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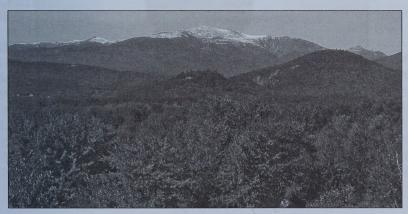

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This has been a very busy year for all of the boards, committees and commissions within the Town of Conway. This past year the Board of Selectmen encompassed a wide variety of ideas and personalities. We, however, strive for unified decisions that continue to generate progress in the Town of Conway.

The biggest issue in my opinion that the Board faced was the economics of the times. What I mean by that is, trying to maintain services at levels that people have become accustomed to, while not driving property taxes to a level above the means of the average citizen within the Town of Conway. The budget season this year was one of the toughest that I've been through in the 8 years I have served on the Board. Trying to find ways to cut expenses and keep services, while revenues dwindled, was a difficult task to say the least. Many of the decisions we made were unpopular to some, and they let us know about them, whether through the newspaper, calling, or coming to Public Sessions on the subject matter. At the deliberative session of our Town meeting changes can be made to any of our decisions, and the board generally follows the wishes of the legislative body.

The biggest positive item of the past year, again in my opinion, is the renovations to the Town Garage. After spending approximately \$238,000, the project to this point is has made a huge difference in the facility: and extended its life expectancy to another 30 years +/-. There is a Warrant Article this year asking for \$230,000 for a new roof, windows and insulation to complete the overall project. I urge you, the great citizens of the Town of Conway, to please support this Article as it the final piece of the project to have a safe and efficient building.

This will probably be my last letter to you all as Chairman of the board for a while; so at this time I would like to say, "Thanks for allowing me to serve you and lead this Board down the road towards the always betterment of Conway."

### TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

As with the rest of the country, 2010 was a year of continued economic challenges for our community. The voters approved a budget that resulted in an increase in the town tax rate from \$4.59 to \$4.96, or 8%. The increase was due in part to employee costs and the fact that contributions to our Capital Reserve Funds were increased to return these funds to historic levels after reductions in the prior year. The increase in the tax rate was also due to the continued downward trend in non-tax revenue. As these revenue sources decline, the amount needed from taxes to fund the budget increases.

While our economic situation is not without significant challenges, I am pleased to report that the town ended our budget year in a positive position. Fortunately, as the year progressed we benefitted from a mild winter yet again which led to savings in the Public Works Department. In addition, we made a number of decisions designed to reduce current year expenditures and to reduce future year's budgets. Open positions were left unfilled to offset current year expenses and the decision to turn off almost 200 street lights was designed to reduce future expenses. Further, revenues exceeded our predictions. Of particular interest was the fact that vehicle registrations were stronger than expected.

So, through luck and a couple of smart decisions, the Town was able to deposit over \$600,000 in our fund balance at year end. These funds can be used to offset taxes in 2011 by including some amount as revenue for 2011. Further, these funds may be particularly useful if State shared revenues are not forthcoming. Finally, some Selectmen have been concerned that our fund balance has been declining in recent years. It may be possible to actually begin to rebuild the Fund Balance by leaving some of the \$600,000 in the fund for 2011.

While much of the work the Town has accomplished is detailed in departmental reports, I wanted to mention one important community project that was begun this year. With much appreciated financial support from the Connie Davis Watson Foundation of North Conway, the Town has begun the restoration of five historic structures at the Abenaki Encampment on Intervale Crossroad. These buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Places due to their unique importance to local and national history. The encampment includes a small building adjacent to the railroad tracks that was used as a gift shop and four "log style" cabins that were used for storage, sleeping, and as a study and workshop. The camp was the summer home of Abenaki Native American Chief Joseph Laurent and his family from the early 1900s into the 1980s. In 1985, the Town of Conway and the Pequawket Foundation acquired the property from the Kennett Corporation. At that time, the property deed to the Town of Conway restricted use of the site and conferred certain rights and obligations to Stephen Laurent son of Joseph Laurent. In 1994, the deeded rights and responsibilities were further transferred to Stephen Laurent's nephew Deny Obamsawin (and descendants) of Odanak, Ouebec.

Unfortunately, several years ago three of the cabins were damaged when a large pine tree fell on them. The buildings were open to the weather for some time before they were tarped and buttoned up. The Conway Conservation Commission hired Forest Land Improvements to remove a number of the large pines at the site to reduce the threat of future damage. Once that was completed, town crews cleaned out refuse and damaged materials leaving as much of the original contents as possible. In addition, the crews have built and installed wooden shutters to secure the cabins against vandalism. Roofing repairs are also under way. Future plans include an interpretive panel so that visitors will be able to learn about the unique history and importance of this site.

In closing, I would like to recognize Karen Hallowell for her efforts in preparing this report and for the fact that the 2010 Town Report won third place for town reports in the New Hampshire Municipal Association competition. This is a well deserved recognition for her work.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends \$147.13.1.9 to allow "...yard sales to run for no more than 12 calendar days in a year in the Residential/Agricultural District." Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0). FAILED 398-887

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 2 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to allow "...yard sales to run for no more than 12 calendar days in a year in all zoning districts." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0). FAILED 372-907

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 3 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.19.2 (the Special Highway Corridor Overlay District) by excluding from the district "...that portion of the limited access right of way as so depicted as it runs northerly from the centerline of N.H. Route 113/U.S. Route 302 in the Village of Center Conway to its Northern terminus at the centerline of N.H. Route 16/U.S. Route 302 to the north of the Village of North Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Planning Board (3-2-0). PASSED 785-435

Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0). FAILED 513-741

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 9 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.8.6.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record business is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0). FAILED 500-743

ARTICLE 11: BOND ARTICLE: To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000) (gross budget) for the construction of a new PUBLIC WORKS SERVICE GARAGE, such sum to be raised through the issuance of not more than Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) of bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and other municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. Any such funding received will offset and reduce the total bond amount; and furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) from the Buildings Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose to be used to fund the garage construction. A 3/5 ballot vote required. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0). The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation (8-2-0). FAILED 735-561

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPER-ATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Twenty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,929,327). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Two Hundred Forty Seven Thousand Four Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$9,247,446) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles.

ARTICLE 13: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in a TWO-YEAR (2010-2011) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2010 and 2011. This means that the proposed contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal years. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1). PASSED 1032-251

**ARTICLE 14:** (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$325,000) to be placed in the **INFRASTRUCTURE RECONSTRUCTION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0). PASSED 789-503** 

**ARTICLE 15:** (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$155,000) to be placed in the **HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1). PASSED 753-533** 

**ARTICLE 16:** (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to contribute to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1). PASSED 766-526**

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to purchase a COMMERCIAL LAWN MOWER FOR THE RECREATION DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-0). PASSED 693-598

ARTICLE 23: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Six Thousand Dollars (\$306,000) (gross budget) for the construction of the KEARSARGE ROAD PEDESTRIAN WAY/BIKE LANE and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. The entire project funding amount shall be raised by grants and contributions such that no funds shall be raised by local property taxes. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0). ### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Conway as of December 31, 2009, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information are not a required part of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated October 8, 2010 on our consideration of the Town of Conway's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Conway's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements of the Town of Conway. The combining and individual fund schedules and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the Town of Conway's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

## **ASSESSOR**

2010 saw a continued decline in local real estate values. When all was said and done, the revaluation of 2009 ended up with assessed values averaging about 93% of their sale prices. Tracking sales on a monthly basis, we waited to see when the assessed values of sales would, on average, move over the 100% mark of their contract prices. This occurred in October 2010.

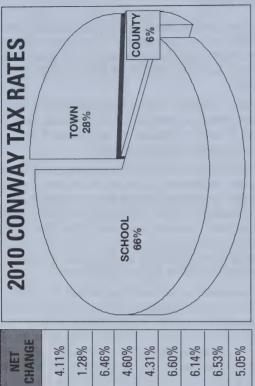
As of the assessment date of April 1, 2010, assessed values of properties that sold in arm's length transactions were still comfortably averaging below their sale prices. Because we were below the 100% level, I saw no reason to recommend to the Selectmen that we reduce assessed values across the board for 2010.

