#### THE LATE FRANK M. HARDING.

The Town of Sunapee suffered a great loss, when Frank Madison Harding died November 25, 1929, after several weeks of critical illness, at the age of 60 years, 3 months, 22 days. Mr. Harding served on the Board of Selectmen for 20 years continuously with the exception of one year, since 1909, and held the office at the time of his death. He represented the Town in the General Court in 1915 and 1916 and was overseer of the poor for many years. He affiliated with Rock Ezel Lodge, No. 79, I. O. O. F., in 1912, and was also a member of Stony Brook Encampment and the Canton.

# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(SEAL) To the inhabitants of the Town of Sunapee, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall, in said Sunapee on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 2. To elect a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.

Article 3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, Agents and Committees or other Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To elect one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for one year, and all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to borrow the sum of (\$40,000) forty thousand dollars, and issue the obligations of the Town in the form of Bonds, to the amount of (\$40,000) forty thousand dollars, to be signed by the Selectmen and Town Treasurer, in accordance with Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of 1926, known as the Municipal Bonds Act. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds to pay all of the outstanding Notes. Said Bonds to bear a rate of interest not to exceed  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  and payable (\$2,000) two thousand dollars annually and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to pay the outstanding debts and interest on its notes and bonds and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Town Officers' salaries for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to repair Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will raise (\$6,000) six thousand dollars, the state to give (\$9,000) nine thousand dollars, to maintain its Trunk Line Highways and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise (\$450) four hundred and fifty dollars, (the state to give a like amount), to maintain its State Aid Highways and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise (\$8,000) eight thousand dollars for permanent road construction, to be expended on Garnet Hill Road and Lake Ave. and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise (\$2,584.12) two thousand five hundred eighty-four dollars and twelve cents, the State to give (\$1,938) one thousand nine hundred thirty-eight dollars, for State Aid Construction and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to plough the snow on all its town highways, raise money to purchase a tractor snow plough and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for electric lights and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to maintain its Fire Department and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to maintain its Public Library and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of the District Nurse and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the care of its Cemeteries and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the Towns of Newbury and New London, to advertise Lake Sunapee, raise and appropriate money for the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will raise four hundred dollars, (\$400.00) to co-operate with the State in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to license Junk dealers and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 23. To see what action the Town will take towards the better protection of the bathing beach, raise or appropriate money for the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take towards repairing or removing the town scales, raise or appropriate money for the same and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25. To see what action the Town will take towards relocating the road on Lake Avenue, beginning at a point near the cottage of Katherine Haviland and ending at a point near the cottage of Emma Chellis and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 26. To see what action the Town will take towards establishing parking regulations in and near the Square, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF  
**SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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To the School Board and Citizens of Sunapee:

In submitting the annual report I shall deal only with the financial aspect of Education as viewed from the standpoint of the Superintendent. It too often happens with the average citizen in thinking of cost of Education that the whole matter is lumped into the general statement that the schools are costing too much. This statement, if accepted in the raw material of the assertion is easily answered by those looking for an un-analyzed answer by saying "Yes."

I am presenting herewith figures of the cost of the schools for the years indicated and taken from the financial reports sent by the School Board to the State for the fiscal year as indicated.

Expenses due to the new building were not included in the above but **only the annual running expenses of the schools were included.** The "Dollar" column shows what part of each dollar assessed for education is spent for the commodity as indicated.

Let us analyze briefly how many of the above items can be charged off to the extravagance of the superintendent. Items 1, 2, 4, 8, 9, 11, 12, and 13, are directly controlled by the School Board and constitute 76.8 per cent of the total cost, obtained by adding the amounts in the dollar column. Numbers 3, 10, and 14 are not controlled by anyone but are the natural expenses occurring from running the schools, such as telephone, electric service, and the fixed charge of insurance. These amounts constitute 3.8 per cent of the total cost. Number 7 is a statutory requirement and prescribed by state law, or 3.33%.

