## Record of Town Meeting

Weare, N. H., March 11, 1930.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 11th day of March, 1930, at ten o'clock in the forenoon

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Charles F. Eastman, Moderator, Pro. Tem; also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 792.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.
The Moderator called a recess for one hour.
Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.
The whole number of votes cast, 399.
Necessary for choice, 200.
For Selectman for three years. Elmore R. Waterman had 2 ; John F. Tierney had $15 \%$; George A. Waterman had 222 and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Town Clerk. Blanche E. Gunn had 1; Frank Peaslee had 398 and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agents. Cleves G. Ellsworth had 1; Lewis C. Ilsley had 128 ; Fred R. Purington had 171; Elwin T. George
had 212; Charles F. Bennett had 250; Frank A. Philbrick had 395, and Elwin T. George, Charles F. Bennett and Frank A. Philbrick were declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor. Blanch E. Gunn had 1 ; John F. Tierney had 1, Walter H. Wilson had 1, Frank Tucker had 395 , and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Chief of Police. Blanche E. Gunn had 1, Russell B. Flanders had 102; J. Minot Sims had 267, and was declared elected by the Moderator.

Art. 2. Voted to raise the sum of three thousand dollars ( $\$ 3000$ ) to defray town charges.

Art. 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for George S. Daniels for Trustee of Trust Funds. This being done the Moderator declared George S. Daniels elected Trustee for three years.

Art. 4. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Jennie E. Bartlett for Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Jennie E. Bartlett elected Trustee for three years.

Art. 5. Upon motion of George A. Waterman, Voted to raise the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars $(\$ 8500)$ for the repair of highways.

Art. 6. Upon motion of Frank Tucker, voted to raise the sum of four thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$4250) for the permanent improvement of the Highway between Weare Center and the Henniker line.

Art. \%. Voted to dismiss the Article.

ART. 8. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth, voted that it be left to the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

Art. 9. Upon motion of Hiram E. Grant, voted to raise one hundred dollars $(\$ 100)$ for the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 10. Motion to raise four hundred dollars (\$400) was rejected.

Art. 11. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones that the town allow a discount on taxes of $3 \%$ July 1st, $2 \%$ August 1st, and 1\% September 1st. Frank L. Eastman offered an amendment to the motion that the rate be 5\% July 1st or on presentation of bills.

The motion as amended was rejected.
Art. 12. Upon motion of Alfred Osborne, voted to raise the sum of eighty dollars yearly $(\$ 80)$ for street lights in Riverdale.

Art. 13. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the Weare Band.

Art. 14. Upon motion of Hiram E. Grant, voted to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for the care of Soldiers' Graves.

Art. 15. Motion to sell the Harrison Currier farm was rejected.

Voted to rescind the vote taken on Article 15.
Voted to reconsider.
Voted to sell the Harrison Currier farm.
Art. 16. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to sell the Stone Crusher.

Art. 17. The History Committee submits the following report:

First: That a committee be appointed to collect material that may be used in a later edition of the history, this material to be kept in the vault at the Town Office suitably marked, and a list of all such material filed with the Selectmen, such committee to serve without pay.

Second: We also recommend that no further history be published until the Town is better able to meet the expense.

Signed, Alfred Osborne, Frank Tucker, Allen W. Sawyer, Hiram E. Grant, Lucie E. Clough and Asa E. Felch, Committee.

Upon motion of Frank N. Sawyer, voted to accept the report and the Committee be discharged with thanks.

Informal motion; voted that in the future the School meetings be held jointly with the Town meeting. A division was called for. A division being had, 62 voted in the affirmative and 29 voted in the negative and the motion prevails.

Upon motion of George A. Waterman, voted to have the records read at the close of the meeting.

Voted to call the meeting next year at 9 o'clock A . M.
Constitutional Convention Delegate. Votes given in was 356 ; Gordon W. Porter had 2; Charles F. Eastman had 170; Forrest Dearborn had 184, and was declared elected by the Moderator.

Voted that this meeting be dissolved.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Afjairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following swbjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raíse such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years,
5. To see how much money the Town will appropriate to repair highways,
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand, five hundred dollars ( $\$ 3,500$ ) to
be used with the sum of seven thousand dollars $(\$ \%, 000)$ to be furnished by the State. This money to be used for the permanent improvement of the highway between Weare Center and Henniker.
\%. To see if the Town will appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
7. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars ( $\$ 400$ ) for white pine blister rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars ( $\$ 200$ ) for band concerts.
10. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tractor and snow plow for the Eastern Division and appropriate the necessary money for the same.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred fifty dollars ( $\$ 150$ ) for the care of soldiers' graves.
12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars ( $\$ 1,000$ ) to be used with the sum of one thousand dollars ( $\$ 1,000$ ), to be furnished by the State. This money to be used for a cement bridge across Choate Brook between the cemetery and Robie's Corner in East Weare.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

In the year 1922, when the thought of restoring the graves of veterans of all wars whose remains lie buried in the various graveyards in Weare, was introduced to the voters at the annual town meeting in March, little thought was given to
the possibilities of the project aside from that which prompted the town to undertake the program, namely, cutting the bushes and trees. During the first year of the program, it was discovered that many of the graves were unmarked, many with broken stones, and still others whose stones were buried from sight beneath the turf. Your Committtee, feeling that these conditions were within its jurisdiction to remedy, took the necessary steps to do so.

There are, however, quite a number of graves which need re-grading and owing to the small appropriation each year, it has been impossible to complete this work. It is felt also that the graves of all of our veterans should be charted so that future generations of the town will not be confronted with the problems which have hampered the work of this committee, and because the town owes to the memory of those valiant sons a debt of patriotic responsibility which it cannot afford to overlook.