If the market continues to decline, it is my opinion that they should not be allowed to stay too far above average sale prices. I may recommend a reduction in assessments for 2011. I stress the word "may" for a couple of reasons. First, if the average is hovering just above 100% it may be within a statistical margin of error and to factor down three or four percentage points would require a tremendous amount of effort and involve state oversight for very little real benefit. Second, it is not my call to make. I can only recommend from an Assessor's point of view. Ultimately it is up to the Selectmen to make the determination from the standpoint of what is best for the town.

It is important to note that reducing assessed values does not result in a corresponding reduction in property taxes. The amount to be raised from taxes in order to meet a budget passed by the voters remains the same. Any reduction in assessed values results in a corresponding increase in the tax rate so that the same amount of money can be collected. The benefit to keeping assessments at or near their sale prices is that it makes it easier to compare assessments so that property owners can determine if they are being treated fairly. It also reduces complaints to the assessing department which results in fewer litigation costs.

The 2010 sales period was notable for its volatility. Assessors use a statistic called the coefficient of dispersion (COD) to measure how closely assessments are tracking sale prices at any assessment or price level. The 2010 COD was very high for a year that followed a revaluation. I believe this was due to various external factors. The first time home buyers' tax credit in place at the end of 2009 was scheduled to end on December 31 and this probably triggered a lot of transfers prior to the deadline. At the last minute it was extended and broadened to April 30, 2010. This may have accounted for a busier than anticipated winter as well as an atypical summertime lull. In addition, foreclosure activity was suddenly quieted due to adverse court decisions against lenders. There was continued low interest rates, tightening credit requirements and swings in consumer confidence thrown into the mix. Put all of this together and you have volatility. It's worth tracking these statistics for if they settle down, it may portend a turnaround. Stability means predictability which translates into buyers being confident enough to enter the market again.

# PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

#### **VETERAN SERVICE EXEMPTION: RSA 72:28-36**

Amount=\$500 Regular Veteran, \$2000 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

#### **OPTIONAL ADJUSTED ELDERLY EXEMPTION: RSA 72:43-H**

Must be a resident of NH for at least three years prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly (if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.).

Net income of \$21,500 or if married \$30,000.

Asset limitation of \$50,000, excluding the value of residence. Amount of exemption:

65-74 years of age: \$37,500 75-80 years of age: \$60,000 80 years or older: \$75,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

#### **EXEMPTION FOR THE DISABLED: RSA 72:37-b**

Must be a resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly (if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.).

Net income of \$19,000 or if married \$25,000.

# BUILDING INSPECTOR/CODE ENFORCEMENT

The year 2010 showed a slight increase in new residential and commercial construction. In 2009 the total number of single family homes constructed within the town was fifteen (15) & one (1) new duplex, for a total of seventeen (17) new residences.

In 2010, the total number of single-family homes constructed was twenty four (24) with no new duplex units, for a total of twenty four (24) new residences.

Commercial construction showed a continued decrease in the size and value of new construction and renovations; the total number of permits for commercial activity is slightly below last year's numbers of (2009 - 108 permits 2010 - 94 permits).

There were 378 building permits issued in 2010, somewhat higher than the 356 issued the previous year. This number reflects the total of both residential and commercial permits.

Permits for 2010 total to an estimated assessment value for the completed work at just over \$13.537 million dollars. This is up from last year's total of \$12.546 million dollars.

The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits for 2010 totaled \$45,298.93 up slightly from the fees paid for last year of \$36,783.58.

This next year is again going to be very hard to predict, but is starting about the same as last year with very few projects in the early planning stages.

I have served as building inspector for the Town sense November of 1999 and still look forward to each up coming year.

# **CODE COMPLIANCE OFFICER**

As Code Compliance Officer for the Town of Conway, my primary responsibility is assuring compliance with the Town's zoning and site plan regulations. The signage regulations contained within the zoning ordinance (Article 147) specify the time, place and manner that commercial signage may be displayed in the Town of Conway. The ordinances also contain some types of signage that is prohibited such as internally lit, blinking/flashing and others. With hundreds of commercial properties in town, businesses and their locations are constantly changing and along with that comes new signage. Most changes and/or new signs require permits and each one is reviewed to make sure that it complies with the town's regulations. Legally existing, "grandfathered" signage is also closely reviewed to make sure that no additional non-conformities are added. There are also several other types of permits issued administratively for Changes of Use, Home Occupations, Temporary Events, Vending Carts and tree cutting in certain restricted areas. In addition, the Planning & Zoning Department follows up on complaints received involving the zoning and site plan regulations.

# **EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR**

In 2010 Conway residents dealt with four minor flooding events, but no major disasters. The Saco River reached flood stage four times this year, twice in March and twice in December. All four times this caused minor flooding and affected some low lying homes. As your emergency management director, I monitored those events plus four other storm events that had the potential to cause us problems. We were fortunate in that these events were all minor in scale and caused minimal disruption and damage.

In 2010, I also continued to review our emergency operations plan. The biggest piece of the plan that needs work is our shelter plan. We need to have a building that we can use to shelter people that are forced to leave their homes due to flooding or extended power outages. That building must be handicap accessible, have facilities to hold and feed a number of people, and have back-up power. With the blessing of the Selectmen, I have applied for a grant to install a back-up generator at the Rec Center to make it usable as a shelter. This will provide us with a shelter location that will also not effect School operation should there be a conflict. Ultimately, our shelter plan will have several levels ranging from use of hotels to shelter one or two families up to a Red Cross operated regional shelter.

There is something each of you could do to help both yourselves and the Town should a major flood, wind storm, or ice storm occur. That is, have a plan. Be prepared to take care of yourselves for a few days if you have no power or have to leave your home. Ask yourself, do you have a secondary heat source without electricity? Do you have a relative that is not effected by the event you could stay with for a couple of days? Do you have food and water on hand if the stores are all closed? The more people that are able to take care of themselves, the easier it will be for your emergency responders to work on getting things restored to normal.

Thanks again to all those that helped with emergency management planning and functions this year.

Recommendations and concerns were submitted to legislators in July, 2009 and testimony was heard in January, 2010. Though the bill did not pass, my intent was to increase awareness of the issues and offer support, both of which were done with great success. I am grateful for the experience and I look forward to future opportunities to share my thoughts with legislators.

The number of people applying for public benefits who have never before had to depend on the system is increasing. This group seems to be composed of primarily working families or elderly folks. They are harder to serve because they wait too long to ask for help, know little about available programs, and have difficulty accessing programs and collecting documents because work and family demands result in scheduling conflicts.

For this reason, it has been tremendously difficult to manage high caseloads. The whole system is overwhelmed, there are long waitlists and nobody can keep up. No matter what side of the desk you are on, people are struggling and suffering to make ends meet and get the job done.

# **PARKS & RECREATION DIRECTOR**

The Conway Parks and Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building, 1808 East Main Street in Center Conway. Our facility includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, art room, audio visual room and television lounge. The outdoor facility features a playground, outdoor basketball court, tented picnic area in the summer and a multi-purpose athletic field equipped with lights.

The Conway Parks and Recreation Department is responsible for all maintenance and scheduling of outdoor parks and recreation areas owned by the town. Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Schouler Park, Washington Street Park, Swift River Covered Bridge, Whitaker Homesite Field, Connie Watson Davis Park, Dick O'Brien Field, Shedd Woods, Conway Public Library and Veteran's Triangle Park. Included with these parks are various cemeteries that our department also maintains throughout the year.

These sites offer many recreational activities such as Nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, volleyball, picnicking and various other activities.

Our children's program for 2010 included t-ball, girls softball, Red Cross swimming lessons, summer camp, soccer, flag football, field hockey, basketball, biddy basketball, pond hockey, children's playgroup and bowling. In addition we offer special events which include the annual children's Halloween party, Easter egg hunt and the children's turkey trot race.

