daily rate which is comprised of a well balanced breakfast, lunch and afternoon snack. Food is prepared by our own staff cook.

STARTING POINT

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups, resources and referrals and community education programs. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

Highlights of clients/services provided to Town of Conway Residents during the time period of July 1, 2007 – June 30, 2008:

- Starting Point worked with the 144 victims of domestic violence, 39 victims of sexual violence and 22 victims of stalking in the Town of Conway representing 38% of Starting Point's overall clients.
- Starting Point staff and/or volunteers had contact with the 205 Conway residents for a total of 1278 contacts. These contacts included crisis line advocacy, in-person visits, court assistance, hospital advocacy and support group participation.
- Emergency shelter was provided to 12 women and 11 children for a total of 1817 bednights.
- 119 students at Conway Elementary and 100 students at John Fuller Elementary participated in Starting Point's *Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary* program at no cost to the schools.

- 150 7th grade students at Kennett Middle School participated in our *Healthy Relationships: The Next Step* program which focuses on sexual harassment prevention. 155 8th grade health class participants received *Healthy Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know about Dating Violence.* These were both at no cost to the middle school.
- 100 high school health students participated in our *Healthy Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know about Sexual Assault* program at no cost to the high school.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

Tri-County Community Action/Carroll County is a private non-profit agency that was established in 1965. The Resource Center is located at 448 White Mountain Highway in Tamworth.

During the fiscal year July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008, our agency has provided services to Conway residents that total \$605,404. The services provided include; Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, and Weatherization/Home Energy Conservation. In addition, we are the conduit for the distribution of USDA Surplus Food to all the food pantries in Carroll County.

Tri-County Community Action provides necessary services for the most vulnerable and less fortunate citizens in our communities who would otherwise have to seek help from the town. We are depending upon funding from your town and neighboring communities countywide. These local funds are used to make available local intake and support for federal and state programs including Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, Homeless Prevention, Weatherization, and electric utility conservation programs.

We greatly appreciate your support and look forward to a continued cooperation and partnership with your towns' residents, elected officials and staff.

WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

White Mountain Community Health Center is a nonprofit health care center located in Conway. The mission of the center is to provide medical care to the underinsured and uninsured. The center provides reduced fees to these residents. This ensures that everyone can receive the health care they need to stay healthy.

The center provides medical outpatient services for men, women and children. This includes a children's program that provides physicals, sick call visits, diagnosis and treatment, inoculations, and many screens to assess the child's or infant's health status. The prenatal program provides care beginning with pregnancy, deliveries of babies with a nurse mid-wife, and post natal care. Adults and teens are also seen for physicals, screenings, sick calls, diagnosis treatment and family planning.

The value to the town includes services offered and not funded by the town:

- In 2008 WMCHC is proving mental healthy counseling services to our patients.
- *Healthy Smiles* program provides dental services provided by a dental hygienist and a dentist. These oral health services are provided in the Conway elementary schools and at the health center.
- Partners in Health is a program focused on children with chronic illnesses.

- The health center assists in the application of Healthy Kids for those children who quality.
- *Employee Prepay Program* is a program that employers prepay for our services at a discount. This offers small businesses an affordable way to provide out patient healthcare to their employees.
- Patient Assistance Funds includes funds to help patients with medication, transportation, and medical testing.

The health center gives away over \$34,000.00 a month in free care to patients. We are asking for only 6% of what it costs us to serve a Conway resident. Due to the service based economy in this area, many employees do not have health insurance coverage. This year we are seeing an increased number of people who have lost their jobs.

We rely on various sources of revenue to assist us in serving these patients. The Town appropriations are an important part of how we can offer free and reduced services to those Conway residents in need. If White Mountain Community Health Center did not exist, Conway could have a larger tax burden. While our visits and services continue to grow each year, we only ask for level funding. We always appreciate the support of Conway residents and we look forward to your support again this year.

Results of the 2009 Deliberative Session

The deliberative session of the 2009 Town Meeting was held on March 2, 2009. Warrant articles 8, 9, 18, and 21 were amended. All other articles were approved as submitted for placement on the ballot. Voting will be held on April 14, 2009. The amended articles are as follows:

Note: Deleted language is shown in strikethrough and added text is shown in bold text.

ARTICLE 8: BOND ARTICLE. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,000,000 \$800,000) (gross budget) for the construction and original equipping of a new PUBLIC WORKS SERVICE GARAGE and to authorize the issuance of not more than Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and other municipal officials to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto; and to authorize the withdrawal of up to Two Hundred Thousand Zero Dollars (\$200,000 \$0) from the Buildings Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. A 3/5 ballot vote is required to pass this article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-5-1).

