

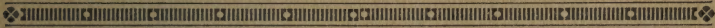

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as recommended by the Budget.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the Town.

5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Sunday sports bill as approved by the Legislature, May 6, 1931, Chapter 155.

6. To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$300.00 toward the support of the Red Cross Nurse.

7. To see what action the Town will take in the matter of the Water System at Woodstock Center and make appropriation therefor.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

School Report

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Woodstock qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the eighth day of March, 1932, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for ensuing year.
5. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
8. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings.
9. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on school buildings.
10. To see if the district will vote to adopt Medical Inspection for the schools and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Chairman and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit my thirteenth annual report of the Woodstock schools for your consideration.

The schools opened in September with the following teachers: Stephen T. Crowther, headmaster and Dorothy A. Sewell and Doris A. Gilbert as assistants; Lois E. Watson, grammar school; Margaret R. Muchmore, intermediate room; Persis L. Doe, primary room at North Woodstock; Dorothy M. Douglass, grammar room; and Beth Bolton, primary room at Woodstock.

The September school census showed 89 boys and 68 girls or a total of 157 pupils in town between the ages of five and sixteen. This is ten more than were reported one year ago. The total registration on September 30th was 176 which is an increase of 22 over one year ago. Twenty-two of these were over sixteen years of age.

From the teachers' registers for 1930-1931, the following data was copied: Visits by school board members 45, by citizens and others 258, by the superintendent of schools 457; there were recorded 182 tardy marks which was 26 less than during the previous year; the percent of attendance was 95.51 which is .25 per cent less than last year. A percent of 95 or over is considered satisfactory.

The health inspection was done by Addie Bilodeau, R. N. She has done some excellent work for us. Her report is appended.

In place of the unsanitary slate urinal at North Woodstock, five porcelain urinals have been installed. This has improved the basement condition very much. Some time, in the near future, we should have new toilets as the present ones are very unsatisfactory. A larger water-pipe line is needed to the building and then some local means of fire protection supplied.

Last June, twelve pupils completed the work of the grammar school and all entered high school in September. There were but two who graduated from the high school. One of these entered Plymouth Normal

School and the other is doing some post graduate work along special lines.

The following twenty-one names of pupils were recorded as having a perfect school record of attendance for the year: viz., High School—Virginia Bradley, Harry Kendall, Edward Kimball, Wallace Woodbury, and Everett Steele; Grammar Room—Christine Cloud, Harold Fulton, Lyle Martin, Lloyd Roy, Vernon Schuster; Intermediate Room—Layton Fulton, Norma Govoni, Marcia Lynde, and Robert Nichols; Primary Room—Mae Gilman, Emma Gray, and Barbara Ward; Woodstock Grammar—Richard Bradley, Arnold Rogers and Lester Sabourn; Woodstock Primary—Bernard Rogers.

The Sons of the American Revolution's Medal last year was won by Lloyd E. Roy, North Woodstock and Shirley M. Avery, at Woodstock. A similar medal is offered this year.

The headmaster's report is appended and made a part of this report.

Standard and other tests have been used during the year as a check on the amount accomplished. The results show that the quality of the work is still on the gain. I wish it might be a little more rapid. I wish to thank all who have contributed in any way in making the gain possible.

Report of Woodstock High School 1931-32

Report of Headmaster

Mr. Alonzo J. Knowlton, Superintendent of Schools, North Woodstock, N. H.,

I herewith submit my second annual report of the Woodstock High School.

School opened September 9, 1931, with an enrollment of forty-three members. Since that date two graduate students have come back for courses, and one more member has joined the freshman class, while four have been dropped from our membership; one because

of illness, and three for other reasons. This leaves a present enrollment of forty-two members.

The distribution of these members according to classes is as follows: seven seniors, six juniors, twelve sophomores, fifteen freshmen, and two graduate students. This year the Academic Course claims twenty, or half of the forty undergraduates, while the other twenty are taking the Commercial Course.

The school was fortunate last spring in having the baseball diamond for the boys' Athletic Association to use. Due to the kindness of many of the townspeople who cooperated in making the diamond possible, we were able to carry out a full baseball schedule. This training in athletics seems to me to be a vital part of the pupils' education, and the diamond is appreciated by the State Motor Vehicle Department, since it reduces the former danger incurred by passing automobiles.