The Teen Center is a program designed for older kids in grades 6-8 to experience non-traditional activities. The Teen Center is open four nights per week including weekends. Our focus is to allow young teens the opportunity to spend time with their friends in a setting that is safe and healthy. The Teen Center offers many amenities which includes, but are not limited to, a functional kitchen which they cook at least once per week, a gym for various activities, a game room, a movie room and a lounge to just hang out with friends. The teens also participate in a number of fundraisers and community service projects designed for them to give back to a community that has supported them.

Adult programming in 2010 saw an increase in participation. This past year we offered men's softball, over 40 men's softball, basketball open gym, ballroom dancing and two new programs in 2010, fall co-ed softball and adult flag football. Both these new programs were very well attended and will continue to be offered in 2011.

Adult programs are also offered to the non-sports person interested in low key recreation. Many of our senior citizens have taken advantage of our weekly Bingo and Scrabble games. This allows the older population to get together twice a week for some fun and social interaction. Adult trips were popular in 2010 with the Foxwoods Casino trip being the favorite.

Over the last four years our department has been responsible for the Fourth of July Celebration. This event gives our town the chance to celebrate the Fourth of July and, also, to take part in the many different activities we offer. The day kicks off with

a spectacular parade in Conway Village followed by entertainment, food, games and fireworks in Schouler Park in North Conway. I would like to recognize the local businesses and civic organizations who donate funds to make this day possible for all of the citizens.

This past year The Friends of Conway Rec. Inc. partnered with the Conway Parks and Recreation Department to raise funds and contribute directly to our sports programs and the summer camp. Every year The Friends of Conway Rec. Inc. gets involved in many fundraisers so they can directly help support our department throughout the year. This volunteer group donates many hours of their time and in 2010 donated more than \$3000 to the summer scholarship fund and over \$1000 worth of food to the Teen Center.

In closing I would like to thank all of our volunteers & coaches who give of their time to make a difference in a child's life. Your commitment to this program is second to none. A special thanks goes to all of the businesses and civic organizations who support our programs with financial and product donations. Our department is fortunate to have you as a part of our community.

It has been my pleasure to serve the people of Conway as your Recreation Director and hope that you may participate or volunteer in one of our many programs in 2011.

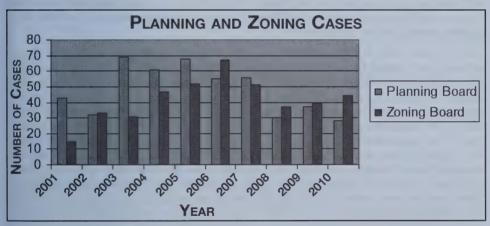

## PLANNING DIRECTOR

As was 2009, 2010 has been an economically challenging year for everyone. The recession continued having a significant affect on development activity. There was a slight decrease in the number of applications that were processed by the Planning Board and a modest increase in number of cases for the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The Planning Board granted approvals for site plans that included 38 new multifamily dwelling units, an eighty-three seat restaurant with drive thru service and the creation/conversion of approximately 20,000 square feet of non-residential floor area. The Board also approved a new tubing park, mountain coaster and infrastructure modifications at Mt. Cranmore, Subdivision applications resulted in approximately 24 new lots/units. There is a persistent hesitation on the part of the developers to exercise the conditional approvals that they had been granted for a number of Subdivisions that would create at least 100 new building lots. The Department and the Planning Board have been working on revisions to the Site Plan Review Regulation's lighting standards to incorporate "Dark Sky" provisions and to promote energy efficiency while reducing light trespass. We have also been preparing driveway permitting regulations.



Based on this year's jump in retail sales and the DJIA flirting with the 12,000 mark, the economy is showing renewed strength. Getting traction in the positive direction will likely stimulate renewed vigor in development activity. This Department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

## **POLICE CHIEF**

The fact that crime continues to increase in Conway is a true concern for the Police Department. I reported last year that the 810 arrests made were the most ever recorded. I'm disappointed in the fact that I can now say that the 861 arrests this year are the most ever recorded. Group "A" crimes against persons, which include crimes like serious assaults, kidnapping, sexual assaults and criminal threatening rose by nine percent. Group "A" crimes against property, which include crimes like robbery, burglary, theft and shoplifting increased by a staggering 14%. According to the New Hampshire State Police records division, the Town of Conway is the 15th busiest town or city in the State of New Hampshire based on the above Group "A" crime statistics. Furthermore, our 2010 statistics rank us equal to communities like Hudson, NH which have a much larger population base and a much larger police force.

The Police Department hired four people this year because of turnover. We were pleased to announce the hiring of Dispatcher Dominic Torch, Patrolman Garryowen Sherry, Patrolman Ryan Daigle and Attorney Janet Subers. Torch was hired in May as a Dispatcher. Dominic came to us having graduated from Husson University in Bangor, ME with a degree in Criminal Justice. Daigle, who graduated with a degree in Criminal Justice from UMass - Dartmouth, is from Cape Cod, MA. Sherry was hired in August as a Patrolman. He served for 4 years in Bartlett, NH as a patrolman before coming to Conway. Attorney Subers was hired in September to fill the needs as the Prosecutor for the police department. She is the first Attorney to fill that role since the late 1980's. We are very fortunate to have these fine individuals working for the department.

As in years past, this Department was the recipient of several grants. The FY 10 Recovery Act Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant – Local Solicitation this year was for the amount of \$14,580.00. With this money the department was able to purchase an Emergency Response Trailer. The trailer will be set up with evidence collection equipment, accident reconstruction gear and various other police equipment that will allow us to respond more efficiently to crime scenes. With this grant we were also to purchase some equipment for the Carroll County Sheriff's Office. The Department would once again this year like to thank the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency for giving us several grant funded law enforcement opportunities this year. These grants included DWI Patrol (\$2,304.85), Sobriety Checkpoint (\$1,463.00), DWI Hunter Patrol (\$698.09), Speed Enforcement Patrols (\$3,582.24), Bike Patrol (\$1,483.47) and New Hampshire Click It or Ticket (\$2,479.85) for a total amount of \$12,011.50. That, along with the JAG Grants, is a total of \$26,591.50 in grants for 2010 with no local tax impact on taxpayers.

Along with the Grants that brought money to the Town, we also generated \$105,102.00 in revenue. This revenue was generated by pistol permits (\$1,180.00), alarm fees (\$11,130.00), fingerprinting (\$4,410.00), parking tickets (\$1,092.00), court fines (\$17,987.00) and Police Income, which includes the School Resource Officer, Administrative Fees for commercial duty and report fees (\$69,303.00).

I will again say that I am very proud of the men and women of the Conway Police Department as they have throughout the year served the community well and will continue to do so in years to come.

# PUBLIC WORKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

It seems that every year is busier than the last; well this year was no exception. Conway had road, bridge, and water and sewer construction from one end of Town to the other. The Town, the Conway Village Fire Department (CVFD) and the North Conway Water Precinct (NCWP) all benefitted from the Federal Stimulus Program. A portion of the monies received for these utility projects is allocated to road reconstruction. The planning and coordination between the Town, CVFD and NCWP allowed us to get all the needed reconstruction done while maximizing the use of federal dollars. The list of roads benefitting from this approach included: Kearsarge, Ledgewood, Ash, Maple, Greenwood, Wilder, Pleasant, Locust and Eastern Slope Terrace.

Separately, we were able to secure funding from a different federal program for the reconstruction of the bridge on Tasker Hill Road. The Town was on the State's list to replace this bridge in 2011. However, you may remember that the old structure collapsed in November of 2009. The Town put a temporary bridge in place for that winter and replaced the permanent structure this past season. All the expenses associated with that project were eligible under the Bridge Aid Program, which means the Town paid twenty cents on the dollar from the Town's coffers. I'd like to thank our contractor, A.J. Coleman & Sons, for doing us such a good on the bridge.

The Town's own highway department reconstructed Kearsarge Road from the North-South Road to Mechanic Street. That job included a redesign of the intersection at the top of the hill and the addition of sidewalks from that intersection to Mechanic Street. As always our crew did a first rate job.

The much discussed and often misunderstood Service Garage project took place this past year. The project ended up being a partial renovation of the existing building. The project ran about two hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$220,000). This year's warrant has an article to insulate the building and to replace the roof.