ARTICLE 9: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant or amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Nine Million One Hundred Fifty Ninety Nine Thousand, Three Hundred Forty Three Dollars (\$9,159,343 \$9,199,343)? Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Three Hundred Thirty Three Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$9,333,776) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-0-3). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-2-1).

ARTICLE 18: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500 \$12,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. (Level funding request). Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).

ARTICLE 21: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Four Hundred Eighty Three Four Dollars (\$7,483 \$7,484) in support of STARTING POINT providing advocacy and support to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-2-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

BUDGET NARRATIVE

Introduction

In August 2008, the Board of Selectmen adopted a "0 Base Budget" approach in formulating the 2009 operating budget. All Town services, functions, and programs were reviewed to determine whether they were necessary and whether they were being provided at the appropriate level. This also meant that all expenditures were approved rather than only approving increases to existing programs and in essence leaving all programs and services intact.

The Board of Selectmen requested that the Town Manager submit a budget that supported the existing mission of town departments. That is, the Board asked for a budget that would support the current level of service for town programs and functions. Their job would then be to review this budget from a "0 based" approach.

After conducting this process, the Board of Selectmen forwarded a recommended budget to the Budget Committee for consideration. The Budget Committee reviewed that budget and subsequently presented a proposed operating budget of \$9,159,343 for consideration at the Deliberative Session.

The following narrative presents the budget as forwarded to the ballot by the legislative body after action at the Deliberative Session.

The total proposed operating budget is \$9,199,343 which amounts to a decrease of \$140,022 or 1.5% from the 2008 adopted budget (see Attachment 1). The proposed default budget calculation is presented in Attachment 2. As will be seen, the proposed operating budget is actually \$134,433 less than the default budget of \$9,333,776.

While the net change in the proposed budget is a decrease, as in any year, some items increased while others decreased.

Significant increases include the following:

- Employee Benefits increase by \$44,124.00.
- The increase of \$64,531 in the Police Budget results largely from costs associated with existing employees including full year funding for the additional officer approved at the 2008 Town Meeting.
- An increase of just over \$22,704 is noted for the Parks and Recreation budget. Significant decreases are as follows:
- The Highway Budget is decreased by \$55,690. Highway Labor has been reduced over last year from \$514,273 to \$483,410. As readers will remember, this line was increased significantly at the 2008 Town Meeting due to the win-

ter weather in early 2008. Hired Equipment has also been reduced on the expectation that snow removal will not be needed as often as last year. In addition, it is anticipated that street lights along the Rt. 16 "strip" area will be turned off. This is possible due to the abundant lighting from adjacent commercial properties.

- A decrease of approximately \$23,000 is noted in the Debt Interest Budget.
- The most significant decreases are found in the capital reserve accounts. These accounts include Highway Infrastructure, Highway Vehicle Replacement, Solid Waste Vehicle Replacement, Landfill Closure and Landfill Expansion. The total decrease of \$238,500 will result in future shortfalls given the current project list and funding schedules.

Departmental Summaries

This following discussion provides a summary of each department budget. Exhibit 1 presents a summary of the changes in each budget from 2008 to 2009.

Executive

The Executive Budget includes staff and operating expenses for general town administration. Included in the budget are supplies and materials for administrative departments and compensation for the Board of Selectmen/Town Manager's Office. Compensation for some elected officials is also included. This year, the budget increases by less than 1%. Increases are due to employee compensation and net changes in other expense lines.

Election and Registration

This budget funds elections and voter registration.

The budget decreases by 7% and reflects the fact that only one election will be held in 2009.

Financial Administration

The Finance Department maintains fiscal records for the town. The Finance Budget includes expenses for Finance Department salaries, information technology, the annual external audit, the elected town Treasurer and Tax Collector, and the Budget Committee. The budget increase of 4% is due in part to staff increases but primarily due to the increase of \$6,000 in audit expense.

Assessor

The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing all real and personal property, including mobile homes, residential and commercial properties, and agricultural land.

The Assessor's Budget includes assessing department staff salaries, outside mapping services, and other costs for property assessment. The budget increases by 2% due largely to increased staff costs.

Legal Expenses

The Legal Budget contains expenses for Town Counsel and other outside legal expenses. Town Counsel provides legal counsel to the Board of Selectmen and town staff. In addition, Town Counsel defends or prosecutes actions in court on behalf of the Town.

The amount budgeted for legal expenses increases from \$45,000 to \$55,000 based on projected needs for 2009.

Employee Benefits

Employee Benefits includes health insurance and other employee costs mandated by the federal or state government such as FICA, social security and retirement. An amount for sick leave incentive for non-union employees is also included.

This budget shows an increase by 6%. Of particular significance is the fact that health insurance increased by less than 1%. State retirement increases from 8.64% to 9.09% in July 2009.