It is the opinion of your Committee that this work should go forward and we request that the sum of $\$ 150$ be appropriated at the March town meeting.

Comparison of these figures with the report of the year before will show that our attendance record has improved considerably, and that our percentage of attendance is still better than the average for the state. Our boys and girls, however, seem to have difficulty in getting to school on time. The average number of tardinesses per pupil for Weare is almost double that for the state as a whole; and only two schoolsEast Weare and Rockland-had a record of promptness for 1929-30 that was better than the state average.

The Riverdale school is closed this year, as there are not enough pupils in that neighborhood to warrant the maintenance of a separate school. The children in that district are attending school at River Road.

The Junior High school is considerably larger this year than last, but there are still several eighth grade pupils attending one-room schools. Two of these are at River Road, one at South Weare, one at Sugar Hill and one at Rockland. I believe that the lack of association at work with others of the same age is a real handicap to pupils in the upper grades, and I wish to repeat my suggestion of last year that pupils in grade eight (also in grade seven where possible) should strive to take advantage of the larger opportunities offered in our junior high school.

## Our School Buildings

Th Buxton school received a thorough remodeling last summer. Windows were added on the left of the pupils, enough to make the glass area equal to one-fifth of the area of the floor. A new steel ceiling was painted white, and the walls a light buff color, which helped to make the room light. New washable canvas shades, recently bought for the Riverdale school, were moved to the Buxton. Additional blackboard space was provided, and chemical toilets were installer.

It is hoped that citizens interested to see the effect of such a thorough change will look into the Rockland or Buxton schools. These are certainly two very pleasant study rooms.

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## A Revised State Program of Studies

During the past summer a new edition of the "Program of Studies for the Elementary Schools" was issued by the State Board of Education. This volume of nearly 500 pages is the work of committees of teachers and superintendents, who have worked diligently for more than a year to complete this important task. The principal changes made by the program are as follows:
a. More emphasis on reading. The 1921 program of studies stated that most children have become independent readers by the end of Grade III. and gave little or no emphasis to formal instruction in reading beyond that point. It is now recognized that further instruction for most pupils is necessary. Training in silent reading as well as oral reading is emphasized.
b. Less arithmetic for the first two grades. Certain processes with number that seem very difficult for young children are mastered with comparative ease by pupils who are a little older, and whose minds have developed to a point where they can understand such problems. It seems good judgment to postpone the more formal number work until the minds of the pupils are mature enough to grasp it successfully.
c. More American history, and less European. There was a time when stories of American history were taught in almost every grade, and this plan resulted in much tiresome repetition. In order to avoid this, the 1921 program assigned to Grades 5 and 6 stories of Hebrew, Greek, Roman and English history. While there is much valuable material in this field, experience has shown that two years of work upon it was too much time, and that one year is probably sufficient. In the new program, the fourth and fifth grades are given stories of our own country. The sixth grade studies the European background of American history, which serves as a basis for a more thorough understanding of our nation's development as studied in the seventh and eighth grades.
d. More-definite standards or goals in each subject. Throughout the new program, there are helpful suggestion: for teaching different subjects effectively. There are also many specific statements as to the degree of mastery expected in each grade. Both of these features should be of help to teachers in securing a higher quality of work on the part of their pupils.
e. Partioular reference to the needs of the rural teacher. Teaching a rural school has a techique all its own. A teacher who can do a splendid job of teaching in a city school may find herself quite at a loss in a one-room school with six or more grades. It is encouraging to find this fact recognized by the authors of our new program of studies, and to find many helpful suggestions advanced for the use of the teacher in a rural school.

## Our Schools and the Community

For several years past, the schools have co-operated in a demonstration of their work for the benefit of the public. This program has usually been held in November, but was postponed in 1930 with the thought that a later time in the year would be more suitable. There is no intention of discontinuing this kind of meeting, for it seems to promote a friendly and helpful interest in the schools on the part of the many who attend these programs.

Grateful mention should be made here of the interest shown by the local post of the American Legion, which has offered for several years a prize for the best essay on a worth while subject, written by the pupils in our elementary schools.

## Recommendations for the Coming Year

1. Visit school one or more times each year. All parents are urged to call at the school which their children are attending, for at least half an hour at some time during the year, We are always glad to welcome parents and neighbors
at our schools. Their visits help in many ways, especially by developing a better understanding between parents and teachers.
2. Improved attendance and less tardiness. It is manifestly a waste of money to pay a teacher to teach children, if the children are not there to learn. No excuse other than ill health should keep a child from school a single day. Furthermore, the habit of being late, which many of us adults have formed, ought not to be encouraged in our children. Parents, by taking care, can prevent much of the absence and tardiness which mar our records each year.
3. Continued improvement of school buildings. The school that needs attention most urgently this year seems to be the River Road school. Its underpinning and floor are in such a condition as to make replacement imperative.

Three other buildings are in need of repairs or improvements. The South Weare school has only half enough window space. The Center school, where the walls are painted over wall paper, is in urgent need of cleaning up and repainting inside. The exterior of the High School building needs painting.

I would recommend that the district appropriate money for a thorough job of improvement at the River Road school, and that the funds usually appropriated for minor repairs be used to do as much work on the other schools mentioned as can reasonably be done this year.

## Conclusion

Grateful acknowledgment is here made of the cordial cooperation of school board members, teachers and other citizens of Weare. Let us continue to practice the motto, "Work together for the good of the children."