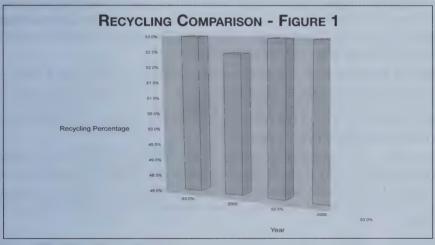
This past season and a half was the first time since recycling enforcement was adopted that we did not have an attendant at the trash windows to assist folks to comply with the recycling ordinance. The attached graphs show that recycling dropped off over this same time period. This past year, the Town reviewed the option of changing to a single-sort form of recycling wherein all your recyclables could be dropped-off comingled in one container. The Town would ship them to a contracted facility where they would be sorted and processed. The obvious advantage of this method is for greater convenience to residents. It was decided to stay with our current methods.

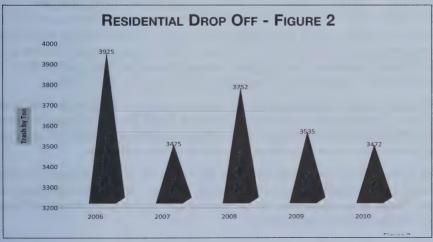

# **CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

Regular forest management work this year focused on Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods and the Common Lands off of Hurricane Mountain Road. Activities include Timber Stand Improvement, clearing wildlife openings, maintaining recreation resources and trail building and maintenance.

Special projects added to the regular business activity. First, the Commission assumed the task of performing the maintenance work at the popular Scenic Vista on Pine Hill. It had not taken place in some time. The work was on a very steep incline and needed the effort of experienced and skilled workers. Regular tree and brush removal is necessary to maintain this much photographed and painted view.

Second, the continued preservation of the historically significant Abenaki Site Conservation Area required the removal of very large trees that threatened to do more damage. A specifically skilled professional was needed to perform the work there. This work was a precursor to the planned stabilization and rehabilitation of the site which was begun in the fall. The reconstruction of buildings and installation of interpretive panels are planned.

Early in the year and consistent with the Town's 2003 Master Plan, The Commission entered into an agreement with the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust (USVLT) to work cooperatively in the acquisition of land conservation easements and land in fee for the purpose of retaining and protecting agricultural and open space lands in the Town.

Previously, the Commission agreed to join with the USVLT in a Strategic Conservation Planning Project. This initiative is specifically intended to develop a Strategic Conservation Plan to proactively identify and target conservation priorities for permanent protection from fragmentation and development in the Town.

In Phase I, a Resource Inventory has been conducted that quantifies and analyzes highly valued resources. Those resources include both natural (water, forestry, agriculture, wild life habitat and natural communities) and cultural (recreation, scenic, and historic). The result will be that we will be better able to identify and preserve the highest valued lands in our community. The Commission's commitment to funding of this work was met in 2010.

Work done with The Nature Conservancy focuses on the Green Hills, including Black Cap Mountain and nearby Pudding Pond. Rebuilding and improving trails, refinishing and replacing signs and new map/brochures for these popular areas.

The Commission has requested and the Town has begun a process whereby existing, unprotected conservation lands are put under conservation easements. These lands then can not be disposed of or developed and will remain conservation lands for perpetuity.

The White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA) contributed over 240 man-hours of trail maintenance in Conway Conservation Lands. The work was planned in conjunction with the CCC, and consisted primarily of maintenance work on the Red Tail Trail in the Hurricane Mountain Road Common Lands, and the Sticks & Stones and Side Hill trails in the Pudding Pond Conservation Area. These trails have proven to be popular with runners and hikers as well as mountain bicyclists. The ongoing efforts of NEMBA are a valuable contribution to the recreation component of the Town's conservation lands.

Members of the Conservation Commission are: Paul Pinkham, Chair; Rob Adair, Vice-chair; Carol Lyman, Treasurer; David Weathers; Selectman's Representative, Karla Allen, Dan Lucy, Chuck Broomhall, and Linda Kearney. Jean Simon provides administrative support to the Commission and Gail Currier records meeting minutes.

The Commission's Consulting Forester is Don Johnson of Forest Land Improvement.

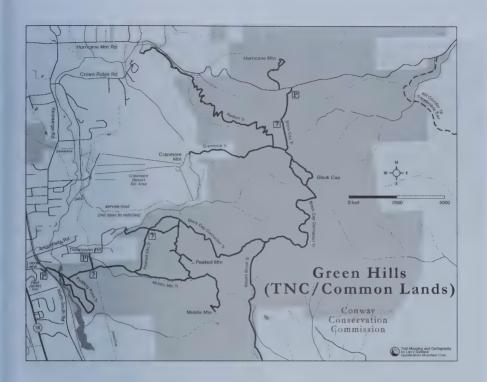

## POLICE COMMISSION

Currently, a lot of discussion is occurring regarding this Commission's request to increase the staffing levels of the Department. Most of the discussion has been productive and informative. Throughout the great debate, and regardless of the position anyone takes on funding, it is unquestionable that the Conway Police Department is understaffed. As a Board we have endeavored to do more with less year after year. This frugal philosophy has served us all well and we have met the ever increasing challenges we face with crime and public safety. However, now we are at a crucial juncture. One which if not addressed realistically and immediately, public safety and the level of police services will suffer.

As you can see by the Chief's year- end report, the disturbing trend of increased crime is now worse than ever. Ten years ago, who would have thought we would be reporting that we had kidnappings, robberies and rapes as a regular occurrence. Does a week go by that the local and State news agencies don't report troubling or shocking events in our town? It should be both sobering and cautionary to hear reports that we are ranked in the top 15 communities for serious crime in New Hampshire. These events are not emblematic of the nature of our Valley but more so of the nature of the times. Nevertheless, we are still left with an undermanned force dealing with a dangerous and prevalent criminal element. Ignoring the problem won't make it go away; but real commitment and resources will. To that end, this year we have included a new patrol officer position in our proposed 2011 operating budget. Additionally, and upon agreement with the Board of the Selectman, we have placed a warrant article for two other officers on the ballot as well. We urge voters to consider all of these positions as an investment in preserving not only life and property, but also the overall quality of life here that is in jeopardy.

As your Board of Commission, we are obligated to take into account, not only the needs of the Department, but also of the taxpayers ability to afford the services they demand. To that end, we have sought and received several federal and state grants for police services this year. In 2010 we received over \$26,000 in grants which helped pay for a number of enforcement programs, safety patrols, and needed police equipment. Combining this amount with over \$105,000 of revenue that the police department generated, the Conway Police Department was responsible for over \$131,000 of unanticipated income directly to the Town. This is not only a real testament to the efforts of the men and women that work here, but a prime example of how hard this agency works to provide quality service at the lowest cost.

The people of the Town of Conway should be very proud of the Department that serves them. Even in the face of increasing crime rates, under the leadership of Chief Ed Wagner we have one of the most productive and professional police agencies in the State. We, as your Police Commission, are proud to be a part of this team of dedicated men and women. We are honored to serve you, and we continue to strive to keep Conway a safe and healthy community for all of us to enjoy.

## **CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY**

The Conway Public Library is a cherished asset of the residents of our town. It was a very busy year with 110,865 patrons visiting the library; they borrowed 86,628 items, asked 7,670 reference questions and used the internet access on library terminals a total of 21,394 times. A total of 8,345 library patrons attended 327 library programs and 111 community programs.

These are impressive numbers considering the heavy construction on the four roads surrounding the library, which restricted access for three months this summer. In addition, the Trustees made the difficult decision to reduce the hours of operation by  $4\frac{1}{2}$  hours in response to the budget cuts made through the town budgeting process in 2010.

The workload of the library staff was not reduced by the change in hours. All of the tasks associated with maintaining an appropriate collection and processing requests continue at the same pace with the hourly staff experiencing a reduction in their work hours. The Trustees wish to recognize the efforts of the library staff in providing the same quality of service to our community and to thank them for their hard work; it is greatly appreciated.