Planning and Zoning

The Planning Department is responsible for advising the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the public on land use and development issues. The planning staff oversees site plan and subdivision applications and amendments to the Site Plan, Subdivision and Zoning Regulations, as well as the Conway Master Plan. The Code Compliance Officer issues sign permits, home occupation permits and enforces the zoning codes.

This budget increases by 1% due to staff compensation increases. It should be noted that the salary for the Project Administrator includes overtime for taking minutes at night meetings for the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Government Buildings

Government Buildings includes operating expenses for a variety of Town buildings and facilities. These include: Town Hall, the Conway Recreation Center, the Public Works Garages, and the Whitaker Meeting House.

For 2009, this budget decreases by 9%. Adjustments made to heating fuel and utility lines account for this decrease.

Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

Insurance

Liability insurance for Town property and vehicles is funded within this budget. The amount presented is an estimate of actual premium costs for 2009 based on the maximum the premium can increase under our current contract.

Police Department

The Police Department preserves the public peace, reduces the opportunity to commit crime, and provides a high level of safety, security and service for all members of the community.

The Police Department Budget increases by 3% or \$64,531.00. This increase is due largely to labor costs and includes full funding for an additional patrol officer position that was approved in 2008.

Ambulance

The Ambulance Budget funds a contribution to local ambulance providers. The providers are Conway Village Fire District and the North Conway Ambulance Service. This budget remains level based on the current contract.

Fire and Rescue

The primary expense within the Fire and Rescue Budget is the provision of fire protection for areas of the Town that are not located within a fire precinct. Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct provide these services under contract. This expense is funded by property taxes paid only by residents of non-precinct areas of the Town.

The budget is expected to increase by 1%. This increase is due to an approximately 7% (\$17,000) increase in the estimated cost of the Non-Precinct Fire Contract which funds fire service to non-precinct areas of the Town. This increase is offset by a reduction of \$15,000 in funding for Emergency Management. This is based on a proposal to contract with an existing member of the local fire service to perform these duties.

Inspections

The Building Inspector reviews building permits, building plans, inspects buildings and enforces the building codes.

This budget increases by 2.5% due to salary expenses for the existing positions.

Highway

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance and construction of Town roads and bridges as well as other related activities such as snow removal and ditch and culvert repair.

A decrease of 3% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This decrease is a result of a number of factors. While some material costs remain high (asphalt, sand and gravel) others have decreased due to both expected demand and/or price. Others such as salt have been decreased. The best example of material cost increases is asphalt which has been increased to maintain the prior levels of paving.

In addition, Highway Labor has been reduced over last year from \$514,273 to \$483,410. As readers will remember, this line was increased significantly at the 2008 Town Meeting due to the winter weather in early 2008. Hired Equipment has also been reduced on the expectation that snow removal will not be needed as often as last year. The Highway Street Lights line has been reduced because the town plans to turn off street lights along the Rt. 16 "strip". This action is deemed possible due to the abundant lighting from adjacent commercial properties.

Solid Waste

The Solid Waste Department manages the disposal of solid waste for the Mount Washington Valley Solid Waste District, which includes the towns of Conway, Albany, and Eaton. The member towns reimburse Conway for this service. The department operates both a transfer station and landfill.

The proposed budget represents an increase of 2%. This is due primarily to vehicle fuel.

Health

The Health Budget includes funding for the services of appointed Health Officers as well as kennel fees for impounded animals. The budget is level funded.

Welfare

The General Assistance Department relieves and maintains those who are unable to support themselves. This office assists with basic necessities such as medication, housing, electricity, food and heat for those who qualify. All assistance is in the form of a loan and not a grant.

This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget increases by 23% primarily due to an added \$15,000 to fund anticipated increases in demand for services.

Parks and Recreation

The Recreation Department is responsible for elementary school age youth sports and recreation programs and activities as well as a Teen Center for junior high age students. The Department also offers a variety of adult and senior citizen programs.

The budget increases by 8.5% primarily due to labor lines.

Library

The recommended budget represents an increase of 1%. This increase is found in the labor lines and is offset by some decreases in other operating lines.

Patriotic Purposes

This budget provides funding for the Town Fourth of July celebration and for commemorative activities that occur on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The budget remains level.

Conservation Commission

The Conservation Commission oversees the planning and long-term use of Town common lands and open space properties. The proposed Conservation Commission Budget decreases by 11% based on planned projects for the year.

Debt Principal

Included here are principal payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget increases by 1% based on the payment schedules of existing long term debt.

Debt Interest

Included in this budget are the interest payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by a net amount of 25% and results from the changes in the payment schedules for the remaining bonds.