The amounts included in 5 and 6 affect the educational program of the schools and whatever is bought under these items can be largely chargeable to the judgment of the superintendent. These amounts in the above tabulation amount to 16.1 per cent of the total cost in this particular year. However these costs were increased about four times in this year due to the fact that about all these materials were burned. I am including a similar list of expenditures for the previous year which were not influenced by any accident and are therefore normal.

As the last fiscal year is somewhat confusing, being mixed up with the building project, let us consider the expenses of the fiscal year of 1927-1928. From these figures is deducted \$5,681.61, all of which was caused by the fire.

The same story obtains concerning the above figures as for the first set. Numbers 5 and 6 are expended almost wholly on the sanction of the superintendent. Normally they comprise about four per cent of the total budget or about \$400 each. In the above year the figures for supplies are abnormally high as the stock room on the top floor of the old building was completely destroyed by fire. Under ordinary conditions it is only necessary to fill in the stock where it is depleted. In this case it was necessary to buy a complete new stock.

The annual requirements for any year are figured on a unit basis; these figures are scrutinized by the School Board when the budget is figured; the budget is voted on by the citizens at the annual school meeting. If the school board or citizens deemed these amounts unnecessary they would probably be revised downward. But once they are voted, does it not seem reasonable that the amounts may be expended for the good of the schools without hurling false accusations of "extravagance?" And these two items are the only two over which the superintendent claims or has any direct duty to expend as a part of the educational program within the schools.

Another angle throws more light on this important subject as to the amount we are spending on our schools. Ever since I have been connected with the school work at Sunapee the annual budget has figured around \$20,000 each year. The debt and interest incurred by the new building has increased the budget to about \$25,000 per year. If the town can pay the new amount is it not reasonable to suppose that the \$20,000 budget I found in vogue at Sunapee and continued nearly to date was not too burdensome, exorbitant, extravagant or unreasonable? Figures for comparative costs of education throughout the

state have just been received and give added light on this subject.

The high expense of the high school per pupil is due to the fact that we are running a secondary school with small enrollment which raises the cost per pupil. Another factor which increases the cost is the fact that we are running five courses in a small school. If local pride did not demand that we have a high school the expenses of our schools could be appreciably reduced by transporting all Senior High School pupils (30 now or X, XI, XII grades) to Newport. This I would not recommend as it is worth all it costs to have your own, efficient high school at home and to retain all our pupils at home.

In many larger places the politicians, who wish to raise an issue on school expenses, attack such things as physical education courses with expensive directors and expensive gymnasium up-keep; art courses; penmanship supervision; instrumental music (band and orchestra) calling them frills. I mention these so-called "frills" to show that we are merely presenting what would be considered to be the bare essentials of such systems. Aside from the high school we could not present less in our first eight grades and comply with the state's requirements. Surely these facts do not indicate that there is any undue extravagance there, either by the School Board or myself. If there be any on my own part, it can concern only about four per cent of the total budget and not all of that if at any time any balance is carried over in the two accounts each of which amounts to \$400 in a \$20,000 budget.

It is an easy matter for anyone, not feeling well toward a tax assessment, casting about seeking what can be the target for complaint, to attack educational expenditures. Such a one usually knows that whatever he may say against education will probably not be contested successfully as he assumes that everyone else knows as little or less about the matter as himself. In this way he hopes to feel safe in making the institution of those in charge, which is the citadel of democracy to which is entrusted the training of our young citizens and the

hope of our community, state and nation, a subject for an ill-founded attack.

I could discuss some situations in detail should space permit. I shall be glad to discuss school matters with any citizen, who is interested to know more about the more intimate workings of school affairs than can here be presented.

Probably one of the most outstanding pieces of constructive educational policy was arrived at last summer when a re-trenchment policy was abandoned with respect to the Headmaster of our school and the board elected Guy F. Williams. Everything reasonable should be done to retain his services at the head of the school. I feel that we have an efficient, hard-working corps of teachers, meriting the commendation and wholehearted support of the entire citizenship.
