

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Town Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Trunk Line maintenance.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Aid maintenance.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for State Aid construction.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for libraries.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to adopt a resolution recommending the enforcement of the law against slot machines and other gambling devices.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the gravel near the Hotel Alpine.

- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a suitable tractor and plow for winter road breaking.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, \$200.00 to put against \$50.00 that the state will give for eradication of Pine Blister Rust.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Week in commemoration of New Hampshire's 150th anniversary as a state.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to oblige all owners of cows in the town to have them tested, according to state law, for tuberculosis.
- 16. To see what action the town will take on certain tax sales in 1909, 1910, 1911, affecting the title of Arthur C. Russell's homestead on Pondfield road.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### THE BUDGET

The total tax levy for 1925 was \$20,031.87 The ammount needed for 1926 will be no less.

Should the town vote to plow its roads the sum needed for town highway maintenance will need to be increased.

The valuation of the town will not change very much from that of April 1, 1925. Unless current expenses are curtailed the rate for next year will probably be \$3.00 on \$100.00.

The rate of taxation is set by the state and voters in town meeting, not by the selectmen.



# Mr. Chairman and Members of School Board:

I hereby submit my seventh annual report of the Woodstock schools.

The teachers for the present year are:

High school, Gladys P. Twitchell, headmaster; Laura B. Gilmore, French, Latin and English; and Kathleen Huntoon, Commercial subjects.

Elementary schools at North Woodstock, Elizabeth M. Thompson, grades 6-8; Pauline Whitney, grades 3-5; Margaret Rowden, grades 1-2.

Elementary schools at Woodstock, Stella Tuttle, grammar grades, and Blanche A. Baston, primary grades. Music, Marion Burnell and Grace Flanders after Nov. 1, 1925.

All the teachers, with one exception, are graduates either of college or normal school. There has

been but one change this year in teachers, viz., Miss Corliss went to Nashua High School and Miss Huntoon was elected to fill the vacancy.

The teachers recorded the following visits for the year: 10 by members of school board, 621 by citizens and others, and 272 by the superintendent of schools.

The report of the September school census shows 72 boys and 71 girls or a total of 143 between the ages of 5 and 13 years. Of those, 123 were reported in school September 30th. and 18 between 5 and 8 and one between 14 and 16 not in school, in other words, we have accounted for all pupils.

The medical examination was made by Dr. E. D. Burtt assisted by Katherine T. Ferguson, R. N., of Lincoln. They examined 127 pupils and reported the following defects: Defective teeth 62 or about 41%; enlarged tonsils 41 or 32%; enlarged glands 57 or 45%; adenoids 3 or a little over 2%; cardiac disease 8 or 6.3%; defective vision 12 or 9.4%; and 19 not vaccinated or 15%. Approximately 6% of pupils of North Woodstock have not been vaccinated and 54% of those of Woodstock. I hope that all parents who have not already attented to the vaccination as required by law will attend to it before schools open another year.

During "National Educational Week," we had our evening session of schools at North Woodstock and a day session for visitation at Woodstock. Both special sessions were well attended.

The school building at North Woodstock has been equipped with system or indirect lighting the same as replaced for the commercial room one year ago.

Extra radiation has been added to Miss Thompson's room, school desks were refinished, plastering repaired in the hall, and a little steel put on the ceilings in the basement. More should be put up as the plastering is nearly all off.

Water has been put into the Woodstock school house and two chemical toilets installed.

The pupils' desks and seats need to be repaired and redressed.

Standard and other tests have been given to check up the work to see whether or not we are gaining in efficiency. Practice and drill sheets are in daily use.

The success of any school depends largely upon the efficiency of the teacher. At the present time, we have a very satisfactory corps of teachers, and the school progress is due primarily to their faithful and untiring efforts.

Two transportation routes are maintained. Seven pupils are conveyed by train from West Thornton and those on the "Lost River" by Mrs. Clara Gordon.

The report of the inspection by the State High School Agent is favorable.

Miss Twitchell's report as headmaster is appended.

I wish to thank all those who have contributed in any way, during the past year, in bringing our schools to the standard which they have reached and may we be not contended until they have reached a much higher level.

#### HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

Superintendent A. J. Knowlton:

It is with pleasure that I herewith submit my

seventh annual report of Woodstock High School.

The school opened September fourteen with forty-two pupils enrolled as follows: seven Seniors, five Juniors, fourteen Sophomores, fifteen Freshmen and 1 special. Seven are enrolled in the Latin Course and thirty-five in the Commercial Course.

We are well equipped with the necessary books for the different courses and with supplies for the Chem-

istry class.

Our greatest handicap is having the train leave at 2:07 in the afternoon. About one-third of the pupils come on the train. They have almost no time for supervised study in school or for assistance in making up work.

Seven have left school; two from the Freshman Class and five from the Sophomore Class. Two of them left the town and are attending school elsewhere,

but the most of the others left to go to work.

We are trying to impress upon the pupils the necessity of staying in school and completing their high school education. Several of the former graduates have said they could not be doing the work they are now engaged in, if they had not finished high school. We are living in an age where high educational standards are required. If we are to advance we must meet those requirements.

We expect to give a high school play in the spring

to help defray the expenses of graduation.

The piano which we bought a year ago last fall was entirely paid for last year from the proceeds of the musical entertainment given by grades and high school under the supervision of Mrs. Burnell, and from the proceeds of the school play.

At Christmas time, Miss Hazel Corliss, who taught the Commercial subjects here for the past two years, presented the school with a fine picture of the

"Roman Forum."
