L. S. STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare qualified to vote in Town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To choose selectmen and town clerk for the ensuing year.

Second. To choose road agents for the ensuing year.

Third. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.

Fourth. To see if the town will vote to buy four or more oxen to work on the road machine.

Fifth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges.

Sixth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the town library.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise money to build a memorial building and hear any report relating thereto.

Ninth. To see if the town will appropriate fifty dollars to enable Stark Fellows Post, G. A. R., to decorate the graves of their fallen comrades.

Tenth. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to dispose of its right in the Elbridge Putnam farm.

Twelfth. To hear the reports of any committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

The past year has been a profitable one in most of our schools and while much has been accomplished more might have been attained. The board was quite fortunate in its choice of teachers and their success compares favorably with that of the teachers in other country towns in the state. In some instances the teachers merited better support from the parents than they received and would have accomplished much more had they been given the assistance they deserved. It is presumed that the annual criticism from the school board is expected at this time and either from force of habit or a sense of duty its members appear ever ready to embrace this opportunity in which to find fault with the school affairs in general, and the parents in particular. To our minds the annual screech, which has afforded our predecessors so much pleasure, is to us a source of satisfaction only so far as it serves to place the responsibility and awaken from apathy the parents and guardians. If in this we are successful we shall feel fully paid for the effort.

To value a virtue we must be able to estimate the degradation of the opposite vice. If we would fully appreciate the benefits of education let us compare the condition of the masses today with that of the common people in any age of the past. When we consider our present condition or contemplate our prospects in comparison with the past we are amazed at the transformation and are led to inquire what has wrought so great a change? There is but one reply—education; and the institution that has been chiefly instrumental in affording the knowledge now possessed by the people at large is the public school. It is the source and being of education; the well spring of culture and civilization. It is indeed a wonderful institution; one in which cast is unknown, for the children of the rich and of the poor, of the obscure and honored are seated side by side; where rank is obtained by personal effort only, and merit and honor are achieved by equal contest with peers. It is the transforming hand of the

school that has developed our modern civilization and by expanding and enriching the mind of the individual it awakens the kindlier sensibilities of the people and affords numberless enjoyments, as well in the dwellings of the poor as the mansions of the rich.

Education is the safe guard of our public institutions and the school the corner stone of Republican government. With them unlimited development and progress is possible, without them degeneration and the loss of a constitutional government would be the inheritance of our posterity. Is it not then, plainly our duty to make every effort possible for the development of our schools and the perpetuation of educational institutions? One of the most serious obstacles, in the past year has been the lack of punctual attendance. Good work cannot be done by any teacher when the number of absentees approaches nearly the number of scholars present, and the knowledge obtained by those who attend irregular must of necessity be superficial. In such schools a grade cannot be maintained and class lines soon disappear and we find the teacher and scholars struggling to attain individually what should be accomplished in classes and grades. In schools of this kind much time is wasted and the best planned efforts of the teacher fail of satisfactory results. We should not permit our children to stay at home when it is possible for them to go to school, nor encourage them to neglect their studies for either amusement or work while the school is in session. It is only by punctual attendance and thorough work on the part of the teacher and scholars, combined with the co-operation of the parents that the best results can be obtained.