The work of the staff is ably supported by the library volunteers and The Friends of the Conway Public Library. The volunteers provided 2,904 hours of work shelving books and processing library materials. For example, there are four volunteers who routinely work in the Henney History Room helping to digitalize the room's materials. In a new program to help the work of the history room, Curator Ed Stevens has created an internship program which provides interns with 260 hours of library work and training. When an intern completes the program, he or she receives a certificate of completion. The first posting resulted in four applicants and is giving the curator much needed help. He now has the donated services of three interns. To note the wonderful contribution our volunteers provide to the library, the Board of Trustees hosted a Volunteer Appreciation dinner at the Mineral Springs Café.

The Friends have been quite active this year. They provide programming, which included speakers on interesting topics and a well attended Christmas concert. The annual meeting in September featured an engaging program by Marianne O'Conner on *Haunted Hikes of New Hampshire*. The Friends held two large book sales, and they manage the ongoing sale of books donated to the library throughout the year. A special fundraising was the silent auction of works by photographer Dick Pollock, who donated the items to the Friends.

The Friends undertook a major project this year at the request of the Trustees: the Ham Community Room, which was beginning to reflect its heavy use in the form of a stained carpet and darkening walls. The Trustees organized a committee to oversee the refurbishing of the room, choosing a pleasing new paint and a washable tile floor. The work was completed during the Christmas holidays and

the room is now brighter and more attractive; this change is very much enjoyed by all the groups using the room. The Friends used monies earned through their fundraising activities to pay for these improvements.

Among the most popular of the library activities is the summer reading program. There were a total of 359 participants, this year, including pre-readers, younger readers and young adults and, new this year, adults, all of whom exceeded their reading goals. During July and August the program traveled to the Conway Recreation Department's summer camp in Center Conway providing six outreach programs. These programs provide a sturdy bridge between the academic years for the town's school children as well as an inspiration for lifelong learning.

The Trustees wish to acknowledge the retirement of another long term employee. Amy Gardner served as the library's cataloger for 38 years. She worked past retirement age as she really loved working at our library. In addition many patrons have noted that Bobbie Frasier, who enthusiastically greeted each patron by name, has also retired. She does occasionally pinch hit, but is no longer working regular shifts. We wish both of them well in the years to come. To replace these two valued staff members, we have hired Gail Fike and Lindsey Pickering. Both of our new staff members are doing quite well.

Finally, the Trustees wish to recognize the leadership of Tara Thomas and Betty Parker for managing the work of our library during a challenging year. There are rarely complaints about the quality of services received by our patrons. However, there are ongoing issues with access. During a thirty day period when the staff monitored complaints, there were 50 registered about the reduction in hours. Parking continues to be a noteworthy problem.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 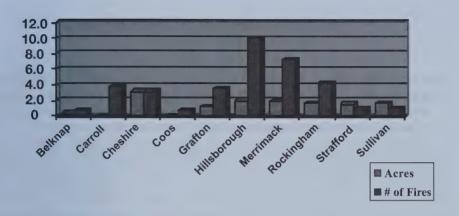
This past fire season had a slightly lower number of fires, as well as lower number of acres burned then the 5 year average. What made this fire season somewhat unusual was that it lasted most of the summer. New Hampshire typically has a fairly active spring fire season and then the summer rains tend to dampen fire activity later in the season. This year virtually all areas of the state had fires throughout the summer due to the periodic dry spells throughout the season. As has been the case over the last few years, state budget constraints have limited the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers to Class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting was supplemented by contracted aircraft and the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. The largest fire for the season was 10.3 acre fire in Charlestown. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2010 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. ## MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

The Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council is dedicated to helping area businesses grow and succeed regardless of current economic conditions. In just the past six years, the businesses in the Tech Village incubator have created 43 new jobs, which in turn enhances the overall economy for the region.

For businesses moving to the valley or attempting to expand, the Council's Revolving Loan Fund provides gap financing for business endeavors that otherwise might be unable to secure financing. The primary object of the fund is to increase and/or create full-time, quality, year-round employment opportunities. To date, the Council has made 55 loans to local businesses totaling nearly \$1.8 million!

With financial help from US Senator Jeanne Shaheen, the "Boot Camp Series," in partnership with Granite State College has been expanded to provide professional training for businesses and non-profit organizations. Over 1,200 people have attended these workshops.

The SCORE (Service Corps of Retired Executives) chapter in the Tech Village continues to provide free and confidential business guidance and advice for businesses or individuals in the valley. Their records indicate that SCORE has helped contribute over \$1.5 million back into the local economy.

The Learning Center at the Tech Village is the hub of advanced education in the valley providing quality technology education and business skills training. The Center is home to Granite State College, White Mountains Community Collage and Plymouth State University classes.

And topics of local interest and importance are covered expertly and regularly at the Council's Eggs and Issues forum.

Several organizations and businesses are exploring the possibility of building a home on the Tech Village Campus. These developments could help the Council reduce its debt and provide funds for the necessary infrastructure needed to grow jobs in the Tech Village. 2010 was another active and successful year for the Economic Council.

## NON PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

## **CHILDREN UNLIMITED**

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a 501(c) 3 nonprofit agency located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed. Children who have a diagnosed medical condition or exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. Our purpose is to provide quality, comprehensive developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home or community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Early identification and intervention is important for a child to reach his/her fullest educational and social potential. Fostering positive self-esteem in children with special needs is also a significant priority for future school success.

Professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers, staff this program. Program services include: developmental screenings, multidisciplinary evaluations, early identification of children with Autism Spectrum Disorders, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, toddler play groups, and "fussy baby" consultations. Fifty nine (59) Conway children and their families received services in 2011.

## **GIBSON CENTER**

The Gibson Center is a busy and expanding place, but everything we do is an extension of our Mission Statement:

Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

There is no way we could do what we do without the support of our community. This past year, we served over 60,000 congregate and home delivered meals. Over 76% of our meals go to Conway residents. Over 90% of our van riders came from Conway.

We are fantastically lucky to have our dedicated volunteers. These are the people who really make our funding work responsibly. It may be hard to believe, but again last year over 12,000 volunteer hours were given to the Gibson Center. We ALWAYS have room for more volunteers.

Everyone at the Gibson Center has been working hard to keep costs low. We will continue to do this. Our request to Conway is \$32,000 as it has been for the last NINE years, even though our meals served have increased by over 10,000 meals.

The Center oversees the management of Silver Lake Landing in Madison; 20 low cost, independent senior apartments. It is important that the taxpayers of Conway know that Silver Lake Landing is owned and operated by the Silver Lake Senior Housing Corporation, a separate 501(c) (3) corporation. No Town funds are used for the operation and management. Silver Lake Landing is completely separate from the day-to-day activities of The Gibson Center.

## **NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER**

This is a NH licensed daycare program since 1972 that provides care for children ages 9 months to 12 years of age. The program employs well qualified staff specifically trained to work with children in this setting.

Services include a toddler room, daycare (with a pre-school component for age 4), 1/2 day for Kindergarten students, before and after school and summer day camp for school age. Transportation is available to and from John Fuller School on the AM and PM school bus as well as, for a small fee, at mid-day for the kindergarten program. The center offers a minimal subsidy for families that are just above the state subsidy eligibility guidelines.

There is a USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) supported meal program included in the daily rate which is comprised of a well balanced breakfast, lunch and afternoon snack. Food is prepared by our own staff cook.

## STARTING POINT SERVICES FOR DOMESTIC & SEXUAL VIOLENCE

**Program Description:** Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to ensuring quality services are provided to victims of relationship violence and sexual abuse, preventing future relationship violence, promoting social change and encouraging accountability and education for perpetrators and stalkers.

Begun in 1981 as a grassroots response to domestic victims in Carroll County, the agency has grown from an impromptu group of volunteers to an incorporated non-profit agency with four full time and one part-time staff member, a governing board of directors and a network of over 27 extensively trained volunteers.

In fiscal year 2010, Starting Point's staff and volunteers provided advocacy and support to 537 primary and secondary victims of domestic violence, sexual violence or stalking living in Carroll County. 188 of the 537 were Conway Residents. (36% of overall victim served) A total of 3,709 services or 45% of Starting Point's overall services were provided to Conway residents. 25 Conway Residents stayed in our emergency shelter for a total of 513 nights ( at \$50 a night that equals \$25,650.00) Starting Point spent approximately \$1,000 on food for shelter guests.

