THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose one member of board of trustees of Trust Fund of the town to serve three years.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the library.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
7. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.
8. To see if the town will vote to repair or rebuild bridges on South Side Highway and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for South Side Highway construction.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$550 for Trunk Line Maintenance, and \$150 for State Aid Maintenance.

11. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising and appropriating additional money for the new cemetery.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing the uniform accounting system as required by law, Chapt. 57, Laws of 1917, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Temple:

Herewith I submit my second annual report as superintendent of your schools, and to it I have attached a report from the supervisor of music.

The work of the schools has been unavoidably interrupted since my last report by frequent changes in the teaching force and by the necessity of closing because of the prevalence of the influenza. Though maintaining but two schools at any time, we have had six different regular teachers on our pay rool during the past year. The interruption of the work because of the expidemic, is a misfortune which has been experienced by nearly every community and has not been as serious with us as in many town in the state.

However, we are now ideally housed in a new building with two teachers of good promise and I feel that your children are at present enjoying exceptional advantages for children living in as sparsely settled a town as is Temple. Your new building is admirably adapted for school purposes. The lighting is ideal, coming entirely from the left side of the pupil. Your children's eyes will no longer be subjected to the strain and other harmful effects of cross lights and inadequate lighting. If their eyes are right when they enter school, they will not be injured there, as have the eyes of a large percent of the children in the past. Your heating plant is adequate and appropriate. No longer will your children be exposed to the inconvenience and injury arising from an insufficiently heated or a super-heated atmosphere which has been dried to an injurious point. This must inevitably result in a decrease to the health. The ventilating system is also adequate, and the same beneficial results must follow from the purer air which the children will breath for five or six hours each day, an air, too, much nearer in humidity to that of the air on the outside. The modern conveniences of the basement does away with the ill smelling and often obscenely decorated outbuildings of the average rural school. Your children are fortunate to enjoy these conveniences. The bubblers will be an insurance against any contagion from the drinking cup.

The ingenious arrangement for the ventilating and drying of the wraps of the children should be mentioned. This is a convenience of especial value in moist weather. The blackboard space is abundant and the boards themselves are of the best and most lasting material, natural slate. The entire structure is substantial and attractive. very little adverse criticism could be offered to it by any expert in school building construction. The building committee deserves much credit and the town should count itself fortunate in possessing such housing for its children.

There are enrolled at the present time in the primary room 13 pupils, in the grammar room 15, with two not yet attending, and 7 in the Advent school, making 35 pupils in all attending, or who should attend, the elementary schools. The township of Temple has an area but a little of any below the average for the towns in southern New Hampshire. This small number of children scattered over so large a territory makes the problem of transportation a troublesome one, and it must always remain such until the day returns, if it ever does in the distant future, when once again there shall be enough children in each district to warrant the maintaining of a school. The difficulties of the situation should be appreciated by the public and their co-operation should be given by assisting wherever possible and by abstaining from unreasonable demands.

With the opening of the schools in the new building, we introduced into the seventh and eighth grades, junior high school mathematics and French, retaining as yet the grammar and geography work. To complete the reorganization, provisions should be made for domestic arts for the girls and manual training for the boys. This can be done without a large expenditure.

I wish also to suggest to you at this time the advisability of increasing the length of the school year. If the educational bill now before the legislature becomes a law, such standards will be set off by the state as will be difficult, if not impossible to meet with a 30-week school year.

Thanking the board for their co-operation and consideration, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools, Temple, N. H. :

While the ultimate end of music in the public schools is to awaken an appreciation and keener enjoyment on the part of the child, there is another reason to fully justify the time devoted to it, and that is its influence as a socializing force. That it is a "socializing force" has been clearly demonstrated in the past two years by the Community sings, and the Government considering music a necessary and vital part of the training of the soldiers and sailors.

The success of the music in the schools will have much to do with the successful development of the community spirit of the future.

Music is the common heritage of man, so in most cases the teacher has simply to create a desire in the child to sing. I have found the children at Temple no exception to this rule. The primary grade seem especially fond of singing, and learn the songs taught by note very quickly.

The higher grades have been well trained, but seem to lack confidence. The uniting of the schools will be a great advantage, as the larger number singing, will give both confidence and enthusiasm.

As there is no victrola in the school, the appreciation will be taught through the folk-song. These songs are the true expression of the people, and have been the inspiration of some of the world's most famous composers.

This department, as every other, has suffered from the loss of time, but it is progressing well at present and I hope to accomplish much of the usual work by the end of the season.

I thank you for your interest in my work.