The seniors, with the aid of the undergraduates, successfully gave their play, "A Peach of a Family" this fall, and cleared over \$80.00. The play was repeated in Campton, the proceeds, this time, going to the Athletic Association.

The chemistry laboratory is well equipped with chemicals which makes the course more interesting and practical.

Due to a change in the train schedule, we have found it best to adopt the single session plan of school. This arrangement seems to be suiting our needs very well.

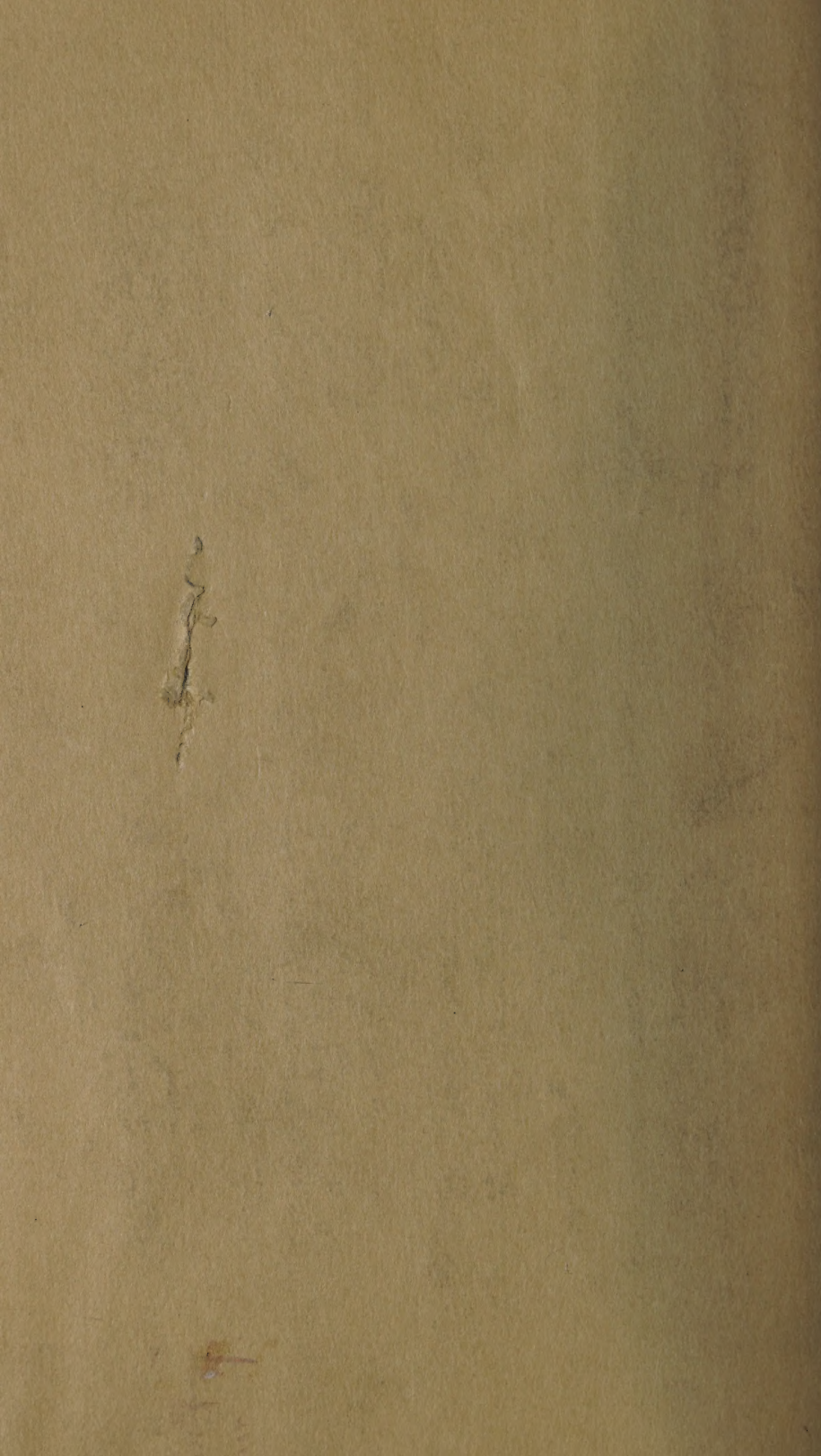