Our services are available 24 hours a day, 365 days/year and are offered at no charge.

In addition to our crisis services, we offer follow up support through court advocacy, accompaniment to the Child Advocacy Center, peer led support groups, case

management and social service advocacy. We promote social change through com-

munity outreach and prevention activities.

Benefits to Town of Conway Residents: Residents of Conway benefit from Starting Point's programs in numerous ways. First, any victim living or working in Conway may access Starting Point's confidential services free of charge 24 hours a day 7 days a week. Second, Conway's Police Department has access 24 hour, 365 days a year to case consultations and resource assistance. Third, individuals living in Conway (such as the town welfare officer) who have concerns about an individual who is or maybe a victim of domestic violence, sexual violence and/or stalking can access consultation services and resource assistance. Finally, Conway's school system has the ability to access Starting Point's prevention education program *Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary* free of charge.

## TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

Tri-County Community Action/Carroll County is a private non-profit agency that was established in 1965. The Resource Center is located at 448 White Mountain Highway in Tamworth.

During the fiscal year July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010, our agency has provided services to Conway residents that total **over one million dollars**. The services provided include; Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, Weatherization/Home Energy Conservation and Homeless Prevention. In addition, we are the conduit for the distribution of USDA Surplus Food to all the food pantries in Carroll County.

Tri-County Community Action provides necessary services for the most vulnerable and less fortunate citizens in our communities who would otherwise have to seek help from the town. We are depending upon funding from your town and neighboring communities countywide. These local funds are used to make available local intake and support for federal and state programs including Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, Homeless Prevention, Weatherization, and electric utility conservation programs.

We greatly appreciate your support and look forward to a continued cooperation and partnership with your towns' residents, elected officials and staff.

## VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC.

Vaughan Community Service, Inc. (VCS) was established in 1965 for the purpose of alleviating unmet and under met needs in the community. VCS is an outreach program of the First Church of Christ, Congregational, however there is no religious affiliation associated with the services provided. VCS is a non-profit 501-C3 organization incorporated in the State of New Hampshire and is financially supported in a variety of ways. Since its inception VCS has provided for a great number of health and human service needs in the Mount Washington Valley.

<u>Assessment/Referral</u> - Help for those who are not sure what they need or where they need to go. In this program we look at each individual situation and help to assess what the true needs are and where the best place is to have those needs met. This may include, but is not limited to, navigating the social service system, applying for government assistance. FREE SERVICE

<u>Food Pantry</u> - Food and essential food items for those who are not able to sustain these necessities with their existing financial situation. Hours are: Mondays: 10:00 a.m.-11:30 a.m. and evening hours 4:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m., Wednesdays: 9:00 a.m.-10:30 a.m. and Thursdays: 1:30 p.m.-3:00 p.m. FREE SERVICE

<u>Clothing Depot</u> - Structured as a store which stocks clothing for all ages, shoes, small household items and appliances, baby gear, books, games, toys and various odds and ends. Hours: Mondays: 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and evening hours 4:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m., Wednesdays: 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and Fridays: 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. FREE SERVICE

<u>Support Group</u> - A Survivors of Suicide Support group meets every month on the second Thursdays at 6:30 p.m. This is a group for those who have had loved ones take their own life. Those who have lost loved ones in this way experience a unique kind of grief, which others find hard to understand. Being able to connect with other survivors of suicide can be a breath of fresh air and a source of hope. FREE SERVICE

## WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

White Mountain Community Health Center is a nonprofit health care center located in Conway. The mission of the center is to provide medical care to the underinsured and uninsured. The center provides reduced fees to these residents. This ensures that everyone can receive the health care they need to stay healthy and keep a health workforce.

The center provides medical outpatient services for men, women and children. This includes a children's program that provides physicals, sick call visits, diagnosis and treatment, inoculations, and many screens to assess the child's or infant's health status. The prenatal program provides care beginning with pregnancy, deliveries of babies with a nurse mid-wife, and post natal care. Adults and teens are also seen for physicals, screenings, sick calls, diagnosis treatment and family planning.

The value to the town includes services offered and not funded by the town:

- Mental health counseling services to our patients are provided to our patients.
- Children's Dental Program provides dental services provided by a dental hygienist and a dentist. Dental Hygiene education and screening are provided in the Conway elementary schools.
- Partners in Health is an outreach program that provides support to families of children with chronic illnesses.
- The health center assists in the application of Healthy Kids for those children who quality.
- Employee Prepay Program is a program that employers prepay for our services at a discount. This offers small businesses an affordable way to provide out patient healthcare to their employees who cannot afford a health insurance benefit.
- Patient Assistance Funds includes funds to help patients with medication, transportation, and medical testing.

The health center gives away over \$35,500.00 a month in free care to patients. Again this year we are seeing an increased number of people who have lost their health insurance or jobs.

We rely on various sources of revenue to assist us in serving these patients. The Town appropriations are an important part of how we can offer free and reduced services to those Conway residents in need. If White Mountain Community Health Center did not exist, Conway could have a larger tax burden. While our visits and services continue to grow each year, we only ask for level funding. We appreciate the support of Conway residents and we look forward to your support again this year. Thank You.

## **Results of the Deliberative Session**

The Deliberative Session of Town meeting was held on March 7, 2011. The voters in attendance approved changes to two of the warrant articles as presented below. Deleted language is shown in strikethrough and added text is shown in bold.

ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Eight Hundred Nineteen Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$8,19,473) Eight Million Nine Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Three Dollars (\$8,998,983). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Forty Three Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$9,043,666) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0). Not recommended by the **Budget Committee (1-9-0).** 

ARTICLE 17: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars (\$29,298) from the annual cable television franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of Public Education and Government television services provided that the State of New Hampshire funds the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level. In the event that the State of New Hampshire fails to fund the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level, this article shall be null and void and the funds shall be placed in the general fund. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

## **BUDGET NARRATIVE**

## Introduction

The following narrative presents the 2011 operating budget for the municipal government of the Town of Conway as amended approved by the voters attending the Deliberative Session of Town Meeting held on March 7, 2011. This budget is supported by the Board of Selectmen by a vote of 5-0. The budget is not recommended by the Budget Committee by a vote of 1-9-0.

The total operating budget proposed to the voters at the Deliberative Session was \$8,819,473 which represented a decrease of \$109,854 (-1.2%) over the prior year's budget (see Exhibit 1).

At the Deliberative Session funding was increased in several areas. Consequently, the budget that will appear before the voters totals \$8,998,983 which represents an increase over 2010 of 1% or \$69,655. The default budget totals \$9,043,666, which is \$44,683 more than the recommended operating budget. (See Exhibit 2).

The operating budget is composed of three distinct components:

- Town Departments that are under the purview of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager
- The Police Department as overseen by the Police Commission and Police Chief
- The Library which is managed by the Library Board of Trustees and the Library Director

While the overall operating budget increases, the Library Budget increases by 2% and the Police Budget increases by 7%. The Selectmen/Town Manager budget decreases by 2%.

Significant changes in the budget are discussed in more detail in the narrative, however, a summary is provided below:

## **Departmental Summaries**

This following discussion provides a summary of each department budget. Exhibit 1 presents a summary of the changes in each budget from 2010 to 2011.

## **Executive**

The Executive Budget includes staff and operating expenses for general town administration. Included in the budget are supplies and materials for administrative departments and compensation for the Board of Selectmen/Town Manager's Office. Compensation for some elected officials is also included. This year, the budget decreases by 3% due to reductions in printing costs, telephone costs and maintenance expenses.

## **Election and Registration**

This budget funds elections and voter registration.

The budget decreases by 1% and reflects reduced election expenses based on the number of elections to be held during the year.

## **Financial Administration**

The Finance Department maintains fiscal records for the town. The Finance Budget includes expenses for Finance Department and Town Clerk/Tax Collector salaries, the annual external audit, the elected Town Treasurer, and the Budget Committee. The budget decreases 2% resulting from the fact that minor increases in personnel costs are offset by decreases in the information technology and seminars and professional development lines.