Interest on TANS

This budget includes projected interest expenses on Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). Simply put TANS are short-term loans available to municipalities from the state that assist in supporting cash needs during the year. The budgeted amount has been reduced from \$5,000 to \$2500.

Capital Reserve Funds

The Capital Reserve Budget includes funds to support ongoing capital equipment purchases and capital construction. This budget decreases by 35% due to reductions in the annual contributions to each fund of 30%. In addition, the Kearsarge Bike Lane Project was deleted from the Infrastructure reserve account.

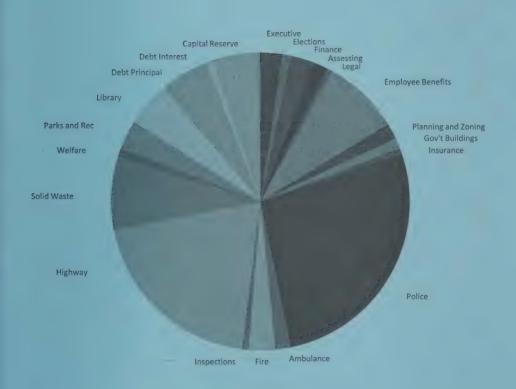

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the TWO-YEAR (2009-2010) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2009 and 2010. This means that the contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-1).

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 9). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to be added to the CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-1).

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (level funded from last year) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-2).

<u>ARTICLE 15:</u> (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred

Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-1).

ARTICLE 16: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. ARTICLE 17: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-2).

ARTICLE 18: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. (Level funding request). Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).

ARTICLE 19: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER for programs of the North Conway Community Center. ARTICLE 20: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). FROM A CLASS VI TO CLASS V HIGHWAY.** The portion to be reclassified runs from the intersection of Henderson and Davis Hill Roads southeastward for approximately 1,050 feet and as depicted on the plans and specifications for the Lebach Realty Trust/Royal View Subdivision (S06-14) approved by the Planning Board on 12/11/07 and recorded at CCRD BK 220 PP 4 and 5. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). **Not recommended by the Budget Committee (0-11-1).**

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution:

Whereas, the constitution of New Hampshire, specifically Part First, Article 28-a, "The state shall not mandate, or assign any new, expanded or modified programs or responsibilities to any political subdivision in such a way as to necessitate additional local expenditures by the political subdivision unless such programs or responsibilities are fully funded by the state or unless such programs or responsibilities are approved for funding by a vote of the local legislative body of the political subdivision", and

Whereas, from time to time the state has shifted the cost of certain programs that have previously been funded by the state, and

Whereas, examples of such acts are recorded in both 1998 and 2007 sessions of the legislature, wherein the state did shift the cost of Medicaid from State Government to the property tax supported County Government, and

Whereas, the state is currently facing a deficit of at least a \$200 million and may resort to relying upon the property tax payers of the state as means to cover either the deficit or the expansion, modification or newly established state programs. Therefore, be it

Resolved that the people of the town of Conway, by vote of the 2009 town meeting, do express to the Governor, the members of the Honorable House and Senate, our objection to any legislation or provision of the state's operating budget that would result in the increase of local property taxes, and be it further

Resolved, that this resolution and the outcome of the vote of this resolution by the voters of the town be provided to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, and the members of the legislature who represent the town of Conway, and to the New Hampshire Municipal Association. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-2-0).**

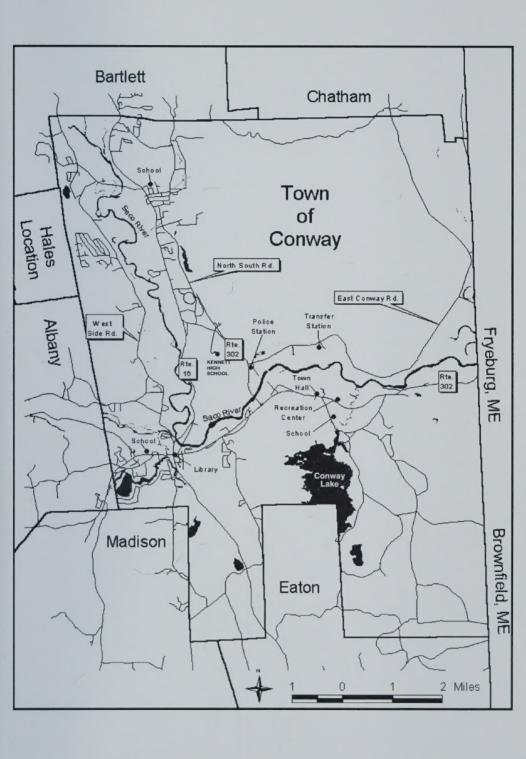