## **Assessor**

The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing all real and personal property, including mobile homes, residential and commercial properties, and agricultural land.

The Assessor's Budget includes assessing department staff salaries, outside mapping services, and other costs for property assessment. The budget is level funded.

## **Legal Expenses**

The Legal Budget contains expenses for Town Counsel and other outside legal expenses. Town Counsel provides legal counsel to the Board of

Selectmen and town staff. In addition, Town Counsel defends or prosecutes actions in court on behalf of the Town.

The amount budgeted for legal expenses decreases from \$60,000 to \$40,000 based on projected needs for 2011.

## **Employee Benefits**

Employee Benefits includes health insurance and other employee costs mandated by the federal or state government such as FICA, social security and retirement. An amount for sick leave incentive for non-union employees is also included.

This budget shows an increase of 5%. Fortunately, employee health insurance increased by just 1.5%. However, in July of 2011 employer contributions to the state retirement system were mandated to increase from 9.16% to 11.09% for administrative employees. Workers comp insurance increased by approximately 6% and unemployment insurance increased by 6% as well. Finally, dental insurance increased by 4.5% and an amount is included in this budget to pay the earned benefit of a retiring employee in the Solid Waste Department.

## Planning and Zoning

The Planning Department is responsible for advising the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the public on land use and development issues. The planning staff oversees site plan and subdivision applications and amendments to the Site Plan, Subdivision and Zoning Regulations, as well as the Conway Master Plan. The Code Compliance Officer issues sign permits, home occupation permits and enforces the zoning codes.

This budget decreases by 1%. Minor staff increases are offset by minor reductions in operating expenses.

## **Government Buildings**

Government Buildings includes operating expenses for a variety of Town buildings and facilities. These include: Town Hall, the Conway Recreation Center, the Public Works Garages, and the Whitaker Meeting House. For 2011, this budget increases by 10% based on projected increases in heating fuel.

## **Cemeteries**

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

## **Insurance**

Liability insurance for Town property and vehicles is funded within this budget. The amount presented is an increase of 6% and is based on the actual cost of insurance coverage for 2011.

## **Police Department**

The Police Department preserves the public peace, reduces the opportunity to commit crime, and provides a high level of safety, security and service for all members of the community.

The Police Department Budget recommended by the Board of Selectmen increases by 7% or approximately \$85,000. This increase is due largely to labor costs.

## **Ambulance**

The Ambulance Budget funds a contribution to local ambulance providers. The providers are Conway Village Fire District and the North Conway Ambulance Service. This budget remains level based on the current contract.

## Fire and Rescue

The primary expense within the Fire and Rescue Budget is the provision of fire protection for areas of the Town that are not located within a fire precinct. Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct provide these services under contract. This expense is funded by property taxes paid only by residents of non-precinct areas of the Town.

The budget decreases slightly due to the elimination of funding for fire pond maintenance.

## **Inspections**

The Building Inspector reviews building permits, building plans, inspects buildings and enforces the building codes.

This budget decreases by 1%.

## Highway

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance and construction of Town roads and bridges as well as other related activities such as snow removal and ditch and culvert repair.

A decrease of 3% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This decrease is a result of proposed reductions in asphalt and the fact that it is anticipated that approximately 200 street lights will be turned off in 2011. Hence, the Highway Street Lights line which funds power usage has been reduced accordingly.

## **Solid Waste**

The Solid Waste Department manages the disposal of solid waste for the Mount Washington Valley Solid Waste District, which includes the towns of Conway, Albany, and Eaton. The member towns reimburse Conway for this

service. The department operates both a transfer station and landfill.

The proposed budget represents a decrease of 9%. This is due to the fact that funding for the contract position of Recycling Compliance Officer has been eliminated and an open position will not be filled.

## Health

The Health Budget includes funding for the services of appointed Health Officers as well as kennel fees for impounded animals. The budget is level.

## Welfare

The General Assistance Department relieves and maintains those who are unable to support themselves. This office assists with basic necessities such as medication, housing, electricity, food and heat for those who qualify. All assistance is in the form of a loan and not a grant.

This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget decreases by 12% based on projected decreases in the amount of assistance that will be provided in the coming year.

## **Parks and Recreation**

The Recreation Department is responsible for elementary school age youth sports and recreation programs and activities as well as a Teen Center for junior high age students. The Department also offers a variety of adult and senior citizen programs.

The budget decreases by 1% due to the proposed elimination of lifeguards at Conway Lake Beach during times when swim lessons are not being provided. In addition, there will be a slight reduction in staffing for summer maintenance. An additional \$58,000 in Recreation Department expenses is projected to be funded through fees collected in the Recreation Department Revolving Fund.

## Library

The Conway Public Library provides community residents of all ages access to information sources, the opportunity to borrow materials in a variety of formats to meet their cultural, educational, and recreational needs, and a place to gather. From story hours to guest presenters, the Library offers numerous programs that encourage lifelong learning.

The proposed budget increases by 2% due to projected increases in heating fuel.

#### **Patriotic Purposes**

This budget provides funding for the Town Fourth of July celebration and for commemorative activities that occur on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The budget is level funded.

#### **Conservation Commission**

The Conservation Commission oversees the planning and long-term use of Town common lands and open space properties. The proposed Conservation Commission Budget remains level and is based on planned projects for the year.

#### **Debt Principal**

Included here are principal payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget increases by 4% based on an increase of \$15,000 in the Landfill Bond payment. It should be noted that this is the final payment on that bond.

#### **Debt Interest**

Included in this budget are the interest payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by a net amount of approximately 36% and results from the changes in the payment schedules for the remaining bonds.

#### **Interest on TANS**

This budget includes interest expenses on Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). Simply put TANS are short-term loans available to municipalities from the state that assist in supporting cash needs during the year. Based on the current reserves retained by the Town, this amount remains the same as the prior year at \$2,500.

#### WARRANT ARTICLES 2011 TOWN MEETING NARRATIVE

#### **Operating Budget**

Article 4 presents the Operating Budget for action by the voters:

ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Three Dollars (\$8,998,983). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Forty Three Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$9,043,666) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-9-0).

#### **Special Articles**

In addition to the Operating Budget, the Board of Selectmen have placed a number of special articles on the warrant. Further, there are usually a series of articles requesting funding on behalf of local non-profit agencies and organizations. These articles are presented below. In some cases explanations have been added to assist readers in considering the articles. Exhibit 3 presents a summary study sheet.

ARTICLE 5: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in the TWO-YEAR (2011-2012) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing level:

And further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Four Dollars (\$5,784.00) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This article asks voters to approve a two year contract between the Town of Conway and its unionized employees in the Police Department. The contract includes changes to the sick leave policy that would result in additional costs to the Town. For the first year, the increase is expected to be \$5,784. It is estimated that the costs in the second year will be approximately \$6,000. This article also appropriates \$5,784 to fund the first year of the contract increase. Approval of this article will result in the funding for 2012 being included in the operating budget for 2012.

ARTICLE 6: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve all costs associated with the addition of TWO PATROL OFFICER POSITIONS IN THE POLICE DEPARTMENT. The annual cost of two additional positions is estimated to be One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) and further to raise and appropriate Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the costs to fund these positions for one half of the year as they are to be hired in July. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-5-0).

ARTICLE 7: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Thirty Thousand (\$230,000) for the purpose of IMPROVEMENTS TO CONWAY SERVICE GARAGE. These improvements shall include but not be limited to replacing the roof, the installation of energy efficient windows, and the insulation of the building. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the improvements are completed, or in two years, whichever first occurs. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This article requests funding to replace the roof on the Town Service Garage. It will also fund the insulation of the building and the installation of energy efficient windows. The Town invested approximately \$230,000 in this building last year to update and rehabilitate the structure so that it would be a serviceable, more energy efficient and safe workplace. The requested funding will allow the Town to finish the project and create a building that will serve the community well into the future.

#### Capital Reserve Funds - Background

Articles 8-14 are warrant articles that ask the voters to place money in Capital Reserve Funds. These are special town funds that can be used to pay for current year expenditures but are also allowed to be used to save for future expenditures. These funds function as special purpose budgets to purchase equipment and vehicles without having to incur finance charges. They are also important in that they support multi-year plans that enable the efficient management of town departments and enable the town to undertake large construction projects.

For example, we plan out all of our vehicle replacements on 10 or 12 year schedules so that we have a dependable fleet and avoid excessive maintenance costs. Monies are saved for a number of years in some cases before the actual purchase is made. The Infrastructure Fund is used to accumulate funding for relatively large road and street construction projects.

ARTICLE 8: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$325,000) to be placed in the INFRASTRUCTURE RECONSTRUCTION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This fund accumulates money to support road and street construction projects (See Exhibit 4).

ARTICLE 9: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000) to be placed in the HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This fund accumulates money to replace equipment and vehicles that are used for all public works activities such as snow plowing, road construction, drainage work and other critical functions. Because we save money up front, the Town avoids financing costs and keeps the budget level by making equal payments to this fund over a period of years thereby saving up for the purchase. Actual annual expenditures are based on equipment to be purchased that year. Currently all equipment and vehicles are on a 10-12 year replacement cycle (see Exhibit 5).

ARTICLE 10: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to contribute to the CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This fund accumulates money to purchase vehicles for the Police Department so that financing costs can be avoided. On alternating years, the Police Department purchases either one or two vehicles. This year the department plans to purchase one patrol vehicle.

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) to be placed in the MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This fund provides for the on-going maintenance of our town buildings. Projects such as replacing heating systems or installation of a new roof are funded from this source. Potential projects for 2011 include repairs to the existing vehicle storage garage and repairs to the Police Station fire suppression system. (See Exhibit 6).

ARTICLE 12: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) to be placed in the SOLID WASTE EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This fund accumulates money to support the replacement of equipment and vehicles that are used at the landfill and transfer station. By saving money up front, the Town avoids financing costs and keeps the budget level by making equal payments to this fund over a period of years. Actual annual expenditures are based on equipment to be purchased that year. Currently all equipment and vehicles are on a 10-12 year replacement cycle (See Exhibit 7).

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) to be placed in the LANDFILL CLOSURE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

**EXPLANATION:** The Town of Conway is required by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services to maintain this fund which will be used to pay for the eventual closure of the existing landfill. Currently, it is felt that the amount in the fund is sufficient to cover future expansion costs. An amount of \$1.00 is recommended so that the fund is kept "open".

<u>ARTICLE 14:</u> (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be placed in the LANDFILL EXPANSION CAPITAL

**RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-0).** 

**EXPLANATION:** This fund provides for the accumulation of funding for the future expansion of the landfill which is scheduled for 2014. The annual contributions are necessary to ensure that the Town has adequate funding for the expansion of our municipal landfill.

#### **Other Warrant Articles**

ARTICLE 15: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) from the annual cable television franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of Public Education and Government television services. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This article asks the voters to place \$100,000 of the approximately \$125,000 in Cable TV franchise fees received by the town into a trust fund to be used only for purposes related to Public Education and Government (PEG) television. PEG TV is currently broadcast on cable channel 3 and is provided for the Town of Conway by Valley Vision, a private nonprofit organization. If the voters approve the placement of these funds in the trust, the Board of Selectmen intends to use \$92,500 to fund Valley Vision services for the year. The remaining monies will be deposited into the account for use for equipment purchases of other PEG related services, programs, or expenses.

ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$110,000) from a one time equipment funding payment received from Time Warner Cable to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the equipment needs of the Public Education and Government television services. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

**EXPLANATION:** This article asks the voters to place \$110,000 received from Time Warner Cable to be used for equipment for the PEG TV. This money was paid to the town as part of the renewal of the cable franchise agreement and is to fund equipment over the life of the cable franchise agreement (10 years).

ARTICLE 17: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Nine

Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars (\$29,298) from the annual cable television franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of Public Education and Government television services provided that the State of New Hampshire funds the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level. In the event that the State of New Hampshire fails to fund the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level, this article shall be null and void and the funds shall be placed in the general fund. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).** 

**EXPLANATION:** This article asks the voters to place \$29,298 of the approximately \$129,000 in Cable TV franchise fees received by the town into a trust fund to be used only for purposes related to Public Education and Government (PEG) television. This article is contingent on the state legislature renewing the funding of approximately \$400,000 in room and meals tax payments to the Town of Conway. If the state fails to fund these revenues, then the article will be null. The effect of this article is that in the event the state does not provide the revenue from room and meals taxes, the \$25,000 in cable franchise revenue will be deposited into the general fund to help offset this revenue shortfall.

#### **Non Profit Requests for Funding**

The following articles are petitioned requests for funding from local non-profit organizations:

ARTICLE 18: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (level funded from last year) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-1).

ARTICLE 19: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 20: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-0).

ARTICLE 21: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-0).

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-0).

ARTICLE 23: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. D/B/A as NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-8-1).

ARTICLE 24: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$2,880) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-1).

ARTICLE 25: (Special -not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty One Dollars (\$6,881) in support of STARTING POINT providing advocacy and support to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-0).

ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an OPERAT-ING BUDGET, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Ninety Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Three Dollars (\$8,998,983). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Forty Three Thousand Six Hundred Sixty Six Dollars (\$9,043,666) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in the TWO-YEAR (2011-2012) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing level:

ARTICLE 7: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Thirty Thousand (\$230,000) for the purpose of IMPROVEMENTS TO CONWAY SERVICE GARAGE. These improvements shall include but not be limited to replacing the roof, the installation of energy efficient windows, and the insulation of the building. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the improvements are completed, or in two years, whichever first occurs. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). ARTICLE 9: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000) to be placed in the HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 10: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to contribute to the CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) to be placed in the MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-0).

ARTICLE 12: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) to be placed in the SOLID WASTE EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) to be placed in the LANDFILL CLOSURE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 14: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be placed in the LANDFILL EXPANSION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to

the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-0).

ARTICLE 15: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) from the annual cable television franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPEND-ABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of Public Education and Government television services. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$110,000.) from a one time equipment funding payment received from Time Warner Cable to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the equipment needs of the Public Education and Government television services. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 17: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Nine Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars (\$29,298) from the annual cable television franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of Public Education and Government television services provided that the State of New Hampshire funds the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level. In the event that the State of New Hampshire fails to fund the Room and Meals Tax at the 2010 level, this article shall be null and void and the funds shall be placed in the general fund. residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-0).** 

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-0).

ARTICLE 23: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. D/B/A as NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-8-1).

ARTICLE 24: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$2,880) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (5-4-1).

ARTICLE 25: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty One Dollars (\$6,881) in support of STARTING POINT providing advocacy and support to victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-0).

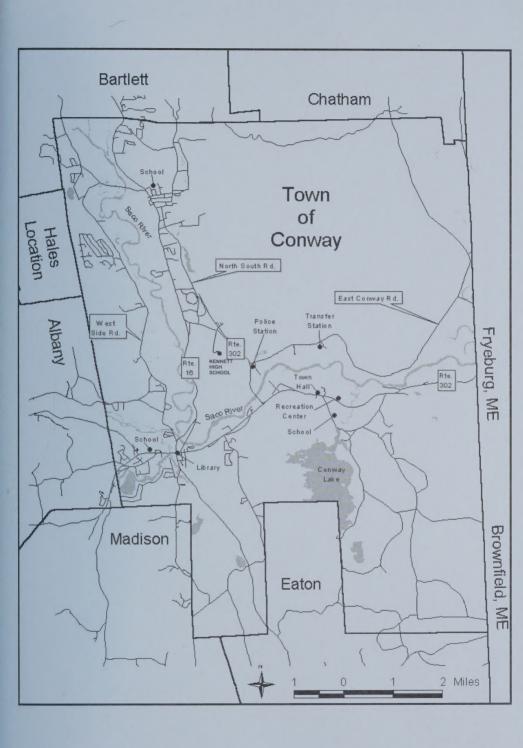
